Reiss elected school board president

Pendulum swings back to Dist. 63 board

The pendulum began to swing back to school board control of School District 63 Tuesday night with the seating of new board members Jeanette Oestreich and Richard Smith and the re-seating of incumbent Larry Reiss. It came one year later than expected.

Tuesday night at an organizational meeting the new school board voted 5 to 2 to elect Larry Reiss president of the school board, with Phil Deckowitz and Barbara Kipnis voting in favor of Howard Lessin. Lessin voted for Reiss.

"As you are the kind of man who will print newsworthy items in your newspaper it's about time some articles were run about how the Niles Police and Fire Department employees are required to live in the Village of Niles; yet, the Public Works and Administration Department employees do not live under the same requirement. When half or better of Niles is shopping centers, cemeteries, industries or main thoroughfares, and because of Niles' proximity to the City of Chicago, the housing situation here is extremely inflated, the Village of Niles makes its award-winning police and firemen live in Niles where a nice three bedroom home is completely out of reach for the average man. Maybe, with some articles concerning this problem in your newspaper, this utterly ridiculous situation could be taken care of. Most towns do not have, or do not enforce, such a rule. The City of Chicago does, and, alas, so does Niles."

Niles Village Manager Ken Scheel responded to the Anon letter-writer. He said Niles policemen and firemen are on 24-hour call. By being in the community they are able to respond to an emergency call much quicker.

Scheel said these public servants living in the community are a part of the decision-making here. Higher taxes affect them and their concern for their own community is greater. Ken believes living-in residents do not have the same boss-employee relationship as those who would live outside the town. The feeling of responsibility for the community would be greater for those living here.



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

These application forms can be picked up by teens at the Trident Center, 8060 West Oakton, The Village Administration Building, 7601 N. Milwaukee Ave.

Any teenager 14 or over can register for work. Salaries are worked out privately between employers and teens.

Niles needs the program, because there are many teenagers who could use their skills and time more constructively to benefit themselves and the rest of the community.

All village residents and businesses are being asked to express their employment needs and to consider hiring a teenager to work parttime for them. Homeowners and businesses can call or mail in their job specifications at the aforementioned centers.

At this time the Niles Youth Commission will only supply a listing of names to employers to choose from. At such time the program expands to a large scale operation, the youth commission will take steps to evaluate the need and provide a more operational basis.

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



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Niles Chamber of Commerce sponsors CPR training

On Wednesday, April 14, 21 Niles businessmen and women attended a cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) class sponsored by the Niles Chamber of Commerce and Industry. This training session was conducted by Helen Dulick, R.N., of the American Heart Association, at the Golf Mill State Bank, and arrangements were made by Oakton Community College, through MONACEP. The purpose of this training session was to prepare laymen (nonmedical personnel) in the techniques of CPR; in other words, "What to do for the heart attack victim until professional medical help arrives."


In print CPR looks fairly simple. First call for help. Next, the ABC's of CPR rescue — (a) open the airway, (b) start breathing for the victim (mouth to mouth resuscitation), and (c) restore circulation meaning chest heart compressions. After Ms. Dulick outlined the basic procedures, the students began to work. The emphasis in this four-hour session was definitely on the practice of the CPR techniques, and most of the time was spent with each student working over the special manikins on the floor of the bank. During the afternoon the recording "Annie's", the realistic models were brought back to life many times. Each student worked as a single rescuer first and then learned and practices the techniques used by two-men teams.

The movie, "The New Pulse of Life", was shown. Red Cross manuals and pamphlets from the Paramedics of the Niles Fire Dept. were distributed to each student. At the end of the session all of the students were very tired but quite accomplished in the techniques of CPR rescue. 

Tornado Alert for Niles

Niles residents were alerted Thursday evening, April 15, by civil defense sirens which blasted a village-wide warning after funnel clouds sighted near Schaumburg were reported moving northeast at 40 miles per hour.

M-NASR Social Club

Niles police were alerted thru the Illinois State Police Emergency Radio Dispatch (ISPERN) that 3 funnel clouds had been sighted outside Schaumburg and moving toward Niles. None, however, touched the ground and no injuries or damage was reported.

Torrential downpours and high winds had hit the Niles area shortly after 6 p.m. Skies had darkened considerably.

Village Manager Kenneth Scheel said he had been notified of severe weather warnings, and of the funnel sighting at 6:20 p.m. Village departmental officials were notified of the possible emergency and the sirens were activated in the Niles area at 6:25 p.m.

Concerned over two village programs in progress at the time, Scheel said he warned those concerned with the monthly Blood Pressure testing at the Administration Building. Also alerted were those concerned with the Cooperative Blood Replacement Program at the Trident Center, 8060 W. Oakton St.

Sister Irene Sebo, Directress of St. Benedict's Home for the Aged, 6930 Touhy ave., said she heard the sirens "just as we were preparing for church services."

"I called the Niles Fire Department," she said, "and was told of the tornado alert ... I asked whether it was serious, and the fire alarm operator said it could be."

"We went into a regular tornado drill," said the Sister. "Our residents were put into corners sitting on chairs." A second call to the Fire Dept. brought assurance that all was quiet. "So we went to the chapel with the understanding that if we heard the sirens again, everyone was to lie down on the floor under the benches."

A resident at Monroe St. and Olcott Ave. said he "barely heard the sirens due to the downpour of rain and the high winds." He said he called the police department and was informed of the tornado alert ...

"I shut everything off and we (family) went down into the basement."

Scheel said the sirens were used one other time, several years ago, for a tornado alert. The sirens are tested periodically, the first Tuesday of every month and had last been tested April 6.

Five civil defense public warning sirens were installed in the village in September of 1969 for use in natural disasters, enemy attacks and other civil emergencies.

They are located at Fire Station #1, Jarvis and Caldwell ave.; the Grennan Heights Fieldhouse, Oketo and Monroe st.; at the south end of Golf Mill Shopping Center; Our Lady of Ransom School; and at Jefferson School, Greendale and Oakton St.

An "alert" blast used for local tornado warnings will be given by a 3 to 5 minute steady blast. An enemy attack is designated by a 3-minute intermittent blast. Either warning indicates danger and village officials suggest that residents turn on their radios for instruction.

Asked for comments on the Thursday night event, Scheel said he had none ... "Thank God."

A twister, the first to touch down in the Niles area, caused half a million dollars in damages on its northeasterly path last March 12 from Rusch dr. near Milwaukee ave. to Howard St. and Caldwell ave. No fatalities were reported in Niles, although a Chicago construction worker in Morton Grove was killed by flying debris.

Near the end of the 3 hour meeting, Lessin sought a critical report from the North Central Accrediting Association which he believed the superintendent was withholding from the school board. Superintendent Gogo stated it was being color-coded, sent to other school administrators and teachers for responses and the entire package, including these responses, would be given to the school board when completed. Gogo said there was no reluctance on the part of the administration to turn over the outside critique to the school board and after Lessin insisted "it be released by 6 p.m. tomorrow night (Wednesday)", Gogo said copies would be made and board members could have it the next day. Gogo said he thought there were some inconsistencies in the report and it should be placed in perspective, but willingly acknowledged the availability of the report by Wednesday.

Lessin told The Bugle the report, which he implied was critical of programs in the school district, had been delivered to the school board, and the superintendent was blocking the board's seeing it at this time.

In a second action Lessin proposed the superintendent ready a comparison of programs at each of the junior high schools. Included in the report will be comparative evaluations of instrumental music, foreign language, low grade readers and special education students. Lessin also requested a comparative report for the next meeting, evaluating grade levels by teams and grade level scores for the past 4 years. After board member Penny Larson agreed such a report would be helpful, Gogo said, "we may surprise you (with the report)."

Lessin shot back that what Gogo does would not surprise him. The brief exchange was the only abrasiveness shown at the meeting. The new school president Reiss conducted a very low-key meeting, which seems to be his style, which should alleviate the highly-charged rancor seen at past year's meetings.

While Lessin's aggressiveness Tuesday night indicated the school board was going to control its superintendent, the remaining board members showed no interest in similar clashes. However, it can be expected the low key meetings will see a slow but perceptible change at future meetings, where the school board and the superintendent will become partners in future actions.

While the status of the superintendent is not an issue presently, the increasing movement of the pendulum back toward the school board will likely change the relationship of the administration and the school board. How far the pendulum moves, and how willingly the superintendent will accommodate to this change, is likely to determine his future.

In other actions Tuesday night the board tabled a resolution by Deckowitz, to assess the educational environment in the district to determine educational goals of the district.

Graduation will take place June 14 with Apollo students graduating at Maine East and Gemini students graduating at Maine North at 8 p.m.

A petition with 370 signatures was submitted to the board which would allow 4 teachers now in the district to have another year of teaching before they are retired. The mandatory retirement age has been reduced to 65 years old (from 70) and 4 teachers who have taught many years will be affected by the sudden change without being allowed to prepare

for retirement. Teachers past 65 years old become non-tenured teachers and the petition requests they be given an extra year in order to plan for their retirement. Action is expected at the next meeting.

Because money may not be forthcoming from the state for a summer school program, a letter will be sent to parents explaining the options the district will have for a summer school program this year. Since the district's financial problems have caused the board not to support paying about \$64,000 (last year's cost) for the program, parents will be notified the summer school may cost \$60 to \$75 per student for the coming year. Superintendent Gogo said such a plan may result in having only students who can afford the program rather than those who need it applying this summer.

Plaques for outgoing school board members will be presented at the next meeting. The Russian language program will be dropped for students entering the 7th grade since only 11 students indicated desire for the course. The present 7th graders will complete their Russian curriculum in the 8th grade. The \$8,000 salary paid to the Russian language teacher would result in a plus \$300 per student cost which would be abnormally high. There are about 500 language students in District 63, most of whom study French and Spanish.

The discontinuance of the Russian program will mean the high school will also discontinue its program. The East Maine district is the only elementary school district offering the program and Maine East is the only high school teaching the Russian language in Maine Township.

The working budget will be made available to the public with 2 copies at each school in the district. Residents can take 1 copy home for study overnight.

Non-residents to use park facilities at resident fees

Niles park commissioners set a precedent Tuesday night, April 20, by unanimously voting season swimming privileges at Niles Park District resident rates to non-park residents who have village addresses.

The action was taken shortly after a park commissioner admitted an overcrowding of both Rec Center and Ballard Sports Complex pools.

Niles Park District residents pay season swimming token fees ranging from \$12 (individual) to a maximum of \$28 for a family of 5 or more. Non-park district resident fees are doubled.

Park action was confined to the Greenwood Estates area, west of Maryhill Cemetery and south of Bruce Drive. Area residents live in Niles but are members of the Park Ridge Park District. With the original formation of the Niles Park District years ago, Greenwood Estates residents had opted to annex to the Park Ridge Park District.

A second park action Tuesday night opened Tam Golf Course to the same non-park resident area under park district resident rates. Non-residents are charged \$3.25. Park District residents are \$2.75.

Past park district president and former park commissioner Walt Beusse, a visitor to park proceedings Tuesday night, charged commissioners with "violating ... in good faith ... your responsibilities to the taxpayers of the Niles Park District. Because of a

little red tape (park and village boundaries do not coincide) you can't keep track of a few non-park resident-village residents."

Beusse referred to the laxity of park employees to pinpoint non-residents when issuing swimming tokens and in accepting golf course fees.

"You're letting yourselves open to much criticism," Beusse told the board. "You're not being fair to people paying park district taxes."

Park Comr. Jeff Arnold termed the criticism as "nit-picking for the few non-park residents involved." He upheld park employees for not noting park boundaries "due to emergencies of registration and avoiding lines to get on the golf course."

Earlier, commissioners had discussed the possibility of reciprocal use with Park Ridge of swimming tokens, but shelved the idea when it was observed that Niles would be on the short financial end of the exchange.

"The residents would be buying Park Ridge tokens and using Niles facilities," observed Comr. Leske.

In other action park commissioners approved the 1976 Maine-Niles Assoc. of Special Recreation (M-NASR) budget of \$170,714 despite outspoken disapproval of several budget items and "lack of information on others." Last year's budget was \$167,380.

Morton Grove reportedly did not approve the 1976 budget.

M-NASR Rep. Millie Jones told park commissioners at a Niles pre-board meeting that the 7 park district M-NASR board of Niles, Park Ridge, Des Plaines, Morton Grove, Skokie, Lincolnwood and Golf-Maine does not appear to be following the original goal of economical use of existing facilities and proper budgeting of funds. "They want too many buildings, too much staff ... everyone wants their own office," Jones blames board attitude on the constant turnover in board membership due to change in individual park boards. Only 2 of the original 7 members remain on the M-NASR board.

"Niles takes a closer look at the budget than other villages," she said, cautioning commissioners to "keep a watchful eye to what is going on."
