NORCOM Police Communications System open for bids

George Curtiss, NORCOM's Project Director, announced to day the completion of the NORCOM design and that Invitations for Bids have been publicly advertised for the police communications systems for Glenview, Glenview, Golf, Kenilworth, Lincolnwood, Morton Grove, Niles, Northbrook, Northfield, Skokie, Wheeling, Wilmette, and Winnetka.

"We have moved off the drawing board to the purchasing stage," stated Curtiss at a Bidders Conference attended by the nation's leading communications concerns. "NORCOM communications are comparable to major U.S. cities and has full voice and digital capabilities found only in a few of the largest police departments." Curtiss attributes NORCOM's success in

achieving such an advanced system to the thirteen communities combining their systems and purchasing power to equal that of a major city. "An important capability will be that every mobile and portable radio will be able to signal using digital computer codes their identification and if an emergency condition exists in the field," said Curtiss in describing some of the

main features of NORCOM. NORCOM was funded by the Illinois Law Enforcement Commission who is the granting agency for the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration of the Department of Justice. NORCOM is a regional communication system serving thirteen communities with seven ultra high frequency radio channels. The system enables any one or all of

several hundred cars to be called into a regional emergency or combined operation. The FCC has licensed the NORCOM system to use new frequencies which the FCC created from unused TV channels to alleviate the problems of congestion on present policy frequencies. "NORCOM has engineered a system which will provide our

From the Left Hand

Did Nick Blase and Niles pull a monumental "boo-boo" in allowing the Sara Lee thrift store on Oakton and Milwaukee to move into Chicago? And did Niles actually force the store to move out of town after unduly harassing the store's management?

The 10-year-old store, next door to Foremost Liquors, wanted to move around the corner in the former Nu Dimensions store on Oakton Street. But it was reported Blase suggested it move across the street into the new shopping center. While Sara Lee people prefer not to talk about the matter, there was an implication Niles began ticketing Sara Lee trucks when traffic in the parking lot became overly crowded. When the plans for taking the larger store on Oakton Street were being considered Sara Lee people said the village did not feel there was sufficient parking in the lots they had been using through the years. It was at this point Blase and friends suggested the move across the street.

Some wary Nilesites wondered aloud if Blase might have an interest in the Candlelight Center. If so, then his suggestion for moving the store across the intersection would have been highly irregular. And if he had no other interest than improving the traffic problems it would seem he would have to look at the village's previous efforts which may have aided in creating the traffic congestion there.

When Niles attempted to improve the traffic flow at Oakton and Milwaukee it created a cul de sac on the street leading into the Sara Lee parking lot. Rather than have traffic move through the residential area east of the lot and turn left into the lot Niles blocked off traffic causing the Milwaukee Avenue back-ups. It is likely Niles' newly created traffic patterns were the primary reason for the traffic foul-ups at Oakton and Milwaukee.

Bike safety patrol approved for Niles

Trustees last week wholeheartedly endorsed a Bicycle Safety Patrol program within the village to promote bike safety and enforce cyclists to obey traffic laws.

The proposal made at the Tuesday night board meeting is the brainchild of Niles police officer James Gerhardt, supervisor of the Youth Bureau.

"Violations by the cyclists of Road and Driving laws have been on the increase," Gerhardt told trustees. "since bicycles have become more and more popular with teens and adults." Numerous daily phone calls are received by the police of safety violations by young cyclists, he said.

Gerhardt proposed the organization of an enforcement group of 10 uniformed college students on bicycles who will be authorized to patrol the village and issue citations to cyclists for traffic violations.

Youthful violators would be required to appear with a parent

at a Saturday morning Youth Commission court. A verdict of guilty would result in a 50 cent fine, "a minimal penalty," observed the Juvenile Police Officer, "which the violator could pay out of his allowance or salary."

The program would work, with the support of the parents noted Gerhardt. Repeat offenders would draw a suspension of use of the bike (to be enforced by the parent).

Issuing of citations, in some cases, would be up to the discretion of the patrol officer and a warning to the violator might prove sufficient. The program also pertains to adult cyclists. A comment by Trustee Abe Selman that a 50 cent fine "would not be very much to an adult," Gerhardt replied that adult violators could and would be booked on Illinois Traffic laws, subject to a \$25 bond and would have to appear in adult court.

Trustees were visibly impressed when it was pointed out that the enforcement group would be a definite aid to Niles police.

"The time consumed for bike safety enforcement (by Niles police) should be spent on crime prevention."

Police Chief Clarence Enrickson and Mayor Nicholas Blase both favored the bike safety proposal with a comment by the Mayor that Gerhardt had "come up with the most unique idea I've heard about enforcing bike safety ... I wish you the best of luck in making the village safer for cyclists, residents and motorists."

Gerhardt sees no difficulty in maintaining the bike enforcement program "once the initial procedures are made, barriers overcome and everything is in place." There are 9,300 registered bikes in Niles he said, estimating a total of 16,000 bicycles in the village.

Niles school boards will be requested to implement curriculums with a cyclist education course submitted by Gerhardt with his proposal. Bike safety on streets and highways will be taught throughout the Niles area in the schools, using the lesson plan which incorporates knowledge of traffic signs, bike equipment, hand signals, etc., a program similar to that taken by motorists. In accordance with the law, said police, every person riding a bike on a roadway is subject to the same regulations and responsibilities of a motorist and he or she is liable to citations in the event of safety law violations.

Gerhardt would also like to see signs posted on Niles boundaries informing incoming traffic that Bicycle Laws are strictly enforced in the village. Should the program prove successful here, he said, "other villages could very well adopt it."

Des Plaines made the attempt to enforce bike safety by patrol car, which was time-consuming. A Saturday court with youthful judges did not prove satisfactory.

Applicants for the patrol enforcement group will be screened very carefully to ascertain responsibility and a genuine interest in enforcement and safety said the Youth Officer.

An applicant for the Safety Patrol called at 8 a.m. the following morning after the presentation to the Board, he said.

Tree and shrubbery purchases for Niles parks

Niles Park District commissioners in continued general meetings Wednesday and Thursday evenings approved landscaping set for 7 Niles parks in the cost amount of \$21,411.50 for trees and shrubbery.

The approved cost was within the \$22,600 set aside for landscaping under the 1973 referendum successfully passed in November, according to Park Director Wm. Hughes.

Altho the program received full approval, Park Commr. Jack Leske discussed means of cutting costs for future tree and shrubbery landscaping.

Successful bidders were Klehm Nursery of Arlington Heights, Fiore Nursery of Prairie View, Simonsen's of Mt. Prospect, Leesley's of Libertyville, Schroeder's of Grayslake and the Arthur Wieler Nursery of Deerfield, Ill.

Type and size of trees and shrubbery were selected by Des Plaines landscape architect Jack Cooper, hired by the Niles Park District last July, as being

knowledgeable in park district landscaping.

Materials were selected specifically in tree and shrubbery species and size for each of the parks at Courtland, Golf Mill, Greenwood, Jonquil Terrace, Kirk Lane, Triangle and Washington Terrace, noted park commissioners.

Monies are set aside to complete all obligations of the \$2,715,000 referendum, said Hughes.

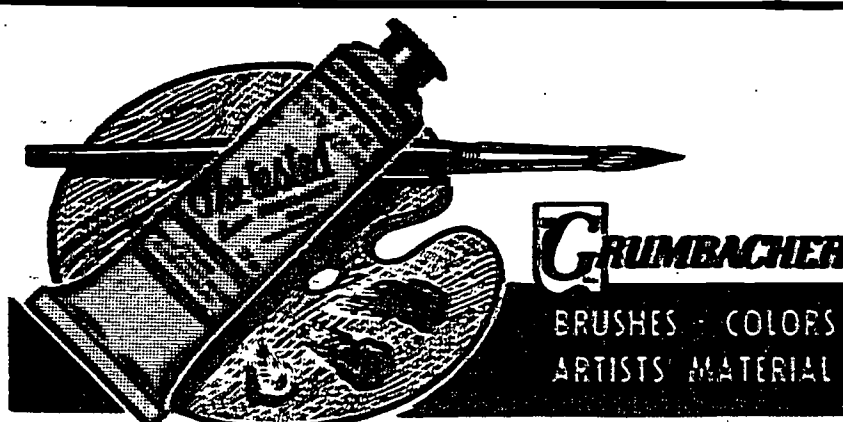
Of all promised under the referendum, he said, the tennis courts and basketball courts are last to be completed.

Of 5 planned tennis courts, 2 will be at Greenwood Park, 2 at Oak and improvement is planned for the existing, Oakton Manor court.

The 4 basketball courts will be installed at Greenwood, Courtland, Washington and Kirk Lane Park, with improvement of the existing court at Triangle Park.

Extensive work of spreading and seeding remains to be completed at Golf Mill Park.

Joseph Casey of Des Plaines has been named co-chairman of the 1975 Crusade of Mercy employe campaign at Commonwealth Edison Company.

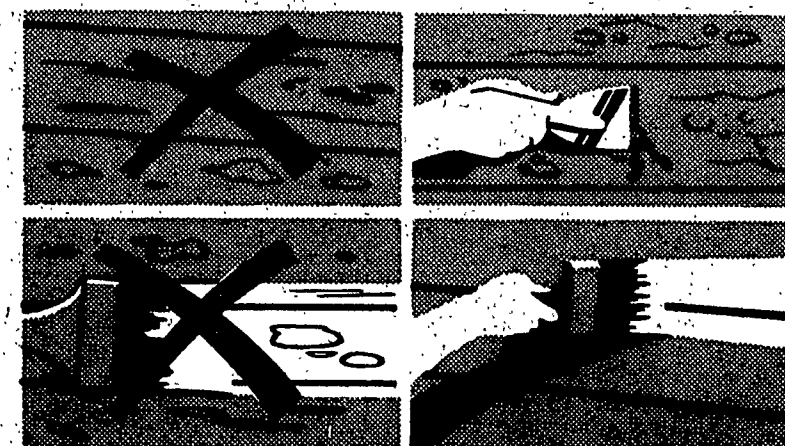

Marriage - bond or bondage

"The marriage institution is under assault in a revolutionary age. Man is not revolting against marriage because he cannot love deeply and permanently, nor because he does not have the 'will to love'. He is revolting against a life without surprises, without the chance of growing, without the thrill of discovery."

Everett Shostrom and Jerome Kavanaugh
"Between Man and Woman"

"If the statistics are valid, fewer people are getting married today, more people are choosing not to have children or waiting years to begin a family, and increasing numbers of people are divorcing and separating than ever before. The bottom line for the future implies radical changes in the fabric of our middle class society in unprecedented ways. I am suggesting that a major factor for this, as stated in the quote from Shostrom and Kavanaugh, is the historic rigidity of the marital bond, and to paraphrase the epithet, 'Marriage - love it or leave it!' The reaction thus far indicates a flow toward leaving it or, if possible, avoiding it all together.

My personal response is to examine ways of changing "it". The "it" being the marital relationship rather than leaving it. Certainly the idea of renegotiating a marriage contract, redefining mutual expectations, restrictions and individual responsibilities is not new. O'Neill's book *Open Marriage* is only one of many; and sometimes extreme proposals of this nature. The importance for me is not the end result of such exploration but that the process be begun before the marital bonds begin to be experienced as bondage for either of the two people involved. Then the task can become difficult and agenda gets cluttered with old hurts and resentments. In this way, I can begin to break the chains and examine what parts of the traditional marital relationship I want to continue to exist with and which I want to change because they no longer fit the reality of my relationship.

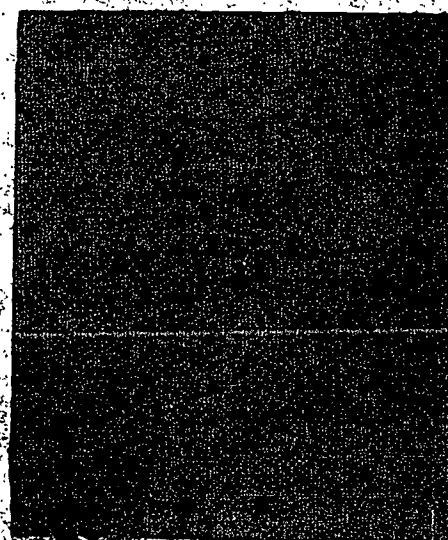
Hopefully, I will arrive at a clearer understanding of myself, my spouse, and us together. My contract may be too loose for some of you and too binding and tight for others. As long as there is room for us to grow as separate individuals and together as a couple, the effort and struggle will be worth it; I can then feel a bond based on choice and not blinded out of obligation. If I am not able to re-negotiate a mutually acceptable contract then some form of counseling might be considered to really examine the extent of the differences.

This renegotiation process is one that I find to be useful periodically. No contract is valid indefinitely. Needs and wants change in a marriage depending on where I am at in the family cycle. When changes occur, a new assessment is necessary, such as after the birth of a baby, or the moving away of a child, or when the woman decides to go back to work, school, or a career. The new contract can reaffirm previous agreements, discard those that no longer fit, and replace them with responsibilities that do. In this way the marital relationship can be responsive to individuals' ever changing wants. Then marriage can begin to be viewed not as an institution into which people are locked, but a structure of your own design that is flexible enough to withstand the turmoil of a rapidly changing society."

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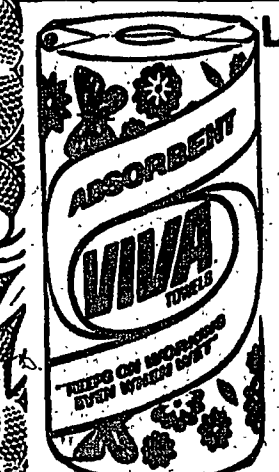

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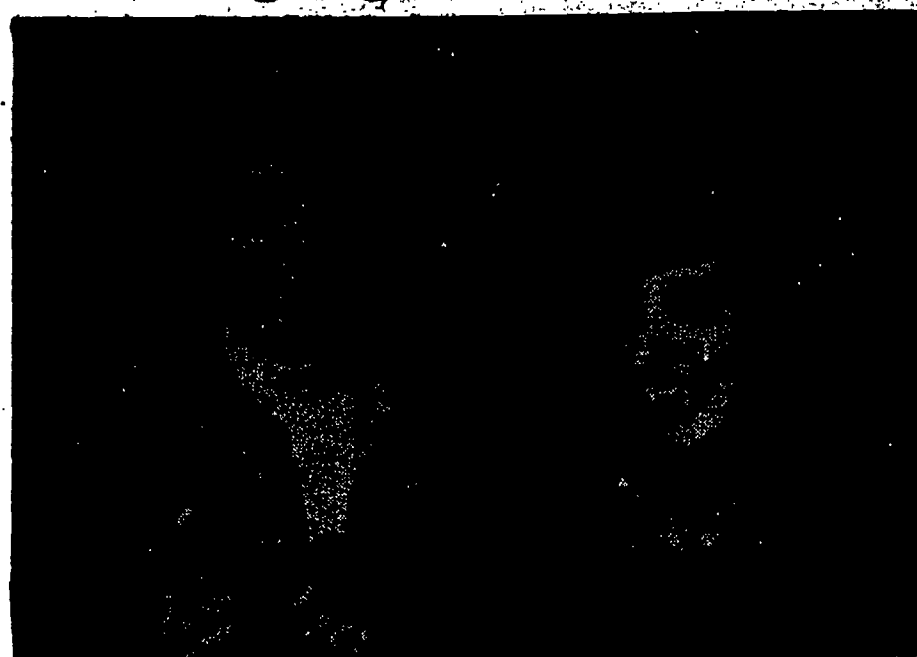

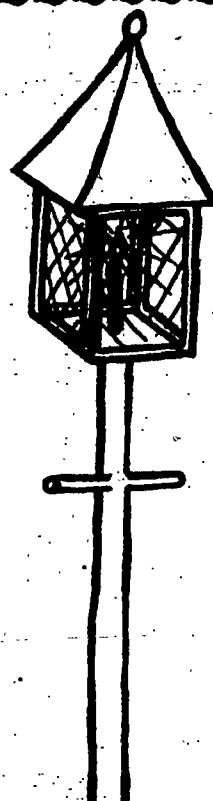

The first annual National Foundation-March of Dimes-Niles-Morton Grove Mini-Walk will be held on Sunday, Oct. 12.

On that day, several hundred area residents will walk 10 miles together to raise funds for The National Foundation-March of Dimes. They will be sponsored by friends, relatives and community businesses who pledge donations for every mile the walkers complete.

The money raised will support March of Dimes research, medical service, educational and community service programs in the Metropolitan Chicago Area and throughout the country, the goals of which are the prevention of birth defects and the reduction of infant mortality.

Participants in the event will gather at 9 a.m. at Golf Elementary School, 9350 Oak Park Ave., Morton Grove, to register and begin their trek through the Niles-Morton Grove area. Checkpoints along the route will provide water and restroom facilities.

Refreshments, donated by Mr. Larry Beemer, District Coordinator for Jack-in-the-Box Restaurants, will also be provided.

The Walkathon will end at Golf Elementary School, Morton Grove, where the rock group Sahara will give a two-hour concert for all Mini-Walk participants.

The walker who collects the most money for the March of Dimes will be awarded a ten-speed bicycle. A transistor radio will be awarded to the second runner-up.

The walk route has been set with the cooperation and approval of village officials and the police departments of both communities.

Police foil antifreeze swindle set for Golf Mill

A Chicago businessman saved \$2,400 last week by enlisting police aid in a confidence game on antifreeze for which Niles was the setting, said Niles police.

The intended victim, owner of an auto parts store, told police he received a phone call from a man who offered to sell him 400 cases of antifreeze for a dollar a gallon, or a total of \$2,400.

Last year antifreeze sold for \$5 and up a gallon - if you could get it.

A deal was set up for a meeting in the parking lot at 8500 Golf rd., according to the victim. The payoff and delivery of the "merchandise" was to be made at the rear of a store in Golf Mill.

What the swindlers didn't foresee was a quirk in human nature. The victim called his friend, another businessman, to

tell him about his "good fortune."

"Don't do it," advised the friend. He had received the same type of call a week before, handed over \$1,800 - and never saw the antifreeze.

Chicago police told the victim they would follow thru, using paper money for the payoff and an officer as the driver of the truck to pick up the antifreeze.

"We contacted Niles police," said Sgt. Robert Vanderploeg of Area 3 Robbery Division in Chicago. Sgt. Wm. Reid and 2 patrol cars responded as a backup and assist to 3 Chicago police cars.

Contact was made at 8 p.m. Tuesday evening. As the "driver" of the truck handed over the money, a second policeman concealed in the back of the truck

revealed himself, placing the contact man under arrest.

The suspect was returned to the South Chicago station. Investigation revealed he was only a runner, a messenger boy who was supposed to pick up the money. He was later released for lack of evidence, said Chicago police.

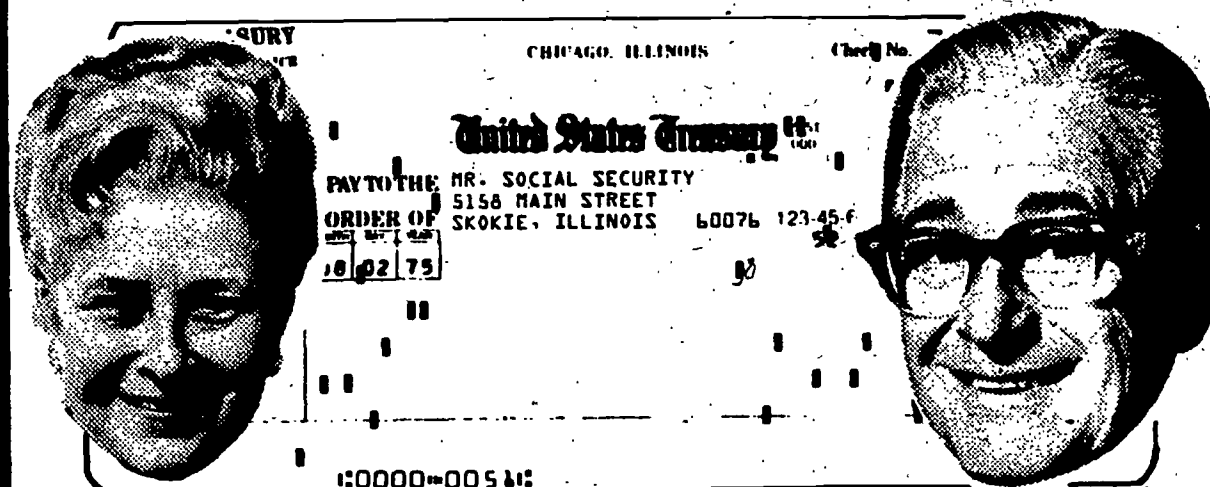
There probably have been more cases of confidence games which have not been reported, said police, with the thought that there is a little larceny in everybody.

A Citizens Band radio valued at \$400 was taken from a locked car parked in Golf Mill on Thursday, Sept. 11.

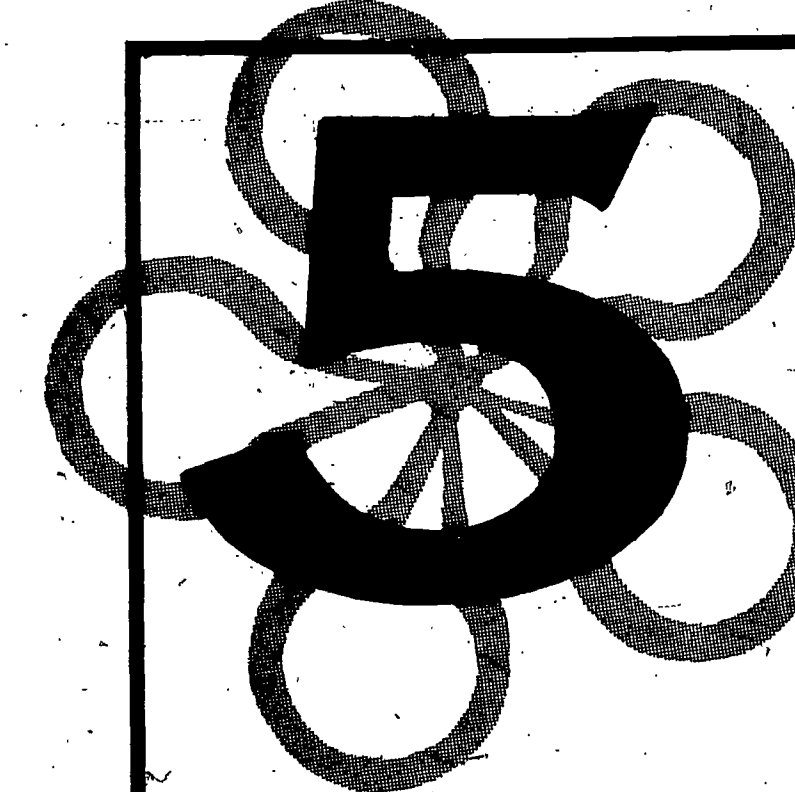
The victim told police he had parked his car on the Greenwood side of Sears parking lot in the morning and discovered the theft when he returned to his car at 5:30 p.m.

Niles Baseball League responds to forfeiture complaint

Subject: Forfeit by Twins to Kings Niles Little League Baseball

Dear Editor:

In a recent issue you published a letter from Mrs. Barbara Hedrich complaining of a decision rendered by the Niles Baseball League Board of Directors which resulted in the forfeiture of a game by the team which her son played for.

While Mrs. Hedrich's concern for the welfare of her son is understandable, and for the welfare of the League appreciated, there were a few points she failed to touch upon. Foremost should be the fact that the rule involved in the decision was one of those we feel make the Niles Baseball League a "cut above", as Mrs. Hedrich put it, many other leagues. That rule involves the maximum number of innings a boy may pitch in a game, consecutive games, or a week, and the penalties resulting from a transgression of the rule.

The "piece of paper" to which she alluded is the Official League Pitching Record. In order that pitching records may be verified both managers are instructed to submit copies, both copies to be signed by both managers. These are open records and may be reviewed by any manager interested in doing so. Mrs. Hedrich's managerial representative signed the opposing manager's record, thereby attesting to its accuracy, and compounded the problem by failing to turn in his own record. Mrs. Hedrich suggested referring to her team's official scorer. The Board of Directors, in effect, did just that by requesting that all of the managers involved bring their scorebooks to the meeting. Not one of three scorebooks reviewed contained adequate notations of pitching changes.

Mrs. Hedrich should realize, if she doesn't already, that any decision rendered by the Board would result in twelve boys being disappointed, regardless of which way the decision went. As for the "ego trips that grown men are more eager to protect", perhaps, rather than having Board Members themselves comment, she should speak to their wives and ask how they feel about having their husbands take off for a "Special Board Meeting" on a Saturday afternoon when there's work to be done around the house. Perhaps she'd care to know from other Activity Chairmen the number of hours spent by anyone involved with administration of the League for which little, or no, thanks is obtained.

Finally, Mrs. Hedrich's interest is commendable, as is her

personal appearance at the games. So many parents cannot seem to find the time to give their boys this attention. It is unfortunate that her son had to be adversely affected by the Board decision; just as it would have been unfortunate for the other team's boy had the decision gone the other way but without rules as guidelines and penalties for breaking those rules, chaos would result.

patrol officers with the latest available technological tools and will enable us to use the building block approach over the next several years to develop car computer terminals and location capabilities," stated Chief Kenneth Chamberlain of Skokie. Skokie has the center for monitoring the regional emergency channel.

CES Telecommunications of Chicago are the system designers. CES is a nationally recognized concern with systems from Rhode Island to Texas. Locally they are currently designing the communications for Southeast DuPage County (Illinois) and the Madison Fire Department (Wisconsin).

The Wilmette Police Department serves as the regional data center. The centers at Skokie and Wilmette are backed up by the Niles Police Department and Northbrook Police Department.

"Our marked cars are equipped with mobiles which will also be used for computer terminals as the system develops next year," commented Chief Clarence Emrikson of Niles as he explained the total communications concept. "When the man leaves his car, he will carry with him a portable radio which keeps him in constant contact with our Dispatchers and gives him access to every police officer in the North Shore."

Live music will be provided and a giant searchlight will identify the new car show during the first few evenings of the event.

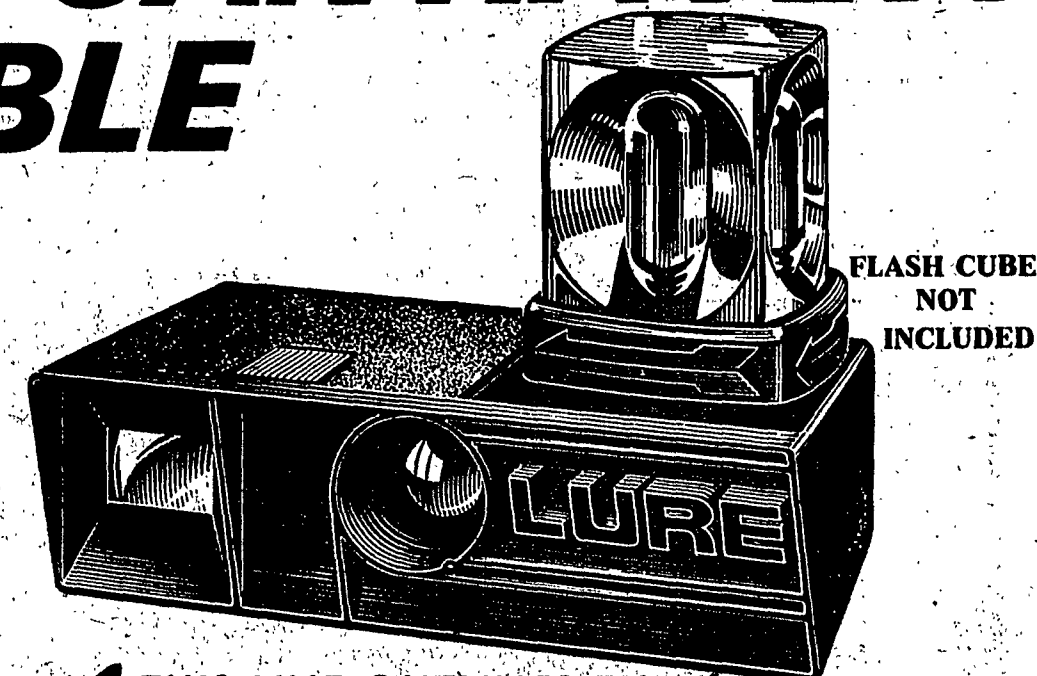
Rubber check

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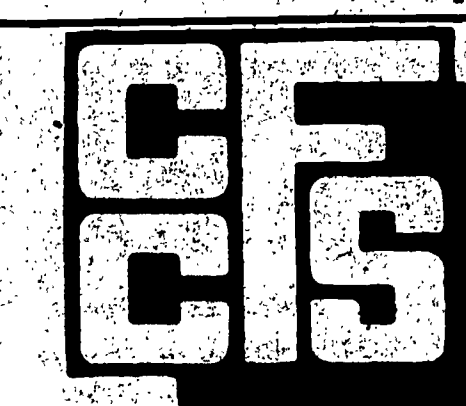

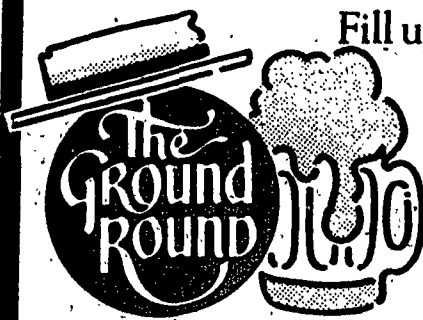

Sara Lee people prefer to remain close-mouthed about the whole matter. But meanwhile 1,200 customers helped open the new store in Chicago on opening day. And by the end of this month Niles will have one less retail outlet in the community.

The Sara Lee people prefer not to mention how much sales they generated at the store but our guestimates after talking to employees is about \$40,000 per week or about \$2,000,000 per year.

Sales tax returns to the village would be about \$20,000 annually on this much sales which is a sizeable chunk of money.

In view of the many empty stores in the village (we would guess about 100 to 150) Niles can ill-afford to pull such a monumental boner. An established successful business should receive encouragement from the community. Undue harassment and plain brusque manhandling has proven costly in this instance.

Dumb-dumb award of the week goes to my neighbors in west Morton Grove who have been up in arms over the rash of burglaries in the area. One great gal on our block, Stevie Balter, went to every home on the block over the weekend and suggested residents keep their outside lights on at nighttime to help light up the area. Yet, in viewing both the front and backyards of our neighbors Sunday, much of the neighborhood looked like it was observing a London blackout reminiscent of the war years.

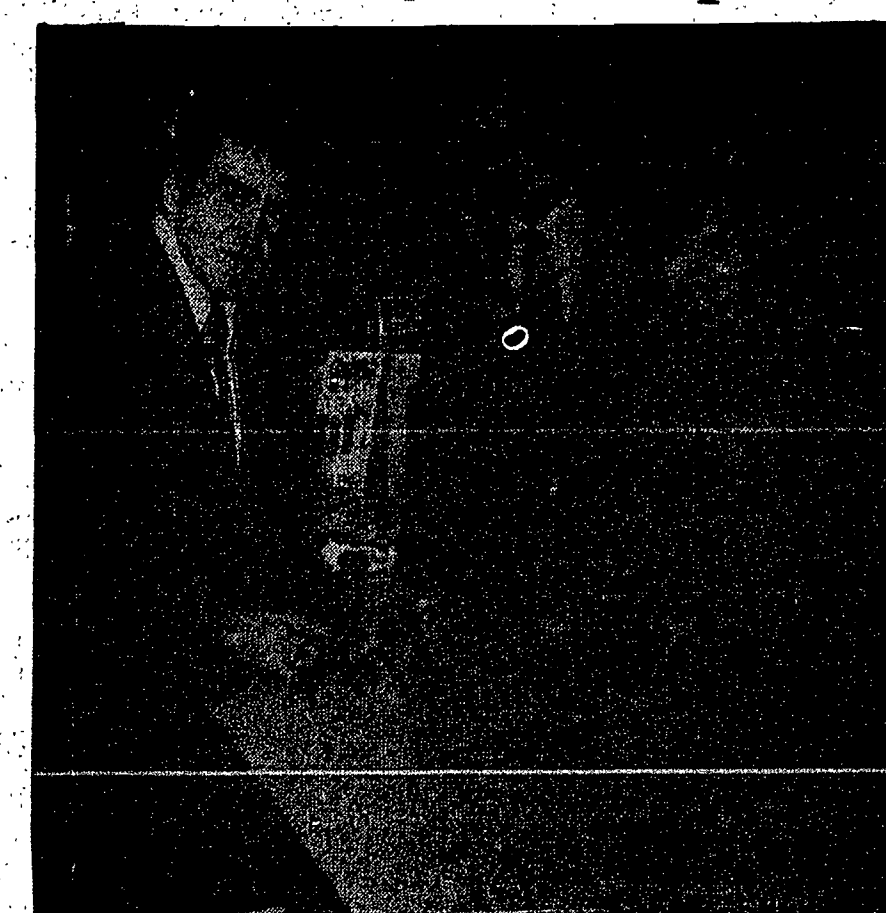
Just to keep the troops abreast of their problem, it was reported two more burglaries took place over the weekend on Murray Court.

Scrambling down to the village hall and crying for help is absurd if these people aren't willing to help themselves. Until the entire community is sufficiently concerned to actively light up the area and keep alert, the problem is not likely to be abated.

If we see inequities in the system for working moms we'll try to lend our voice on their behalf. But moms who want to lunch out with their cronies will have to find another boy to carry their colors.
