According to Frank McTier, the Morton Grove Days idea was born as an outgrowth of a small group of women called the Women's War Workers Circle, that banded together to raise funds to erect a statue honoring the 'doughboys' of World War I. The money was raised and the statue was erected and still stands on the Library. grounds at Lincoln and School st. as a lasting memorial.

Perhaps the most notable achievement of the Days Committee was the purchase of the land north of Dempster st. that is now Harrer Park. This land was turned over to the Park District and was in essence the beginning of the Morton Grove Park District, MG Days was traditionally given monies to the Park District and in more recent times has disbursed funds to help build the Park District and in more recent

times has disbursed funds to help

build the Park District buildings that occupy most park sites. Thru the years, the Police and Fire departments, the Little League. Senior Citizens and numerous other organizations and projects have received funds from the Committee. The Fourth of July Fire Works, Santa Claus comes to Morton Grove, and the Easter Egg hunt have been jointly sponsored by the Days Committee and the American Legion Post #134. The reason for the almost unanimous vote to disband was based, according to Committee spokesmen, on a waning interest of the various civic and fraternal organizations that had traditionally supported the operation with manpower, and the declining interest of the people of Morton Grove to support and patronize the Morton Grove Days

While needs from community to community vary, the Niles Township Administration representative told us 5 families in their township area will be assisted by the Salvation Army during the holiday season.

At the Salvation Army headquarters in Evanston, 650 family units (one or more persons) will receive some aid this year. More than 2,000 applications were handed out and responses will enable 650 families to receive help from the

Those applying will be eligible to receive one new toy for each child under 12 years old. Grocery certificates will be distributed enabling families to have a Christmas dinner. Certificates range from \$7 to \$20 depending upon the size of

While "kettle" donations are down, one-third of the Salvation Army budget is received from people dropping coins in the kettles. All monies stay in the community.

In Evanston there is 1 social worker who receives \$600 a month for working with the Army. The lieutenant and his wife, who are weathering the cold, standing all day besid the kettles, receive their room and board and a very small check for their basic needs from the Salvation Army. Their lives are ones of great dedication.

Monday, a middle-aged man walked into Niles Family Service on Oakton/Street and his story was sad and the support he received was minimal. The man said he was from Yugoslavia and is here on a visa. He has been unable to find work, and as of Monday was without any money. In a quest to financially aid the man, the Maine Township public aid assistance office refused to help him and only the Niles Township office came up with money which provided him with board and room for the night.

According to a Niles Family Service representative, the man was extremely unhappy over his position in a strange country, without any money or friends to help him.






