Trustee Pesole wages individual price stamp battle

Niles trustee Peter Pesole introduced at the Oct. 14 board meeting a food-pricing ordinance that requires individual stamped pricing of store items in Niles shops.

He proposed the ordinance for law said Pesole after learning that supermarkets are introducing a computerized food pricing (scanning) system that relies on a code

in registering the price at the checkout counter.

No store in Niles presently is using the scanning system, although it is in operation at a Morton Grove supermarket chain.

Niles trustees agreed to study the proposed ordinance for discussion at the next, Oct. 28, board meeting. An employee from a chain store using the price scanning device is expected to be

present to explain the computerizing method.

Pesole said he became aware of the "scanning" food pricing system while attending a recent legislative session of the House of Representatives in Springfield. The law requiring individual price stamping passed the House, Pesole said, but was defeated by 5 votes in the Senate.

"I can't understand what is

wrong with letting people know the price of the item they want to buy," he said.

Even now store items are marked with different prices than are marked on store shelves, he noted. And how does a shopper tell if the price is wrong when it goes through the checkout computer?

The computerized method is okay for the store, argued Pesole,

but what of the shopper on a weekly budget, or the senior citizen who must use extreme care in purchasing supplies on a limited budget?

"I want to see a price on the item before I buy it and I want to see that price registered at the checkout counter," he declared. He intends to get first-hand experience by shopping in several

5 arrested in jewelry burglary

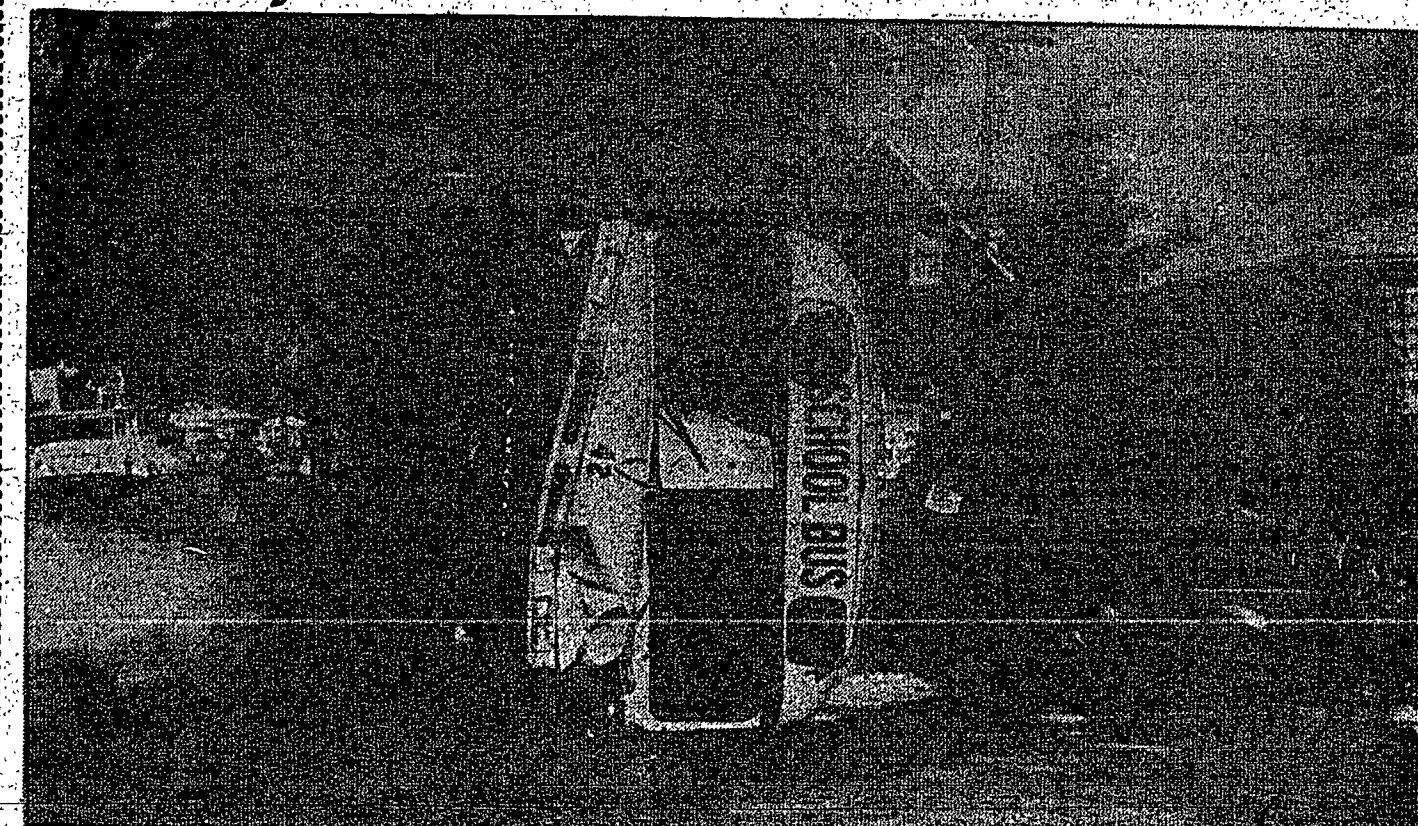

The Blackstone Theatre is presenting Brown Bubbling Sugar, which may become one of the great musical variety shows of the last 30 years. The show, which has been to Philadelphia and Washington, is taking its time moving toward New York, but when it gets there New Yorkers will be standing in line waiting weeks and perhaps months for tickets.

To place a relatively obscure show alongside Fiddler, or Oklahoma, or South Pacific may seem a bit presumptuous. But when you see the usual 'hard to please' Chicago audience leap to its feet during the finale and roar its approval, staccato-clapping its way thru the last number, you know you're seeing a happening.

Sugar has a rather thin story line, tracing the Harlem years of the 20's, 30's and 40's, when Eubie Blake and Duke Ellington and Billy Holiday made swing and jazz and dance into a genuine American art form. But the story line is unimportant. The music and the dance and former jazz singer Thelma Carpenter and friends is what the show is all about. The Ellington music, played by a fine 12 piece onstage band, and the lush dance numbers, and the singing, glorious as anything heard in the Harlem of the 20's and 30's, parlay a 2 1/2 hour evening into the best sustained stagershow we've seen in many years.

Two 70 year old vaudevillians surround Miss Carpenter on center stage most of the evening in as charming a performance as you're likely to see. And while they softshoe their way into your hearts, their younger counterparts turn up the velocity, turn on the hyped dances, and turn a warm, pleasant evening into a rousing 150 minutes of exuberance which exhilarates both the audience and cast to the crescendo finale.

Norway's King Olav V was greeted by Mrs. Joseph Kallested, 82, of 8325 Ozanam, Niles, for the second time Thursday, Oct. 15, at the Norwegian Lutheran Memorial Church (Norwegian name: Minnetårn), 2614 N. Kedzie st., Chicago.



The children sang "Hallelujah for the King" six times, said Mrs. Kallested, as he and his entourage strolled outside the church. The church was filled with people sitting in the aisles and an overflow on the outside.

Her mother was very excited at meeting King Olav again, said the daughter, the first meeting occurring at the church in 1968. Mrs. Kallested's family, finished hearing and artistic conclusion necessitated the daughter's assistance in receiving the King.

During the hour-long ceremonies, each of the 12 honored church members were introduced by the church minister to King Olav, who shook hands and acknowledged each meeting with a slight bow.

"It was a very suspenseful moment," commented the Nilesite upon the ceremony, "especially for my mother who noted that the Thursday meeting might be the last big moment of her life, that she probably would not be here for the monarch's next visit."

Mrs. Kallested had immigrated to the States in 1923, accompanied by her daughter and a son from Kristiansand s., in the southern part of Norway, to join her husband already settled in Chicago. Mrs. Gulbrandsen was

Whether you are interested in serving on the committee or just wish further information, Page urged that all members of the community attend.

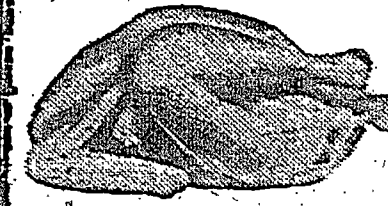

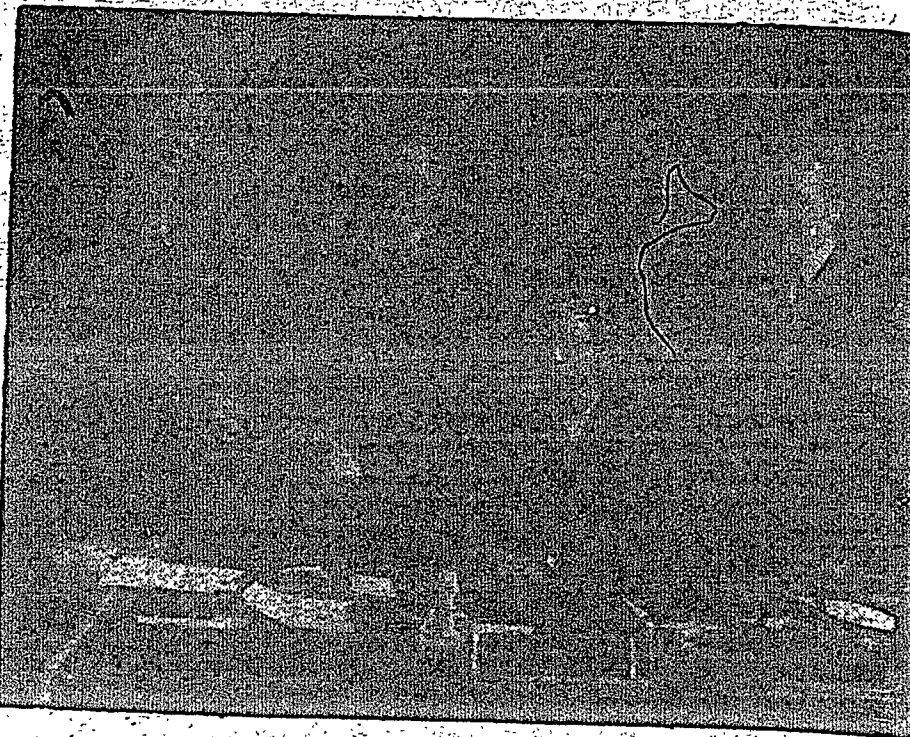

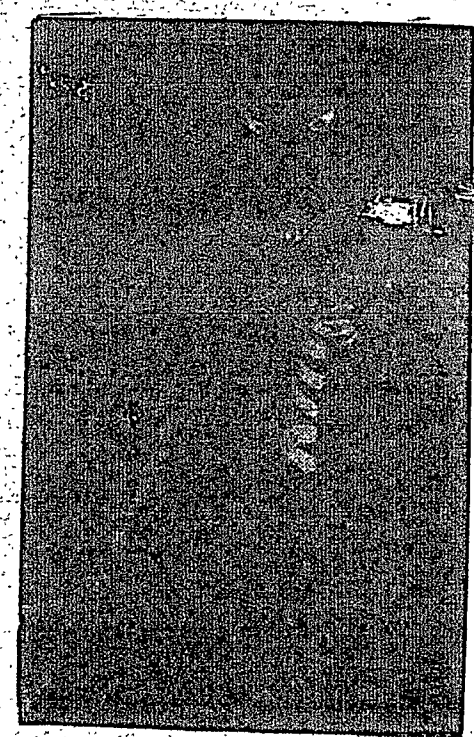

Fourth of July parade, fireworks for '76 endorsed by Niles Days

The Niles Days Committee last week stamped an okay on the idea of a fireworks display, and a parade for the Village Bicentennial Celebration next July 4.

"Our Committee had already noted Ed Brach, who with Ben Mankowsky is co-chairman of the Niles Days Committee. Learning that a Bicentennial parade was in the planning for the Fourth of July he said the committee ceased preparations so as not to conflict with Bicentennial plans.

A Village Bicentennial Committee was formed earlier this year of approximately 30 Niles organizational representatives, chaired by Village Trustee Carol Panek for the purpose of planning monthly Bicentennially themed events in 1976.

Guidance, under an Executive Board of Directors has projected plans for a Bicentennial stage production, sponsored by the Woman's Club of Niles, for April. An interfaith project in May will take place at St. John Brebeuf Church, 8307 Harlem Ave.

A contest encompassing red, white and blue gardens is under advisement by the Garden Club of Niles. A village parade and an old-fashioned Country Fair are

projected for July 3 and 4 with a huge fireworks display during the evening of the National holiday and a Bicentennial Ball is under consideration for Dec. '76.

Numerous other Niles organizations have volunteered their services already, according to Chairman Panek... the Niles Jaycees, the Niles Squares, the Senior Citizen Clubs of Niles, the Niles Historical and Art Society and religious orders within the village.

The planned events for the year '76 all require funding, observed Brach, who is also a member of the Niles Bicentennial Executive Board.

"The Niles Days Committee annually seeks a community project which can best be the recipient of Days' funds," commented Brach last week.

In his opinion the Days Committee would look favorably upon a request for monies to fund Bicentennial events, he said. "The total profits, dependent upon the size of next year's Festival Days, could be allocated to Bicentennial costs."

Conversations with Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase said Brach have indicated that the Mayor approves of co-participation by

both the Bicentennial Committee and by the Niles Days Committee for sponsorship and funding of the 1976 Bicentennial celebrations.

He noted that the Days Committee has not set a date for acceptance of letters requesting funds, but "the date will possibly be in November or December."

The sum of \$12,500 of Festival profits in '74 had been requested and allocated to village expenses of Niles' 75th, Diamond Jubilee, birthday last year, he commented.

Approximately \$16,500 have been tentatively suggested toward costs of a parade, the fireworks and the drama production.

Netted monies at the end of the year will be geared to a Bicentennial village project, according to Bicentennial Chairman Panek.

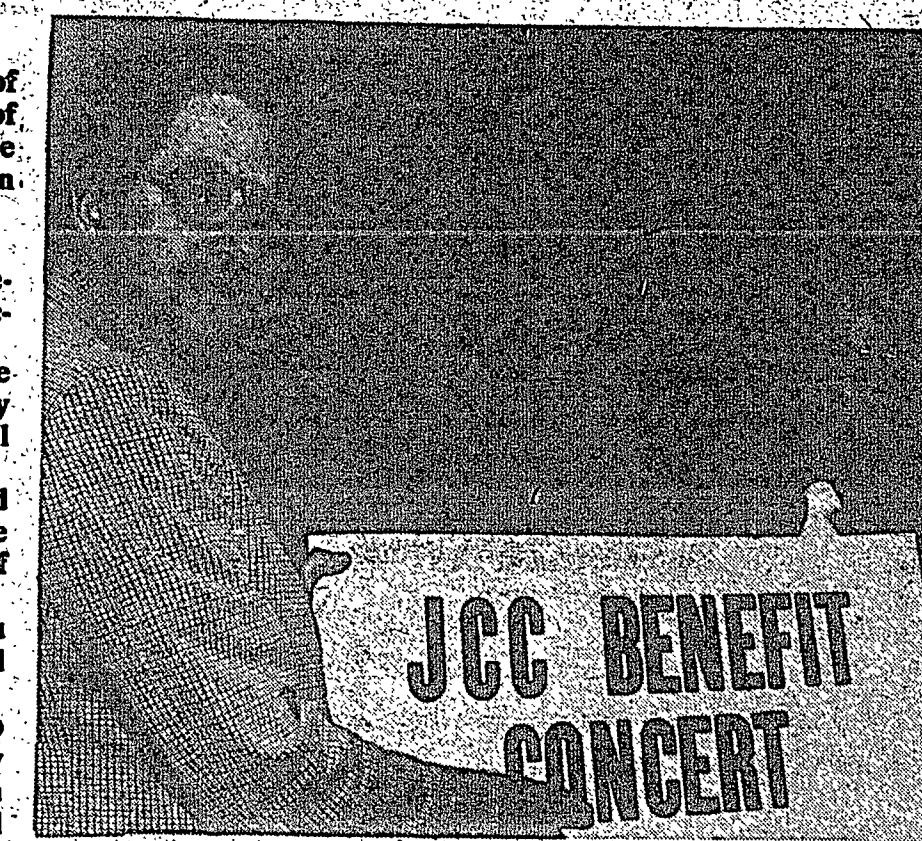
Godspell

V-Show has something for everyone as it covers the development of America thru skits, dance and music.

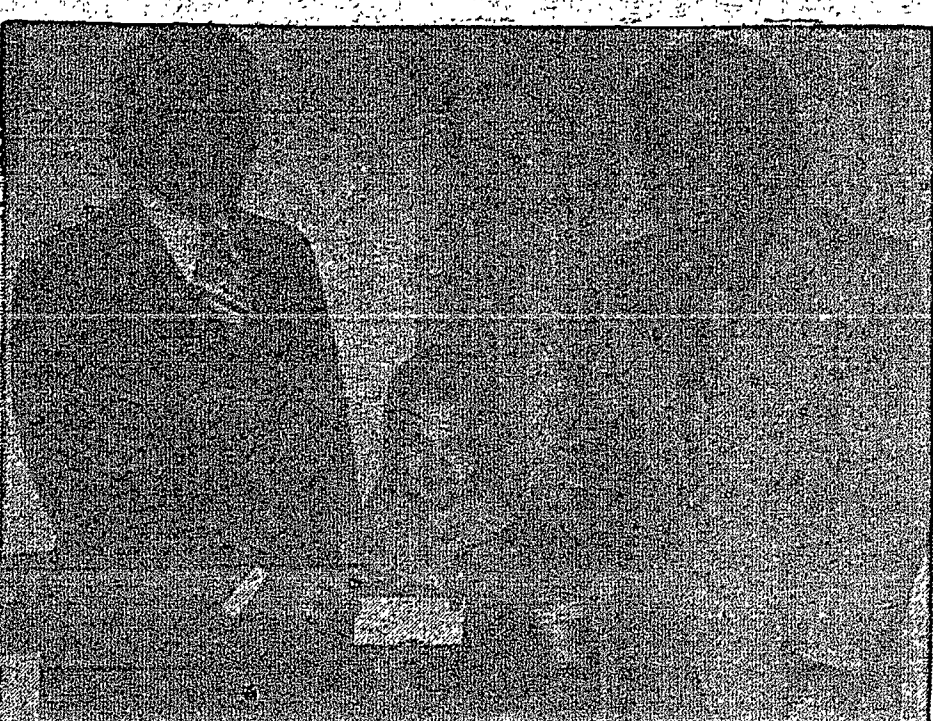

Centel employees end 3 1/2 month strike

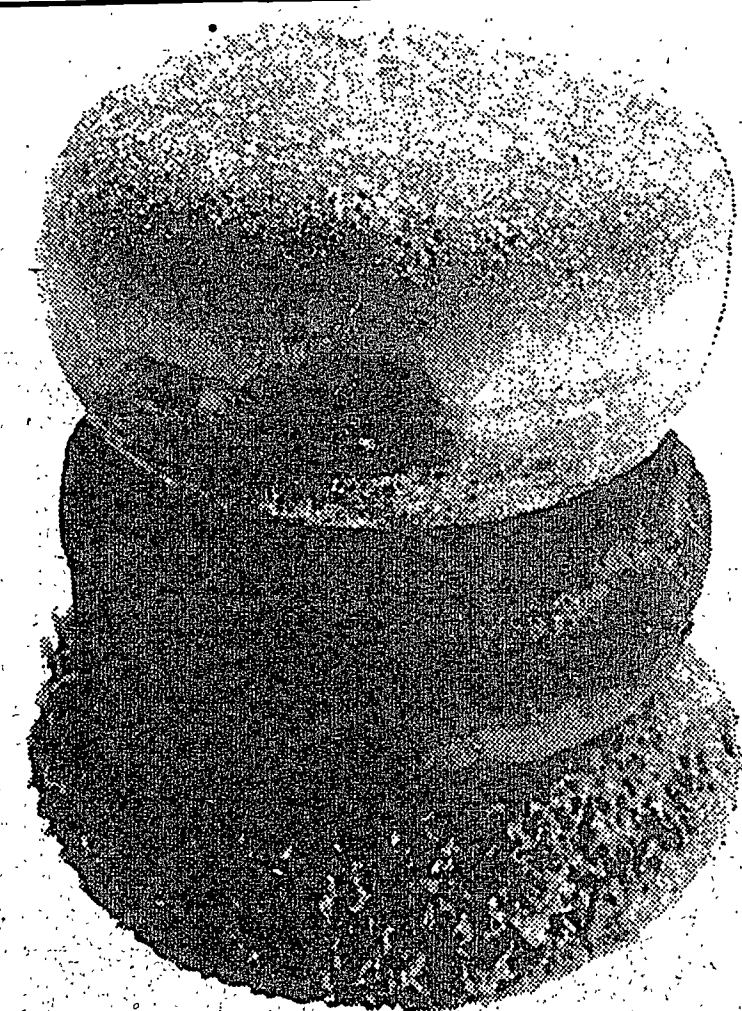

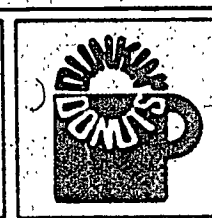

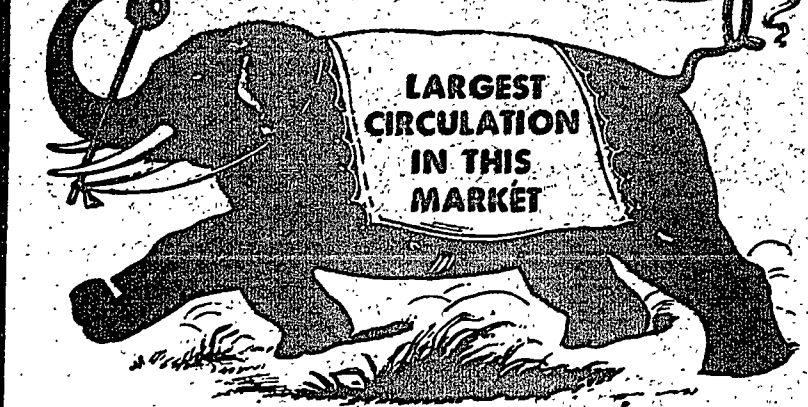

Park Board motion to reduce office term

Niles Park Commissioners Tuesday night unanimously approved a motion to reduce the service term of a park commissioner from 6 years to 4 years. Park Attorney Gabriel Berrafato was directed to prepare the necessary resolution for approval at the November park board meeting.

The bill permitting park commissioners to reduce their term of office from 6 years to 4 years had been signed into law recently by Governor Walker as well as a pending House Bill allowing park districts to enlarge their boards of commissioners from 5 to 7 members. Park Commissioner Jack Leske had cautioned fellow commissioners at the September board meeting that he would seek approval on both issues and for the commissioners "to think on it."

Tuesday night Leske said he would approach the new laws one at a time and called for approval of the reduction in terms of office. On a shorter term (4 year) basis, he said, park commissioners would have more empathy to people's problems.

Park Attorney Berrafato, told commissioners that under the law, park districts may reduce the term of office by resolution of the board or by petition-initiated referendum. If the Board chose to change the term of office from 6 to 4 years, said the attorney, only a petition-called referendum could change a commissioner's term back to 6 years.

Park Commissioner Steve Chameriski had asked for a tabling of the motion to allow more discussion time but the tabling motion died for lack of a second. In other business: Comr. Jack Leske presented the 6th Annual

Fishing Derby Awards of a rod and reel to Marshall Collins, 7, of 1301 Western ave.; and to Gene Kalkowski, 10, of 8737 Stolling rd., for catching the most fish in their age category of any one fishing session. Al Bremer, 15, of 8144 Ozark, received a tacklebox; Larry Barcheski "over 18", of 7656 Osceola, was awarded a box of lures. For catching the largest fish, Bob Zanko, 15, was awarded a minnow basket and net.

Bids for a spectator shield system at the Ballard Sports Complex "Ice-Rink" went to Administration for recommendation at the continued meeting of the Park Board on Oct. 28.

Park commissioners confirmed a motion of approval to change the name Maine-Niles Assoc. of Recreation for the Handicapped (M-NARH) to Maine-Niles Assoc. of Special Recreation (M-NASR) by reason of individuals who have a learning problem, explained Comr. Millie Jones, rather than a handicapped problem.

A request by Norm Dachman on behalf of the Better Boys Foundation to use a Niles park for a circus as a fund-raising project was sent to Committee for report at the Oct. 28 meeting. In agreement that the project was a worthy cause, Comrs. Leske and Chameriski questioned the suitability of Niles parks, suggesting use of "open forest preserve land."

Park Board President Millie Jones announced a meeting of Golf Mill Park residents, Community Police Officer James Gerhardt and park officials, set for the Ballard Sports Complex Wednesday, Oct. 22, at 8 p.m. to discuss complaints of youth harassment, abusive language and rowdiness at the park.

Continued from Page 1 through the wall of an adjoining barber shop to gain entry into the jewelry store.

The break-in and burglary were unsuccessful said police, who theorized that the burglars were prematurely frightened off after one of the men tripped over a wire in the store, setting off an alarm directly connected with Niles police headquarters.

Police identified the men as Roy Blakeney, 35; Edward Cook, 50; and Martin Katz, 41; all of Miami, Fla.; Theodore Ristich, 29, of Bensonville and Louis Ritacco, 48, of St. Paul, Minn.

All five were charged with burglary, possession of burglars tools and possession of stolen property. A van and one of the two autos used by the men when they were apprehended were stolen, said police.

The suspects were held in the Niles jail for a preliminary hearing in Niles Court Monday morning before Judge James Maher who set each man under a \$100,000 bond. They were housed in Cook County jail Monday afternoon pending arraignment Friday, Oct. 24 in Niles Court before Judge George Zimmerman.

The men were considered professionals in their particular line of endeavor, said police.

No weapons were displayed at the time of seizure nor did they give any indication of having any, said Niles Captain of Detectives Edward Dennis.

Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson credited the Chicago Criminal Intelligence Unit (CIU) and the Niles Detective Bureau with apprehension of the suspects Sunday night.

"The CIU was tipped off that the men were in the Chicago area," said the Police Chief, "and they had the group under surveillance for many weeks."

A surveillance by Chicago police had been set up at a Rte. 83 Motel where the men were staying and the police followed the group until they came into Niles and the K-Mart Shopping Center. Niles police were notified and the area was surrounded by police.

"We watched them break into the barber shop and were waiting to close in," said a Niles police captain. The suspects fled the scene in three cars after accidentally tripping an alarm.

Dennis said the police had specific reasons for apprehending the suspects in their cars and followed the suspects until such time that the police cars could effectively close in.

According to an eyewitness homeward bound to Niles Sunday night, traffic was backed up on Ballard Road and the entire area cordoned off.

"Lights were flashing everywhere," she said and the police had the five men handcuffed and

Continued from Page 1 Before the Sagar hits Broadway, I'm sure the show will be rewritten, perhaps several times. But if the producers are wise, they'll leave the show alone. Without any truly big names helping to carry the show, it moves along with its own verve.

Do yourself a favor and get down to the Blackstone. It's likely to be the best show you'll see this year, and perhaps for many more.

If you're looking for some adventurous reading, try Sir Edmund Hillary's autobiographical Nothing Venture Nothing Win. One of the first two men to reach the 29,000 foot peak of Mount Everest in 1953, Hillary takes you thru hundreds of pages of mountain climbing, down some of the most treacherous rivers of the world and across Antarctica in a farm-like tractor which is more exciting than any fiction which could be written for adventure lovers.

The Hillary story is about man's ability to conquer nature. But it's more a story of self-discipline, of going on and up when it would be easier to turn back. For this farmer from New Zealand, being able to continuously rise to the natural challenges of the world is a marvellous testimony to an extraordinary man.

World Book sponsored an expedition to the top of the Himalayan mountains, about 27,000 feet high, many years after Hillary had reached the top of Everest. They were interested in how high man could climb without the use of oxygen. Hillary led the climb in a test of endurance which defies credibility.

Nothing Venture Nothing Win will be an exceptional adventure for all who read this most exciting book. Read Sir Hillary's book one hour a night for one week, and you'll remember for years to come these mighty adventures, which contrasts with your already forgetting last night's 4 hours of TV.

The Goodman Theatre opened its 50th year with Thornton Wilder's Our Town 2 weeks ago. It indeed was a splendid selection. Wilder's New England families which we see are young, mature and die during the turn-of-the-century, wear extremely well some 40 years after it was first performed.

What seems like simple homilies—"We never really listen to one another"—becomes quite meaningful as Wilder takes us from the young years of star-crested high school lovers, thru their marriage, and to the eventual death in childbirth of the bride we grew up with during the two hour performance.

The very gentleness and simplicity of the time, and the people, is a vehicle for Wilder's telling us to eschew our days on earth. His closing scene where the departed sit up from their graves is great theatre, a scene which will live in the memories of those who take Wilder at his words. It's a fine play, well-cast, and a must for theatre-goers who enjoy the best of productions from a live proscenium.

laying face down on the grass. No theory was offered by police as to why the 5 men chose the Niles store as their target. And the suspects are not talking.

stores prior to the Oct. 28 meeting for proof of evidence to set before the Board.

Pesole said Chicago councilmen "voted unanimously to approve the same ordinance. I am asking."

Skokie approved the ordinance, but exempted small stores -- "I exclude no one in the ordinance I am proposing for Niles."

Des Plaines housewives' pressure last week on Mayor Herbert H. Buehler's veto of the individual price stamping ordinance prompted Des Plaines aldermen to override the Mayor's veto. "The women of Des Plaines actually campaigned to push that

law through," said an alderman, "and we couldn't withstand that kind of pressure."

Pesole said his proposed ordinance is a composite of the Chicago, Des Plaines and Skokie law.

Should the ordinance be passed into law Niles stores will be notified the following day. The Village License Officer will enforce the ordinance which permits a \$1,000 fine per day immediately.

Pesole was surprised that he has not received any phone calls (other than the Bugle's) from Niles residents regarding the ordinance.

He received the early promotion for his superior performance in all phases of the training, which emphasizes physical conditioning, discipline and teamwork.

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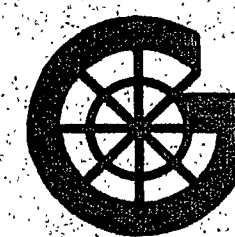
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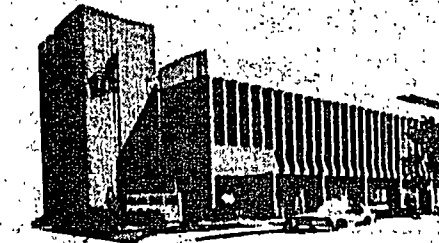
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
