

Zoning Board tables decision on 'wrap up' reducing method



Nilesites, whose postal office is part of the Chicago system. have-all mail going downtown for sorting. We were told Tuesday if there is only a small volume of mail in Niles and a couple of trainees are available. then some of Niles mail could be sorted here. Preprints and newspapers, which are already sorted by carrier and delivered to Niles, are the only mail which does not take a trip into Chicago's Loop.

Potted house plants are available in many sizes. The smaller pots indicate vounger plants that have a onger life ahead of them if they are cared for properly. If you are giving a potted plant to someone who is not used to growing plants, include a book on indoor plants as part of your gift.

Make A Snowy Christmas Tree

This year, why not give your holiday gifts a three-dimensional look with an easy-to-make decoration like the one photographed here? All you will need are some Q-tips cotton swabs, cardboard, solid-color giftwrap paper, glue and two small pieces of styrofoam.

Here's how: make a cardboard triangle almost as tall as your wrapped package. Cover it with solid-color gift-wrap paper. Glue a tiny piece of styro-foam on the back. Set the "trunk" of the tree in the other piece of styrofoam, then cover with gift wrap paper.

You will need 41 Q-tips cotton swabs for this snowy tree. Snip off ends with

scissors so swabs will cover the cardboard as shown. When the layout looks right, glue them in place and allow to dry thoroughly.

This unique tree can be fastened to the box by taping the styrofoam on the back to the box. Design can be removed easily and used decoratively.


This same idea has been used sucessfully for many years by kindergarten and nursery school teachers. Little children learn to identify colors along with a sense of responsibility for their possessions.



Evanston Federal reduces mortgage rate to 8½%
