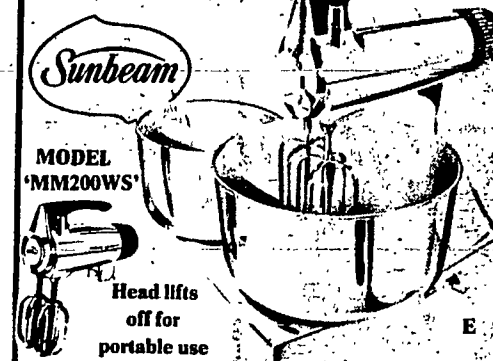

Zoning Board defers action on Branch Bank and Day Care Center

Action was delayed for a second time, Wednesday night, Dec. 18, by the Niles Zoning and Plan Commission on a Special Use permit for branch banking by Peerless Federal Savings & Loan at 7759 N. Milwaukee ave.

Zoning commissioners questioned the legality of the use of an alley as a primary entrance to any business. Petitioners for the Savings & Loan, whose home office is at 4930 Milwaukee ave., were requested to return at a future, Jan. 22, hearing to present amended plans permitting entrance into the area from Milwaukee ave.

The alley, at the east end of the area petitioned for rezoning, has been under heavy use by the adjacent, Builders Kitchens, and in all likelihood would present traffic problems, said Commissioners.

While not objecting to the rezoning for the branch bank, representatives of the Golden

Triangle Homeowners Association and the nearby, Niles Park District were gravely concerned with the direction of traffic flow in connection with the proposed branch banking.

A 5-teller station, primarily beginning with 3 tellers and a manager, was proposed for the Milwaukee-Mulford corner, said Timothy Sheehan, president and managing officer of the Peerless Savings & Loan. Hours of business were proposed as being 9 to 4 p.m. on Monday and Tuesday; 9 to 8 p.m. on Thursday; 9 to 6 p.m. on Friday; 9 to 12:30 p.m. on Saturday and closed on Wednesday.

In a second action Zoning Commissioners continued a petition for Special Use permit for a Day Care Center at 83612 Golf rd., to the Jan. 22 Open Hearing, contingent on proper petitioning.

Petitioner Mrs. Eileen Lombardo was advised by the Board of Commissioners to obtain ves-

ted rights in the property or to have the owner of the property request the rezoning.

Projected for the area by Mrs. Lombardo, who was represented by her husband, Robert Lombardo, is a Day Care Center for children, ages 2 1/2 to 5 years old, of working parents, from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. The Center would be supervised by 5 instructors and would contain an indoor-outdoor play area as required by State law.

In final action Zoning Commissioners approved a Special Use permit to Joseph Kovalik for an Automobile Service station at 7169 Milwaukee (at Touhy), exclusively for sale of gas and oil and excluding automotive repair work or service on the premises.

Since the Zoning Board is a recommending body, Chairman Jack Frick advised the petitioners to appear before the Village Board of Trustees for a final decision.

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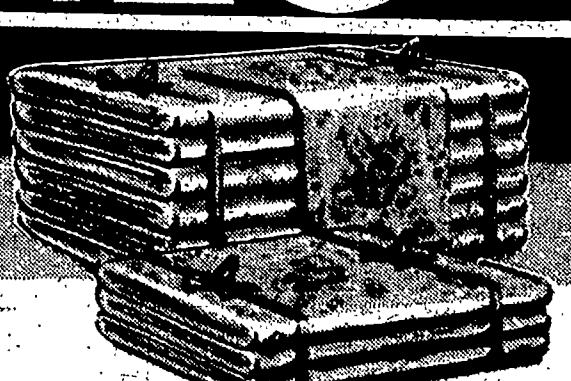


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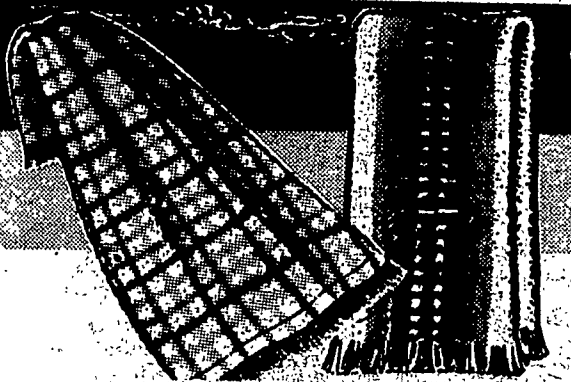


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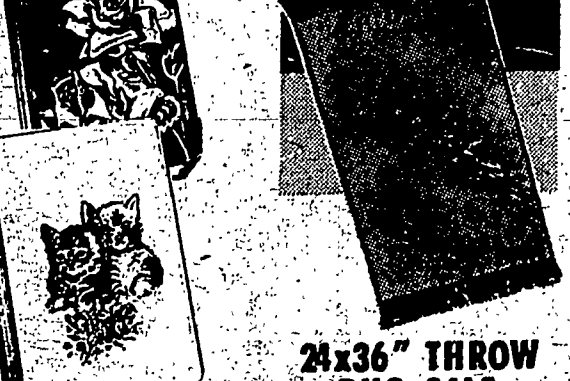


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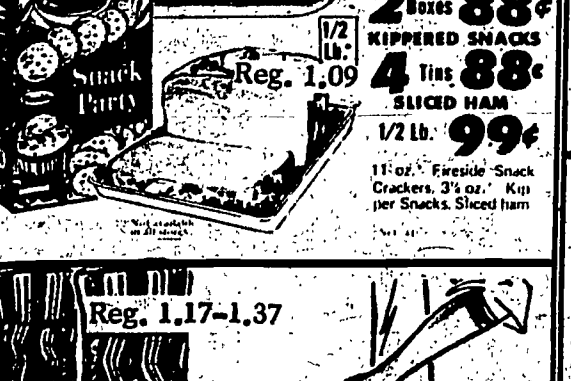
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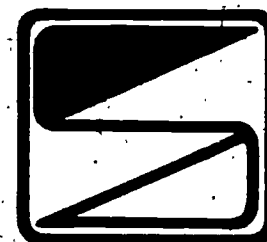
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Tryouts for Girls' Track Club

OCC Cagers set new school record

The Oakton Community College basketball team broke a school record for scoring in a single game when it defeated Morton Grove College 123-82 on Tuesday, Dec. 17, in a game played in Cicero.

This marked the fourth time this season that Oakton has scored over 100 points in a game. The team's record stands at 9-1 overall and 4-1 in the Skyway Conference, putting them in second place behind Triton College.

The Raiders had to fight off a last minute surge by league rival Harper College in order to win 83-82 on Saturday, Dec. 14.

"We played well for about the first 35 minutes of the game and had control of it. Then in the last five or six minutes, Harper made four or five shots from at least 20 feet and they came right back and made it tight," said Oakton coach Tom Jorndt. "In the meantime, we went cold and became dis-

organized. I felt fortunate to come out of that with a victory."

But then against Morton we did just the opposite. In the last five minutes we went berserk and blew them off the court," Jorndt pointed out.

Tom Florentine lead the Oakton attack against Morton with 31 points, 21 of which came in the first half.

"He just didn't miss in the first half," Jorndt said of Florentine who went 10 for 13 in that period.

Five more Oakton cagers were in double figures, including Tony Reibel with 18, Roy Sanders and Jerry Jones with 17 each, and Don Welter with 16.

Oakton dominated the boards as well, out-rebounding Morton 61-24. Jones had 14 and Ray Sanders, twin brother of Roy, had 11. Even 5'4" Art Feldman hit the boards for OCC as he pulled down two caroms.

The Raiders led 51-41 at half time. They came back after the intermission and hit 31 of 40 field goal attempts, a 77.5 shooting percentage for the second half. Overall, they hit 67.4 percent of the time.

Oakton takes on 7-2 DuPage College in the first round of the Elgin Christmas Tournament on Dec. 26.

"I look for that to be a great game. They've got the height advantage on us. Their front line is all 6'6". I think we're probably better shooters and a little quicker," Jorndt said.

Provided OCC downs DuPage, the Raiders would face either Morton or Elgin in semi-finals, both of which have already been defeated by Oakton.

"I feel that if we get by DuPage, we'll be in the finals against probably either Triton or Wright," Jorndt speculated.

Notre Dame's record now reads 13-9-2.

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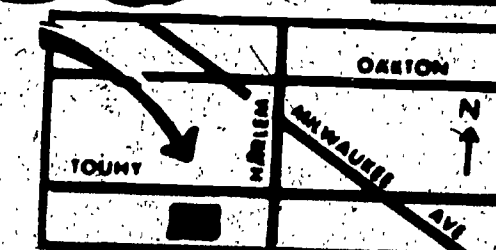
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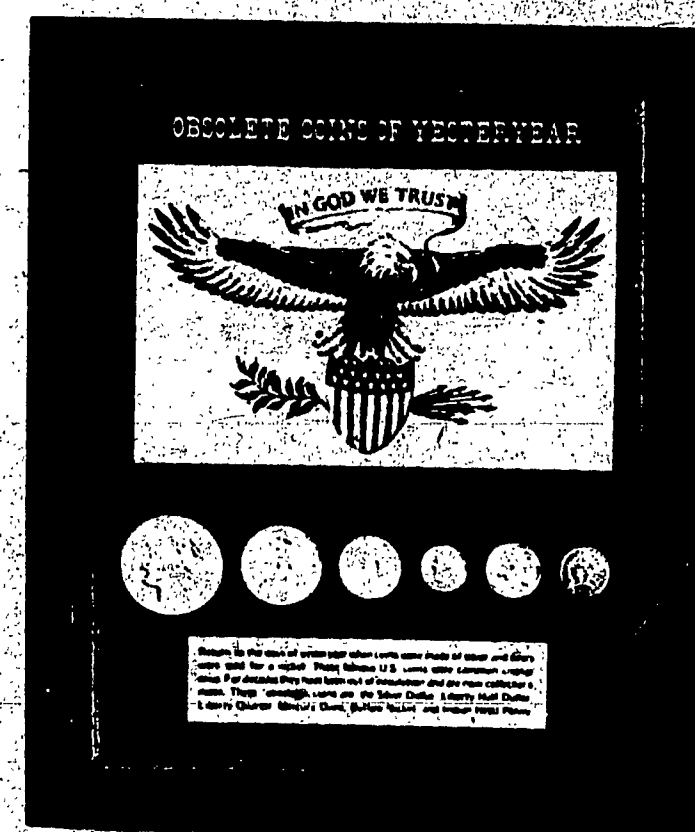
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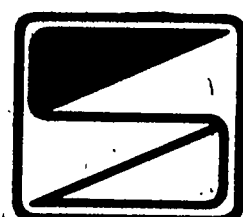

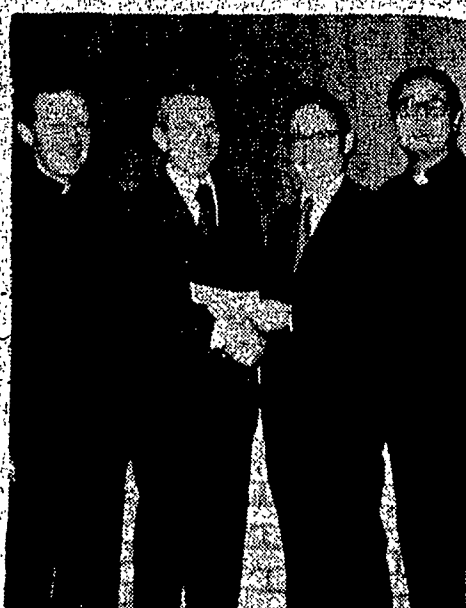

Illinois State Filing Requirements

This is the first in a series of articles on ways you can save money on your Illinois State Income Tax return this year. The articles are written by H & R Block, America's Largest Tax Service.

A few changes have been made in the 1974 Illinois Income Tax Form 11-1040, but the tax law and filing requirements are basically the same.

You are required to file an 11-1040 if you are required to file a U.S. Form 1040 or 1040A, but your 1974 income is more than \$1,000 times the number of exemptions you are entitled to for Federal Income Tax purposes. To illustrate: a single student who earns \$1100 is not required to file a Federal return, but is required to file the 11-1040.

You should also file an 11-1040 to obtain any refund of State tax withheld from wages. As an example: a single taxpayer who earned \$900 is not required to file an 11-1040, but should file in order to obtain a refund of any State tax withheld.

The exemption allowance for each taxpayer, spouse, and dependent who is a resident of

Illinois is \$1,000. An additional amount of \$1000 is allowed for each additional exemption claimed on the Federal return. This includes the 65 and over and blind exemptions.

Filing out a Federal return is a pre-requisite to preparing the Illinois return. The taxpayer needs the adjusted gross income from the U.S. 1040 or 1040A, for line 1 of the State return.

Special rules apply to filing by non-residents, part-year resident, and servicemen.

Illinois Bell reduces federal excise rate

A reverse twist to spiraling prices will go into effect Jan. 1 when telephone customers will get a break on their bills. That's when the federal excise tax rate on telephone bills will drop one percent, according to Illinois Bell Telephone Company.

The new tax rate will be seven percent, and will continue to be applied to both monthly service and long distance calls.

Under the federal excise tax law, Illinois Bell Telephone is simply the tax collector for the federal government. In other words, the company collects the excise tax on most telephone services and turns it over in full to the federal government. In 1973, Illinois Bell's total tax bill was \$426,350,097—or \$49.19 per telephone. Of this, federal excise tax totaled \$103,432,808.

Federal excise taxes were first added to the phone bill in 1914, then were off and on an finally reimposed as a temporary emergency measure during World War II. They have existed ever since despite phone company efforts to have them repealed.

In 1970, Congress passed the Excise, Estate and Gift Tax Adjustment Act, which called for the gradual reduction of the tax. The first reduction came in 1973, when the rate dropped for 10 to 9 percent. The tax is scheduled to decline one percent a year until its complete elimination in 1982.

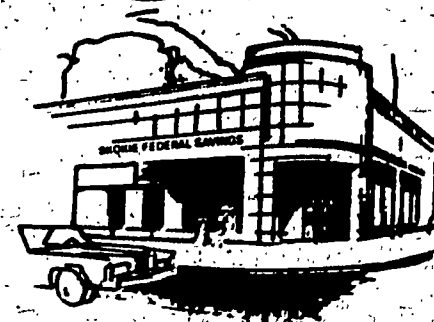

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Maine High placement tests

All students who plan to enter the Maine Township High Schools next fall as freshmen must take the placement tests which will be given at the four high schools on Saturday, Jan. 11. Testing will begin at 7:45 a.m. and should be completed by 12:15 p.m.

Students are required to take the tests at the Maine high school they will attend next year.

The placement tests given will be the Differential Aptitude Test program, covering verbal reasoning, numerical ability, abstract reasoning, space relations, mechanical reasoning, clerical speed

and accuracy, and language usage. The testing program is identical in all Maine high schools and will be administered by members of the counseling department of each school.

It is important that the students arrive and be seated, ready for the test before 7:45 a.m. Late arrival will jeopardize the individual's test performance. Students should arrange for their own transportation to and from the testing center and bring with them two sharpened No. 2 lead pencils. Parents should arrange to pick up their children at 12:15 p.m. or shortly thereafter.

The Maine East testing center will include students from Emerson, Gemini, Apollo, Chippewa, parochial and private schools. The Maine North testing center will test students from Apollo, Chippewa, River Trails, River Road, parochial and private schools. Apollo and Chippewa students will be tested at the Maine high school they plan to attend as determined by their place of residence.

The Maine South testing center will test students from Penoyer, Emerson, Lincoln, parochial and private schools. The Maine West testing center includes students

from Algonquin, Chippewa, Ironquois, Our Lady of Hope, St. Mary's, St. Zachary, St. Emily's, St. Stephen's, Immanuel Lutheran (Des Plaines), and all other parochial and private schools.

According to Merlin W. Schultz, Coordinator of Pupil Personnel Services for District 207, the Differential Aptitude Test helps students, parents and counselors in making decisions regarding course selections which meet the needs and interests of each student. It is used as only one of the criteria, along with the student's past performance, and

the judgements of former teachers, in deciding on a program of studies to be taken in high school.

The test results help evaluate relative strengths and weaknesses in a variety of aptitudes which are important to educational progress and the making of career choices.

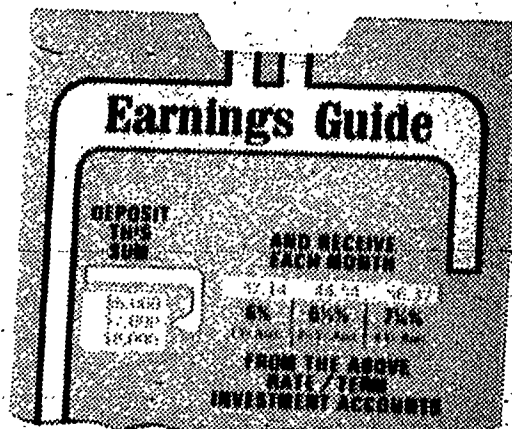
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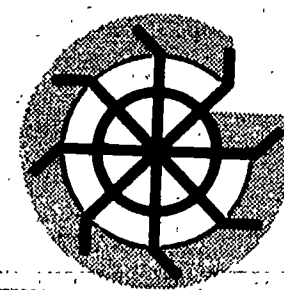
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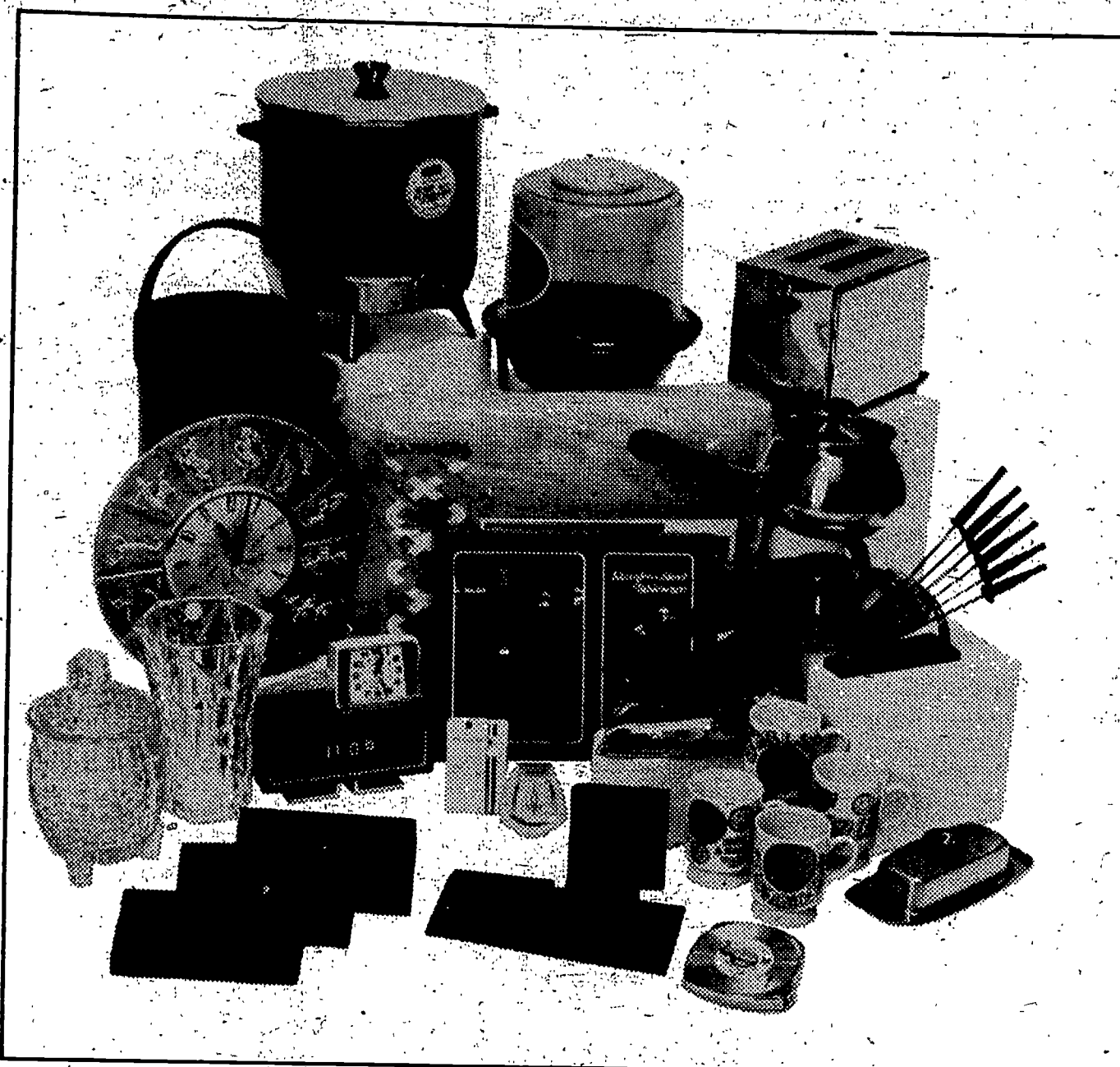

The one weeker

What started as an experiment a few years ago has now become the biggest single trend in the travel business—the one weeker. There is certainly debate on the value of one week vacations both from the standpoint of employer and the couple or family on the road.

Many psychologists and corporate doctors hold the medical opinion that it does us all infinitely more good to get away from work for a longer period. The theory goes this way: The first week you are away you unwind, the second week you begin to enjoy the vacation on the third week you don't care if you ever go back to work. For \$447 you can combine London four nights with Paris (three nights), theatre tickets "and beaucoup more" as the ads say.

American Airlines: You can spend a week in Rome for between \$444 and \$593 including hotels or you can freestyle your way around Torremolinos and Costa del Sol for between \$387 and \$513 including two meals a day.

United Airlines: The one weekers are even working their way as far west as Hawaii. United has a variety of plans to this paradise in the neighborhood of \$400.

While the one week vacation has some disadvantages, it is certainly an improvement over the 14 countries in 14 days packages, popular a decade ago.

You can, in a week, capture a flavor of one specific spegiment of one country. If it is a small country, Portugal for example, you can cover a good portion of the entire country.

One weekers can be highly enjoyable vacations if activity is focused on a particular hobby, sport or national event. Seven days of golf in Scotland can be an unforgettable event. Two days in Disneyworld, three days of Florida sun and two days of deep sea fishing can be a fine holiday.

And, of course, there's always the one weeker to a remote island for total peace and quiet.

John Lundgren, Insurance salesman: More police patrolling the streets in Niles. When we first moved here over 15 years ago, it was usual to see a police car. Now we hardly see them anymore and there are more street "incidences" occurring.

Stanley Slawinski, Vendor: No more land annexations! I live in one of the oldest sections in Niles. Public Works service and policing are less frequent. Niles was a nice comfortable town 8 years ago.

Tony Torres, Niles postman: A moratorium on construction of new business in Niles.

Albert L. Heelbl, Niles Fire Chief: Improved lighting on Niles streets at night. Sometime ago, two programs of improved night lighting were instituted at great cost to the village: a better lighting program on Milwaukee ave. eight years ago, and the second, on Waukegan rd. six years ago improved night lighting facilities. I had hoped the program would continue all over the village, for safety of youth, motorists and the public in general.

Frank Wagner, Village Clerk: We desperately need a new police building, having run out of space in the present one. The Lawrencewood site would be ideal to consolidate all village services, as one big complex, which would also include the new post office. The Fire Dept., of course, would be left as is, since it is more ideally located presently for fire and ambulance services.

Gabriel Bernafato, Morton Grove attorney: I would like to see off-the-street parking on Dempster st., where the strip businesses are located.

Walter Bousse, Niles Park Commissioner: A new, over-all traffic study of village traffic. Better traffic control is needed at Dempster-Milwaukee; at Milwaukee-Golf; at Dempster-Greenwood; and at Milwaukee-Oakton, where it is going to become worse.

Judi Heyman, new correspondent: A whole new Board of Trustees in Lincolnwood, who will be responsive to the public. Kenneth Cohen, Niles Attorney: A valid alternative to the traffic flow on the main arteries of Niles with view in mind of some express method.

Bonnie Schleber, Classic Bowl, M.G.: All suburbs should issue a combined bus schedule, stating hours of travel, and designate the various buses as to destinations. Then we non-drivers would know which bus goes to Golf Mill, to Randolph, Old Orchard, etc.

Hanna DeKova, artist, M.G.: All the shopping centers and stores, everything closed on Sundays, except churches.

Ann Minasola, Edison Park: I'd like to live in Niles because of many advantages of living in a small town, such as good services, cleaning of streets, etc.

Sal Maniscalco, operator/owner, Stage Door Beauty Shop: No more shopping centers in Niles. The traffic on Milwaukee is getting more and more congested.

Edith Domblak, Jewel sales: No more eateries or restaurants in Niles. We have more than enough now.

Schrader: more home financing in 1975

There will be more home financing money available by early 1975, according to Robert E. Schrader, President of Evanston Federal Savings and Loan Association, as he appraised the observable factors currently at work.

"With savings once again flowing into Savings and Loan Associations, mortgage money will be available to home buyers when housing market comes to life next spring," Schrader explained. "However, the cost of this money will remain high. Even though short term rates have declined considerably, mortgage money or long term money rates cannot be reduced significantly so long as savings rates are at their current level."

"The relationship of interest paid to savers and the rate charged mortgage borrowers can be explained simply in this way: to attract savings in a competitive market, financial institutions must pay minimum savings rates allowed by law to remain as competitive as possible in the U.S. Government market and other equally safe investments. It is unlikely that these rates will see much decline below the 7 1/2 per year limits in the coming months. It is therefore, unlikely to expect mortgage rates to drop below the current 9% range."

"Up until last October the demand for housing was strong

and little mortgage money was available at any rate. The question now is, with home financing money once more available, will there be a demand? Are people worried enough over signs of a depression to forego buying a home?"

"Even with the higher costs of acquiring a home and mortgage, if a person's employment is secure and his budget can stand the expense, we would advise a family to buy a home now as a sound investment."

"In our opinion, inflation will be with us for years to come, whether at 12% per year or 6%, it will not disappear. A home is still one of the best hedges against inflation. In most cases your equity investment will appreciate and Uncle Sam shares with you in the interest cost by allowing it as a tax deduction."

"One contingency in this prediction of the mortgage market is the possibility that the temporary adjustment made in the Usury Statute by the Illinois Legislature last summer will NOT be extended after July 1, 1975. This would cause mortgage rates to revert back to an 8% limit in Illinois. If this happens, local mortgage funds would immediately disappear from the market as it is unrealistic to think of lending money at 8% while paying as high as 7 1/2% for savings."

Christmas Day fire estimated at \$25,000

A mid-day fire of undetermined origin began in the mailboxes of a 16-unit apartment house in the unincorporated area of Des Plaines on Christmas Day, causing extensive heat, fire and smoke damage to the building and several of the apartments.

No injuries were reported. Four pumps, 2 trucks and an ambulance of the North Maine Fire Dept. were at the scene.

The fire, confined to the walls, spread upward from the mailboxes to the attic of the building. An effective stop to the fire checked it from spreading further, said North Maine Fire Captain Richard Leibach. All 16 mailboxes were involved.

Three of the apartments sustained heavy heat and smoke damage to furnishings and interior of the apartments.

The fire was of undetermined origin and remains under investigation by the Fire Prevention Bureau.

An estimate of damages was set at \$20,000 to \$25,000, according to Captain Leibach.

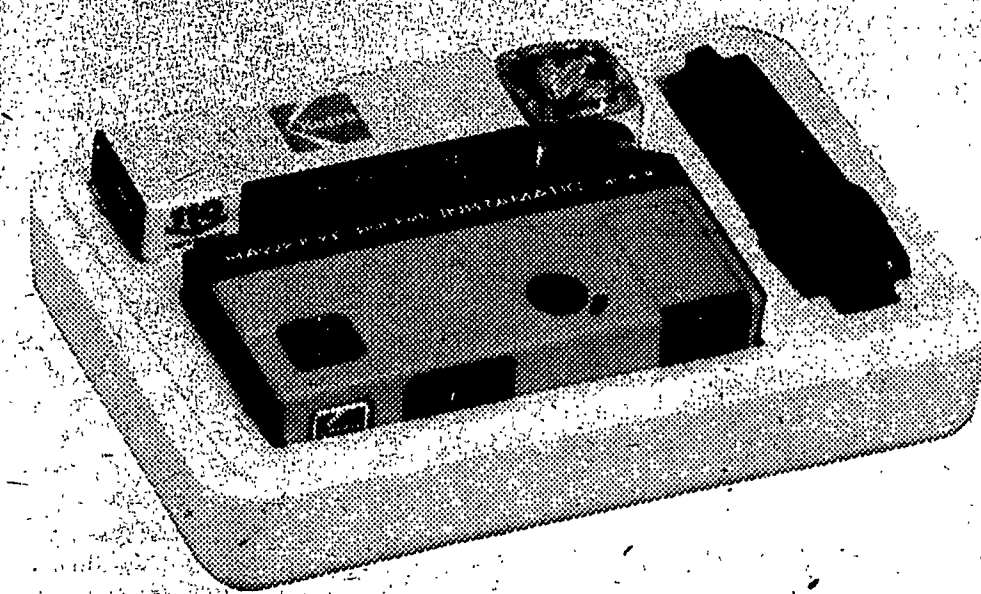

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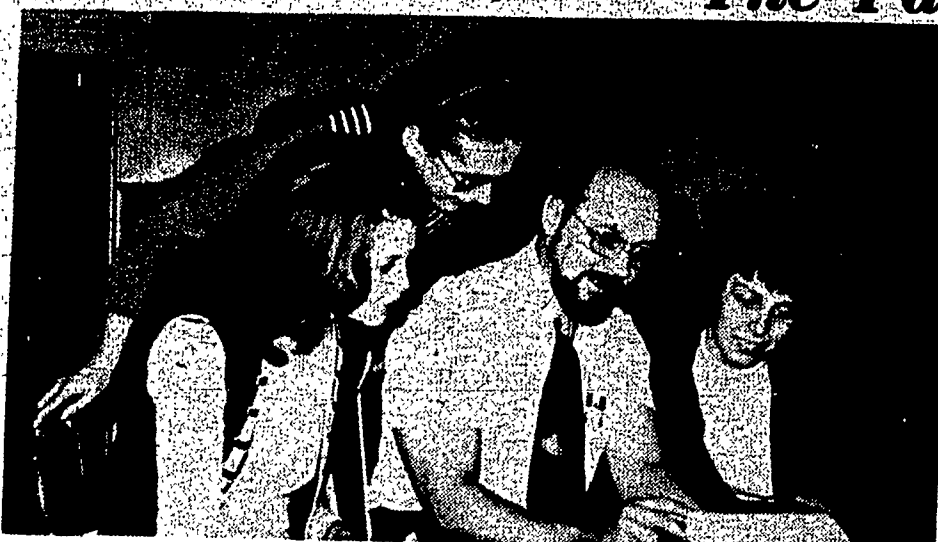

Pitts named Fire Dept. Training Officer

Pitts was appointed a Director of the Northwest Suburban Trauma Committee and spent a week at the University of Alabama Medical School participating in a task survey for the purpose of preparing the National Registry Examination for Emergency Medical Technicians.

In May of 1973 he received his degree in Fire Science Technology and in Oct. of that year was promoted to Lieutenant and assigned as a Shift Commander. During his eight years on the Department he has also worked as an inspector in the Bureau of Fire Prevention under the command of Captain Fred Huscher and has functioned as a clerical aid to the Chief, preparing reports and publicity releases. 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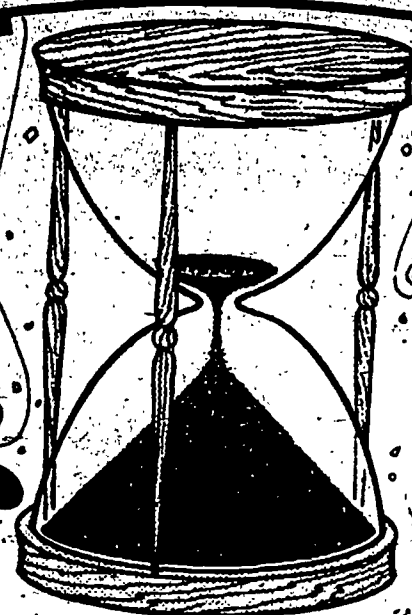
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ND Foilsman enter new year 5-0
