Board Jockeys for Decision on Betting Parlors

In multiple action the Niles Plan Commission Sept. 1 continued action generally on Off Track Betting and Messenger Service; tentatively approved zoning change for a full service restaurant in the Greenlake Shopping Center; recommended reduction of side yard variation in Bunker Hill Estates for construction of a private pool and delayed action on variations for

lot sizes proposed for Golden Acres in North Niles. Zoning Commissioners elected Wednesday night to delay action on categorizing off-track betting parlors under a Special Use which requires public hearings, pursuant to parking restrictions and legal opinion on the betting service. Action had been prompted said Building Commissioner Joe Sa-

lerno by a phone inquiry several months ago from a firm which considered opening a betting service in Niles. The Service acts as an agent for customers who place track bets and charges a 10 per cent service fee—no phone orders accepted. Salerno said the original betting parlor, The Pegasus Co., opened in Chicago July 4, 1975, and was closed by police the same

day. The owners were charged with gambling. The case awaits Illinois Appellate Court whose decision may be appealed to the Supreme Court. Zoning Comm. Ken Cohen asked for an opinion from the Village Attorney whether the service could be prohibited in Niles under Home Rule. Salerno said he contacted The Pegasus and a similar location on

Grand ave. for criteria inquiry. The Service employs 6 clerks at 3 windows to take bets from 10:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. daily with an average of 50 customers at one time, he noted. Racetrack officials are unhappy with the services which allegedly have decreased track attendance approximately 8 per cent. ... Predicated on final approval Continued on Page 22

Whenever I think of the first day of school I think of new corduroy pants which made a swishing noise when you walked between the seats in the narrow aisles.

The first day meant great anticipation and meeting all the kids you hadn't seen for many weeks. The first day meant girls' new dresses, and new or polished saddle shoes. And the still warm weather meant lagging pennies on the sidewalk in front of school. And heading for the bushes across the street where a crap game was camouflaged from the school officials.

The warm first day was always a good feeling. It was the feeling of running. You ran in the schoolyard. And you ran past the girls, brushing against them on the sidewalk, in hot pursuit of somebody who had grabbed something from you.

The first day had the smell of the new. The school was freshly painted, the books smelled new, and even the old teachers seemed new. They had on new smiles which somehow lasted thru the first day. And that meant the teacher the older kids had told you about wasn't half as bad as they said she was...at least for the first day.

The candy man was a more welcome sight the first day than he was during last spring's days. Somehow you had more money the first day and you bought Mary Janes or malted milk balls, red hots and jawbreakers, or even a hot dog.

And the first day meant lots of sitting around in restaurants and drug stores and ice cream shops. It meant walking home from school with an endless pack of first dayers. It meant bags of french fries, with lots of catsup. The first day also meant breaking away from the pack. If the girl of last spring

125 homeowners oppose purchase of homes by Jerry's Market

Oketo residents oppose parking lot

More than 125 homeowners, largely from the Golden Triangle area (bounded by Milwaukee-Oakton-Harlem-Howard), unanimously vetoed Tuesday, Sept. 7 a proposed bid by Jerry's Fruit and Garden Center, 7901 Milwaukee ave., for a parking lot which would ultimately require the

razing of 4 homes east of the Center on Oketo Avenue. Rumors of the intended plan brought Niles residents together in protest Tuesday night ("a full house" noted one resident) at the Niles Park Rec Center, to which a representative from Jerry's Center

Mikva backs Medicare amendment to cover physical extenders

Congressman Abner J. Mikva is cosponsoring an amendment to the Social Security Act to permit Medicare reimbursements for physical extender services.

There are more than 2,800 physical extenders in the country who are trained professionals who dispense primary and emergency health care in areas where there are few, if any, doctors.

Physical extenders include physical assistants, nurse practitioners, nurse clinicians and other trained practitioners who have successfully completed a program of study approved by the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, who are certified as physicians' assistants by the National Board of Medical Examiners, or who are licensed or

otherwise recognized by a state as qualified to provide primary health care services in the state in which such services are rendered. The amendment specifies that the physical extenders perform under the supervision of a physician.

"The intent of the amendment is to correct the imbalance that currently exists in the distribution of health care services," Congressman Mikva explained. "In many cases, the areas most in need of health services—rural and inner city areas—are most discriminated against by the current Social Security laws that do not provide reimbursement for services by physical extenders. The amendment would correct this inequity in the system and, hopefully, begin to correct the imbalance in health care distribution."

The amendment is a logical extension of the health manpower legislation enacted by Congress in the 1960's to assist health professional schools so that the supply of health personnel would be increased.

Chief sponsors of the legislation are Congressman John J. Ducas (R-Tenn.), Phil Landrum (D-Georgia) and James Symington (D-Missouri).

"There is evidence to support our belief that such an amendment will result in overall savings to the Medicare program," Congressman Mikva said. "In areas previously unserved by primary medical care, the introduction of physical extenders has produced decreases of 10% to 15% in hospitalization days," he added.

District 71 announces school lunch policy

The Niles Elementary School, Clarence E. Culver, Superintendent, today announced its policy for Free Milk and Free Meals or Reduced Price Meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free milk and free meals or reduced price meals. In addition, families that

do not meet these criteria but have expenses such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free milk and free or reduced price meals for them, the family should contact the school.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his/her race, sex, color, or national origin.

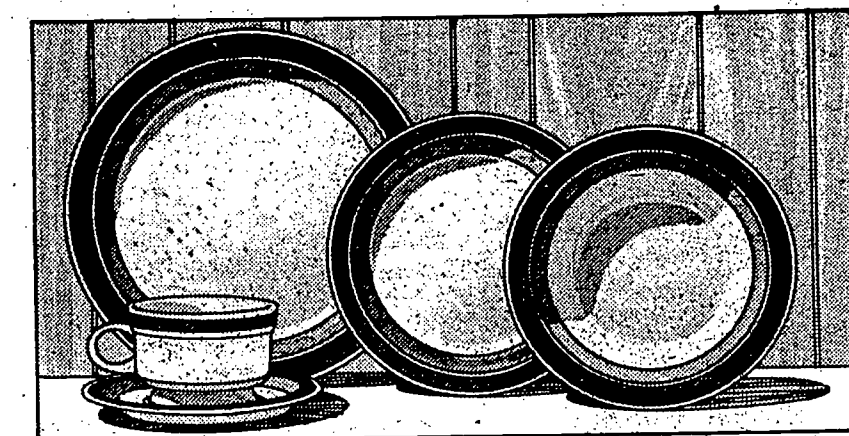

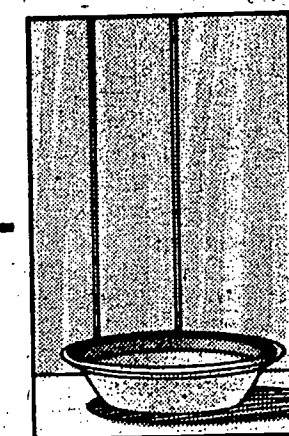

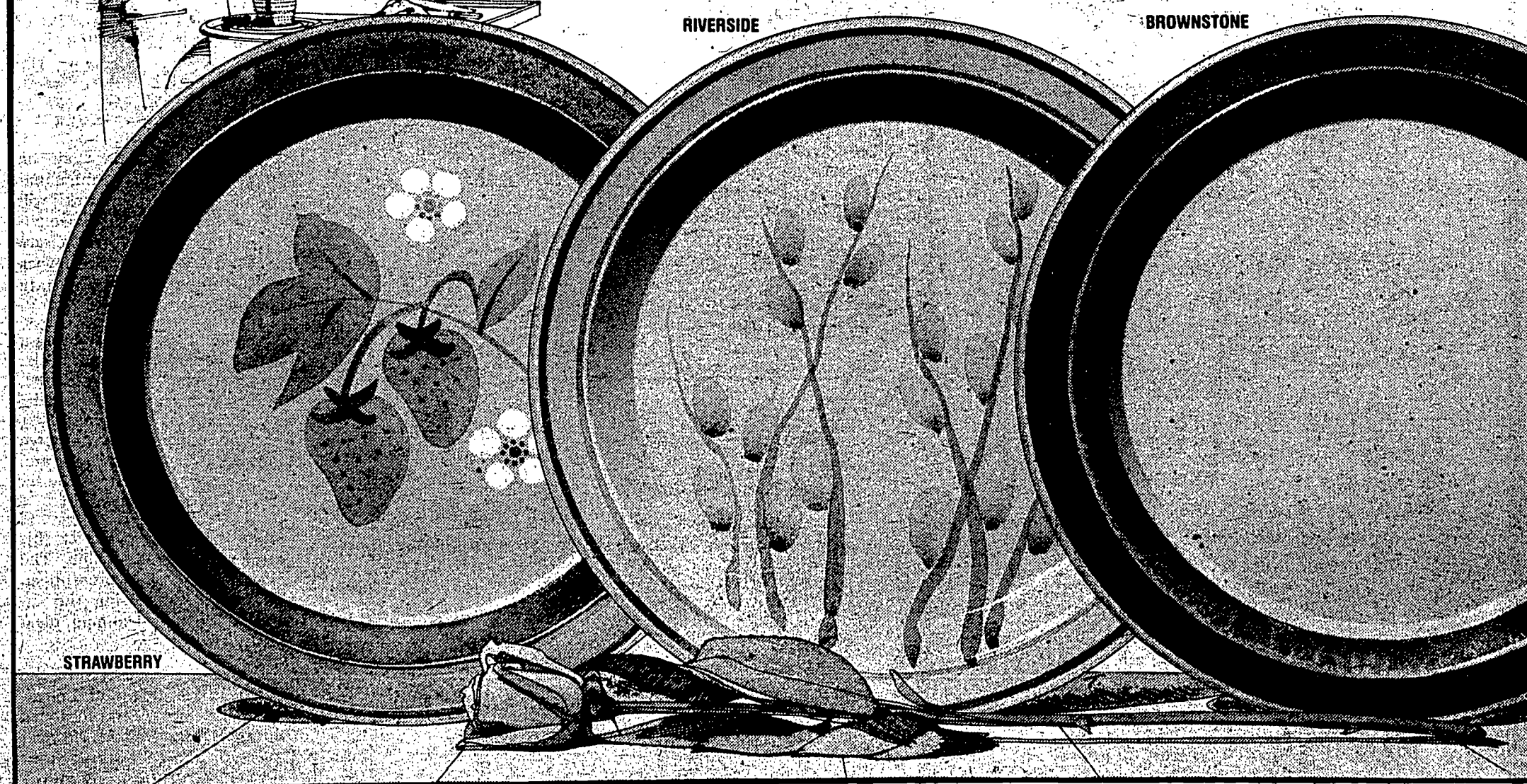

In recent months, St. Benedict's home for the aging in Niles has expanded its pro-life apostolate by introducing a new program which will help protect life at the other end of the age spectrum — the unborn child.

In cooperation with Catholic Charities of Chicago, St. Benedict's is accepting the temporary placement of unwed mothers who will live and work at the home during their pregnancy. The arrangement provides the girls with a peaceful, comfortable and secure living environment and an opportunity to hold a salaried job. The girls are employed in either the office or the kitchen at St. Benedict's; however, their work schedules are flexible to allow for adequate rest and to meet the individual needs of each young woman.

The girls are paid for their work and this, in turn, enables them to pay a small fee for their room and board and to save for their own personal needs.

"The health needs of each young woman are kept in mind," explained Sister Irene Sebo, OSB, administrator of St. Benedict's.

"Time is set aside for regular check-ups with her doctor and for conferences with the social worker assigned to her by Catholic Charities.

"Each unwed mother has the further security of knowing that she will not be alone when the time of her delivery comes," added Sister Irene. "A staff member will accompany her to the hospital, if she wishes, and remain until the child is born and the mother is back in the recovery room."

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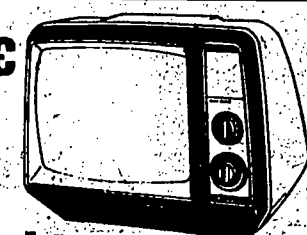

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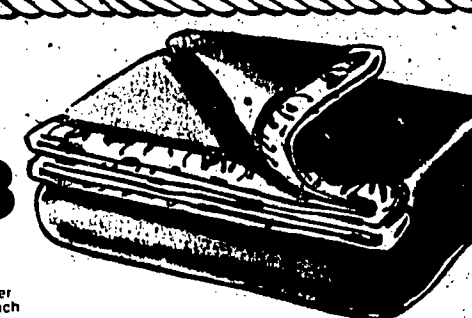

Between The Bugle and its friends Theatre Books

Pick up your chapeau, and your chap-bow, and hurry out to Lake Forest where one of the truly fine theatre productions of many seasons is now appearing at the Academy Festival Theatre on the Barat College campus. The play is *Misalliance* by George Bernard Shaw. A tour de force in conversation which is a triumph whose exacting success may well send it on to Broadway.

The comedic play was written in 1909 and is as current as it was written this morning.

While there are several Shavian misalliances which Shaw touches upon, the joining of families of the working class and the aristocracy in England is the peg which Shaw hangs his story on. An underwear tycoon's daughter (Lynn Redgrave) is engaged to marry the son of an aristocrat, a misalliance between a healthy, headstrong, free thinking, young lady with an intellectual pipsqueak who throws tantrums at fitful moments. Into their garden house drops a handsome pilot and a Polish acrobat (Irene Worth) who upset the rather dull routines of life with a chase into the bushes of the headstrong daughter by the pilot, and the scandalous unorthodox "exercising" of the menfolk by the acrobat.

While Irene Worth plays her role nobly, Lynn Redgrave's portrayal of a daughter longing for life, and her father, Donald Moffat, bewhiskered in the Shavian tradition, carry off the play in rousing fashion. Moffat, the underwear tycoon, and father of the precocious daughter, is pivotal in the play's success. Almost three hours of conversation surrounds Moffat, whose blustering bravados are done with great skill.

William Atherton, the somewhat vacuous pilot, carries off daughter, Hypatia, with the first glow of romance, and the second glow of hard-nosed money-gathering from the tycoon-father.

Richard Pilcher's role as the fallen suitor is superb, as are Polly Rowles, the proper mother and wife of the headstrong girl and husband.

Emery Battis, the aristocrat father, Robert Moberly, the squeaky socialist, and Neil Hunt, as the smug overbearing son of the tycoon, are excellent in their roles.

The casting of the show is precise, the portrayals being near-perfect, and 3 hours of Shavian comedy crisply moves along with much wit and laughter.

This play is destined for a long run. If you enjoy theatre, you'll be enthralled with *Misalliance*, an alliance of sharp comedy and superb acting.

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Howard Teichmann's *Smart Aleck, The Wit, World And Life of Alexander Woolcott*, is a marvelous portrait of a unique American.

Woolcott was a product of a poor home, a rotund body, a frustrated libido and an acerbic wit whose address was the White House, when in Washington, and who counted as his close friends the luminaries of the theatre and the writing profession the world over.

Woolcott is the story of the 20's in America. The story of that bejeweled make-believe period when America hung between two wars. A period when mountains of wealth and reputations were made overnight. And it was Woolcott who claimed to be the maker of so many reputations. Perhaps. The flycover and the news release of the book claims he encouraged Robeson to sing, George Kaufman to write, W.C. Fields to turn from juggling to becoming a comic and Will Rogers from a comedian to a writer. It is claimed he discovered the Marx Brothers, Helen Hayes, Lunt and Fontanne, Fred and Adele Astaire and Ruth Gordon and Katherine Cornell. Apocryphal, perhaps, but he was at the center of the action during these marvelous times.

Prior to World War I he landed a job on the New York Times and became first of their many outstanding critics. During World War I he joined Harold Ross on Stars and Stripes. And again the author makes the rotund one a bit heroic, climbing out of trenches while shells burst all around while he covered every major battle in Europe.

Returning to America he escorted the young unknown Helen Hayes to a theatre party, in which a very sophisticated party, after an opening nite performance came to a hypnotic halt when the critic Woolcott, entered the room. Very jocularly he put down the writer-director Noel Coward, who bowed his knee to the great one, just as most of the Woolcott's acquaintances did throughout the book.

Teichmann wrote an interesting biography of a sophisticated who was the center of all his social groups. The famous Algonquin Round Table crowd of the 20's pivoted around this man whose immature tantrums were better portrayed in books about New Yorker editor Ross, writer Dorothy Parker and Robert Benchley.

Woolcott was bigger than life. So much that his friend, George Kauffman, immortalized him as Sheridan Whiteside in *The Man Who Came To Dinner*. Woolcott, a non-actor, played the role of himself and it has since become an American classic.

He grew up in a communal home and chose similar communal living when he moved into the 3 story residence of editor Ross.

His incredible life style involuntarily moved him out of their apartment and finally out of the building. But his penchant for having people around him caused him to purchase a summer home in which the elite of the theatre-writing world in New York would be in attendance thruout the summer.

Woolcott was a man of immense passions. Of immense everything. Immense appetites, and immense propensity for acquiring friends and acquaintances. He was beloved, somewhat sympathetically, by most who knew him.

His contribution to this make-believe era was substantial in magazines, newspapers and as the Town Crier on the radio.

Woolcott would likely be forgotten by all but his dwindling number of friends. But Teichmann's portrayal, while not too even and well-balanced, nevertheless, re-introduces us to a man of immensity, somewhat larger than life, who occupied a very large stage, quite often in the center, during the 20's and 30's.

Feels Bike Patrol goes to extremes

To the Editors and Readers:

After reading your article in the September 2 issue about the Niles Bike Patrol, we find ourselves compelled to voice an opinion about them. We don't believe that his article fully evaluated the purpose and means for which the Bike Patrol was instituted.

For example, on August 24, a 16-year-old boy, with no previous police record, was arrested and charged with "duty to keep to right" and "trick riding on bike."

He was denied the right to walk one house over to get his mother, and to speak with her until \$25 bond was posted. A group of concerned friends went to the police station to inquire about his arrest. One of them offered to pay the bail, but was refused any information about the charges. To top it off, the desk sergeant was totally unaware of the presence of a prisoner.

However, this letter is not to argue the innocence or guilt of the boy in question. This is to question whether or not the arrest was necessary for such menial charges.

In the instances cited in the article, another 16-year-old boy only received 3 tickets and a \$3.50

fine after 3 weeks of running from the Bike Patrol, whereas this boy stopped quietly.

We concede that safety is important, but should it be carried out to such an extreme that a great amount of time, money, and manpower should be spent on something as simple and enjoyable as riding a bicycle?

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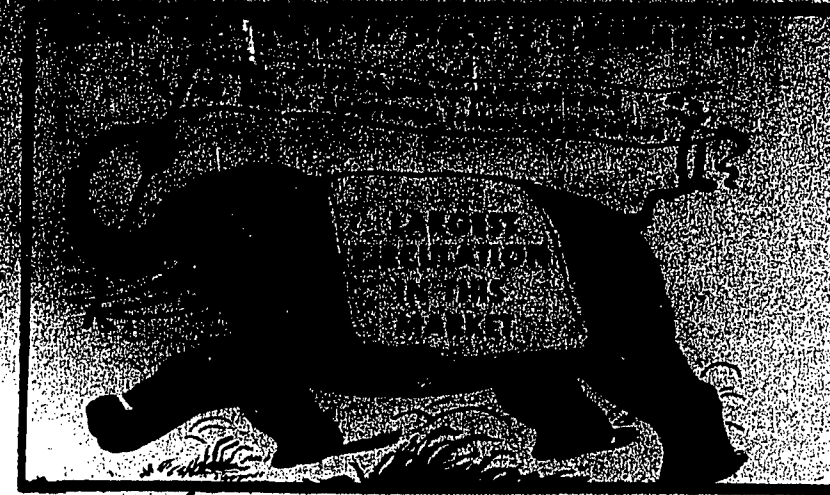

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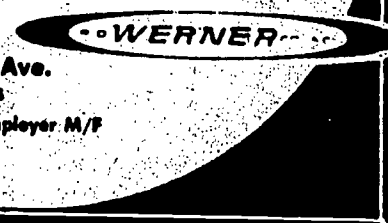

due to the fact that he had sold to a couple who did not reveal that the purchase was for Jerry's Market. His suspicions were aroused when the purchase was set up under a land trust, he said.

Ship claimed the subterfuge was necessary for appraisal of the homes to avoid a raise in purchase price.

Further statement by Ship, that he had to get traffic off Milwaukee ave., that he paid \$9 hourly wages to police to direct traffic at the entrance drew anger from a nearby homeowner who said "a larger parking lot will create more traffic."

"You are meeting a wall of hostility," said resident Karen Shields.

John Nelson, 7538 Octavia, was concerned over "invasion of a residential neighborhood... Gas stations are over-abundant... that most abusive signs in the world have gone up here... and now this."

A Niles housewife observed that commercially zoned areas "were not doing well," pointing out Lawrencewood and Candlelight Court.

"Should the spot zoning be granted," said Kermit Creager, "what's to prevent the other 6 to 8 homes on Oketo plus 3 more on Oakton from being gobbled up by Jerry's?"

During a Tuesday morning phone conversation with Mayor Nicholas Blase, according to Mrs. Koerner, the Mayor had said "if

the residents on the block do not approve of it (parking lot), then in no way will the re-zoning be approved."

Further action by Jerry's Center necessitates petition for rezoning before the Zoning Board; publication of such intent in the newspaper; 15 days notification to adjoining property owners (including the Park District); a Hearing date before the Zoning Board and final decision by the Village Board of Trustees.

Officials of the Golden Triangle Homeowners Group promised support of the residents' decision to veto the parking lot. "Stay with us... we know what to do," they promised, "altho we need full support and your physical presence at future meetings."

"It may be possible that Jerry's owners may decide against continuing plans for the parking lot in view of the resident opposition."
