# From the **Left Hand**

The south side Besser family grew up around 31st and Indiana Avenue around the turn of the century. The patriarch in the family worked in the stock yards on Ashland Avenue and his wife, who quarterbacked the family, took an option on a little neighborhood grocery store. Her option was she would begin operating the store on Friday, and make her first payment towards its purchase the following Monday. Over the weekend she accumulated enough money from the former owner's inventory to make the first down payment; and in sneer wit and working long hours, she kept her family of 3 boys and a girl together as she slowly built up a respectable business in the little store on the corner.

While all the children had a modicum of success in later life, it was her second son, my uncle, who emerged the star in n the family.

As a youngster he went to work for a friend's father, Ben Lindheimer, who owned a bank on the southside. He became a teller, and indeed was a very conscientious one. He was fond of telling a rather vague story how he once was \$99 short at the end of the day. He realized he unwittingly paid out \$100 on a \$1 bill. He hurried out of the bank, and somehow managed to chase down the depositor who received the extra money, and luckily he returned the \$99.

This uncle was an exceedingly charming man, and quickly rose in the financial and social ranks of his community. One of his friends was a young man named Henry Crown and as we mentioned before, another was Ben Lindheimer.

When the senior Lindheimer eventually became County treasurer, the uncle moved downtown to Washington and Clark Streets. He had become a trusted friend of the president of the First National Bank of Chicago, a man named Brown who wanted the uncle to work in the County

A Public Hearing June 8 for the 1976-77 Combined Budget and Appropriation ordinance of the Niles Park District set the total park operating budget at the amount of \$2,140,795, down from last year's budget of \$2,347,052. Total appropriation for the fiscal year, beginning May 1, 1976 and ending April 30, 1977 was set at \$2,605,217 of which \$1,430,850 is expected revenue and other sources and \$1,174,367

# Bike Patrol captures TV eye

[by Alice M. Bobula]
Thousands of TV viewers

watched the inception of a new safety program for bicyclists on Thursday, June 10, when Channel 7 Eyewitness News visited Niles to film the Niles Bicycle Safety Patrol. Film clips appeared on the 5 o'clock and 6 o'clock

The pilot program was given the green light last September when its originator, Niles Police Officer James Gerhardt, appeared before the village board to request approval and funding of the Patrol.

The Sciety Petrol is comprised of 10 college-age youths (and one alternate) whose function is to bike-patrol village streets 11 a.m. to 8 p.m., seven days a week. The blke cops are empowered under Home Rule to take corrective action on bicyclists who are in violation of the Illinois Safety

Candidates for the Safety Patrol were carefully screened and of 40 applicants.

The junior cops underwent a week of training in rules. regulations and courtesies prior to going on the streets June 2. They ride usually in teams of 2, uniformed in white and have assinged areas of patrol in Niles. Contact with the police department is made every 2 hours by

Many months of preparatory work have preceded the detailed programming, selection of uniforms, etc., noted Gerhardt, "but much is still played by ear".

Talk sessions are held with the bike cops prior to 11 a.m. street patrol during which time various situations are discussed. The 8 males and 2 females are instructed to be firm but courteous at all times. Patrol cars serve as a

'back-up' in emergencies. Gerhardt noted one case where the bike cops had cautioned 2 women from a neighboring village against riding abreast on Milwaukee ave. The women resisted the warning stating they were not liable to Niles' law since they were not residents of the village. The bike cops called for a patrol car officer to enforce

Gerhardt said he upheld authority by the bike cops when the women telephoned him later to say they did not have to comply vith "orders from kids".

# **Mikva cosponsors** crime victims compensation bill

is cosponsoring legislation to subsidize compensation for medical and legal expenses and lost wages incurred by crime victims. "A fundamental responsibility of society," Mikva said, "is to protect its citizens from crime. By compensating victims of crime, we recognize that the cost of society's failure to protect its citizens should be borne by all, not just by the unfortunate person who happened to be at the wrong place at the wrong time."

The proposal, the Victims of Crime Act of 1976, provides for 50% federal reimbursement to states that have qualified compensation programs.

To qualify for federal funding, states must have a crime victims compensation program with a hearing and review procedure for denials of compensation, require victims' cooperation with law enforcement authorities, and inform eligible victims of their right

Chief sponsor of the bill is Congressman Peter Rodino. Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, which is considering

Compensation for crime victims has long been a concern of Mikva's. While in the Illinois state legislature from 1956-66, he was chief sponsor of legislation to create an Illinois commission on victims compensation, which led to the development of Illinois'

Today, Henry Crown's son, Lester is president of the Crown enterprises and Lindheimer's daughter, Marge Everett is now president of a race track in California.

Now, a couple of generations later, a guy with a community newspaper based in Niles is asking representatives in Springfield and Washington to create laws, which will send people to the pokey for giving bribe money to public officials.

When former Governor Otto Kerner went to prison, he was convicted of receiving favorable stock purchase advantages from Marge Everett who, it was alleged received favored race track dates at Arlington Park, which she then owned. Kerner was convicted of his crime and sent off to jail, and Mrs. Everett turned state's evidence and despite her part in the scandal, was not tried on any charges.

More recently the metropolitan newspapers are reporting about public officials in Springfield who received favorable treatment from representatives of the cement industry in exchange for action benefitting this industry. This time Lester Crown's name dominates the news, representing the cement people who allegedly received the benefits of this action. Crown, like Everett, is spilling the beans which may well lead to indictments of public officials. And Crown, like Everett. will not be charged with any offense.
