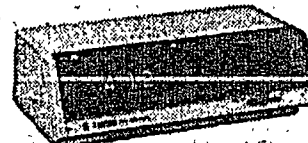

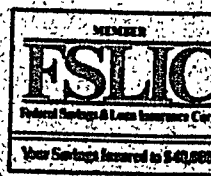

While you're buying, buying, buying, cooking, cooking, cooking, and getting ready for the holidays, there's a lovely bunch of people over at St. John Brebeuf who wear the Christmas spirit the year around.

The St. Vincent DePaul Society of St. John Brebeuf helps the needy in Chicago and 12 months of the year. And while the Christmas highlights their year's activities, there are 12 great people and 17 younger guys and gals who are helping and giving of themselves all year long.

Last week 650 to 700 gifts were stacked on the altar at the church as parishoners opened their hearts to those less fortunate. The Society then distributed the presents to disabled veterans on Huron Street, to the Little Brothers of the Poor which aids the elderly, the Mercy Mission which cares for Vietnamese refugees, and to the Spend program which serves the needs of retarded children.

Pete Zonsius, who heads the St. Vincent group, said they have a junior society of 17 youngsters who also do yeomen's work in aiding those in need.

The St. Vincent group makes an effort the year around to help widows in the parish who may have need, for help. And children without fathers are also watched over by this fine group. Pete said Santa Claus visited many of these children during recent days.

Last Sunday Santa Claus visited the Vietnamese children who were enjoying their first Christmas in this country.

Once a month the Society visits the disabled veterans in Chicago and periodically the men head down to Madison Street in the city to help with the soup kitchens.

This event is the largest single Catholic Grammar School event in the mid-west area. Featured are 7 different levels and areas of competition.

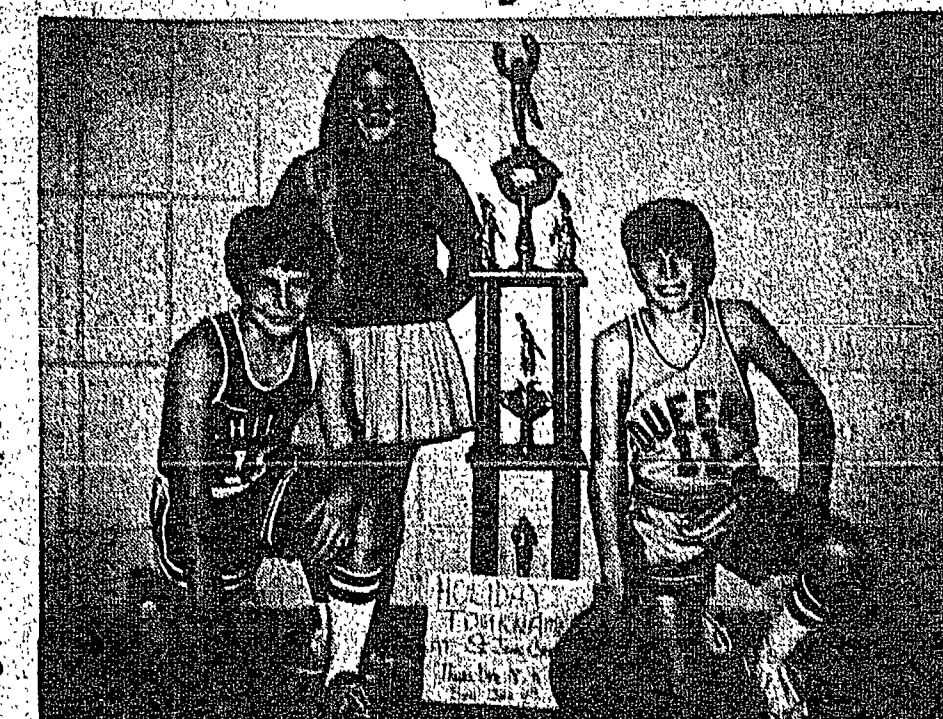

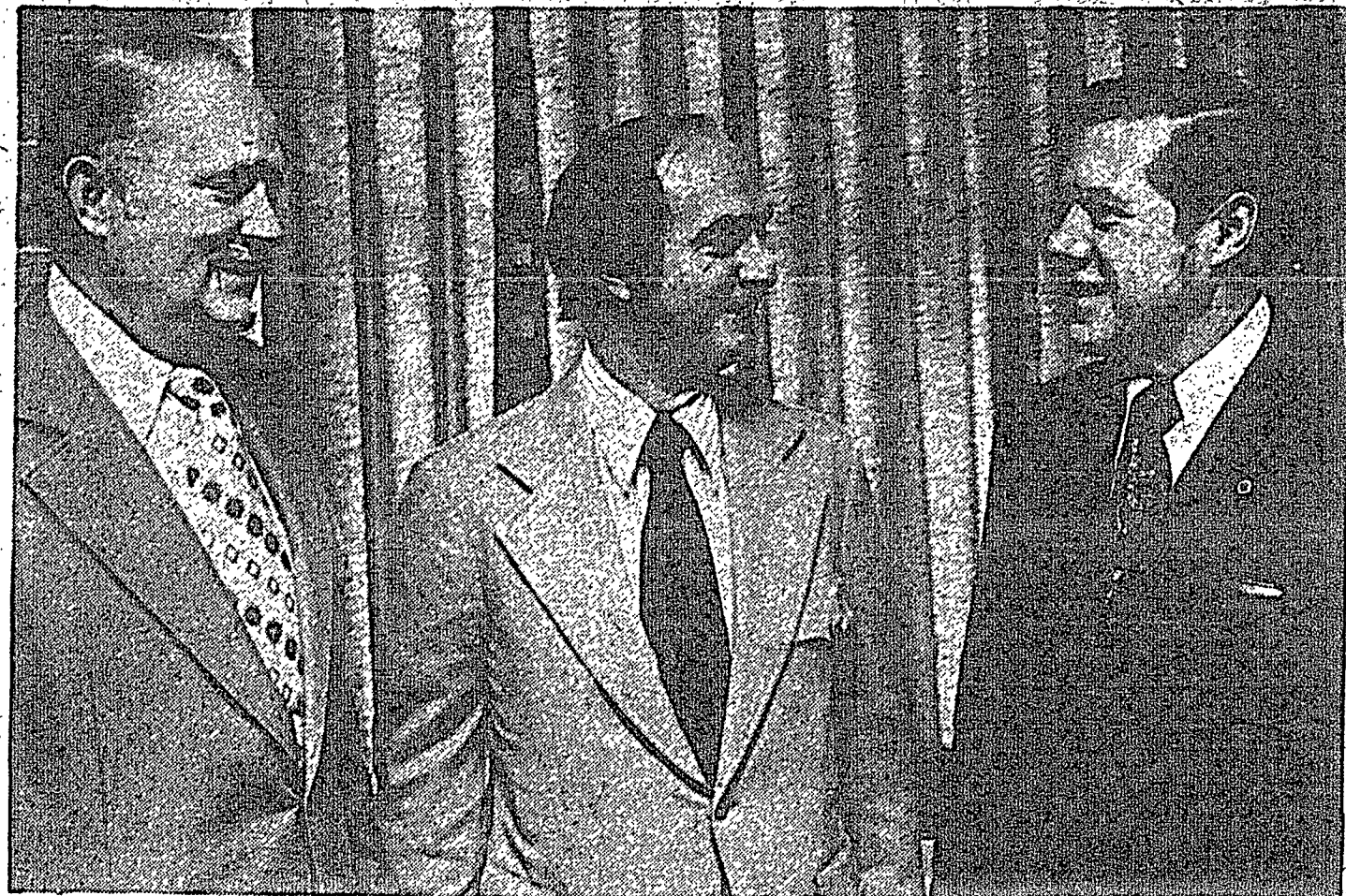

## Notre Dame swimming teams begin season

The varsity and frosh-soph swimming teams of Notre Dame H.S. in Niles began their 19th year of competition on Nov. 22 against East Leyden of Franklin Park. The varsity coach is Bill Casey who has been at NDHS since 1959 and the frosh-soph coach is Al Brennan, an alumnus of the Class of 1970 who joined the faculty last year after getting his A.B. at the University of Illinois in Urbana. Al teaches in the Communications Arts Dept. Bill Casey taught biology for many years but is now full time in the Phy. Ed. Department.

Notre Dame lost to East Leyden 45-38 but won 6 out of the 11 events. The varsity could possibly have won a 7th event in the 100 yd. backstroke, but senior Tim Burke missed a touch with his hand at the 50 yd. turn and was disqualified. Tim had won the 50 yd. freestyle earlier in the meet. The only double winner for N.D. was senior Brian Walsh of Niles who won the 200 and 500 yd. freestyle events. Another winner was Jeff Stahl of Morton Grove in the 100 yd. breaststroke. The 400 yd. freestyle of Jim McNab of Niles, Dave Herdrich of Des Plaines, Eric Otten of Morton Grove, and Brian Walsh also took a first place. Jim Brennan of Niles and Joe Koziol of Glenview took first and second places in the diving.

The next day at the St. Patrick H.S. Shamrock Relays Notre Dame's two man diving relay of Brennan and Koziol took ND's only first place trophies and also set a new meet record for their performance. Brennan is a senior and Koziol is a junior. Other award winning performances at the Shamrock Relays were a 3rd place in the 400 yd. medley relay by Burke, Stahl, Otten and Walsh and a 3rd place in the 300 yd. backstroke relay of Otten, Stahl and Jim Schwarz of Des Plaines took a 4th place. The 200 yd. frosh-soph medley relay took a 5th place. Members of this relay were Wally Schreiman of Chicago, Jim Clausen of Niles, Jerry Waters of Niles, and Mike Zonsius of Niles. East Leyden and St. Patrick both tied for first place with 124 out of the 8 teams entered. Stagg H.S. was 2nd with 97, Forest View was 3rd with 74 and Notre Dame tied with West Leyden for 4th place with 70

points. York H.S. had 48 and St. Ignatius had 41 points.

The ND varsity lost to Arlington Heights on Dec. 2 by 114-54. On Dec. 4 the ND varsity lost to Prospect by 101-71 but the ND frosh-soph team won 88-56.5. On Dec. 6 the ND varsity beat Naperville Central by 88-84 and the ND frosh-soph team also won 100-52. The losses were highlighted by good performances as diver Jim Brennan remained undefeated and set a new team record at Prospect with 262.6 points and a new pool record at Naperville Central. Senior backstroke Tim Burke is also undefeated posting a 1:00.8 against Arlington. This was his best performance so far in the season. Senior Eric Otten also turned in a fine performance in the 100 yd. breaststroke.

Capt. Brian Walsh is the varsity's big winner this season, but it was his finish that gave a 3rd place to the "B" freestyle relay and his team a hard fought victory over Naperville Central. The meet went back and forth and with one event remaining N.D. was winning 82-76. Naperville's last relay was loaded with their best swimmers and a 2nd place finish for ND would have ended the meet in a tie. However, Coach Casey gambled and placed his top freestyler Brian Walsh on the ND "B" relay in hope that they could take a 3rd place and the "A"

relay would still take a 2nd place. This would give ND the victory. It took a good performance by all 8 varsity freestylers on both relays to make this plan work. ### Maine East's child care occupations program

The Child Care Occupations program at Maine East is unique because it enables students to teach children and to learn from them.

The five year old program consists of 12 children who attend the Maine East program for one semester at \$25. The nursery school meets Tuesday thru Friday from 12:30-2:30 p.m. On Mondays the 20 juniors and seniors in the program have a staff meeting, during which they plan the week's activities and discuss learning experiences.

"Social development is the most important thing a child learns in our nursery school," says Ms. Mimi Cocconato. "I want the children to get along with each other and to feel that school is fun. They're so anxious to come to school at this age. That's an enthusiasm that I don't ever want to see lost."

The children are always kept active and interested. Everyday there's an art lesson and a juice time. Ms. Cocconato prefers they

drink milk, but sometimes they talk her into something else. At times the children and their teachers make pizza, popcorn, a tossed salad, or fondue, but cheese and crackers are avoided. The children also see Maine East plays, hear the orchestra, watch Maine East swim classes and visit the nurses. A trip to the fire department is generally planned, and they usually get a visit from Officer Friendly.

Ms. Cocconato and one or two students from the class visit each child's home during the semester and meet their families. Mothers, in turn, visit the nursery school. Each Maine East student in class supervises one child and is required to do a case study during the semester.

The only pre-requisite to the course is Child Development, which can be taken at the same time as Child Care Occupations. There is an out-of-school program, also. Twenty senior girls teach at various neighborhood nursery schools.

### Holy Family offers "Rooming-In" for new parents

From the time of the birth of a child at Holy Family Hospital, both the father and mother have an opportunity to become better acquainted with their new family member through the hospital's new Rooming-In program.

Holy Family's "family oriented" approach begins with prenatal classes which enable the father to be present in the delivery room for the birth if he wishes.

Instead of keeping the newborn in the nursery, except for feedings, the mother may have her baby at her bedside in a bassinet for as long as she wishes between 9 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. except during regular visiting hours and with the approval of her physician. 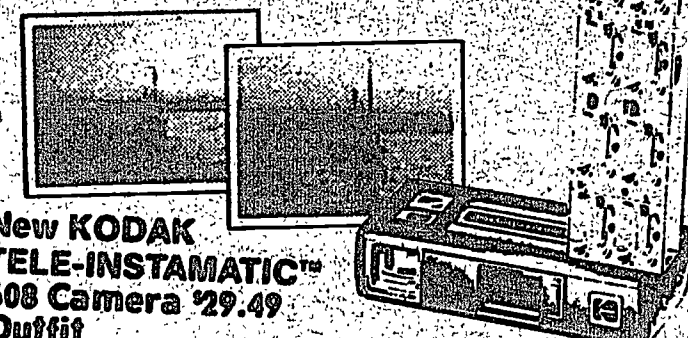
The clerk turned his back to get a room key. When he turned around the man displayed a light wood baseball bat and demanded, "Give me your money." The

## Pack 275 celebrates Indian Festival

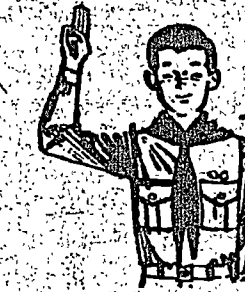

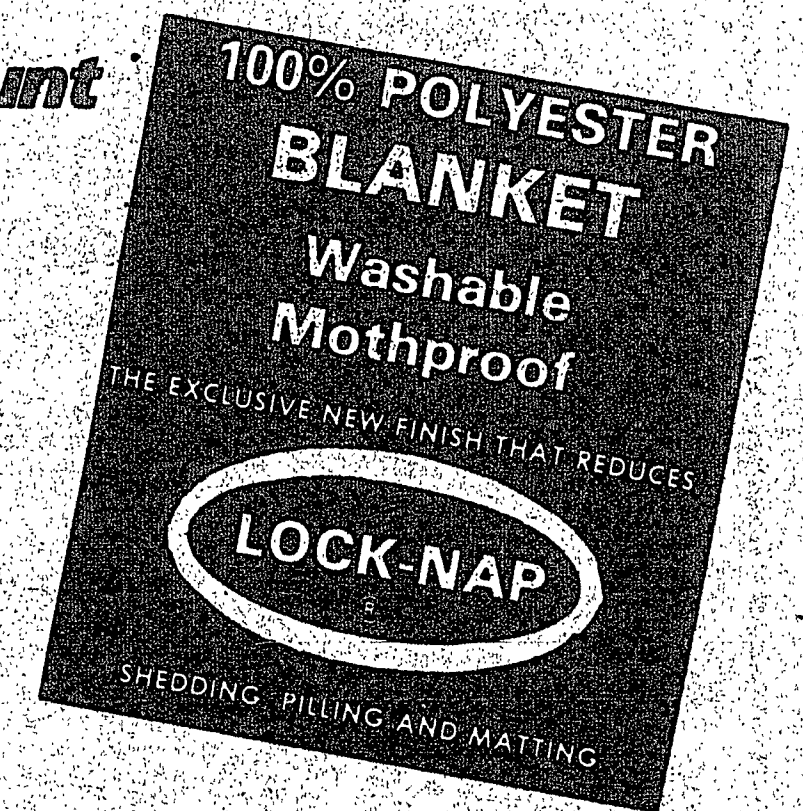

"The meeting was specifically called to decide the fate of the organization," explained Dorothy Wentink, secretary.

The action brought to an end an active civic organization that was to have marked its 47th year of operation in the Village as a fund raising group that thru the years had helped many projects within the community.

According to Frank McTier, the Morton Grove Days idea was born as an outgrowth of a small group of women called the Women's War Workers Circle, that banded together to raise funds to erect a statue honoring the 'doughboys' of World War I. The money was raised and the statue was erected and still stands on the Library grounds at Lincoln and School st. as a lasting memorial.

Perhaps the most notable achievement of the Days Committee was the purchase of the land north of Dempster st. that is now Harker Park. This land was turned over to the Park District and was in essence the beginning of the Morton Grove Park District, MG Days was traditionally given monies to the Park District and in more recent times has disbursed funds to help build the Park District and in more recent

times has disbursed funds to help build the Park District buildings that occupy most park sites. Thru the years, the Police and Fire departments, the Little League, Senior Citizens and numerous other organizations and projects have received funds from the Committee. The Fourth of July Fire Works, Santa Claus comes to Morton Grove, and the Easter Egg hunt have been jointly sponsored by the Days Committee and the American Legion Post #134. The reason for the almost unanimous vote to disband was based, according to Committee spokesmen, on a waning interest of the various civic and fraternal organizations that had traditionally supported the operation with manpower, and the declining interest of the people of Morton Grove to support and patronize the Morton Grove Days Carnival.

As pointed out in the lengthy discussions that preceded the vote to disband, by Fred McClory, Ed McMahon, Phil Cancellieri and others, the Village itself has changed drastically over the past 15 or 20 years. Morton Grove has changed from small and young growing community with spirit to, in recent years, an

older and more mature community that is perhaps self satisfied and complacent.

As Jeannette Hack said, almost sadly, "I guess all of us are getting older." It was pointed out that at one time the Homeowners Groups were very active and viable. While now very few exist, and those that do, have become social organizations. According to Mrs. Hack, "It seems that the same people that worked in the various organizations 10 or 15 years ago are still holding these organizations together by their interest and hard work and that the younger or newer residents have either not been asked or are not interested in taking over the active roles in these various organizations."

Joe Schmidt echoed these sentiments also and with good reason because he has been active in the Days, the American Legion and the Little League organization for many years. "You see the same small group of people doing all the work," said Joe.

The Committee voted to disburse the remaining funds to support several Village programs that are coming up in 1976. Some \$5,000 was split among the following projects: The Morton Grove Bicentennial Commission, The Little League Baseball for Boys organization, and monies for the erection of a flag pole and plaque to commemorate the many years of work and achievement of the Morton Grove Days Committee.

The Morton Grove Days will be sorely missed, said Steve Yadron, who has spent many years helping the Days to be a success. "It's a very sad day for me," Yadron stated.

All the year around the Society visits the elderly and acts as big brothers in entertaining youngsters by taking them on activities thruout the city. Pete said this summer a great deal of time was spent as the college on Touhy Avenue playing with the Vietnamese children and helping them learn English.

While needs from community to community vary, the Niles Township Administration representative told us 5 families in their township area will be assisted by the Salvation Army during the holiday season.

At the Salvation Army headquarters in Evanston, 650 family units (one or more persons) will receive some aid this year. More than 2,000 applications were handed out and responses will enable 650 families to receive help from the SA.

Those applying will be eligible to receive one new toy for each child under 12 years old. Grocery certificates will be distributed enabling families to have a Christmas dinner. Certificates range from \$7 to \$20 depending upon the size of the family.

While "kettle" donations are down, one-third of the Salvation Army budget is received from people dropping coins in the kettles. All monies stay in the community.

In Evanston there is 1 social worker who receives \$600 a month for working with the Army. The lieutenant and his wife, who are weathering the cold, standing all day beside the kettles, receive their room and board and a very small check for their basic needs from the Salvation Army. Their lives are ones of great dedication.

Monday, a middle-aged man walked into Niles Family Service on Oakton Street and his story was sad and the support he received was minimal. The man said he was from Yugoslavia and is here on a visa. He has been unable to find work, and as of Monday was without any money. In a quest to financially aid the man, the Niles Township public aid assistance office refused to help him and only the Niles Township office came up with money which provided him with board and room for the night.

According to a Niles Family Service representative, the man was extremely unhappy over his position in a strange country, without any money or friends to help him.

While the joys of the holiday season are all about us, there's much need to help.

adding that amount to the Treasury; it improves the minimum tax provisions so that everybody pays some taxes and makes some tax advantages, such as a tax credit for child care expenses, accessible to more people.

"If the House version becomes law, it will eliminate only 3% of total tax preferences, but this is still the most meaningful tax reform since 1939," Mikva said. He is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, which is responsible for tax legislation and he was a leading proponent of tax reform.

Evaluating Congressional performance since January, the Congressman said, "If I were giving a report card, I'd give Congress: B or B minus."

Many problems are still unsolved and will probably stay unsolved until Congress gets some direction from the White House. "Congress functions best when it is revising and reacting to initiatives from the Administration and leadership has been sorely lacking thus far," Mikva said.

On a positive side, Mikva said he credits Congress with moving toward improving its efficiency and effectiveness thru examples such as the newly-introduced budget making procedure and the War Powers Act.

"Under the new budget procedure, Congress for the first

time is involved in setting spending priorities, not merely in reshaping a Presidential budget. Our budget is a specific limiting document and we are required to vote to increase the budget if we go beyond the approved ceiling."

The War Powers Act has enabled Congress to once again exert some influence in foreign affairs and Mikva credits the act, which is unpopular with Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, with tempering American involvement in Portugal and in moderating the Egyptian/Israeli conflict.

sure his attendance at park board meetings. An additional \$35 hourly rate was automatically raised to \$40 by the reappointment, according to Berrafato, for legal services as needed in court, preparing documents, land acquisition, etc.

Berrafato had been placed on a 3-month evaluation last June by the park board. Park Commissioners Millie Jones and Jeffrey Arnold had voted at that time for immediate severance of the attorney's services, basing their decision on what they termed "delayed legal actions and the need for an attorney who would move decisively."

The decision for reappointment was reached last Tuesday, Dec. 9, following six park committee meetings and interviews, since last July, of 8 lawyer applicants from "in and out of Niles", according to Park Board President Jones.

"Interviews with lawyer candidates gave us (Park Board) a tremendous insight into the responsibilities of the job," said the park president, admitting that initially the commissioners had no idea what questions to ask of the applicants. "The experience was a tremendous education to us as a Board in learning the involvement and time expended by the attorney in park affairs."

She stated Berrafato was the one person "on whom the commissioners could agree conclusively.... It's the best decision we've made and a good one."

ance vehicles in addition to service facilities and parts storage. The 4,000 sq. ft. office portion provides for both Public Works and Water Meter personnel, and it will contain a women's washroom which has been a long-time request from the female employees of the Village.

The needs of the Public Works Department have been overlooked for many years as they operated out of the original 7,500 sq. ft. building for more than 20 years. During this time, the Village's population and maintenance work continued to grow; and now, Mr. Dahm's department will have a total facility of 20,000 sq. ft. by mid 1976.

Park Director Bill Hughes was very pleased with the Board's decision, commending the attorney who, he said, has been extremely helpful to the youthful director in reviewing past park history and other matters.

Taken unaware by his non-reappointment last May, Berrafato, 47, said he was not surprised by the Board's decision Tuesday night for reappointment.

"I'm sure the Board made the right decision," he commented with a trace of humor and in serious vein said, "The Board satisfied themselves as to the responsibilities of the position and are obviously pleased with their conclusions."

A resident of Morton Grove since 1957 Berrafato has served as village attorney in his town for over a year. He is married and has 7 children, ranging in age from 10 years to 22 years.

In other action: Commissioners approved a tabled motion for a \$2,604.07 payment to James Clark Company. Approval of payment had been tabled for proper evaluation of information regarding tax bills and leasing of the Tam Golf Course property to the park district by J. Emil Anderson.

A meeting date of Jan. 6 was selected by the Board for determination of a fuller, inter-relationship basis with the Park Director.

Commissioners verbally resolved to reaffirm Board policy authorizing the Park Treasurer to invest funds under State laws and ordinances government Park Districts. Under questioning by Commissioner Bill Keener, Attorney Berrafato conditionally set investments of funds (for the present time) to a \$40,000 limitation of insurance. Responsi-

bility of the investments is placed on the treasurer by the State, said Berrafato, preferably following legal counsel and approval.

Park Director Hughes gained approval of commissioners to sell park equipment (a truck) under sealed bids.

The annual Children's Christmas Party at Grennan Heights will be Saturday, Dec. 20, at 1 p.m.

The Grennan Heights Recreation Center will be open from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily during the Christmas vacation. Public skating at the Ballard Ice Rink will begin at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

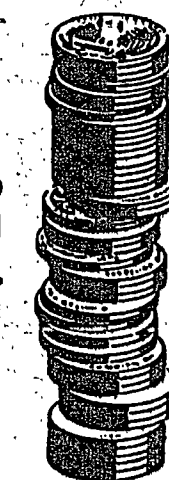

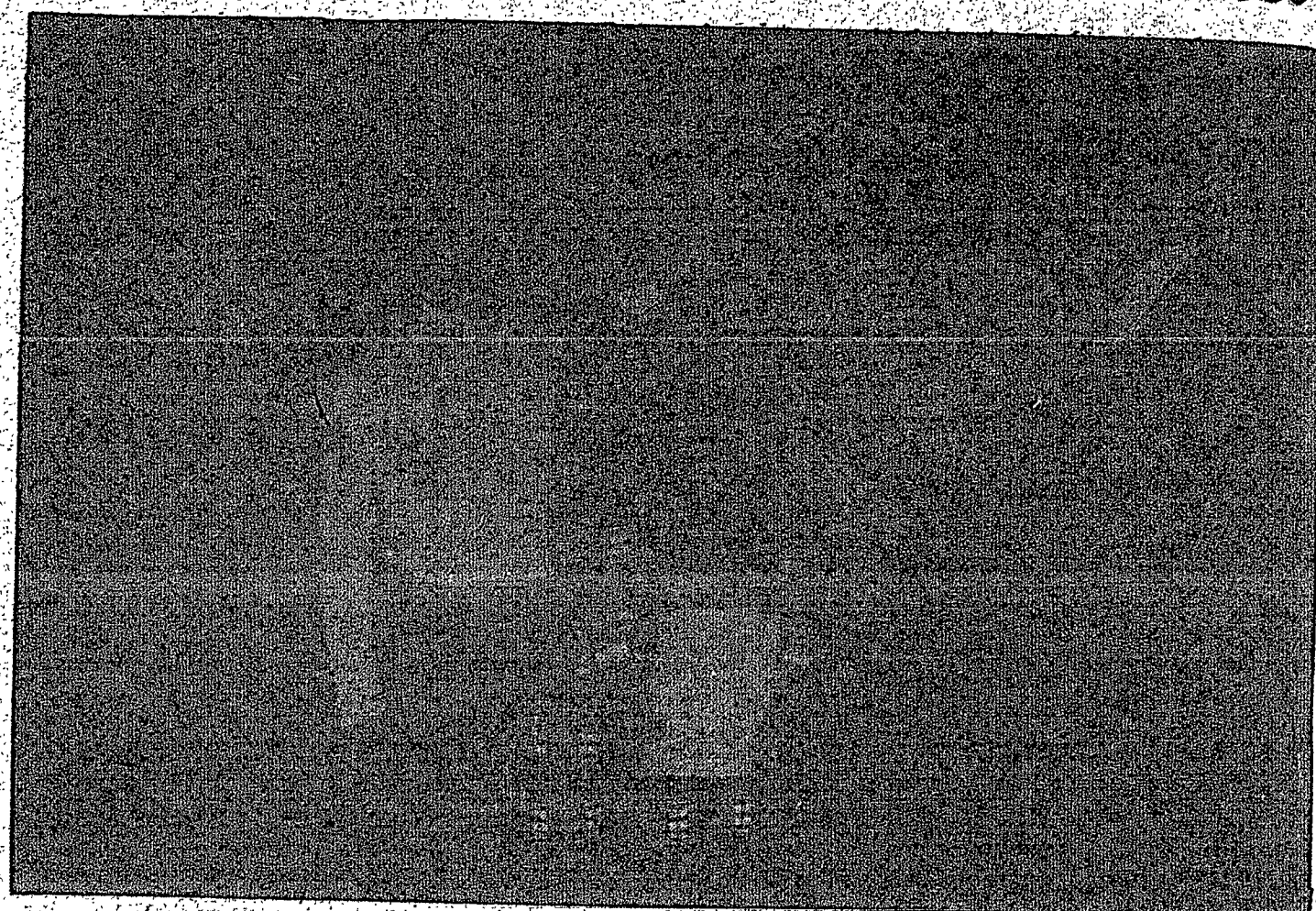

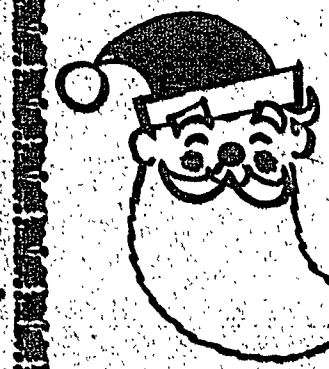

## Candidates file petitions

## Young files nominating petition with state board

Former Congressman Samuel H. Young, a Republican candidate for re-election in the 10th Congressional District, announced today that his nominating petition was filed with the State Board of Elections in Springfield on Monday, Dec. 8, at 8 a.m.

In a statement issued from his campaign headquarters in Skokie, Young, who served as an elected member of the 93rd Congress during 1973 and 1974, said: "Without detracting from the importance of an election of the President, I believe the governmental branch with the most power is the Congress because it is that body which is responsible for the expenditure of money and passage of laws."

Noting the current high rate of inflation, Young stated that it is the "excessive deficit spending by the majority of Congress which caused the high unemployment and inflation we have experienced during the past several years."

He said: "It will take a change of Congress to change the direction of the country. While electing a President is important, it is not nearly as significant as electing a new majority of Congressmen. It is the Congress who makes the laws and spends the money while the President can only make recommendations and proposals."

Young, who resides in Glenview, stressed that price controls "have been a failure as a solution to shortages in this country," and he emphasized that "cutting the federal budget is the way to slow the inflation rate."

According to Young, the majority of Congress is "filled with too many politicians who are concerned with short-run cosmetic action."

He said he believes the majority of Congressmen "are neglecting unpopular but long-term actions necessary to stimulate the economy and stop inflation."

On Friday, Dec. 19, the Board of Elections will, by lot, select ballot positions for each candidate. There are two other Republican candidates in the 10th Congressional district who have announced their intentions to seek the Congressional seat.

Young welcomed his opposition and stated that he was pleased there is "enough interest and vitality in the Republican party to develop three candidates."

"I feel the luncheon was extremely successful in establishing more effective lines of communication between Mr. Finley's office, the Secretary of State's office and our local elected officials," Sutker said.

"Hopefully, meetings such as these will improve the productivity of all our offices," he continued.

More such gatherings are planned, Sutker concluded.

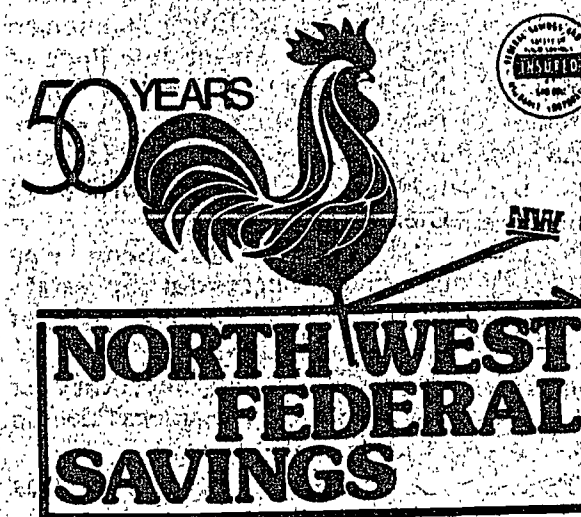
