

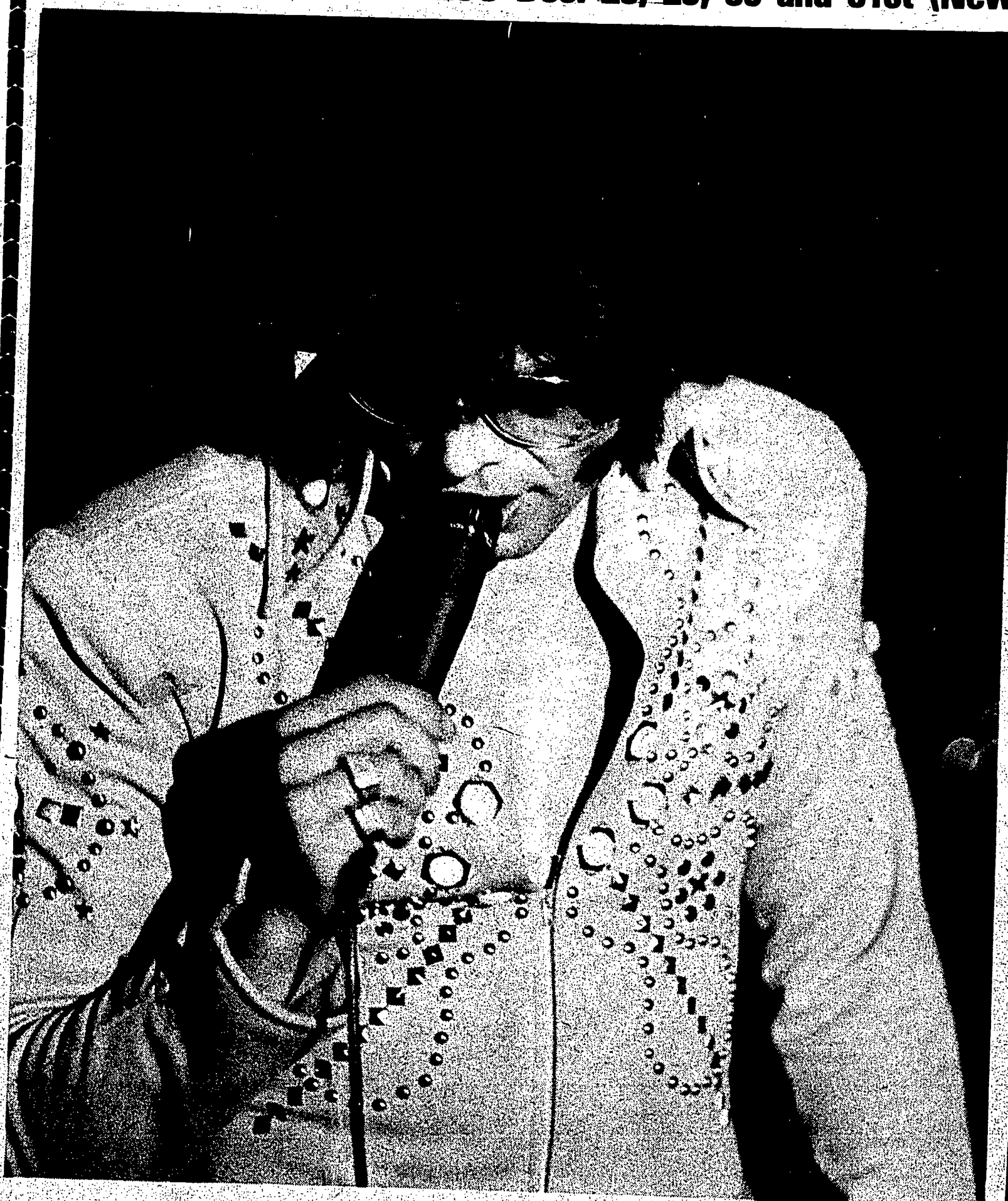

Niles eyes reciprocal recreation with Des Plaines

Niles and Des Plaines Park Districts are exploring future reciprocal use of recreational facilities.

Niles Park Director Bill Hughes told commissioners Tuesday night, Dec. 21 that Des Plaines has made overtures for use of the Niles Ballard Ice Rink and participation in the learn-to-skate programs.

In return, Niles Park District residents will have reciprocal privileges at the 73-acre Lake Park, which offers fishing, boat rentals, sailing and canoeing at its man-made Lake Opeka. The park and lake are located west of Mannheim Road between Howard St. and Touhy Ave. along Lee St. in Des Plaines.

In seeking co-operative agreement between the two suburbs, Des Plaines Park Director David Markworth said in a Dec. 2 letter to Hughes, a similar agreement between Des Plaines and Park Ridge Park districts "did not develop as it was intended," but did not enlarge on the statement.

Des Plaines does not have a formal ice rink but depends on weather usage of its parks for skating. Niles, as yet has not formed its own lake.

Hughes said the two districts would "have to sit down and work out the details." As for other recreational facilities, he noted Des Plaines has an 18-hole golf course "which we may exclude since we have our own."

Niles Park Board approval was necessary at this time he said in order to include agreement in the next Ice Skating Program which opens January 17 and extends thru March.

Driver's license, library card or utility bill, wherever applicable, will be required for identification purposes said Hughes.

In other action an Ice Rink Program Award was presented to the Niles Park District by the Illinois Chapter of the Ice Skating Institute of America. The plaque cited the park district for "excellence in ice rink programming" for the 75-76 skating season.

The Park Director reported the doors to Grennan Heights Gym have been resurfaced with steel frames and cedar panels and with replacements of panel, wired glass. "Vandalism has been reduced considerably," he said in noting the glass in the atrium (inner court) had also been replaced.

Comr. Steve Chameriski requested park district residency be reconsidered for park employees due to the recent Supreme Court ruling which upheld the Chicago residency requirement for city employees.

While Comr. Jeff Arnold noted city employees were hired with full knowledge of the residency requirement, Park Attorney Gabriel Berrafato commended residency reconsideration by the Niles Board for possible expansion. "It's worth some study," he said.

A decline in attendance at the Annual Ice Derby held in the Ballard Ice Rink last year sent the Derby back to Grennan Heights Park January 15 for outside participation.

Following Tuesday night's board meeting Park Comr. Jeffrey Arnold indicated his intention to file petitions in January for one of the two 4-year vacancies on the Park Board. Comr. Bill Keener, whose term will also expire in 1977, has not definitely indicated his intentions to date. Park and Village elections will be April 19, 1977.

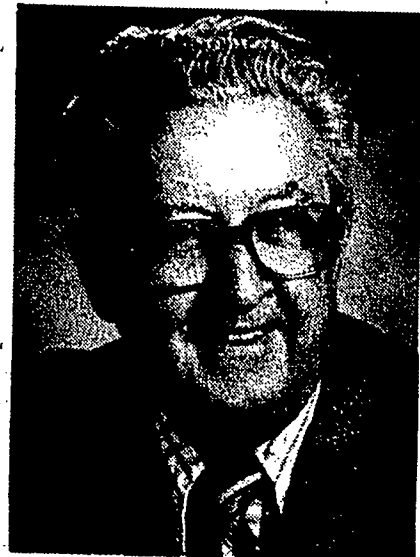
Mc Donnell retires from First National of Des Plaines

Orchard Center changes name

Orchard Center will be newly named ORCHARD MENTAL HEALTH CENTER OF NILES TOWNSHIP. The center located at 8600 Gross Point rd., Skokie, was established in Sept. '69 as a not-for-profit community mental health center, and it provides a wide array of mental health services to all residents of Niles Township. Besides an annual grant from the Illinois Department of Mental Health, Orchard Mental Health Center of Niles Township receives its principal funding from the Niles Township

Administration, Skokie Valley United Crusade, Village of Skokie, the National Council of Jewish Women, and local organizations as the Morton Grove Women's Club.

Some of the services provided by OMHC of Niles Township are Group, family and individual therapy, Socialization program for adults with chronic emotional problems, Early Intervention for infants up to three years of age and treatment for school age children through adolescence. Turning Point provides group therapy for adolescents who have

concerns about identity and who need guidance in establishing themselves as independent people. Groups meet to discuss issues such as friends, family, school, drugs and self.

Orchard Mental Health Center recently sent out its first Newsletter called ORCHARD SCENE to many residents of Niles Township. The letter describes the various programs and services and introduces many of the staff. Anyone who would like to receive one may stop by the Center or call 967-7300.

Mikva's high school interns make plans for 1977
