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New Niles postoffice in spring?

Construction of the Niles post-office planned for the Lawrencewood Shopping Center, Waukegan and Oakton, may begin within the next 30 days, said Trustee Ang. Marcheschi at the Tuesday night village board meeting, "with new postal facilities for next spring."

According to the latest news from Eugene Gailard, general manager of the real estate dept. of the U.S. Postal Service, said Marcheschi, "the lowest bidder on the postal facility is being checked out on qualifications."

Bids had been let on the one-story postal branch last January. Marcheschi, who has been pushing for the new postal facility since 1969 opined that it would take a year to complete the facility, once construction begins.

Inadequate parking and the cramped conditions at the present postoffice located at 7727 Milwaukee Ave. resulted in plans for a larger postal branch in the Lawrencewood site. The exact location remains to be announced. The new building is expected to service Niles' current population for the next 20 years and will have ample room for parking.

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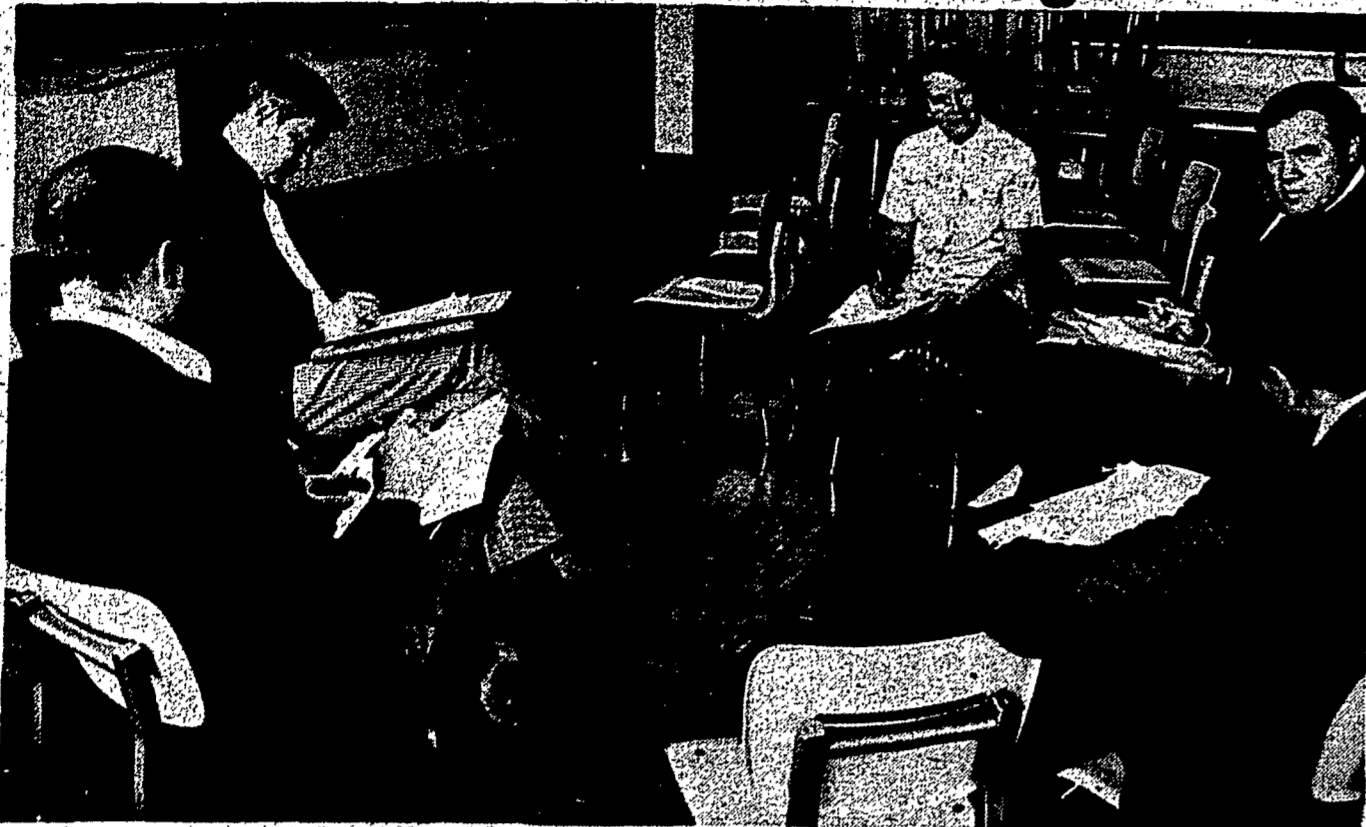

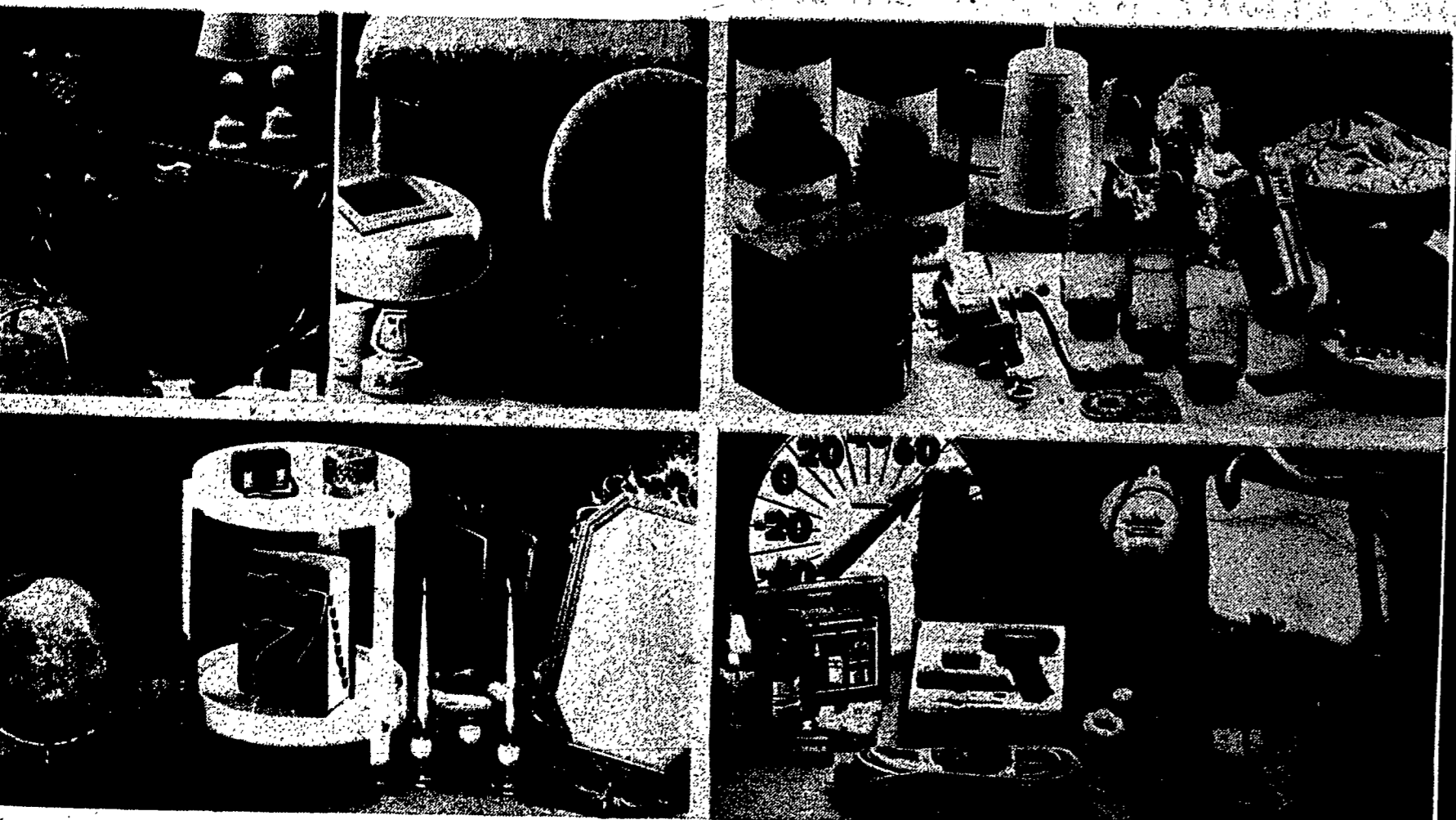

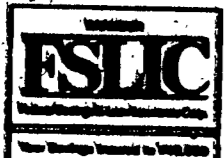

Public aid for May

The number of persons who received public aid from Maine Township during May dropped 38 per cent from April, marking the second consecutive month of decline, Maine Township Supervisor James J. Dowd announced today.

Dowd said 210 persons were granted general assistance in May, down from 290 in April, and almost half the record 417 for March this year.

Dowd pointed out, however, that the number was 35 per cent higher than May of last year and 108 per cent greater than the comparable month two years ago.

He added that the caseload also showed a downward trend, dropping from a high of 176 in February of this year to 169 in March, 149 in April, and 122 in May.

Dowd concluded by saying that he interprets the figures as indicating that the current recession has indeed "bottomed out," and that preliminary June data indicates a continuing reduction in requests for township general assistance.

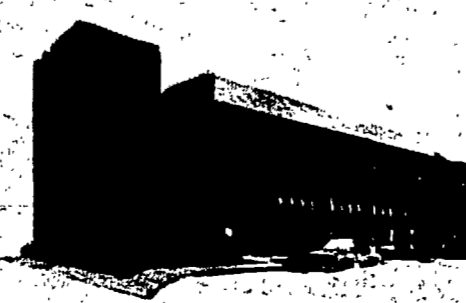

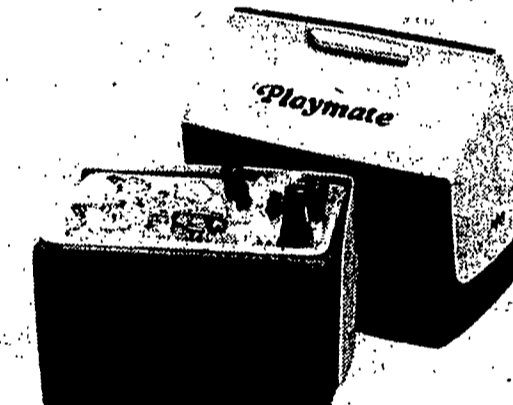

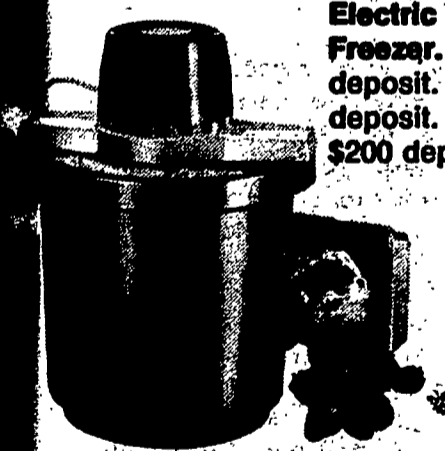

really want to, but what we are seeking are parish organizations. We need different groups, guilds and clubs to find apartments for these people, help furnish the apartment with used items and then sort of be a friend and help the family learn and adjust to the community. We're hoping the group would furnish the first month's rent and then the family should be on their own."

The success of the program, according to Ms. Dorman, depends on the response from parishes and volunteers. The Director of the Orientation Center in Niles, Patrick Marshall, said, "Volunteers have brought clothing and toys, more volunteers have taken people downtown for tours of the city, some volunteers have taught English and we have girls coming out in the morning playing with children."

Volunteer work done for the refugees by St. John Brebeuf parishoners has been "tremendous... overwhelming" according to Marshall. Confirming this Ms. Dorman said, "The youth group from St. John's, the Junior St. Vincent De Paul Society, is coming when they can and supervising play with children and trying to teach the children English. Saturday there was a big delivery of clothing and the junior group went around door to door to get bikes and they've brought about five bikes already." Ms. Dorman added St. John Brebeuf is providing emergency drivers to take refugees to the hospital when the need arises.

Catholic Charities had hoped the refugees would only stay at Niles College a few days before moving into an apartment. However, as Ms. Dorman has indicated, this is not the case.

"We're not getting them resettled as quickly as we would like. We only intended to keep them here a few days but the first group has been here a week. I think once the community becomes a little more aware and responds to the needs, this will be important. We'll have to work faster since we want to get the children into school. This is of great concern to these people that their children be able to go to school." Ms. Dorman added the children are quickly learning English from watching television; however, she doubts whether they will be placed in the same grade here as they would have at home.

Explaining why the refugees left South Vietnam, Marshall said they have "a real fear of the Communists." Ms. Dorman further explained, "A lot of them worked for the South Vietnamese government and they had priority to leave because they would have been in danger had they stayed. Some worked for the American armed forces over there or other United States government agencies so they would have been in serious jeopardy." The first group of refugees that arrived at Niles College included a mayor, an alderman, a high school principal, two lawyers, a mechanical engineer and other professional people.

Referring to the refugees in Niles, Ms. Dorman said, "From what I've seen here I'm amazed at how well they're adjusting. One of the men spoke to us representing all the families and he said they were so happy and appreciated everything everyone has done and described this as paradise."

For many of the people, it is the second time they have been refugees. In past years they fled from North Vietnam to South Vietnam and now they have come to the United States. "They are aware of the job situation here and are afraid of not being able to be independent since they want to be independent as fast as they can," explained Ms. Dorman. "I think they have fears of being separated from each other. When they're settled they want to be able to visit and be reasonably close to each other."

Once resettled in their own apartments and jobs, Catholic Charities "expects them to be on their own", according to Ms.

Dorman. "If they're in trouble or need help, we'll certainly be there to advise them since they will be entitled to the same services we give anybody else. We will do follow up on the refugees to make sure they're as happy as they can be under the circumstances."

is a Democratic committeeman and a top domo in Mayor Daley's political machine.

According to park commissioner Jack Leske, the most non-political guy (or gal) on the board, he said he hopes new lady president Millie Jones is not being pushed around. He implies Mesdame Jones may be receiving pressure from Blase and his friends to oust Berrafato.

Jack praises new lady president most highly when he says, "She's a most elegant commissioner. Last year she was the best commissioner on the park board and she deserved (being elected to) the presidency."

Leske said, "We're not married to the attorney", inferring the appointment of any post is not forever. Nevertheless, Jack said Berrafato has good rapport with the board, and gives Gabe high marks for not using \$10 words with \$5 people. He also noted Gabe has been successful in legal actions with neighboring park districts which certainly are pluses in favor of the present attorney. In case of one suit, which Leske single-handedly brought about, Niles Park District now receives from \$40,000 to \$65,000 annually as the result of having the eastern end of Niles industrial area disannexed from Skokie P.D. and annexed into Niles P.D. While this was a one-man effort by Leske, it was Berrafato who headed the legal effort which resulted in Niles receiving this annual dollar bonanza.

Leske said he favors selecting another attorney, who he believes is heir apparent to the state Illinois Association of Park Districts. Jack said whoever is chosen for the Niles park job should have as much park experience as possible.

While the unnamed candidate Leske favors has this experience, Berrafato and Troy can also qualify as having park experience. Troy's political background, plus his recently appointed job as Chicago's park attorney, would probably exclude him from Jack's list of preferred nominees.

While Leske and Keener are two very non-partisan guys on the park board, we've had good reports Steve Chameriski is also becoming more objective in his park votes and actions. And knowing Millie Jones, we're not convinced this lady is any political guy's patsy. Like Jack said, 'she's been a very elegant commissioner'. Those are very nice words. And we can add we've always found Millie to be a very elegant lady. And an elegant lady doesn't get pushed around by any cigar-chomping politicians.

Across Dempster Street in Morton Grove Ab Mikva's office reported Tuesday morning the Morton Grove Park District will receive a \$200,000 grant for outdoor recreation land. It will be used for the purchase of a park land acquisition at Dempster and Newcastle.

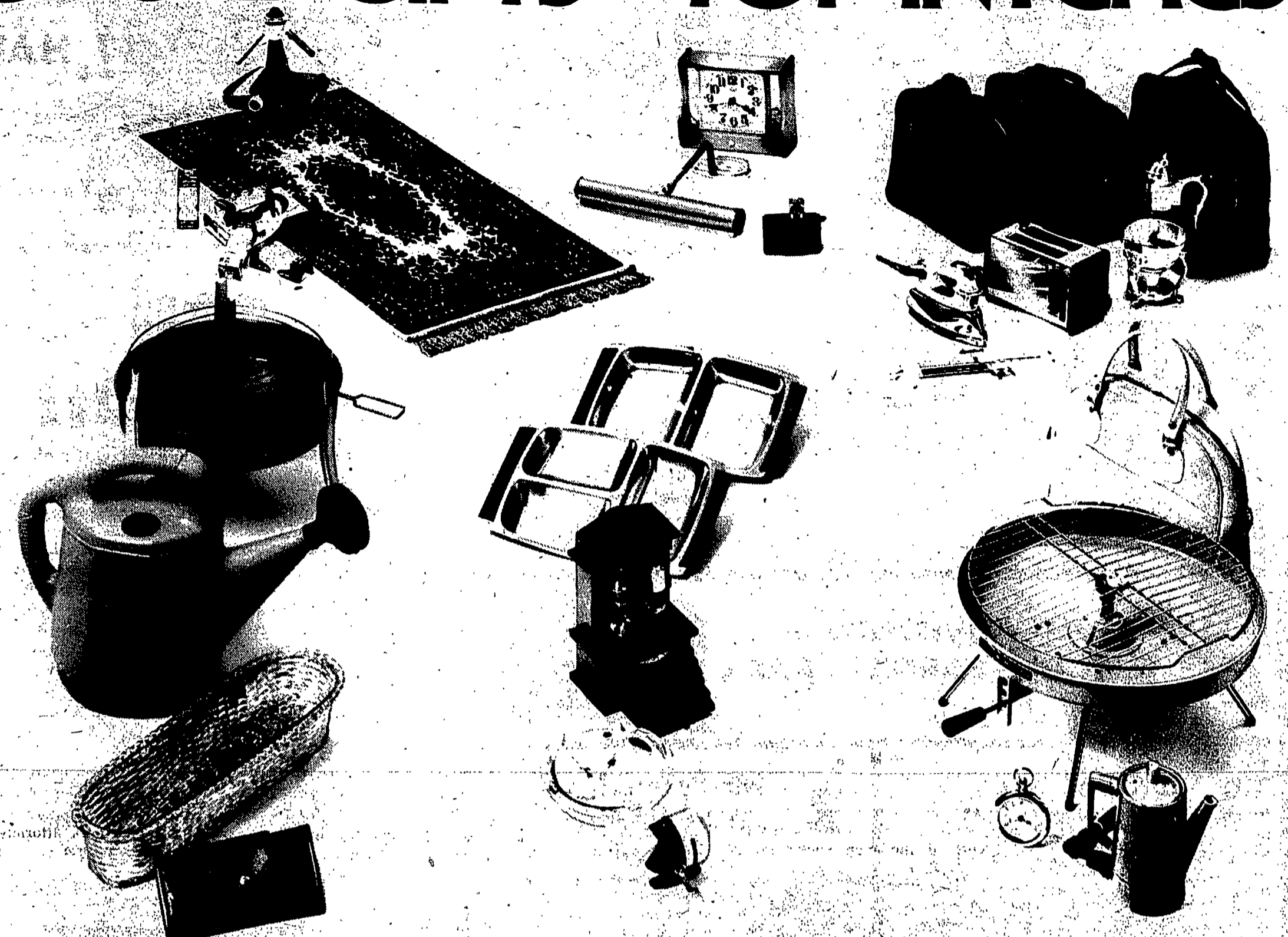

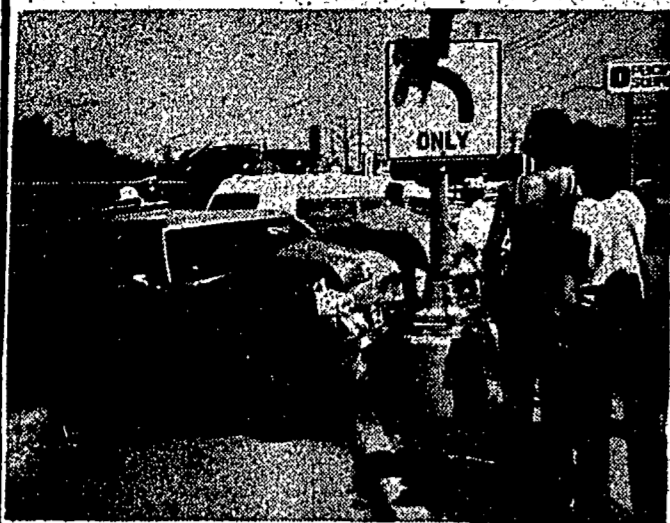

Police's previous method of writing down license numbers of cars parked in areas of high burglaries. "What the police cars are doing," said Glauner, "is video taping license numbers of cars and if they find a car with a license number that registers to a known burglar then we might know who is committing the burglaries."

The video taping program, thought of by Morton Grove Police Capt. Larry Chaey, has been used in the west Morton Grove area bordered by Washington and Oriole going east-west and Churchill and Beckwith going north-south. In this west end of Morton Grove, 41% of Morton Grove's burglaries have occurred, according to Glauner.

"When you're dealing with a crime of stealth," explained Glauner, "you don't know who you're dealing with. If we can come up with cars that don't belong in that area, then we're protecting the people of the village and this is my main concern as chief."

Referring to the epidemic of burglaries in west Morton Grove a few years ago, Glauner said, "I think we've got it under control from what it used to be in 1968 and 1969 when that area was hit pretty bad. It's a more affluent area than others in Morton Grove and this is why it's susceptible to burglaries."

Declaring that "we're trying everything we can to prevent burglaries", Glauner said that no burglaries have occurred when the Morton Grove Police Selective Enforcement Unit has been on duty. The Selective Enforcement Unit was instituted a number of years ago to add police reinforcements in those areas that have been heavily burglarized. Composed of "three or four policemen", the Selective Enforcement Unit members patrol in marked and unmarked vehicles. "This is extra manpower on the streets patrolling which keeps the police moving around," said Glauner. "Citizens know we're out there and I think they appreciate it."

Calling its members "dedicated", Glauner described the Selective Enforcement Unit as "all police officers - not a select few". "In summertime policemen put in eight hours," explained Glauner, "and then you ask them to come back and, even though it's overtime, they're still coming back to work four hours extra."

Regarding the frequency of Morton Grove burglaries, Glauner said, "We know the times they're happening, we know the days they're happening and this is the time we have the extra manpower on. However, Glauner contends, "The hardest thing to do is catch a burglar in the act. If someone doesn't call the police after seeing them approach a home, it's pretty difficult for us. A burglar dresses like you or me. He'll walk right down the street into someone's back yard and if the neighbors don't pay any attention, it makes it more difficult for the police department."

According to Glauner, most burglaries occur between 5:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. Also the months of June, July and August have the most burglaries. To try to prevent your house from being burglarized, Glauner recommends when you take a vacation, ask a neighbor to watch your house. Also when on vacation, use inexpensive timers to turn on and off lights. This is most effective when at least two timers in different parts of the house are used. Furthermore, make sure you have someone to pick up newspapers delivered to the house. If the vacation is going to be for an extended period, arrange for someone to mow the lawn so as not to identify your house as being vacant. Above all, make sure the house looks natural. If you don't normally pull down window shades, don't do it while away.

"The main thing," says Glauner, "is giving your home a lived-in look and having your neighbor watch your home. If they see anybody come up to the door, then walk away and if they're not able to call the police right away, have them write down the license number of the car or some kind of description. The more the people help us, the faster we'll be able to stop burglaries and make apprehensions."

Continued from MG P.1 duty, thus effectively adding four policemen.

The final police department figure of \$980,950 is 16% more than the department spent last year.

According to Police Chief Norman Glauner, "a reduction of more than 4% will result in discontinuing some nonemergency services and a delay in implementing planned programs and activities."

To effect a 25% cut, the police department, among other things, would have had to eliminate the six additional patrolmen it had requested, discontinue public relations activities, increase response time for nonemergency calls, and eliminate other services, Glauner said.

The fire department cut 7 1/4% from its original request of \$691,000. The 1975-76 budget will be 15% higher than the amount spent last year.

A conservative estimate indicates that anticipated revenue for 1975-76 is about \$93,000 short of 1974-1975 revenue. Expected decreases in income from court fines, liquor licenses, retail occupational tax, and Illinois income tax account for most of the drop.

A property tax increase can be expected next year, according to board members. However, before a final decision on a tax increase can be made, the board must approve its tax levy and await Morton Grove's total assessed valuation from the Cook County assessor's office.

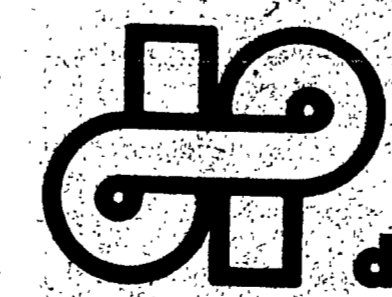

ND's Tim Glass 2nd in U.S. Nationals; 8th in Olympic Trials

The U.S. National Fencing Championships were held in Los Angeles from June 22-29th at the International Hotel. NDHS and UND fencers entered 4 of the events.

In the U-19 Sabre event, NDHS senior, Kevin Cawley took 5th place to earn the automatic status to the US Junior Olympics in Detroit in February and the US Nationals in Philadelphia in '76. The results were:

- Brad Thomas (Los Angeles Ath. Club), 2. Mike Sullivan (Boston), 3. Pat Caux (Texas), 4. Steve Renshaw, (N.J.), 5. KEVIN CAWLEY (NDHS), 6. Rich Weil (N.J.). This was the first time the Eastern strength was reduced to less than half.

In the U-19 Foil championships, there was a finals of 9. The finalists were:

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the USA entering the 1975 Nationals. In the first round, Glass was seeded 1st but with a 3-2 record, would up 6th seed in the second round. In this round Glass won 4 of 5 to be 1st seed into the 3rd round. In this round, Glass was 2-3 but advanced to the next round of 24—the Quarter finals. In the Quarter finals, Glass was seeded 6th again with Scot Bozek and Paul Pesty in the pool (both Olympians). Tim Glass defeated all except Bozek to go 4-1 and first into the semi-finals. The 4 rounds were fenced in one day, the other two on the next day from 5-11 p.m. In the Semi's, Glass faced Bozek again and had him 4-0 before losing 5-4. Tim's 3-2 record was sufficient to make the finals, his first US National adult finals, and the only teen-ager to do so in recent times. The finalists were: 1. Scot Bozek (after fence-off), 2. TIM GLASS (NDHS-UND), 3. Steve Netburn, 4. Bill Reith, 5. Paul Pesty, 6. Orban Greenwald.

Glass was 2-0 until he fenced Bozek, who he had not beaten in 4 tries. He lost and was 2-1. Bozek lost to Netburn. At this point both Bozek and Glass went on to be 4-1, the critical bout being Bozek-Pesty. If Pesty defeats Bozek, Glass is National champion, but Bozek won 5-2, forcing the fence-off. Bozek and Glass faced each other 5 times in 6 rounds. Bozek won giving him his second national championship. Tim Glass' finish put him 8th overall in the Olympic tryouts and a chance this coming year to make the Olympic team. The Pan-Am team was chosen

and Glass is the 3rd alternate which is not a likely team position.

All-in-all Tim Glass and Pat Gerard have had a very successful year. Glass took a 1st at the J.O.'s, and Gauntlet, 2nd at US National Championships, 3rd in the WORLD Championships, and 4th in the US NCAA Championships to make All American and also go from 18th to 8th in the US National Olympic Standings.

Pat Gerard was 1st in the Gauntlet, 2nd at the J.O.'s, 4th at the US Nationals, in U-20 level, USA team to Mexico City with Glass and went over 250 wins this season in foil, 4th in the Great Lakes Championships and is now 4th in US in U-20 foil and about 30th in US in adult foil.

The future looks good for Notre Dame alumni, Mike Gerard, Pat's brother and 1975 grad from NDHS will be on the Illini team in the fall along with sophomore Ken Lavelle, so that the ND-III meet will be a meet of NDHS alumni.

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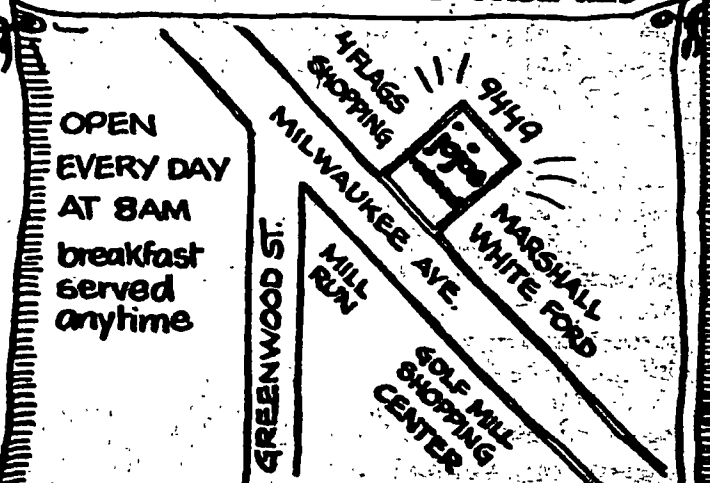
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"Yankee Doodle Dandy" to ring out
