





Recycling center

The Niles Township High School Reclamation Center is now accepting applications for volunteer workers. The center is primarily looking for young volunteers from the age of 13 to 18 to help sort and prepare materials

The reclamation center is now in its fifth year of providing an outlet for our Niles Township communities to recycle their household wastes instead of discarding them. By recycling your wastes you are not only helping to conserve natural resources, but more importantly, you are providing a second and third use out of materials and ores that would normally be tossed aside. It should be noted that products made of recycled ma-terials are not inferior to products made of virgin materials and in most cases it is more economi-cally desirable for the consumer to purchase goods made from recycled material.

Young people who volunteer in the program will help people unload their cars and process the materials for shipment to the recycling mills. Volunteers are asked to work a single three hour shift per month, but may log additional hours if they desire.

The reclamation center is a program of high school district 219. The purpose of this program is twofold. First, it provides an interim answer to our solid waste problem and it also gives students and young people experience with working at a basic recovery program. "Understandably, we all concentrate on the noise problem, but high levels of pollutants are just as damaging to the health of those living under the influence of the world's busiest airport."

Last week I should have mentioned that extreme caution should e exercised in dealing with pressure cooling systems. A 15 lb pressure system, when hot, can build up to a point that when the engine is hot and the cap is removed, the radiator will act like a geyser. Boiling water and live steam will result and can take the skin right off! So please be careful!

RON BRISK SAYS:

engine block until it reaches a temperature of 160°-180° or 195° depending on your car specifications.

This coolent then circulates into your heater, gives heat and enables your windows to defrost.

Last week I also mentioned a 50/50 mixture would lower th freezing point to approximately -34°. Why set it so low?

It never gets to -34° We're not in Alaska or the North Pole! Assuming it is 10° outside, you start your car, let it warm up for five minutes and you're getting luke warm air from the heater.

You would assume that the engine is warmed up. Not really! It could possibly be only 100° and your thermostat is set to 195° and holding the coolent in the block. Now you start driving 40 m.p.h. on highway or street and the wind chill factor on the radiator going into a 10 m p. h. wind is putting one heck of a cold blast on the radiator. The engine could be hot but the coolent in the radiator is probably turning to slush!

This happened to my sister Pat a few years ago. My folks lived in Wisconsin, near Spooner. (It gets pretty cold up there.) She warmed up the car (as above), felt heat and was on the highway pushing about 65 m.p.h. (legal then) and the temperature was about -15°. By the time she got to Spooner (17 miles) the radiator was a block of ice, the hoses blew off, the engine was so hot that it seized up and stopped. The car really burned oil after that.

I must once again say extreme caution should be exercized with pressure cooling systems. If you don't know what you're doing,


The sophomore soccer game at 5:30 p.m. and the varsity at 7 p.m. will be in the stadium. The Demons will be taking on the Forest View Falcons.
