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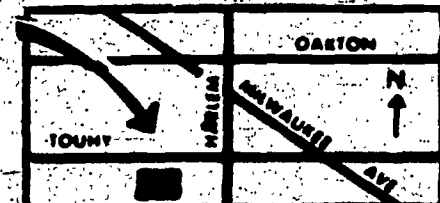
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Newer suburbs socio-economic rank increases while old line communities fall

Chicago urbanologist Peter de Vise reported Tuesday the socio-economic rankings of Chicago's 201 suburbs showed the newer and younger areas increasing in wealth while the older line suburbs decreased in ranking. While villages like Barrington Hills and Oakbrook moved to the top of the list with median family

income at \$42,250 and \$39,820 and median home values at \$129,500 and \$103,500, north and northwest suburbs showed broad changes since the rankings of 1970. In our immediate area Northbrook moved from 15th to 9th place on the new money scale as median family income soared to

\$35,120 and median home value zoomed to \$79,500. Old line communities Glenview and Park Ridge both lost ground in the latest "snob poll." Glenview moved down from 19th to 23rd on the S-E rank with a median family income of \$29,860 and a median home value of \$60,300. Park Ridge also moved

downward from 22nd to 27th place, with M-F income at \$26,540 and homes averaging \$55,000. In other Niles-Maine Township areas Lincolnwood retained its 12th ranking with a \$32,560 income and a \$64,600 median home value. Morton Grove was second in

our area, moving up one notch from 32nd to 31st place. M.G. income is listed at \$27,370 and home value at \$50,900. Skokie moved down the socio-economic scale from 24th to 37th with income at \$25,400 and home value at \$51,500. Niles slipped back from 47th to

From the LEFT HAND

There was another side to the Niles police controversy concerning the men who went to the rescue of a woman who was being beaten by an off-duty Niles cop.

The mother of one of the citizens who intervened in the matter asked Niles police chief Whitey Emrikson why Niles did not at least apologize to the citizens after the police department browbeat and cursed the interveners. Emrikson was reported to have said if there was an apology, it would be an admission of guilt. Since the off-duty cop was suspended for 15 days without pay, and two more cops were also suspended for 2 days for their conduct at the scene, there is little doubt who is guilty.

Emrikson was also quoted by the citizens involved their refusal to sign a complaint at the time of the incident implied they did not have a very strong case against the policemen. He was quoted as saying defense attorneys would rip their stories apart if the cases ever moved into court.

According to the pizza store owner and workers who were the interveners, they never had an opportunity to sign complaints at the time of the incident. They were told by Niles policemen to "get out or you'll be arrested for loitering."

This happened at the time the imbroglio took place. We do recall subsequently the men did have a chance to formally register a complaint which they did not do.

The atmosphere at the time of the intervention was extremely tense. One police officer, who came to the scene of the incident, told the interveners to "shut their mouths" when they became involved. Handcuffs were placed on one intervenor and one citizen said he was placed in a police car with the drunken cop who then punched the citizen who was stranded in the car.

The owner of the pizza parlor did say, "The village did something. It could have been a lot worse." However, he said

Estimate \$8 million for completion

Plan new look for Milwaukee Avenue

A comprehensive plan to upgrade the 4.5-mile long Milwaukee ave. "corridor" was accepted Tuesday evening by the Niles Board of trustees as a guideline for future development of Niles' primary thoroughfare. Mayor Nicholas Blase labeled the study plan as "a recommendation, a preliminary idea of improvements" for Milwaukee ave. to be followed by Open Hearings and implementations prior to final approval of the project.

The one-year study made at a cost of \$37,000 was presented by George March of Metcalf & Eddy, Inc., engineers, to a standing room crowd at the Sept. 27 village board meeting. Village manager Kenneth Scheel said that \$25,000 of the total cost was funded by a Community Development Grant through Cook County. The remaining \$12,000 he said came out of village general funds.

Scheel estimated a cautious ballpark figure of \$8 million for completion of the project "if it

Blase announces petition drive against SST landing

Nicholas B. Blase has announced a petition drive to oppose the landing of the Concord SST at O'Hare field. Blase, the Maine Township Democratic Committeeman, said his organization and interested volunteers will circulate petitions that will be given to President Carter. Persons interested in circulating petitions should pick them up at 8074 Milwaukee ave., in Niles, or call 692-3388.

Mr. Blase said, "The British and French governments have made a request to President Carter to allow their SST to land at O'Hare field. This means that

the loudest and most ear deafening jet in the world may soon be flying over your head. We must stop this landing of the SST at O'Hare. The noise levels at the present time clearly and socially and possibly physically damaging to everyone who lives around O'Hare field. Recently a New York study reported that the SST noise level approaches the point of pain. President Carter in good conscience must not permit this to happen to the residents of Maine Township."

Mr. Blase went on to say, "I am organizing the collection of petitions opposing the SST landing at O'Hare field. Our whole Democratic Organization will circulate petitions. However, we are not enough. We need volunteers to collect petitions. We will present our objections to President Carter. Help us to help yourself. Requiem for the historic Landmark?

A vast army of protestors swarmed into the Landmark Tavern's spacious parking lot, Dempster and Milwaukee, last Sunday at high noon. Carrying banners and placards, to the accompaniment of trumpet and drums, they shouted their disapproval to Matty Pokuta and Lorraine (Lorrie) about tearing the joint down. Both motorists and pedestrians stopped and gawked causing a near traffic jam.

This large group of protestors weren't long-haired, wild-eyed rebels — indeed, no. They comprised many of Niles' leading citizens, politicians and businessmen. Niles' great mayor and Democratic Committeeman of Niles Township Nicholas B. Blase was carrying a sign that read **Matty goes - the Landmark stays!** Peter Pesole, a Niles trustee, waved a large placard that said **Keep Pete's retreat!** Benjamin Mankowsky heisted a large sign that read **Italians for Matty - eyesore stays!** Dr. Kogo's banner proclaimed that **Matty cheats at bocci ball.** (Incidentally, Matty's team, just before his arrival on the scene, won the Bocci Ball world series. Matty had scored

most of the key points. Perhaps this colored Kogo's outlook.)

Many of the remaining huge group was made up of comparable distinguished citizens of Niles and the surrounding area. Such as Sam Bruno, President, Police & Fire Commission; Angie Marcheschi, Trustee; Todd Barvaro, former Trustee; Ray Prybly, Abe Selman, Trustee; Leno Prandini, Lenny Cohen, Tony Gagliano, President of Niles Days, Trustee Niles Township; Nick Constantino, senior citizen coordinator, and assist. health inspector, Tony Scipione, Ted Bismnik, coordinator Niles Township Democrats, Fire Chief Al Hoelbl, Frank Kearns, Larry Mertes, Cindy Pokuta (Matty's daughter), sons Jerry, James and daughter-in-law Dora, Steve Walsh, Ralph Bast, Phil Panella, Rich Vandini, John Katsoulas, Niles super sleuth, Lou Pandera, Mgr., Bunker Hill, Sid Strauss, Agriculture Dept., State of Illinois of "the man who talks to race horses", Joe Salerno, Lenny Cohen, Bocci Ball player, Vince Bugarin, School District 71 board member, Tony Sciarati, Peter Anselmo, Tom Bondi, Al Jacobson, Greg Demos, Niles police officer, Ben Guazzo, and many others of the same ilk.

And in addition to the celebrities, there were, of course, hundreds of the rank and file, many of whom were customers and friends of the Pokutas for years.

The most venomous protestors were those involved with the new Milwaukee ave. beautification and redevelopment plan for the village of Niles.

They believe that the historic Landmark is a gem of antiquity — a thing of beauty — and should be preserved forever. When one views it in the right light, this is true. For the Landmark, when considered from a standpoint of antiquity, has no counterpart. When the sunlight shines upon it in a certain way, it is a thing of beauty. The peeling paint on this red barn type of 19th century architecture accentuates the character and strength of this noble structure. And its companion edifice, a building of the same era, with its fading, bilge

green paint, is also a thing of antique beauty and nobility and hence should remain a joy forever.

And between these two monumental examples of 19th century architecture, set slightly back from the front steps of the Landmark, is a glorious sunken garden. Were Picasso alive he would salute its magnificence as a masterpiece of creative art. For not even a Picasso with all his magical artistry could create such a natural work of art. For in this magnificent sunken garden thru the inexorable movement of time is a vintage Chevrolet emersed up to its fenders in soft turf and surrounding it is an accumulation of antique memorabilia arranged in an artistic montage, not by men, but by time and God. As Parisian artists would say, "It's magnifique! Man can imitate, only nature can create."

The Landmark formerly was known as the Mallard Inn going back to about 1890. For the past thirteen years the Landmark has been in the able hands of Matty and Lorrie Pokuta. The friends they've made during this span of years are legion, both in Niles and all of Chicagoland.

But even more than the place, the Landmark, I shall miss most of all Matty and Lorrie, two of the

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Mikva, Schlesinger stress critical energy situation

The seriousness of this country's energy situation and the importance of taking action to stave off critical energy shortages in the future were the recurring themes stressed by Congressman Abner J. Mikva and Energy Secretary James Schlesinger in speaking to a Tenth District audience Sunday (September 25).

Mikva highlighted the wide spectrum of public reactions to the energy problem -- "from those who deny its existence to recent remarks by some business men that the OPEC-controlled oil price structure is good for their profit picture" while Schlesinger outlines "the invisible crisis" and the Carter Administration's proposal to overcome it.

Their remarks were made at a fund-raising dinner sponsored by the New Trier Township Democratic Organization at the Holiday Inn atop the Apparel Center, Chicago. Congressman Sidney Yates (9th) was presented with an award "for his long and meritorious public service."

"The energy situation is the toughest, most important and most complex issue now facing the country -- and, in fact, may be

the toughest, most important and complex issue we have faced in the past 25 years," Mikva said. "The key to solving the problem continues to be convincing the American people that there is indeed a problem and that we can work together to solve it. President Carter and Secretary Schlesinger are trying to do that."

Secretary Schlesinger echoed the importance of building a national coalition behind a comprehensive national energy policy and he called "The risk of Balkanization by region or by interest group" on opposing sides of the energy policy the greatest threat to a secure national energy future.

"Unless we take action to head off the crisis, our energy supply will no longer be able to support our current rate of economic activity," Schlesinger said. Failure to meet the energy challenge will lead to increased inflation, increased unemployment and such a severe change in our balance of payments that we could be unable to purchase any oil that may be left, he added.

"President Carter's challenge to the country to face the energy



problem 'as the moral equivalent of war' was not a call to implement war time policies. It was rather a challenge to achieve in a time of peace the degree of national cohesion and consensus on a national problem normally only achieved in a time of war," Schlesinger continued.

He described the Carter Administration's proposed energy plan now before the Senate "as a

combination of conservation and fuel switching."

The plan was considered and amended by the House before going to the Senate. Schlesinger complimented and thanked Mikva for his "absolutely critical role in getting a superb bill out of the House of Representatives. For that, the whole nation owes him a debt of gratitude," the Energy Secretary said.

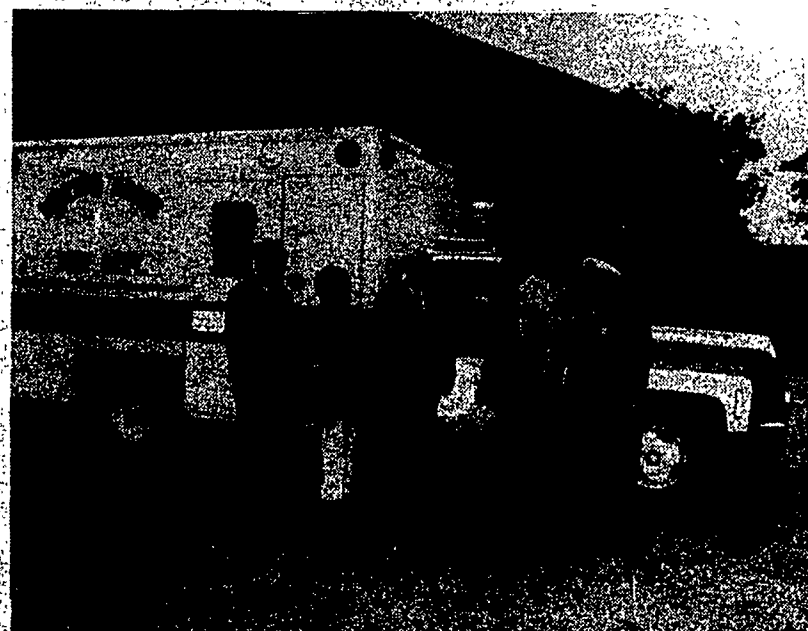

he felt the village was just going thru the motions in holding the hearing. He added he felt the village was "mad at us when all we were doing was trying to help people". He felt they don't have good rapport with the village.

These men from the pizza parlor added the pressure from the newspapers forced the village to do something. They disagreed with the police chief who decried the report of the incident being out-of-proportion to the importance of the matter.

From The Left Hand it would seem the brave efforts of these men going to the defense of a woman being beaten rates a resolution of commendation from the village board for their heroics. It is high time citizens who get involved should receive commendation and recognition for their efforts. How many times have we read of the callous disregard people have about those in distress? And how many times have we been horrified by stories of persons left dying in the streets of New York because citizens were afraid to get involved?

These men committed an act of bravery. And they were treated as if they were criminals by the very policemen who should encourage citizens to uphold the law.

Nick Blase and the Niles Village Board have a responsibility to recognize these men, no matter how embarrassing it may be to the police department. Such recognition would tell the good guys on the police department (the great majority of Niles policemen) that dishonorable work in the department will not be tolerated. Anything less is a reflection on Blase and the entire village.

The sad story in last week's Bugle about the alleged murder and suicide of people named Fritz ends a chapter in Niles history. The Fritz family are owners of the Golf-Milwaukee property at the intersection where the Toys-R-Us store is located. They had operated a small kiddieland there many years ago, finally leasing the land under the present store.

It was reported the senior Fritz had gone to the parking lot of the store and allegedly committed suicide some years ago. Now, the deaths of the younger wife and her husband ends a Niles chapter which goes back many, many years.

Many old line residents in these communities had property which was in the center of a boom area and which multiplied its value many times. When the time was ripe for profiting, the transaction was made. While the windfall may have seemed a blessing at the time, the subsequent incidents in this family's lives belie any thoughts happiness can be measured in dollar signs.

and make a decision within two weeks and the motion was carried. Trustee Henrici said he'd like Atty. Ashman to see if this procedure was legal or if the school property must be bid on at a Public Auction. Supt. Eckhardt then said the school board attorney advised his board this property could be sold to the village with no problems at all.

Eugene Schlickman, Atty. for Jack-in-the-Box told the board the owners of the property said they believe the problems previously existing at the drive-in are now under control. He noted they plan to do some remodeling, and asked the board to rescind the portion of the ordinance they passed which limits the hours of operation of the drive-in. The Jack-in-the-Box owners would like to remain open for 24 hours daily. According to neighbors who, up to now, complained of noise during early morning hours during the summer months and trash being strewn about, these problems have been overcome and they are now satisfied with conditions, but want assurance things will remain in good order as they now are. Mr. Schlickman said if problems ever arose again, the ordinance could always be used to ensure the property owners comply with the village code. Police Chief Glauner said, "As long as the off duty police are kept on the job things will be in order, otherwise matters could become troublesome again." Schlickman then said the village could stipulate the 24-hour operation was contingent on Jack-in-the-Box maintaining a police or security force on the premises. Trustees then voted to rescind the hours restricting the hours of business for the drive-in.

Alan Goldberg, Plan Commission chairman, read a report in which the Morton Grove Bank sought to obtain a Special Use permit for a two-story building at the corner of Dempster and Harlem in the Village Plaza Shopping Center for drive-in bank facilities. 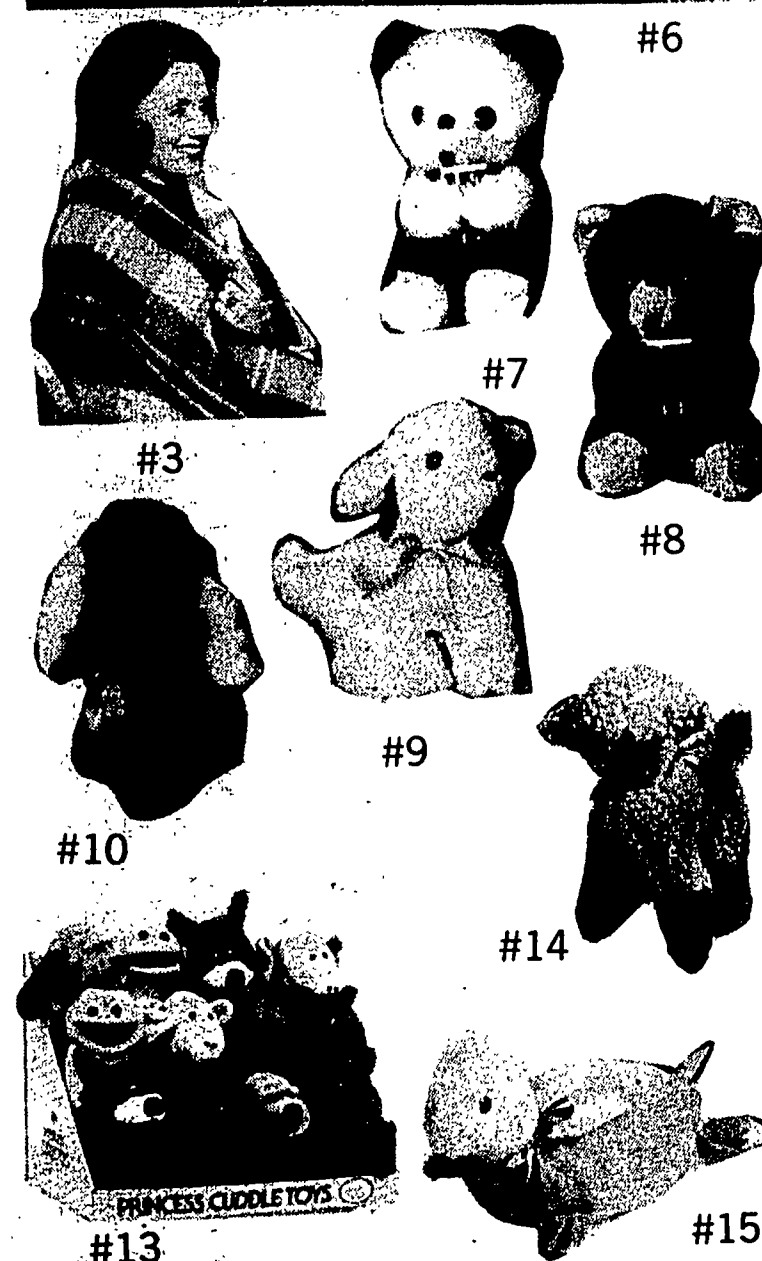
Chief of Police Norm Glauner said he has received preliminary approval of a grant for the Crime Prevention program and also a grant for our Bicycle Safety Program.

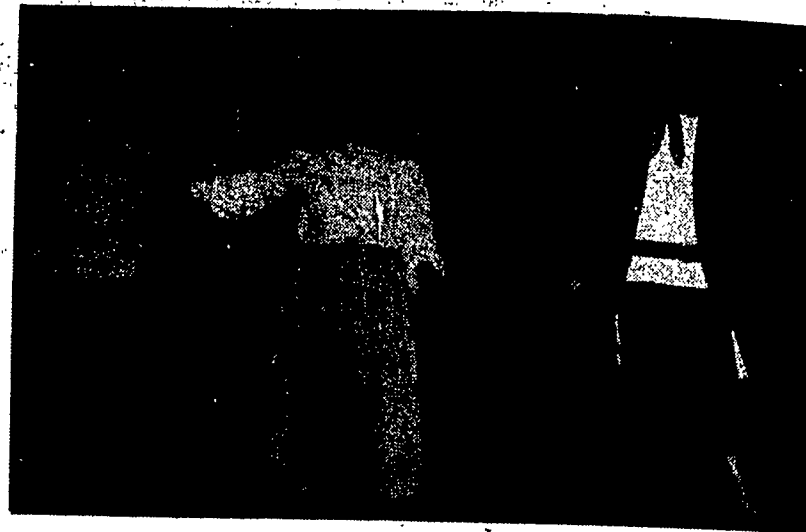

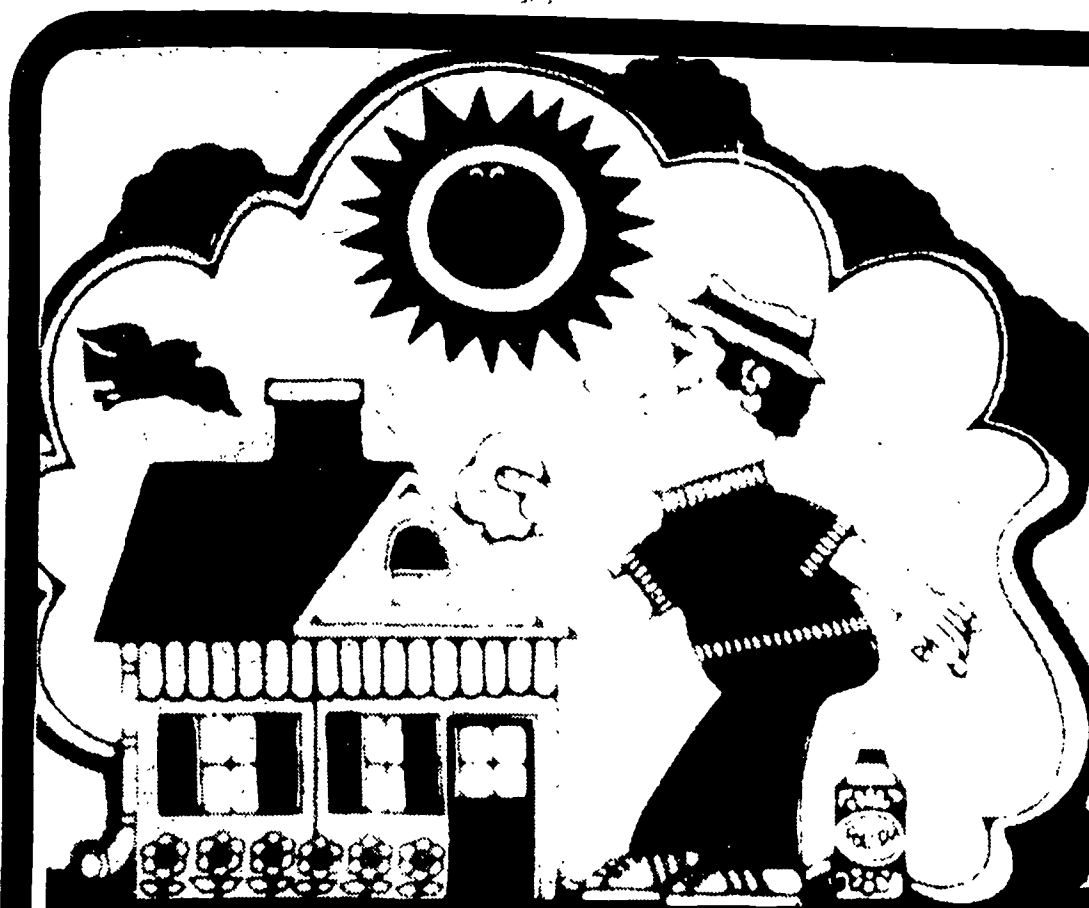

that could be used to serve the
many people in outlying suburbs
who are running out of water.

1. In 1975, the City of Chicago
showed an average pumpage of
844 million gallons of water a day
for a population of 3,369,000.
That averages out to 250 gallons a
day per person.

2. On the other hand, the 74
suburbs served by the Chicago
Water Department showed an
average pumpage of 139 gallons a
day per person. That average is
based on a population of
1,279,000 and pumpage of 177
million gallons per day.

3. Some might say that the
difference in per capita consump-
tion is due to the amount of
manufacturing that Chicago has,
as opposed to the suburbs.
However, information from the
Coldwell Banker Commercial
Brokerage Company indicates
that the City of Chicago has
approximately the same number
of square feet of manufacturing
available as do the suburbs.

4. Therefore, there is no
accountable reason for Chicago
using 111 gallons of water per
person per day more than subur-
ban water users. The only ex-
planation is wastage.

5. In 1975, over two-thirds of
Chicago's 504,598 water services
were unmetered. This encourages
waste since people only have to
pay a flat fee per year, as opposed
to paying for the amount of water
actually used.

6. Taking 111 gallons of water
wasted per day and multiplying it
by 3,369,000 people in the
City of Chicago, comes to 374
million gallons of water wasted
per day.

7. If we then take that wasted
water and divide it by normal
suburban needs of 139 gallons per
day, we come up with the fact that
we could supply water from the
City of Chicago to an additional
2.7 million people living in the
suburbs who need Lake Michigan
water. Elimination of the water
wastage would allow those 2.7
million additional people to be
served without additional with-
drawals from Lake Michigan.

Chicago must recognize that it
can no longer waste this precious
commodity when so many people
are in need of it.

These recipients are examples
of the fine persons who make the
Niles Blood Assurance Program a
success. A blood program of this
type should be viewed as an
insurance policy as important as

Without donors there would be no
blood available for those who
need it. Niles must collect only
1297 units of blood per year in
order to insure all of our
residents.

At present at least one third of
this quota is being collected from
students at Niles College and
Notre Dame High School. Par-
tishoners of St. John Brebeuf
Church are providing approxi-
mately another third of our quota.
All of the rest of the residents of
Niles are providing only about
30% of the quota. This could
definitely be improved upon.

were done today." Cost of the
nearly 50 improvement projects
for the Avenue, as set forth by the
engineering firm, would depend
on many factors, he said, such as
real estate values and expense of
materials, to mention a few.
Sources of funding he noted were
grants, revenue sharing, state
and county monies, motor vehicle
and motor fuel taxes and private
and business-sharing financing.

Blase asked for planning sug-
gestions, to be included as part of
implementation, from Niles resi-
dents and organizations, direct-
ing that letters be sent to Trustee
Richard Haczak, chairman of the
Beautification Committee. Blase
also said "someone would be
hired in the future for the explicit
purpose of implementation."

In presenting the development
plan March said the survey was
based on project data of existing
and projected future traffic use,
traffic accident data and a public
opinion survey of conditions,
needs and solutions.

He noted a 1975 average traffic
flow of 31,000 cars at the north
end of Milwaukee, decreasing to
27,600 at the south end. Future
traffic projections, for the year
2000 were set at 34,100 autos.

He also noted an average 540
accidents yearly for the major
thoroughfare with 127 injuries in
two-and-a-half years and 3 fatalities.

March said a "revitalization
framework" plan for success of
future development centered
around land use (controlled by
zoning ordinances), a well-func-
tioning thru-traffic flow, adequate
and conveniently located parking,
improved pedestrian accommo-
dations (with consideration of the
elderly and handicapped) and an
aesthetic streetscape including
landscaping, improved parkways,
an upgrading of above-ground
public utilities and restriction of
business and advertising signs.

Our water suit filed against the
City of Chicago by some fifty
suburbs, charging that we're
paying too much for water, will
dramatize the particular fact of
tremendous water waste. The
overcharge is caused, in part,
by the 374 million gallons of water
wasted per day in the City of
Chicago."

\$3rd with a \$23,020 income and a
\$52,500 home value.

Des Plaines went from 52nd
place in 1970 to 69th place in 1977
with median income at \$22,820
and median home value at
\$43,400.

Perhaps most interesting of the
improvement projects recom-
mended was that of a central-
ization point, village-discussed
over many years, of a "Village
Center", a 5-acre development
planned for the northeast corner
of Touhy ave. and Milwaukee
ave., across from Dutchman's
Point.

Proposed was inclusion of a
senior citizen complex overlook-
ing a civic plaza. Facilities within
the plaza could include an open
air theatre and band shell, a kiosk
and information center, museum,
public restrooms and a concession
stand. A bridge "could link" the
Center to the elementary school
and park facilities south of Touhy
ave.

Overall improvements for the
suggested Avenue included busi-
ness parking, bus shelters, side-
walks, general landscaping, inter-
section changes, acquisition of
property, relocation of street light
cables, development of new off-
street parking and improvement
of street advertising signs.

The Comprehensive Develop-
ment Plan was set around six
separate study areas of (1) Green-
wood to Church/Maryland
st., (2) Church/Maryland to
Crain, (3) Crain to Monroe, (4)
Monroe to Howard st., (5) Harlem
to Touhy and (6) Touhy ave. to
Albion ave.

Residents at the Tuesday night
board meeting requested imple-
mentation in the study of sewer
flooding problems near Demp-
ster, near Howard st., and south
of Maryland ave.; traffic safety at
Milwaukee and Monroe for access
to Grennan Heights Park; and for
traffic signals or channelization at
entrances to McDonald's, Jerry's
Fruit Market and Oak Mill Mall.

Planning may be viewed at the
Administration Building, 7601
Milwaukee ave., during business
hours.

In other business a proposed
DIMar subdivision at 8701-8743
Sunset dr. to a less-than-required
lot frontage by owner Mario Verre
generated enough dissension
from area residents for a delay in
action by trustees. Board member
Angelo Marcheschi suggested a

prior to decision.

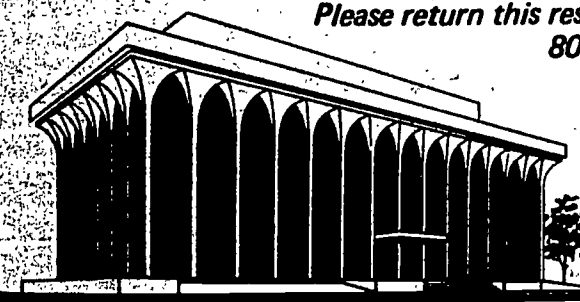
