

"It's the first time," commented a club member, "that the senior citizens at the back table ever laid their cards down!"

A Park Ridge woman who refused to rise to the bait in the old, phony "pigeon-drop" scheme was home safe with her money said Niles police last week



Inspection of the wallet revealed it allegedly contained \$3.000.


The woman who found the wallet said she worked in the Golf Mill Sears store and that she







The GTA was organized back in Aug., 1975, when disapproval of management's new garbage removal system brought tenants together on a common gripe. Once together, the group immediately became aware that the management had been unresponsive to many other problems existing in the apartment complex such as poor maintenance, extermination, water and security. Five hundred tenants rallied in October at a mass meeting that brought the support of Congressman Abner Mikva, state representatives, and county officials who spoke at the meeting.

Since that time, GTA members have been working on various projects to get the attention of the complex operators, U.S. Managers, a California based company. U.S. Managers has remained unresponsive, and GTA decided to take stronger action by appealing to the county.

The method used to get county response was a checklist that was distributed to the 1,700 apartments. Results from the 500 persons who responded to the survey indicated that conditions were as bad as expected. Examples: have mice or roaches, 38%; rusty water. 89%; inadequate building security. 82%: inadequate garbage removal. 61%; excessive dog droppings on lawn, 70%; and poor parking roadway conditions, 70%.

Last Tuesday, Jan. 20, officers of the GTA presented the results of the checklist along with copies of the individual completed forms and a letter of support signed by the mayors of five surrounding communities to President George Dunne. On hand to present the material were GTA President and organizer, Keith Marvin, Vice President Patton Feichter, and Attorney for Niles, Rich Troy. At that meeting, President Dunne gave his assurance that the county would take a close look at the conditions of the complex and deal with violations as prescribed by law.

The letter of mayoral support that accompanied the individual checklists stated that because the Greens may be in a state of deterioration, the communities, directly adjacent to the property



annual \$50,000 burden will have to be lived with. She said public skating is up, learn-to-skate programs have increased and the co-operative programs between Golf Maine and Morton Grove park districts have been a big plus for the district.

Millie laid great emphasis on this co-operative program When Morton Grove finally junked its plans for its own indoor ice rink, it proved a wise move. Not only have they participated in the Niles program, but adding another neighborhood rink would have added competition to the now existing community ice rinks, which are all fighting for the same limited dollars from the dwindling number of hockey players in the north and northwest areas.

While the NPD is 'fighting to keep the ice rink going', the increased parking lot at the Ballard Complex is aimed at increasing revenue after the ice rink is closed during the warmer months. Hopefully, generating business during these months would lessen the present annual \$50.000 burden.

On a sunnier note, Niles Little Tam Golf Course has proven a bonanza. The district made about \$20,000 profit last year after all expenses and bond costs were paid. Millie says happily this surplus is drawing interest, though it must remain in its present fund, to be used only for this one program. Millie noted the good season, plus from 5,000 to 10,000 more golf rounds were played at Little Tam than comparable courses. She gave praise to the management and the greens keeper for the great job they did, which, she said, was largely responsible for its success.

In other areas Ms. Jones felt there is a greater need for co-operation between the school districts and the park district. She pointed to Elk Grove Village schools which turn over their facilities to the park district after 3 p.m. daily. Their use is then transferred for recreation, an obvious common sense effort which is paid for by the same taxpayers. The facilities are fully utilized and the need for duplication of gyms and pools becomes unnecessary. Niles prexy would hope a similar effort might be considered here.

Mrs. Jones gave high praise to Niles village representatives which she contends co-operate with the park district. Decreased costs for crossing guards and loaning of equipment are two examples where the village gives positive support to the park district.

One serious area problem which must be solved is the general rowdyism in all the park areas Millie thought the emphasis of rowdyism in the Golf Mill Park gave the wrong picture last year. She said this is a general problem throughout the district and the board must-sit down and solve year. Whether supervisors will be hired from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. at all parks or the need for hiring park policemen will be among the alternatives considered in confronting the problem. Millie emphasized something must definitely be

In the swimming pool area the president noted there was a deficit of about \$15,000 which she considered normal. Even though the swarming swimmers seem to inundate the pool areas it is an expensive activity.

One question which has not been resolved is the replacement of the baby pool. A wooden deck had to be removed for health reasons and whether to replace the pool has not vet been determined.

While vandalism is a major concern she pointed to Jim Stamborski, who is in charge at the Grennan Heights park, as the man who has reduced the vandalism there to almost the zero figure. It was a major problem until Jim took over and she gave him high marks for his efforts which has almost eliminated the problem.

Millie lastly complimented Niles park director Bill Hughes whose tremendous personality has been a great plus in overcoming the public relations problem the district had in the past. She said the entire park district staff is an excellent one, and has lent much to the positive position the district is

The park president's assessment seems to be most encouraging. Remembering all the burdens and obstacles the district has had in the past years, Millie's report lends itself to a very optimistic look to the future.

'76-'77 year. But Tuesday night Gogo reiterated what he has warned many times in the past the need for closing schools. He said one, and possibly two. elementary schools should be considered to be closed for the '77-'78 year.

Dr. Gogo also proposed the board study the possibility of converting the two 7th and 8th grade junior high schools into middle schools, which would add the 6th grade to the present two-vear schools.

An expected 19% enrollment decrease by the 1979-'80 year and an anticipated \$5 million deficit by then is resulting in the school board reviewing all options for meeting the problem. Dr. Gogo noted four elementary schools would have enrollments under 400 students by next year, and noted it becomes too expensive to operate a small school.

In closing one school the annual estimated savings to the school district would be about \$200,000. In Evanston three school closings will save approximately \$600,000 each year.

If the 3-year middle school system is adopted, 2 elementary schools might be closed within the next 2 years. Moving students to the junior high school one year earlier would decrease enrollments further in the elementary schools, perhaps by as much as 20%.

The superintendent contends utilizing the junior high school for 3 grades and closing elementary schools would "sustain very qualitative programs for youngsters. The price of not doing that is an annual curtailment of services and programs."

Gogo noted it would take about 14 months of planning before a school could be closed.

The board concluded its study of options for reducing costs in the district on an upbeat. After discussing the possible use of a school principal at more than one school, reducing the number of assistant princin s, reducing after-school clubs and intra-mural or inter-school programs, board member Penny Larson suggested a cost reduction which aroused Superintendent Gogo. Mrs. Larson suggested the administrative and office staffs be reduced by 20%. Gogo, who had been almost clinical in discussing cutting costs in about 25 different areas in the district, said, "There is no way of reducing the administrative staff by 4 people", adding, "we're very conservatively staffed." Larson did not just refer to Gogo's administrative staff, but also to the office staff. Mrs. Larson said she is conditioned in the business world and this would be one area where the cost cutters would take an extra hard look. She said job descriptions might be realigned and perhaps board members should take up less time of the administrators.

In the reductions in office taffs, it was suggested each

elementary school might be reduced to one secretary, which admittedly might create a hardship. Board member Howard Lessen suggested the adminis trative workshop might also be reduced. Larry Reiss suggested specialists such as superintendents of instruction might be eliminated returning to the staff-



service agency. Youth Commission advisor and Village Trustee Abe Selman, the lone holdout against closing of Center deplored the close-down. "It's difficult to decide where the fault lies." he said.

Vandalism by the youth had continued despite efforts to initiate new programs at the Center The April smoking ban had resulted in decreased attendance. said Selman, and the kids had just begun to filter back when the latest incident occurred.



Bergquist **Issues** RTA statement

Republican candidate for 4th District Representative Roy H. Bergquist today pledged that if elected he would initiate or support legislation to ensure the suburbs a fair share of RTA funds and services.

Bergquist said the Regional Transportation Authority appears to be committed to cover evergrowing losses of the Chicago Transit Authority and thus jeopardize the financing of services for the remainder of the six-county mass transit area.

Bergquist said the RTA's current budget is \$184 million, of which more than 50% is allocated to the CTA. In the forthcoming year, he added, the CTA will devour more than 75% of the RTA budget. As a result of this projection, the RTA has proposed a 5% gasoline tax to increase its revenue."

He pointed out that taxes on gasoline now approximate 26 cents per gallon, and the increase would add another three cents on a gallon selling for 60 cents.

Bergquist said the proposed tax adds insult to injury to the suburban driver, because the burden of the tax would fall most heavily on him. Moreover, he said, the suburbanite does not seem likely to get any additional mass transit service for the new tax.

Bergquist stated that the suburbs have a population greater than that of Chicago, but will receive only one-quarter of the services provided by the RTA.

Bergquist said he did not believe it was the intent of the legislature to fund the CTA at the expense of suburban areas when it created the RTA. The intent, he added, was to provide mass transportation throughout the sixcounty area, not devise a new means of funneling funds to the CTA to cover its uncontrolled deficits.

Unless the RTA clamps down on the CTA with the same vigor it exercises in controlling suburban public transportation, the state legislature should reconsider the role and authority of the RTA, he concluded, and intends to take such action.
