### From the LEFT HAND

When Ab Mikva hosted his economic conference last month in Niles, we were there in the role of a reporter. While we sat thru the 3 hours of testimony, mostly from people representing big interests (banking, oil companies, labor), we were chomping at the bit to give testimony on behalf of smallness, of a small businessman and of a small consumer, who reflect the problems of today's economy.

We weren't alone in our feelings that the big people were dominating the conference. Frank DiMaria, a Niles builder, was quite angry as he sat there and heard speakers like A.C. Nielson, Jr. and Newton Minow comment on the economy. Sitting in the rarefied top seats of LaSalle Street, and atop the pole which measures the public pulses, were not men who were true representatives of the 10th Congressional District. We also didn't feel consumer advocates nor anti-southeast Asian advocates gave the meat and potatoes comments which should have been forthcoming at the meeting.

Had we shed our role as a reporter and told the conference about our personal relationship with the economy, perhaps a little more meaningful light might have been shed on a very complex subject.

Why is the economy in its present straits? And how did our personal actions hinder its progress? We'll give you a short disposition on one man's pulling in his horns, which can be multiplied all over the country.

Cindy said she grabbed Scott's hand and urged Janice to follow her downstairs, but Janice refused. As Cindy and Scott walked downstairs, they were met by Lisa, who had been awakened by smoke, and she led both children out of a rear door.

Cindy said she ran to the rear of the house and then urged Janice to jump out of the window as the fire was then on the second floor. Janice suffered a compound fracture of the large toe on her right foot and is recovering at Continued on Page 33

Niles Park Attorney Gabriel Berrafato announced during the March 18 Park Board meeting the acquisition of 5 lots on Chester ave. near Betty Terrace, im-mediately north and south of Greenwood Park.

The purchase price of \$100,000 said Berrafato was reached in an out-of-court settlement of the Park District condemnation proceedings last October on the 5 lots (about 3/4 acre in size) owned by Western Financial Savings of Chicago.

Title to the property is pending due to several claims and adjustments against the property prior to claim by the Niles Park District.

Also contingent to the settlement, said the attorney, \$5,000 of the purchase price has been set in escrow pending removal by area builders Leskey and Hilson and according to village specifications of the huge mound of dirt piled on the lots.

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



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

The Maine-Niles Association of Recreation for the Handicapped is an extension of seven cooperating Park Districts and Recreation Boards. Our purpose is to provide comprehensive recreation program opportunities for all handicapped children and adults within the community on a proportionally shared cost basis. Why form?

The member Park Districts were not able to develop comprehensive programs for the limited number of identified individuals with any one particustype of handicap. Through the pooling of resources and populations, M-NARH is able to offer the handicapped residents of Maine and Niles Townships a recreation program equal in frequency, diversity and quality to those available within the Park Districts. The Association does not consider its programs to be a luxery but, in reality, an obligation to the people of the area who have a right to expect service to be available.

Who do we serve?

Programs are offered for all the handicapped children and adults of Maine and Niles Townships including those with mental. educational, emotional, social, physical, hearing and visual disabilities.

Who administers the program? Representatives are appointed member Park District to Directors of the Maine-Niles Association of Recreation for the Handicapped.

How is it financed?

To date, a proportional amount of each Park District's assessed valuation has been donated to cover operating expenses. In addition, member townships have provided Federal Revenue sharing monies to help support the pilot program. Fees for individual programs are also used to defray program expenses. What do we do?

Maine-Niles offers the hand capped residents of the area an opportunity to make productive and enjoyable use of their leisure time in their own community. We offer them a chance for a more well-rounded existance, enabling them to develop physically, socially, emotionally and intellectually. Programs include summer camps, social clubs, beep base-ball for the blind, overnight ing, sports, art activities bowling for the physically handi capped and many more.

What is the future? This pilot program, though immensely popular and successful, will be forced to discontinue services in all 7 districts unless an immediate source of permanent unding is obtained.

Revenue Sharing is an unstable source of revenue. The Park Districts themselves are faced with yearly cost increases and tax income reductions. There is no place else to find a permanent source of income other than the general public. The state legislature has recognized the needs and has authorized Park Districts to levy up to .02% for their share of costs in this type of Association. requires that the general approve this tax by refer-

endum. How much will it cost?

# Ed and Carl put together a plastic cylinder that's going to help keep your rates down.

It's called a vacuum chamber weld tester. It's not too fancy, and it doesn't have any microcircuits or chrome trim, but it could save us more than \$100,000 a year.

Ed Steeve, Commonwealth Edison engineer, designed it; Carl Knutson, Assistant Shop Superintendent, helped put it together at our Maywood Technical Center.

The vacuum chamber consists of a short, transparent plastic cylinder that's slightly larger

in circumference than the pipe it's testing. We fasten it around the weld, where the leaks are likely to occur, then seal it airtight. The space between pipe and cylinder is then partially filled with a clear liquid (usually water) and a vacuum pump is attached to remove the air. If there

are any leaks in the weld, the air from inside the pipe will create a column of telltale bubbles.

It's a simple process, but vitally important. When we put cables in underground pipes, we expect them to last for many years. A pin-hole leak would result in a cable failure, a loss of power, and a loss of valuable man-hours in repair work.

We have been testing welds by other methods, which were time-consuming, and cost as much as \$14,000 for every mile of pipe.



## Niles resident instructor at Science Center



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#### Money & You 1974 tax tips-part ||

A great number of taxpayers who used their cars for business in 74 are entitled to a bonus deduction. You can deduct the difference between the new, higher 15 cent/10 cent "automatic" mileage. allowance and any company reimbursement for less than that. And you get this deduction even though your actual expenses came to a less than the "automatic" deduction.

Just about everyone who uses a car for business will be entitled this "excess" deduction on his '74 return.

Since the 1974 increase in the "automatic" mileage deduction for business travel is retroactive to the first of the year, your reimbursement will be less than the new "automatic" deduction-even if the company gave you the maximum all along. (The limits before this tax change were 12 cents/9 cents). To figure your "excess". simply compute the "automatic" deduction subtract your reimbursement, and deduct the difference. You don't have to hold on to gasoline receipts and repair bills; you get 15 cents/10 cents regardless.

Case in point: Bob Smith drove 15,000 miles for his company in '74. He was reimbursed at 12 cents a mile. He can deduct \$450.

If your company gives you a mileage allowance and a separate reimbursement for meals and lodging, tax information publisher Prentice-Hall offers this caution. Excess mileage the wrong way and you could lose out on either: I. The excess "automatic" mileage expense deduction; or, 2. The easy recordkeeping set-up that now allows an employee traveling on business to receive per diem of up to \$44 and have that payment treated as accounted for.

A tough tax ruling says you can't separate your mileage allowance from your per diem and get the best of both worlds. They are both travel expenses. And since they are, if you claim an excess. mileage deduction, you have to be able to prove all your non-automobile expenses "mainly your meals and lodging" because you claim excess mileage deductions.

That means prove in full-under the ultra-tough substantiation rules. (If your return is prepared by a tax professional, he might be interested in the specific citation for this tough rule. It's Rev. Rul. 73-191, IRB 1973-17.

And even if you have receipts and records for '74, you have report things right. Prentice-Hall suggests that you follow Form 2106 line by line. That way you can't help but spell out everything Uncle Sam wants to know. By following Form 2106 step by step. your return will reflect how business-related expenses and reimbursements actually match up. . Deserononononononononononononononononon

#### Resumed interest ceiling could halt home construction

"Since a large part of the funds being attracted to savings and loan associations-which provide most of the mortgage money-cost these institutions eight percent, it is not possible for them to lend at eight percent," said O'Connell.

'Along with builders, a resumption of the eight percent interest level will have an economic impact on suppliers to the housing industry, realtors, lending institutions and persons attempting to sell their homes." O'Connell stated.

If the market price on mortgage money is higher than the state usury law, the impact will be felt especially by the young, who may not have their larger downpayments required, and on the poor, who are affected as well by the shorter maturity dates asked in the necessity rationing of existing money.

About a year ago we sought builder Frank DiMaria's advice about a small piece of property which could be used for future Bugle offices. Because our business doesn't require walk-in trade, the location didn't have paramount exposure which a retailer would need. Frank said the area was satisfactory, and he gave us a ballpark estimate of the square foot cost for constructing a small building. When we scratched out the costs for the modest building, estimated the tax and the high interest rates, we concluded the new monthly payment would be three or four times higher than our present expense. Contemplating the loss of revenue on the down payment money, you can add another \$200 a month to the cost. When we mentioned the project to our accountant, he jokingly asked if we were interested in building a monument to ourselves. We smiled wanly, thinking he may not have been too far off the mark. Nevertheless, the high interest rates plus the estimated \$15 to \$20 a square foot costs, scared us off any such project. Several men, who would have been employed during excavation and construction, did not get this job. The mysterious flow of money thru the banking system was lessened and one less project to oil the economy was put off to

Some weeks later Bob Wagner, who handles our distribution, suggested we consider purchasing another truck. Even though our present one only has 35,000 miles on the odometer, the burdens of increased circulation and larger newspapers has place stresses and strains on the present truck, which necessitates another one. We told Bob to try to "make due" for a while, again, pushing the economic clock back. One less truck means less work on the assembly line and again, less action for a bank in the area.

Back in the fall, when the new model cars came out, we considered trading in the wife's 60,000 plus miles car. Bu when we saw the soaring price of a comparable car, at leas \$1,500 more than the cost of her original car, we again pulled back our horns. We bought a couple of new tires, and a new battery, and have slushed thru another winter with no car problems. But again, Detroit sold one less car, which mean several workers at the Dearborn plant had less work and a the rubber companies in Dayton; and the glass companies in Pittsburgh less action was forthcoming because of our
