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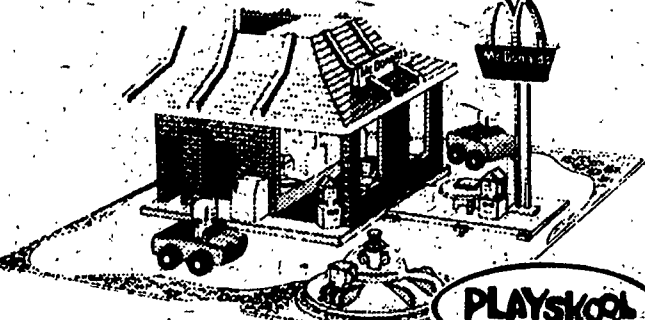
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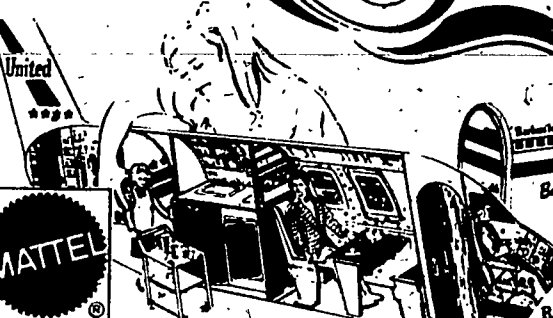
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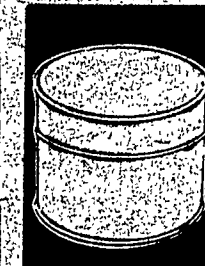

Neighbors in the 8400 block on Ozark Avenue have been calling the office since Saturday reporting on the refuse being taken out of a home in the neighborhood by the Niles Public Works Department. They reported dog leavings have been accumulating in the basement and compared the stench and mess in this home to a similar happening in a Des Plaines apartment some months ago.

We stopped off at the home last Saturday and a large refuse dumpster was on the street in front of the house loaded with items removed from the home.

We sent a reporter into the area Saturday but the reporter said it was a delicate matter since a Niles official was indirectly involved. It is the home of his former wife and the reporter preferred not to cover the story. However, we were told by several callers only The Bugle would follow up and report such a story so we feel obliged to report what is certainly a legitimate news story. Several of the callers were indignant because they implied since the Niles official was indirectly involved, it was being hushed up and taxpayers were being forced to foot the bill.

In conversation with Niles manager Ken Scheel he told us the village received a court order prior to taking this action. This is the proper legal action before entering a private home and removing private property. Scheel said a sewer had backed up causing a great amount of articles becoming mildewed. The village had first been alerted to the building because old refrigerators were placed outside the residence. This led to the eventual court order.

On a recent canoe trip on the Wisconsin River, these scouts aided an overturned canoeist, and

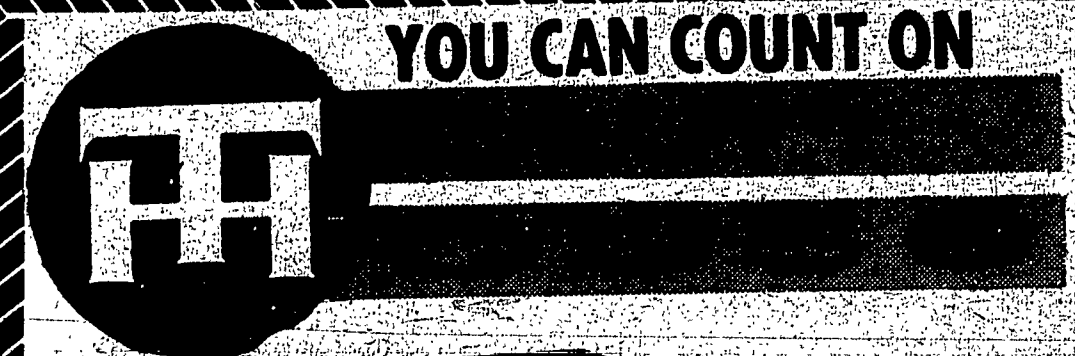
helped many others when the weather suddenly became stormy. They also helped locate two youngsters who were caught on the river by darkness.

files condemnation suit

Condemnation proceedings were set in motion in mid-Oct. by the Niles Park District on 5 lots in the Betty-Chester site, totaling approximately 1/4 acre in size.

The lots, according to Niles Park District attorney Gabriel Berrafato, are owned by Western Finance, a Chicago subsidiary of Western Savings & Loan.

The Niles Park District already owns 4 properties between Chester and Greenwood, known as Greenwood Park, acquired in 1969 for approximately \$70,000. The proposed acquisition of the 5 new lots would expand the Chester sites, forming an "L" shaped park.

The acquisition of 6 lots was set under the successful, 1973 park referendum," said Park Commissioner Walter Beusse, "but due to tight finances, the Board's ultimate decision was to acquire only the 5 parcels." The lots are improved with water and utilities.

The Betty-Chester site and the Jewish Cemetery site on Shermer Rd. are the last of land acquisitions sought under the 1973 Referendum.

Of the \$2,715,000 Park Referendum, approximately \$350,772 remains for purchase of the two remaining park sites. Another \$291,967.59 remains for develop-

ment expenditures for both parcels.

Development of the Betty-Chester site under the Referendum calls for 2 tennis courts with lights and colored surfaces, a basketball court, playground equipment, benches and landscaping.

Bargaining for the 5 properties, said Attorney Berrafato, was finally broken off due to the substantial difference in price. The Park Board decided to file condemnation proceedings following an executive session on land acquisition last Oct. 15.

A favorable decision by the Court will set condemnation price as a fair market price, finalized by real estate appraisals of the property.

According to Park Commissioner Walter Beusse, the Park Board hopes that condemnation proceedings at Betty-Chester may be dropped through negotiations between Park District and property owners.

Library buys
adjoining lot

The Board of Trustees of the Niles Public Library District has just announced that the Library District has entered into negotiations for the purchase of the vacant property just west of the main library building at 6960 Oakton st. The Board and many citizens of the Library District have long felt the need for the Library District to acquire this property for immediate expansion of the Library's very limited parking facilities and for future expansion of the Library building.

The purchase of this property has been made by the Board in exercising its legal authority, "to purchase or lease real or personal property... for the use of the library." In order to finance this purchase the Board has executed a mortgage on the present library building in the amount of \$117,500 and has made an earnest money deposit of \$10,000 amortized over a 3 year period without any need for increased tax rates, as permitted by Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 81, section 1005.5.

With this acquisition the Library will soon be able to alleviate the present shortage of parking space, which has been causing great inconvenience to the people of the Library District and will also be in a position to expand the main library facilities in the future.

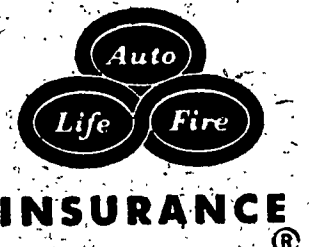
"What will be, will be" seems the best way to construe this year's golf campaign, which ended Tuesday, Oct. 22, at the conference meet held at Niles East.

Nov. 15 saw the beginning of the Maine East basketball season with the annual Blue and White intra-squad games. Officially the season began Friday, Nov. 23, as the Demons host Palatine.

This year the Demons are looking forward to a very successful season on all levels. Coach Andy Russo commented on his freshman squad by saying, "I'm very optimistic about this year. Our guards are quick, and we have the big men to do the rebounding. Most importantly, the boys work together well and have a good attitude."

The sophomore team, coached by Craig Schafer, has an excellent chance to win the C.S.L. conference. Last year as freshmen, they won 20 and lost only 1. Coach Schafer had this to say about his team, "The boys have been improving and showing a very good attitude. We're going to be tall and have depth at all positions. As for coming close to last year's record, we'll just take one game at a time and see what happens. We certainly have the talent on this time to do it if everybody does their job and works hard."

Notre Dame wrestling teams

The wrestling program began at Notre Dame High School in September of 1970. After two years of wrestling a frosh-soph schedule with some varsity matches, the 1972-73 season was the Dons' first full varsity season against strong competition with only one senior, mostly juniors, and some sophomores and freshmen. Although the going was tough, especially at first, the Dons finished with a respectable 9-9-1 dual season while capturing first place in the Luther-North Tournament and finishing second in the S.C.C. tournament behind a tough Carmel squad. Individually Vito Vee at 105 lbs, won 1st place in the conference and district tournaments, 2nd in sectionals, and became the 1st N.D. wrestler to participate in the state championship meet in Champaign. Mark Mandelini at 155 and Al Marzano at 185 also won conference championships and were district place winners.

This year's young wrestling team will be led by senior captain Kevin Walsh of Niles at 112 lbs. Three other seniors will be Ken Barge of Chicago at 145, Brian Burke of Skokie at 167, and Paul Allibene of Niles at 185.

The 1974 season opens on Nov. 23 in Elmhurst at 1:30 p.m. against a strong York H.S. team. Notre Dame defeated them last year. Then the Dons make their home debut the following Wednesday evening, Nov. 27, at 6:30 p.m. against always tough Gordon Tech. In other home battles they will wrestle Barrington on Dec. 10, St. Viator on Dec. 13 and Buffalo Grove on Dec. 20. They meet Holy Cross, Carmel, Glenbrook South and Schaumburg also in December and will be in a tournament on Dec. 28.

Notre Dame swimming teams

The varsity and sophomore swimming teams of Notre Dame High School will begin their 18th year of competition on Nov. 29 against East Leyden of Franklin Park. The meet will be at the East Leyden pool at 1 p.m.

Coach Bill Casey, who has been at Notre Dame since 1959, says, "We have beaten East Leyden in the past, but they will be tough this season." Coach Casey also notes that he has only three seniors on this year's varsity. They are Captain Ed Zonsius, Fran Gambro, and Don Knill. All three live in Niles. Zonsius hopes to break a school record set by Tim Gilmore of last year's varsity in the 500 yd. freestyle. He also wants to qualify for the state meet at New Trier East on Mar. 1st and be the Suburban Catholic Conference champion in the 500 freestyle. Gambro hopes to be the team sprinter, but is being challenged by Mike Walsh of Niles, a junior, and Dave Herd- rich of Des Plaines, a sophomore. Don Knill, the third senior, is a diver and one of three returning lettermen in this event. The other divers are Jim Brennan of Niles and Craig Zebad of Glenview. Both are juniors. Sophomores Joe Koziol of Glenview and Rob Smith of Niles will also dive for the varsity this season. Coach Casey predicts that diving will be the

team's strongest event. The diving coach is David Porterfield who also teaches in the Communication Arts Department.

Returning letterman Jeff Stahl of Morton Grove, a junior, hopes to set a new school record in the 100 yd. breaststroke, qualify for the state meet, and be the S.C.C. champion in breaststroke.

Others working hard for the team and for personal goals will be Tim Burke of Skokie, Eric Otten of Morton Grove, and Brian Walsh of Niles. They are juniors. Burke swims the back stroke. Otten swims the freestyle and breaststroke events. Walsh could swim the individual medley which requires all four strokes - freestyle, back, breast, and butterfly. Sophomores Bill Meyer of Glenview and Jim McNab of Niles hope to win varsity positions this year. Meyer hopes to swim distance freestyle and McNab either backstroke or butterfly.

On Nov. 30, Notre Dame will participate in the St. Viator Relays. They will start at 2:30 p.m. Other teams entered besides Notre Dame and St. Viator are Buffalo Grove, Maine North and Elk Grove. Tough meets follow with Arlington on Dec. 3, Niles North on Dec. 14, Maine East on Jan. 3, Glenbrook South on Jan. 11, Marmion on Jan. 24 and St. Viator on Feb. 2.

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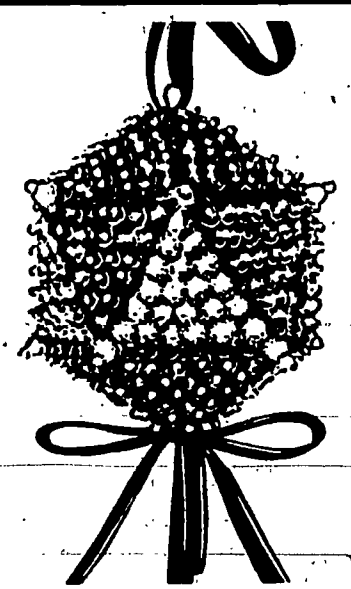

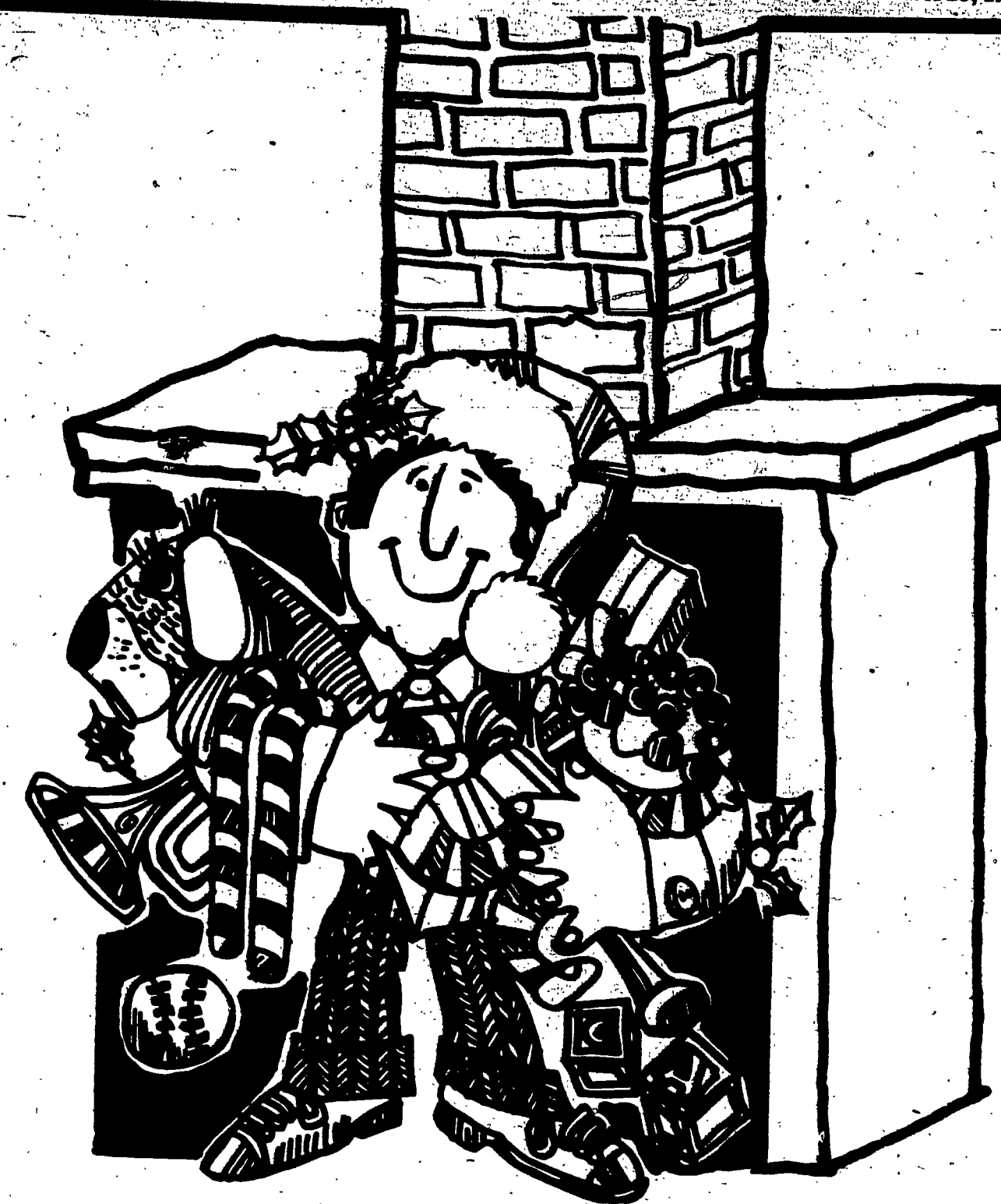

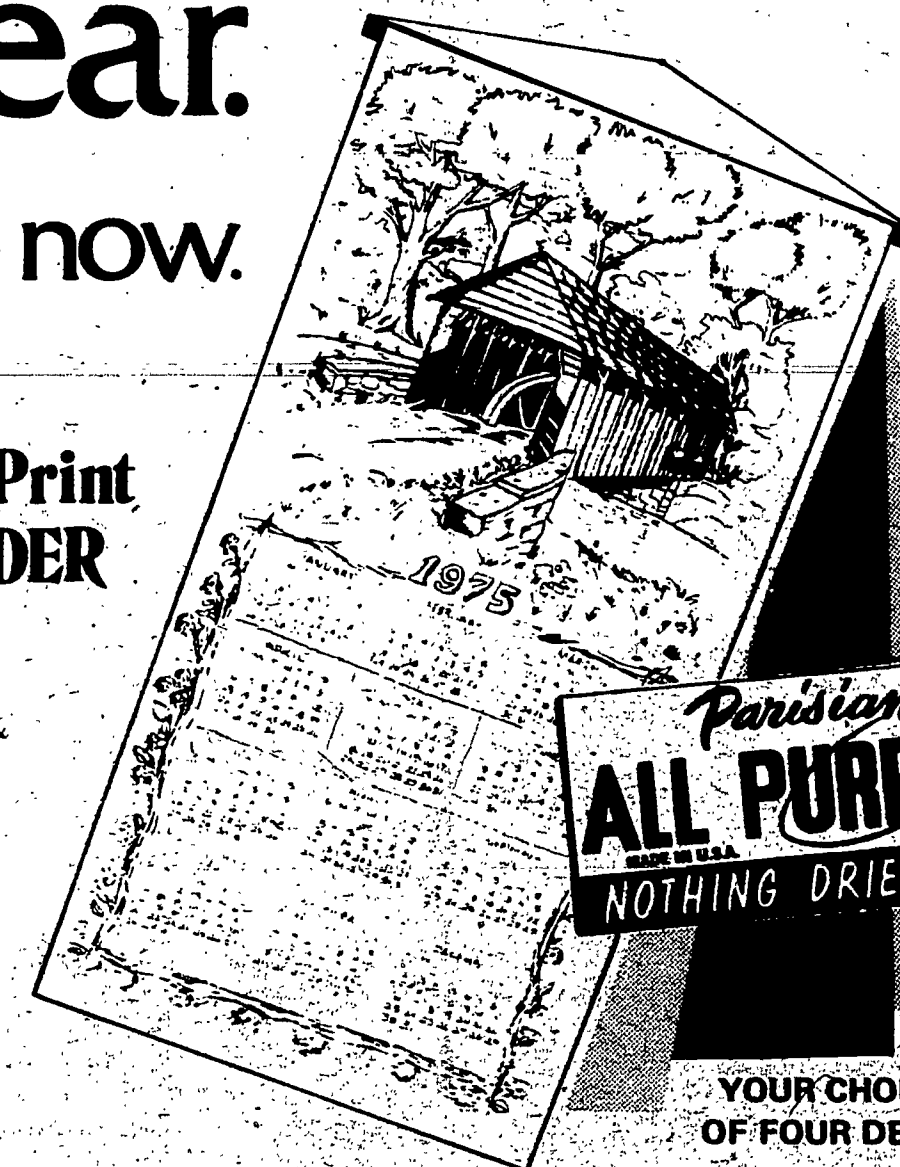

Trident Community Center formally opens doors

Despite a drizzling rain on a dreary Sunday afternoon, approximately 150 Niles residents turned out for the formal dedication and Open House of the Village-Trident Community Center.

Formerly a Jewel supermarket, the 15,000 sq. ft. building at 8060 W. Oakton st. was purchased for \$250,000 last April and remodeled in May at a cost of \$170,000, to house Family Service, the Senior Citizens Center and a Teen Center. Each has its own entryway into the building.

J. Emil Anderson & Co. architects drew up the remodeling plans for the Community Center, which has parking for approximately 70 cars and a bocce court on the north side of the parking lot.

During the brief dedication ceremonies on Sun., Mayor Nicholas Blase credited Niles as "being more than any other community in the northwest suburbs, always innovative and progressive." Following a sug-

gestion made to him three years ago, said Blase, of combining the 3 services, plus utilization of almost \$500,000 of Federal Revenue Sharing funds, the remodeled community center was dedicated to village service.

Senior Citizens Center
The northeast corner of the building is devoted to senior citizens. According to Senior Citizen Co-ordinator Mary Kay McCarthy, it will be a planned activities and drop-in center for senior citizens in Niles.

Of the 2 senior citizen groups in Niles, the All-American Senior citizens, a limited group of 125 who presently congregate on Fridays at the Rec Center, will use the Community Center as a meeting place beginning the first of next year.

The Niles Senior Citizens Club, a going group, also limited to 125 members, have been sponsored by the Niles Park District for many years, meeting on Thursday afternoons at the Recreation Center with planned outings during the year.

Teen Center

The Teen Center, located in the west portion of the Community building, was originally innovated about a year ago, by the Niles Youth Commission. "We searched for space, finally locating at the N.P. District Rec Center 3 days a week," said Youth Commission chairman Abe Selman. Two young counselors, in their late 20's, Paul Hanson and James Kessler were hired to assist with activities for the Junior High to Senior High School age groups.

The Teen group moved into the Center last Oct. 21, according to Selman, and have enjoyed good attendance.

There are changes in the offering, he said, such as a possible change in name, from Teen to Youth Center. A developing organization, of membership cards and dues is also in the planning.

A Kickoff Dance, planned for Friday, Nov. 29, will have a live rock group "Catharsis", a 6 member youth from Maine East,

Notre Dame and Roosevelt University.

Current funding allows the Teen Center to be open 5 afternoon/evenings per week. Selman looks to open hours on a daily basis.

Niles Family Service

Innovated 6 years ago, in 1969, a mental health-family service type agency was established as the Niles Family Service, quartered in the old firehouse on Touhy and Milwaukee aves. Under the direction of Larry Renetzky, the Service moved into the Lawrencewood Shopping Center and, in Sept., 1974, into the Community Center on Oakton st.

The agency's claim of servicing 2,000 families puts a unique light on such a progressive village, handling 225 cases per month. Family Service is located in the northeast corner of the Center, on a 24 hour, 7 days a week basis.

Visitor to the dedication on Sun., Mrs. Svea Lutgen, 7508 Keneby, who moved to Niles from Chicago 3 years ago with her

husband, thinks "Niles is a beautiful town...this Center will give senior citizens a chance to get out. If we stay at home, we get stale."

Teenager Barbara Lee, 15, of 8352 Oconto, said of the Center, "It's pretty nice here." She attends Glenview Youth Center, but would like to come to the Niles Teen Center, "to see what programs they have to offer."

Mrs. Florence Herberts, 8322 Olcott, a self-styled "junior" senior citizen, and very civic minded, chose to look over the Center to see what the \$500,000 in Federal Revenue Sharing funds bought. "It looks very nice," was her only comment.

Mr. and Mrs. Donald Ericson, 8100 Prospect ave., 19-year residents of Niles, were somewhat cautious in their opinions, expressing the desire to join a senior citizens organization.

Fred Reisdorf, 8149 Oak In., resident of Niles for 21 years, was blunt... "I'd like to come in and use the Center...it's a very fine building."

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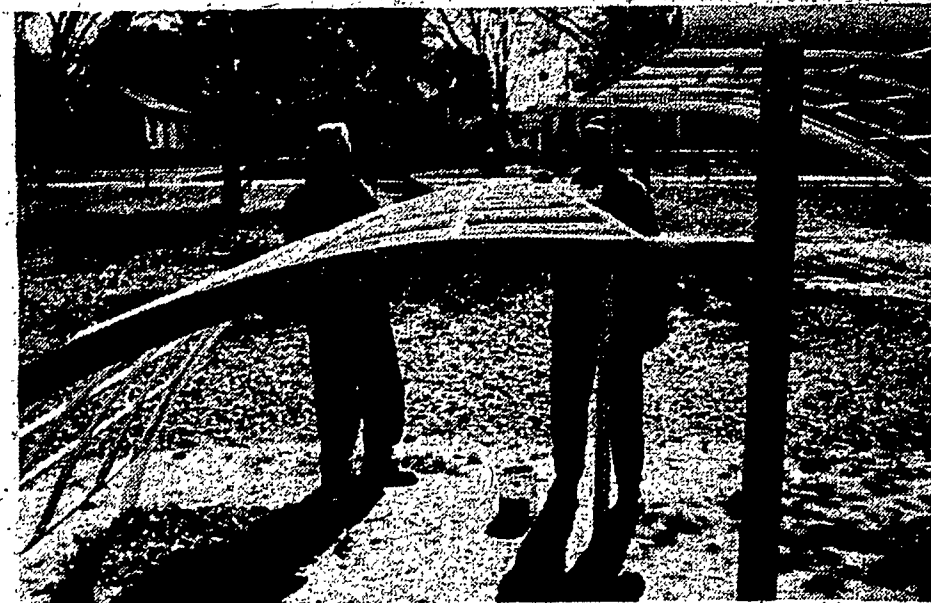

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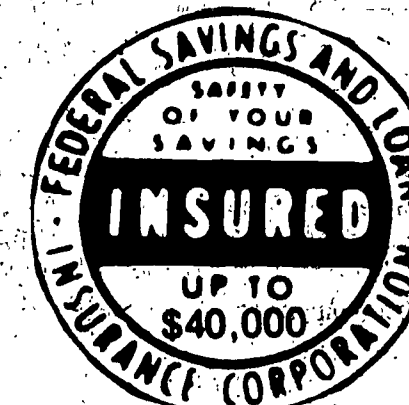


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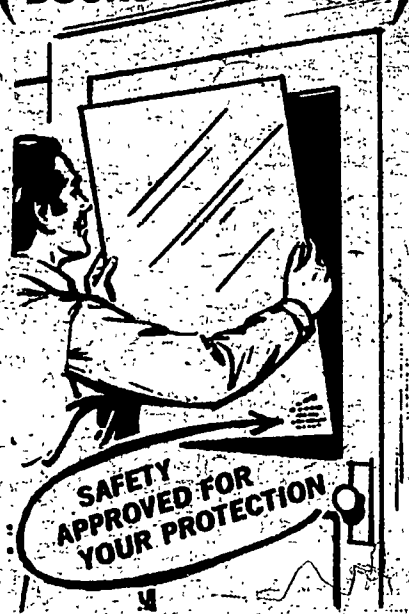

"Thank You"

Two little words, but, Oh! how much these two words can mean. Just think back the last time someone responded to something you did for them by saying "Thank You". Make you feel good? Most of the time it does, especially if you believe the person meant it. We all want to feel that we are appreciated; saying "thank you" helps to convey this.

Fortunately, most any person, young or old, can say "thank you". Unfortunately, you don't hear it as often as you used to. I can remember when the following was more the rule than the exception:

A youngster "thanking" his parents for something that they did for him; not accepting it as a matter of fact. A parent saying "thank you" to his child for a chore well done; not just "you had better or else."

The store clerk "thanking" you for the purchase made as she gives you the change; not that she is doing you a favor by waiting on you. A customer expressing "thanks" to the clerk who has been most accommodating; not just "it's their job".

The boss who expresses his appreciation to an employee for a job well done and can say "thank you"; not just "you're getting paid, aren't you". An employee who is able to say "thank you" when he receives his check or some other recognition for doing the job; not "well, I earned it, didn't I?"

The student who can acknowledge the help a teacher may be giving him by saying "thank you"; not "it's her duty, isn't it?". The teacher recognizing the student's honest effort to comply and follow through and saying once in a while "thank you" or "a job well done"; not just "it's what you're supposed to do."

A husband "thanking" his wife for a good supper, shirts pressed, or a clean house; not just accepting it as a matter of fact. A wife letting her husband know that she appreciated his hard work in helping to make a living for her and the family; not just accept it for granted.

I'm sure you could add some more to the list. Why don't you write or call me? Also, give me some examples when you were or were not thanked. I would like to hear from you. Of course, your name will be kept confidential if you wish. Also, don't forget to say thank you to somebody today, especially somebody you haven't said it to for awhile, that might also include "God".

Before I close, I want to say "thank you" to all of you residents of Niles. Thank you for accepting Niles Family Service and responding so enthusiastically to us. Thank you for your patience and understanding when we haven't always been able to help. Thank you for your support and encouragement to grow and to try to better meet the needs of those in crisis, as well as to provide an educational and preventive component. Most of all "thank you" for "having heart", for being "You", and for living in Niles and helping to make possible an "Agency With A Heart".

How to prepare Christmas parcels for mailing

Postmaster Don Swanson of Morton Grove offers the following tips on how to prepare Christmas parcels for mailing:

A single item in a package should be cushioned with shredded paper, excelsior, compressed tissue paper, cloth, or expanded plastic foam.

If two or more items are mailed in the same carton or box, cushioning material should protect all items from contact with each other, and each item should have its own individual wrapper.

Cardboard containers, including large soap, cereal boxes, etc., larger than the gift being mailed should be cut down to about the size of the gift to minimize shaking and breaking in transit.

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned, and all four

sides of the container should be padded with cushioning material.

Tape used to seal containers should be durable and should cover or firmly secure all flaps.

Paper for the outer wrapping should be at least equal in quality and strength to the draft stock used for grocery bags. Incidentally, such bags, in good condition, provide excellent wrapping when trimmed to the proper size to fit the package snugly.

Wrapped packages also should be secured with strong twine, not ordinary light string. Twine should be knotted at several intersecting points to keep it from loosening.

All packages that contain delicate articles should be marked FRAGILE.

Each package should contain the name and address of the

person to whom it is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address, contained inside is insurance that it will be received promptly even if the outside address should become lost or obliterated.

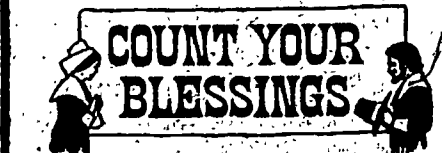
Be sure to put your return address on the package.

And, finally, address the package correctly and legible. Be sure to include the ZIP Code. (Call your local post office if you don't know your ZIP Code.) Mail with the proper ZIP Code is processed more rapidly.

Be sure to put only one address on the outside of the parcel. Do not address on more than one side.

"Don't forget the hungry birds this winter!" This is the theme of the late Fall display in the lobby case of the Morton Grove Public Library.

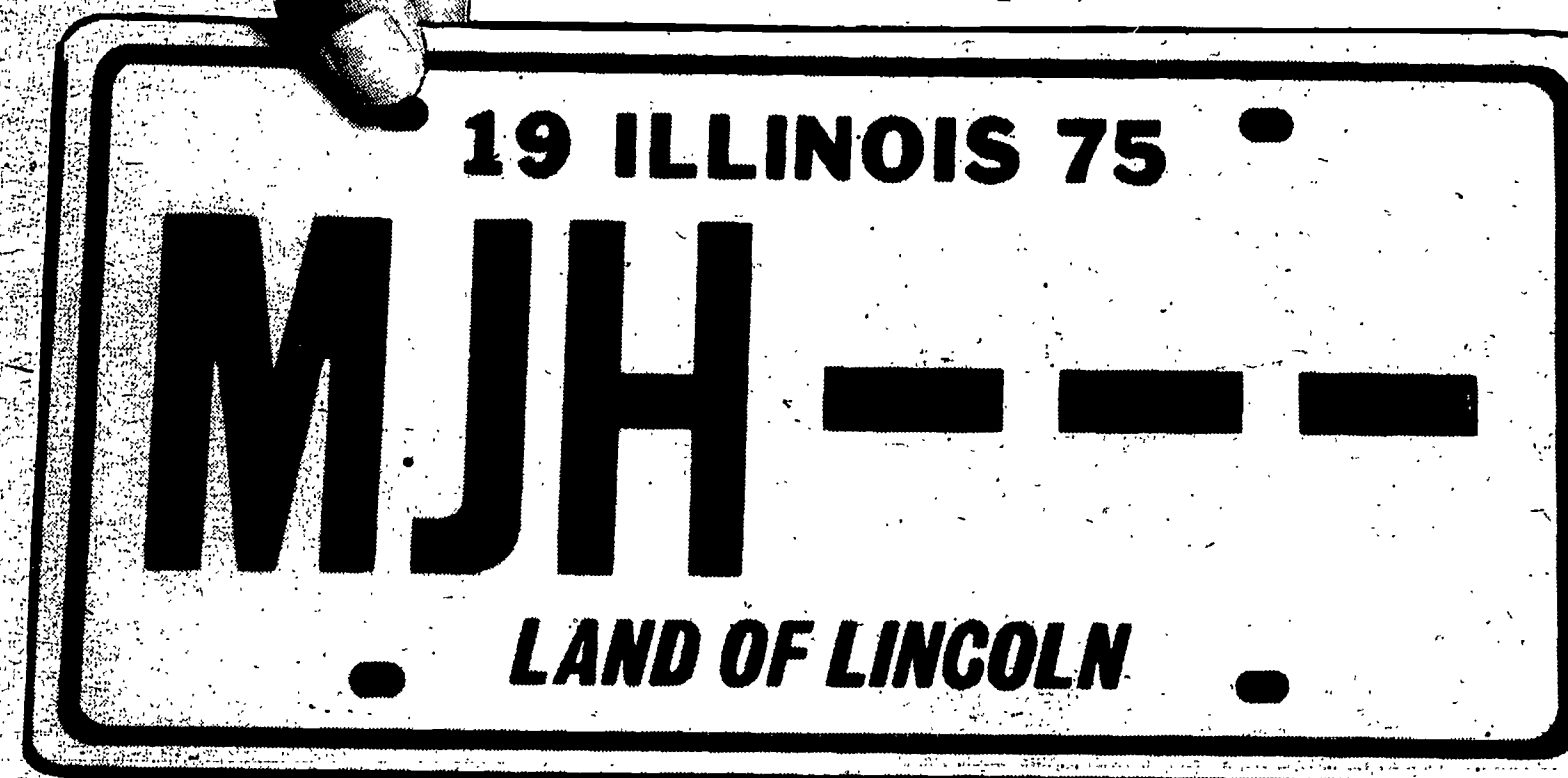
The display features model birds and nests contributed by Mrs. Louise Digerger. There is

There are many birds that stay with us during our cold winter months and they need our help to survive. Our wildlife is SO important, let's not forget to "feed the birds!"



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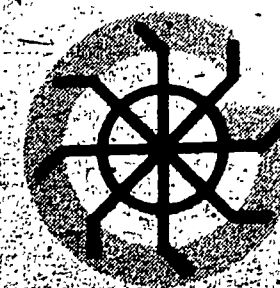

Apply Before You Retire

Planning to retire at the end of 1974? You may apply for social security benefits up to 3 months before you retire. Also, you do not have to take time from work to visit your social security office, as you may apply by telephone.

It may take up to 90 days to process your application for retirement benefits, so by filing in advance your first benefit check will not be delayed. Retirement benefits cannot begin before age 62.

Be sure to have your birth certificate and/or baptismal certificate available when you apply. If these documents are lost or not available, find the oldest documentary evidence you have to establish your age. Your Social Security Office will assist you in obtaining proof of your age. If you have a spouse and/or children who may qualify for benefits have their birth and/or baptismal records available also.

Your W-2 statement for last year and an estimate of your total earnings for 1974 and months you earned over \$200 will be requested. If you are self-employed, you will need your tax return for 1973.

To apply or obtain additional information, contact your social security office.

Keep callin'!

Q. The appointment of a Park Director was made several months ago, but there has been no mention of his salary. What is the Park District Director's annual salary?

E.K. Ans: According to Niles Park Director Bill Hughes, his annual salary, as set by the Park Board, is \$17,000.

Q. Is it true that Sara Lee is moving out of Niles?

E.R. Ans: Sara Lee has no intention of moving out of Niles, said store manager Dale Miller. "We like it here... we have outgrown our present location, however, and are looking at larger quarters around the corner."

Q. Can anything be done about the property located between 7313 Dempster and Abi Television at 7315 Dempster? It is a health hazard and an eyesore.

J.D. Ans: The owners of the property, Save Mor Drugs, have been told by the Village of Niles that they have until Jan. 1st to clean up the area or have someone else do it for them, said Village Manager Kenneth R. Scheel. "We can cite the property owners after Jan. 1 if the area is not cleaned up."

Q. What happened to the history of Niles, which was to have been printed in the Jubilee Year?

W.B. Ans: The 200-page book, "History of Niles", in the making for three years, said Village Historian Dotie Tyse, should be published around Dec. 1st. The delay was due to publishing and cost of printing.

Q. What is the building that has been so long in construction, on the north side of Dempster near Greenwood?

L.K. Ans: Pillsbury Poppin' Fresh Pies plans to open late in December. Original plans called for an earlier, Dec. 1, opening, said Village Manager Scheel, "but it doesn't look like it."

Q. Why are the floors and rooms so dirty at the Grénnan Heights Annex?

K.H. Ans: The Annex has been under surveillance for better maintenance, said Park Commissioner Walter Bousse, who stated that he will personally bring the problem to the attention of the Park Director this week. "We recognize the problem, which is partially due to abuse by the users of the gym as well as due to faulty supervision. The problem should not exist, with 3 full-time and 4 part-time personnel who are constantly at the Annex. Conditions will change very shortly according to Bousse, "and if they do not, there will be a change in personnel!"

Q. I was ticketed for going through the fire department stop signal on Dempster st. near Cumberland, commented a high school teacher. "In subsequently using the Dempster st. thoroughfare I notice many cars 'running' the light, to stop at the corner stoplight. Is this not discriminatory?"

B.A. Ans: When the light is red, the motorist must stop, said Niles Police Lt. Joseph Hanna. "Any motorist observed going through the Fire Department stoplight will be ticketed."

Q. Did Peerless Federal Savings & Loan, who requested a zoning permit for branch banking at the southeast corner of Mulford and Milwaukee, change their plans to come into Niles?

M.J. Ans: "Definitely not," said Peerless President Timothy Sheehan. We cancelled our appearance before the Nov. 27 Zoning Board Hearing only because our architectural plans for the proposed building and parking spaces were not completed. We are scheduled to appear before the Zoning Board on Dec. 18.

Oakton reports record first day registration

Oakton Community College set a new record for first-day registration for a college semester last Thurs., Nov. 21, doubling the number of last year's opening day.

A total of 796 students were registered, compared with 384 on the first day of registration for the Spring, 1973 term, according to John Gagin, director of admissions and records.

"Registration at the local community college began for full and part-time students presently enrolled at Oakton who plan to return next semester."

"New registration procedures, an increase in the number computer terminals to process students, and a new liberalized payment procedure enabled us to serve more students efficiently. Few students had to wait long in a line," Gagin said.

Gagin recommends that students who plan to attend Oakton next spring apply now for admission in order to enroll in classes of their choice. Registration by appointment for full and part-time students will continue from now until mid-Jan. Students who are unable to register prior to January 13 may apply and/or register at the Admissions Office in Building 3 at Oakton during open registration on January 13 and 14, 1975.

Classes for the spring semester will begin during the week of January 20, 1975. The Spring 1975 Class Schedule will be mailed to all area residents next week.

Payment for tuition and fees may be made at the time of registration or deferred to Jan. 2, 1975, Gagin said. Payment of tuition and fees for open or late registration must be made at the time of registration or within 24 hours.

Payments not received within the deadlines will result in the computer automatically dropping a student from all registered courses, he explained. Students needing financial aid should see Michael Dessimoz in the Office of Financial Aids, in the Admissions Office.

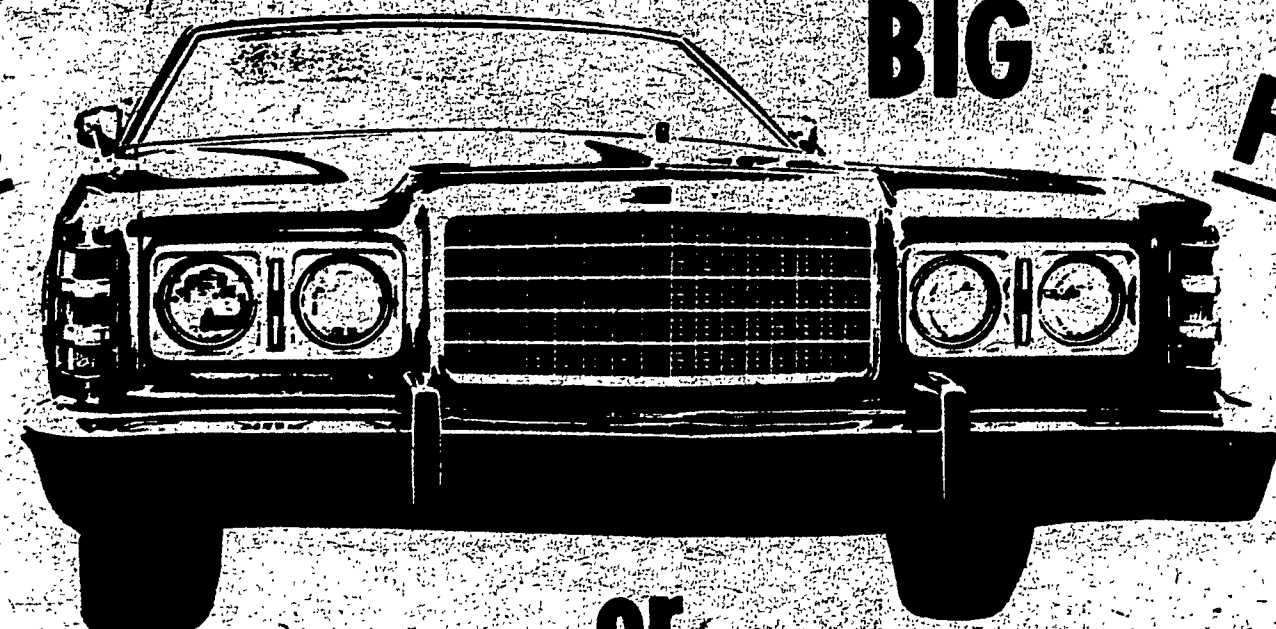

Notre Dame fencers win at Maine South Tournament

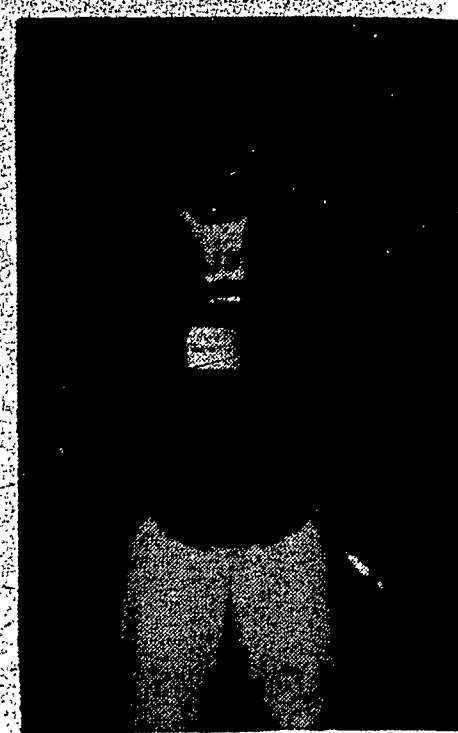
After a successful Detroit tournament on Nov. 17, Notre Dame fencers were also on top in the Maine South tournament on Nov. 23.

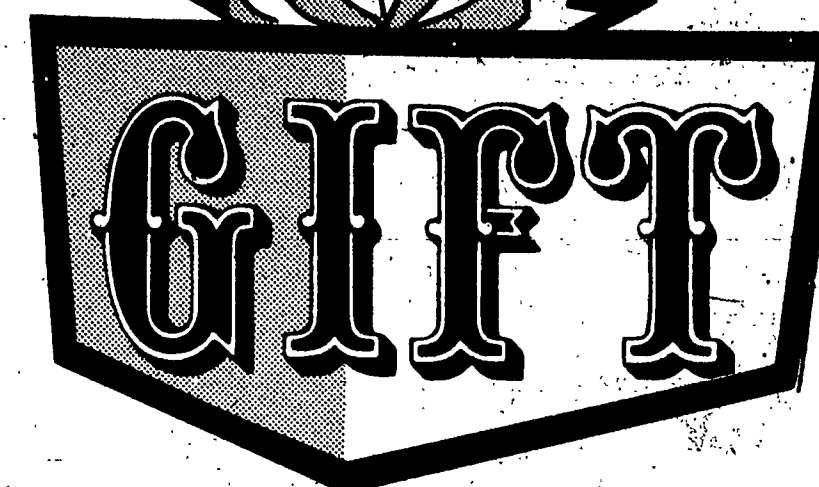
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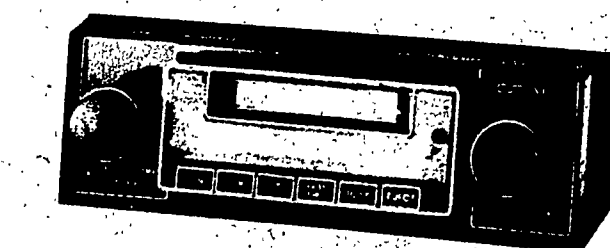
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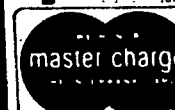
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Holds line on credit hour costs

Vivian H. Medak, chairperson of the Budget and Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees, Oakton Community College, reported this week that the unit cost of education paid by the local taxpayer to Oakton was down for the fiscal year which ended on June 30, 1974.

The unit costs paid from local taxes were \$28.22 per credit hour for fiscal year '74, down from \$28.44 for 1973.

This reduction resulted because the total unit cost increased only slightly and state support

was increased, Ms. Medak pointed out.

"In times of 10 to 12 percent inflation, I think the college should take credit for holding the line on costs while continuing to increase the quality and variety of educational programs offered," Ms. Medak commented.

Total cost per credit hour were up from \$57.79 in 1973 to \$59.06 in 1974, she added. This was an increase of 2 percent. State support during that period increased from \$19.35 to \$20.50, for

an increase of \$1.15 per credit hour.

Oakton increased the number of credit hours offered last year from 73,036 to 85,699. Ten new programs were introduced in to the college curriculum during 1973-74 as well as a number of new courses which were added to established programs.

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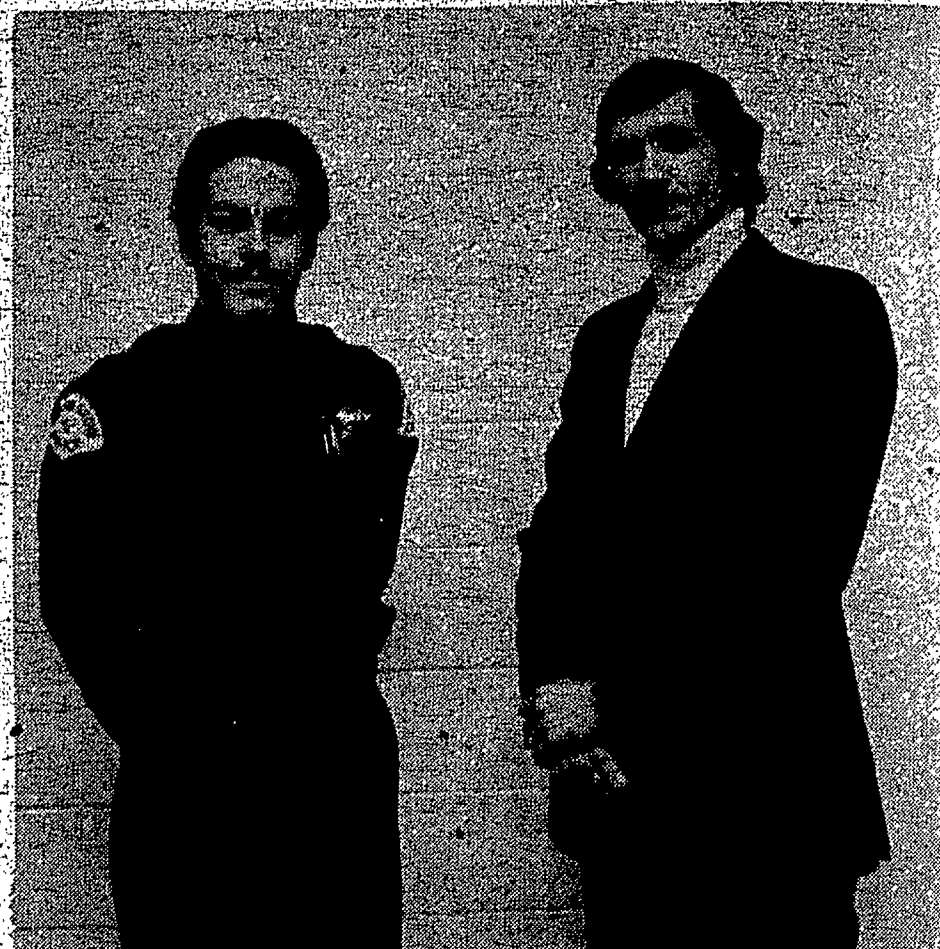

OCC accounting program expands

An estimated 1,000 students will enroll in accounting courses at Oakton Community College for the Spring, 1975, semester, according to Paul Grosso, coordinator of the OCC accounting program.

Enrollment in the eight accounting courses offered at Oakton jumped to 700 this fall from a total of 400 in spring of 1974.

"Our accounting program is geared to insuring that all students are qualified for good jobs," Mr. Grosso said. "In many cases, a person doesn't have to have a Bachelor of Science Degree to do a good job in accounting."

Secretaries working for promotions, people already employed in offices and even graduates with Bachelor of Science degrees in such fields as management and Business Administration, who need more accounting skills, all find they benefit from the Oakton program, according to Mr. Grosso.

Offerings in accounting at Oakton range from a basic "Principles of Accounting" course to "Corporation Income Tax Accounting." Students enrolled in the "Practicum Work Experience" class get credit for working in an accounting environment, along with classroom experience.

Oakton students may choose between a 30-hour certificate program requiring 21 semester hours of accounting, and an associate of arts degree program, requiring 61 to 64 hours. The latter includes all eight accounting courses and the required general education courses. All levels of accounting courses are available in both day and evening sessions, Mr. Grosso said.

Walker names OCC professor to state board

George Klein, assistant professor of anthropology at Oakton Community College, was recently appointed by Gov. Dan Walker and confirmed by the state senate as a member of the Illinois Mental Health Planning Board.

The Board is an independent citizens' panel which does long-range planning for mental health needs in the state. Board members currently are writing a plan for the regionalization of mental health services.

Klein is interested in the issues of emergency psychiatric services, involuntary commitments of patients to state hospitals, and forensic psychiatry. He will incorporate in his new position research he has done first-hand by accompanying police in apprehending mentally ill persons. Klein has also examined admission procedures for the involuntary commitment of the mentally ill to psychiatric hospitals.

The junior varsity didn't quite meet the expected demands. They ended up their season with the record of 1-6-1, but they did gain some valuable experience.

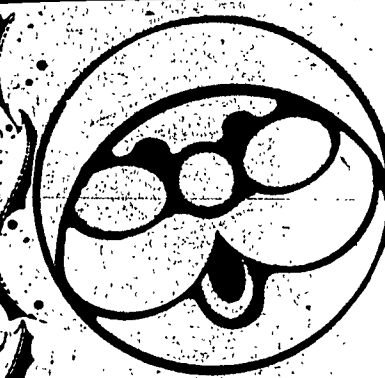
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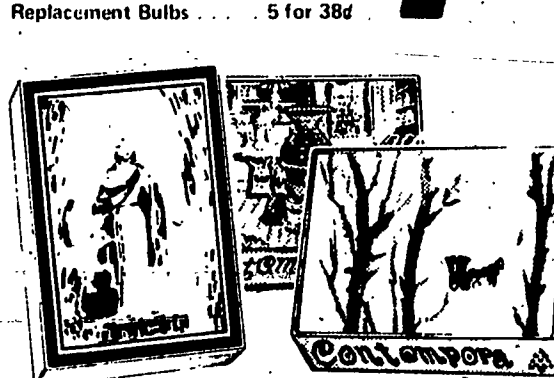
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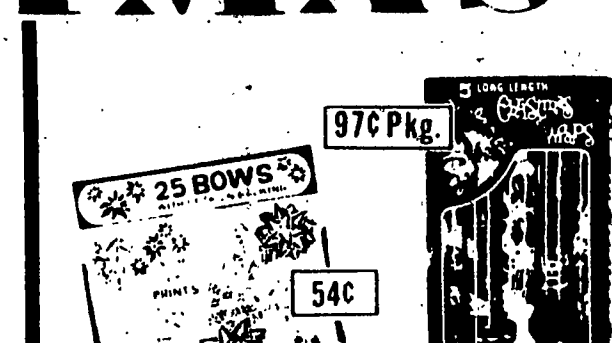
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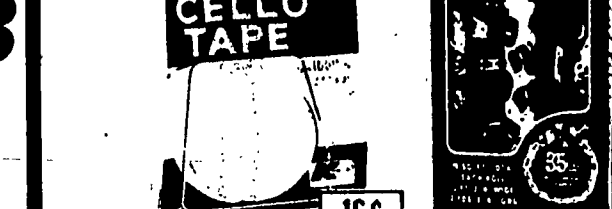
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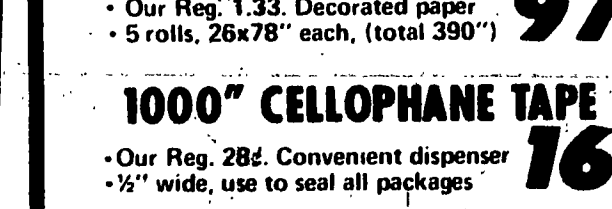
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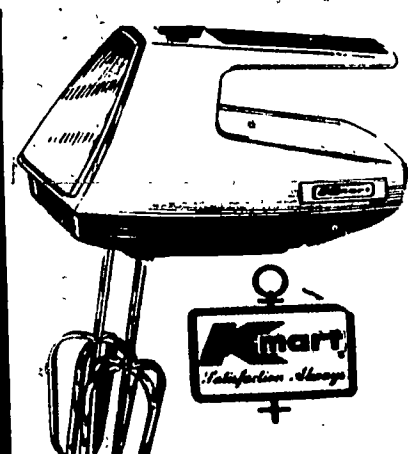
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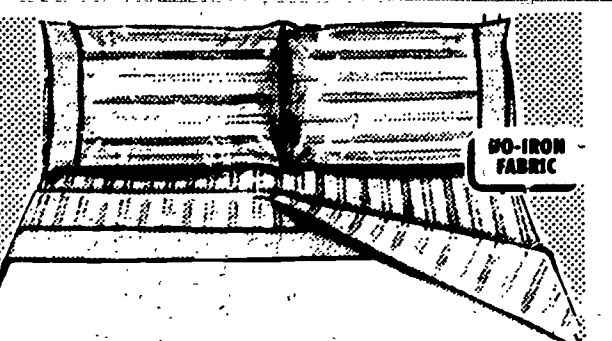
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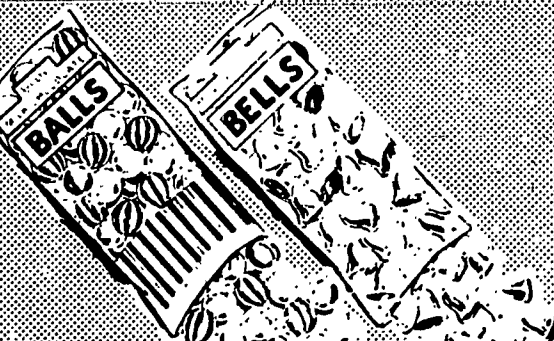


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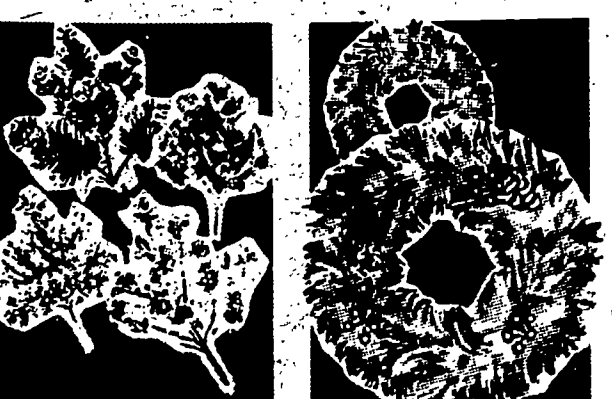


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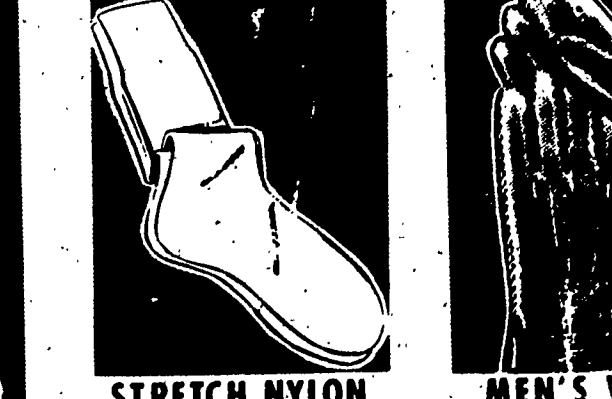


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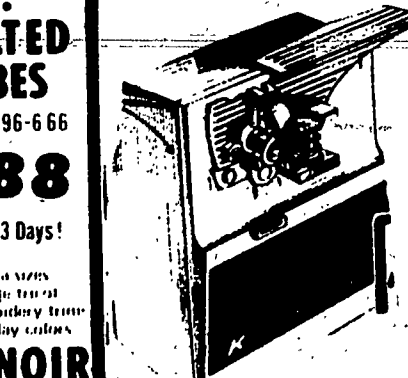


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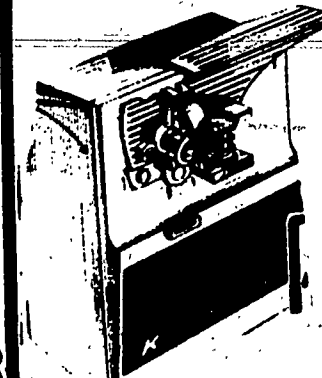

District 207 purchases Des Plaines property

The recent purchase of the Henry Koehler property on Howard st. in Des Plaines, adjoining the Maine West campus, by the Board of Education of Maine Township High School District 207 has brought into sharp focus the significant changes that have come to the Wolf-Oakton area in recent years. Open farmland just 17 years ago, this part of Des

Plaines is now the location of a large township high school, a choice industrial complex of modern manufacturing plants and many thriving business concerns.

The Koehler property, at 626 Howard st., is a nostalgic reminder of the semi-rural nature of the district as it used to be. The attractive, well-maintained frame home stands amid a grove of venerable oaks and maples, about 500 feet east of Wolf rd. on about an acre of ground that juts into, and is surrounded by, Maine West's practice fields. On three sides of the property, wide open spaces remain; but instead of viewing cornfields and truck gardens from their windows as they did a few years back, the Koehlers now look out upon Maine West athletes playing baseball, soccer and football.

Recently the Koehler family decided to sell the property and offered house and land to the District 207 Board of Education at a reasonable figure. Although it had not initiated the transaction, the Board was glad of the opportunity to complete the Maine West site as it was envisioned in the original plans for the school.

The history of Maine West goes back to the 1950's when Chicago's northwest suburbs experienced a tremendous population growth. By 1957 the school district's one high school, at Dempster st. and Potter rd. in Park Ridge, today known as Maine Township High School East, was overcrowded in spite of several expansion programs.

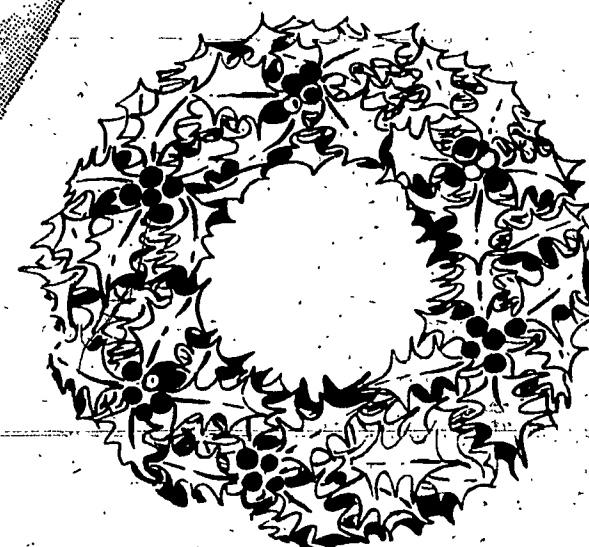
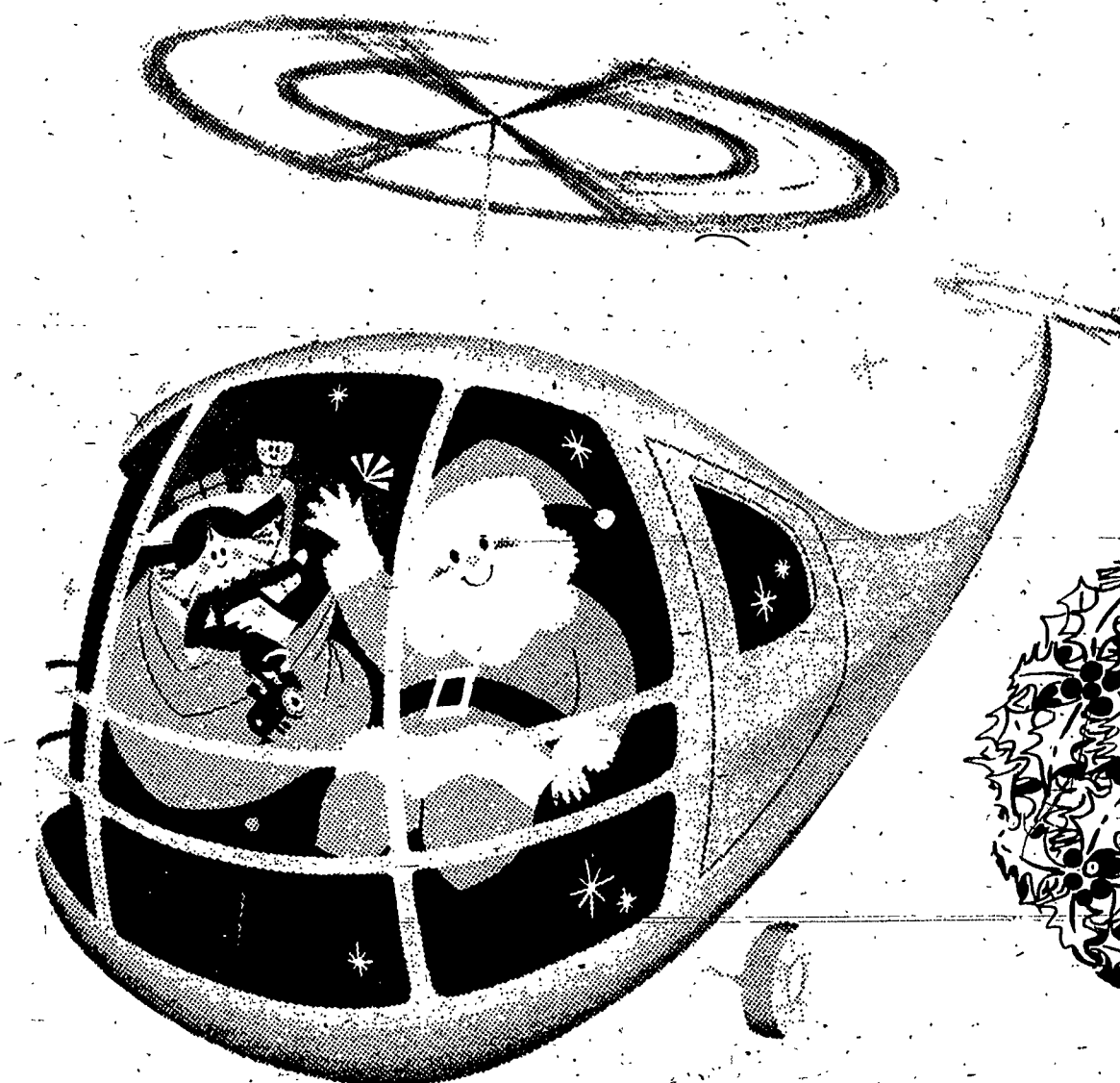
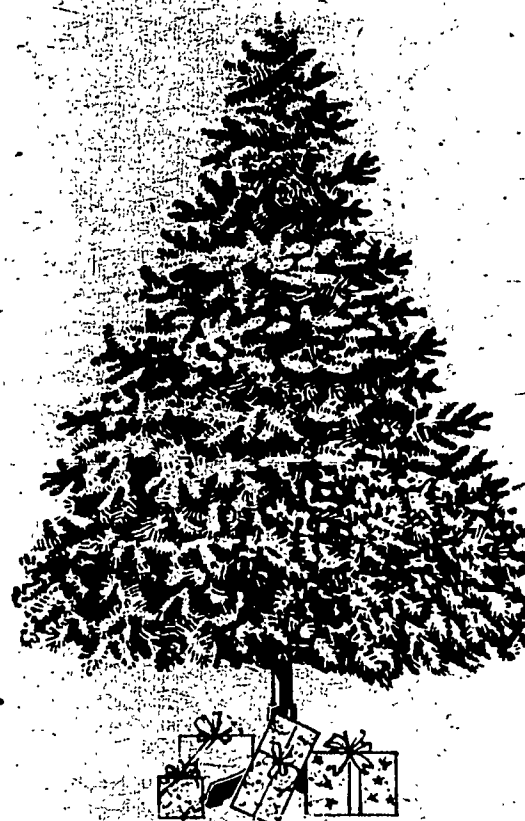

Moratorium declared on fence permits

A 60-day moratorium was set by the Village Trustees during the Tuesday night board meeting on the issuance of fence permits in townhouse and apartment areas.

In setting the motion, Trustee Abe Selman allowed that it would give the Board time for discussion on fence heights.

Niles trustees are still finding it difficult to decide on fence or defense. Eight years ago trustee action finalized, after considerable hassle, a village ordinance limiting fences up to a 5 ft. height in Niles. Now they are faced with fences anywhere from 3 ft. to 5 ft. in areas almost too small for fencing.

First and foremost they claim fences and obstructing hedges are detrimental to fire fighting.

These are the same trustees who allowed themselves to be talked out of a fire-lane eight

years ago behind the Nordica townhouses. Many of the tenants who rebelled against the fire lane at that time have since moved away.

Under a unique situation in the Washington, townhouse area, a front yard comes under a side yard variation, allowing for construction of a fence.

Trustees Ralph Bast and Abe Selman, townhouse owners in different areas, agree on privacy provided by fencing, but "to weigh privacy against human life is out of balance," argued Trustee Ang Marcheschi.

Building Director Joe Salerno, admittedly against fencing, recommends fencing in townhouse areas, other than corners, be restricted to 3 feet.

The lower the fence, the wider the walkway, the better for firefighting, said the Fire Department. No fences would be ideal.

According to Village Attorney Richard Troy, "Existing fences can be removed as being detrimental to firefighting."

In approving the 60-day stall for time in which to decide, Mayor Blase told trustees, "We must come up with a positive solution."

They have time until Jan. 31 to decide.

Scheel answered the objections of our phone callers by stating the homeowner will be billed for the work done at the home.

Sunday was another great day in Niles history with the opening of the converted Jewel Food Store on Oakton Street for the senior citizen center, the family service center and the youth center.

This is the second grocery store which has been converted for village purposes and the effort seems to be a financial bonanza. The huge building and parking lot cost \$250,000 and an additional \$200,000 was spent in renovating the building. A layman's ball park guesstimate would imagine a comparable project built from scratch would cost twice as much.

The senior citizens lounge and the teen center have private entrances for both groups with a huge lounge in each area. The family service area also has a private entrance and the many rooms there are certainly conducive for most productive work.

Trustee Abe Selman noted Niles free bus service stops alongside the building enabling Nilesites of all ages to be able to easily come to and from the facility.

Feeling pretty good about all of Niles facilities Ken Scheel and Bob Goldberg both laughingly made reference to the conversion of the former supermarkets. Noting Niles converted an A & P into the administration building and a Jewel was changed into the new center both of them remarked the village is now looking for a National Tea store for their next project.

Regarding the teen center facilities located in the Trident Community Center, we find a note of inconsistency in village policies. Recently an ordinance was passed in the Village of Niles which prohibits the purchase of cigarettes out of a machine or over the counter by anyone under the age of 18. Yet, we noted recently there are signs on the walls of the Teen Center which state, "Do not throw your butts on the floor." It does not seem logical to us that a village which does not allow youths under the age of 18 to purchase cigarettes would allow youths of 14, 15 and 16 to smoke while they are in the Teen Community Center which is operated by the village.

On Sunday night we were with Morton Grove trustee Marty Ashman but forgot to ask him about an effort in his town which should be considered in other villages. We were told Ashman led the way for senior citizens to have their water bills reduced by 50% in Morton Grove. Such an effort seems most worthwhile and neighboring towns might consider similar action. During this tremendous inflation residents on fixed incomes are the hardest hit. Any relief they can be given should be of paramount interest to village officials.
