### Oakton parking permits on sale

Student parking stickers for use during the fall semester at Oakton Community College will be on sale Thursday, August 26, in Building 6 on the Oakton campus, Oakton and Nagle, Morton Grove.

Sold on a first-come, firstserved basis, the stickers cost \$10 each. Day stickers, good for both day and evening parking can be purchased from 8:00-11:00 a.m. while evening stickers, good for parking after 12:30 p.m., are on sale from 7:00-9:00 p.m.

A sticker must be displayed on every motor vehicle parked in the campus lots. In the nearby St. Paul Woods Forest Preserve, daytime student parking is also available - no permit required. Free shuttle bus service is provided to and from the forest preserve.

#### Niles Scouts hike **Philmont Trails**



Holy Family extends patient menu

A new attractively designed menu offering a wider selection of food items has been developed by Holy Family Hospital's Food Service Department for the hospital's patients and visitors to its dining room.

Meals for pateints are prepared on a six day rotating cycle so the menu does not repeat itself on the same weekday for six weeks. Previously, the menu would repeat itself every two weeks. With the shorter cycle, a wider

variety of menu items are available to the patient. For example, the number of daily entrees for lunch and dinner has been expanded from two to three. Extra salads and more desserts have been added. "Jell-O," ice cream and a special dessert are now available every day.

For breakfast, another hot cereal is now offered patients with three more cold cereals.

A new item unique to Holy Family's Food Service operation is now offered to patients on the Sunday luncheon menu--a Danish Shrimp Sandwich served openface style with cold shrimps. sliced tomato, lettuce, thousand island dressing and potato chips. Children staying in Holy Fam-

ily's Pediatrics section--upon the approval of their physician--will find lunch-time more enjoyable. Food items such as hot dogs. hamburgers and pizzas will appear on the menu more frequent-

During the process of revising the patient menu, all recipes for hot and cold items have been updated, rewriteen and also improved. They have been placed in special recipe books for quick reference for Food Service personnel.

The hospital's dining room menu, also placed on the six day rotating cycle, has added, on a regular basis, entrees such as steak sandwiches, London Broil and Steamboat Round of Beef.

### Mikva to travel to Israel for Trade Subcommittee

Congressman Abner J. Mikva will visit Israel in mid-August to study the status of emigration to that country by residents of Romania as well as of the Soviet Union and other Eastern European countries. The Congressman will make the trip on behalf of the House Ways and Means Committee's Subcommittee on Trade, of which he is a member. He will be in Israel during the Congressional recess August 13 to 22.

The Subcommittee on Trade oversees the granting of most favored nation trade status to other countries and reciprocal trade agreements. In January, Congressman Mikva visited Ro mania as a member of a subcommittee task force that reviewed emigration and trade policies between Romania and the United States.

Romania has enjoyed most favored nation status since last year and the agreement is up for renewal shortly. The visits to Romania and Israel by Mikva and other members of the Trade Subcommittee are specifically aimed at reviewing the implementation of the emigration provisions of the agreement. Under the Jackson-Vanik pro

visions of the Trade Act, no country can enjoy most favored nation treatment from the United States unless it agrees to maintain a reasonable emigration policy as to its religious and ethnic minorities. The Jackson-Vanik proviso has special sig-nificance to Jews living in Communist countries who desire t emigrate to Israel as the Jewish omeland



#### **Blood Préssure** Tests

Nearly 200 persons have received blood pressure tests at Holy Family Hospital since a new community health program, Hypertension Screening, began early in July.

Area residents are encouraged to have their blood pressure checked on Wednesdays between 1 and 3 p.m. in the hospital's Health Service Center on the ground level. Persons wishing the test should come to the reception desk in the lobby inside the hospital's main entrance. No appointment is necessary.

At Holy Family's weekly screening, participants are given an on-the-spot appraisal of their blood pressure levels and are advised to see their personal physician if their readings are found to be elevated.

Hypertension, or high blood pressure, is considered the #1 killer among Americans, affecting 23 million persons. Only 11 million, or less than half, realize v are sufferers, according to the Chicago Heart Association

A blood pressure test is simple and painless. It involves taking a person's blood pressure with an arm cuff. In addition to the tests, information on hypertension is available at the hospital, as well as pointers on how to guard against heart disease.



Another interesting figure which manifests the sound financial condition the district is in is a \$1,048,700 in certificates of deposit, which Niles park district is drawing interest on, while holding the money for future payouts during the year, as well as for future park development. A breakdown of the \$1,174,367

figure shows the general corporate fund will receive \$315,000. The levy for the corporate fund administration is \$88,200, for parks and facilities maintenance. \$172,400 for parks and facilities development, \$29,500, for replacement, \$9,900 and a plus 5% for loss and costs in collecting taxes.

In the Recreation Program Fund \$236,250 is earmarked. Personnel services for administration is \$20,500; Recreation Supervisory salaries are \$86,250; contractual services are \$58,000, commodity charges levied are \$31,000, fixed charges total \$8,000; total capital immprovements are \$19,750 and replacement, \$1,500, plus 5% for loss in costs and collection for a total of \$236,250 for the recreation program fund.

Additional monies levied is for the Illinois Municipal Retirement 'Fund, \$63,000; total levied for general liability insurance, \$26,-250, for auditor, \$7,350 and for bond and interest redemption purposes, \$478,445. Adding \$23,922 for 5% loss and costs in collections the total levied for bond and interest redemption purposes is \$502,367.

The total levied for the handicapped fund as provided by referendum is \$24,150. Bond and interest redemptions for bonds outstanding are as follows: The September, 1962 series for land, swimming pool and 4 parks totals \$54,925 in payment for the coming year. The September 1, 1968 bonds for 4 parks, a second swimming pool, the gym and ice rink totals \$166,864 for '76-'77. The Februrary 1, 1974 bonds for land and the golf course total \$164.891. The total bonds and interest which are gradually being retired total \$478,445 plus \$23,922 for a 5% estimate for loss and costs in collection bringing the total levy for bond and

interest purposes to \$502,367. In other actions Tuesday night Roseman Tractor Company was approved as the low bidder and will deliver a 3600 ford tractor (1976 model) for \$5,745.20. It will be used primarily for lawn cutting.

its very first year. But more importantly, it taught village officials there was gold in shopping centers, and subsequent officials learned their lesson well. Today, the village likely has the highest proportion of shopping center stores of any community in the Chicago suburban area.

Across the street from Niles, Morton Grove sat back idly and watched Niles pick-off these centers. Niles aggressively sought Golf Mill while Morton Grove slept. Niles was actually farther from the Golf Mill center than Morton Grove. And since the center needed city water it could have just as well received it from MG. But old sleepy MG passed up the opportunity and now Morton Grovers pay about 50% higher illage taxes than Nilesites and have far less services.

While Nilesites can thank the foresight of John Stanley, and the subsequent agressiveness of latter day officials, their approving and adding additional shopping centers has caused a genuine problem in the community. In recent years Niles moved northwest and annexed the Dempster Plaza center at Dempster and Greenwood and wend its way thru the maze of the unincorporated area and grabbed the center on west Golf Road. In addition the Candlelight center was built at Oakton and Milwaukee, the Four Flags center at Golf and Milwaukee, and the Treasury and Memco complexes plus several smaller centers north of Dempster on Milwaukee Avenue. Now, Republic Lumber has just closed its doors in Four Flags, the Treasury is closing up shop on Golf Road and Candlelight has iust been sold to Marvin Hyman, who has been most successful in developing smaller centers at Harlem and Milwaukee, and two small centers in the Milwaukee Avenue area north of Ballard Road in the 9000 and 9400 blocks.

Hyman has been reported to be considering changing the Candlelight name to Oak-Mil center. Having a more melifforous ear we have long referred to the area as Mil-Oak.

But whatever its name Hyman obviously is convinced the area can handle another center. And in the event it can't we imagine he could successfully turn the contor into offices which would prove highly profitable.

Aside from this center the village has a tremendous amount of vacant space in other centers and it could provo a burdon if the economy reverses itself in the future.

The concept of Niles, a town of 35,000 people, being unable to support these burgeoning centers is not significant. Niles has long been a weigh station among commuting suburbanites who bounce back and forth from their homebase to Niles to do their shopping. It is a great bonanza for Niles receives tax revenue without having to provide services to these people.

Niles is not unlike many communities centered in rural areas which has only a minimal population but which services farm people from many miles around. Saturday morning the exodus into these towns makes that day almost festival-like. Unlike those areas, shoppers surrounding Niles don't have to wait until Saturday, often popping in and out of the community several times a week.


Shopping today is more than just a trip to the store to make a purchase. To many it is a genuine recreation. People of both genders and all ages often spend hours wandering around, perhaps buying, perhaps only looking, but expending much time in this barren cultural nadir. It is a sign of the times and it is a cultural mores which cuts across all economic groups as well as ethnic and educated groups.


