## From the Left Hand

They hammered down Niles so tightly the past week, a tornado going down Milwaukee Avenue wouldn't blow a piece of paper across the street. The 'hammer-downers' were Mike Howlett workers who posted signs for their gubernatorial candidate on telephone poles, abandoned gas stations, a building next to a tavern, and on all visually-available sights up and down Niles' main street.

Tuesday Nick Blase said Niles might take some of the signs down since signs on privately-abandoned buildings are generally not allowed. He said posting signs the weekend before an election are generally overlooked but advertising 8 weeks before the primary makes the sign pollution a bit much.

Blase had been a supporter of Governor Walker the past 3 years but once he came out and endorsed Howlett, the hammer and nails guys really took over.

Nick said he was at a luncheon with suburban Democratic committeemen and Walker's right hand, Vic DeGrazia, when tempers flared and DeGrazia's alleged 'high-handedness' resulted in Blase's loss of support for Walker. Blase said the group told DeGrazia the need for a direct line with the governor to help with suburban problems. Blase said the hot-tempered, blunt-speaking DeGrazia told the committeemen suburbia wasn't going to re-elect Walker. Blase said DeGrazia brusquely added if the committeemen didn't help Walker in '76, Walker would fight them when they were up for re-election in '78. The comment tossed the meeting up for grabs and DeGrazia got up and walked out of the luncheon get-together.

Niles' Mayor-Committeeman added the Walker people have many younger guys who Blase feels are disruptive in the political arena.

Board updates obscenity code

## Stricter licensing in Village

Village trustees Tuesday night by amendments tightened the reins on village. Licensing and Business Regulations Codes and weakened the Obscenity Code by defining obscenities in specifics. Amendment to the License and Business Regulations section 19-34 empowers the mayor to suspend or revoke licenses following a public hearing before an officer appointed by the Mayor. The mayor is also given authority to close down a business following a Special Hearing by reason of

unseemly conduct. Liquor licenses are excepted as being in a class by themselves. Purpose of the amendments, according to Village Attorney Richard Troy is to bring the Niles Code in accordance with new rulings by Illinois and U.S. courts. The courts have become increasingly critical during the past 8 to 12 months, according to Troy, of licensing procedures and have decreed that the regulating officer cannot preside as a

## Zoning Board's review of fees benefits homeowner

The Niles Zoning Board Wednesday night recommended a reduction in fee to homeowners petitioning for zoning variations, an increase in commercial fees and a fee increase for Planned Unit Development (PUD) in proportion to the size of the area development.

Commissioners unanimously recommended a reduction from \$75 to a \$50 fee for residential variations. The fee to commercial developers for rezoning and Special Use petitions was set at \$100. Planned Unit Development fees were proposed from a present \$150 for increase on the following scale: up to one acre, \$500; 1 acre and less than 5 acres, \$750; 5 acres and less than 10, \$1,000; 10 acres and less than 15, \$1,250; 15 acres and less than 20, \$1,500; and 20 acres, \$1,750.

Wednesday night's action was the result of a recommendation to the Zoning Board last October by Bldg. and Zoning Director Joseph Salerno for a reduction of \$25 of the \$75 fee charged to homeowners petitioning for variations.

"The same fee is charged to a homeowner for a variation hearing which takes approximately 15 minutes as compared with the lengthier, three or more meetings required for a full rezoning hearing," he said. The \$25 charge would cover legal publications costs and administrative costs, he said.

It was the Board decision at that time to review all zoning petition fees, projecting a decrease in residential fee and increases in PUD and commercial fees in view of the changing economy.

Discussion Wednesday night of a survey covering fees by surrounding communities indicated

an average zoning fee in 21 communities of approximately \$100 with a median fee of \$50. In Niles the present regular petitions require a \$75 fee and a PUD fee of \$150.

Other communities use flat fees according to the survey but distinguish among two or three case petitions (industrial, commercial, fencing, rezoning, etc.). Some communities charge per hearing, other base fees on administrative costs and six communities use a schedule of detailed fees in preference to a flat fee.

Niles commissioners Wednesday night set the homeowner variation fee at \$50 to prevent an indiscriminate "influx" of petitions. Increases in fee for commercial and PUD were noted on basis of increase in costs and profits by developers which, in PUD, noted Commissioner Charles O'Grady, could go as high as 600%.

In other action the Zoning Board denied petition by Frank Candir of 8355 Maynard rd. for a sideyard variation for construction of a room addition to his home.

On basis of denial commissioners noted that the 7 area lots originally had been subdivided to provide for construction of garages. The petition did not allow for the village requirement for off-street parking for 2 cars, said Comr. Ken Cohen. Approval of the room addition, he said, would jeopardize community character as a whole since prior conditions had been set on the property.

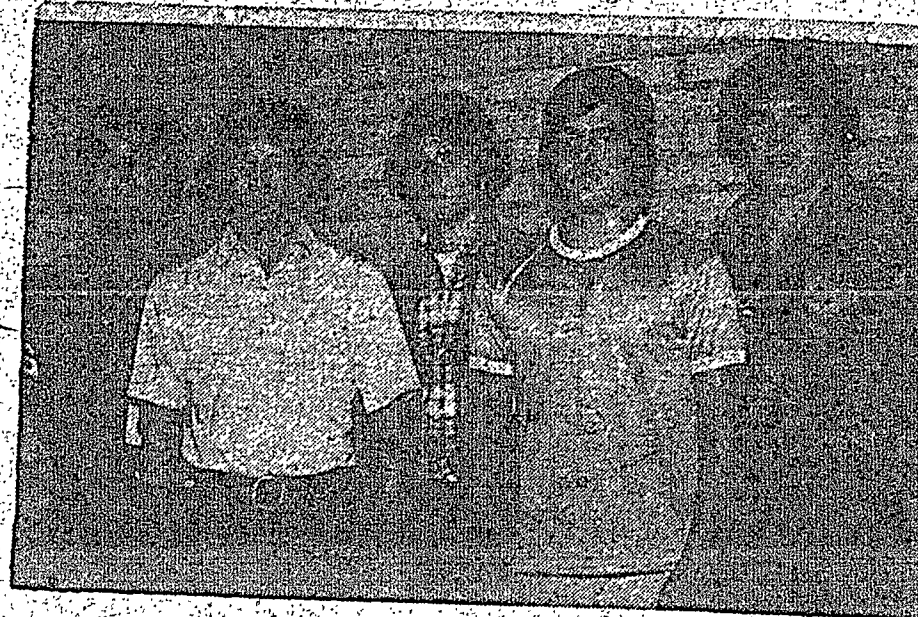
## Freshman "A" Basketball

### District 71 lunch price policies

The Niles Elementary School District #71, Clarence E. Culver, Superintendent, in accordance with the provisions of Public Law 94-105, has announced its amended policy to include and/or increase the eligibility for reduced price meals. Local school officials have adopted the following family size/income criteria for determining eligibility under the free and reduced price lunch program.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown are eligible for either free meals and free milk, or reduced price meals. Families not meeting the income criteria, but with other unusual expenses due to high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of income, special education expenses due to

the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses may also be eligible. In addition, children whose parents or guardians have become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced price meals or free milk, provided that the loss of income causes the family income, during the period of unemployment, to be within the eligibility criteria.

Application forms are available at the principal's office in each school. If you feel that you may be eligible, you are urged to contact the school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children, living with them, and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for these children, they should contact the school.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of Child Nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

### Proposed District 207 school calendar for 1976-77

A school calendar for the 1976-77 school year for the four Maine Township High Schools has been developed and presented to the District 207 Board of Education for consideration. The Board has stated that it will act on the matter at its Jan. 26 meeting.

The proposed calendar provides for 185 teaching and/or teacher institute days in addition to authorized vacation periods and legal holidays. It proposes that students begin school on Tuesday, Sept. 7, the day after Labor Day; have a two-week Christmas vacation period; a Spring vacation at the end of the third quarter, consisting of five school days beginning Monday, March 28. Thanksgiving Day, a

legal holiday, will be observed the fourth Thursday in November, with Friday, Nov. 26, the day after Thanksgiving, included as a school holiday in the proposed calendar.

Other legal holidays scheduled to be observed during the 1976-77 school year are: Labor Day, Sept. 6; Columbus Day, Oct. 11; Veterans' Day, Nov. 11; Good Friday, Apr. 8; and Memorial Day, May 30. School closing is scheduled for June 17, 1977.

The calendar was developed in accord with the district's school calendar policy, and corresponds with calendars of the other school districts in Maine Township.

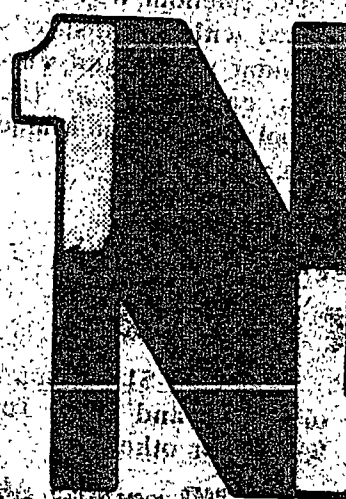

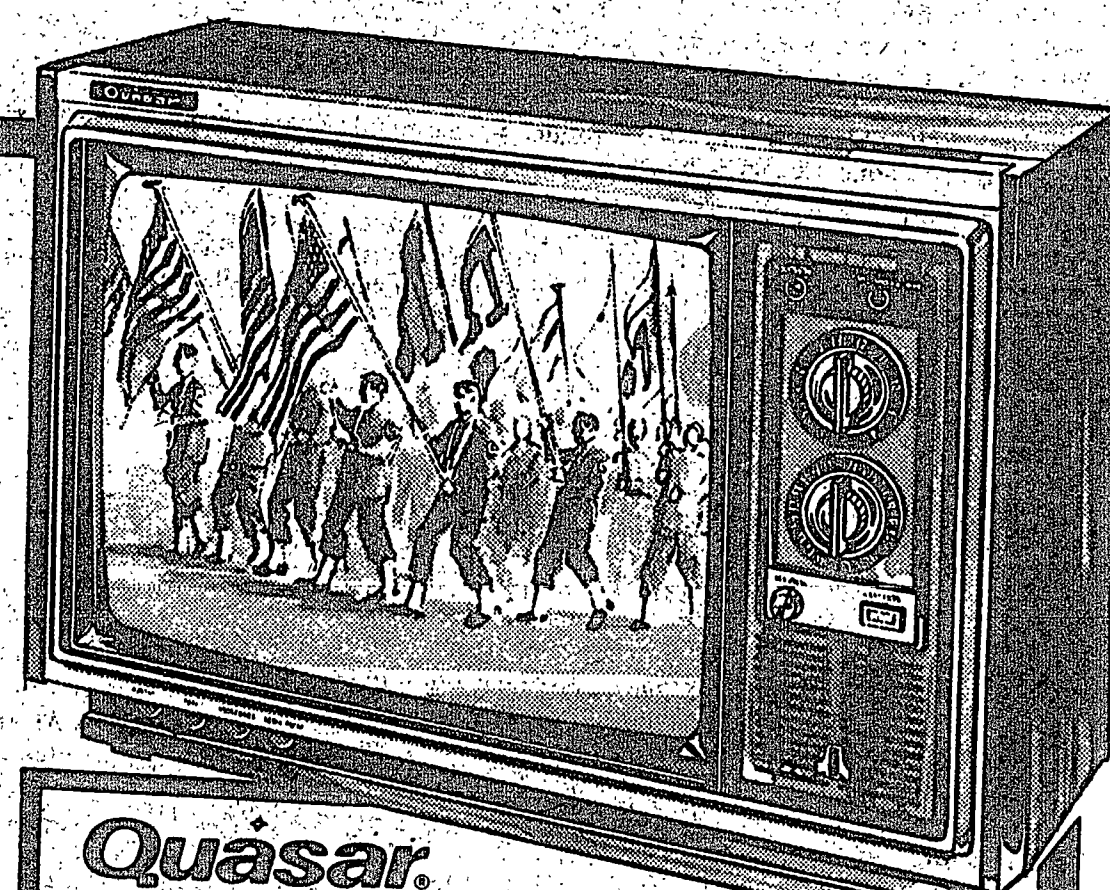

hearing officer at license proceedings. In Niles the Village Clerk, under summary action, previously had the authority for license suspension or revocation.

Section 19-10 of the village code which authorized license revocation or suspension by village authorities following notice and a hearing was amended to delete "notice and hearing".

Amending subsections of the Obscenity Code tied down the definition of "obscene" to specific descriptions of sexual conduct in comparison to the original Code which termed as "obscene" any material which generally or as a whole pertained to sex. The village ordinance, according to Troy, "now must be more explicit in the definition of what is 'obscene'."

In other business trustees approved rezoning under Planned Unit Development Major Change for a Tarsi's Pizza (full service restaurant and carry-out pizza) at 9216 Golf rd. in the Greenlakes Shopping Center, predicated under installation of a second washroom. Niles ordinance requires 2 washrooms in restaurants.

Under village ordinance according to Mayor Nicholas Blase, Niles has the right to opinion on events within a mile and a half of Niles boundaries. Niles has always objected to dense rezoning (R6 classification) which allows for heavy population.

Approved Plat for dedication by Sentinel Construction Company of 7 feet on Howard-st. for a public street.

Extended the deadline for village vehicle stickers to coincide with the deadline set for Illinois license plates (at least to Feb. 15).

Referred to the Plan Commission a petition for a rear yard variation for construction of a single family home at 9191 Courtland.

Announced formal recognition of the nation's 200th anniversary with the first bicentennial event of "America - We Love You", a 14-act-musical comedy co-sponsored by the Niles Bi-centennial Commission and the
