

Residents should be sure to bring along all records of previous tax year (IRS Federal and State copies). Clients should itemize and total all income (salary, wages, commissions, dividends, interest, rent, etc.) and list all expenses such as medical, contributions; taxes, state income, real estate, gasoline, sales and other taxes. Be sure to have receipts for all items.



## **Oakton's Edington sets records**

Oakton's Larry Edington set new records for the Raiders at the Illinois Benedictine Open College Indoor Track meet last week.

Fifteen teams from the state of Illinos including DePaul, Loyola, and<sup>•</sup> Lewis Universities, along with Wheaton College and the University of Chicago competed in the indoor track meet.



## Mikva renews support for National Health Care proposal

Citing the upward spiral of health care costs in the Tenth District and throughout the country, Congressman Abner J. Mikva. is again cosponsoring the Kennedy-Corman proposal for a comprehensive national health insurance program.

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"This bill adequately addresses the two major facets of the health care problem in this country--the expense of decent health care, especially when catastrophic illness can wipe out a family's financial resources, and erratic delivery that results in an overabundance of health professionals in high-income areas while some poor rural and urban sections have no doctors and no hospitals," Mikva explained.

The Congressman is cosponsoring the Health Security Act of 1977, submitted by Senator Edward Kennedy, chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Health. and Congressman James Corman, a member of the House Subcommittee on Health. Mikva said he favors their approach over the other national health care proposals because it is a flexible plan that includes realistic and necessary budget restraints while providing equal benefits for all Americans with no out-of-pocket expenses. Under the Kennedy-Corman plan, national health care would be financed from a combination of general revenue and payroll taxes.

He cited statistics from the

Congressional Budget Office indicating that the cost of total health expenditures in five years will exceed \$250 billion -- \$20 billion more than the cost of health care coverage proposed in the Kennedy-Corman plan.

In a questionnaire distributed during the last Congress, Mikva asked Tenth District residents about a national health care plan. Of those who responded, 80% favored some type of national health insurance and only 20% said they preferred that the overnment take no action on the

"President Carter said during his campaign that national health insurance would be a goal of his dministration," Mikva noted. "I hope he will decide to make it a rominent legislative priority, ecause the quality of a person's health care should not be determined by his income or where he



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



A rezoning request for construction of a Planned Unit Development (PUD) at 7850 Caldwell ave. was continued to March 2 by the Niles Zoning Board of Appeals to allow for plan recommendations by the village plan-

Petitioner Edmund Beaulieu, 8058 Milwaukee ave., seeks a zoning change from B1 Special Use high rise office structure to multiple units for 76 two-bedroom apartments in 10 buildings on a 3.069 acre site. Plans call for 5 six-flat buildings, 3 eight-flats, a 10-unit building and one 12-unit condominium type 2-story building in the development.

Provision for 164 parking spaces exceeds village requirement of 152 spaces.

The property is located in a flood plain bounded by the North automotive radiator repair service Branch of the Chicago River on rto Joseph Di Maggio of Niles the west, Caldwell ave. on the Approval was predicated on no east, NI Gas Station, and apart- outside storage of unwanted ment buildings to the north.

Units in the complex expected by the developer for couples who have grown families were pro-jected to sell in the \$40,000 range with an \$8,000 downpayment. Site planning was not favorable to Comr. Charles O'Grady who called the presented PUD "just a bunch of apartment buildings"

Beaulieu said he did not have financing for office buildings that everyone is condominium or apartment building-minded." He preferred a condominium-type in June, 1976, due to gasoline complex to apartments for maintenance, he said.

The property purchased in 1972 for \$350,000 is held in trust with Beaulieu as sole beneficiary. Commissioners cautioned petitioner that any change in ownership would constitute a Major Change in PUD and the property would then revert to its original zoning.

Zoning commissioners also cautioned Beaulieu in this instance to refrain from previous. actions taken, in sale of re-zoned properties prior to development, altho according to Beaulieu, such actions were beyond his control.

In other action zoning commissioners for a second time delayed action to March 2 on a residential to manufacturing zoning change for an office complex at 7353-73 Caldwell.

Petitioner Lee Goyette asked continuance to provide for clarification of a 1956 Declaration of Restrictions set by property owner Paul Brandel which provides a 125 "buffer zone" to owners of adjacent residentially-zoned pro-



A public review of the proposed budget will be on view at all district schools from Feb. 18 to March 22, the latter date being the night of the public hearing when the adjusted budget will be approved.

Business Manager Jim Bowen said the heating budget will be increased \$32,900, a 27.4% increase from the past year. He noted the abnormal cold winter this year forced the original amount of the proposed new budget be increased by 23.2%.

In other actions Tuesday night, the Board unanimously approved a motion for a new policy for the removal of notices of remedial warnings from personnel files of school personnel.

A teacher in the district requested a review of this policy after she said an unfavorable report was placed in her file after she was involved in a teacherorganization confrontation over school policy 4 years ago. Noting the acceptance and recognition of the union in the school district the past 2 years she sought to have her former problem reviewed by the present board.

The following administrative procedure will be implemented for the removal of Notices of Remedial Warning from personnel files:

1. An employee may submit a request in writing to the Superintendent or his designee for the removal of a remedial warning from his/her personnel file after four (4) years from the date that the warning was issued.

2. In reviewing the request, the Superintendent or his designee shall take into consideration the level of remediation, evaluations, and the severity of the incident leading to the issuance of the

remedial warning. 3. The Superintendent shall advise the Board of all requests for removal from the personnel file and review with the Board the Superintendent's recommendation on the request.

4. Following failure of the Superintendent to recommend removal, or the Board to act in connection with such a request, the employee must wait one (1) calendar year from the date of the request to reapply for the removal of the remedial warning from his/her personnel file.

In other actions a policy spelling out electioneering repeated the state law requirements on the matter. 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Continued from Page I've often read Chicago has the second worst tenement districts in the world, second only to London. And Chicago has the dubious distinction of being the most segregated city in America. After you read a Daley biography about his own racist feelings as a young man and you can graphically view how Bridgeport, where he lived, is a white island surrounded by blacks, it is not hard to appreciate where its hard-lined racist policies emanated from. Yet, despite his short-comings the city people loved 'De Mare'. After the 1972 Olympics the young 15 year old Russian gymnast, Olga Korbut, appeared at the Chicago Stadium. When she was introduced she was met with a brief crescendo of cheers. When Mayor Daley was introduced to the audience, his ovation lasted so long 1 thought the stadium was stacked with precinct workers.

Nick Blase, while no Daley, can nevertheless get a similar free ride in office as Daley got. He can point to that free bus transportation system in town, which makes him look great. He's taken the lead of all suburban Mayors in fighting Chicago's water rate increase. He heads a town whose public services are comparable and perhaps better than surrounding towns. So why should he be replaced? Niles is a bedroom community where the people slide in and out of their beds during the majority of their time in town. They work elsewhere, and they often play elsewhere. So while they're away, the town is watched over. And while they're here, they have few community problems to be concerned with.

Blase runs on pretty\*much the same track as Daley did.

For children born in the city of Chicago, a certified copy of the birth certificate may be obtained from the Chicago Department of Health, Room CL-111, Daley Center, Randolph and Clark st., Chicago, Ill. 60602. A \$3 fee is charged for this service and checks should be made payable to Chicago Department of Health.

All children entering kindergarten for the 1977-78 school year must have a physical examination and immunization for measles, German measles, polio, diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis. The evidence of such examination and immunizations must be brought up to date and verified by school officials before a child will be
