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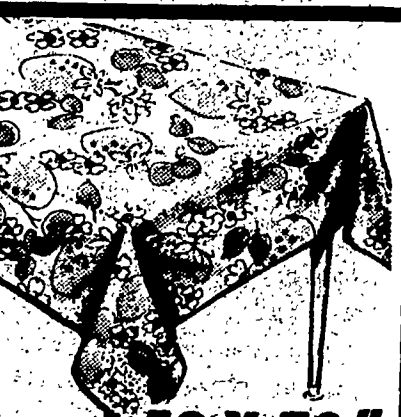

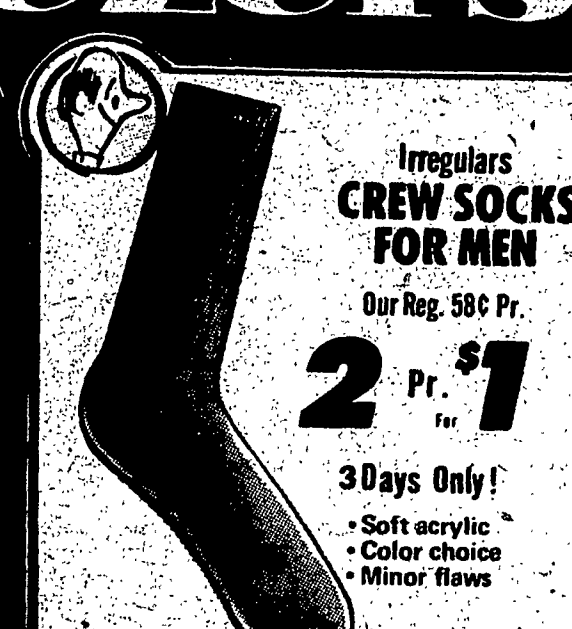

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State Rep. Robert Juckett dead at 42

State Rep. Robert S. Juckett (R., Park Ridge) died Sunday in Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, where he had been hospitalized since late November for leukemia.

Juckett, 42, of 1823 W. Crescent ave., a lawyer, was elected in November to his fifth term as a

state representative.

He had served in the Illinois House as chairman of the House Executive Committee and of the Legislative Commission to Visit and Examine State Institutions, and had been a member of the Purchased Service Facilities Committee and the Mental Health

Fund Advisory Committee.

Rep. Juckett is survived by his widow, Janet; two daughters, Linda and Pam; two sons, Robert and William; a brother and a sister.

Services were held Wednesday in St. Mary's Episcopal Church, 306 S. Prospect ave., Park Ridge.

"He served his city as an alderman and as a state representative. He did both jobs with honor and great dignity and great support," Park Ridge Mayor Martin Butler said Sunday.

"Rep. Juckett was a dynamic legislator who always gave his all to any interests he pursued and

will leave a void in the legislature," said State Rep. Eugene Schlickman (R-4th, Arlington Heights). In the legislature, Rep. Juckett was always supportive of township government and fought for improvements in Illinois mental health programs, Schlickman said.

From the LEFT HAND

We spent a couple of hours at the County jail two weeks ago interviewing two brothers in their early twenties who've been hooked on drugs almost half of their lives. They "shoot" quinine, fire battery acid, and shoot anything into their veins to get high. On the street they said they're always "hustling" to get a buck so they can feed their habit.

In the County jail the older man (23 years old) said he could get drugs in the prison if he desired. He said the sole deterrent to his getting further involved in drugs is he might wind up in the federal penitentiary for 5 years.

It was a tawdry story, almost without hope. Two boys in their early teens whose father lost interest in them, preferring to sit in the local tavern and ignore raising the boys. At 14 years old they had already been thru the drinking scene. They said the natural sequence is to move up to reefer (marijuana) and then move into the hard drug habit. It was clear the kids who contend smoking pot is harmless don't know what they're talking about since the follow-up drugs are hard drugs.

These two young men we talked to were tough street-hardened white men who knew their way around, both in and out of the County jail.

Inside their jail tier are perhaps 20 or 30 men, whose individual cages face onto a center passage which leads to the front of the tier. Most of the guys are at the front. It's visitation day and 3 of them are hopefully looking out the front bars for a visitor from home. A tall, handsome, girlless black woman moves into the visitation section and talks to her man 3 feet away behind the caged-in area. Another guy is writing a letter, several are playing cards, hooting and hollering, while a very quiet dude is deep into a chess game.

After interviewing the drug victims, you move into the prison area and are shocked by the brutality of it all. Men, staring out behind the double-barred doors have the same caged-in look the hungry animals have at Lincoln Park Zoo. You first feel shock, then dismay, and then shame that such a system exists.

If they put a suburban kid in with these guys, he'd be eaten alive in no time. The street-hardened interviewee has no such problems. He said you don't give these guys "nothin'" and

Money recovered after Cupid Capers chase in hold-up

A 27-year-old Chicago man was shot twice in the capture-chase by Morton Grove and Niles police after robbing a Morton Grove food store on Wednesday morning, Jan. 29.

Charles Lawrence, Jr., 27, of 3618 S. State st., was taken into custody and charged with armed robbery, two counts of aggravated assault and unlawful use of a weapon, said police.

He was captured following a traffic stop by Morton Grove police at Dempster and Menard. "We spotted this green Maverick weaving erratically down Dempster st., and going over the speed limit," said Morton Grove detective Robert Smolen, "and pulled him over... he came out of the car with a drawn gun, as we did, and two shots were fired." Smolen and his partner, Sgt. Pat McKenna radioed for backup and Morton Grove and Niles police joined the manhunt.

Officers searched the two block area and, alerted by a woman neighbor, cornered the suspect in a garage at 8840 Menard.

He surrendered and was taken to Lutheran General Hospital for treatment of gunshot wounds in the left shoulder and right wrist.

An employee of Convenient Foods, 7630 Dempster st., stated that a male, weighing about 180 lbs., wearing a beige suit and a purple shirt, had entered the store around 10 a.m., walking to the back for a bottle of Coke. After the other customers left, she said, he pulled out a blue steel revolver and forced her to open the cash register, taking \$116 in cash.

The money was recovered, said Morton Grove police, and the suspect waived his rights, stating he didn't know why he did it — he didn't need the money.

He was held over on \$25,000 bond, pending a preliminary hearing in Evanston.

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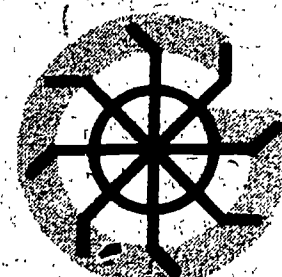

Mikva meets with 10th District LWV's

Mary Stoltz, president of the Skokie-Lincolnwood League of Women Voters (LWV), met Jan. 18 with Congressman Abner J. Mikva and representatives of other 10th District LWV chapters to discuss a wide range of national issues. Ruth Kadota, another member of the Skokie-Lincolnwood LWV, also attended the meeting.

"There was a great meeting of the minds—our views were very similar on all the issues," said Donna Schiller, president of the Illinois LWV who also attended the meeting in the Glenview Public Library.

Mikva told the League presidents that although he will be on the House Ways and Means Committee for the 94th Congress, he intends to work on many of the issues he concentrated on when he served on the Judiciary Committee from 1969-72—such as speedy trials and handgun control. He has already introduced a bill to ban the manufacture, sale and distribution of handguns.

"I had originally intended to seek to return to my old assignment on Judiciary, but it was impossible to turn down an opportunity to work on the 'pocketbook' legislation that so vitally affects my constituency as well as the whole country," said Mikva.

He told the League presidents that he favors expanding public service employment programs and increasing investment tax credits to businesses where expansion benefits the public interest—such as in housing and public utilities. He said such credits should not go to the oil industry, which is already reporting record profits.

Mikva also told the presidents that he:

--Supports extension of the Voting Rights Act. The act, which guarantees that citizens cannot be kept from voting by discriminatory laws like poll tax, expires in Aug.

--Favors the revival of the Land Use Bill sponsored last year by Rep. Morris Udall (R-Ariz.), which encourages states to develop their own land use plans.

--Advocates multilateral developmental aid to foreign countries administered through the U.N. Mikva said that although he was concerned by recent U.N. actions against Israel, he still thinks much good can be accomplished by working with the U.N. He added that military aid should be separated from other forms of foreign aid when presented to Congress, so that they can be

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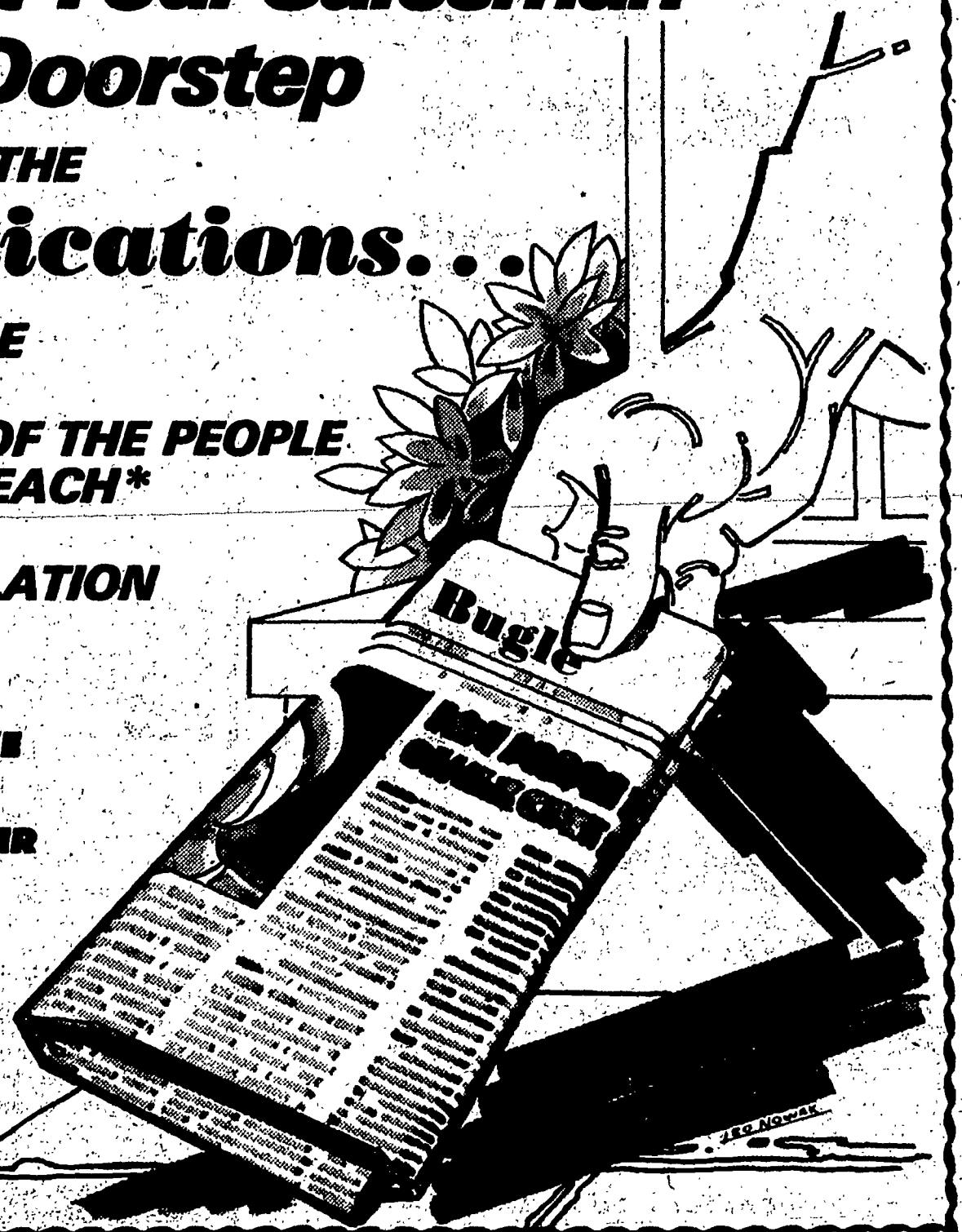
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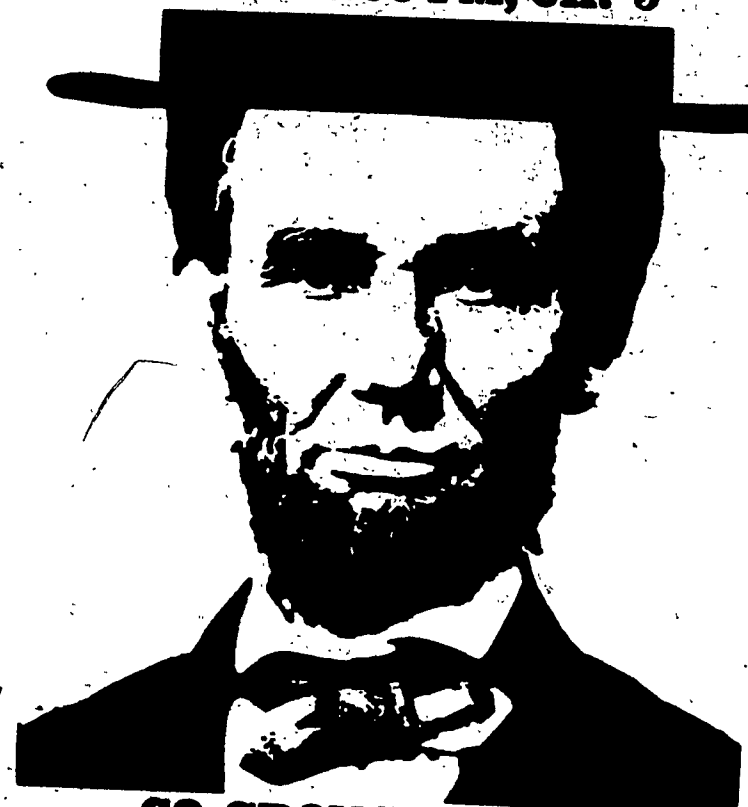

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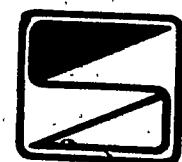

This is one of the reasons that each Niles home has received plastic bags and containers, said Village Manager Ken Scheel. As for other, plastic or metal containers, he said, "people pack as much refuse as they can into these containers, packing them down. The refuse will not come out when the men try to empty the cans, forcing them to bang the containers, resulting in dented cans." The solution, he said, is "Don't pack the cans." Scheel: 2 capfuls of ammonia in the bottom of the bag will odor them away, or keep the stand within your garage, out of range of the squirrels... "they're very fresh," he commented.

NW Cook County Girl Scouts' SME drive

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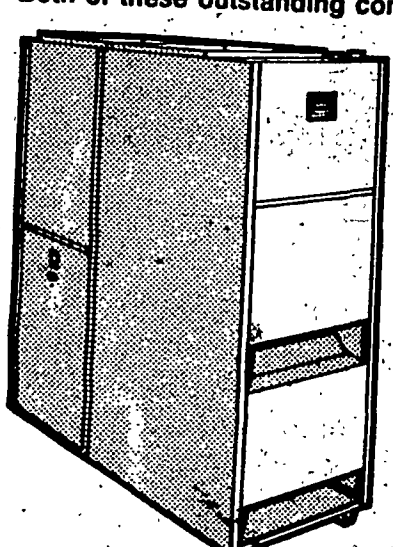
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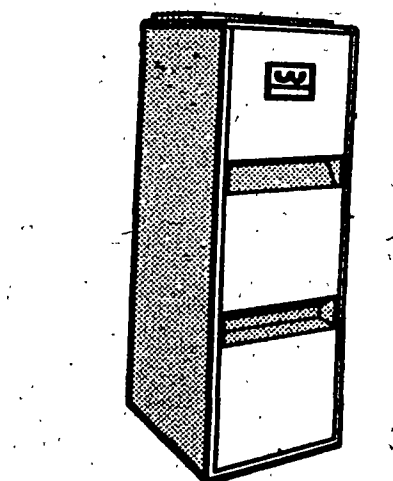

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE

AMENDING CHAPTER 25 OF THE VILLAGE OF NILES CODE OF ORDINANCES

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: That Section 25-41 of the Village of Niles Code of Ordinances which reads as follows:

Sec. 25-41. Board created; membership.

The police pension fund of the village shall be administered by a board of trustees, consisting of five (5) members who shall be residents of the village and they shall be known as the board of trustees of the police pension fund of the village. Two (2) of said members shall be appointed by the president of the village. The term of one member shall begin immediately after May 27, 1953 and his appointment shall expire after May 27, 1953 and after his appointment for the period of two (2) years until the second Tuesday in May and the third and fourth members of said board shall be elected from the regular police force by the active members thereof and they shall be elected by ballot for a term of two (2) years from the first Tuesday in May of the year in which they are elected and fifth member shall be elected from the beneficiaries under the provisions of law. The election provided for in this section shall be held biennially on the third Monday in April under the Australian Ballot System, in such place or places in said village, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by the appointed members of said board. In the event of the death, resignation, or inability to act of any member of said board, elected under the provisions of this section, the successor of said member shall be elected for the unexpired term in a special election, which shall be called by said board and shall be conducted in the same manner as the annual elections provided for above.

is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 25-41. Board created; membership.

The police pension fund of the village shall be administered by a board of trustees consisting of nine (9) members, chosen in the manner hereinafter set forth. All members of the board of trustees of the police pension fund of the Village of Niles shall be residents of the Village of Niles and shall serve for a one (1) year term. Five (5) members of the board of trustees shall be appointed by the mayor with the consent of the village board of trustees. The members so appointed shall include a member of the village board of trustees and the Chief of the Police Department, if the chief is a member of the pension fund. If the chief is not a member of the pension fund, the mayor shall appoint another member of the police department who is a member of the fund. The other members so appointed shall have knowledge of fund management and pension law, such as a lawyer, an accountant and a banker. The remaining members of the board of trustees shall be elected by the active members of the police department and the trustees so elected may include one retired member of the police department receiving a pension from the fund. They shall be elected by ballot and shall commence their term on the first Tuesday in May of the year in which they are elected. The election provided for in this section shall be held biennially on the third Monday of April under the Australian Ballot System, in such place or places in said village, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by the appointed members of said board. In the event of the death, resignation, or inability to act of any such elected member of said board, the successor of said member shall be elected for the unexpired term in a special election, which shall be called by the board and shall be conducted in the manner as the annual election provided for above. A majority of the board of trustees of the police pension fund shall be required to transact business and a majority vote of the full membership as provided by law is required for effective action by said board. Membership on said board shall not preclude membership on any other board or commission of said village.

SECTION 2: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3: That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

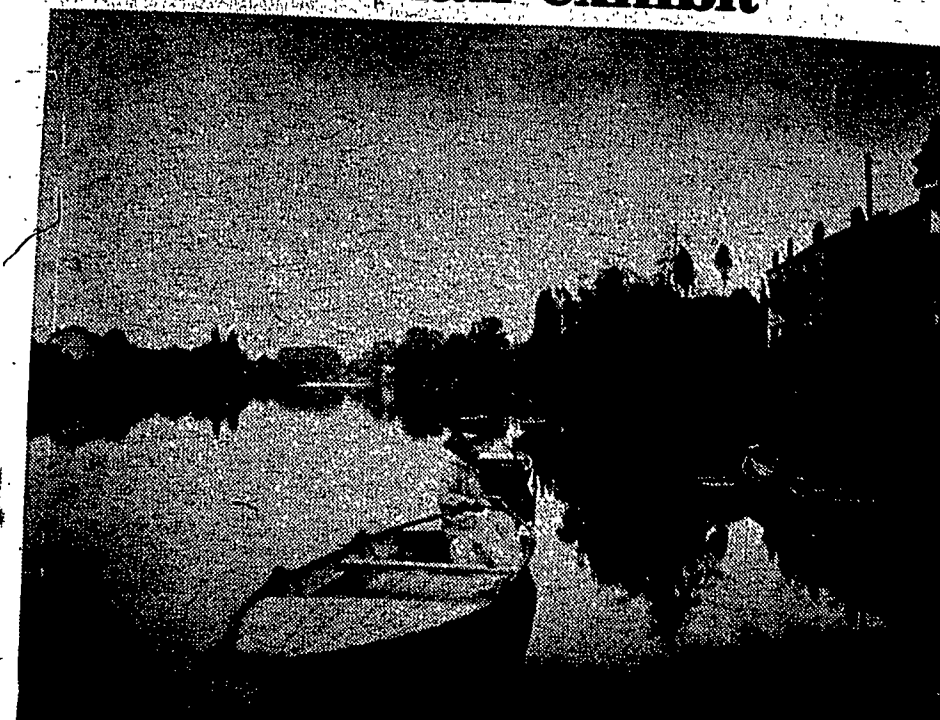

LEGAL NOTICE AN ORDINANCE

AMENDING CHAPTER 13 OF THE VILLAGE OF NILES CODE OF ORDINANCES

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: That Section 13-22 of the Village of Niles Code of Ordinances which reads as follows:

Sec. 13-22. Board created; membership.

The fire pension fund of the village shall be administered by a board of trustees, consisting of five (5) members who shall be residents of the village and they shall be known as the board of trustees of the firemen's pension fund of the village. Two (2) of said members shall be appointed by the president of the village. The term of one member shall begin immediately after May 27, 1953 and his appointment, and shall expire on the second Tuesday of the succeeding May and one shall serve after May 27, 1953 and after his appointment for the period of two (2) years until the second Tuesday in May and the third and fourth members of said board shall be elected from the regular fire force by the active members thereof and they shall be elected by ballot for a term of two (2) years from the first Tuesday in May of the year in which they are elected and fifth members shall be elected from the beneficiaries under the provisions of law. The election provided for in this section shall be held biennially on the third Monday in April under the Australian Ballot System, in such place or places in said village, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by the appointed members of said board. In the event of the death, resignation or inability to act of any member of said board, elected under the provisions of this section, the successor of said member shall be elected for the unexpired term in a special election, which shall be called by said board and shall be conducted in the same manner as the annual elections provided for above.

is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 13-22. Board created; membership.

The fire pension fund of the village shall be administered by a board of trustees consisting of nine (9) members, chosen in the manner hereinafter set forth. All members of the board of trustees of the fire pension fund of the Village of Niles shall be residents of the Village of Niles and shall serve for a one (1) year term. Five (5) members of the board of trustees shall be appointed by the mayor with the consent of the village board of trustees. The members so appointed shall include a member of the village board of trustees and the Chief of the Fire Department, if the chief is a member of the pension fund. If the chief is not a member of the pension fund, the mayor shall appoint another member of the fire department who is a member of the fund. The other members so appointed shall have knowledge of fund management and pension laws, such as a lawyer, an accountant and a banker. The remaining members of the board shall be elected by the active members of the fire department and the trustees so elected may include one retired member of the fire department receiving a pension from the fund. They shall be elected by ballot and shall commence their term on the first Tuesday in May of the year in which they are elected. The election provided for in this section shall be held biennially on the third Monday of April under the Australian Ballot System, in such place or places in said village, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by the appointed members of said board. In the event of the death, resignation or inability to act of any such elected member of said board, the successor of said member shall be elected for the unexpired term in a special election, which shall be called by the board and shall be conducted in the manner as the annual election provided for above. A majority of the board of trustees of the fire pension fund shall be required to transact business and a majority vote of the full membership as provided by law is required for effective action by said board. Membership on said board shall not preclude membership on any other board or commission of said village.

SECTION 2: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3: That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Abraham Lincoln's birthday will be commemorated this year with the presentation of the second in a series of six hour-long television specials based on Carl Sandburg's Pulitzer Prize winning biography of "Abraham Lincoln".

Money & You

Social Security Part II

Monthly social security checks may go to workers and their dependents when the worker retires, becomes severely disabled, or dies. Then, there's Medicare, which helps pay the cost of health care for eligible people who are 65 or over or disabled.

Monthly benefits social security pays include:

Retirement checks - When you retire, you can start getting retirement checks as early as 62.

Disability checks - A worker who becomes severely disabled before 65 can get disability checks.

Under social security, you're considered disabled if you have a severe physical or mental condition which (1) prevents you from working, and (2) is expected to last (or has lasted) for at least 12 months, or is expected to result in death.

Once checks start, they'll continue as long as you are disabled. If you are severely disabled, you could get benefits even though you manage to work a little.

Survivors checks - If the worker dies, survivors checks can go to certain members of the worker's family. A lump-sum payment also can be made when a worker dies. This payment usually goes to the widow or widower.

Monthly social security checks also are paid to certain dependents of a worker who has retired, become disabled, or who has died.

Retirement or disability - Monthly payments can be made to a retired or disabled worker's:

Unmarried children under 18 (or 22 if full-time students).
Unmarried children 18 or over who were severely disabled before 22 and who continue to be disabled.

Wife or dependent husband 62 or over.

Wife under 62 if she's caring for worker's child under 18 (or disabled) who's getting a benefit based on the retired or disabled worker's earnings.

Survivors - Monthly payments can be made to a deceased worker's:

Unmarried children under 18 (or 22 if full-time students).
Unmarried son or daughter 18 or over who was severely disabled before 22 and who continues to be disabled.

Widow or dependent widower 60 or older.

Widow under 60, or surviving divorced mother, if she's caring for worker's child under 18 (or disabled) who is getting a benefit based on the earnings of the deceased worker.

Widow or dependent widower 50 or older who becomes disabled within 7 years after she stops getting checks as a widow caring for worker's child under 18.

Dependent parents 62 or older.

Checks also can go to a divorced wife at 62 or over, or a surviving divorced wife at 60, or to a disabled surviving divorced wife 50 or older if the marriage lasted 20 years or more. Children may be eligible for social security benefits based on a grandparent's earnings under certain conditions.

Generally, a marriage must have lasted at least 1 year before dependents of a retired or disabled worker can get monthly benefits; survivors can get benefits in most cases if the marriage lasted at least 9 months.

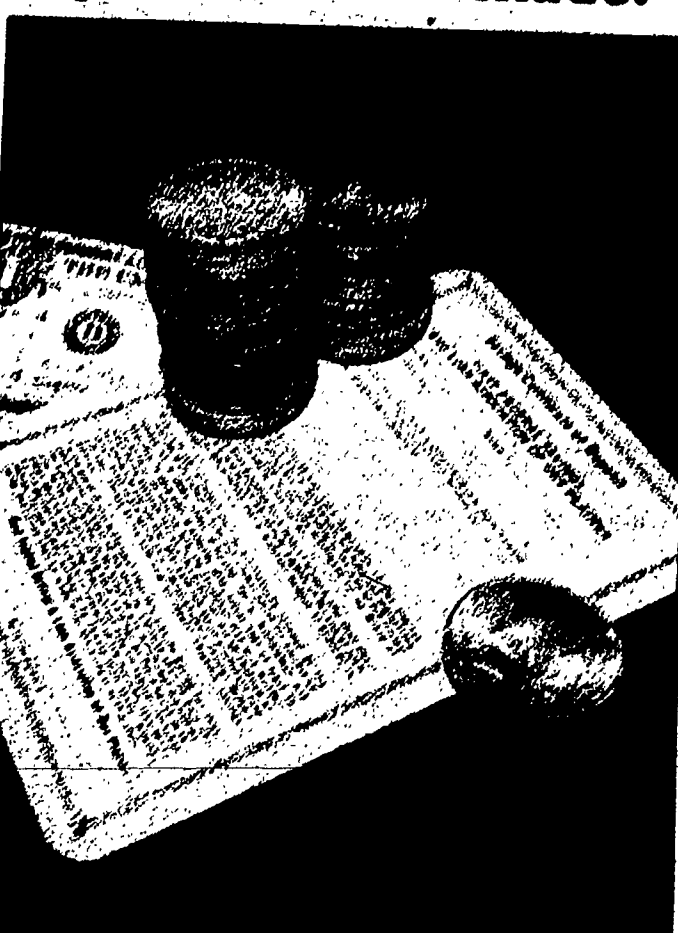

The site's B-1 zoning, however, is intended to permit a building of mixed commercial and multifamily residential use, Joyce said.
The proposed condominium building includes only one small room in an inconvenient location that will be available for commercial use, he said.
"As far as I'm concerned, the building doesn't belong there at all," Joyce said.
Joyce said he will file an amended complaint today in Circuit Court and request an immediate hearing.

Part of the problem is that it is the first such structure to be built in Lincolnwood under B-1 zoning and the village's ordinance does not define a mixture of commercial and residential use, Joyce said.

Lincolnwood officials were "very cooperative and made every effort to make full disclosure," he said.

Residents near the building site have been organizing opposition to the construction since November, claiming that it would aggravate traffic, water pressure, and density problems in the area.

The homeowners suit also charged Louis Calamaras, chairman of the Lincolnwood Plan Commission, with conflict of interest because he allegedly sold the land to Katz-Weiss for a \$650,000 profit after urging its rezoning in 1962. Calamaras' involvement wasn't discussed at the Friday meeting, Joyce said.

Excavation began at the site last week. Joyce said he believes a hearing date on the suit will be set for this week. The case has been assigned to Judge Francis T. Delaney in Circuit Court.

Bernard Katz, president of Katz-Weiss, said last week that his company would have good grounds for damages if construction is delayed because "hundreds of thousands of dollars are tied up" in the project.

Tentative days for this year's Festival were set for July 16 thru 20. The Committee hopes to set the Days on the Treasury parking lot, 8500 Golf rd. (near Milwaukee ave.), last year's successful site, also Four Flags and Lawrencewood are also under consideration.

In fact of the present economy the Committee is considering the possibility of raffling money, from \$250 the first night to \$1,000 on Sunday night, instead of the usual Grand Award of a car. "Last year's winner was the first to keep the car," commented Brach. "The previous five annual winners sold their cars."

Two big Spectaculars are promised for this year, said Co-Chairman Ben Mankowsky. More rides, "about 22 to 24" are also promised for the Days, due to the tremendous, \$42,000 in receipts taken in the '74 Days.

The Niles Days Committee is made up of delegate-members from participating homeowner groups and civic and social organizations in Niles. The Committee plans an annual 5-day Festival during July, the net proceeds of which are allocated to requests for the receipts, pending qualification of the requests.

don't take any guff from anybody. "If you were to give a guy a cigarette, an hour later it would be expected you do it again. And if you don't, they'd try to beat the hell out of you."

At the County the recidivist rate is about 85%. That means 85 of every 100 guys return. But there's a glimmer of hope. There's a private educational institute, the Pace Institute, which has private-financed buildings on the County grounds, which has only a 25% return rate. If a man has at least 3 months incarceration at County and volunteers for the Pace program, he will become a part of about 200-300 men participating in the education program.

At Pace each man receives group counseling. Leo Lewis, who is the community counselor there, said they concentrate on an extensive reading program, and offer trade programs in many fields. Once a prisoner is released, another counselor will try to keep in touch with him for 24 months. The releasee is provided initial money to get him going on the outside, and then the outside counselor tries to watch over him, if he can find him during the subsequent months. Such a program reduces the returnees from 85% for the general County prisoner to 25% among those who've gone thru the Pace program.

There were two prisoners we interviewed. The more talkative older brother was most open, and was the most experienced. He talked about beatings with buckets and blankets inside the prison tier. But he emphasized "I don't give nothin' to no one", and his taking advantage of the Pace program is likely to have negligible results. But his brother, more subdued, and less experienced, took pride in telling us how well he did in his math course. You had a feeling, just maybe, he'd get out and go straight.

It was a shocking experience seeing the caged men. There seems so little hope. More than 8 out of 10 will return. But the work of the Pace Institute leaves a glimmer of hope.

When you listen to a guy who started hustling for drugs 10 years ago at the age of 13, you begin to understand those frightening crime figures which seem so impersonal in print. He gets hooked, he needs more and more money, and there's only one way to get it ... take it. He told of knocking at a door. If no one is there you knock it down, break it open and rummage for anything of value. You then go to the next apartment and continue until you have enough for today's high. Each day you need money and you repeat the process.

It's a depressing story. These men can't be left on the street to terrorize. And they can't be holed up in cages without an attempt at rehabilitation.

Pace workers and volunteers are doing the necessary rehab job which is showing phenomenal results. It's the one hope for a problem which is becoming an American undertow.

Sometime if you can break away from our unreal suburban world call the County for a tour of that other world. It's depressing and it's shocking and it feels much different than the prison world you've seen on your TV screens.

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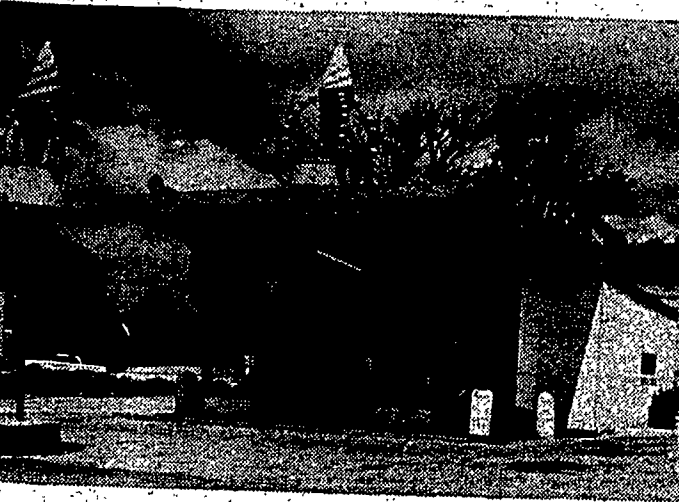
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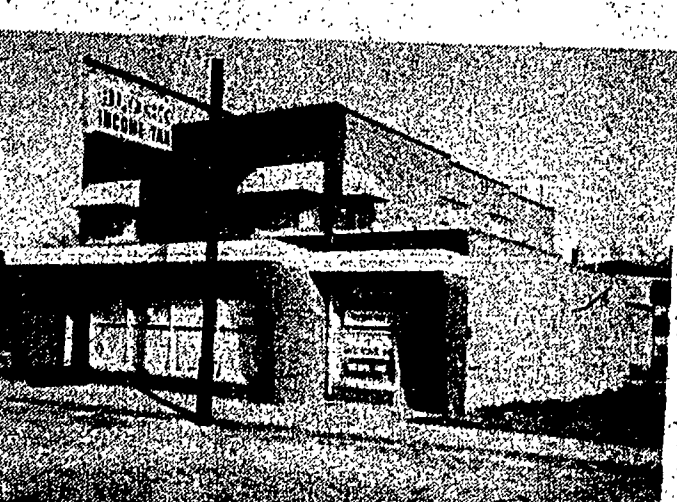
