Increase of 7% over last year

\$6.9 million budget set for '75-76

[By Alice M. Bobula]

An appropriation ordinance for \$6.9 million was presented to the Niles Village Board Tuesday night, June 24, by Village Manager Ken Scheel.

The budget for the fiscal year 1975-76 exceeds last year's \$6.4 million by 7%, said Scheel as compared with the 10% increase of the previous year, 1973-74.

"Niles uses an accrual budget as well as a cash budget," said Scheel. "With this cash budget which is evaluated monthly we can keep close track of our cash flow and expenditures. This method has kept the Village in a sound financial position."

Anticipated revenues have increased 10% over last year's. Continued on Page 38

From the Left Hand

The death of the Chicago Today newspaper Sept. 13 is truly a sad time for all Chicagoans. It has been the best Chicago newspaper in reporting Chicago City happenings.

Unlike other businesses the demise of a newspaper in a community diminishes the entire community. Whether or not you read the newspaper, the very competition it offered the other papers made all of them better. While Today had combined much of its operation with its sister paper, the Tribune, the editorial department remained independent.

In our younger days the Chicago Herald American and Examiner were the predecessors to the present Today newspaper and was an important part of our growing up. It was the era of the great columnists, saloon reporters and gossip mongers, who created a very lively paper. Syndicated columnists Winchell and Hellinger were the prototypes for future Kups to follow, and their mangling of the English language was only surpassed by their inter-personal battles with endless foes.

The lingering illness of the Today actually preceded its birth. For many years the evening newspapers in Chicago have been operating with huge red figures and the death of one of them was inevitable.

Rising costs and automation, with its conflicting union problems, will be the likely reasons for the newspaper's interment. Adding the competition from television you probably have the major reasons why a metropolitan area of 6,000,000 people or more can no longer support 4 daily newspapers.

Force District 63 to present report

In a voice vote, district 63's school board passed a resolution Tuesday for Superintendent Gogo to present "long and short range goals and objectives" for the district.

Gogo, who contended these goals are already set forth in the MBO's (Management By Objectives) presented annually to the board, said there would be several "volatile" topics, implying they would be best not be held up for public scrutiny at this time. But with the strong insistence from board members, Deckowitz, Larson, Lessin, and Reiss, Gogo expected the report will be aired at the next regular board meeting, August 19.

While the vote did not receive any negative votes, board members Allen, Kipnis and Nidetz remained silent on the voice vote.

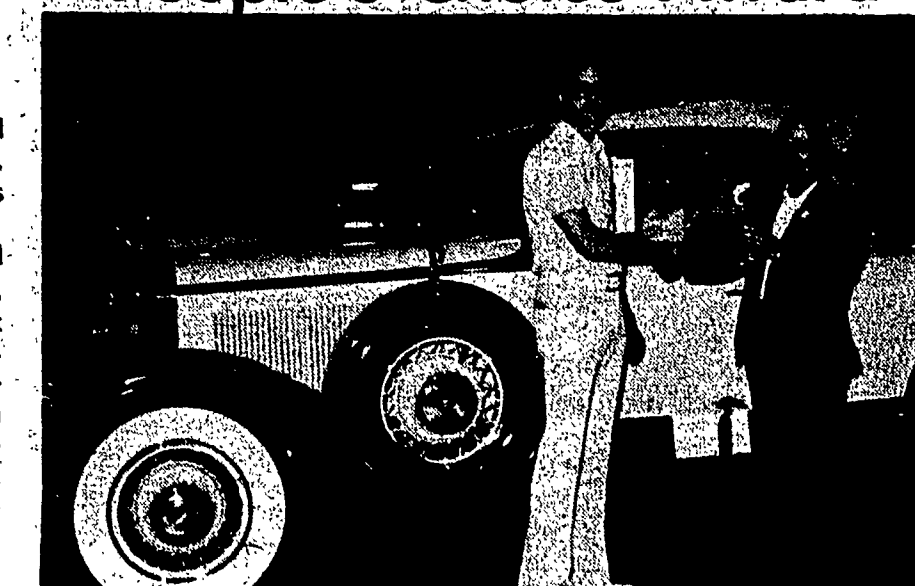
An alert Niles resident assisted in the arrest of a burglar suspect Thursday whom he observed going through his backyard at 2 a.m. carrying a dark square object.

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Money & You Goodbye to the little tin box

You may have seen one at your grandmother's house. The old tin budget box with slots in the top for all the different categories of family expenses. When Papa arrived home with his wages in a narrow brown envelope, it was time to sort out the money needed and place it in the tin box. For monthly expenses, a few coins were added each week.

Well, in these days of credit, the rigid budget, like the tin box, is just a relic of days gone by. Which is great, because money after all is to be managed by people, not the other way around. Yet sometimes when we shun practices as old-fashioned, we "throw out the baby with the bath water."

It really doesn't matter how rich or poor you are. Sometimes people with high incomes are floundering around even more than their less fortunate neighbors. Managing money efficiently can make the difference between "feeling rich" or "feeling poor." If you've ever had to hold your breath waiting for the next paycheck to come in, you'll know just what we mean.

But things aren't often that desperate. The true value of a budget is that it gives you something to refer to when you are using your money; it will enable you to spend your money with the peace of mind that comes from knowing that an unexpected emergency the next day won't put you behind the eight ball.

To dispose of your disposable income efficiently, you need the flexible control of the budget, plus a combination of a self-discipline and informed spending. To start with, you must know how much income you have to work with...after taxes, social security, union dues, and so forth have been deducted. Unless you and your spouse are newlyweds, you will probably have a good idea of income and expenditures for the past twelve months. Check your W-2 form and then get out all of your cancelled checks and reconstruct the expenditures of the past year. Of course many of these checks will be for "cash" and may be hard to categorize. (Some people put an inconspicuous code letter at the corner of such checks to indicate use, e.g., "h" for household.) Almost certainly this review of your checking account will provide you with the statistics about your "fixed obligations" and the remainder will represent your "discretionary" spending.

The goal of a budget is to make you feel comfortable within your own income, not to turn you from a poor person to a rich one. In order to make any drastic improvement in your fortunes without increasing income, you're going to have to change some of your "fixed expenditures." For example, you're going to have to move to housing which will cost less. Since such major changes are usually impractical, you should strive for a budget which will allow you to get more for your money.

It's in the area of discretionary spending that you can adapt your income to your life-style. Don't be turned off by that overworked term; perhaps the "now" generation has the right idea when it tells you to do your own thing. Sometimes an examination of your expenditures will show that you're putting a high price on "keeping up with the Joneses." How you reallocate the priorities is up to your spending scheme: clothing, gifts and contributions, appliances, furnishings, entertainment, building and grounds maintenance, and savings.

Obviously you can't expect some of these categories to be the same from month to month. You should be able to figure from past experience the amount of money you will be spending on these variable items during the coming year.

Such imponderables as medical and auto repair expenses should also be estimated. Then you must regularly set aside money to meet these needs when they come. Many budgeters have a special savings account for short-term purposes. For people who have never followed a spending plan, this will be the most difficult part.

Along with your study of expenditures, you will want to look into your competence as a shopper. You'll find that you'll really get more quality by shopping at the end of the season for clothing and housewares; at pre-set times of the year for furniture and appliances. Even a car can be bought at a savings if you get it just before the annual model change.

Personal expense is another nebulous category. Should it include everything which the person needs, and how much flexibility should there be? Walk around money can be a source of aggravation when there isn't enough of it.

How do you go about setting-up the mechanics of your budget? You must isolate the money for each category and this can be done by listing in advance the amounts that will be needed. The advantage here is that you see the whole picture and cannot be misled into spending money which should be earmarked for a specific purpose. At the end of the month you will enter your expenditures in each category and compare them. From this you can see if your budget is realistic and, moreover, if there are categories of spending which need a special effort to reduce.

In addition to the savings account which contains money for relatively short-term needs like new living room furniture or a washing machine to replace Old Faithful, every budget should allow for deposits to a long-term savings program which will build security for years to come.

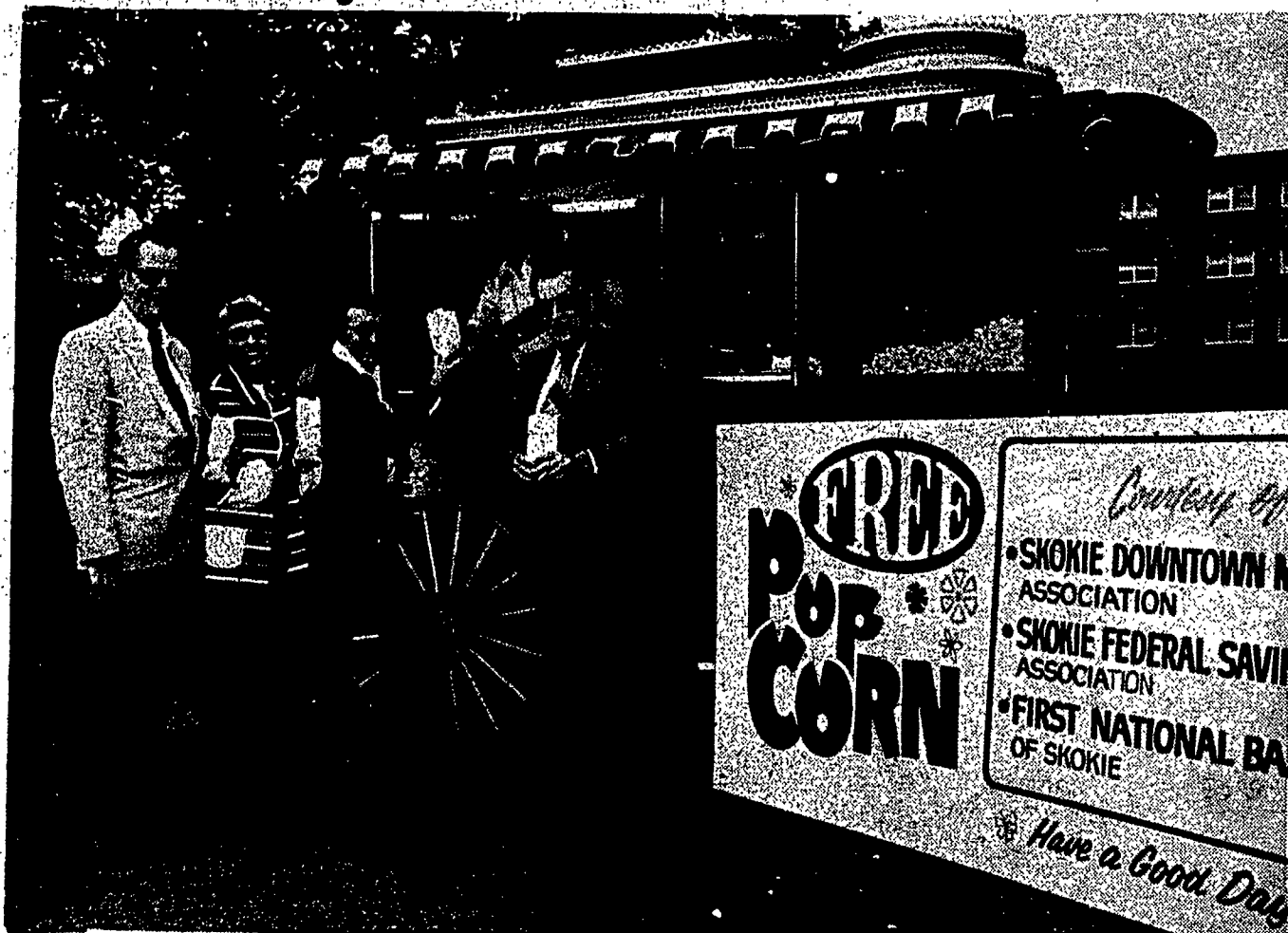

## Liberty Bell replica on display at First National



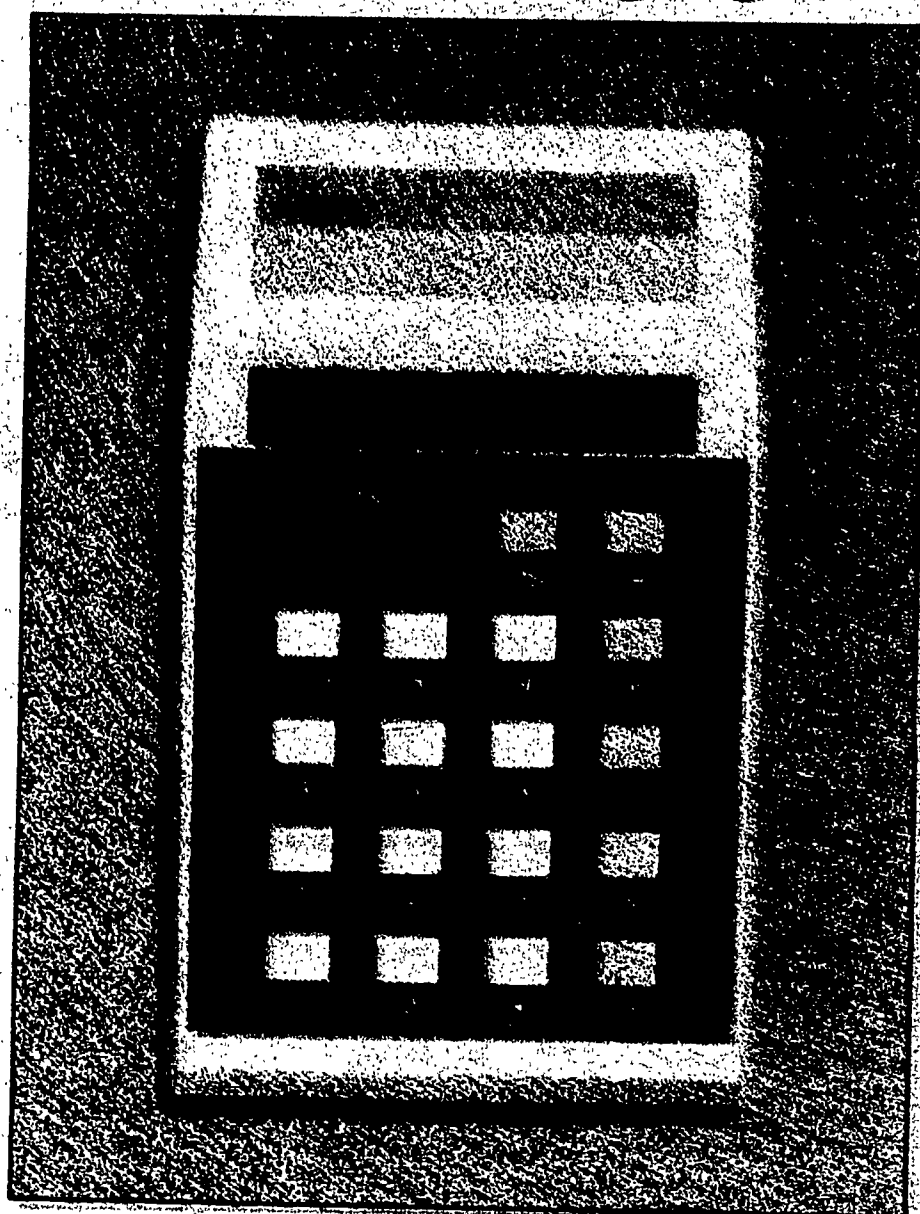

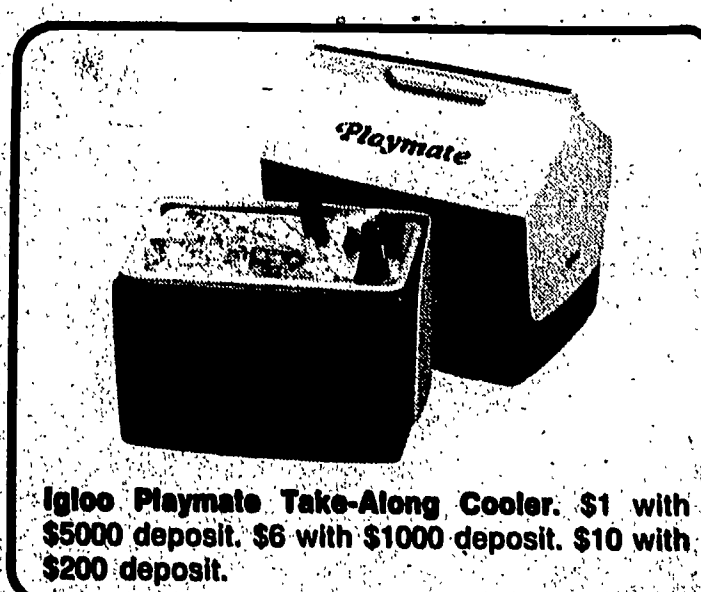

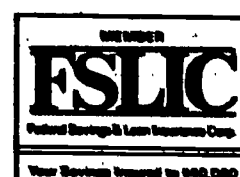

### Teachers lobby in Springfield

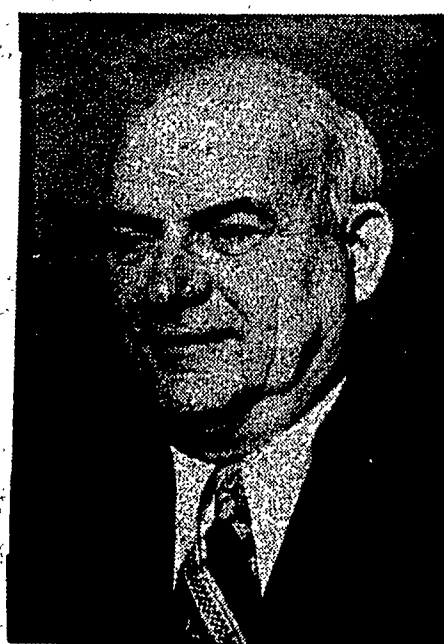

## Is your child safe on a bicycle?

As would be expected, most cycling accidents occur during the Spring and Summer months. Most reported accidents occur during daylight hours. However, severity of accident is increased after dark.

National Safety Council statistics indicate the bicycle accident rate is highest for both boys and girls during the ages of 6-8.

The problem of bicycle safety is clearly one of proper safety education for the child and of parental responsibility to provide supervision that can help the child ride more safely.

The Morton Grove Police Department has provided the following tips to assist parents in promoting bicycle safety in their youngsters:

1. Make sure the bike is a size the child can safely handle and balance.
2. Show the child how to check their bikes for safe operation.

Brakes, lights, seat adjustment, chain, handle bars and grips, horn or bell, and tires should be periodically checked.

3. For night riding, a headlamp visible for 500 feet and a red rear reflector is needed. Light colored clothing is very helpful in making a bike rider more visible to motorists.

4. Ride in the same direction as traffic and stay close to the curb.
5. Always ride in single file when you are with other cyclists.
6. Never hitch a ride by holding onto cars or trucks.
7. Don't weave in or out of traffic or swerve from side to side.
8. Obey street and highway signs and all traffic signals.

No parent wants his child hurt in an accident on a bike. All that is needed, in most cases, to prevent a tragedy is TIME...your time in training that youngster in the basics of safe bicycling.

## Park Ridge man escapes death in underpass accident

A 21 year old Park Ridge man was hospitalized Thursday night June 12 after his car struck the west end of the underpass at Milwaukee and Dempster in Niles.

Injured with facial lacerations and a broken nose was Edward Trumbull of 1840 Parkside ave. in Park Ridge. He was taken to Lutheran General Hospital.

According to Niles police Trumbull was travelling east on Dempster st. in the curb lane at 11 p.m. Thursday night when his 1968 Chevrolet struck the southwest corner of the viaduct.

The reporting officer stated that he could find no signs that the driver had applied his brakes prior to or during the impact. He also noted that the State had previously placed 5 barrels filled with sand in front of the viaduct and that there was a yellow warning light flashing behind the barrels.

Several pedestrians on Dempster st. stated they heard the car accelerate and saw the car hit the viaduct wall said police. There were no passengers in the car.

A hospital spokesman stated the driver of the car was in good condition on Monday morning. It was not known when he would be released.

Trumbull was ticketed with failure to reduce speed and with damage to state property.

This was the third accident to occur in the area within the last 6 months. A Des Plaines girl was killed December 16 when the car in which she was riding struck the underpass abutment. State highway officials had placed barrels filled with sand at the end of the viaduct to apparently avoid further fatalities.

A 21 year old Glenview man was killed last Nov. 1 when he apparently lost control of his car, striking the same abutment of the Milwaukee-Dempster underpass.

Niles Mayor Blase credited the sand barrels with saving the driver's life in the June 12 accident. He has complained to the State by letter concerning this area he said but "it is doubtful that the state can do anything without major reconstruction at this location."

Replacements of wider sand barrels were made several days later.

The dashing days of the "Front Page" when guys by the names of Charley MacArthur and Ben Hecht ruled the roost died back in the 30's and the last years have been a benevolent respite for a communications era which is rapidly changing. The death of metropolitan newspapers in all major cities (New York has been reduced from 8 to 3 daily papers) is a prelude for a new journalism which is likely to come from a television-like communications. It is no coincidence 7,000,000 circulation magazines named Life, Look and The Saturday Evening Post were put to rest because their era had passed. And it is no coincidence the furious maneuvering for Cable-TV stations and exclusive areas are being fought today by the future "Publishers" of tomorrow's mediums. Local publisher Lou Lerner, who has been playing it very close with Chicago politicians, has been reported in the frontline vying for a future in this new medium. Since the approval for stations is likely to come from the local political men, it's important these relationships be established.

Interestingly, the publications which show the greatest success are the specialty publications. Playboy and trade magazines are very successful today while the more general newspapers are gasping for air in a quickly-changing market.

In our local areas the Pickwick newspapers were almost sold a couple of years back and last winter the Skokie News changed hands. The Sun Times created a daily suburban Day newspaper which lasted about 2 or 3 years, and now the little Trib and the Suburban Week are supplements in suburbia. Because of the migration of the city folk to the suburbs the metropolitans are trying to crash and cash into these markets. The changing of the inner-city is a considerable factor in the changing patterns of the city papers, and the accompanying advertising changes which are the lifeblood of the papers, have altered the metropolitans objectives.

In saying farewell to the Today, we're saddened by its demise and the loss to Chicagoland. We're also saddened by the many workers who've spent their working lives there and will now have to seek other employment, many outside the newspaper field.

From the ashes of smoldering printers' ink the cathode tube is likely to emerge in which your future newspaper will be peeled into your living room every morning, noon and night, just as sure as you now see the Today, Lawrence Welk and Gunsmoke shows. The news will be more immediate and more graphic. And whether we older newspaper reactionaries like it or not, this is what the future holds for all of us.

The number '30' means the end of a story. September 13, the '30' will be printed across the Today newspaper. And while we rather melodramatically think of Hemingway's famous For Whom The Bell Tolls ending, "the bell tolls for thee", we're optimistic tomorrow will bring a better day in communications for all of us.

"Checks and balances are inherent to our system of Government", Black told the board. "We have seen in recent years the kinds of misdeeds that can occur when one part of Government operates in stealth", Black continued.

Black said that he repeatedly has asked the Supervisor and the Township Attorney Samuel Berger for custody of the records, but has not been successful. "Sadly, instead of getting legal opinions, I kept getting advice which seemed to be blatantly political-in effect, to keep my hands off", Black added.

"I cannot keep my hands off for two reasons. First, I am charged by law with the responsibility for certifying the fact that the Supervisor is faithfully carrying out the duties of his office through the Supervisor's bond. Second, and I think more important, is the fact that if no one acts as a check or a deterrent on a Government which is trying to act in secrecy, then credibility in Government and our public servants will suffer.

"The credibility in the Niles Township administration has been strained to the breaking point. Unaccounted funds, unusual personnel practices and irregular administrative procedures have made us the laughing stock of the Community", Black continued.

"Despite the efforts of some auditors to shine the light of day on some of the dark recesses in the way this Township is governed it has done no good. It has, therefore, been my reluctant duty and last recourse to file the lawsuit", Black added.

Black said that his Attorney, Burt Odelson, Oak Lawn Village Attorney, has assured him that his case is legally valid. "Many other lawyers and other Township Clerks have also looked at the law and said that I am completely in the right", Black added.

"I can only conclude that Attorney Berger's opinions which never cited legal precedent to begin with, were done for the purpose of covering up for the Supervisor's past misdeeds and the misdeeds of the Supervisor's predecessor. We have had quite enough coverup in this country", Black continued.

The suit contends that Anderson is in "dereliction of his duties" and that refusal to turn over the records is "arbitrary, capricious and in derogation of the law."

"The rule of law is highly abstract and the real issue of this case can sometimes be lost in legal verbiage", Black continued.

Black said that since all the suit asks is for legal opinion and court order, hopefully it would be decided within 30 days.

inged little from last year according to Scheel, with 38% of the total revenue expected from sales tax. Utility taxes increased 1/4% over last year. "The total of \$5,929,454 in anticipated revenue is on the conservative side," he added.

The \$4.5 million General Corporate Fund is slightly increased over last year's \$4.1 million figure. Budgeted within the 1975-76 General Fund is \$1.5 million for the Police (25% of the total departmental expenditures); \$1.1 million for Public Works (18.5%); and \$1 million for the Fire Dept. (16.5%).

These figures vary little from the 1974-75 budgets of \$1.4 million for Police; \$1.1 million for Public Works; and \$990,000 for the Fire Dept. Other departments under General Fund include Water Dept. \$1.4 million; executive, legal, judicial, finance and administrative personnel depts., \$504,423; building, housing and health, \$131,813; family services, engineering, automotive fund and other commissions.

When Niles was growing as rapidly (in former years) all attention had been given the physical aspect of services. Now that the community has stabilized, the need for human services has become the desire, said Scheel.

"Like most businesses and municipalities," he noted, "our biggest component is personal services and our Village should be proud of its sincere, dedicated, loyal and efficient work force."

In other business: a petition for banking and drive-in facilities by the Four Flags State Bank was referred to the Zoning Board.

problems Gogo insists the district will have in subsequent years. In an interview with The Eagle Gogo suggested the word "volatile" might be too strong a word but he believes several subjects will arouse the community.

Gogo explained the school board already has a philosophy of education which has been submitted to the State of Illinois (Superintendent of Education). Board member Barbara Kipnis repeatedly said the resolution submitted by Lessin was "redundant", which echoed Gogo's thoughts such spelling out of plans were a duplication of previous efforts.

Gogo said "we're presenting projective information all the time" noting projective material up to 1980 has been developed by the administration. He emphasized it was the job of the administration to translate the data they receive but it's the job of the Board to make decisions what they should do with this data.

New board member Howard Lessin, who introduced the resolution, said the report is for the Board and the public. In defending the need for having long and short range goals spelled out, he said it would help the Board to head in a straight path. He said he felt the present efforts of the school board moved too "jerky", noting they were not moving forward "smoothly."

While Lessin noted the report was important, both for the Board and the public, Gogo said he "resists handing out the goals to the public without the Board revising it."

Board president Arlene Nidetz mentioned several times the goals have been established in the MBO's, a program which had been adopted 2 years ago. Because they were discussed in March, before new members Lessin and Deckowitz were on the board, she stated she understood the reason for the Lessin request, though admitting it was a duplication.

While the strong resistance by Gogo, Nidetz, and Kipnis was evident, it was perplexing why they tried for an hour to defeat the resolution. Gogo's assessment of the report being "volatile" seems overstated. He has already reported many times about the enrollment, housing and financial problems he anticipates in the immediate years. He points to the pinpoint accuracy of projecting decreasing enrollment in the district the past years, and has emphasized enrollment will continue to decrease indefinitely. He has repeatedly warned about the financial straits the district will be in a few years from now, defending the need to hold over surpluses from year to year to help meet the money crunch. And he has often noted the district may have a more transitory make-up, with a change in cultural background in the future, subjects which have been on public display at many meetings.

The presumption which may be drawn from this resistance is the superintendent does not want to place himself on public record as to the future of the district, fearful such pronouncements may be boomerang in the coming years. Future school boards may not look kindly on prognosis which are far off the mark. If this is a consideration a very broad general white paper can be expected, with much hedging included, especially for the long range goals.

1973-74 robbery was up 35 percent and assault up 11.4 percent in Morton Grove, continued Fine. He said that he did not blame our police, but felt they were short-handed and could use another 4 men on the force and another squad car on the streets. Fine said he thought the CCPA would help to get more policemen on the force and perhaps this would provide better protection for the residents.

Dave Cohen, trustee said that since he met with Fine and Chief Glauner in February, the possibility of hiring new men for the police force has been considered.

Phil Cancellieri of the Morton Grove Chamber of Commerce, said he believes we have one of the finest police forces in the country. He said the police feel they are also citizens and should be able to exercise the right to belong to a group. "I know you will evaluate the feelings of these men as a group and since we want them to continue to do a good job I hope you will consider their needs and desires," said Cancellieri.

James Maguire, one of the Skokie police present at last night's meeting said when the CCPA was recognized in Skokie, they recommended using 2-men squads on the midnight shift and also asked to have shotguns placed in police cars. Ron Henrici asked Cancellieri if he had the results of the study being taken by the Chamber of Commerce of businessmen here to see how they felt about the CCPA. Cancellieri said there was no determination yet, but that the results would be forthcoming soon.

Burpo then requested once again the board meet with Tom Venn and a representative of the CCPA to discuss the question of recognition. David Cohen moved to have such a meeting but hastened to say that it meant nothing as far as the CCPA being recognized. He said he wanted the meeting to see if new reasons could be introduced to change his mind on the matter. When the vote was taken, only Cohen and Henrici voted in favor of the motion and it was defeated 4 to 2. A very disappointed group of policemen and their supporters left the meeting.
