Fromthe left land

It was Russ Beavers, Niles Police Chief Whitey Emrikson's right-hand man who was talking: "Niles insistence policemen nust live within the community is certainly a reason the Niles police department doesn't have the same problems Skokie

Beavers made a telling point when he said Niles policemen have a 24 hour concern for their community, not just an 8 hour on-the-job interest. Noting while the police department is a para-military organization he said, "In Niles we're forced to be friends". Russ pointed out, "When a cop has a problem in Viles he comes over to the house for a chit chat". He noted living within the city limits results in many neighbors being members of the police force which lends an entirely different relationship among the men within the department.

Russ also pointed to the people who run the village, the trustees. He said Niles has good people on the top which results in men in the public services being satisfied with their

In Skokie, Russ said many of the staff people in the police department live outside the village. "You care what's going on" which Russ implies makes the big difference between Niles and neighboring communities.

Beavers explained Niles salary structure in relation to its eighbors is roughly "in the middle of the pile". He said salary schedules are closely akin the surrounding communities. While painting a generally rosy picture of the Niles police department, Russ did say working conditions have fallen behind the times. He noted Niles facilities were once among the best in the northwest area but he hoped future conditions would improve.

Noting the expected disciplinary actions in Skokie, Russ said he believed a lot of "nice guys" in the Skokie department Continued on Page 30

The Niles Park District Board of Commissioners Tuesday night approved a 1975-76 annual total budget of \$2,347,052, down from last year's budget of \$4,826,050. Reason for the decrease in this year's budget is due to the fact that most of the monies from the '73 Referendum (included in last year's budgets) were spent.

The total \$2,347,052 budget includes an operational budget of \$1.662.052. the remaining amount of \$550,000 of the 1973 Referendum money and the anticipated \$135,000 grant money (reimbursement on the 1974 Jonquil Terrace purchase).

Legislature **approves funds** for Oakton

The state legislature approved \$10 million for construction of the permanent campus for Oakton Community College during its final rush of business this week, college officials learned today.

The funds, included in H.B. 0289, which included most of the school construction funds for Illinois, will not be subject to an eight percent across the board freeze in appropriations by Governor Walker.

The \$10 million will be financed by the state through capital development bonds and will not come out of general revenue. The impoundment of six to eight percent which has been proposed would apply only to operational budgets, not capital funds, it was College officials were opti-

mistic that Governor Walker will sign the funding legislation withut amendment. Construction on the new cam-

pus for Oakton Community College will begin in the fall. The campus will be located on the east bank of the Des Plaines River between Golf and Central Roads in Des Plaines. The college has been operating in interim facilities, former Morton Grove industrial buildings for the past five years.

the plan future flood damages in the North Branch of the Chicago River basin will average \$2.9 million a year. With the plan, damages will be reduced an estimated 87% to \$380.000."

floodwater retarding structures. • modification of the Willow Road Dam to improve flood control. · contingent upon future needs. construction of a pumping plant and pipe line from Lake Michigan into the Skokie Lagoons and Skokie River.

"There is no doubt about the need for a floodwater management plan," Mikva stressed. "Currently, more than a thousand homes are threatened each year with flood damage, highways and local roads are swamped and soil erosion is polluting streams, clogging storm sewers and filling the Skokie Lagoons.'

The Congressman noted that if the North Branch Floodwater Management Plan is implemented, it will also provide increased recreation areas and watershed protection and environmental enancement for 65.300 acres in Cook and Lake Counties.

The parts of the plan that would be under the control of local governments are floodplain management, zoning regulations, channel operation and maintenance, flood proofing and land
