


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"Booby", popular restaurateur, dies unexpectedly

Q. Where can I get a parkway lawn marker bearing my house number? Are these available through Public Works? D.V.R. Not at the present time although the possibility of uniform, luminescent markers bearing house numbers are under consideration by the Public Works Dept. The markers were suggested to village fathers several years ago, said Asst. Director of Public Works Rich Albrecht, but the idea drew no conclusion. The markers are ideal for identifying a house by visitors, fire, police and public works departments, he said, and could be provided at a very nominal cost.

Q. Does the village intend to do anything about the tremendous water retention at the ditch north of Four Flaggs Shopping Center on Golf? Following a heavy rain, motorists are forced into oncoming westbound traffic to avoid the heavy water or take a chance on water logging car brakes if they drive through the water. The pump provided to relieve the situation is not

Village Manager Kenneth Scheel said that from now on the parking lot will store the water and the pump owned by Four Flaggs will pump out the water at a slow rate so that it will not overwash Golf rd. The situation will be relieved when Golf rd. is widened and larger sewers are put in under the State Program planned for '75.'76

Q. What is the bridge at Oakton and Caldwell? Why was it built and how much did it cost? I understand we paid \$65,000 for its

The overpass at Oakton and Caldwell is not a Niles construction, said V.M. Scheel. It is a bicycle path built by the Cook County Forest Preserve, with government money, costing around \$315,000. It was built for the safety of bikers and motorists. More information can be had by calling Mr. Buck of the Cook County Forest Preserve, at FO 9-9420.

Q. Does the Niles Consumer Fraud Division still inspect the weighing devices in the Village?

Yes; said Frank Wagner, Director of Consumer Fraud Division in Niles. Every gas pump and weight scale in Niles is inspected every 6 months for accuracy and must display a green and white decal, 2" by 1", indicating stamp of approval and date of inspection. Our counter weights are taken to Springfield to be calibrated every year and certified by the State as to their accuracy. The "Master Bucket" used for accuracy of gas pumps carries a scaled tube showing exact ounces of gas pumped which is also inspected and sealed by the State of Illinois in Springfield. Scales in new stores and new gas stations are also inspected by the village prior to opening.

Q. My son, who is ecology minded, picks up newspapers and bottles, presently taking them to Niles. Is there an area closer to us, at Harlem and Dempster, where he can turn them in? Mrs. H.W. [Morton Grove]

Mikva nominated for

Congressman-elect Abner J. Mikva has been nominated for the prestigious Ways and Means committee of the House of lepresentatives.

The announcement was made by Speaker of the House Carl Albert at a press conference Wednesday morning in Washington and followed Mikva's endorsement by the Policy and Steering Committee of the Democratic Caucus. The nomination must be approved by the Caucus, which consists of all 291 Democrats elected to the House for the 94th Congress.

If confirmed, Mikva, who served on the House Judiciary Committee during his previous two terms in Congress (1969-72), will be working directly on such vital legislation as tax reform. trade legislation, social security, health insurance and welfare.

He said the Ways and Means assignment will enable him "to help reform the tax structure so that tax burdens are shared more fairly than at present, to create a tax policy for the oil industry which is good for the country rather than for a privileged few, and to improve social security so that our senior citizens can live in

Mikva pointed out that his nomination to Ways and Means was made possible by the reforms passed earlier this month by the Caucus. The Caucus voted to expand Ways and Means' membership from the traditional 25 to 37. The Caucus also voted to split Ways and Means into subcommittees and to assign newer congressmen to it. Mikva supported all these reforms.

Each year thousands of taxpayers claim itemized deductions of one sort or another on their tax returns instead of using the standard deduction. What does this have to do with you? Answer: Just this: by averaging these deductions out--according to income brackets and the type of deduction, you can get a pretty good idea of what an average deduction is in your income

By comparing this "average" to your deductions, you might just be able to tell if you're heading for a tax Audit.

If your deduction for charitable contributions this year i \$2,000 and the so-called average charitable contribution for taxpayers in your income class is \$1,031--look out, your return is going to stand out like a sore thumb. The "over-average" deduction is almost certain to flag your return for a Revenue Service audit, according to Prentice-Hall, the tax information

To help you guide yourself in the right direction for deductions, let's take a look at some of the "averages" P-H has broken down from a statistic-jammed Revenue Service publication. While these figures are based on 1972 tax returns (the latest available), they will give you a pretty fair idea of what your fellow taxpayers are doing on their tax returns.

Don't think you can't or won't be audited just because your deductions are in line with the "average" in your income category. You can be! And don't believe that you are entitled to the "average" deduction even if you haven't made the expenditures. You can only deduct what you've actually laid out.

If you have extraordinary deductions--don't pass them up merely because they'll throw you over the average. Claim them. by all means--but be prepared to prove them as well as the other items in your return.

One deduction frequently overlooked is donations of used clothing. Such gifts do qualify as charitable deductions.

Taxwise, you just don't know how much to deduct for the used clothing you give. After all, you're not acquainted with the second-hand clothes market, and you're in no position to estimate the value. Probable result: since you don't know how much to deduct, you skip the deduction altogether. Well, if that's your situation, here's an actual case.

Mr. Dennert contributed used clothing to a school for a rummage sale and gave other clothing to a church. He couldn't specifically identify the articles given, and didn't have an appraisal made at the time of the donations. Mr. Denner estimated the original cost of the clothing as \$525--and deducted 40 percent of that amount. Result: though IRS didn't go along with the 40 percent figure, it did OK a deduction for 20 percent-or \$100.

One easy way to figure the amount of your deduction is to simply ask the charity for an appraisal of the property--i: writing. Many charities will be happy to give you such pon request. In any case, be sure you keep a list of the items donated--preferably receipted by the charity when you

philosopher's face. He ate too much and he loved too much and he walked too fast and he got mad too fast and he hated like he loved, except it evaporated too quickly. There was Booby at the racetrack. You'd jump in his car, run out to Arlington, get there by the second race, bet a few bob on 3 races, jump back in the car and race back to the restaurant. And Booby at the ballpark. If he sat thru 3 of the 9 innings, he set a record. He spent more time buying than he did watching. "Es mein kind", and you ate and drank thru 9 calorie-filled innings. And Booby shopping. Same routine, jump in the car, off to Devon Avenue where he waved and said hello to nearly everyone on the street. Into the jewelers, out of the jewelers, stop for a hot dog, and then into a men's shop. After a fast purchase he started out the door, and then saw a belt he liked. The owner, an old friend said, "I'll give you it cheap" and he bought 3. Back in the car I noticed the price on the belts was a dollar less than he paid; I laughed and he gave me the silent treatment all the way back to the store.

While he spent too much and he ate too much and he walked too fast, there's no doubt he loved at an equal pace. He was fiercely loyal (he couldn't just be "plain" loyal). I often used to criticize Nick Blase and Booby was his staunchest defender. Booby grew up on the west side and he became intimate friends of the Elrods and the Arveys. He knew the way the game was played and he accepted politics on this level. Still he empathized with me. He was perhaps the most moralistic man I ever met and he knew what I was doing in Niles, even if he didn't like my taking off after Blase, one of his closest friends. His generosity was as extreme as everything else he did. For years he ran the outdoor barbeque dinners at Maine East during the season's first football game. And at Niles Days, Booby gave of himself there as well. Nobody was a softer touch than Booby when they sought help, whether financially or by giving of himself.

I remember one morning when no one was around, he showed me a letter he received from his son. It was perhaps the most loving letter I've ever read between a child and his parent. He had just finished law school and he told his Dad how he was loved by his kids and his family. The tone of the letter was he'd given so much and it was now time for Booby to look to the future and begin to slow down. While Booby felt this was a very personal letter, it just wasn't his nature to keep it a secret. He was touched and he was proud and he had to share it.

Booby was loveable, and Booby was exasperating. He was tough to work for and he was most generous to those who worked for him. He gave work to one person who would have had difficulty finding a job, and this effort alone speaks for his kindness. He took on the burdens a lesser man would have

He gave so much. And he received so much in return. I think that's about the best ledger sheet any guy could ask for.

As a postscript Niles officials might consider re-naming the community center after Booby. He was a great friend to the young and old in the community. It's a building devoted to helping as well as to having fun, indeed, a befitting memorial to a guy who exemplified these qualities.
