# State police to concentrate efforts on high accident areas


The Illinois State Police will begin a Concentrated Traffic Enforcement Program starting this month. A six month special effort will be directed at reducing vehicular accidents, and their resultant injuries and deaths. through increased police patrol and enforcement of all traffic laws at 45 high accident locations throughout the state. As a result of a grant request,

federal highway safety funds have been authorized to assist the State Police in deploying the troopers to conduct patrols in higher than normal accident rates. Accoring to Superintendent Lynn E. Baird, the program will operate from September through December of 1977, and May and June of next year. The project will utilize 28 five-member teams committed to a total of just over 49,000 man hours. The teams will be made up of off-duty troopers re-hired at their regular rate of pay. The troopers will place emphasis upon enforcing moving hazardous violations occurring in the identified areas.

An Illinois Department of Transportation analysis of statewide accidents showed significant increases from 6 p.m. Friday to 6 a.m. Saturday and 6 p.m. Saturday to 6 a.m. on Sunday. The Illinois State Police recognized the problem but found they were understaffed to such a degree they could not adequately cope without help. "The demands for Illinois State Police services have increased to the point that our existing resources are not sufficient to handle calls for service and at the same time cover those locations considered to have high-accident location." # **Safety hints**

**United Ostomy** 

Since July 1 of this year, it is possible for every citizen in Illinois to receive a Photo Identification card.

This is of particular importance to people who do not hold a valid drivers license - such as older residents, the handicapped and others who do not drive. The official card will establish positive identification for cashing checks or evaluating credit requests.

It is easy to obtain an ID card. You go to any of the Secretary of State's full-time driver services facilities. You will fill out an application, have your picture taken and receive instant issuance if qualified. Fee for the

card is \$4 for five years with applicants 65 years old and over receiving the card free.

So that you don't make an extra trip, you must furnish at least two documents. One must prove date of birth and the other proving your identity. Possibilities are a birth certificate, a life insurance policy, a baptismal record, cards for Social Security, Voter's Registration, Selective Service or an established credit card.

Cont'd from Niles-E.Maine P.1 are rented thru Lawrencewood Management at 211 Lawrencewood, owned by millionairedeveloper Robert Krilich, a Barrington resident. Krushner Realty Management, 2900 Peterson, in Chicago, rents 67 and the remaining 39 are homeowned.

Krilich originally owned the apartment complex opened 18 years ago but allegedly lost control over the years. He served a 14 month Federal prison sentence following a May, 1971 conviction for income-tax evasion. He had reported a 1963 income of \$97,718 in contrast to the government's proven claim of \$246.943.

Commissioners said they had no formal request from the Fruit Market owners but "if the

police to lower street speed on Nordica; erect a stop sign at Jonquil and Nordica; a patrol for school children; and implored police patrol of the area for present and expected vandalism nearing Halloween, "skitching" winter and drag racing on Nordica.

Niles Police Sgt. James Gerhardt told Nordica tenants that "the majority of people that violate the law live in the area" ... anyone seeing wrongdoers should 'call the police department and give names (of offenders)."

Further action by Mankowsky includes "at least two more meetings" with Nordica residents after his deliberation with village officials over area complaints.

He noted another area, of 100 ownhouses and 167 apartments near Grand ave. and Prospect several years ago, had "worse problems of drugs, fights and dog and teen problems.'

Establishment of a homeowners organization, he said, resolved the situation. "People became interested in beautifying the entire area ... things have mproved greatly. We (village) don't have to run out every five minutes to police the fights, teens, and dope problems.

No other areas in Niles need 'cleaning up'' said Mankowsky. "This is the last one."
