Furnace filters should be replaced according to manufacturers directions, in most instances this is on a monthly basis during the winter heating

Fan belts on hot air furnaces should be checked for fraying or cracking or if the belt is loose. Motors should be oiled as directed by the manufacturer and checked, if the motor is making noise, that could mean bearings

Furnace humidifier motors should also be checked on a regular basis. Keep all combustibles away from furnace area and from hot water tank so there is less chance of having flammable material start on fire.

During the spring, furnace chimneys should be checked for necessary repair work.
