Disposal of 2 land parcels included in study

District 63 committee studies school closings

District 63's new Citizens Committee on Facilities and Property Utilization will study the feasibility of closing schools and the disposal of undeveloped land.

At a Monday night meeting the 16-person committee disclosed the two basic topics they will concentrate on.

District 63's school board has announced many times by 1981 the district may have a \$7,000,000 debt if they continue expenditures at the present rate. They decided to form the Citizens Committee which will recommend means for combatting this liability.

Chairman of the Citizens Com-

mittee, former school board president Bill Gurolnick, told The Bugle Tuesday the Committee will discuss the possibility of closing elementary schools, and/or a junior high school. He said the committee desires residents in the community express their views.

Gurolnick said a second topic

the Committee will discuss is the disposing of several parcels of undeveloped property it now owns.

District 63 owns two parcels of land in the northwest end of the district. Three acres of property is located at Harrison st. near Greenwood and a 5-acre parcel at Dee rd. and the power lines north

of Golf rd.

Concerning the savings by closing schools, Board President Larry Reiss told The Bugle there would not be a cost savings by reducing teachers since they would be transferred to other schools. However, he said maintenance personnel and secretarial

Evaluation survey to determine sewer system deficiencies

Study new plan for flood relief

Village of Niles announced today that work has begun on a supplemental facilities plan to investigate possible solutions to the few remaining flooding problems and sewer system deficiencies within the Village. The plan will consist of a Sewer System Evaluation Survey (SSES) for separate sanitary sewers and computer simulation of the combined sewers utilizing the Storm Water Management Model (SWMM).

Village Manager Kenneth Scheel explained that the SSES is required by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Metropolitan San-

itary District of Greater Chicago as part of the expansion of the Sanitary District's Northside Treatment Works. The SSES portion of the project will comprise a systematic examination of the separate sanitary sewer system to determine the specific location, estimated flow rate, and suitable method of rehabilitation of any sources of "infiltration/inflow."

Infiltration/inflow consists of extraneous water such as ground-water and/or storm runoff that enters the sanitary sewers through defects in the system and causes overloading and possible

or Richard J. Daley, who served the League in that capacity for 22 years.

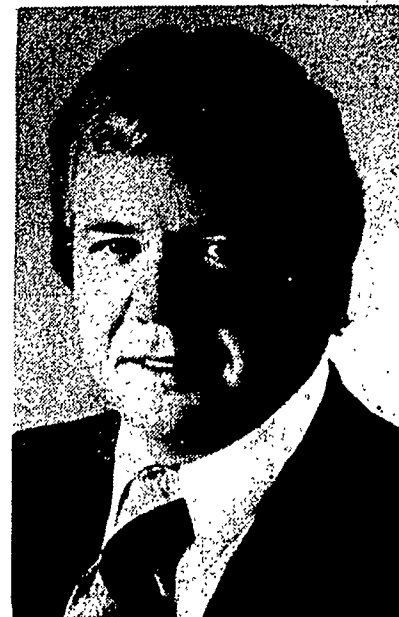
Roy F. Sipusich

Thomas Tully, Cook County Assessor, will be the speaker at the Oct. 14 meeting of the Maine Township Democratic Organization.

We are fortunate to have an attorney available at the Center, to assist people in the area of simple wills. This program helps lower and middle income seniors who need assistance with a will. There's no charge for a consultation with the attorney, pertaining to an existing will. If you need a will drawn up, you must be at least 60 years of age, have an income of \$10,000 or less and your assets excluding car and house can't exceed \$10,000. The fee for having a will drawn up won't be more than \$50. To make an appointment with the attorney, call the Center.

Niles veterinarian honored by college

Alumni of the University of Illinois College of Veterinary Medicine honored two Illinois veterinarians during the college's recent annual fall conference.

Dr. T. J. Lafeber of Niles was given the association's Service Award.

Dr. Lafeber, an internationally known avian veterinarian, is a 1949 graduate of Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine. He opened a small animal practice in Niles, Illinois after graduation. Although he and his associate treat all types of pet animals in their hospital, his special interest in caged bird medicine.

Dr. Lafeber maintains an aviary of parakeets, canaries and other birds for use in clinical evaluation of drugs and other studies. He is currently conducting projects on organo-phosphate insecticides for treatment of bird parasites, as well as a nutrition study and studies on several new drugs. In the past, his avian research has introduced a micro-liter syringe for use in birds, perfected surgical techniques and x-ray procedures for birds, established blood chemistry values, and established drug dosage schedules and a formula for feeding birds by gavage or stomach tube. All the research work has been done with his own funds; and all honorariums he receives from lectures is put into the research.

Dr. Lafeber received a special award from the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) in 1970 in recognition of his contri-

butions to the fields of avian medicine and clinical laboratory medicine. In 1975, AAHA recognized Dr. Lafeber as the Outstanding Practitioner of the Year in Region III. Region III encompasses 13 states and two Canadian provinces. He also received the 1976 Stange Award to an outstanding alumnus by Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine.

Dr. Lafeber is a past president of the Niles Lions Club and is active in Boy Scout projects.

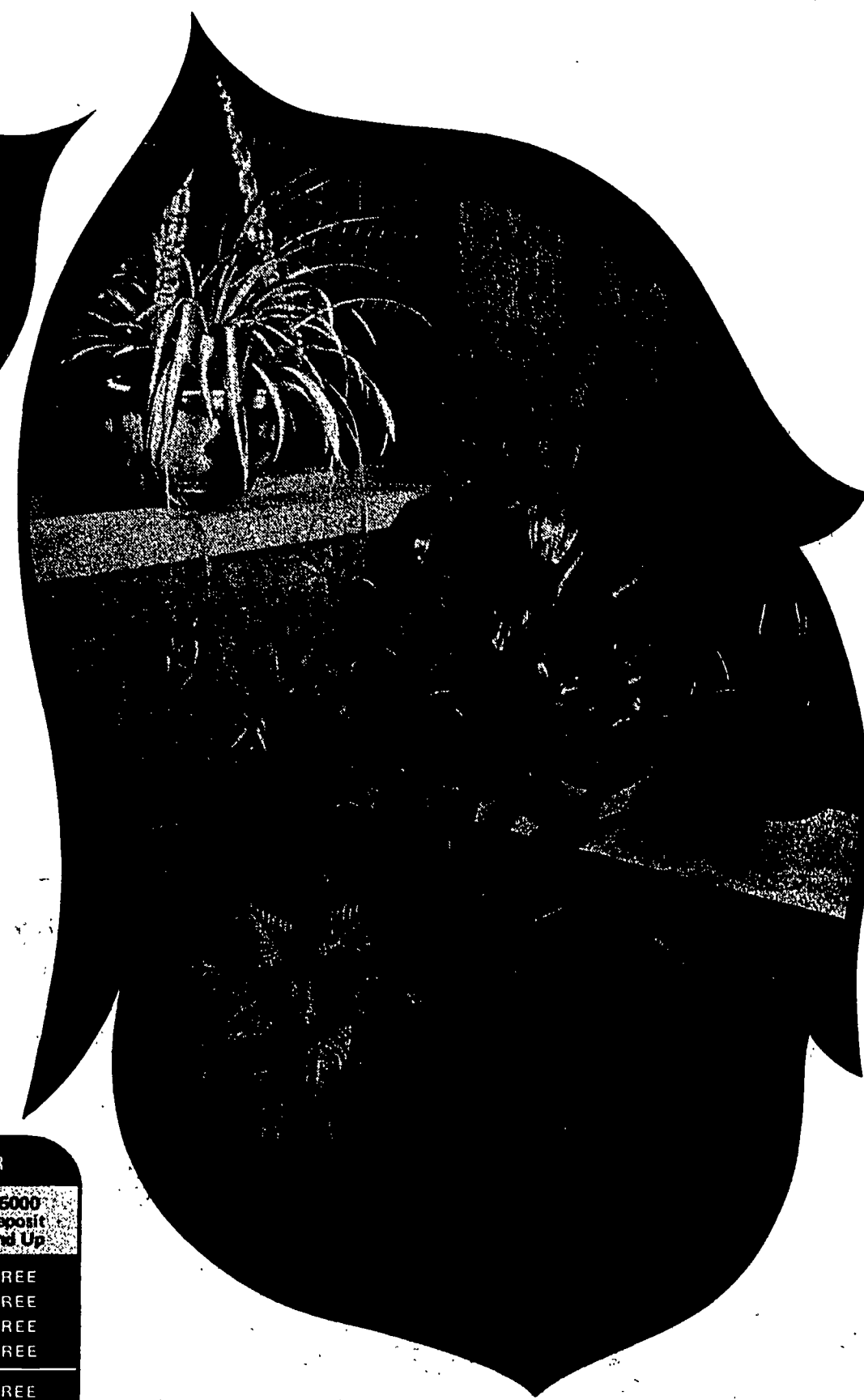

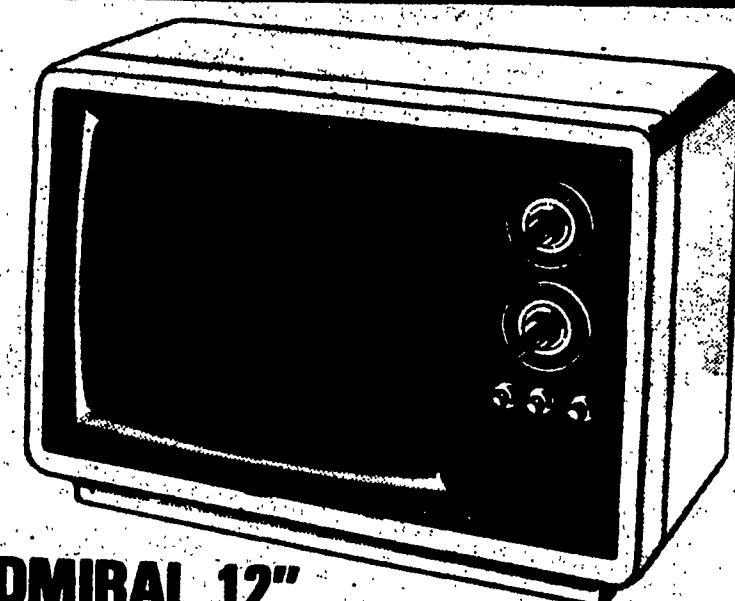

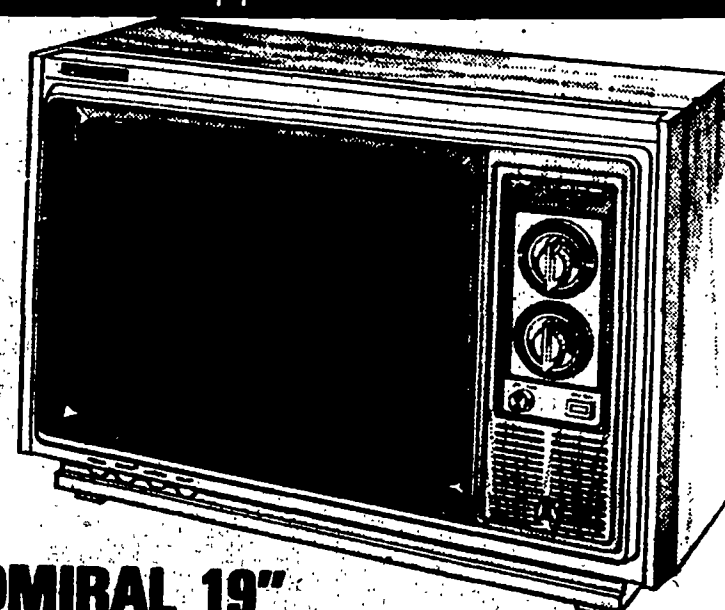

OCC enrollment up again

Enrollment for the fall semester at Oakton is up by 8% according to John D. Gagin, director of admissions and records. Oakton's student body has continued to increase each year since the college opened in 1970 when 832 were enrolled. When MONACEP registrations are completed it is expected that more than 19,000 will have enrolled.

In college credit courses Gagin indicated that 6,740 students enrolled this fall. The comparable total at the end of registration last year was 6,252. This year's enrollment includes increases in almost all categories, especially among part-time students.

Some of the increase is a result of the recent annexation of the Glenbrook and New Trier high school districts to Oakton. Because the annexation became

effective so late, July 22, Gagin estimates that the impact on enrollment will be greater next year. Gagin also pointed out that increased enrollment of residents of Evanston, Niles and Maine townships are reflected in the totals.

Enrollment increased in day courses (3,707), evening courses (2,915) and weekend courses (118 in Saturday only).

Gagin will submit a comprehensive report on admissions and registration to the Oakton Community College Board of Trustees on Sept. 20.

Continuing education courses begin Sept. 26 and MONACEP registration will continue through Sept. 30. Alex Kruzel, director of MONACEP (Maine-Oakton-Niles Continuing Education Program) anticipates that fall registration will exceed 12,000 students.

Oakton diagnostic testing

Diagnostic assessment tests in the basic skills of mathematics, reading, and composition will be given at Oakton Community College on Saturday, Oct. 15, to students who plan to register for college credit courses for the spring 1978 semester.

All students who intend to take any mathematics or communications course at Oakton are required to take these placement tests.

Testing is scheduled from 9 a.m. until 12 noon. Students who wish to take the test at this time should sign up with the Student Development Office, Room 405, Building 4, OCC Interim Campus, or call 967-5120, ext. 323.

These tests enable college personnel to make accurate placement recommendations to the students and help ensure that students know which courses are appropriate to their skill levels, it is pointed out.

Diagnostic tests for the spring term will also be held on Saturday, Nov. 19, and on Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 9 and 10, during open registration.

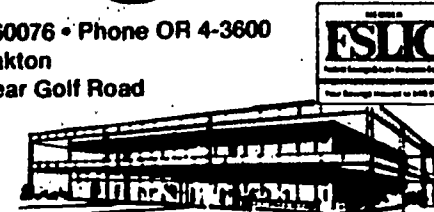

Johnson discusses energy, nuclear war planning

Mark "Markus" Johnson accused his opponents of underestimating the seriousness of America's energy situation and of advocating an unwise approach to nuclear war planning. The four Republicans, who hope to oppose incumbent Democrat Mikva, appeared in a debate Wednesday, Sept. 14 at Marillac High School in Northfield.

Johnson said, "I differ from my opponents because I believe America has an energy problem. The idea that the free market will automatically take care of everything may be true in the narrow academic sense that prices will always rise to ration limited supplies. But based on my years of commodity futures trading I know that free market adjustments can be very painful and may trigger widespread social unrest -- social unrest that Democrat collectivists like Abner Mikva naturally use as an excuse for more government. Republicans must be concerned about energy to combat and contain Democrat collectivism."

Responding to a question from the audience, candidates Hales and Porter supported an Ameri-

can nuclear "first strike capability" for tough "bargaining" with the Russians. Johnson disagreed, saying "The real experts on nuclear war, the professional nuclear war gamers, know that America's achieving first strike capability is destabilizing because it increases the likelihood the other side will strike first. American first-strike capability means that the bad guys on the other side have less than a half hour in which to decide to shoot their nukes at us once they decide, rightly or wrongly, that our first strike has been launched. That half hour is more than enough time for our missiles to fly around the world and obliterate theirs."

Johnson continued, "Because bad guys are much more likely than Americans to make bad decisions, due to stupidity, emotional weakness, or temporary technical communication difficulties, I think American first strike capability will do us more harm than good -- therefore I do not support it at this time." Johnson believes the new MX ICBM would be an effective counter-measure if Russia developed first strike capability.

Choke saving methods act becomes law

Landmark legislation, authored by State Rep. Ralph C. Capparelli (D-16th), to require the posting of choke-saving methods in all food service establishments was signed into law recently by Governor James Thompson.

Originally introduced as House Bill 13, the new law provides that the Illinois Department of Public Health select the life saving procedure, and design and distribute placards to food service establishments for posting. Failure to comply will result in a \$500 fine.

"I am very pleased that after three years of working to pass this legislation, the Choke Saving Methods Act is now law," said Capparelli. "This bill is one of the best to come out of the Illinois General Assembly this year."

Capparelli noted that while the Illinois Department of Public

Health has the responsibility for selecting the life-saving procedure, he is hopeful that the Heimlich Maneuver will be chosen.

"This Maneuver is the easiest to administer and very effective," he continued. "It has been documented that as many as 600 lives each year could be saved in Illinois if more people were aware of this method."

Capparelli said that the choke saving method is simple to learn. The Heimlich Maneuver is administered by forcing the diaphragm upward, compressing the air in the lungs and expelling the object blocking the breathing passage.

This pressure, he described, is applied to a standing or sitting person by moving behind the individual who is choking, wrapping one's arms around the

choking person's upper abdomen, below the rib cage, and exerting quick upward thrusts.

"Choking can happen to anyone," said Capparelli. "Ronald Reagan's life was saved during last year's political campaign when someone near him knew this procedure, but others like Ric Riccardo, Tommy Dorsey, and the Chicago Art Institute's John Maxon were not so fortunate."

"As a result of the publicity given this bill over the past year, Mayor Bilandic, in his wisdom, required several months ago that all Chicago firemen be fully instructed in this life-saving procedure. Now this procedure will be known statewide and, for this, I am grateful to the governor for signing the bill, and to Susan Veach, editorial director of WBBM-Radio for broadcasting numerous editorials urging that the bill become law."

Entertainment Guide

Notre Dame extension bands

Notre Dame High School, Niles, has a unique instrumental music program for grade school musicians. Boys and girls from local grade schools have been meeting weekly at Notre Dame since 1956 for instruction on various band instruments and rehearsing band music.

Rev. George Wiskirchen, CSC, founder of the program and presently the Assistant Director of the University of Notre Dame Band, felt that there was a need to give these grade school musicians a group experience that they could not get with private teachers.

In 1962, the Archdiocesan Music Education Office encouraged Catholic high schools to extend their facilities and faculties to after school activities for grade school musicians. The program at NDHS was then turned over to Donald Tolosko who had been working with some of the new Catholic grade school bands in the area. With the extra time that Tolosko was able to devote to this program and his

introduction of class instruction, the Notre Dame Extension Bands have grown into the most successful program of this type in the Chicago area and possibly in the nation. Tolosko became department head in 1972.

Currently there are two levels of performing bands: a stage band or jazz group and multi-level mixed instrument classes. These groups meet on Saturdays and certain evenings. Several private teachers are also available at the school. Some of the bands participate in contests and usually receive a Superior rating.

Beginning band members are recruited every September and October. These boys and girls, most of whom have never had any previous training, meet weekly for instruction in small groups of similar instruments and they also meet weekly in a full band rehearsal. Classes are available through the intermediate level. Students usually study with a

private teacher at the advanced level.

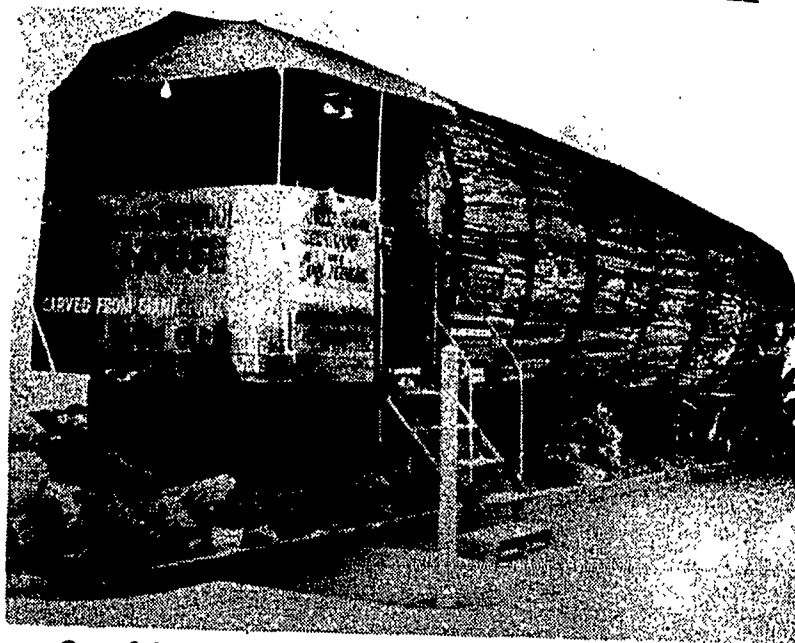
Most beginning students obtain their instruments thru rental plans with local music stores. In some cases, Notre Dame supplies the instrument. Notre Dame also supplies most of the music. The students pay a small semester fee.

Interested students need not be beginners. In recent years boys and girls from local Catholic and public school bands have joined to supplement their own school band experience. At least fifteen schools are represented each semester.

This year's program is being organized. The program for those students who have been playing for over one year will begin in early October. The beginning band program will start in mid or late October.

California Redwood Log House at Golf Mill



One of the world's most unusual exhibits -- a three-room house carved from a giant redwood log -- is currently being displayed at the North Mall, thru Oct. 9th, during center hours.

The Redwood Log House, exhibited in all 48 contiguous States and at World's Fairs, took two men nearly a year to carve out of the Liberty Tree, a giant Coast Redwood felled in the late 1940's near Eureka, California. The Log House was formed from the fourth segment cut from the base, yet it is more than 9 feet in diameter at its larger end.

The completely furnished trailer home inside the Redwood log is comfortably outfitted for travel living, with modern living room, kitchen, and bedroom. Cabinets throughout are also of Redwood, but are not from the original tree material.

After the war, he was associated with the Reuter Organ Company as a sales representative, installer and tonal finisher. At the same time, he operated an organ rebuilding and service business of his own. Altogether, about 300 of the finest pipe organ installations bear his personal nameplate.

Dr. William H. Barnes, dean of American organ architects and consultants, and long a close associate of Wichlac stated, "If there was ever a dyed-in-the-wool organ man, with intimate knowledge and vast experience in adapting all sorts of pipes (from numerous builders) to change of wind pressure and location and making them sound well, it is Frank Wichlac."

Wichlac has recently worked as a consultant to CATOE (Chicago Area Theatre Organ Enthusiasts, Inc.) on the installation of CATOE's Wuritzer pipe organ at Maine North High School. This organ was removed from the Indiana Theatre in 1975 by CATOE members, completely rebuilt and reinstalled in the splendid new auditorium of Maine North High School. Mr. Wichlac has also worked with CATOE on several of their other projects in the Chicago area.

Days Chairman Tony Gagliano said the monies for the Niles Jaycees of \$725.92 and the Northwest Italian American Society of \$1,304.76 as well as the Village allocation would be held in escrow pursuant to bills (covering events as requested) submitted by the 3 groups "at which time", Gagliano said, "the Committee will honor the requests."

Contrary to a previous report by the Days Board, of ineligibility by the Senior Citizens Club of Niles to receive monies due to inability to provide Festival booth workers, Gagliano Monday night said the group would get \$382.50. He said the cash would come from a 2 year old fund held in escrow out of \$584.93 excess monies returned to the Niles Days treasury from a \$5,000 request by the Niles Chamber of Commerce for a village outdoor bulletin sign. Should the Senior Citizens decline the monies, Gagliano said "the bequest would revert to the Niles Days treasury for future allocation."

Days Chairman Gagliano expressed disappointment that the 1977 Festival did not bring more profits. He said "the carnival

itself was a success altho we didn't generate the funds we expected," indicating that "crowds chose to eat and drink" but "profits were decreased at the ride booths."

New officers for the 1978 Festival Days include Terry Shevelenko as Niles Days Chairman; Tony Gagliano, vice chairman; Sandy Friedman, secretary; Bernardine Reid, treasurer; and Bill Bers, personnel director.

Voted in for two year terms as Directors were incumbent Joe Booker, June Haas and Ed Brasch. Don Steinke was appointed to fill an unexpired director's term of one year, vacated by Bill Bers' resignation.

Also on the Niles Days Board of Directors fulfilling another year in office are Ben Mankowsky and Norm Katz.

In handing the Niles Days gavel to his successor, outgoing Days Chairman Gagliano commended the entire Committee and participating organizations for a "wonderful job well done."

Niles Days is an umbrella group of approximately 30 Niles organizations which has given out monies annually to groups requesting handouts from the 5-day Festival traditionally held annually in July.

Grease should always be cleaned from the range, and curtains should not be near enough to blow over it.

A portable gas or oil heater can be a very pleasant feature of a cold bedroom, but don't neglect to turn it off at bedtime. Also leave a door or window slightly open, so that the oxygen it uses will be replaced.

Have an experienced serviceman go over your central heating system now — don't wait for cold weather. He should also inspect and clean flue pipes and chimneys and make necessary repairs.

The basement, closets and attic have their uses, but not as accumulation spots for papers, rags and old furniture. All can catch fire and leave a family outdoors looking on helplessly while their home burns.

Using kerosene or other flammable liquids to start a fire in a furnace, fireplace, or stove is a very dangerous practice. So is cleaning clothes with benzine or gasoline. Better to take them to the local cleaner and spare the grief of a home fire.

as much as 15 or 20 years away from retirement, even for those who never intended to retire at all, he said.

Grant has been presenting similar pre-retirement programs in the Chicago area over the past three years. He said the programs stress the social, psychological, and economic aspects of retirement. flooding of the sewer system and the treatment plant.

The computer model, SWMM, will be used to simulate various intensities of rain storms and aid in determining the size and location of any necessary relief sewers in the combined sewer areas. Scheel reported that the EPA will reimburse the Village for seventy-five percent of the costs associated with the study.

Metcalf & Eddy, Inc. of Des Plaines, the Village's consulting engineers for the project, will be responsible for applying the computer model and coordinating the field work associated with the project. The Village's Engineering and Public Works Departments are actively involved in the study and are responsible for conducting the field work associated with the project.

Favorable weather conditions during the various phases of the project should allow completion of the work by February, 1979.

Home). Sit down with your family and diagram two routes to the outside from all rooms, especially bedrooms. Provide each family member with a whistle to warn others of danger; keep the whistle by the bed. Place the fire department telephone number (965-2121) on all telephones. Choose a place outdoors for everyone to meet for a roll call; discuss why no one should ever go back inside once the home is evacuated. Conduct the following home fire drill to practice the escape plan:

1. Everyone in bedrooms; doors closed
2. Someone sound the whistle or alarm
3. Each person tests his door for fire. If it's warm, you'll have to leave by your alternate escape route.
4. Pretend it's hot; use the alternate route.
5. Everyone meet outdoors for roll call. One person go to a prearranged phone to call the Fire Department.

Residential fires claim an estimated 6,500 lives annually, according to studies by the National Fire Protection Association. Three times as many people die from smoke inhalations die from burns. Smoke detectors give early warning of a fire, which may mean the difference between a safe escape and no escape at all. For about the cost of an electrical kitchen gadget — perhaps only seldom used — a smoke detector can protect a household 24 hours a day, every day. A smoke detector should bear the label of a safety testing organization, such as Underwriters' Laboratories. Smoke detectors should be installed outside all sleeping areas and on all levels in the home.

In addition: Put matches above the reach of children; Don't smoke in bed and check up on other smokers; Impress upon children the dangers of gasoline and other flammable liquids; Drop and roll if your clothes catch on fire; Wear tight fitting clothes

when cooking; Don't overload electrical outlets; Have your heating equipment checked each year; In multiple story buildings. Exit Using the Stairways, not the elevators; Make a mental note of several fire exits whenever you enter a restaurant, store, theater, or other public building; Conduct a fire inspection of your home.

Chief Huscher reminds everyone that additional information regarding smoke detector placement, exit drills, fire prevention, or assistance with a home fire inspection may be obtained by contacting the Fire Prevention Bureau, 965-5030, weekdays until 5 p.m.

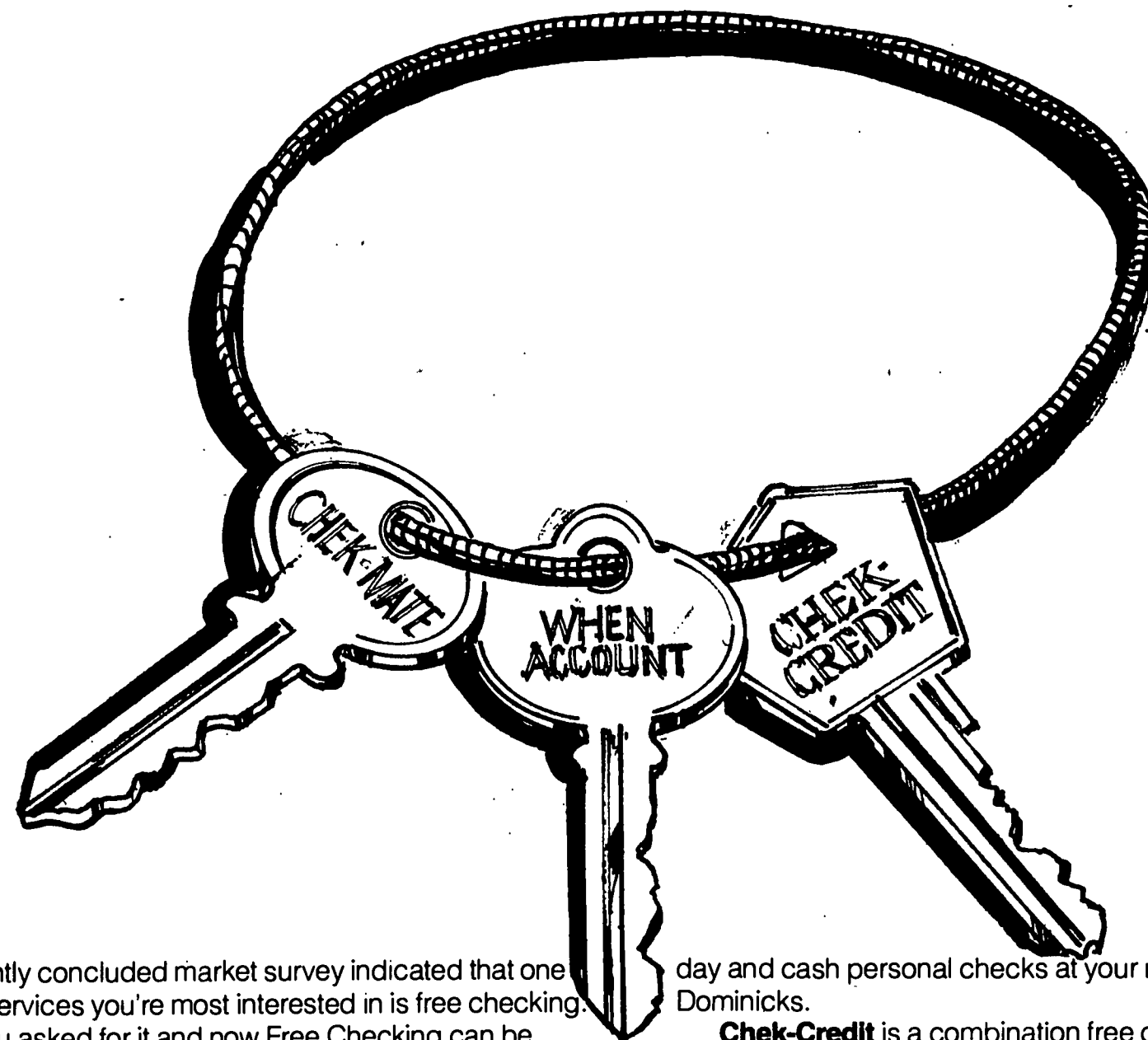

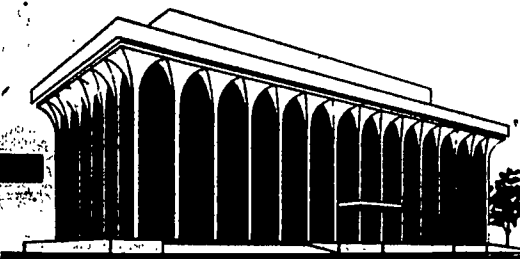
