Neighbors in the 8400 block on Ozark Avenue have been calling the office since Saturday reporting on the refuse being taken out of a home in the neighborhood by the Niles Public Works Department: They reported dog leavings have been accumulating in the basement and compared the stench and mess in this home to a similar happening in a Des Plaines apartment some months ago.

We stopped off at the home last Saturday and a large refuse dumpster was on the street in front of the house loaded with items removed from the home.

We sent a reporter into the area Saturday but the reporter said it was a delicate matter since a Niles official was indirectly involved. It is the home of his former wife and the teporter preferred not to cover the story. However, we were told by several callers only The Bugle would follow up and report such a story so we feel obliged to report what is certainly a legitimate news story. Several of the callers were indignant because they implied since the Niles official was indirectly involved, it was being hushed up and taxpayers were being forced to foot the bill.

. In conversation with Niles manager Ken Scheel he told us the village received a court order prior to taking this action. This is the proper legal action before entering a private home and removing private property. Scheel said a sewer had backed up causing a great amount of articles becoming mildewed. The village had first been alerted to the building because old refrigerators were placed outside the residence. This led to the eventual court order.

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
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
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Niles Park District files condemnation suit

Condemnation proceedings were set in motion in mid-Oct. by the Niles Park District on 5 lots in the Betty-Chester site, totaling approximately 1/4 acre in size.

The lots, according to Niles Park District attorney Gabriel Berrafato, are owned by Western Finance, a Chicago subsidiary of Western Savings & Loan.

The Niles Park District already wns 4 properties between Cheser and Greenwood, known as Greenwood Park, acquired in 1969 for approximately \$70,000. The proposed acquisition of the 5 new lots would expand the Chester sites, forming an "L" shaped park.

The acquisition of 6 lots was set under the successful, 1973 park eferendum," said Park Commissioner Walter Beusse, "but due to tight finances, the Board's ultimate decision was to acquire only the 5 parcels." The lots are mproved with water and utilities.

The Betty-Chester site and the Jewish Cemetery site on Shermer Rd. are the last of land acquisitions sought under the 1973

Of the \$2,715,000 Park Referendum, approximately \$350,772 remains for purchase of the two remaining parksites. Another \$291,967.59 remains for develop-

# Library buys adjoining lot

The Board of Trustees of the just announced that the Library District has entered into negotia-tions for the purchase of the vacant property just west of the main library building at 6960 Oakton st. The Board and many citizens of the Library District have long felt the need for the Library District to acquire this property for immediate expansion of the Library's very limited parking facilities and for future expansion of the Library building.

The purchase of this property has been made by the Board in exercising its legal authority, "to purchase or lease real or personal property...for the use of the library...". In order to finance this purchase the Board has executed a mortgage on the present library building in the amount of \$117,500 and has made an earnest money deposit of \$10,000 amortized over a 3 year period without any need for increased tax rates, as permitted by Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 81, section 1005-5.

With this acquisition the Librawill soon be able to alleviate the present shortage of parking space, which has been causing great inconvenience to the people of the Library District and will also be in a postion to expand the main library facilities in the



parcels for mailing: A single item in a package should be cushioned with shredded paper, excelsior, compressed tissue paper, cloth, or expanded

If two or more items are mailed in the same carton or box, cushioning material should protect all items from contact with each other, and each item should have its own individual wrapper.

Cardboard containers, including large soap, cereal boxes, etc., larger than the gift being mailed should be cut down to about the size of the gift to minimize shaking and breaking in

#### **Apply Before You Retire**

Planning to retire at the end of 1974? You may apply for social security benefits up to 3 months before you retire. Also, you do not have to take time from work to visit your social security office, as you may apply by telephone.

It may take up to 90 days to process your application for retirement benefits, so by filing in advance your first benefit check will not be delayed. Retirement benefits cannot begin before age 62.

Be sure to have your birth certificate and/or baptismal certificate available when you apply. If these documents are lost or not available, find the oldest documentary evidence you have to establish your age. Your Social Security Office will assist you in obtaining proof of your age. If you have a spouse and/or children who may qualify for benefits have their birth and/or baptismal records available also.

Your W-2 statement for last year and an estimate of your total earnings for 1974 and months you earned over \$200 will be requested. If you are self-employed, you will need your tax return for 1973.

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

#### Oakton reports record first day registration

Oakton Community College set a new record for first-day registration for a college semester last Thurs., Nov. 21, doubling the number of last year's opening

A total of 796 students were registered, compared with 384 on the first day of registration for the Spring 1973 term, according to John Gagin, director of admissions and records.

Registration at the local community college began for full and part-time students presently enrolled at Oakton who plan to return next semester.

"New registration procedures, an increase in the number computer terminals to process students, and a new liberalized payment procedure enabled us to serve more students efficiently. Few students had to wait long in a line," Gagin said.

Gagin recommends that stu dents who plan to attend Oakton next spring apply now for admission in order to enroll in classes of their choice. Registration by appointment for full and parttime students will continue from low until mid-Jan. Students who are unable to register prior to January 13 may apply and/or-register at the Admissions Office in Building 3 at Oakton during open registration on January 13 and 14, 1975.

Classes for the spring semester will begin during the week of January 20, 1975. The Spring 1975 Class Schedule will be mailed to all area resident next

Payment for tuition and fees may be made at the time of registration or deferred to Jan. 2. 1975. Gagin said. Payment of tuition and fees for open or late registration must be made at the time of registration or within 24

Payments not received within the deadlines will result in the computer automatically dropping a student from all registered courses, he explained. Students needing financial aid should see Michael Dessimoz in the Office of Financial Aids, in the Admissions

The recent purchase of the Henry Koehler property on Howard st. in Des Plaines, adjoining the Maine West campus, by the Board of Education of Maine Township High school District 207 has brought into sharp focus the significant changes that have come to the Wolf-Oakton area in recent years. Open farmland just

The Koehler property, at 626 Howard st., is a nostalgic reminder of the semi-rural nature of the district as it used to be. The attractive, well-maintained frame home stands amid a grove of benerable oaks and maples, about 500 feet east of Wolf rd. on about an acre of ground that juts into, and is surrounded by, Maine West's practice fields. On three sides of the property, wide open spaces remain; but instead of viewing cornfields and truck Sciortino are experienced in State gardens from their windows as they did a few years back, the Maine West athletes playing Gerard is an adult "C" in foil and baseball, soccer and football. 

novel of the same name. The author of the novel was Frederick William Rolfe. A misfit and recluse all his life, Rolfe has been regarded as a literary curiosity, an impoverished and freakishly talented eccentric.

At 26 he became a convert to Catholicism and decided to become a priest but was refuffed he was twice expelled from seminaries. An embittered, lonely man, he tried being a painter, a designed, a composer and a photographer, and he did manage to write and have published ten novels which few people read.

His best-received novel during his lifetime, and the best known today, is "Hadrian VII", in which Rolfe fantasied his own life and revenged himself for slights hehad suffered from the Catholic hierarchy. He imagined that a bishop and a cardinal came to beg him to accept the priesthood he longed for. Then when a Papal Conclave was deadlocked over the election of a new Pope, enough Cardinals decided at one parti cular ballot to throw their votes away by voting for Rolfe's hero, whom he called George Arthur Rose, to elect him to the papacy to everyone's astonishment. leaving Rolfe-Rose on his elevation to grandeur to swagger his way through the intrigues and manueverings of his non-too-devoted Cardinals.

This is the second grocery store which has been converted for village purposes and the effort seems to be a financial bonanza. The huge building and parking lot cost \$250,000 and an additional \$200,000 was spent in renovating the building. A layman's ball park guesstimate would imagine a comparable project built from scratch would cost twice as much.

The senior citizens lounge and the teen center have private entrances for both groups with a huge lounge in each area. The family service area also has a private entrance and the many rooms there are certainly conducive for most productive

Trustee Abe Selman noted Niles free bus service stops alongside the building enabling Nilesites of all ages to be able to easily come to and from the facility.

Feeling pretty good about all of Niles facilities Ken Scheel and Bob Goldberg both laughingly made reference to the conversion of the former supermarkets. Noting Niles. converted an A & P into the administration building and a Jewel was changed into the new center both of them remarked the village is now looking for a National Tea store for their next project.

Regarding the teen center facilities located in the Trident Community Center, we find a note of inconsistency in village policies. Recently an ordinance was passed in the Village of Niles which prohibits the purchase of cigarettes out of a machine or over the counter by anyone under the age of 18. Yet, we noted recently there are signs on the walls of the Teen Center which state. "Do not throw your butts on the floor." It does not seem logical to us that a village which does not allow vouths under the age of 18 to purchase cigarettes would allow. youths of 14, 15 and 16 to smoke while they are in the Teen Community Center which is operated by the village.

On Sunday night we were with Morton Grove trustee Marty Ashman but forgot to ask him about an effort in his town which should be considered in other villages. We were told Ashman led the way for senior citizens to have their water bills reduced by 50% in Morton Grove. Such an effort seems most worthwhile and neighboring towns might consider similar action. During this tremendous inflation residents on fixed incomes are the hardest hit. Any relief they can be given should be of paramount interest to village officials.
