


Mikva town meeting in Morton Grove




Passenger injured in 3-car collision

Niles Police plan for CB assist

[by Alice M. Bobula]

Niles Police are planning to monitor Citizens Band radio transmission in an effort to shorten response time to emergencies.

Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson said last week his department is negotiating to purchase monitors for hookup to police car radios that will continuously monitor Channel 9--the CB emergency frequency.

"We'll have citizen band capability within 3 weeks," he noted.

Installation of the monitors means that citizens with a CB unit in their car can talk to police directly. Policemen in the squad cars will pick up the call on the CB monitor of Channel 9 alto they will not have the ability to transmit out on the channel.

Des Plaines began monitoring CB transmissions earlier this month according to Police Chief Arthur F. Hintz who said a \$300 CB unit was installed in a department vehicle which enables police to talk directly with CB operators who view an emergencywhich calls for police action.

Emrikson said the use of the CB radio saves valuable time because callers do not have to

locate a telephone to call police. "CB assistance is a big thing," he said. "If there is a bad accident on the road and a CB is in the area, obviously we will get the message sooner and can respond more quickly to the scene.

The new system will have one problem, he said. "We'll probably get some false alarms from kids who will use CB radios to report false information to see what action they can get out of the police department."

Skokie, Mt. Prospect and Arlington Heights have also gone to CB said the Niles police chief who favors the Skokie plan of working with local CB clubs.

Niles police, he said, are already working with a local CB Club, The Chatterbox, to plan some code of identification for authorization.

All forms of communication have value, said Emrikson, noting that "it will be interesting to view results after some time of use."



Kitchen Fre **causes** \$2,200

damages

Fire caused an estimated \$2,200 in damages to the Lester. Blaul residence, 8453 Normal, Niles late Friday afternoon, July

No injuries were reported and no one was home at the time.

Smoke emitting from the bi-level home around 5 p.m. caught the attention of a neighbor to the east who looked up to see leaping flames in the kitchen across the driveway.

The fire, confined to the kitchen, was apparently electrical in origin, said a fire source, who theorized it may have been due to an electrically powered exhaust fan above the cooking range.

Firemen said flames were five feet high, reaching from cabinets to a cathedral type ceiling on their arrival.

Damages were estimated at \$1500 to the building and \$700 to contents. The fire had spread up through a vent reaching to the outside and had burned away a portion of the roof area.

The kitchen was heavily charged with smoke, water and fire damage, with heavy smoke damage throughout the upper level of the bedrooms. The dining room and living room also sustained smoke damage.

Seven pieces of equipment from Niles responded to the call. Firefighters remained on the scene for over an hour.

Had it not been for early detection by an alert neighbor and fast response by firemen, said a fire source. "the fire would have gained a toehold and damages could have been more extensive.'
