Why does 'non-profit' Lutheran General have highest room rates?

[By Bob Decker]
Is Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge, which has the highest room rates among area hospitals, hiding behind its non-profit status? Allegations have been made to THE BUGLE by a Lutheran General upper echelon employee that the hospital has been making a profit of \$1 million annually. "The hospital is very well run

from a financial point of view making a large profit each year, averaging more than \$1 million annually for the past few years," commented the employee. As a "non-profit" hospital, Lutheran General is prohibited from making an annual profit. Profits can be hidden by lease arrangements of land and buildings and by paying excessive administrative salaries. Because

IN THE BACKGROUND IN BUGLELAND
of this designation Lutheran General pays no income tax and as a non-profit organization its donors may use donations as tax

deductions. Furthermore, because Lutheran General Hospital is under the auspices of the American Lutheran Church it is not required to file Internal Revenue Service Form 990 listing such information as the hospital's annual intake and surplus of money and its assets. In addition, Lutheran General is the only hospital of the five area hospitals not to publish an annual

budgetary report. Commenting on this Rev. James Wiley, Lutheran General Hospital Vice President for Human Relations and Resources, said, "It isn't as though it (the budget) isn't available. Whatever information the people might be interested in that is public knowledge ... is available." However, when inquiring into

Career education at Apollo

This year Apollo students, East Maine School District 63, have had an opportunity to explore careers that they may someday wish to make their life's work.

Career education is often not given much attention at the junior high level in our country's public schools. But, this is not the case at Apollo. Tom Manion, Guidance Counselor, has seen to that. Of course, he has not been alone in his efforts to develop a good career education program. Bette Krebs, librarian, as well as classroom teachers and the District's Volunteer Bureau, have given him a great deal of assistance.

The program has many interesting features. A career center has been set up in the library. Students can go there to look at literature and AV materials that describe occupations in which they may have an interest. 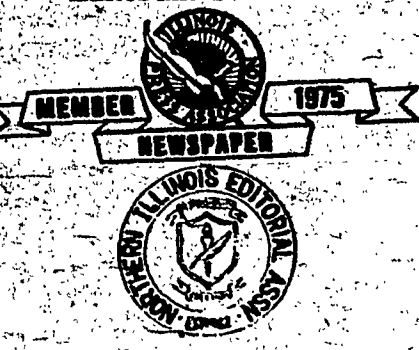

Oakton to lose \$300,000 in state aid

Oakton Community College will lose over \$300,000 in state funds this next year from state budget cuts made by Governor Dan Walker, according to David Hilquist, vice president for business and finance.

Governor Walker has cut the proposed community college budget for the state from \$102.4 million to \$93.3 million.

Community colleges in Illinois will continue to receive \$19.20 per approved semester hour, the same funding formula as for fiscal year 1975.

However, the Illinois Board of Higher Education had recommended a rate of \$21.70 per semester hour. As a result, Oakton will receive \$200,000 less in state funding for 1975-76.

The supplemental appropriations bill for community colleges which Governor Walker signed on July 15 provided \$10.2 million for 1975 fiscal year. A compromise, it was less than the \$16 million requested by community colleges to cover unexpectedly high enrollments throughout the state in the spring 1975 semester. This compromise will cost Oakton about \$100,000 in FY75, fiscal year just closed.

Oakton to lose
\$300,000 in
state aid

Oakton Community College will lose over \$300,000 in state funds this next year from state budget cuts made by Governor Dan Walker, according to David Hilquist, vice president for business and finance.

Governor Walker has cut the proposed community college budget for the state from \$102.4 million to \$93.3 million.

Community colleges in Illinois will continue to receive \$19.20 per approved semester hour, the same funding formula as for fiscal year 1975.

However, the Illinois Board of Higher Education had recommended a rate of \$21.70 per semester hour. As a result, Oakton will receive \$200,000 less in state funding for 1975-76.

The supplemental appropriations bill for community colleges which Governor Walker signed on July 15 provided \$10.2 million for 1975 fiscal year. A compromise, it was less than the \$16 million requested by community colleges to cover unexpectedly high enrollments throughout the state in the spring 1975 semester. This compromise will cost Oakton about \$100,000 in FY75, fiscal year just closed.

Training in electronics servicing

Electronics Servicing, a certificate program offered for the first time this fall by Oakton Community College, will teach the practical workings of most major electronic appliances and the procedures for repairing them.

Students will acquire the skills and techniques for repairing and servicing such entertainment equipment as televisions, stereos, radios, and tape decks, according to Thomas Witte, acting coordinator of the program.

He said the purpose of the program is to provide an individual with the background neces-

sary to obtain a position in the service industry or to open one's own repair shop. The student will also learn to operate test equipment related to servicing, to diagnose problems, and to repair them.

The program, open to both full and part-time students, offers an excellent opportunity for those already in the electronics servicing field to update their skills.

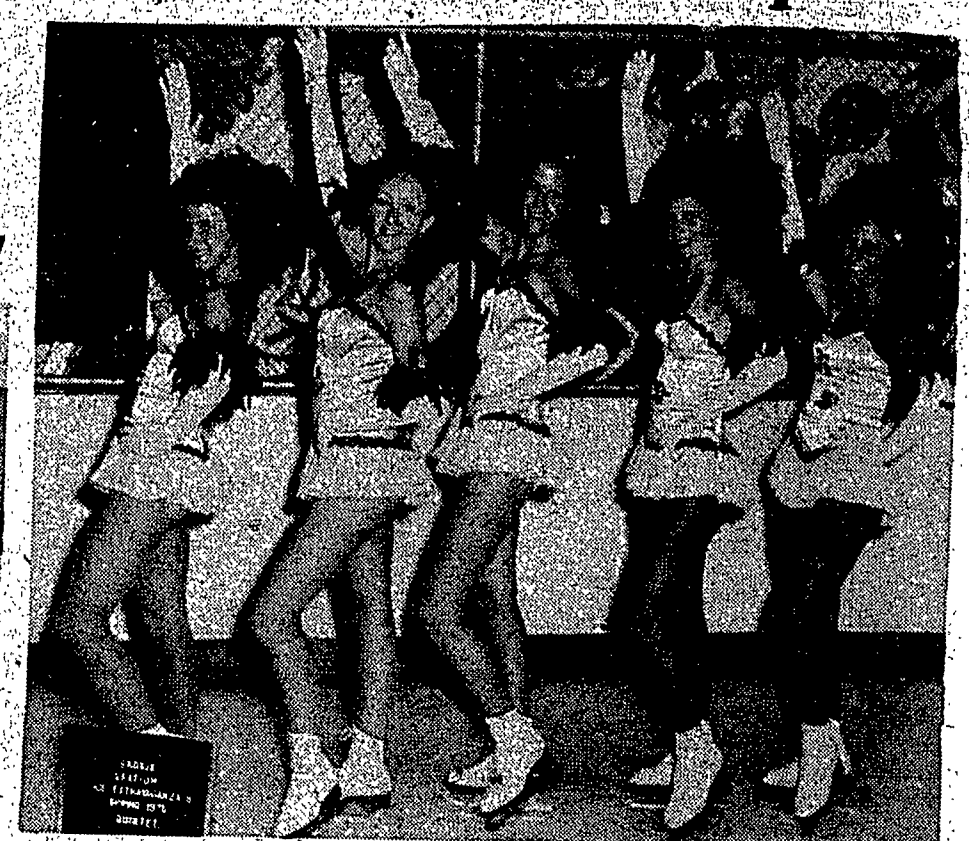

A gift of life from the tragedy of death

Chicago, Ill. (July 23) - A small styrofoam container lies on a corner table of the doctor's surgical lounge at Chicago's Resurrection Hospital. Nearby, eight-year-old David has expired - a drowning victim. But part of that child will live on, for in the container are the boy's eyes, donated by understanding parents so that someone else might see.

Moments later a green-clad Organ Preservation Specialist brings another, larger container into the room. In this container are the boy's kidneys. They will be rushed to Loyola University's Medical Center to be stored briefly in anticipation of transplanting them so that another's life may be saved. Life from death.

It all happened so swiftly. The kidneys and eyes might be used to help someone else. David's parents agreed. While David was still lying in Resurrection Hospital's Intensive Care Unit, a

transplant coordinator was contacted and told that this child was a "perfect donor."

All was now made ready. A four-member organ transplant team arrived from Loyola University. There are five such teams in Chicago: Northwestern University, University of Illinois Medical Center, Children's Memorial Hospital, the University of Chicago and Loyola.

The team from Loyola worked skillfully and swiftly. David's kidneys and eyes were removed one hour after death. Time is of importance, the kidneys must be rushed to a preservation unit at Loyola where a heart-lung apparatus can keep them functioning 50 to 72 hours. Tissue tests must be run and the most suitable potential recipients must be checked for compatibility of tissue and blood type.

And the eyes, they must be transported to University of Illinois Medical Center where they can be preserved for 30 to 36 hours before they, too, must find

a recipient. There is a waiting list, approximately 80 persons waiting for cornea transplants.

So many persons waiting for help. The Anatomical Gift Act of 1969 allows persons to request donating their organs for transplant before they die. Filling out a donor card and carrying it assures that someone may receive a gift of life from the tragedy of death. But too few people use the law, too few even know about it.

That is why this bearded young man sits in the surgical lounge at Resurrection Hospital. He is a transplant coordinator, a liaison between grieving relatives, the hospital and transplant teams. It is his job to make all necessary arrangements. And he must move swiftly.

The transplant coordinator must know all the legal ground work, he must keep medical staffs aware of the opportunities for transplants. He must discuss it with donor families.

And it all happened so quickly. From the time David was brought to the hospital's emergency room on a hot summer's afternoon until the organ transplant team relaxed in the doctor's surgical lounge accompanied by David's eyes and kidneys, less than two days had passed. And one cannot help but be moved by the wonder of it all. And the gift of life from death.

Public Aid applicants increase

Two local work stoppages have increased the number of persons applying for township assistance and reversed a three-month decline in applications, Township Supervisor James J. Dowd announced today.

Dowd said more than 40 persons, either employees of Central Telephone Co., or auto mechanics, have requested township aid thus far in July. Preliminary information for June had shown the third consecutive month of decline since the high of March this year.

Dowd said that under the law, certain striking workers are eligible for township assistance, but that they must meet several restrictive conditions regarding their assets to be eligible. He added that certain persons have been meeting the prerequisites, including a number of single, senior operators who make up a large segment who those qualifying.

Dowd stated that the Centel workers became eligible on July 1st, but can and will be referred to the Illinois Department of

Public Aid on August 1st if the work stoppage continues.

One Maine Township social worker said the influx of applicants appeared to be the result of the communications workers union informing its members about the procedures for obtaining aid and food stamps. She said she had been so informed by one of the applicants for aid.

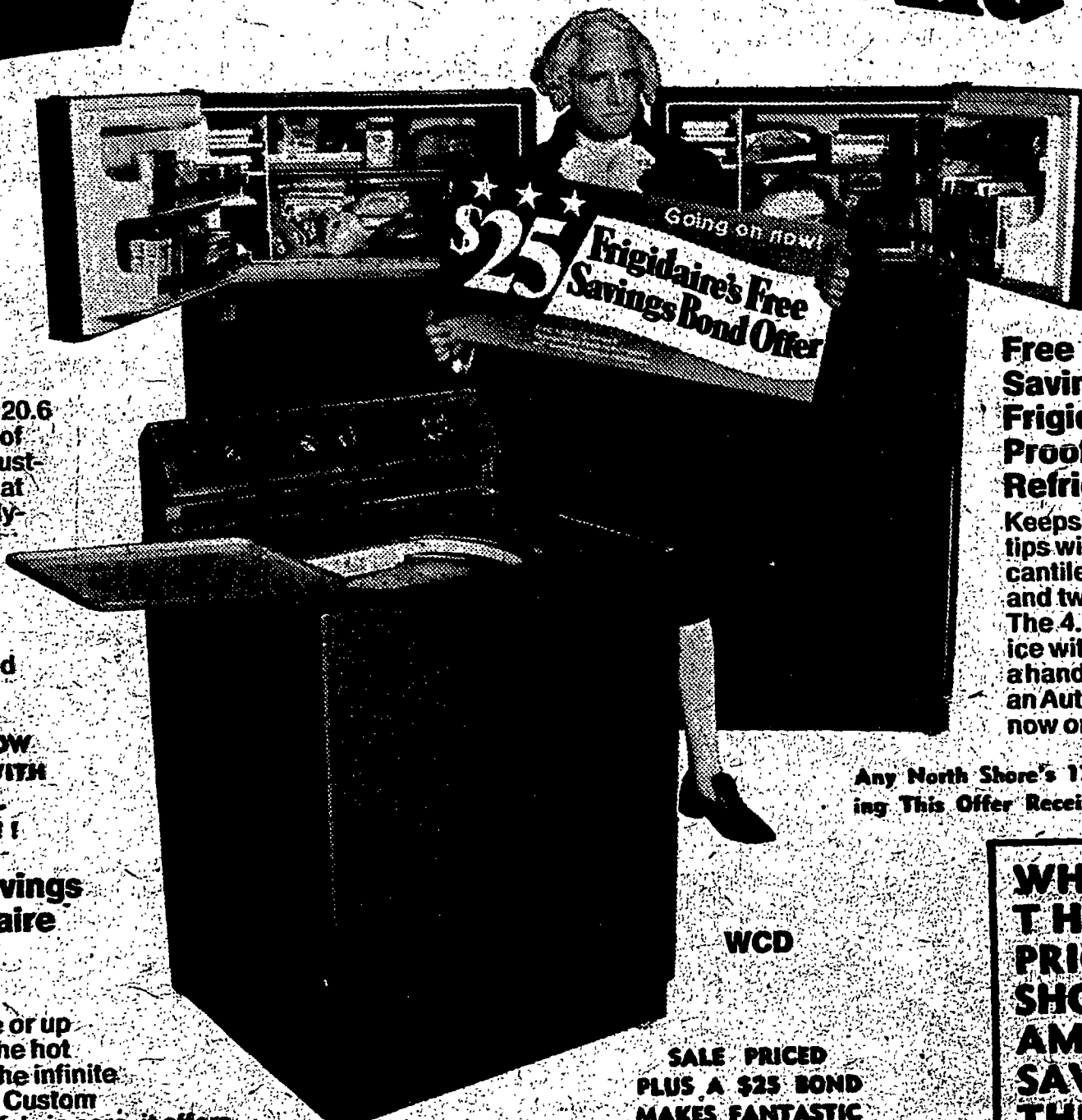

Mikva wants more utilization of nurses

The nation's health care delivery system would be more efficient and less costly if highly trained licensed nurses are allowed to provide services for Medicare and Medicaid patients, according to Cong. Abner J. Mikva.

Mikva, a member of the Ways and Means Committee which has jurisdiction over health legislation, is co-sponsoring a bill that would permit direct payment to licensed nurses under Medicare and Medicaid. Under present law, nurses may provide services but only physicians can be reimbursed. This prevents nurses from treating Medicare and Medicaid patients except with the direct supervision of a physician.

"This costly and unneeded provision should be eliminated because of licensed and registered nurses receive a vast amount of training that qualifies them to perform many services without a doctor's direct supervision," Mikva said. "All this provision results in is the underutilization of highly skilled health professionals and the overutilization of doctors."

Mikva noted that by allowing nurses to participate more fully in the delivery of home health care and prevention services, the legislation would help give the American people the more personal health care they desperately need.

"Recognition of the skills and training of registered nurses would be an important result as well," he concluded. "Nurses are highly trained professionals who are anxious to help our country make the transition to a more sound and comprehensive health care system."

Oakton to lease 6th building on Morton Grove campus

Oakton Community College will lease a sixth building on the interim campus site at Oakton and Nagle in Morton Grove for occupancy during the fall term.

The Board of Trustees authorized the college administration to complete the two-year leasing agreement for Building 5 at its business meeting on Tuesday night, August 22.

This building will provide the college with an additional 22,000 sq. ft. of classroom, laboratory, and office space.

"The college is in desperate need of more space to meet anticipated enrollment of the fall semester," David Hilquist, vice

president for business and finance, pointed out.

"Oakton began seeking additional temporary classroom and office space last winter for the coming year. Local school districts had informed us that they had nothing available now. The college is fortunate that unexpected circumstances made the one remaining building on our interim site available for immediate occupancy," he said.

Hilquist noted that Oakton will attempt to negotiate three one-year options to renew the lease after June 30, 1977. The lease will become effective on September 1, 1975, although the college will be

able to have 4,000 sq. ft. on August 15. Oakton will take over another 4,000 sq. ft. in September and the balance of 14,000 sq. ft. on December 1.

Cost of lease for the total building will be \$3,333.33 per month plus taxes and expenses. Lease payments for the first year of the lease will be pro-rated according to take-over space, he said.

Hilquist also said that cost of the space over the two-year period will be about \$1.82 per square foot per year.

Site development will begin on the permanent Oakton Community College campus in Des

Plaines this fall and construction of Phase I is anticipated to start in spring 1976. It is expected that the first phase will be completed for the fall 1978 term.

Major Maiden added that "Each recruiter was selected for the special course and recruiting duty as a volunteer with an outstanding Air Force record."

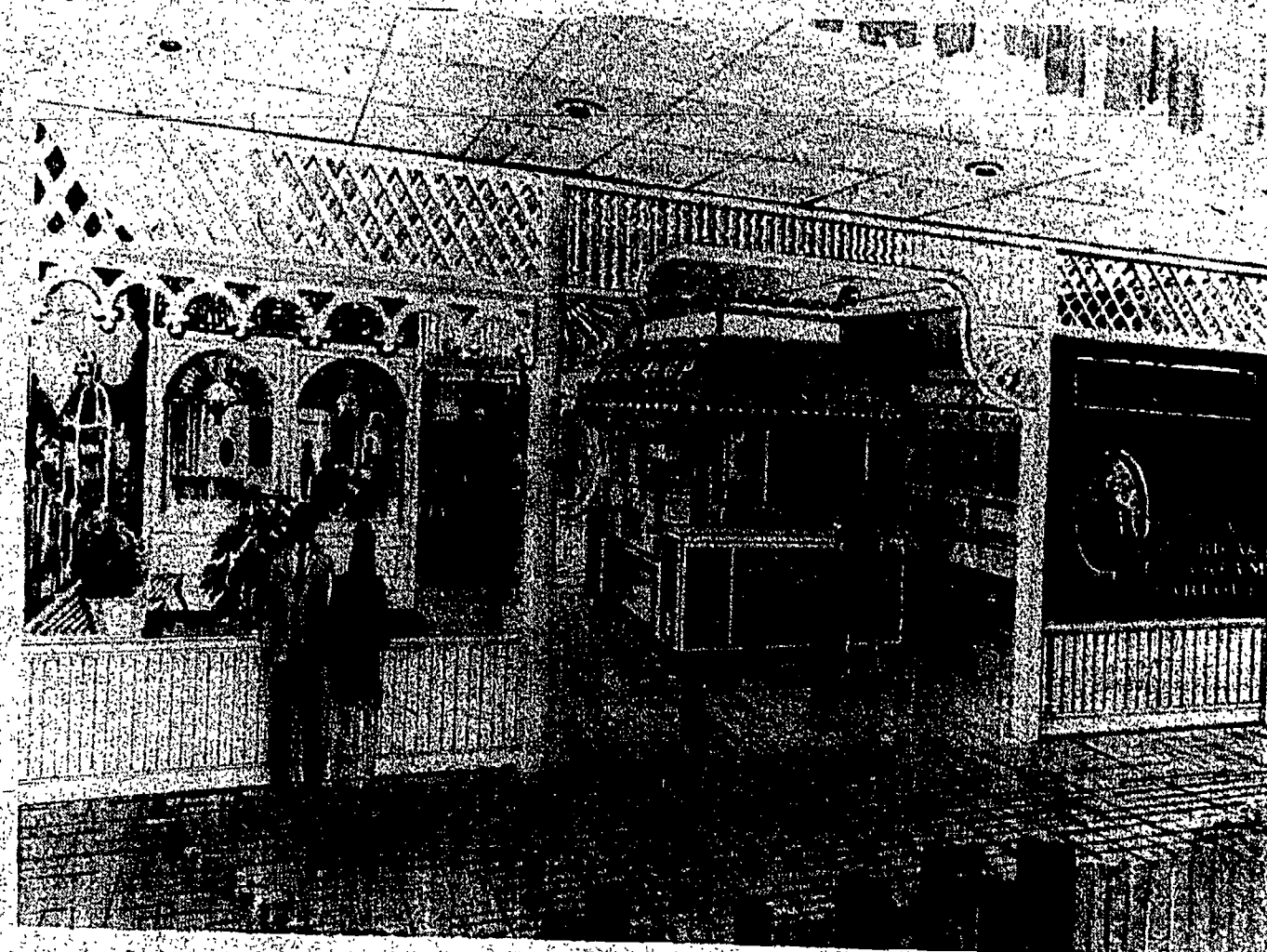
\$800 in damage to Cock Robin

Village begins roadway repairs

Niles residents may expect more moving inconvenience with the advent of the village 1975 roadway resurfacing program Monday, July 28.

Most of the work planned will be in the midwest portion of Niles. The entire project will take about 3 months to complete, with the most inconvenience occurring on Cumberland ave.

Joseph LoVerde, president of LoVerde Construction Co. in Niles was awarded the \$640,000 work contract as lowest of 5 bidders on the project.

LoVerde told village trustees at a preliminary board meeting Tuesday night, July 22, that he is "hoping for dry weather". His men will work 6 days a week beginning July 28 to complete the road repairs, said LoVerde, and they "will clean up" as each section of road is completed, "weather permitting".

Residents of each section of the roadway resurfacing program will be notified before work begins, according to Keith Peck, director of Public Service.

Cost of the resurfacing will come out of motor fuel tax funds. Resurfacing of Seward st., Nora ave., and Oakton ct. is planned to begin July 28 and be completed Aug. 4.

Church st. (south of Golf Mill Shopping Center) from Cumberland to Greenwood is scheduled for tree cutting, installation of

curbs and resurfacing beginning July 28 and finished Aug. 4.

Oleander ave. from Jonquil Terr. to Mulford (south of Candlelight Court) is scheduled for resurfacing beginning Aug. 4 and completed Aug. 11.

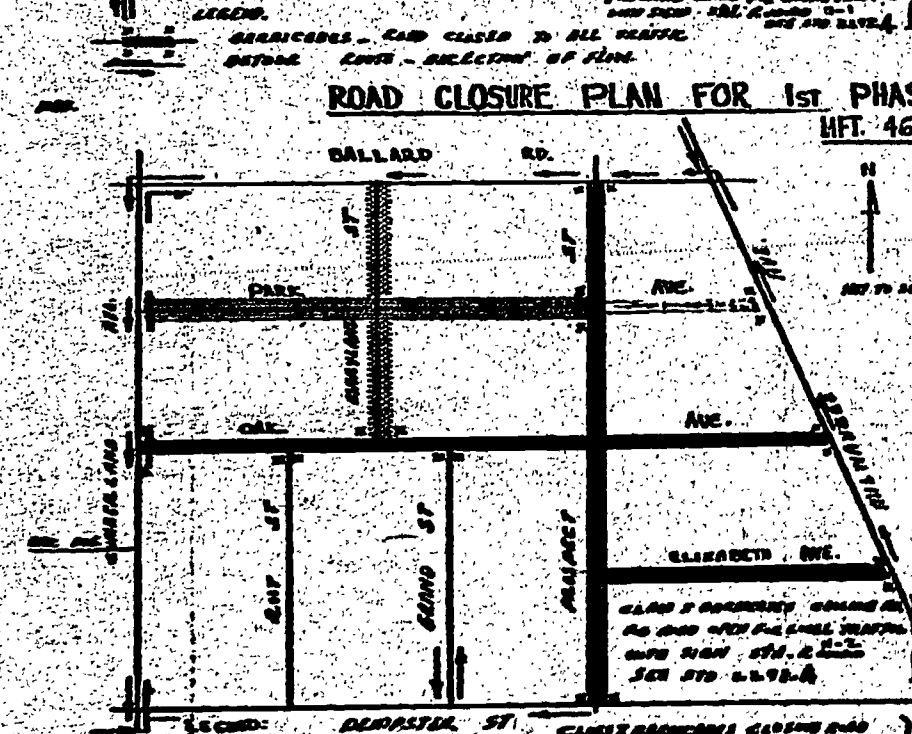
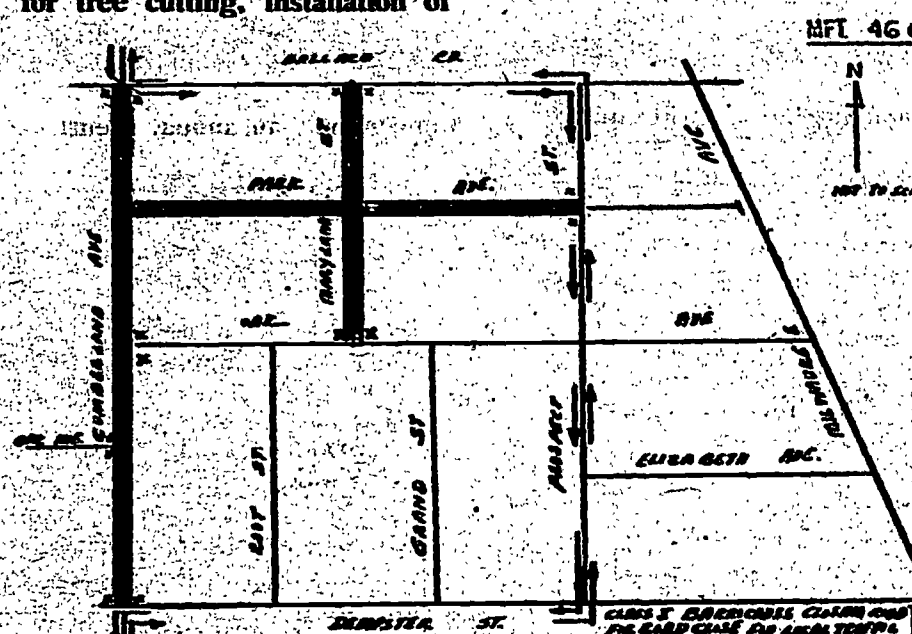
Carol ave., Grace st. and Crain st. are planned for excavation and installation of curbs beginning Aug. 4 and completed Aug. 15.

Phase 1 on Cumberland will begin Aug. 4 for excavation, curbing and resurfacing, completed Sept. 10. Cumberland ave. will be closed to traffic from Ballard rd. south to Dempster.

Traffic going north on Cumberland will be detoured east on Dempster to Prospect st. north to Ballard rd. and west to Cumberland ave., to continue north. Maryland st. (from Ballard rd. south to Oak ave.) and Park ave. (from Prospect to Cumberland) will be closed to all traffic.

Phase 2 on Cumberland will be started Sept. 1 for excavation, curbing and blacktopping and completed on Oct. 10. Traffic will resume on Cumberland ave., but Oak ave. will be closed to traffic from Cumberland to Milwaukee and Prospect st. closed from Dempster to Ballard rd. Elizabeth ave. will also be closed from Prospect to Milwaukee ave.

A general cleanup of seeding and grading will be finished by October 30, according to LoVerde.

Tax Rebate Checks

Nearly seventy-eight million American taxpayers, entitled to rebates this year from Uncle Sam, will get those rebates in one of three ways.

Other than receiving a single check in the mail, the Internal Revenue Service has devised two other ways that individual taxpayers will "receive" their 1974 tax rebates.

According to H & R Block, The Income Tax People, the first and simplest method being used by the IRS is the mailing of a single check to early-filing taxpayers, clearly marked "TAX REBATE".

The second way in which the IRS is handling rebates is to include the amount on tax refund checks yet to be processed. In other words, if you are still to receive a refund on your 1974 income tax, then the amount of your rebate will be added to your refund and ONE CHECK issued.

Example: Say you have coming a \$500 tax refund, plus a \$100 rebate. The IRS will issue one check in the amount of \$600. The check will be clearly marked "REF & REB." The amount of your rebate (\$100) will be shown at the bottom of the check. You can determine the amount of your refund by simply subtracting the rebate amount from the total amount (\$600) of the check.

The third way the IRS is

handling rebates is to withhold them for payment of taxes overdue. In other words, if you have filed but have not yet paid the balance due on your 1974 income taxes, the IRS will subtract the amount that you owe from your rebate.

Example: You owe Uncle Sam \$100 in taxes due. Your rebate figures out to be \$150. You will receive a check for \$50 (\$150 minus the \$100 you owe). The total amount of the rebate (\$150) will be shown separately on the bottom of the check.

Your rebate also may be applied against any back taxes due, going as far back as 1971, according to the IRS.

The Internal Revenue Service has begun mailing our 1974 tax rebate checks on a "first-in, first-out" basis. This means that early filers of 1974 income tax returns will get their rebates first.

The IRS reports that as of May 2, 81,255,000 returns have been filed, with 67.9% requesting refunds. While the majority of these refunds have already been paid, those remaining will be combined with the rebate into one check.

Obviously, say authorities at H & R Block, this may cause considerable confusion among taxpayers who expect their refunds in one check and their rebates in another.

Cook County Treasurer reports

The Cook County Treasurer's office earned a total amount of \$11,581,497.62 on its investments for the first seven months of the county's fiscal year. It was announced today by Cook County Treasurer Edward J. Rosewell. The county's fiscal year began December 1, 1974.

For the month of June, the Treasurer's office earned a total of \$991,699, Rosewell said.

The Treasurer said that the funds are invested in 83 banks at interest rates ranging up to 7 and a quarter per cent.

As of July 1, the Treasurer's office had invested a total of \$219,286,050.

"Every dollar held by this office for more than a day is invested at the highest legal rate of interest," Rosewell said. "This earned interest helps reduce the cost of government for all taxpayers."

During fiscal 1974 the Treasurer's office earned a record \$29,953,162 in interest on its investments.

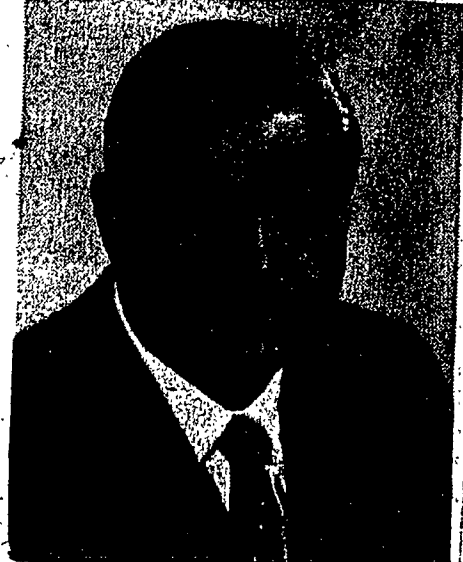

Funds for The Community Fund of Chicago, the Mid-America Chapter of the American Red Cross, and the Suburban Community Chest Council whose membership includes 88 community chests and united funds serving 152 Chicago area suburbs.

"While we have set \$42,500,000 as a minimum goal for this year's campaign, this is nowhere the amount needed," A. Dean Swift, general campaign chairman and president of Sears, Roebuck and Co., says. predicated on the outcome of a court suit regarding property parking rights.

Plaintiffs Annabel and Harold Kuempel, owners of the property east of the Cigo corner, initiated legal action claiming a verbal agreement with the previous owners for parking rights on the east 16 feet of the Cigo owned property. Cigo does not recognize the parking agreement made prior to purchase of the corner area, and has issued a "cease and desist" order to the Kuempels, prohibiting use of the Cigo property for parking.

A preliminary injunction under the 16 point suit issued Monday, July 21, to Niles, restrains the village from granting a Special Use for the Quik Mart pending court decision.

In a second action, a Special Use petition to expand and remodel Riggio's Restaurant at 7530 Oakton was denied by the Board for not meeting village requirements on parking.

Numerous efforts by owner Anthony Riggio to provide sufficient parking stalls for the projected increase in patronage has resulted in several continuances of the case from the original date of Nov. 27.

At the Wednesday night meeting Riggio told Zoning Commissioners that he had recently purchased the property east of the restaurant, now occupied by KingsGard. Cleaners. Altho KingsGard had another 2 years of lease, Riggio stated he intended to share parking with the Cleaners and was also under a share parking agreement with the owner of the adjacent U-Do-It store.

Commissioners declined to accept a share-parking agreement. Parking requirements must be met solely by the petitioner, they said.

receiving a copy of the Lutheran General budget THE BUGLE was told the hospital budget is "not a public document" and the request was denied. Furthermore, copies of Lutheran General Hospital's budget are not sent to the Chicago Hospital Council, Illinois Hospital Association or American Hospital Association as are budgetary reports from other local hospitals. Also, a request for Lutheran General Hospital's budget was turned down by the American Lutheran Church in Minneapolis.

While the worth of Lutheran General Hospital is unknown to the public it maintains the most expensive hospital room rates in the area. Lutheran General Hospital's daily rate for a semi-private room is \$118, which is \$19 higher than the next most ex-

pensive hospital in the area, Evanston Hospital. Its semi-private room rates are \$39 higher than Holy Family Hospital in Des Plaines which is the least expensive area hospital. Lutheran General also has the highest room rate for private rooms, charging \$125 daily which is \$5 higher than Evanston Hospital and \$41 more expensive than Holy Family. Of Lutheran General's 692 beds, 86 per cent are semi-private and less than one per cent are private.

Asked about these room rates, Wylie said, "No comment." However, Wylie did add, "The room rates do vary from hospital to hospital and the things that are included in room rates do vary." Regarding Lutheran General Hospital's higher room rates, Wylie said, "The statistics speak for themselves."

nounced? "I think it's been just about long enough." Telling reporters he was leaving partially because of his health Chief Hildebrand indicated he would be spending the winters in a warmer climate but continue to reside in Morton Grove during the rest of the year because, according to the chief, "This is my home and this is where my friends are at."

In other business Morton Grove resident Robert Hanrahan, representing himself and his neighbors of 8200 Austin ave., requested that the village require the developers of a track of land adjacent to Austin ave. to construct an opaque fence to maintain the residents' privacy. Acting Village President John Hilkin sent the matter to the Morton Grove Beautification Committee.

The Morton Grove Youth Commission recognized Morton Grove resident James Phipps as their Man of the Year. Complimenting Phipps for his "quiet, low key approach which has done a lot to help kids." Youth Commissioner Robert Hanrahan listed Phipps' past achievements which included 28 years as a Little League baseball coach. During this time Phipps had 11 conference championship teams going to the state finals six times. Trustee Ronald Henrietti also commended Phipps who was Henrietti's coach from 1954-1959.

Serious crime increased significantly in Morton Grove during the first six months of this year, according to Trustee David Cohen, who heads the Fire and Police Committee. The Police Department reported an 11.9 per cent increase in all serious crimes in the first six months of this year, said Cohen, which is lower than the national average, which saw an 18 per cent increase during this same period. Additionally Cohen announced a 21 per cent increase in traffic arrests in the first six months of this year.

Village Administrator Fred Huber told the village board that the \$50/50 tree program was continuing with the appointment of a nursery to begin planting trees. Under this plan the village will pay for half of the cost of a tree on the parkway in front of Morton Grove residences. The Berthold Nursery in Elk Grove Village was awarded the contract with a bid of \$4,800 which was \$450 cheaper than the next highest bidder.

Trustee Juanita Goldberg announced that her Air Pollution Committee has investigated Baxter Laboratories' sterilization program and declared it "well protected." Also, Goldberg said that her committee decided against pressing the village board for new anti-pollution ordinances since they would only repeat regulations already enforced by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. Furthermore, Goldberg said the village does not have the main power to enforce such ordinances. Goldberg announced that there will be a Board of Health meeting Aug. 5 at the Village Hall.

Trustee Ronald Henrietti, who heads the Transportation and Street Lights Committee, told the village board that negotiations are underway with the Forest Preserve District to construct a six to eight foot wide bicycle path on the north side of Beckwith rd. He also said his committee has contacted NORTTRAN to see about getting service at the Milwaukee Road rail station on Lehigh.

Trustee John Hilkin said the next Morton Grove blood drive will be Aug. 7 at the Julia Molloy school. Hilkin also reminded the

It wasn't too long ago Niles cops were telling us about the quota of tickets they had to write each month. Since nobody refuted the charge there's little doubt of its truth. But how do we point a finger, and then expect to get off like so many guys in town do, with one phone call? We told our accountant this cost is a legitimate deduction. But with today's economy, "who needs it?"

Several months ago we wrote about the federal indictment of Floyd Fulle, who heads the Maine Township Republican Party. Floyd is scheduled to defend himself against charges he received payoffs for zoning changes. Now comes a similar indictment of Ed Scholl, a former state Senator, who previously was alderman alongside Niles' in Norwood Park-Edison Park.

When we first published the Bugle Ed used to drop over at our house. At the time he was the 21 year old editor of the Norwood Park Review newspaper. He was a young man with a great deal of ambition. During his teen years he had written a history of Edison Park which was his initial thrust into the public light. He married a local Niles girl, a young lady named Wright, who lived in a house near the present Amy Joy location at Milwaukee and Waukegan. During those early years Ed was very aggressive and was destined to move up and on. The Review newspapers are owned by the Fulle family in Des Plaines. The publisher then was Fred Fulle, who was a County Commissioner. His son, Floyd, eventually inherited the father's political posts.

Ed Scholl, being the editor of the Fulle Edison Park paper eventually came under the political wing of Fred Fulle, who likely was responsible for Scholl's running for alderman on the Republican ticket.

During the first years of the Bugle, Ed manifested his ambition during many discussions we had. Twice we were a finalist in an editor-of-the-year contest in Illinois. When Ed read about it he telephoned and was very interested in finding out just how you become eligible for such recognition. He was very success-oriented and these conversations seemed to prove it.

He once wrote about his being followed by some shady characters during his newspaper days, and reported he had a bodyguard with him 7 days a week. Despite his rather bravado story, we were always somewhat disappointed in Ed, who we felt didn't stand tall when the chips were down during Niles gambling controversies.

When he arrived at Chicago's City Hall he made many headlines fighting the Daley machine. Still, remembering his weak efforts here, we were suspicious his headline hunting days proved there was more style than substance behind the man's actions. Subsequently, he moved up to Springfield, where he served 1 term in the state Senate, before being defeated in the '74 election, when Republicans took a bath because of the Watergate fiasco.

Ed is now alleged to have taken about \$6,000 in bribes concerning a zoning matter in his home area in the Edison Park-Norwood Park area.

Like Fulle an indictment does not mean he's guilty. Still, there's a mixture of sadness and irony in the 2 stories. Both men had everything going for them. It's quite likely Scholl would have been elected once more to the Senate in '76, just as it is likely Fulle had a lifetime job as a County Commissioner. Both men were handed their positions by being closely affiliated with Fulle, Senior. And both men led exemplary public and private lives. Since the final decisions are not yet, both men still have hopes of renewing their past years' activities. But if "guilty" charges are brought back against either man his public days are over. And while greed may seem the overriding reason for such actions, in Scholl's case his unrelenting ambition may have contributed to his present plight.

More and more, doctors are coming to realize as Dr. Podgers suggested, that many illnesses — perhaps even greater than 50% of the illnesses experienced — are greatly related to the "holding in of feelings" or "not receiving adequately the feelings of others". Numerous physical illnesses, as well as emotional disturbances and mental illnesses can be attributed to this lack of receiving and giving emotional feelings. I also see many marriages dying and families suffering because of the seeming inability to really share and communicate their feelings with one another.

Let me ask you a question — do you like to feel loved, needed, wanted, appreciated and accepted? Hopefully, your answer is a healthy and resounding yes! My response to this is — so do others, such as your spouse, children, parents, friends, neighbors, colleagues and other loved ones. How desperately we need to share and receive feelings as well as to empathize with the feelings of others. Cultivate this now and you will have less "Hardening of the Heart" and in turn a much healthier you, marriage, family, and society in which to live and to grow. Try to change your attitude about this now for it is much too risky not to. Sure, there are some risks involved in sharing and receiving feelings but the risk is much greater if you don't.

They say, "Age is a state of the mind". I say, "Age is a state of the mind and your sharing and receiving feelings". Don't let hardening of the heart age you like hardening of the arteries can. 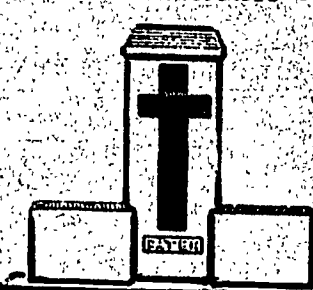
