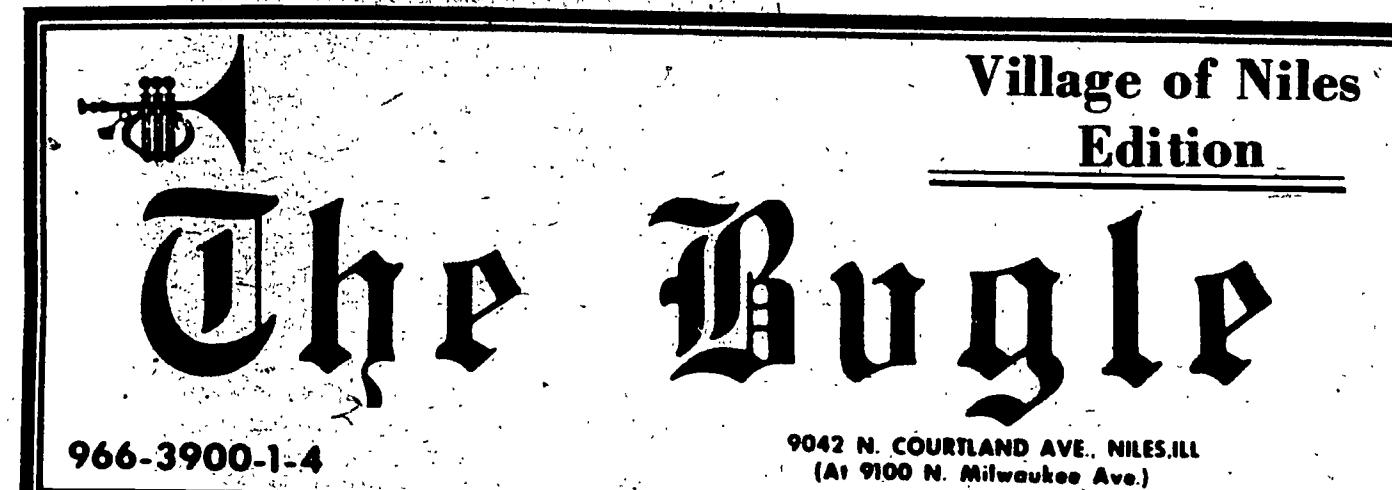
1. Purchase a freshly cut tree which has been stored outside. Keep it outside until needed. Do not set up in the house until just a few days before Christmas ... preferably on Christmas Eve.

2. Keep the tree watered. A container which holds water is not enough. Cut the base of the tree on an angle and be sure to add water every day.

3. Do not place the tree near a stairway as the stairway will act as a flue and draw heat and fire

## Left Hand: "X" marks the end of Niles film censorship

### From the LEFT HAND

You can place an "X" after Niles obscenity ordinance, as the result of action taken this past week-end.

A celluloid piece of garbage named "Flesh Gordon" came to the Lawrencewood Theatre Friday and an 8 year restriction against the theatre showing this kind of film came to an end.

When the Kohlberg theatre first applied for a building permit years ago, Niles officials insisted their okay was predicated on the theatre not showing X-rated films. In it's first years, the movie, "I, A Woman" was to be shown there, possibly as a test of Niles code. Village officials viewed a pre-screening of the film and ruled it couldn't be shown. Subsequently, we were told a second film was also tested, and Niles also blocked its showing in the village.

Friday, a Morton Grovite, Harry Goodman called me and said he expected a confrontation with Niles police, who he thought were going to prevent him from showing the "flesh". Goodman is a distributor of the film. He said 3 village officials had viewed the film in the afternoon and they said they would report their findings to the police chief. Goodman quoted the chief as saying "They're not going to see much of this show". But when the 75 viewers at the 6:30 show sat thru the entire movie, it was obvious Goodman's expected "confrontation" never resulted.

Saturday, Niles Mayor Blase, who had been out-of-town Friday, also viewed the film and recommended two scenes be deleted from the movie which the theatre people agreed to do. By deleting the excerpts, the film has been allowed to be shown.

The Kohlberg interests also run the Morton Grove Theatre, 1 1/4 miles northwest of the Lawrencewood. They've been showing X-rated films there for years. But Niles standing up to the movie owners and blocking their effort may well have been a bluffing operation which all concerned were keenly aware of.

The Kohlberg people wanted to "get along" in Niles and since they had the Morton Grove outlet, there was little reason to offend the Niles officials. Since Morton Grove is a sleepy town, with probably the most "off-the-ball" administration of any neighboring community, it was a simple

## BD. TABLES FIRE/POLICE PENSION TALKS

Discussion of proposed amendments to Niles ordinances covering fire and police pension funds were postponed, for a second time, during Tuesday night's Village Board meeting, to a future, January board meeting.

"We need to talk about considerations involved," said Mayor Nicholas Blase, in tabling the discussion set on Tuesday night's agenda. He then proposed to "sit down with committees from both fire and police departments" by the end of December.

### Board Meeting postponed

Involved in the proposal is two and a half million dollars in pension monies, now invested, by the present police and fire pension boards, in treasury bills, municipal bonds and certificates of deposit.

Each pension board is made up of 4 village officials (the mayor, village clerk, village attorney and

## Niles Teen Center Grand Opening

On Friday, Nov. 29, over 300 Niles teens gathered for the Grand Opening of the Niles Teen Center at 8060 Oakton. A dance, which was the focal point of the grand opening was held from 8-11 p.m.

The teens started gathering as early as 7:30 p.m. waiting for the festivities to begin. Many of them had heard about the dance from others who attend the Center's activities regularly.

At 8 p.m. the rock group, Catharsis, took the stage and played their first set of music. Before the band took their first break over 300 youths had gathered around them to listen and dance. During the first break in music, many of the teens took advantage of the Center's free juke box to play their favorite rock hits. Others joined the long lines at the refreshment counter where free cokes and chips were handed

out.

As the evening progressed, most teens joined in the dancing and many were surprised to find that the Niles Teen Center is open to those 13 or older, Monday thru Thursday, from 6:30 to 10 p.m., and on Friday, from 7-11 p.m. Among the activities, all of which are free to Niles' Teens, are two billiard tables, two air-hockey games, shuffle board, foosball and six ping-pong tables. On regular nights many teens play cards and other table games or just visit with their friends.

Jim Koestler and Paul Hansen, the co-directors of the Youth Center, have found "the teens that gather here simply like to have a place to go with their friends where they can feel free. We try to provide that type of atmosphere. On week nights over 75 teens take advantage of the facilities, and on Friday nights the number often exceeds 100!"

During the first dance, which was free, it was announced that the Teen Center will hold more dances in the future as long as the teens continue to participate in them. The next Teen Center Dance is planned for Friday, Dec. 27, from 7:30 to 11 p.m. The popular rock group Catharsis will play and tickets are now being sold at the Teen Center for 50 cents per person. Cost at the door will be 75 cents each.

## Notre Dame star swimmer



Don Knill, a senior at Notre Dame High School, lead his team in a sweep of the diving events in a swim meet at East Leyden H.S. on Nov. 29. Don placed first with a personal best, scoring 200.25 points in six dives, he began with a half twist dive which was selected as the required dive for the meet. Don's five optional dives were: a forward dive two summersaults, back dive 1 1/2 twists, forward 1 1/2 summersaults with a full twist, and inward 1 1/2 and reverse dive 1 1/2 SS. Knill earned his first varsity award in diving as a sophomore and is working toward his 3rd major award. This season Don is swimming butterfly on the medley relay to help the team. In the last meet his time was good enough to earn him a spot with the "A" relay. Don spends his summers diving for the Niles Park District swim team where he is employed as a life guard. ### "PATIENCE HAS ITS REWARDS"

Do you believe this expression, "Patience has its rewards?" Have you ever experienced the reality of it yourself? I have more times than not discovered that "patience" does in fact have its rewards. This is true in my own personal life as well as my professional experiences.

When my son started first grade, I questioned whether he was emotionally ready for it. He had only lived in the area for a few months and his birthday was just one month before the deadline of cutting off his admittance into first grade. It was obvious after the first few months that he was not ready to cope emotionally with school life. Start of second grade made this all the more apparent. Fortunately, dad's ego didn't get in the way, mom was receptive and our son was accepting of going back into first grade. It wasn't easy for all concerned, especially our son. Through this experience he learned that "patience has its rewards." He has now adjusted quite well emotionally and he is doing fine work in school. If we had pushed him to stay in second grade or he felt compelled to do so for any reason, I believe he would still be having considerable difficulty.

I'm thankful that my son has learned early in life that "Patience has its rewards." I believe all of us can learn from our experiences if we do exercise "patience" and we don't make things "life or death." Frequently in my work I see people much too often making issues, problems, concerns, etc. "Life or death." They need to relax and become more patient with themselves, their spouse, their child or someone else. If they can begin to become more patient, they find that their anxiety is lessened and they're better able to cope with the situation. In fact, they often find that "Patience does have its rewards."

"Women are their own worst enemy; they put themselves down." Nancy Miller, president and founder of Women's Inc., a Hinsdale based employment agency for women, told the participants in an OCC/MONACEP sponsored Career Day recently. The program was held in the St. Luke's Lutheran church in Park Ridge on Nov. 19.

"We women have lots to offer society, and society needs us. It is time we appreciate and take stock of our abilities and potential," she told the capacity crowd: "There is nothing being done in the business world that we can't do, if we really want to."

She said that women must begin to make the distinction between job and career.

"The average woman who works is in the work force for a total of 20 years. Until now, traditionally women have thought 'job' rather than 'career.' Now women should think in terms of a

"career path" with a company and where it will lead.

Nothing that the trend is from a product-oriented society to a service-oriented society, Ms. Miller said that housewife skills translate very well into business terms.

Pointing out that older women bring stability and maturity to a job, she said that companies would be well advised to realize that it is a myth that women move from job to job.

"The corresponding myth is that men don't move from job to job."

"The corresponding myth is that men don't move about, when statistics show that in actuality, the average man stays in a job for only 7 years."

Women make up about 41 percent of the work force and are moving out of the traditional women's jobs of teaching, social work, secretarial, and nursing and moving into every field, the employment counselor said.

The "Career Development and Decision-Making Day" was designed by the OCC staff and the Women's Outreach Resource Center, to enable women to assess themselves and evolve some goals toward a career. A repeat of the day will be held in March to accommodate the many women who could not be registered because of limited space.

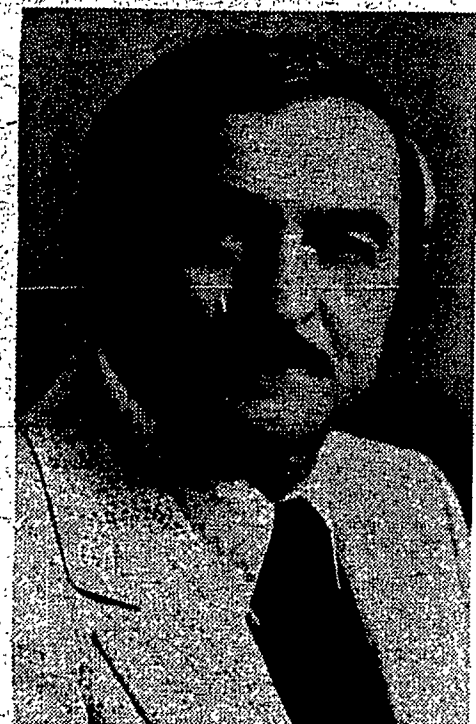

## Sara Lee cited for traffic congestion

The sugar price crisis was blamed, last Tuesday night, for the increase in traffic due to Sara Lee Resale Store sales.

The popularity of the store at 8005 Milwaukee ave., said Mayor Nicholas Blase, has resulted in traffic backup from Seward to Oakton st. on Milwaukee ave. The store attracts out-of-towners as well as Niles and surrounding suburban residents.

According to Niles Police Capt. Russell Beavers, the owners of Foremost Liquors and the Sara Lee store have made a commitment to station a "traffic manager" starting Wednesday, Dec. 11, to direct traffic in the Oakton-Milwaukee parking lot from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

A feeling that the traffic guard will not solve the problem of backed-up traffic on Milwaukee prompted Mayor Blase to ask

confirmation from the trustees to cut off Seward st. as an emergency measure if the traffic is not controlled.

Sara Lee did not pick up a rental option which expired last September. The store lease expires next September (1975). The entire corner lot is owned by Avondale Savings and Loan, Chicago.

Both Sara Lee officials and Mayor Blase have indicated they do not wish to see the resale store move from Niles.

Niles collects 1 per cent sales tax annually from the million dollar gross retail sales by the Sara Lee Resale store.

## Pesole urges no variation in building code

Despite a plea by Trustee Pete Pesole not to deviate from Village standards, village trustees approved a request for variation to a Niles Building Code, 5 to 1, Pesole dissenting.

Crouse Hinds Co., 7420 N. Lehigh ave., petitioned for board approval of an all sheet metal addition (instead of the concrete blocks as required by village code) to their present building.

"The cost of masonry is prohibitive to us at this time," said John Conn, Chief Industrial Engineer for Crouse Hinds.

The addition, approximately 9 1/2% of the total of the present building structure, is to be put on the southwest side of the building "which will not be seen from the street," commented Conn.

The company manufactures outdoor lights and light poles. The addition was needed for storage of steel.

"Once a deviation to our code is allowed," argued Pesole, "it will change the entire appearance of the area."

According to Building and Zoning Director Joe Salerno, the board had previously approved two similar deviations at Imperial Eastman, one in 1964 and a second in 1973, to "the same type of structure."

## District 219 caucus

On Nov. 18, the District 219 high school caucus held a most successful workshop on what traits or characteristics one should look for in prospective school board candidates.

Rita Dee, a Representative of the Illinois Department of Public Instruction, came and served as the moderator of our discussion.

Miss Dee began the discussion with two examples of how people see different things even if witnessing the same phenomena. This demonstrated the benefit of working in groups to form opinions as to characteristics we should be looking for in prospective board members.

up to the 2nd floor (usually the bedroom area). Do not allow the tree to block a door or exitway. Locate the tree in the coolest part of the room (if necessary, shut off heat registers) and be sure not to place it near any open flame device such as a stove or fireplace.

4. Pretty lights are the heart of the tree's beauty and are also the biggest cause of tragedy. Don't use any lights that are not UL approved and be sure to check them carefully. If they appear even the least bit worn or if the cords are brittle or cracked replace them. Lights are inexpensive, children are not.

5. Locate the tree circuit fuse in your fuse box. Be absolutely certain that it is equipped with a fuse of not more than 15 ampere rating. If the fuse blows out when the tree is turned on, it will be necessary to remove some of the other things on that circuit during the time the tree is up. Do not put in a large fuse!

6. Inspect the tree to see if any of the needles near a light have begun to turn brown. If they have, relocate the light. Remember, it takes the average tree less than 60 seconds to burn completely, igniting anything combustible that is around it.

7. Turn out the lights when family leaves the room. Never leave the lights on when the house is unoccupied. Never leave children alone in a house with a decorated, electrified tree.

8. Do not use cotton, paper or other flammable material to decorate a tree. Do not use any of these items around the base of the tree. Do not place electric trains or other electrically operated toys around the base of the tree as metallic tinsel can fall on the tracks or other controls and cause a short circuit and a fire.

9. Avoid toys which use flammable liquids. Nitrocellulose toys (which look like celluloid or plastic) burn with surprising ferocity. Some imported toys have been made with this highly dangerous material.

10. Select your electrical appliance gifts with fire safety in mind. Choose only electrical appliances and toys which contain the UL label. Remember the UL label must be on the item as well as on the cord since cords are tested separately.

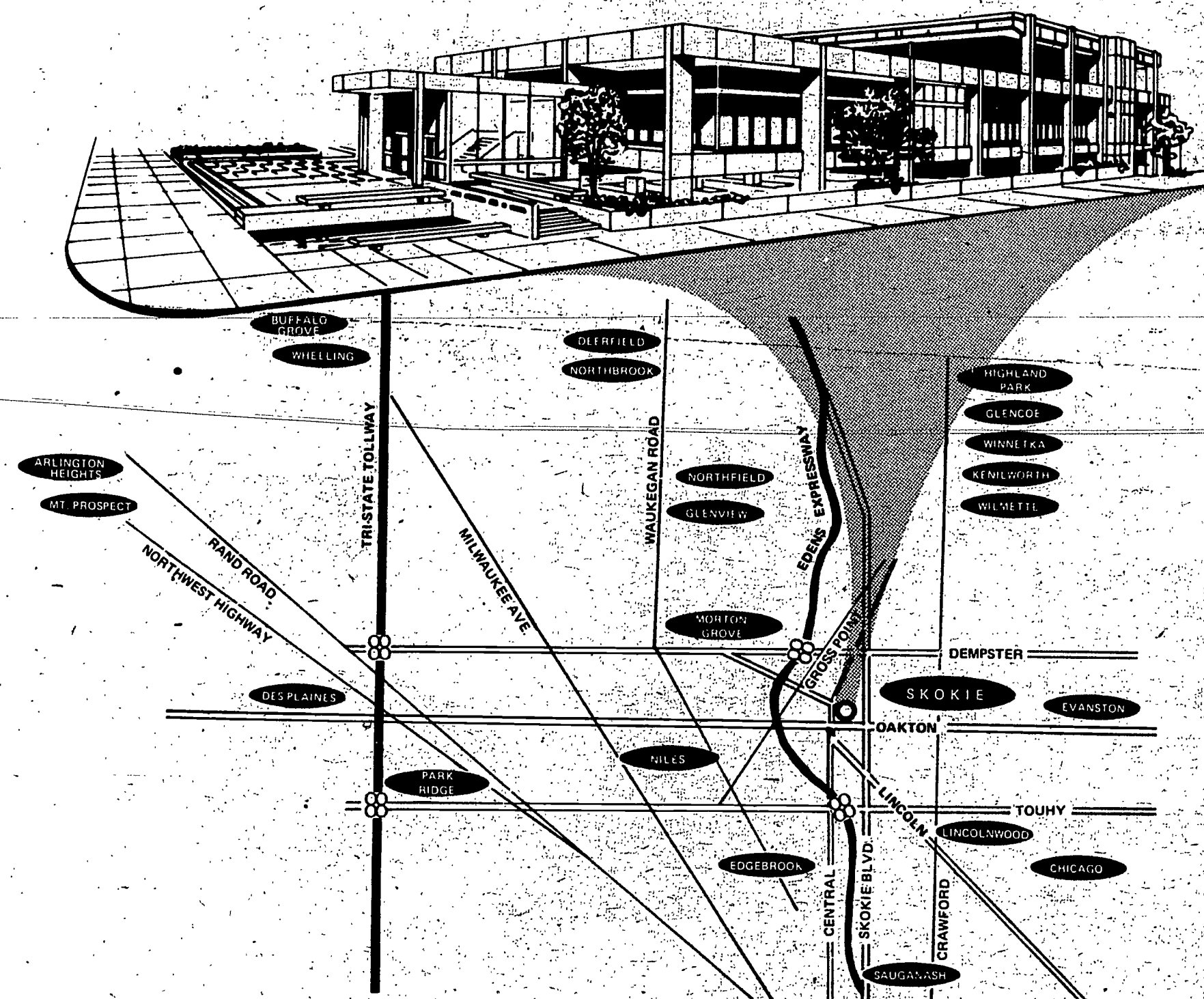
11. When you enjoy the unwrapping of the gifts please place the paper and other wrapping material in a large carton and dispose of it immediately. It is almost unbelievable how fast a home can burn when the fire is started with paper and gift wrap. Don't throw the wrappings in the fireplace unless you are sure you have a spark arrester on your chimney. Sparks from burning paper will ignite roofs.

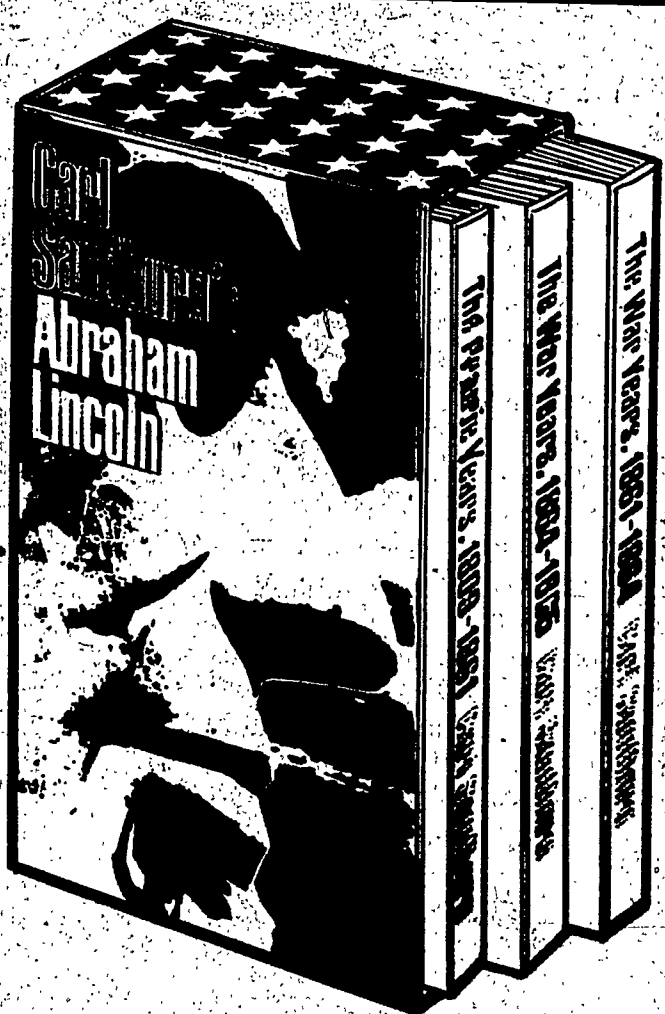

## Buy 'American made' products to boost economy

Dear Editor:

Today, America is in the midst of a full-fledged recession. The recession threatens to be the longest and deepest since W.W. II. The first and by far the worst result of recession is unemployment. Unemployment is expected to increase to more than 7% in the future. That would be 6.5 million people out of work.

Elementary economics reveals the broad results of this economic disaster. The unemployed and those who fear unemployment will spend dramatically less money. This, in turn, effects nearly every industry. Fewer products and services will be purchased. The circle continues effecting nearly every industry in this country. The amount of money in the circular flow continues to diminish, and recession gets worse.

Looking back at one of the first major industries to falter in this recession, we can find some answers. "The U.S. automobile industry is getting sicker, and effects of the illness are spreading rapidly throughout the nation. Hardly a region of the country or a major industry will go unscathed" (U.S. News & World Report: Dec. 9, 1974) From the same source we learn that almost 200,000 workers have been laid off in the auto industry. Some of them for over a year now.

The auto industry is one of the largest industries in the nation. Approximately 50,000 companies supply materials, parts, and services to motor vehicle manufacturers. Of these, 20,000 have as their major business activity, the production of components for automobiles. When the auto industry has problems, troubles quickly shoot out in all directions.

Just think, when you buy a Toyota instead of a Vega, a Panasonic or a Sony television instead of a Zenith T.V., you are giving the Japanese the money they need to buy up American industries and American farmland.

Think about the industries that depend on the auto industry. Each car contains 7 miles of wire and at least a ton of steel. Half of the nation's radios are used in cars. Plastic vinyl is used in great quantities. About 2/3 of all the rubber consumed by U.S. industry goes into cars and trucks. Plate glass, plastics, copper and zinc are also big items in cars. Connecting the circular flow of money and the auto industry, we

can plainly see one area of economics. For example, if the car industry suddenly experienced a rise in business, they could begin making cars once more. The auto workers could afford to buy new things and spend money in other industries. All the workers in industries previously hurt by the sag in the auto industry could, likewise, go back to work and begin spending more money. Quickly the circular flow of money speeds up. The recession turns around and unemployment drops.

Next time you are looking for a new car, look at the American built cars. If you buy an American built car you are putting money in America, adding money to the circular flow which helps all Americans. This holds true for all products. When you buy, make sure the product is "Made in America". Do this whenever possible and you will be helping all Americans. What a great Christmas gift that would be.

## Increased bus and rail service

At their regularly scheduled November meeting, trustees of the North Suburban Mass Transit District (NORTAN) heard reports of new and increased service starting in the next 30 days. This prompted Chairman Richard T. Newman, trustee from Evanston to say: "This is a most substantial addition to the transportation service for our District. We've had other larger developments, but more things are being done for more people now than ever before."

Among the developments reported were:

1. New Saturday Shopper Service on United Motor Coach Co. (UMC) bus routes #3 and #13 effective Nov. 30, 1974. Route #3 travels from the Davis st. "L" station in Evanston to Golf Mill via Skokie, Old Orchard, Edens Plaza, and Glenview. Route #13, the Green Bay Dasher, travels from the Davis st. "L" station in Evanston to the Main Gate at Fort Sheridan via Green Bay rd.

2. Two new in-bound and two new out-bound rush hour trains on the Milwaukee rd. North Line effective Dec. 2. This new service is the direct result of the purchase of new rail equipment by NORTAN and the leasing of that equipment to the Milwaukee rd.

3. An expected Jan. 1, 1975 start for a new transfer system between NORTAN sponsored bus routes and the Chicago & North Western Railroad (C&NW) whereby, upon presentation of the C&NW commuter display tickets, the rider will be given a 20 cents fare reduction on the bus.

The NORTAN-CTA transfer system, currently in operation between the Jefferson Park CTA Station and UMC bus routes #70 and #71 will soon be expanded to all NORTAN sponsored routes.

In the report of the Executive Director, Joseph DiJohn thanked Golf Mill Shopping Center for
