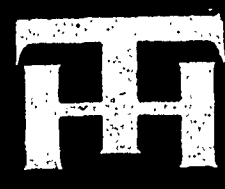


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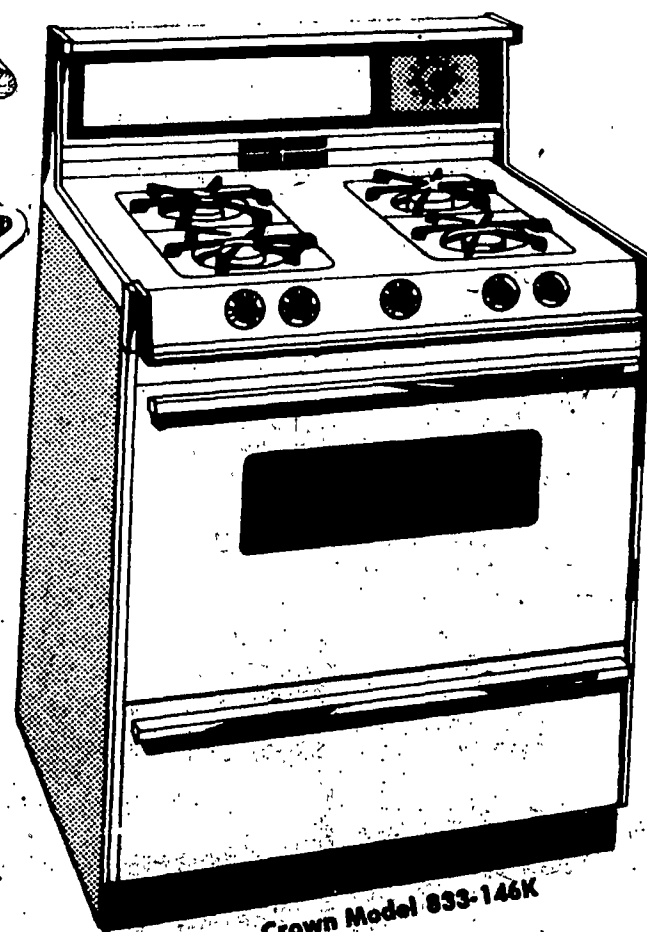
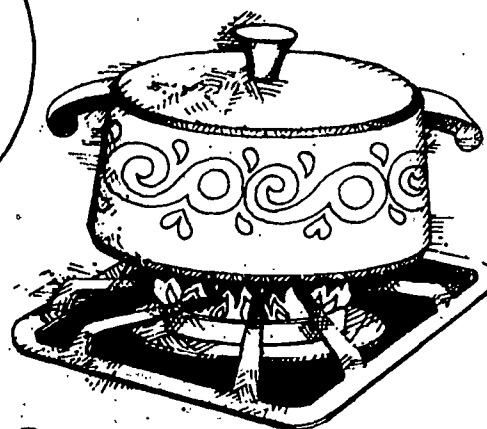
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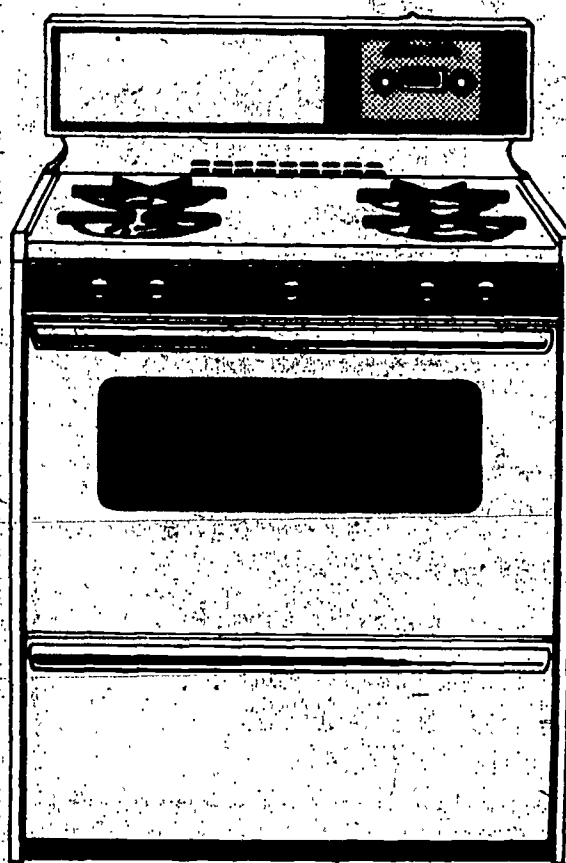
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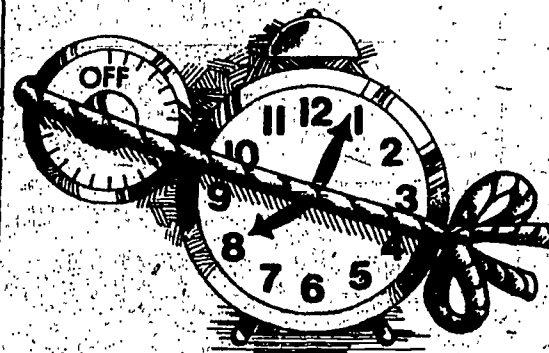


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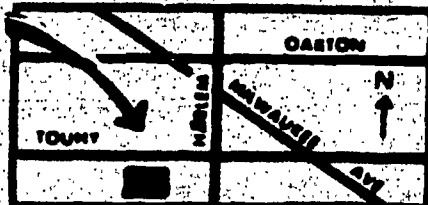
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Kirk Lane Park censured again

Niles Park District commissioners continue to receive complaints of disorderly conduct at Kirk Lane Park located near Jonquil Terrace and Waukegan rd. in Niles.

A Jonquil Terrace resident whose property abuts the rectangular park on the east told commissioners during the Sept. 20 Board meeting of constant loud noises from the park, breakage of

bottles on the shelter roof, stomping on benches, vandalism of park equipment.

"Anything and everything the Park District has put into the area has been badly abused," said the Nilesite who declined identification because "we (area residents) are all 'sitting ducks' (for reprisal)."

Neighbors are fearful to call police, she said, who would

require identity of the complainant.

In earlier complaint the Jonquil Terrace resident deplored location of steel posts for a baseball backdrop which could result in balls batted into neighboring yards.

She also charged "that (Kirk Lane) park in no way represents the 1970 planning by Commissioner (at that time) Walter Beusse for the area ... residents

were promised they would be consulted ... we've lived in the area since 1969 and no one has ever come to me or to my neighbors to ask opinions on placement of park equipment."

Referring specifically to the park shelter she noted "it's rarely used for its original intent ... it's more of a meeting place for rabbles, of teens," and requested increased police surveillance of the park.

Park President pro tem Jeffrey Arnold said awareness by park commissioners of problems in the area had resulted in "a large crackdown last month by Niles police who issued a sizeable number of tickets for park violations."

Commissioners also noted that solution such as increased police protection was costly ... "we try to serve the majority while the

Husband commits suicide in
downtown hotel

Slain woman found in Golf Mill

Acting on an anonymous phone call, Niles police discovered the body of Mrs. Sally Fritz, 29 Apple Hill, Prairie View in the rear seat of her 1974 gold Cadillac Eldorado parked in the Golf Mill Shopping center last Friday afternoon.

The male caller told police a serious accident involving a gold Cadillac had taken place in Golf Mill and he would meet police in front of the Sears store and lead them to the scene of the accident. Niles officers Chuck Affrunti and John Gaba were dispatched to the

scene, but upon arrival could not locate anyone in front of Sears and proceeded to look for a gold Cadillac. The auto was parked at the end of the first aisle directly in front of the north entrance to the Sears store. As Officers Gaba and Affrunti approached the vehicle, they noted the engine was still warm, the vehicle was unlocked, the keys were in the ignition and there was a considerable pile of bed clothing in the rear seat. Upon checking the bedding, they noted the blood stains and the

Both Nilesites and Morton Grovers at the northwest ends of our communities jammed Morton Grove's village hall Monday night to hear plans for more condominiums in the Golf-Washington area. Condos on the west side of Washington under Niles jurisdiction are now in the planning stage. Two developers are proposing multiple units on the east side of Washington, which is likely to become a part of Morton Grove.

Residents are concerned with the increased traffic and sewer problems in the area. They would like to block or limit the number of units to be built, though they are fighting a limited battle.

One developer proposes building two 32-unit buildings. He originally planned on constructing a row of single family homes to be used as a buffer separating the existing single family homes from the proposed multiples. He has now withdrawn the buffer. The second builder, planning to construct condos at the north end of the area, facing Golf Road, did not make his plans known at Monday's meeting.

The area is presently in unincorporated area. The desire to become part of an incorporated village is advantageous to the builders. But being presently in unincorporated area gives the developers several aces in the holes. They are holding most of the cards in the game of give and take between builders and residents.

Neighbors of the proposed development would like to have the least number of units possible. They contend it would lessen the burden of their schools. And the dangers of increased traffic are proportionate to the number of units built.

The builders are interested in making the maximum amount of profit. They can best do this by building the greatest number of units. However, since the village has more rigid regulations than the County, the builders will have to compromise their profits if they desire to be a part of Morton Grove.

The battle lines are drawn. Residents seek to limit. The village seeks to limit by minimizing parking facilities and

North Suburban Blood Center Relocation

The North Suburban Blood Center and the North Suburban Association for Health Resources, formerly tenants of a medical building at 1500 Sherman rd., Northbrook, have moved into a handsome, new, custom-designed building at 1255 N. Milwaukee ave., Glenview. Formal dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremonies were held in the new headquarters Tuesday, Sept. 20 at 11 a.m. Speakers at the event were Warren C. Jenkins, M.D., President of the Board of Directors,

North Suburban Blood Center and the North Suburban Association for Health Resources; Penny Pullen, State Republican Representative (4th District); John J. Nimrod, State Republican Senator (4th District); Alan Weinstein, Executive Director of the Blood Center; and the Association for Health Resources; and J. Dan Connor, Administrator of the Blood Center. Among the invited guests were elected state and local government officials and the Board of Directors.

The 13,328 square foot North Suburban Blood Center building is 2½ times as large as the former quarters—and is situated on 2½ acres of landscaped and naturally wooded property. The one-story building is elevated eight feet above ground on a landscaped berm. White Portland cement was chosen to cover the entire exterior rather than masonry for not only its functional, feasible and esthetically superior results, but also for savings in total construction costs. The plaster outer-coating, the berm and therm-o-pane windows also contribute to considerable energy savings in the future operations of the building. Parking facilities include: a 15 space visitor lot; a 5 space Blood Center vehicle lot; and a 45 space employee lot. Provisions for future expansion of the building have been made. Hill-Papp Association of Lake Forest were the architects. The general contractor was McLennan Construction Company of Park Ridge. The total cost of the new facility was \$625,000. Financing was arranged through the co-operation of The Illinois Health Facilities Authority and the First National Bank of Niles.

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Niles Days' profits less than expected

Local organizations contemplating receipt of monies from the 1977 Niles Days Festival will get less than expected.

The Niles Days Committee will turn over \$12,171.23 in net profits Oct. 3 to be shared by eight groups, less than the \$19,725 needed to fill total requests.

The decrease in profits was due to less revenue than anticipated from the annual festival days this year held July 20 thru 26 at Four Flags Shopping Center in Niles.

The top \$7,500 is allocated to the Village of Niles to finance this year's Fourth of July Parade and Fireworks display. The remaining \$4,671.23 will be apportioned on a percentage basis and point system to requesting local groups.

Two of the eleven petitions for 1977 funds, the Niles Art Guild's request for \$900 and the Girl Scout Council's appeal for \$515 were excluded under the point system because they did not receive the number of approving votes necessary from Committee delegates.

Committee members noted regret at inability to fulfill the Niles Art Guild appeal for funds. Altho "their delegates have attended meetings and Guild members have been faithful in working during Niles Days," Bernadine Reid, Treasurer of the Days, said it "grieved her that the Guild was not accorded sufficient votes to receive needed monies to pay for club programs. She pointed out the group shared Festival responsibilities in "true village spirit" despite denial of funds.

Another petition, from the Senior Citizens Club of Niles, was voted ineligible by the Niles Days Board to receive any or all of a requested \$1,500 after club members informed the Days Committee shortly before the Festival that senior citizens were unable to provide booth workers.

Three organizations will receive the full amount of their requests: Knights of Columbus, for \$155 to purchase a refrigerator to hold refreshments for SPRED (Special Religious Education Program for Retarded); Boy Scouts of America, \$200 to purchase equipment and camping supplies for Cub Pack 62; and the Camp Fire Girls, \$100 to purchase supplies for shut-ins.

Remaining festival profits were allocated proportionately under the point system:

- \$1,304.76 (of \$2,200 requested) to the Northwest Italian-American Society for a Christmas party for retarded girls in Lake Zurich, 11 1/2 points.
- \$859.84 (of a \$2,000 request) to the St. John Brebeuf Golden Age Club for social programs, 7 1/2 points.

- \$725.92 (\$2,400 requested) to the Niles Baseball League for purchase of uniforms, 6 1/4 points.
- \$725.92 (\$1,000 petitioned) to the Niles Jaycees to send 2 mentally retarded children to Jaycee summer camp, 6 1/4 points.

- \$599.79 (of \$2,670 asked) to the Falcons Jr. Football Association for purchase of football equipment, 5 1/4 points.

Niles Days, an umbrella group of approximately 30 Niles organizations has distributed monies annually to Niles groups requesting handouts from the annual 5-day Festival traditionally held in July.

The Days Committee has come under sharp criticism from village fathers who complain there has been a decrease in community involvement combined with increasing police problems during the Festival Days.

Days Committee members have observed the need for new ideas and for total community projects for successful continuation of the Days.

Niles to unveil Milwaukee Ave. beautification plans

On Tuesday, Sept. 27, 1977, immediately following our Board Meeting at approximately 8:30 p.m., the Village of Niles will unveil its Milwaukee Avenue Beautification and Redevelopment Plan. This plan has been under study for over a year and has had tremendous input from most of our local residents who answered surveys regarding their own thoughts about Milwaukee Avenue.

We feel this will be a tremendous first step toward the overall beautification of Milwaukee Avenue, our main thorough-

fare, and obviously will add to the appeal of our community. We urge anyone interested in seeing what it is all about to be at our meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 27, at approximately 8:30 p.m. Board Meetings are held at the Niles Police Station — Council Chambers.

Recycling center

The Niles Township High School Reclamation Center is now accepting applications for volunteer workers. The center is primarily looking for young volunteers from the age of 13 to 18 to help sort and prepare materials for recycling.

The reclamation center is now in its fifth year of providing an outlet for our Niles Township communities to recycle their household wastes instead of discarding them. By recycling your wastes you are not only helping to conserve natural resources, but more importantly, you are providing a second and third use out of materials and ores that would normally be tossed aside. It should be noted that products made of recycled materials are not inferior to products made of virgin materials and in most cases it is more economically desirable for the consumer to purchase goods made from recycled material.

Young people who volunteer in the program will help people unload their cars and process the materials for shipment to the recycling mills. Volunteers are asked to work a single three hour shift per month, but may log additional hours if they desire.

The reclamation center is a program of high school district 219. The purpose of this program is twofold. First, it provides an interim answer to our solid waste problem and it also gives students and young people experience with working at a basic recovery program. The Lions of Illinois

Governor O'Connor is giving the first dollar of District 1-F towards the statewide goal of \$1 million and three dollars to help the blind and visually handicapped by a variety of programs either administered or supported by the Lions of Illinois Foundation.

What they preach is help for the blind and visually handicapped. This help comes in many forms—volunteer efforts, helping a blind person find a job, collecting used eyeglasses, and raising funds to support many programs that directly benefit the blind and visually handicapped.

The fund-raising comes in the form of Lions Candy Day for the Blind, to be held this year on Oct. 14 on streetcorners and in shopping centers throughout the state.

On that day, 30,000 Lions and friends "give away" candy rolls, and Illinois residents respond generously with donations in that familiar-looking canister carried by the person in the Lions hat.

And the first contribution in that canister came from a Lion. It is traditional for District Governors to give the first dollar towards established goals, and local Lions then put in their own contributions before asking the general public to do the same.

Lion James O'Connor, District

Governor of District 1-F recently helped get the campaign going by depositing his dollar with Lion A.G. "Ang" Marcheschi, President of the Lions of Illinois Foundation, to support the statewide goal of \$1 million and three dollars.

The Lions of Illinois Foundation administers several programs for direct help to the blind and visually handicapped, financed by Candy Day: the Mobile Glaucoma Screening Unit, Camp Lions, Eye Donor Registry, Used Eyeglasses Collection, publishing of the Illinois Director of Services for the Visually Handicapped, and a Social Services and Referral Program.

Candy Day money is also awarded in the form of grants to Hadley School for the Blind; Leader Dogs for the Blind; Dialogue with the Blind; University of Illinois Department of Ophthalmology; and, a low vision program at the Illinois College of Optometry.

Mikva request granted for air quality study

Des Plaines, Niles and Park Ridge will be the test sites for an air quality study the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency will begin next month at the request of Congressman Abner J. Mikva.

Starting Oct. 15, the EPA will be taking samples in the three communities with Bensenville as a backup site to determine the level of pollutants in the air generated by aircraft using O'Hare Airport. Congressman Mikva requested the study following complaints from many Tenth District residents about the offensive odor in the air caused by unburned jet fuel emitted by aircraft.

"I am pleased that the EPA has agreed to do a test in the vicinity of O'Hare. Scientific data will be needed to bolster our ongoing efforts to improve environmental conditions for those living near O'Hare," Mikva said. "Understandably, we all concentrate on the noise problem, but high levels of pollutants are just as damaging to the health of those living under the influence of the world's busiest airport."

In a letter to the Congressman, George R. Alexander, Jr., Region V EPA administrator, said the

study would include identifying and quantifying the level of hydrocarbons in the air and the level of benzene, a pollutant currently under assessment as a toxic substance. At the completion of the two-month monitoring period, the results will be analyzed and Alexander said Mikva would be sent a copy of the results.

"If the results are conclusive, they will furnish evidence of the health hazards that are inherent in living in the shadow of O'Hare Airport and every other major airport in the country," Mikva said. "The technology is such that the airports can cut down the level of pollution substantially. Hopefully, the study will lead to stiff EPA recommendations for cutting air pollutants distributed in the wake of aircraft."

body of Mrs. Fritz wrapped inside.

The area was immediately cordoned off by Niles police and the state's attorney's office was notified. Medical examiners were sent to the scene from the Northern Illinois Crime Lab.

Although the medical examiners noted only one bullet hole in Mrs. Fritz' head at the scene, it was later determined after further examination she had been shot four times in the head. Mrs. Fritz was clad in gray slacks, a white blouse and moccasin-type shoes at the time she was found.

Upon checking the Fritz home in Prairie View, police found a .32 caliber revolver belonging to Herbert J. Fritz, Jr., 54, in the blood-stained bedroom of their home. Four slugs were also recovered from the wall of the bedroom. Mrs. Fritz had apparently been shot after her children had left for school, the body wrapped in bed clothing, carried or dragged to the rear seat of her car and then driven to the Golf Mill Shopping Center. A murder warrant was issued Friday for Mr. Fritz. Sources involved in the investigation also learned that Fritz was currently undergoing treatment for bone cancer, a fact that was known only by some of his children. The Fritzes were the parents of five children, two of whom still reside in the family home and are high school students.

Fritz was quite familiar with the Niles area and was the owner of the property at the southeast corner of Golf rd. and Milwaukee ave. which now houses the Toys 'R Us store. His family owned and operated the kiddie park which was formerly located on the property for several years. In 1972 Fritz' father was found dead in an auto parked in the lot of their Golf-Milwaukee property.

According to the Niles police, after Fritz parked the vehicle in Golf Mill he made the call to the station from the outer vestibule of the Sears store, which contains public phones, and then boarded a bus which stops directly in front of the Sears store.

On Sunday evening the body of Fritz, shot to death, was discovered in a seventh-floor room of the Bismarck Hotel, where he had checked in on Friday and paid for two nights' lodging in advance. According to police he had been dead approximately 18 hours when his body was discovered. The apparent motive for the murder of his wife and his subsequent suicide was revealed in a letter found in Fritz' suitcase and addressed to his son Russell, 17. Fritz reportedly revealed his feelings about his wife's relationship with another man and also how he wanted his son to handle his estate. According to Terry Sullivan, assistant Cook County State's Attorney, Mrs. Fritz had

been seeing another man regularly before she was murdered. Sullivan said that man, about 50, was questioned by police, but was not a suspect in the woman's death.

According to police, Fritz had attended several trade conventions for amusement park owners at the Bismarck Hotel and they feel he chose this hotel since he had been a frequent visitor there. Fritz registered in the Bismarck on Friday under the name of John Fox and listed the address of the Golf-Milwaukee property.

He was described as a talented carpenter who enjoyed wild game hunting in North Dakota. He owned several pieces of property including a farm in Bristol, Wisc., and a small shopping center at 1187 Elmhurst rd., Des Plaines. Services were held Wednesday at Skaja Terrace Funeral Home, 7812 N. Milwaukee ave., Niles.

square foot usage of multiple units. And the builders let everyone know they can build outside village limits and restrictions, implying less control from County regulations will maximize their profits.

The push and pull from all sides is certainly real but the end results are predictable. As Zoning Board Chairman Al Goldberg noted, the highest and best use of the property is the criteria which determines what will be built there. And as Goldberg reiterated, while no two people would agree what "the highest and best" means, the final decision hinges on this definition.

Since the developers can say, "If you don't want us we'll build outside your town," residents desiring some control will have to give ground to bring them into town. However, since the value of the condo should be worth more inside Morton Grove, the builders will bend slightly, willing to decrease their number of units.

While the village will have to provide additional services, this nominal cost is offset by tax monies derived. It is unlikely any additional public service people or vehicles would have to be added to serve this additional community. The control over the area, the additional ingresses and egresses to Morton Grove, paid for by the developers, would make the addition of value to Morton Grove. And since the squaring off of the village is a natural extension, there is no doubt the condo projects will be built under Morton Grove jurisdiction.

This is a fair example of the importance of having good representation at the village hall. If the most stringent regulations minimize the potential problems, neighbors will be well-served. If the builders were to construct inferior products, or assume minimum responsibility for the area, residents would have much to be concerned about.

These problems best point out why the unincorporated area in Maine Township should have been incorporated into neighboring villages. The control of the areas 10 years ago would have prevented the deteriorating neighborhoods which now exist.

Someone could make a fair case for a theory which states the closer residents are to the control of government, the better communities will develop. Nilesites and Morton Grovers both have far superior communities to the unincorporated areas, precisely because they have been able to control their destinies. Stricter building codes, and just plain watching the store, has resulted in well-ordered communities which have the least number of problems.

Since County government is just too unwieldy and too far from the scene of action, it does not serve the people it represents.

This is a powerful argument to incorporate the unincorporated area even at this late date. We all turned our backs on the problem many years ago. We now are all burdened by this hodge-podge construction. But if the area has lessened during the last decade, it can only continue to go downstream during the next years. And where potholes in the street and unkempt buildings are now prevalent, the next 10 years could prove disastrous for the entire area.

The Golf-Washington construction is a microcosm of the burdens which we now carry in Maine Township. Controlling the area by our local villages is the best way to lessen future problems.

It's unfortunate we weren't wise enough to have thought this way years ago when the area west of Milwaukee ave. was still vacant.

minority cause the problems." Park officials have attempted to resolve criticisms from another Jonquil Terrace resident adjacent to the west end of the park who has critically attended park meetings for a year, appearing at the August Board Hearing to complain about excessive noises and of beer cans and whiskey bottles thrown into her back yard.

In other business commissioners honored by resolution former Park Comr. Lee Cress, 72, who died Aug. 3 at Boswell Memorial Hospital in Sun City, Arizona.

A charter member of the first park district board, Mr. Cress served as secretary, then president, during his term 1954 thru 1958. The resolution noted Mr. Cress' record as one of "sustained performance, drive and enthusiasm" toward development of the Park District and extended grateful recognition of his services.

Comr. Jack Leske rejected as "too high" a \$17,000 proposed cost of a washroom for construction on Tam Golf Course. Comparing the building to the size of a 2-car garage Leske noted: "We have talent within the park force to do the job." Outside sources would be needed, he said, "but we can do 90% of the work ourselves."

Approved a \$300 contribution this year instead of the \$500 requested by the Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission. Leske noted the previous year's donation of \$400 to the federal agency arguing that "payment of \$500 this year would increase our tax rate... we must start curtailing our expenses."

Comr. Dan Kosiba recommended sodium vapor lighting as replacement of the 17 year old lighting presently in use on Diamond #5 at Jozwiak Park. He said the park district would realize a savings of \$3,300 per year on a 500-hour scale with the new lighting system. Date of completion was targeted for May, 1978, with cost to be placed in next year's budget.

Lighting on Diamond #4 was replaced two years ago, he said, with monies requested by the Niles Baseball League from Niles Days.

Comr. Kosiba reported the 1977-78 school year.

School District 63 Board is considering for report back to the Park District a park request for recreational use of a 4 1/2 acre school site located south of the Ballard Sports Complex on Cumberland rd.

Declined to open 2 sealed bids received for ceiling installation at the Grennan Heights Gym. In view of a park board decision to re-advertise, Comr. Arnold noted it "would be unfair" to open the two bids received.

Noted the Annual Fishing Derby will be held October 8, 9 and 10 at the Recreation Pool Center.

Larry Solomon was chosen vice chairman and Joan Futterman was elected secretary.

While there are presently 16 members on the new committee the Board proposed 24 members should represent elementary schools and 3 representatives who do not have children in the schools would serve each side of Milwaukee ave.

Liaisons from the school board, the teachers and the administration would also join members of the committee.

Enrollment has decreased in the district from about 7,000 in 1970 to approximately 5,000 in this school year. While the district is likely to follow the pattern of neighboring districts by closing schools it is undetermined what schools should be closed.

Board members have consistently said they would like to retain the neighborhood school concept allowing all district children to be within walking distance of the schools. An alternate closing plan would be the closing of one of the two junior high schools.

The committee will give an initial report Nov. 15 with their final recommendations delivered Jan. 15.

A second citizens committee is being formed to study the financial problems in District 63. It will study the need for a tax rate referendum. If such a recommendation was proposed it would likely take place during the 1977-78 school year.

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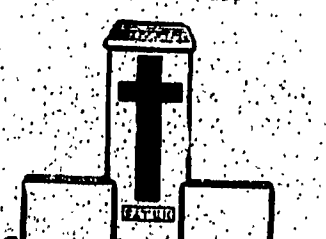
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
