Village has tree problems

Diseased and dying parkway trees are fast becoming a grave concern to the village. In an effort of control officials have decided to hire the services of a tree sprayer for the coming fall and in the spring of next year.

Resident complaints have been numerous concerning trees in parkways whose branches drip sap; and tree root blocking sanitary sewers in streets. Trustees are unhappy over village-planted trees last year in commercial areas and in residential parkways which are dead or dying this year.

Under a 1974 decision by the Board of Trustees a tree must be dead before its removal "and". said Mayor Nicholas Blase in a preboard discussion on trees June 28, "We must exercise extreme caution in cutting down our trees," avoiding such action "unless absolutely necessary."

According to an April, 1974, survey, the village has 6.069 trees in parkways. As trees have died they have been replaced, noted Beautification and Landscape Director Ron Kornacker, under a replacement program with costfree trees from a Niles cemetery. However healthy, the trees have not taken kindly to transplanting; many have died and the village plans to begin a new replacement program with nursery se-

Of the many complaint calls

regarding diseased trees, Public Works Supt. Ed Bacher noted the silver maple is the worst violator seconded by the elm, "but the disease is spreading to all our trees." the fungus, known as a cottony maple scale which looks like popcorn grows along the branches eventually emitting a

Up to two years ago parkway trees were sprayed with an oil-based solution which killed bugs and controlled, but did not stop, the dripping sap.

'We stopped spraying," said Bacher, "because the spray fell on the ground and affected worms...the birds ate the worms and the bird population decreased.

However by not spraying, tree problems have re-occured. "And if we don't spray," said Kornacker, "we'lll lose a lot of trees next spring.'

Morton Grove under residential pressure recently held an emergency meeting to hire a professional sprayer, at \$2 per tree, using an oil spray. Their decision was to spray twice a year.

All surrounding villages have begun a spraying program "Of one kind or another" according to Kornacker, altho "some are not too affected so only one annual spraying is necessary...some northwestern suburbs are not spraying at all and people are pecoming concerned over possible loss of their parkway trees."

Altho the roots can be cut out and a chemcial applied to deter further root growth, "those with continual root growth problems should result in removal of the tree," even tho, he noted, "we don't want to lose our

> He said his men will experiment this summer with a foam which clings to tree root causing decay in a matter of months.

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Fourth of July festivities burst in Niles

Independence celebrated with Hoopla

Thousands of Niles residents and visitors turned out in 90 degree weather Monday to witness the village Fourth of July parade and wish America a happy 201st birthday. Celebrations finalized in an hour-long fireworks display near dusk at Tam on Howard ave. near Caldwell.

Lawn chairs, blankets, bicycles and curbs served as ringside seats for most of the spectators on Main st. Others were lined shoulder to shoulder on Waukegan rd., the final leg of the parade route. Suckers and tootsie rolls were tossed from floats and many of the children clutched balloons emblazoned "201" distributed at the parade grounds.

In perfect-ly hot weather spectators waited close to an hour for their first glimpse of the parade heralded by police cars and flashing lights. Muffled drum beats echoed in the distance.

Mayor Nicholas Blase rode in one of the first of 48 parade units, followed by floats, decorated cars and marching units. Drum and Bugle corps in striking uniforms marched briskly, chins held high. eyes straight forward. Military music filled the air as they played their repertoire of marching

Many resources exist within the Chicago area to help handicapped people meet the challenge of independent living, Rep. Penny Pullen (R-4th) said this week.





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Mikva backs state role in cutting aircraft noise

Congressman Abner J. Mikva called Friday for the state to take the lead in trying to quell aircraft noise generated by planes using Illinois airports and he expressed his hope that eventually towns that surround airports will have some power to wield against noise

Mikva backed the aircraft noise regulations proposed by Illinois Attorney General William Scott in a statement that was read during an Illinois Pollution Control Board hearing on the proposal in the Skokie Public Library.

"The federal government has not demonstrated the capacity of ability to reduce the composite noise level at the airports. The Federal Aviation Administration and the Civil Aeronautics Board are primarily concerned with airline safety and airline routes and rates and they have not adequately addressed the problem of noise pollution," Mikva

"I applaud the Attorney General of Illinois in his efforts to have noise abatement standards imposed at the state level," the Congressman's statement con-

Scott's proposal would require the aircraft noise level to be reduced to an average of 75 decibels by 1980 and to an average of 65 decibels by 1985, which parallels recently proposed regulations by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Mikva's Tenth District. The noise levels around O'Hare during jet takeoffs is equivalent to or exceeds the noise heard when one s standing within 50 feet of a freight train or a pneumatic drill, Mikva noted in his statement.

Adoption of Scott's proposal would at least bring the noise level in the O'Hare area into "inhabitable" range, he added.

The Congressman listed some different methods of reducing aircraft noise-requiring the airlines to lower the noise level of fleets, directing planes to fly in configurations that would have less noise impact on nearby residents, adjusting the takeoff and descent maneuvers to cut the level of noise, and imposing curfews on takeoffs and landings been ignored by the Chicago City during certain hours of the night.



After a number of years of complaints by area residents about the high dust created when ball diamonds are dragged, Filiberto Almendarez and his crew have implemented a new system which waters the diamond before dragging to minimize the heavy dust problem. A large water tank is placed on the back of the tractor with a 1" pipe distributing water preceding the drag. There is also a canvas thrown over the drag which has greatly improved in the reduction of dust. A number of area residents previously very critical of the high dust and pollution problem being created by the dragging of the ball diamonds have commended the Niles Park District, and specifically Supervisor Almendarez, for implementing this system of watering prior to dragging.
