## Niles Youth Center shuttered

The Niles Youth Center was closed down by the Village Board Tuesday, Jan. 20, pending further notice.

Accumulation of incidents at the Youth Center were responsible for its closing, said village officials.

A particularly malicious act of vandalism on the preceding Friday, when almost an entire wall

inside the building was destroyed, had triggered the Board decision to close the Center, according to Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase.

Despite a smoking ban set at the Center in April, 1975, there had been continual smoking in the washroom and consistent damage to the interior of the building. Ceiling and wall tiles had been torn down, fixtures

detached and damage to equipment at the Center had occurred over the past year.

Inability of proper supervision of the teens had resulted in the Friday night incident, where one or more of the youth had entered, through a fire exit door from the Center, a long corridor leading to the parking lot and deliberately kicked through a partitioning wall to the Senior Citizens Center.

No estimate of damages was available. Positive identification of the youth or youths causing the destruction could result in a court suit said the Mayor.

The Niles Youth Commission had been informed of the close-down. "The (village) Board will consider re-opening of the Center at a time when the Youth Commission can present a plan for successful programmed op-

eration," said Blase.

The teen center, a little more than a year in existence, was transferred from the Niles Park District to its present location in the Trident Community Building at 8060 Oakton which formally opened on Nov. 24, 1974. The building also houses the Senior Citizens Center and Niles Family Service, a mental-health family

## From the Left Hand

Our favorite woman park board president, Millie Jones, capsulated Niles Park District doings, giving us a very positive picture for the NPD's immediate future.

Madame president said the budget picture seems quite satisfactory, the budget being in rather good shape. She said unused moneys from the last referendum are drawing interest, much of it being earmarked for park improvements and landscaping scheduled for completion this year.

Millie feels it's important the district consider 5 to 10 years long-range plans as the district anticipates future goals and problems. Niles' Modern Millie said federal government cut-backs could create a problem, though it is not immediate. Eventually, voters may be asked to increase the corporate and recreation funds taxing maximums, though it is not likely to take place for 3 or 4 years. She noted it's important the district be very careful in its actions without cutting down its many services.

Several times Ms. Jones emphasized the tremendous support the park board received from Nilesites in passing its last referendum, and she echoed the responsibility she felt the board had in providing for residents whose vote of confidence was also accompanied by dollars for recreation.

On the negative side of the ledger, the ice rink is running about \$50,000 in the red. When we suggested the Village of Niles might lessen the park district's burden by not charging for water for park pools, Millie said a greater savings could be initiated if Commonwealth Edison could lessen the \$25,000 bill which now goes to pay for the ice rink alone. She noted the rink's burden is partly due to the declining number of hockey players in the program, pointing to the costliness of the sport, as being one reason for its decline. She felt Niles got "too carried away" when they planned the ice rink, and now the

## Vandalism forces closing of Youth Center

# Teens protest closing of Center

Approximately 25 teens waited their turn during the Jan. 26 Village Board meeting to protest the Youth Center shut-down. Board action resulted in an invitation to representative youth to attend a Youth Commission meeting Wednesday, Feb. 4, for discussion.

The Center, closed since Tuesday, Jan. 22, had been ordered shut down by the Village Board of Trustees following an ultimate act of vandalism which destroyed an inner wall of the Trident building.

The teens, aware of the Friday night vandalism, said they had no knowledge the Center was closed until the posting of a sign to that effect on Tuesday.

Numerous attempts to talk with Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase, by telephone during the following week were fruitless, said several youth and resulted in his "being short" or "refusing to talk" with the callers.

Blase was not in attendance at the Tuesday night meeting. The

## Cook County to investigate 'Greens' apartments

Within a week inspectors from Cook County President George Dunne's office will create a task force to investigate all 127 buildings of the Greens of Golf Mill apartment complex in unincorporated Maine Township. Two state's attorneys will assist in the investigation. The problems which stimulated this investigation were brought to light by a tenants group calling themselves the Greens Tenants Association.

The GTA was organized back in Aug., 1975, when disapproval of management's new garbage removal system brought tenants together on a common gripe. Once together, the group immediately became aware that the management had been unresponsive to many other problems existing in the apartment complex such as poor maintenance, extermination, water and security. Five hundred tenants rallied in October at a mass meeting that brought the support of Congressman Abner Mikva, state representatives, and county officials who spoke at the meeting.

Since that time, GTA members have been working on various projects to get the attention of the complex operators, U.S. Managers, a California based company. U.S. Managers has remained unresponsive, and GTA decided to take stronger action by appealing to the county.

The method used to get county response was a checklist that was distributed to the 1,700 apartments. Results from the 500 persons who responded to the survey indicated that conditions were as bad as expected. Examples: have mice or roaches, 38%; rusty water, 89%; inadequate building security, 82%; inadequate garbage removal, 61%; excessive dog droppings on lawn, 70%; and poor parking roadway conditions, 70%.

Last Tuesday, Jan. 20, officers of the GTA presented the results of the checklist along with copies of the individual completed forms and a letter of support signed by the mayors of five surrounding communities to President George Dunne. On hand to present the material were GTA President and organizer, Keith Marvin, Vice President Patton Feichter, and Attorney for Niles, Rich Troy. At that meeting, President Dunne gave his assurance that the county would take a close look at the conditions of the complex and deal with violations as prescribed by law.

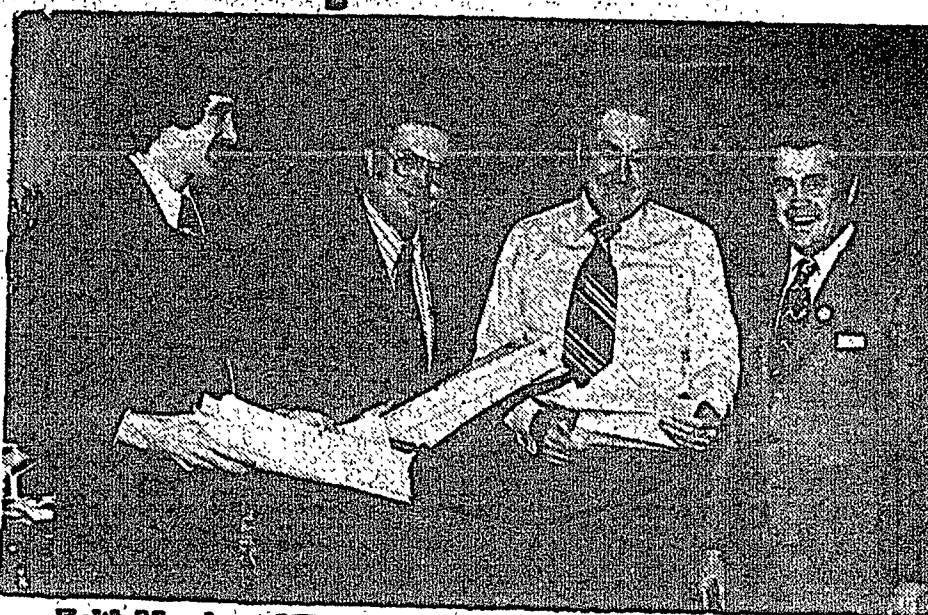
The letter of mayoral support that accompanied the individual checklists stated that because the Greens may be in a state of deterioration, the communities directly adjacent to the property

may be affected similarly. The letter urged the County Board to assign the proper personnel to correct the problems. Mayor Nicholas B. Blase of Niles wrote the letter and as well as signing it himself, got the signatures of Mayors Herbert Behrel of Des Plaines, Martin Butler of Park Ridge, Jule C. Bode of Morton Grove, and Edward Patton of Glenview.

Just as promised, President Dunne arranged a prompt meeting to discuss Greens' problems and solutions for Friday, Jan. 23. Although GTA officers were unavailable to attend the meeting given on short notice, others attending were Commissioners William Harris and Raymond Welsh of Cook County Department of Building and Zoning, Robert DeJounge of the Cook County Health Department, three

states attorneys, and surprisingly enough, an executive director of Field Operations for U.S. Managers, Henry Olek.

The meeting lasted two hours and covered the problems presented by the Greens Tenants Association, responsibilities of correction, past complaints and lawsuits from individual tenants, corrections already underway by the Greens management, and details of the County's plans to investigate the property. When the investigation is complete and where code violations are discovered, formal complaints will be filed by the County. U.S. Managers will be given a reasonable amount of time to comply. If they do not, the States Attorneys will begin legal proceedings.

reduced lunch policy

Letters have been sent to parents of Maine Township High School students reminding them that if they meet certain income criteria, their children are eligible for free milk and free lunches, or for reduced price lunches, served at the district's four high schools under the National School Lunch Program.

Income eligibility guidelines are listed below. Children from families with incomes greater than those shown in the guidelines but with unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30% of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster losses, may also be eligible.

In addition, children whose parents or guardians have been unemployed are eligible provided that the loss of income causes the family income, during the period of unemployment, to be within the eligibility criteria. Parents may apply at any time during the year if they believe their children are eligible for benefits. In certain cases, foster children are also eligible.

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## Report on North Maine Fire Department

Dale Moore, Chief of the North Maine Fire Protection District Fire Department, has released the Department's Annual Report for the year of 1975.

One of the highlights of the year was in the improvement of the District's Emergency Medical Services. Through the passing of the Ambulance Referendum, in 1974, the District was able to purchase an ambulance and equipment, and add additional personnel to the department.

A total of 500 alarms were responded to by the department. The alarm total for 1975 was an increase of 131 alarms over 1974. During the year buildings, automobiles, trucks and contents valued at the sum of \$17,147,551 were involved in fire, with a fire loss of \$52,255. The fire loss of 1975 was a decrease of

\$197,389.66 from the year of 1974.

The report also covered the Bureau of Fire Prevention, Training Program, Apparatus Maintenance and Inspection Program, Fire-Prevention Program, Hydrant Maintenance Program, and personnel information on members of the department.

In the list of recommendations, to the Trustees of the District, Chief Moore recommended that additional personnel be added to the Fire Department.

In the Summary of the report, Chief Moore said he felt that the Annual Report for the year of 1975 shows that the department has again made fine progress. He said his department was extremely proud of the accomplishments and progress that the department has made during its

first six years of operation.

Chief Moore said that the operation of the department with limited manpower had placed quite a load on all of the department's personnel. He was very proud of the cooperation and effort expended by all of the officers and firemen, both paid and paid-on-call. He extended his sincere appreciation to all of the department's personnel. Chief Moore made special mention of the cooperation received from the Board of Trustees and other District Officials.

## Grazian challenges suburban judicial candidates

Suburban Cook County judicial candidates, on the Republican ballot, this week were given a challenge to submit themselves for merit selection prior to the March 16 primary from fellow GOP candidate, Leonard R. Grazian.

Grazian's proposal followed a recent one by candidate Brian Duff, chairman of a group of nine judicial hopefuls, who said they support merit selection of judges, rather than by political vote.

A practicing attorney for 25 years and president of the Maine Township High School Board of Education, Grazian said Monday, "I am sorry to resort to the press, but I sent my challenge in letter form to five of the candidates and received no reply." Duff's announced support of merit selection received daily newspaper, TV and radio coverage.

The Morton Grove resident said that thus far the only reply came from Des Plaines resident William R. Jacobs, also a candidate for a suburban judgeship. Jacobs concurred completely with Grazian's idea of pre-primary selection on merit.

Five suburban judgeships, newly created by the legislature, are open in Cook County. Four vacated spots for the suburban race will also have candidates vying.

"The anointed ones have not as yet accepted the challenge of the rebels," Grazian said.

Grazian and Jacobs decided to run as independent Republicans after the slate-making committee

avoided selection of candidates from Maine Township.

The five GOP endorsed candidates to whom Grazian put the challenge were George Marovic of South Holland, Richard Petracca of Chicago Heights, Edward C. Hofert of Mt. Prospect, State Rep. Romie Palmer of Blue Island and State Rep. Duff of Wilmette.

Grazian said in his letter, "I am delighted to note your public stand concerning Merit selection of judges."

"I, also, firmly believe that merit selection of judges is the best. In fact, I feel so strongly about merit selection, that I am willing to submit my name along with yours and all other Republican candidates to present ourselves before an impartial group of attorneys, selected by the Chicago Bar Assn., the Chicago Council of Lawyers, all suburban bar associations, on a weighted basis, and before a group of impartial citizens selected by the Better Government Assn., and let them recommend to us whom they believe to be the best five of the group of eleven Republicans seeking the aforesaid office in the March 16 Republican primary."

The candidate then proposed that those not recommended withdraw as candidates. Grazian concluded, "Why should we wait for the day (which may never come) for a law to be passed concerning merit selection of judges, when we can voluntarily do what we believe to be right and correct?"

## Bergquist names campaign finance chairman



Roy H. Bergquist, Republican candidate for state representative from the 4th district, has named Len Hauber, 712 Babetta, Park Ridge, to be his finance chairman.

Hauber, a former three-term Park Ridge alderman (3rd), has

also served on the District 64 school board caucus, and the Park Ridge United Fund.

He is a former VFW Commander, a former Maine Township G.O.P. precinct captain, and has been active in Park Ridge politics. He is currently credit advisor for Newark Electronics Corp.

annual \$50,000 burden will have to be lived with. She said public skating is up, learn-to-skate programs have increased, and the co-operative programs between Golf Maine and Morton Grove park districts have been a big plus for the district.

Millie laid great emphasis on this co-operative program. When Morton Grove finally junked its plans for its own indoor ice rink, it proved a wise move. Not only have they participated in the Niles program, but adding another neighborhood rink would have added competition to the now existing community ice rinks, which are all fighting for the same limited dollars from the dwindling number of hockey players in the north and northwest areas.

While the NPD is 'fighting to keep the ice rink going', the increased parking lot at the Ballard Complex is aimed at increasing revenue after the ice rink is closed during the warmer months. Hopefully, generating business during these months would lessen the present annual \$50,000 burden.

On a sunnier note, Niles Little Tam Golf Course has proven a bonanza. The district made about \$20,000 profit last year after all expenses and bond costs were paid. Millie says happily this surplus is drawing interest, though it must remain in its present fund, to be used only for this one program. Millie noted the good season, plus from 5,000 to 10,000 more golf rounds were played at Little Tam than comparable courses. She gave praise to the management and the greens keeper for the great job they did, which, she said, was largely responsible for its success.

In other areas Ms. Jones felt there is a greater need for co-operation between the school districts and the park district. She pointed to Elk Grove Village schools which turn over their facilities to the park district after 3 p.m. daily. Their use is then transferred for recreation, an obvious common sense effort which is paid for by the same taxpayers. The facilities are fully utilized and the need for duplication of gyms and pools becomes unnecessary. Niles prexy would hope a similar effort might be considered here.

Mrs. Jones gave high praise to Niles village representatives which she contends co-operate with the park district. Decreased costs for crossing guards and loaning of equipment are two examples where the village gives positive support to the park district.

One serious area problem which must be solved is the general rowdiness in all the park areas. Millie thought the emphasis of rowdiness in the Golf Mill Park gave the wrong picture last year. She said this is a general problem throughout the district and the board must sit down and solve it this year. Whether supervisors will be hired from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. at all parks or the need for hiring park policemen will be among the alternatives considered in confronting the problem. Millie emphasized something must definitely be done.

In the swimming pool area the president noted there was a deficit of about \$15,000 which she considered normal. Even though the swarming swimmers seem to inundate the pool areas it is an expensive activity.

One question which has not been resolved is the replacement of the baby pool. A wooden deck had to be removed for health reasons and whether to replace the pool has not yet been determined.

While vandalism is a major concern she pointed to Jim Stamborski, who is in charge at the Grennan Heights park, as the man who has reduced the vandalism there to almost the zero figure. It was a major problem until Jim took over and she gave him high marks for his efforts which has almost eliminated the problem.

Millie lastly complimented Niles park director Bill Hughes whose tremendous personality has been a great plus in overcoming the public relations problem the district had in the past. She said the entire park district staff is an excellent one, and has lent much to the positive position the district is in.

The park president's assessment seems to be most encouraging. Remembering all the burdens and obstacles the district has had in the past years, Millie's report lends itself to a very optimistic look to the future.

'76-'77 year. But Tuesday night Gogo reiterated what he has warned many times in the past—the need for closing schools. He said one, and possibly two, elementary schools should be considered to be closed for the '77-'78 year.

Dr. Gogo also proposed the board study the possibility of converting the two 7th and 8th grade junior high schools into middle schools, which would add the 6th grade to the present two-year schools.

An expected 19% enrollment decrease by the 1979-'80 year and an anticipated \$5 million deficit by then is resulting in the school board reviewing all options for meeting the problem. Dr. Gogo noted four elementary schools would have enrollments under 400 students by next year, and noted it becomes too expensive to operate a small school.

In closing one school the annual estimated savings to the school district would be about \$200,000. In Evanston three school closings will save approximately \$600,000 each year.

If the 3-year middle school system is adopted, 2 elementary schools might be closed within the next 2 years. Moving students to the junior high school one year earlier would decrease enrollments further in the elementary schools, perhaps by as much as 20%.

The superintendent contends utilizing the junior high school for 3 grades and closing elementary schools would "sustain very qualitative programs for youngsters. The price of not doing that is an annual curtailment of services and programs."

Gogo noted it would take about 14 months of planning before a school could be closed.

The board concluded its study of options for reducing costs in the district on an upbeat. After discussing the possible use of a school principal at more than one school, reducing the number of assistant principals, reducing after-school clubs and intra-mural or inter-school programs, board member Penny Larson suggested a cost reduction which aroused Superintendent Gogo. Mrs. Larson suggested the administrative and office staffs be reduced by 20%. Gogo, who had been almost clinical in discussing cutting costs in about 25 different areas in the district, said, "There is no way of reducing the administrative staff by 4 people", adding, "we're very conservatively staffed." Larson did not just refer to Gogo's administrative staff, but also to the office staff. Mrs. Larson said she is conditioned in the business world and this would be one area where the cost cutters would take an extra hard look. She said job descriptions might be realigned and perhaps board members should take up less time of the administrators.

In the reductions in office staffs, it was suggested each

elementary school might be reduced to one secretary, which admittedly might create a hardship. Board member Howard Lessen suggested the administrative workshop might also be reduced. Larry Reiss suggested specialists such as superintendents of instruction might be eliminated returning to the staffing that preceded this innovation.

Dr. Gogo's assistant, Lenore Page, defended the programs stating the workshops and the education areas for teachers were most important, and it would be "quite difficult in trimming it."

The quick defense of the administration by the superintendent was a fair example of the workings of a bureaucracy. Each branch of a complex organization can quickly recommend means for cutting the costs of the other guy's bureau. But when your own area is scrutinized, bureaucrats become very defensive.

Con't'd from Niles-E.Maine P.1 service agency. Youth Commission advisor and Village Trustee Abe Selman, the lone holdout against closing of Center deplored the close-down. "It's difficult to decide where the fault lies," he said.

Vandalism by the youth had continued despite efforts to initiate new programs at the Center. The April smoking ban had resulted in decreased attendance, said Selman, and the kids had just begun to filter back when the latest incident occurred.

No calls protesting the closing have been received, he added.

Selman said there is a definite need for the teen center. "But it will remain closed until a satisfactory program can be presented to the Board to justify the expense of continuing the youth program."

"A Teen Center should be set apart in a separate facility with a less 'sterile' atmosphere... formalized and structured programming is needed as well as the unstructured, because some kids want to do more than just sit around and shoot pool."

There is no simple solution to making the Center successful said Selman. It must relate to the kids on their level.

Formation of a Youth Council comprised of teen youth had success until the smoking ban according to Selman. The Council was in process of re-forming when the Friday incident occurred.

The teen center was open from 6:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. during the week. Pool tables, table tennis, air hockey, shuffleboard, cards, monopoly, chess and checkers were available. Extended evening bus hours did not improve attendance at the Center, said Selman.

## Bergquist issues RTA statement

Republican candidate for 4th District Representative Roy H. Bergquist today pledged that if elected he would initiate or support legislation to ensure the suburbs a fair share of RTA funds and services.

Bergquist said the Regional Transportation Authority appears to be committed to "cover" ever-growing losses of the Chicago Transit Authority and thus jeopardize the financing of services for the remainder of the six-county mass transit area.

Bergquist said the RTA's current budget is \$184 million, of which more than 50% is allocated to the CTA. In the forthcoming year, he added, the CTA will devour more than 75% of the RTA budget. As a result of this projection, the RTA has proposed a 5% gasoline tax to increase its revenue.

He pointed out that taxes on gasoline now approximate 26 cents per gallon, and the increase would add another three cents on a gallon selling for 60 cents.

Bergquist said the proposed tax adds insult to injury to the suburban driver, because the burden of the tax would fall most heavily on him. Moreover, he said, the suburbanite does not seem likely to get any additional mass transit service for the new tax.

Bergquist stated that the suburbs have a population greater than that of Chicago, but will receive only one-quarter of the services provided by the RTA.

Bergquist said he did not believe it was the intent of the legislature to fund the CTA at the expense of suburban areas when it created the RTA. The intent, he added, was to provide mass transportation throughout the six-county area, not devise a new means of funneling funds to the CTA to cover its uncontrolled deficits.

Unless the RTA clamps down on the CTA with the same vigor it exercises in controlling suburban public transportation, the state legislature should reconsider the role and authority of the RTA, he concluded, and intends to take such action.

The College Board, which marks its 75th Anniversary this year, is a non-profit membership association of 2,372 school and school systems, colleges and universities, associations, and scholarship agencies. The Board offers guidance and evaluation services in counseling, admissions, placement and credit, and financial aid to help students in making important educational and career decisions.

As a voting member now, Niles West has a voice in the policy decisions and activities of the College Board. Representatives of the membership demonstrate their interest and become involved in Board policy and program development by their participation in regional and annual forums.

## Teens protest.

few parents present offered no comments.

Spokesman for the youth group Floyd Dillman, 8272 Wisner, who said he has attended the Center since its opening, asked the Board for reasons of the close down.

"The reasons are obvious," replied nettled Village Trustee Ang Marcheschi. "The damage (to the Center) has been considerable since it opened over a year ago. It costs plenty to repair damages caused by kicking in a wall, of sinks and basins torn from walls and of initials carved in new paneling, altho," he said, "I could understand how a cue stick might make a hole in the ceiling. Money repairs come thru the village and are out of taxpayers' pockets. There is no reason that a building provided by the village for youth should be so damaged."

Added factors to the closing he said were reduced attendance and less participation by the youth at Center activities.

Young Dillman told trustees that a survey of attendance, polled by Youth Center Supervisor Paul Hanson, showed a nightly attendance of "35 kids during the week and 50 kids on Friday nights." He also presented to trustees approximately 400 petitions which he said were signed by Niles residents in support of re-opening the Center.

Trustee Richard Hartzak discounted the value of the petitions: "Parents are not fully aware of the damage incurred at the Center," he said, stating he had spoken with several mothers shopping in his store on the Saturday following the vandalism. "Damages have been heavy in dollars and cents ... the Board took closing action because of the constant, recurring incidences of destruction in the building."

A \$4,000 village budget for the Teen Center covers hourly salary of a Youth Supervisor, equipment and incidentals.

A Niles resident who did not make himself heard during the meeting asked later why the youth responsible for the damage was not apprehended and corrective action taken. "With the Center closed, this kid is out on the streets bent on more destruction, maybe on my home ... who's to prevent him if the police and

Can't from Niles-E-Maine P.I. the village do nothing?"

Several teens stated they knew the youth, a Maine East student, that he consistently caused trouble, but that teachers and officials turned their backs. "We know he has (been responsible for lawless acts) in Niles ... in view of his conduct at the Center we have asked him to leave the building."

Why, they wondered, didn't the village take action against the responsible vandals?

In other action trustees discussed possible formation of a community Consumer Fraud agency. The area-wide agency, over Morton Grove, Des Plaines, Park Ridge, Skokie, Glenview, Lincolnwood and Niles, said Village Clerk Frank Wagner, could better service Niles residents, 60% of whom according to a recent survey shop in other business communities.

The Consumer Fraud Division, unique to Niles alone, was initiated by ordinance in 1970 as a local agency thru which consumers could register complaints against businessmen. More than 1,000 complaints were received over 5 years said Wagner. Responsive action takes longer when complaints are against outside (of Niles) businessmen; therefore the need to expand for a unified agency covering the 7 communities. A proposed Feb. 11 meeting was set for Niles by the mayors of the 7 communities.

Niles trustees Tuesday night granted a time extension to Oct. 1, 1976, for construction of a permanent First Federal Savings & Loan Bank facility at 8400 Dempster, stipulating that the present temporary "residence" of the savings institution be razed.

The time extension, cut from the Dec. 31, 1976, requested by bank officials, was needed for the setback in new plans required by the (then) Republic Savings merger with First Federal for delays in receiving materials from Wisconsin and Texas and due to severe winter conditions preventing building construction.

Original time period for construction of the new bank facility expires April 8, 1976.
