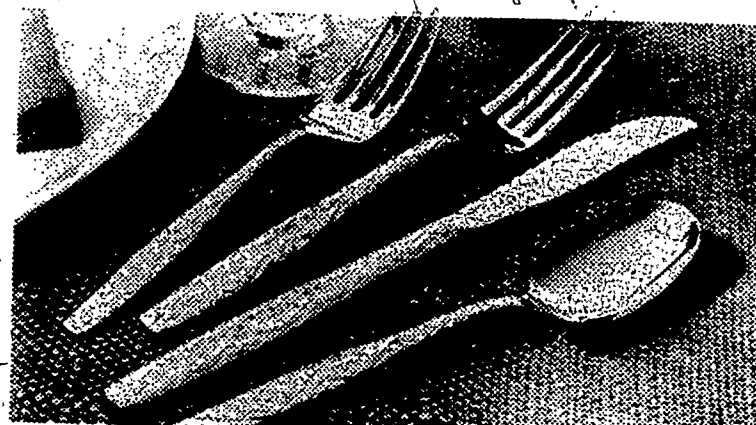

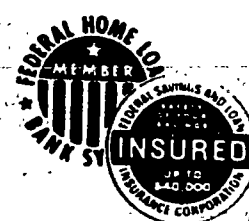

From the LEFT HAND

Since this seems to be belt-tightening time thruout the country we're wondering about the feasibility of building more school buildings in our area during the upcoming years.

The sharply decreasing school enrollments in the elementary levels seem to indicate yesterday's projected enrollment figures are way out of line. And since increased school facilities in both our townships were based on much higher student enrollments perhaps it's time to re-assess our thinking about more building.

Maine Township's 4th high school was built in anticipation of a total enrollment of about 14,000. The figure today is substantially below this, closer to 12,000. Based on population figures at the East Maine district, that 12,000 is likely to come down drastically in the coming years.

In November, 1970, District 63 had an enrollment of 7,300. Today there are 5,916 students. But even more startling, the number of students at each grade level graphically describes decreasing enrollments for the future.

Assuming District 63 feeds about 1/3 of the public students into the high schools in Maine Township, a decreasing pattern seems to prevail. Students in 8th grade today are 77, 7th grade, 752; 6th grade, 691 and 5th grade, 674 for a total of 2,845 for a 4-year period. In the lower grades the numbers continue downward: The 4th grade has 650 students, 3rd grade, 627; 2nd grade, 561 and 1st grade has 636 for a 4-year total of 2,474. Today's kindergarten figure is 566.

There are 371 less students in the first 4 grades than in the second 4 grades. Multiplying the figure by the 3 districts, the decrease is an additional 1,000 over the already decreasing present rate.

Adding parochial grammar school students to the public figure, it can be guesstimated the projected 14,000 figure might be closer to 9,000 during the immediate years. It would seem 3 high schools averaging 3,000 students would amply serve the community, rather than 4 schools averaging 2,250.

While we don't have figures for Niles Township similar enrollments will decrease the high school burden there in a similar pattern.

Pokrana, Park District Business Manager, resigns

Niles Park Commissioners accepted the resignation Tuesday evening of Daryl Pokrana as Business Manager in the Niles Park District. He left formally on Dec. 24 to take the position of County Auditor of DeKalb County in January.

The change in jobs will advance his career, said the 25-year-old Park District employee, who was unable to be present at the Tuesday night board meeting. A broader exposure to municipal work on a higher level, working with more assets with a variety of funds and accountability, as compared to the limited exposure within the Park District provoked a greater challenge, Pokrana told the Bugle last week.

Pokrana came to the Park District in Aug., 1973, from the CPA firm of Beecham & Bernstein of Chicago, through an ad in the Chicago Tribune.

The position of business manager was newly created within the park district at that time, with both finances and recreation formerly handled by the Assistant Park Director.

A graduate of Northern Illinois University, with a degree in accounting, Pokrana is married and has one child. He is a resident of Niles, although the new job will necessitate a move to within the county of De Kalb, since county employees must be residents of the county.

Altho he is enthused over the advancement in position, Pokrana is sorry that he cannot continue in the Park District. "The Niles Park District has the youngest administrative staff in the area," he commented "and so far we've been running what we think is a good operation. I'm sorry I won't be continuing in Niles, but I must attend to my professional growth. The Park has come a long way, since my employ, in the area of finances and park development."

A change in controls, following the departure of former director Helmut Dressler has resulted in a greater flexibility and more rapport with the Board of Commissioners, he said. "However, Dressler made a good many innovations, which we developed further, after he left."

Pokrana apparently continues to feel a close relationship with the Park position. "The future holds a great promise, financially, and the Park District should be on sound ground, with present investment schedules. In looking at the present economy, the tax

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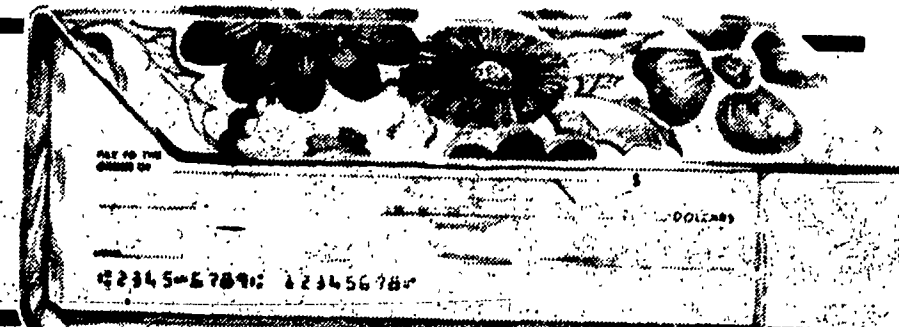

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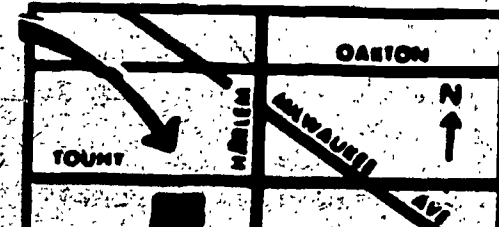

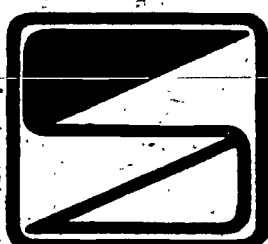

Tax News

Residency rules eliminate double tax

This is the second in a series of articles on ways you can save money on your Illinois State Income Tax return this year. The articles are written by H. & R. Block, America's Largest Tax Service.

The "part-year" residency rule enacted by the State of Illinois provides a tax break for people moving into or out of Illinois during the tax year.

Residents include in Illinois income all of their income regardless of where that income was earned. Non-residents include income earned solely within, or derived from, services in Illinois.

A person who is a resident for less than a year computes Illinois income as a resident for that part of the year, and as a non-resident for the remainder of the year. Both part-year residents and non-residents must use Schedule NR with the 11-1040 to compute

Illinois income tax. This Schedule NR should not be confused with or used in conjunction with Schedule CR, which is a resident's claim for credit to tax paid to another state.

You were a part-year resident in 1974 if you became, or ceased to be, a resident of Illinois. You must determine the point in time when your status changed from resident to non-resident or vice-versa.

For non-residents and part-year residents, allowable exemptions are computed according to the percentage of Illinois income to total income.

Residents of Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Iowa are not subject to Illinois income tax on their compensation paid in Illinois and are not required to file an Illinois income tax return.

Schrader: good news for savers and home buyers

There will be more home financing money available by early 1975, according to Robert E. Schrader, President of Evanston Federal Savings and Loan Association, as he appraised the observable factors currently at work.

"With savings once again flowing into savings and loan associations, mortgage money will be available to home buyers when the housing market comes to life next spring," Schrader explained. "However, the cost of this money will remain high. Even though short term rates have declined considerably, mortgage money or long term money rates cannot be reduced significantly so long as savings rates are at their current level."

"The relationship of interest paid to savers and the rate charged mortgage borrowers can be explained simply in this way: to attract savings in a competitive market, financial institutions must pay maximum savings rates allowed by law to remain as competitive as possible in the U.S. Government market and other equally safe investments. It is unlikely that these rates will see much decline below the 7 1/2% per year limits in the coming months. It is therefore, unlikely to expect mortgage rates to drop below the current 9% range."

"Up until last October the demand for housing was strong and little mortgage money was available at any rate. The question now is, with home financing money once more available, will there be a demand? Are people worried enough over signs of a depression to forego buying a home?"

"Even with the higher costs of acquiring a home and mortgage, if a person's employment is secure and his budget can stand the expense, we would advise a family to buy a home now as a sound investment."

"In our opinion, inflation will be with us for years to come, whether at 12% per year or 6%, it will not disappear. A home is still one of the best hedges against inflation. In most cases your home equity investment will appreciate and Uncle Sam shares with you in the interest cost by allowing it as a tax deduction."

"One contingency in this prediction of the mortgage market is the possibility that the temporary adjustment made in the Usury Statute by the Illinois Legislature last summer will not be extended after July 1, 1975. This would cause mortgage rates to revert back to an 8% limit in Illinois. If this happens, local mortgage funds would immediately disappear from the market as it is unrealistic to think of lending money at 8% while paying as high as 7 1/2% for savings."

There was also almost unanimous opposition to a proposal to build a new administration center with most parents agreeing building additional school rooms at the Nathanson School would alleviate the immediate burden in that area and would be a preferred choice.

According to school officials 5 mobile units, which are not utilized at Nathanson, must be discontinued after the end of the school year. They contended state law requires the temporary buildings can only be used for 5 years and this year will complete that period.

After more than two hours of lively discussion Business Manager Jim Bowen reviewed the school referendum of 1967, which stated an addition to Nathanson was included in the approved bond vote. Thus, the school board has the power from that referendum to build the addition.

The administration building, which seems to be favored by Superintendent Gogo, and several board members, would not raise the taxes of residents, because about \$450,000 of money for construction is presently available, and cannot be used in other educational areas in the district.

Many of the parents in attendance at the meeting admitted they were not familiar with the functions and actions of the school board, implying they were new in the district. Some parents insisted they would not allow their children to be transferred from their present schools citing the traumatic social experience their youngsters would undergo if they had to leave their friends. Other parents cited the dangers of walking to schools which did not have sidewalks near the schools and still others objected to the increased distance their children would travel.

While no decision was reached it is expected the next meeting will determine Board action on these matters.

Checking accounts at Skokie Federal

For the first time in Illinois history a savings and loan association will begin offering checking account services. Skokie Federal Savings will be making free checking accounts available to customers who retain \$500 in their savings accounts.

Under guidelines established by the Federal Home Loan Bank Illinois savings and loans are prohibited from issuing their own checking accounts. This is a concession to banks who offer checking accounts but are only permitted to pay 5% on passbook accounts as compared to a savings association's maximum of 5 1/2%.

However, Skokie Federal Savings will be issuing checking accounts which are supplied and serviced by Madison Bank of Chicago. Similar programs are presently being offered in California and Ohio and have been approved by financial agencies there.

John O'Connell, President of Skokie Federal Savings, noted, "We are making this new service available in an attempt to meet the needs of our customers. Instead of making a lump deposit in non-interest-bearing checking accounts, we urge our customers to keep the minimum in their checkbook and earn daily interest on their funds by keeping as much as possible in a savings account."

Investment Certificates

Highest bank rates of 7 1/2% interest on 6-year Investment Certificates of Deposit, is now offered at the First National Bank of Des Plaines, announced Arthur R. Weiss, president.

Former Mayor dies

21 when he became motorcycle sergeant on the Niles police force in 1921. Married in 1931 to his wife Sally, he ran for the office of village clerk in 1937, remaining in office until 1941, when he was successfully elected as Mayor of Niles for the next 20 years, until 1961.

He left service of Niles and went to work for the Forest Preserve District, Skokie Division, in Northfield, where he was employed until shortly before last Thanksgiving, when he entered Northwest Hospital because of declining health.

In one of his last public appearances in November, he was to see his granddaughter, Sally Stankowicz, 13, take office for a day as Niles village clerk, as one of the Niles Youth Commission's annual contest winners. "At that time," said a close friend, "he looked drawn, ill and had lost considerable weight."

Hospitalized shortly afterward for 3½ weeks, he was brought home to spend Christmas with his entire family, but took a turn for the worse a few days later.

His death saddened many of the older residents of Niles. "Frank lived a public life," said those who knew him, "giving 24 years of his life in elective office." And in death he was honored by village departments, as police and fire cars led the way to his final resting place.

"My only regret," said his widow last week, "was that he did not live to see a published copy of the 'History of Niles,' scheduled for print last December."

He is survived by his widow, Sally; a daughter, Susan (Robert) Kaberlein; two sons, Frank, Jr. (Joanne) and Martin (Kathleen); 15 grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Peggy Comiskey and Mrs. Sally Reschke; and two brothers, John and Edward Kozak.

Based on the present economy and on the decreased enrollments, it would seem feasible the college board should once more consider purchasing one of the local high schools for a college, rather than add a greater burden to residents for another school. Residents in both townships have given rubber stamp approval to nearly every school bond referendum in our communities and we believe now may be the time when we should all consider blowing the whistle on future school buildings.

New campuses and new buildings are often rather expensive ego builders to administrators and board members who want to see brick and mortar proof of their accomplishments. But as we are beginning to see, board members and administrators move on, while the strapped taxpayers continue to foot the bills long after they've departed.

In School District 63 it has been suggested an educational service center be considered to be built there. With all the buildings in the district and with the decreasing school enrollment, another building is nevertheless being discussed.

After 15 years of rapid expansion and spiraling taxes, it's time the guy who foots the bills begins resisting more building. We've all been most generous in our support of the very best facilities. Utilizing present facilities for educational centers and colleges seems only good sense and cents.

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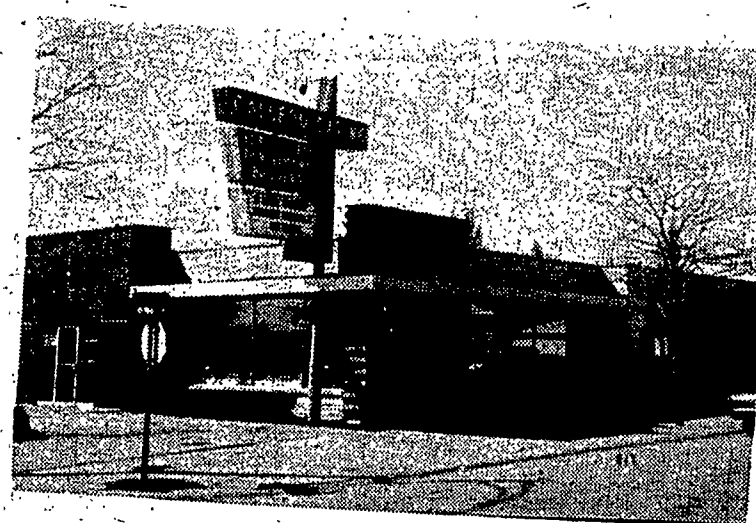
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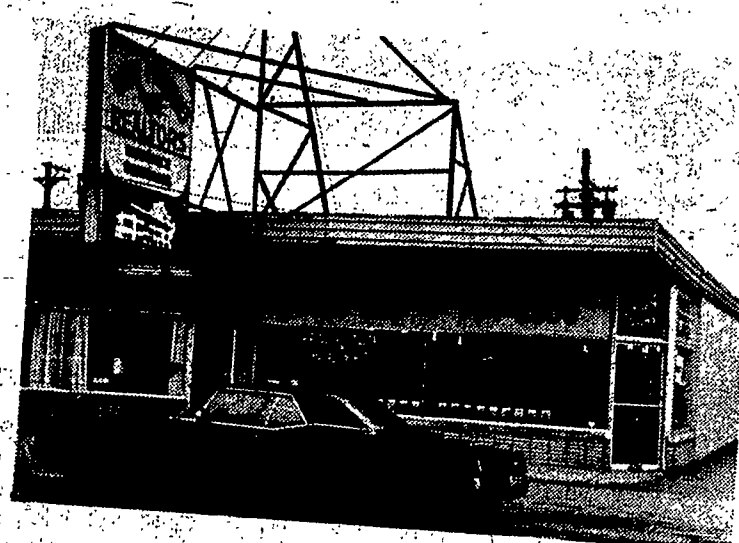
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Consumer protection bills

To the Editor:

I was very pleased to read that State Rep. Alan Greiman (D-15) is planning to introduce a series of bills designed to help protect consumers and home owners from some immediate destructive effects of our present economic plight.

If these bills all make as much sense as the one he recently introduced (HB 10), the freshman legislator will be making a substantial contribution towards helping ease the economic hardships of many Illinoisians.

HB 10 amends the mortgage foreclosure act and provides that no mortgage foreclosure suit be brought to foreclose a mortgage of residential property containing four units or less, unless the monthly payments are at least six months in arrears.

This should be very beneficial to middle class people, so many of whom find themselves temporarily unemployed, or just unable to keep up with the continuous rising cost of living. The breathing spell before possible foreclosure, for which the bill provides, could mean enough warning and enough time for the homeowner to avoid the disaster of losing the home.

With the continuous stream of hollow speeches and slogans being offered the public, as a substitute for legitimate plans and programs to solve some

economic problems, it is very refreshing to learn of some solid, workable legislation being drafted by Rep. Greiman, one of our own area members of the Illinois General Assembly.
