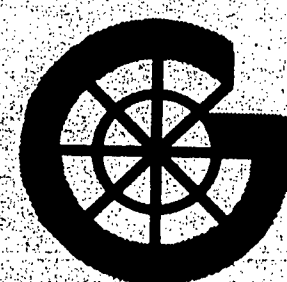
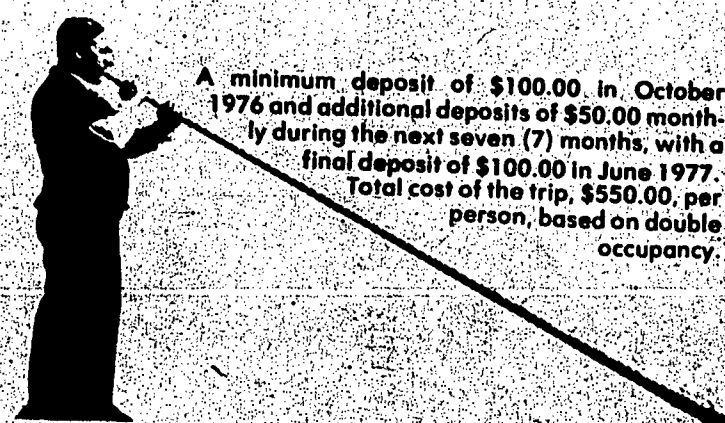


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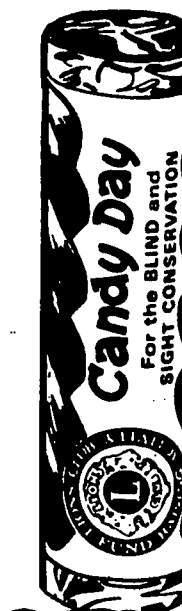

## Niles Days disburses profits

The Niles Days Committee Monday night distributed \$11,879 to 15 Niles groups in net profits from a total 1976 Festival Days receipts of \$43,755.35.

The top \$7,500 by Niles Days resolution was presented to the Niles Bicentennial Commission to partially fund the successful Bicentennial weekend of a Com-

munity Fair, Parade and Fireworks last July 4.

The remaining \$4,379, representing a 20% funding of the total \$21,895 originally requested by them, went to 14 local groups. Decreased Festival profits this year (down from last year's net of \$22,500) were blamed on the televised Canadian Olympics held the same weekend, two previous carnivals held in the same area and on rain.

Receiving 1976 monies were: Niles Baseball League, \$601.20 for new uniforms; League of Women Voters, \$20 for printing and distribution of Voter Guides; Niles Art Guild, \$220 to fund

## From the Left Hand

We received a telephone call Tuesday morning from a School District 64 parent concerning a notice she received from the administration of the Park Ridge-Niles elementary district. She said she was reminded the schools would be open, to send her children, though she should escort them to school and stay with them until they enter the school building. The implication was her children may need protection during any teacher strike. The mother who called thought this notice was a bit much.

After reading about last week's school imbroglio in Niles Township, plus last year's experience with the four-day strike in District 63, we're wondering what kind of judgement is being elected to school boards in our districts.

While collective bargaining and the right to strike, is not a joint legal action in Illinois, nevertheless, the intimidating actions by school boards are atrocious. These same rights are legal in many other states and the likelihood of their being made legal in Illinois can be expected in the immediate years.

For the District 219 Board to fire employees who have given loyal service for many years is incredible. And for District 64's Board to hint school children may be harmed is a despicable act.

Whether or not you agree with the rights of public employees to be the same as those of employees in the private sector, it seems obvious one reason why teachers' salaries have lagged behind the private sector is they have had no means to seek fair address.

It has been the history of the labor movement in this country union activity has followed abuses by employers. What we are seeing today is a last gasp dying effort by autocratic employers, whose arbitrary actions have kept the pay scale of their employees below what is their rightful due.

In the scale of social values teachers' contributions exceed most occupations. Yet, they have long lagged behind when it came to compensation. Women's libbers could latch onto this

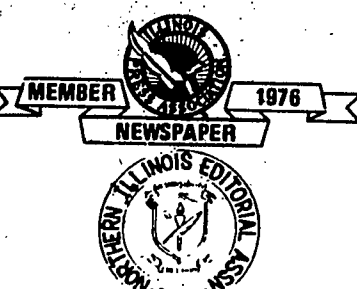

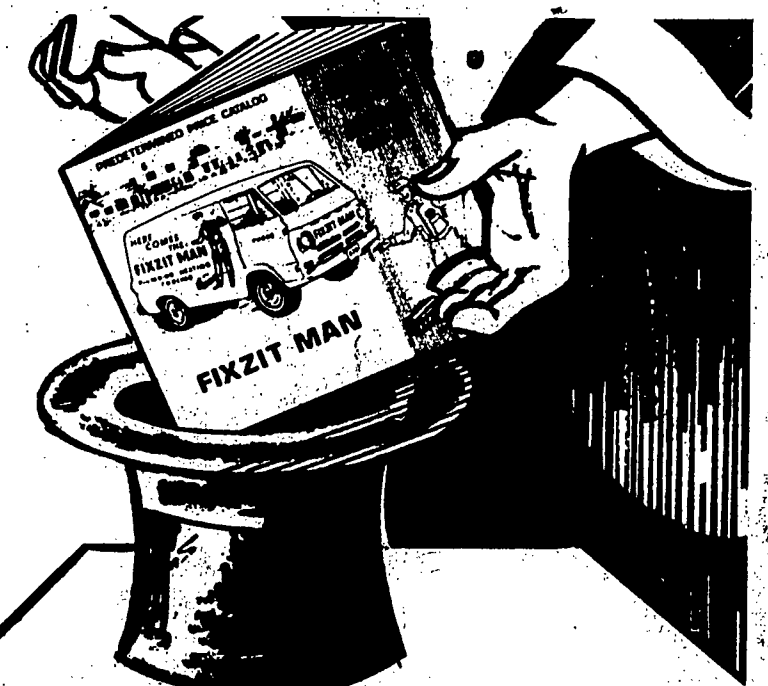

a 14-6 lead.

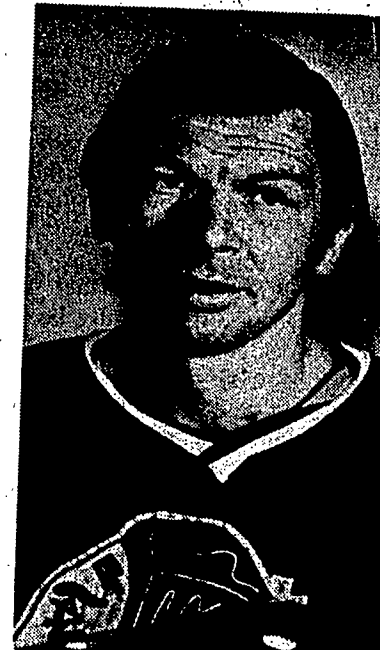
Sam Donatucci regained the

prevention information. As a community service, the Bureau of Fire Prevention will inspect your home for fire safety. However, this inspection must be requested by the individual home owner. A home fire inspection will include advice on the proper location of home smoke and heat detectors, and planning emergency escape. To make an appointment for a home inspection, residents may call the Fire Prevention Bureau, 965-5030, weekdays until 5 p.m.

Behind almost every family tragedy in a dwelling fire is the fact they were totally unprepared for the emergency. National Fire Protection Association studies show the great majority of lives taken by home fires were needlessly lost because of failure to preplan and rehearse escape measures. Chief Huscher offers the following fire safety hints:

1. Get everybody out at the first sign of fire. Unless you have done some thinking and planning, you and your family may not be able to escape.

2. Prepare a home life safety plan for your family; then rehearse it to make sure that

everyone, including children, knows exactly what to do.

3. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for blocking of stairways and halls by fire.

4. Make it the rule to sleep with bedroom doors closed, because closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke, allowing extra time for escape.

5. For upper floor escape, a window may be your only alternate route. Be sure exit windows work easily, and are low and large enough to get through.

6. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet for "roll call", and be sure everyone understands that the house must not be re-entered for any purpose.

7. Know how to call the fire department by street box or telephone (in Morton Grove dial 965-2121) and do this as quickly as possible after leaving the house.

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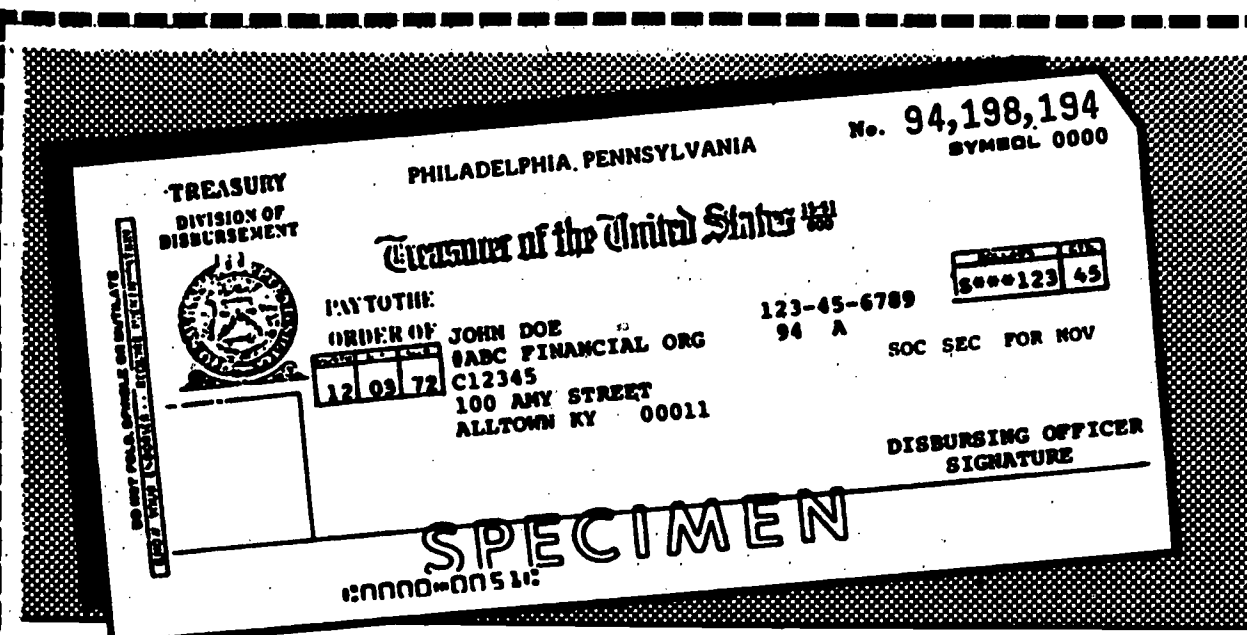

as another example of unequal treatment in our society. If the teaching profession, particularly at the grammar school level, was dominated by men, you can be sure the salary schedule would be substantially higher.

School Board president Larry Reiss did not know the exact figure but said it was likely to be such an amount. He said the Board hosts one evening a year with these heads of district 63 schools and feels such an evening is worthwhile. This activity has been an annual affair for some years.

Since the subject is schools, District 63 parents might be interested in an \$800 dinner fee the school board is presenting to them. A school teacher in the district asked us two weeks ago about the fee. She said the board will host the administration, the principals, and their spouses, at a get-together dinner which will run about \$800. "Why," asks the teacher, "must the district cut-back on programs to conserve money, and then wantonly toss 800 bucks around for one evening's entertainment for board members, administrators and their husbands and wives?"

We had an interesting news story in recent weeks which bears comment.

A Niles lady was involved in an auto accident with a Niles fire ambulance. A Bugle correspondent reported the accident. The lady was making a left turn into a shopping center and it was reported her auto collided with the ambulance which was making an emergency run.

We made several telephone calls to all three departments of the village and found out her story was correct. The ambulance siren was not on which was of paramount importance. While we did not discuss the insurance problem we assumed her receiving compensation rested on whether or not the siren was on. The story also left the impression her driving was in error which reflected poorly on her.

After checking with all departments Niles finest came through with flying colors. Rather than rally around one another Police Lieutenant Frank Stankowicz said the ambulance siren was silent. Had it occurred in other towns, the officials would likely have remained silent, and the lady-driver would have been unfairly treated. But Stankowicz and Niles Police Chief Emrikson played it straight readily admitting to the siren's silence.

We have been quick to point out shortcomings in this department in the past. The Stankowicz-Emrikson action was most exemplary and deserves recognition.

In this post-Watergate era, where so few seem to trust their government representatives, an effort such as this, made by these policemen, goes a long way to reverse government suspicion by the public.

An accolade should also go to the lady who refused to accept what she felt was an unfair report. Her persistence resulted in the correct story being reported. Her effort was equally exemplary.

## Swine flu inoculation warning

Jack Reeves, coordinator of the Maine Township Senior Citizens Swine Flu Inoculation program, has issued a warning to township residents to be certain they get the correct kind of the two types of vaccine available when inoculated.

Reeves said many persons are aware that there is one type of vaccine for senior citizens and another for the general public, but most are unaware that persons under 60 with certain chronic diseases should not receive the vaccine intended for the general public.

Persons with heart disease, diabetes, chronic kidney diseases and lung diseases such as asthma, emphysema, and chronic bronchitis should receive the bivalent type vaccine for persons over 60, not the monovalent form used for the general public, Reeves said.

The bivalent vaccine contains swine flu serum and a second strain called A/Victoria. It is intended to prevent the serious complications persons with these

diseases could suffer if they are stricken by influenza.

Reeves urged persons with such health problems to see their physicians to determine the appropriate type of vaccine for them.

Reeves said Maine Township is responsible for the inoculation of senior citizens and persons with chronic diseases. Cities and villages are responsible for inoculating the general public.

Reeves added that the township program has been delayed pending arrival of the bivalent vaccine, but that inoculation centers have been designated. The dates and locations will be announced as soon as the delivery dates of the vaccine becomes known.

Reeves also said that Maine Township is still in need of volunteers, including registered nurses and senior citizens, to assist in the program.

Reeves said persons willing to volunteer their services should call him at the Maine Township offices, 297-2514.

## Village amends animal code

The Village Board of Trustees, Sept. 28 unanimously approved an amendment to the Animal and Fowl Code which tightened restrictions on the sale of animals within the village.

The ordinance was proposed for amendment due to approximately 12 complaints received from village residents over the past 18 months who had purchased sick or diseased animals from the Animal World Pet Shop, according to Village Clerk Frank Wagner.

The amended code gives the village the right to make periodic inspection of kennels and pet stores to determine health and sanitation conditions.

It also permits hire of a licensed veterinarian to examine an animal following a complaint report within 48 hours of purchase and provides the veterinarian fee of "reasonable" cost be billed to the shop which sold the animal.

The amendment further provides a copy of the inspection report be given to the shop owner.

## Niles Fire Department extends CPR classes

The Niles Fire Department will extend their CPR classes for Niles residents into November because of the unusually large response to their pilot program which has been planned for October only.

According to Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl, the program, consisting of one 3 1/2 hour session, originally had been planned for classes of not more than 20 persons on each Monday evening of the month. However, he said, the response has been so overwhelming that additional classes will be held and enrollment must be restricted to residents of Niles and all other requests will be referred to the appropriate fire department or other closest agency conducting CPR classes.

The course, which teaches the proper technique of using cardiopulmonary resuscitation, will be given by the department's paramedics. Firefighter/Paramedic

Richard Valkanet, the department's paramedic coordinator, said that enrollees must be at least 18 years old, and should wear casual clothes because they will be working with a lifelike mannequin. The Niles Lions Club recently made a presentation to the Fire Department of a Recording Resuscitator, the most advanced model available, which emits a recording tape indicating if the trainee is properly administering the rescue technique.

Chief Hoelbl indicated that the November sessions are presently being planned for the first two Mondays of the month. If the response continues to be great, additional classes may be scheduled. The classes will start at 6:30 p.m.

a statement that the annual salary of a teacher would not be considered. The Board also agreed to provide written reasons to teachers who are honorably dismissed because of reduction in staff. The PREA maintained its position that reduction in staff must be in accordance with strict district seniority within three categories, regardless of qualifications. The Board stated its firm belief that qualifications, along with seniority, must be considered.

The Board's last salary proposal calls for a base salary of \$9,825 and credit for professional growth computed on a base of \$9,900. This proposal would provide the District's 270 teachers with an average increase of over \$800 per school year, or 5 1/2%. The PREA is demanding a base of \$10,425 for experience and \$10,450 for professional growth. This would amount to an approximate \$1,850 average raise per teacher, or an increase of about 12%.

At the outset of negotiations on Monday, the Board team proposed extending the teachers' agreement until Monday, October 11. The PREA refused to respond to this proposal.

At 6:20 AM, the PREA proposed mediation. The Board team stated that this proposal would be submitted to the full Board.

At a special meeting held at 8:30 AM, Tuesday, October 5, the Board unanimously agreed to request the appointment of a Federal Mediator so the schools can be open. The Board is hopeful the PREA will join with it in requesting that the Chicago office of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service appoint a mediator to assist the parties in resolving the few remaining issues in negotiations.

At noon, Tuesday, the Park Ridge Niles Board of Education District 64 and the Park Ridge Education Association jointly requested that the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service appoint a professional Mediator to assist the parties in reaching agreement on unresolved issues in negotiations. programs, artists and demonstrators; Maine-Niles Camp Fire Girls, \$100 for purchase of plants and materials for shut-ins; Knights of Columbus, \$240 for purchase of equipment for Jefferson School Handicapped Children; Senior Citizens Club of Niles, \$300 to cover cost of bus trips.

Also, Niles Amateur Hockey Assoc., \$660 for medical insurance costs and learn-how program; Niles All-American Seniors Club, \$200 to defray cost of bus trips; Lions Club, \$500 for purchase of materials for visually handicapped for presentation to the Niles Public Library; Niles Falcons Junior Football Assoc., \$352.80 to purchase jerseys and equipment; Scouts of America, \$185 for field trips, repair of Scoutmobile, camping equipment; Garden Club of Niles, \$500 to refurbish 60 ten-year-old flower baskets on Milwaukee ave.; Grandmothers Club, \$200 to cover bus fares; and the Niles Policemen's Benevolent Association, \$380 toward life insurance for 53 members.

In 1975 a record request totaling \$34,836.69 had been made by Niles Days Board of Directors recommendations to \$28,150. The Niles Festival Days net proceeds of \$22,552.47, augmented with a 1974 carryover of \$5,432.64, resulted in a 1% decreased disbursement of \$27,868.50 to 15 Niles organizations in 1975.

In second action Monday night the Executive Board of Niles Days recommended approval by resolution to financially support annual July 4th village celebrations of fireworks display and a parade up to \$7,500 per year. The monies would come from fund-raising by the Days Committee, a representative group of Niles organizations, thru an annual five-day festival traditionally held in July. Excess of the committed Fourth of July funds would be distributed to Niles organizations requesting hand-outs.

The recommending action stemmed from a pre-emptory request last September by the Village Board to the Niles Days Committee to undertake funding of the July 4th celebrations "for total community involvement."

In final action Niles Days officers and directors were elected unanimously for 1976-77 from the nominating slate offered by committee.

Also the Chairman noted a need for new ideas, chairs were shuffled around to accommodate the same Board members who have run the committee for the last five years, with the exception of two new candidates. Terry Shevelenko (Niles Jaycees) was appointed to serve the remaining one year directorship left vacant by the resignation of Chris O'Brien. The second was newly elected Director Mike Wallace, for one year.

Elected to office were chairman Anthony Gagliano; vice-chairman June Haas; secretary Betty Cusi-mano; treasurer Bernadine Reid; personnel director Ed Brasch. Directors for two years were Bill Biers, Norm Katz and Ben Mankowsky. Other directors include Eddie Schuett, committed to two more years, and Joe Booker, for another year.

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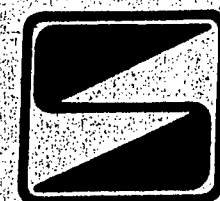
