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Area leaders to attend hearing on unincorporated area

Governmental leaders from the area are being invited to a Maine Township government public hearing on unincorporated area problems, Supervisor James Dowd said this week.

The hearing will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 23, at Gemini School, Ballard and Greenwood. Dowd said invitations are being sent to County Board Chairman George Dunne and the suburban county board members, and to the mayors of Niles, Park Ridge and Des Plaines, the communities which surround the area.

The hearing is being held to allow residents to identify their complaints about building and health code violations, street problems and lack of police protection, or any other problems they have, Dowd said.

This will enable the township board to act on those problems which, by law, fall within its jurisdiction, Dowd said. Others will be forwarded to the appropriate governmental agency and the township will follow up to see what action is taken.

Dowd said that County Board Commissioner Harold Tyrell has already indicated he will attend, and Commissioners Mary McDonald and Ronald Larson probably will be present.

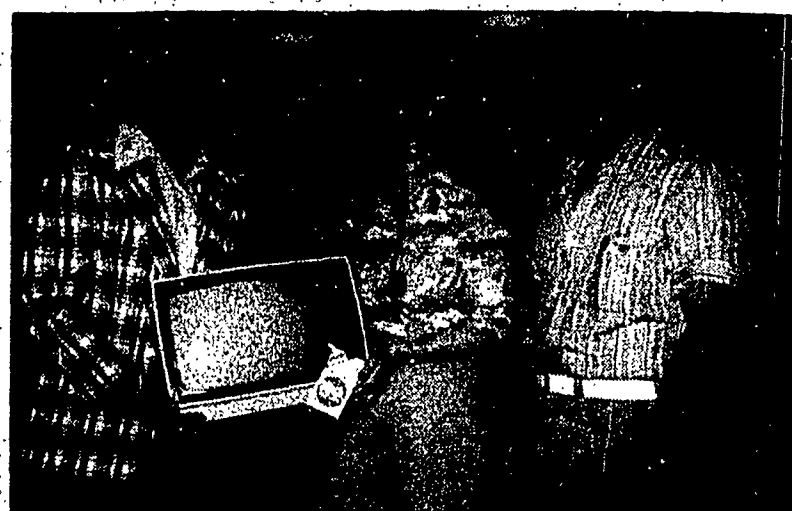

Elrod sponsoring 'Ordnance Turn-In'

Sheriff Richard J. Elrod has a solution for citizens wishing to safely dispose of old war relics or souvenirs that may be potentially dangerous.

Sheriff Elrod is sponsoring an "Ordnance Turn-In" three weekends in August and September when anyone may turn in war relics, souvenirs or other potentially destructive devices.

The Cook County Sheriff's Police Bomb Unit will be on duty from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Aug. 27 and 28 at the Sheriff's Police Station, 8970 Milwaukee, Niles; Sept. 3 and 4, Sheriff's Police Station, 1154 Ridge rd., Homewood; and Sept. 10 and 11, Sheriff's Police Headquarters, First ave., north of the Eisenhower, Maywood.

Sheriff Elrod said such pieces

of ordnance are routinely found in homes which have been recently purchased or when residents clean out garages, attics, basements or other storage areas.

War relics or potentially explosive devices may be brought home by children who find them at excavation sites.

The scheduled "Ordnance Turn-In" would give residents an opportunity to dispose of these devices safely and anonymously if they so desire.

Sheriff's Police Officers assigned to the Bomb Unit will also go to a location to retrieve the unwanted devices if necessary.

LGH School of Nursing receives 6-year accreditation

The Lutheran General and Deaconess Hospitals School of Nursing, Park Ridge, has received renewal of its accreditation by the National League of Nursing for a six-year period.

The National League of Nursing is officially recognized as the national accreditation agency for nursing by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Accreditation by the League is voluntary on the part of the school and reflects high quality educational programs.

"We're proud to receive this accreditation," said Ken Lund, Ph.D., vice-president of educational services, at Lutheran General. "Accreditation by the National League of Nursing reflects excellence in nursing education and meeting the strict requirements of the League has always been the goal of the Lutheran General and Deaconess Hospitals School of Nursing. This reaffirms the confidence in the excellence of our program."

Erna Rueggeberg, director of the school, pointed out that "Accreditation by the League is most thorough. In 1975, 88% of the diploma nursing schools in the U.S. were accredited by the National League of Nursing. In Illinois, 32 of the 35 diploma programs were accredited."

The criteria upon which the League bases its accreditation covers all areas of the school's programs including: the school's philosophy and objectives; its administration and organization; faculty; students; curriculum; resources and facilities.

"To receive accreditation by the League," explains Miss Rueggeberg, "administrators, faculties and students of nursing schools throughout the country must continually evaluate and strive to improve the quality of their educational programs. The League in turn evaluates the school's nursing programs in relation to its stated objectives. Consequently, this means improved nursing services in the hospital and other patient care facilities."

Representatives from the National League of Nursing visited Lutheran General's school of nursing last February. The school received its first accreditation from the League in 1971 for six years. Prior to that the school of nursing had received provisional accreditation.

The Lutheran General and Deaconess Hospitals School of Nursing has graduated more than 1,150 registered nurses.

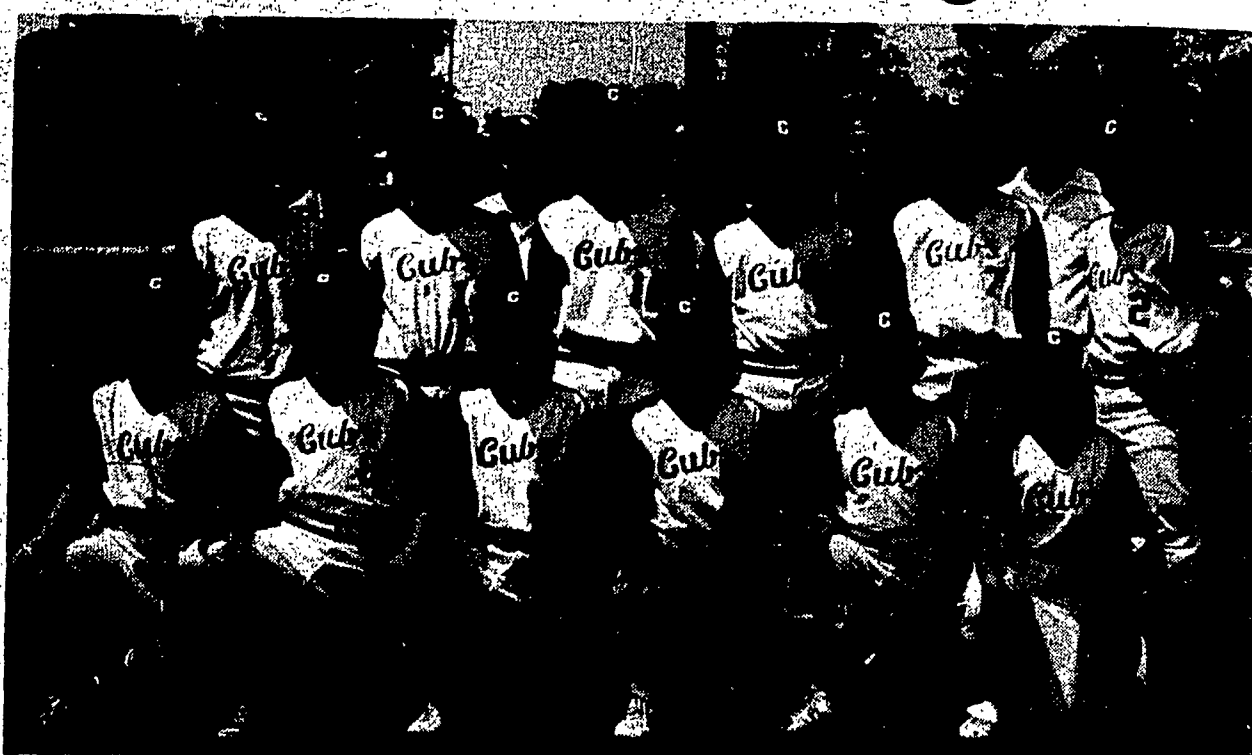
With the season almost over it was a big win for the Cubs on Sunday winning the Championship by beating the Orioles 5 to 1.

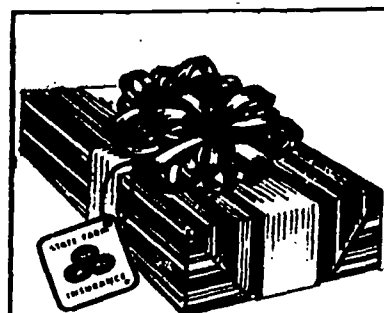

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Niles Family Service Thought for the Week

I'm pleased to have on our Niles Family Service staff, James Cisek who is director of our School/Community Outreach Program. One of the SCOP areas involving voluntary students has to do with conflict resolution - helping the student accept their role in starting and resolving conflict. In this article, Mr. Cisek will be speaking to people of all ages on "Conflict Resolution."

Conflict resolution is a necessary skill which must be developed if a person is to get along with other people. The last few articles focused on helping your children to solve their own problems by guiding the problem-solving process. This technique can still be used if the parent "owns" the problem rather than the child. The parent owns the problem or the conflict if the child interferes with their needs or wants. Rather than resorting to forcing the child to behave (imposing your will), the use of guided discussion can help your child become more aware of the causes and consequences of his behavior. That also makes them more a part of the conflict resolution and they will feel more motivated to do something about it.

Parents are often vague about their reasons for wanting their children to do something or to stop doing something. To be sure, they don't "owe" their children an explanation why they request something yet on the other hand, "Just do what I say" or "because I'm your father/mother" doesn't help the child to understand the causes or consequences of his behavior. He is told what to think, rather than helped how to think. This situation has been repeated many times. The child gets punished when the mother sees what he did. The parent threatens the child with a "don't ever do that again" or a similar reprimand and the parent misses an opportunity to help the child understand the causes of his behavior, the alternatives to the conflict and/or consequences of his action. Consider these two discussions involving mom and Bobby the two people involved in the last article. Bobby wants to finger paint.

Mom: "Don't you dare! Get to your room."
Bobby: (Obviously angry) Why?
Mom: "Because I said so, that's why. You do what I say."
Bobby: "I want to stay here!"
Mom: "Enough of your back-talk, you're not going to run this house. Wait until your father comes home."

Mom and Bobby got into a real conflict. Both quickly forgot the issue (Bobby may spill his finger paint and ruin the rug). Mom just showed who is more powerful. But conflicts like this are never solved, these keep coming back in different ways. Bobby can show his power again (maybe with company around) or get revenge. He certainly hasn't developed any conflict resolution techniques through the opportunity to solve the conflict. Let's try the conflict again using the problem solving techniques that were discussed in the last article.

Mom: Bobby - I see you have your finger-painting kit out. I think that's a good idea, but I don't want you to paint in the living room.
Bobby: Why not - I want to.
Mom: I hear you want to, but I'm concerned something might happen.

Bobby: Nothing will happen.
Mom: What might happen if some finger paints get spilled?

(What might be the consequences?)
Bobby: It will stain the rug.
Mom: How do you think I will feel about that?

Bobby: Bad.
Mom: Can you think of some place that you can paint and I won't worry if an accident happens?

Bobby: How about outside?
Mom: That's a good idea. Why don't we try that.

Mom helped avoid a conflict and forcing Bobby to do something against his will. Bobby learned what might happen and how it might affect Mom. It became a problem-solving situation rather than a show of power. Other things Mom can say to help Bobby think about the cause and effect are "I can't let you (e.g. finger paint now) because... Do you know why I can't let you (finger paint now)? Can you think of some other places to do it in the house? How will you feel (if the finger paints get all over the rug)?

The next article will present a few situations that you can talk over with your children to assist their conflict problem solving ability. 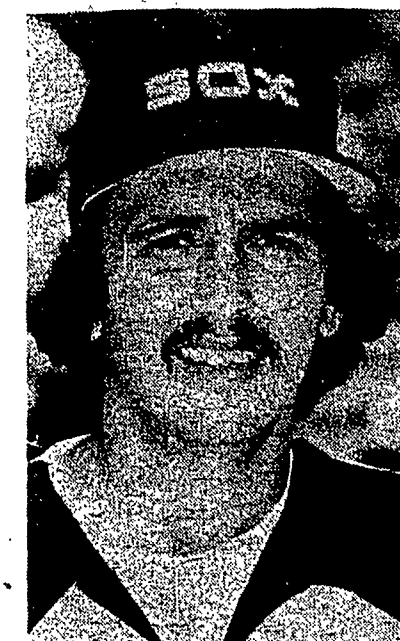

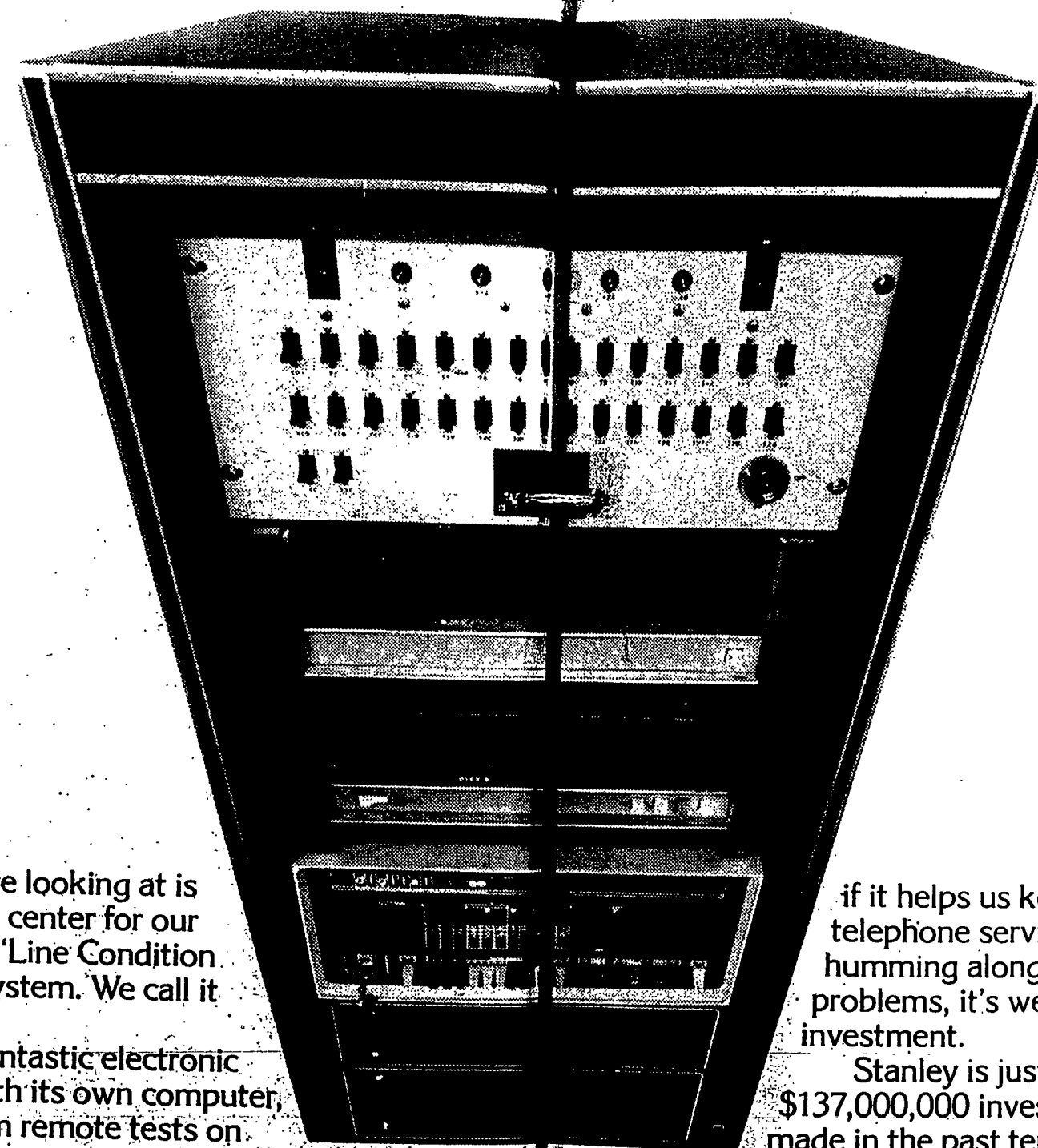

Does wearing a badge give
a policeman special privileges???

Dear Mr. Besser:
This letter is being written in regard to the article that appeared in the August 4th issue of the Bugle regarding the suspension of the off-duty police officer from Niles because of the beating he gave to a woman and also of some other Niles policemen who prevented concerned citizens from trying to come to the woman's aid.

TO THE CHIEF OF POLICE OF NILES:

Dear Mr. Emrikson,
As a person who is concerned for the people of Niles, I am a bit surprised to hear that some of your men would actually try to stop a citizen or citizens from coming to the assistance of a woman in distress.

It seems that we are always being told either thru T.V. or radio, or the newspaper, or by word of mouth to step forward and help a person in need. We are told that lack of concern is not right, and it isn't. People should care.

Then, along come some of our Village's policemen who, by their

actions, implied that to care is wrong, especially since the person doing the beating up is another policeman. Does wearing a badge give a policeman special privileges? I don't think it does. They should obey the law like anyone else.

It seems to me that, some of your police officers should take a few courses in how to deal with people. Also my feelings on this matter are that steps be taken to discipline the officers who prevented those concerned citizens from coming to the aid of the woman in need.

I personally know some of your officers who are doing a fantastic job, not only as policemen but as private citizens; and we should be proud of them. It's sad but all too often people look at the ones who are not doing a good job. This is why when a policeman does wrong, he should be disciplined.

Because of incidents like this, people become more fearful and lose respect and trust for a police officer, especially young people. It makes a parent's job that much harder in trying to teach their children to have this trust and respect for a policeman that he rightly deserves.

Some of my friends are trying to tell me to make this letter anonymous. Why? They say I should be afraid to sign my name to this letter. Why should I be? This is America we live in; the country where we are allowed the right to voice our opinion without consequence. Maybe, if more people in Niles would voice their opinions about uncool scenes they see happening in this town, incidents like the one concerning the beat-up woman wouldn't happen.

I'm getting fed up with hearing about this incident and other incidents in this town. I want to see our town bettered. I want to be able to hold up my head and not be ashamed to say, "I live in Niles and I'm mighty proud of it." I want my children to be able to say the same thing.

I'm calling upon your integrity as our police chief, to prevent incidents like this one from ever happening again.

Back care
classes taught
at Tower Y

The Leaning Tower YMCA will again be offering its course on the care of the back.

The "Y's Way to a Healthy Back" will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays for six weeks beginning September 12 - 8 p.m.

The course, developed by Dr. Hans Kraus, MD, clinical associate professor of rehabilitative medicine at New York University College of Medicine, is designed for those who suffer discomfort and pain in the lower back and need to increase overall flexibility.

Many medical authorities agree that organic diseases cause only a small percentage of back pain, consequently, says Y back instructor John Joyce, the chances are that your condition is caused not by organic disease, but by muscles that are weak or tense or both and can be helped by this program.

The program is divided into three parts. The Kraus-Weber six item test is used to determine minimal muscular strength and flexibility. These tests are easy to do and only take a few minutes, Joyce said. The results then are used to personalize the exercise program by a professionally trained YMCA instructor.

Phase two consists of the exercise program, itself, that is composed of a series of movements that begin with relaxation, then flexibility techniques.

The third part of the program is the continuation of the exercises at home. Participants will be given an exercise booklet to follow as they practice the simple techniques of back care at home.

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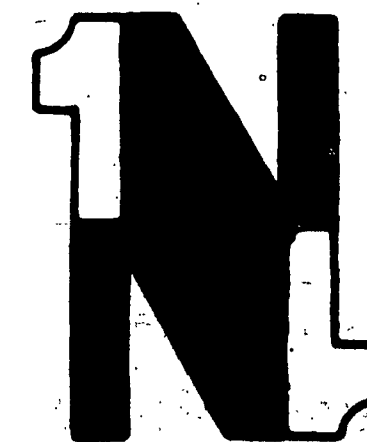

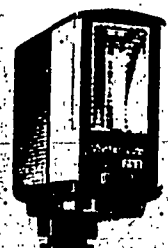
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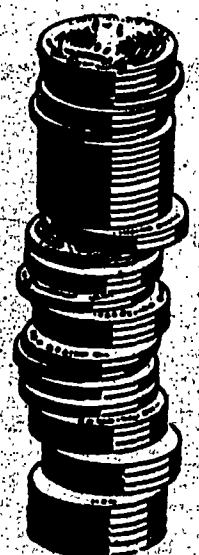

Mikva optimistic about peace talks

Following his 10-day fact-finding trip to the Mideast that included meetings with the leaders of Israel, Egypt, Syria and Jordan, Congressman Abner J. Mikva has reported to the State Department his "cautious optimism" about the future of peace talks in Geneva.

Mikva met July 21 with Secretary of State Cyrus Vance to discuss his findings in the four countries; the comments of government, civic and business leaders and his assessment of the chances for an effective long-range peace settlement in the troubled area.

"In each of the countries, I found a sincere desire to participate in the talks and reach some kind of accommodation over longstanding differences. While it would be rash to predict a quick resolution of differences, it is clear that the leaders of the four countries are anxious for peace and are willing to talk seriously about the means to achieve a lasting peace," Congressman Mikva reported.

He explained that each of the four governments leaders -- Prime Minister Begin of Israel, President Sadat of Egypt, King Hussein of Jordan and President Assad of Syria -- have unique circumstances in their countries that bode well for the talks. Mikva added that a major role is

expected of the United States at the Geneva talks "because as President Sadat said, we are the only country that both sides trust."

"Right now, Israel is bargaining from a position of strength. The country is stronger economically, politically and militarily than it has ever been in comparison to its Arab adversaries, and Begin and other Israeli leaders are anxious for peace before the balance shifts," Mikva said.

"Egypt is very poor and getting poorer. It has the largest population of the so-called 'confrontation countries,' and is experiencing some military difficulties since being cut off by the Russians. President Sadat is definitely under pressure to bring peace to a country beset by economic problems and in which the military may soon start to chafe unless support is forthcoming," the Congressman continued.

He called King Hussein of Jordan "the most moderate of

Arab leaders" and the one who has been most flexible in handling Arab-Israeli relations, but Syria "continues to be the enigma, still in the Russian orbit. Yet in our meeting, even President Assad seemed willing to try to reach an agreement," the Congressman continued.

One of the most pleasant surprises of the trip was the meeting with Israeli Prime Minister Begin, who Mikva found to be "charming, much less of a hawk than had been reported. He wants to be flexible on whatever he can be flexible without jeopardizing the stability of Israel."

Mikva, who is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee's Trade Subcommittee, was asked by House Speaker Thomas P. (Tip) O'Neill to make the trip. The other members of the delegation were Congressman Lee Hamilton (In.), who served as chairman of the delegation, Congressman David Obey (W.) and Benjamin Rosenthal (N.Y.).

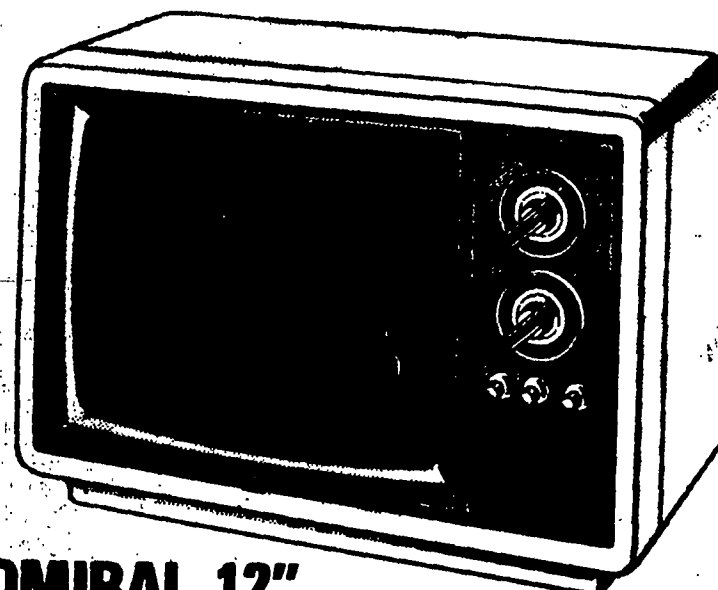

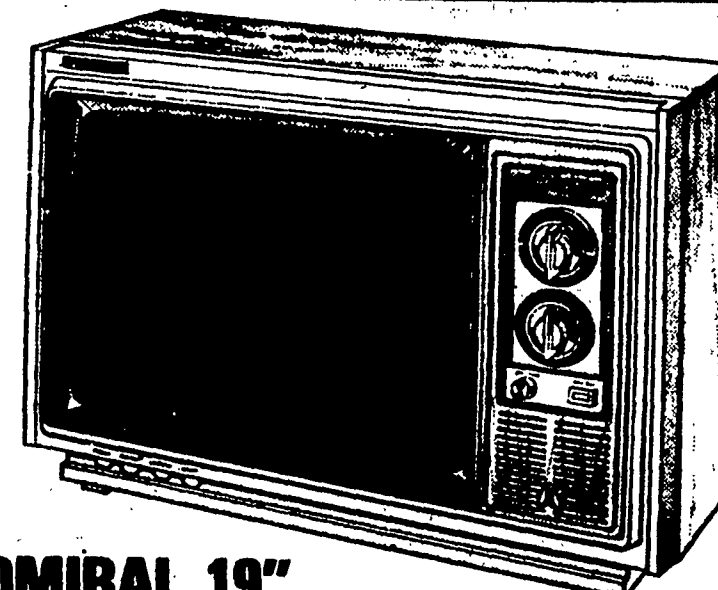

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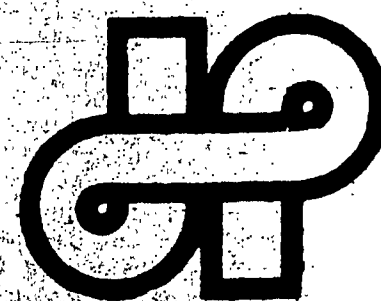

Young amputees as well as children born without limbs have found new hope through electrically powered artificial limbs. The children have demonstrated that electrically powered joints and hands afford them much greater flexibility and a closer approximation to the movements of normal limbs.

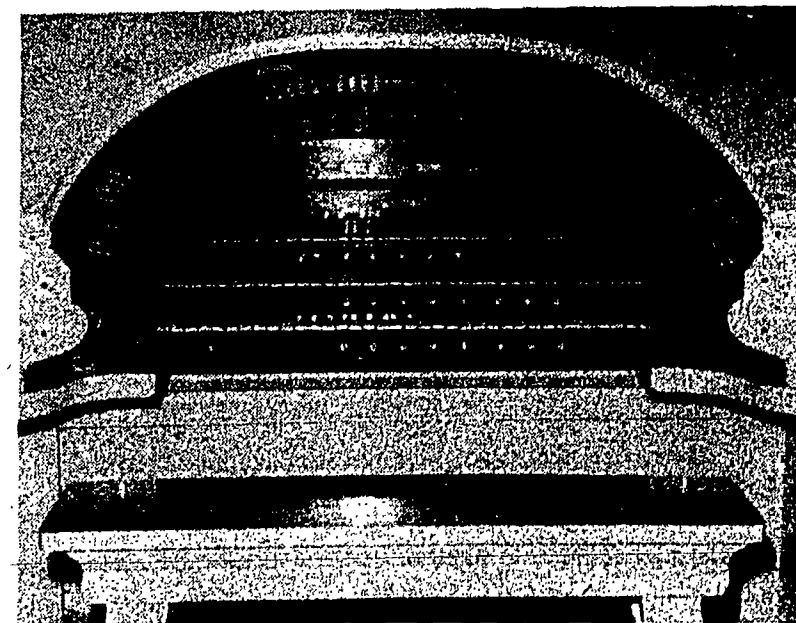

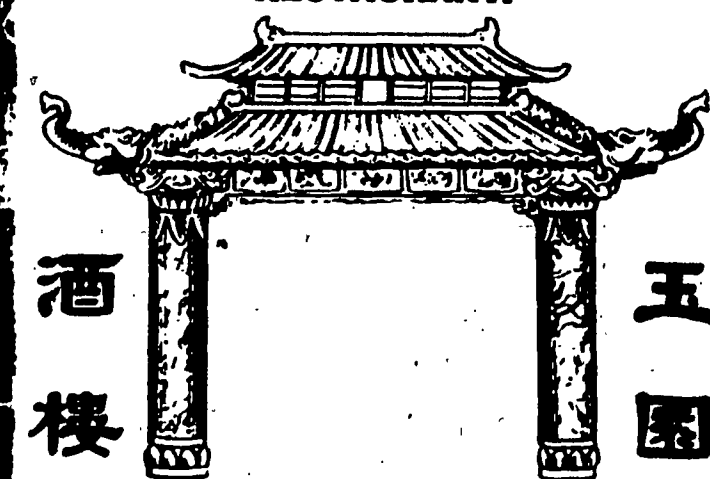

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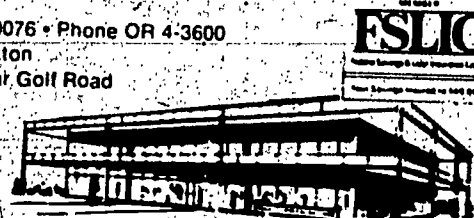

post in past years.

In the Lessin imbroglio over the hiring of Kenneth Moe Superintendent, he handed out a brochure quoting many parents and teachers who cited Moe's lack of administrative experience as reasons he should not be hired. Moe's highest position has been Director of Elementary Education at the West Bend Schools. The elementary schools are about equivalent to the number of schools in District 63.

Lessin cites Moe's lack of a doctorate degree and lack of administrative experience in a central office. Lessin noted: "It is one thing to have a Cadillac psyche in a Chevrolet district and quite another to have a Chevrolet district with an unlicensed driver."

Lessin cites the opinion of another administrator: "His (Moe's) central office experience is light. His current district has been experiencing growth as opposed to District 63. He has not had to confront the decisions that lie ahead for District 63. Based on my interview with Mr. Moe, I would recommend a continued review of the candidates."

Lessin added in his opinion, District 63 should not be used as a training ground for superintendents and with the salary the district pays (previously, about \$42,000 plus fringe benefits), Lessin said other superintendents with better background did not apply because they did not feel they qualified due to their lack of experience at the administrator's level. Lessin said with the hiring of Moe, the Board had neither a qualified nor experienced superintendent.

In ending his 2-page letter, he wished the new superintendent well, luck and a sailor's stomach in the stormy seas in District 63.

Pointedly, he ended his criticism by stating the school district, which former superintendent Gogo went to, District 108, "got the better of the deal".
