## Sutker to run for State Demo Committeeman

Today Calvin R. Sutker, Committeeman of the Niles Township Regular Democratic Organization, announced that he will run for the Illinois State Central Democratic Committee from the Tenth Congressional District.

In a speech before party faithful at the North Shore Hilton, Sutker said he believes the Party "must work toward the day when women and the young are integral parts of the Party's decision-making process".

He noted that under his leadership Niles Township Democrats have an open door policy and that this policy largely accounts for the unprecedented success of the Party in recent local elections. Sutker was particularly pointed in endorsing Congressman Abner J. Mikva for re-election, pledging his "political resources to that end without reservation".

Mikva won a 13,000 vote plurality in Niles Township in his closely contested race in 1976, the highest vote for him in any of the five townships that comprise the Tenth Congressional District. He further contended that his brand of leadership can provide an effective suburban voice "in the Party's highest councils and in the decision-making process".

Sutker is widely recognized as the most effective suburban committeeman.

Sutker is in the private practice of law and is the Chief Hearing Office for the Illinois Secretary of State. He also has served in many civic capacities, such as the Presidency of the North Suburban Bar Association and the Chairmanship of the Skokie March of Dimes.

State Representatives Alan J. Greiman and Aaron Jaffee are the co-chairmen of Sutker's campaign. "I am proud to have men of their proven integrity and independence supporting me," Sutker said.

... There's something wrong with Halloween. No longer do the droves and droves of kids ring our doorbell. And the necessity of older brothers and sisters escorting the younger wonderkind is a sad commentary on our times. Oh, for those bygone days when little ones skipped down Merrill ave. and saw the white-sheeted ghost slide from the second floor of the Hartzell house. And reaching the front door the talking pumpkin would request the trick or treaters leave some of their goodies for him. Have those days gone forever? We hope not.

... There's an even sadder commentary on local vandalism we touched upon last week. A builder dropped into the office to tell us his sad experience. His one building, which he is trying to sell, was pockmarked with damage last week. Expensive thermopane windows were holed by throwing rocks. Circuit breakers were ripped out from the wall. And other damage must be replaced without the help of insurance, which cannot be gotten for these problems. He said he knows an adult witness to these crimes who does not want to report them. And he said the police refuse to interview the witness. Dejectedly, he said he scheduled an Open House for this past Sunday, which had to be cancelled because of the heavy damage.

... We're pleased the Niles Police Department has initiated action to have a management study of their department. While we were concerned a P.D. recommended firm would turn out to be a whitewash, we have found out one of the firms is most substantial. Hopefully, Niles won't hire a Police Chief organization to study the department of a fellow-police chief. And writing about police chiefs, has anyone been suspicious this study is a search for a new police chief? Emrikson has said many times he's retiring next year. It could be the beginning of a search for a new Niles police head.

... School District 63's inquiry about a proposed inter-district student transfer plan with Chicago schools was handled most gingerly last week. While board members were most emphatic, no District 63 children would be bussed outside the district, they left the door open for a possible bussing-in of inner-city children. # Nilesite inducted into Track Hall of Fame

Annette Rogers Kelly of Niles gained lasting fame following induction Oct. 14 into the United States Field and Track Hall of Fame, located in Angola, Indiana. Induction ceremonies were held in the Hilton Hotel, Washington, D.C., Friday evening.

The 23 year resident of Niles had been nominated for the honor in 1975 on her 1932 and 1936 Olympics record as winner of two gold medals in the 400 meter relay.

She is the third member of her team, the U.S. Field and Track Olympians, to receive formal recognition. Team member Helen Stevens, a gold medal winner for the 100 meter dash in the 1936 Olympics, also was inducted at the Friday ceremonies. Betty Robinson, long-time friend and

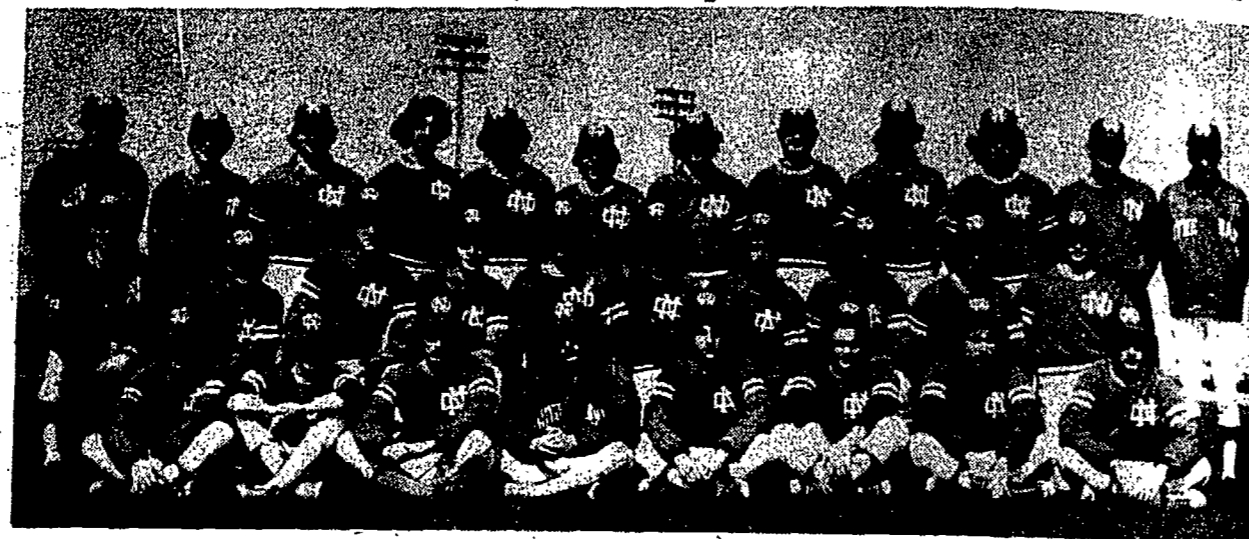

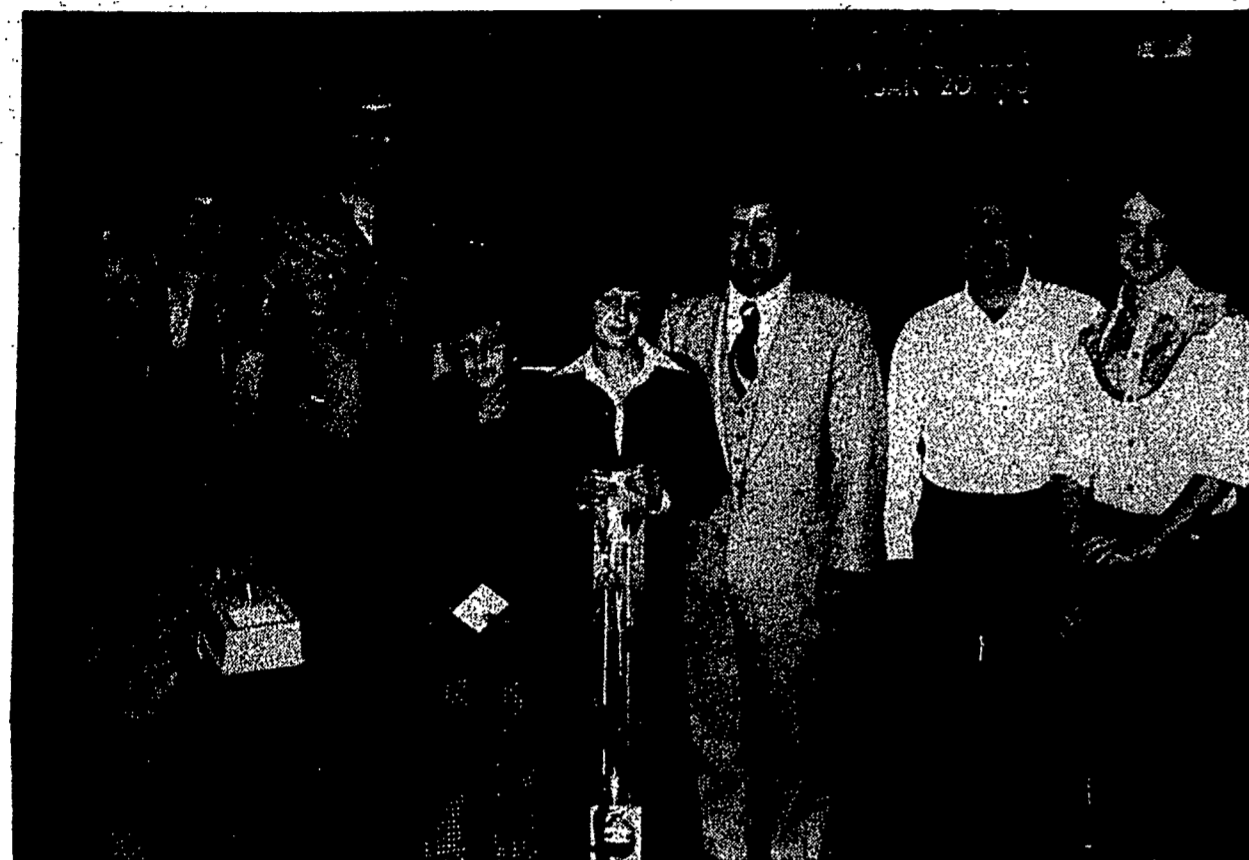

## 'Bonnie and Clyde' aid Centel system



As Vicky Sheppard and Dolores Feltmann, dial clerks at Central Telephone Company of Illinois in Des Plaines type into "Bonnie and Clyde," the two affectionately named Teletype machines -- part of a mechanized directory and equipment number system in the division -- the desired information appears before them on the TV-like screen.

"Bonnie and Clyde," a St. Louis telephone number and a device with a "Star-Wars" - sounding name, cathode ray tube, are helping Central Telephone Company keep track of more than 300,000 telephones and equipment numbers.

Those are just some of the components of a new computerized system being tested by Centel at the company's Prairie Street building in Des Plaines.

"Bonnie and Clyde" are nicknames assigned by Centellers to a pair of teletype machines used to call computers in St. Louis. The computers' memories are filled with Centel's phone number records which the Des Plaines office scans long-distance and updates using a TV-like screen called a cathode ray tube.

The complex system fills a seemingly simple need - providing phone numbers. But phone companies don't keep these numbers in a giant fishbowl, to be pulled out at random when needed. And since phone numbers are recycled -- residence numbers are reassigned 90 days

after disconnect; business numbers after one year -- the records must be accurate and up to date.

"Prior to 'Bonnie and Clyde' and the St. Louis computers, records of working and non-working numbers were kept in books -- page after endless page," said Don Adkisson, Division Traffic Manager. "When a number was disconnected, it had to be noted in the books. When reassigned, it had to be in the books," he added.

The new system, DENS (for Directory and Equipment Number System), ends all that manual searching and the need for Centel to manually update its inventory of phone numbers. Some 200 to 300 service orders are now processed daily.

"The accuracy and integrity of the records has greatly improved," said Adkisson, "and the likelihood of mistakes is greatly reduced."

Centel is the first of the nation's 1,600 independent (non-Bell) phone companies to use DENS.

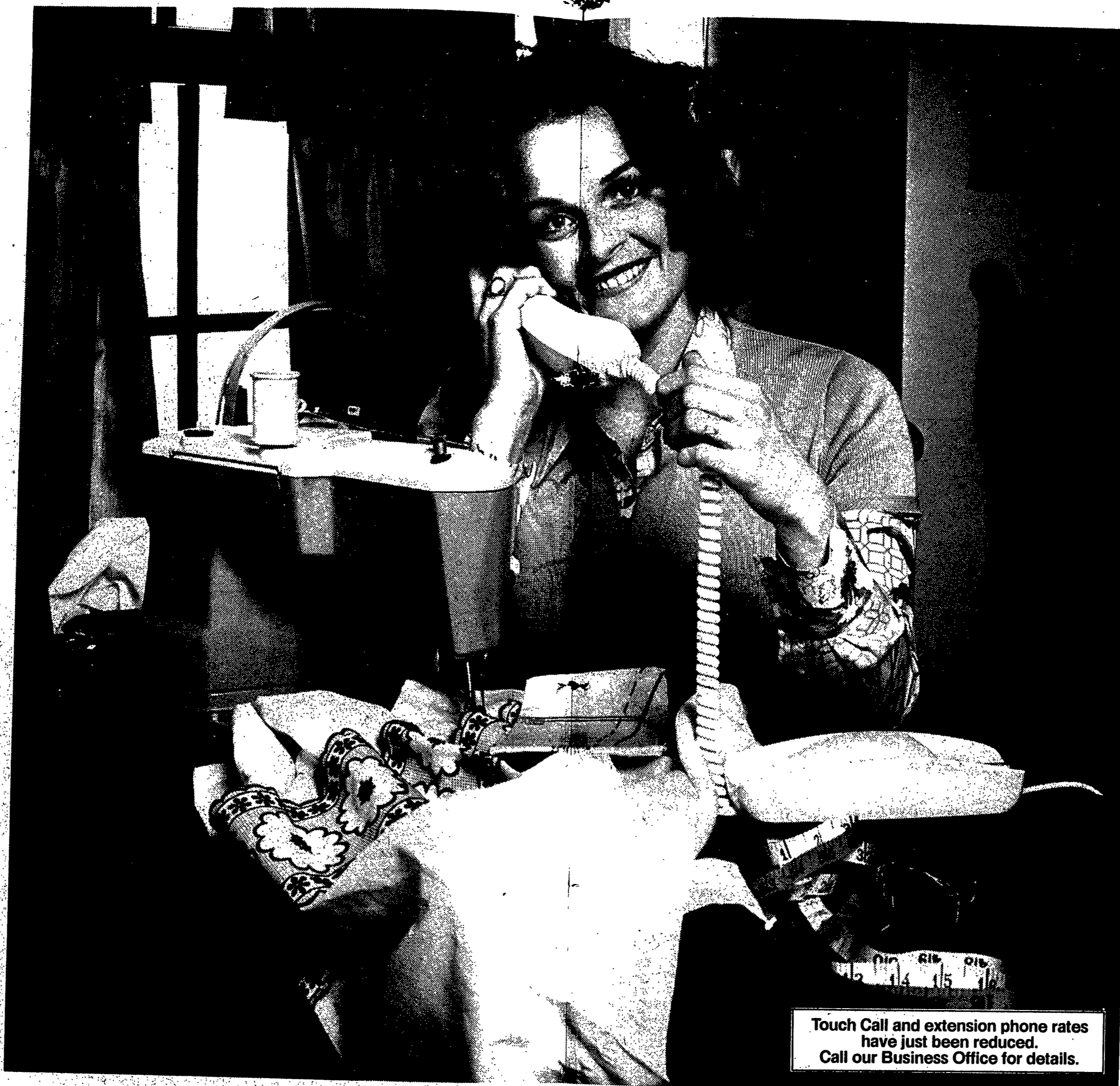
## FNBS announces promotions

## Centel reports higher third quarter

Central Telephone & Utilities Corp. reported higher third quarter earnings and said it is confident of a 10th straight year of record profits.

Primary earnings for the three months ended Sept. 30 rose 16.4% to 71 cents per average common share from a restated 61 cents a share in the year-ago quarter. Net income increased 22.3% to \$15.8 million from \$12.9 million a year earlier, while revenues increased 16% to \$123.5 million from \$106.4 million.

For the 12-month period through September, Chicago-based CTU had primary earnings of \$2.77 per average common share, up 15.4% from a restated \$2.40 a share in the corresponding period ended last year. Earnings per share from continuing operations increased 14.9%.

Income from continuing operations for the 12 months was \$61.1 million, up 18.6% from \$51.6 million in the comparable year-ago period. Revenues increased 14.3% to \$464.7 million from \$406.7 million.

"The continuation of improved earnings into this second half of this year virtually assures a 10th consecutive year of records profits," said Robert P. Reuss, chairman and chief executive officer. He also reported his prediction to New York analysts last month that CTU's earnings for 1977 would likely be on the upper end of analyst estimates of \$2.75 to \$2.80 a share.

Demand for the company's telecommunications services remains strong, Reuss said.

Net income from telephone operations in the September quarter increased 15.3% to \$12.5 million from \$10.8 million in the like 1976 quarter. Revenues advanced 15.9% to \$98.5 million from \$85 million.

Centel companies served 1,594,605 telephones at the end of the September quarter, a 7.5% gain over the last 12 months. Growth in long distance calling continued strong.

Earnings from electric operations were substantially improved, Reuss said, benefiting from a rate increase and higher peak generating loads during the late summer.

Net income for the September quarter increased 62.4% to \$3.4 million from \$2.1 million a year ago. Electric revenues increased 16.7% to nearly \$25 million from \$21.4 million last year, kilowatt-hour sales rose 6.1%.

Reuss said CTU expects to complete by Dec. 1 its purchase of an 80.4% interest in Telephone Utilities, Inc. for about \$55 million. The company is also working on a definitive agreement to acquire Lorain (Ohio) Telephone Co.

The acquisitions will not necessitate a public offering of new CTU common stock, Reuss said.

## Evanston Federal Savings marks record gains

Evanston Federal Savings and Loan Association achieved record gains in savings deposits and mortgage loans during its fiscal year ended September 30, 1977, according to association President Donald G. Martens.

Evanston Federal's year-end savings totaled \$110,659,307, increasing \$16,576,530 from the previous year end, a gain of 17.6%. This increase was the largest yearly increase in the association's history. Savers were paid a total of \$6,515,832 in interest on their savings accounts, which is also a record amount for one year.

The association acquired new mortgage loans of \$36,894,478 during the year, increasing its loan portfolio by 22.8% or \$21,307,644 to \$114,877,713 at year end. This large volume of loan originations allowed 723 families to purchase new homes in Evanston, Niles and adjacent communities served by Evanston Federal Savings and Loan.

Contributing to the association's growth during its fiscal year was its new office at the northeast corner of Golf Road and Milwaukee Avenue, Niles. Since opening last November, the office's savings deposits have doubled, Martens said.

Easily accessible from main traffic arteries in the area, the new office offers plenty of free parking space for customers who wish to conduct lobby transactions.

For additional customer convenience, the office features an advanced two-lane, drive-up teller system. Without leaving their cars, savers can quickly and easily handle most transactions by using the drive-up, which is open Monday through Saturday for a total of 61 hours each week.

All Evanston Federal Savings' services are available at its Niles office, including the recently-introduced application-through-closing home mortgage loan service. Mortgage loan closings were held previously only in the association's home office in Evanston. Now, the Niles office handles mortgage applications, processes them and conducts closings as well.

Other highlights during Evanston Federal Savings' fiscal year included reaching the \$100,000,000 mark in total savings deposits last February, and the naming of Evanston attorney Harry C. Benford III. to the association's Board of Directors.

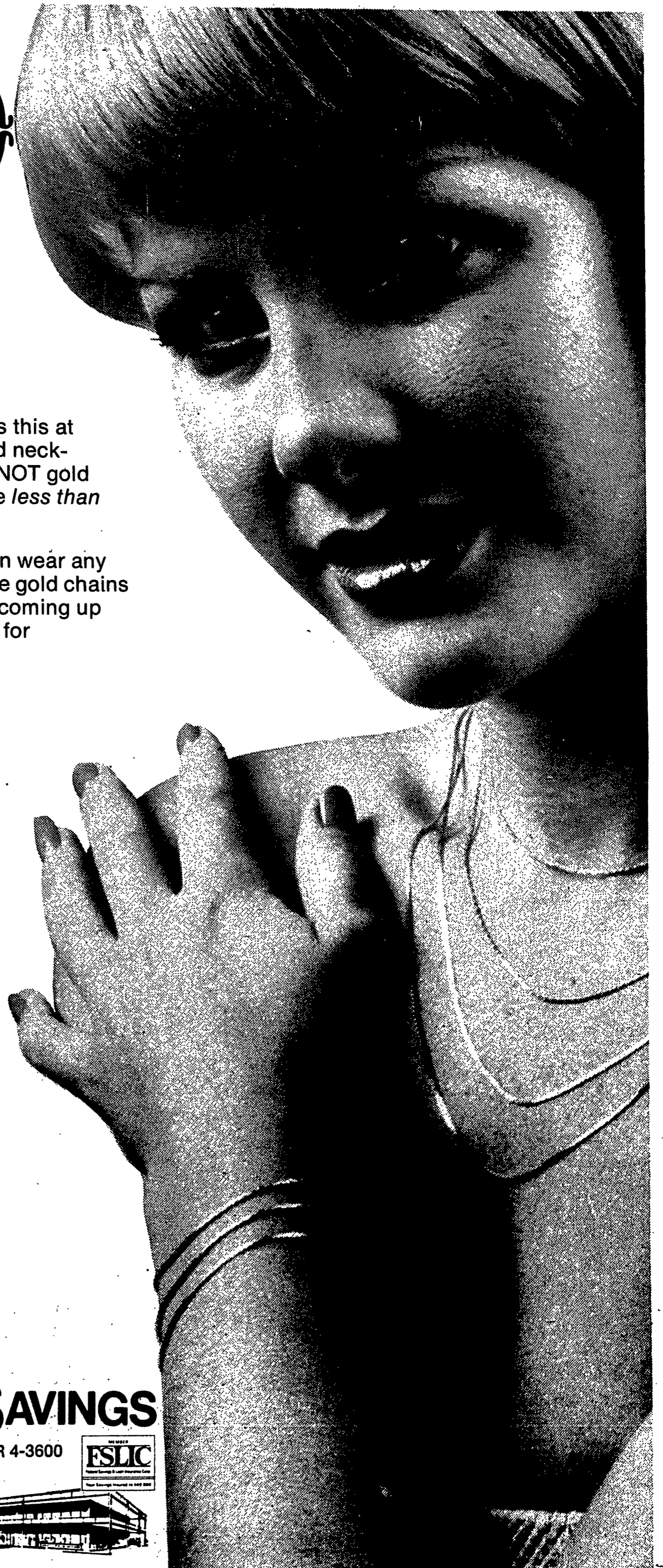

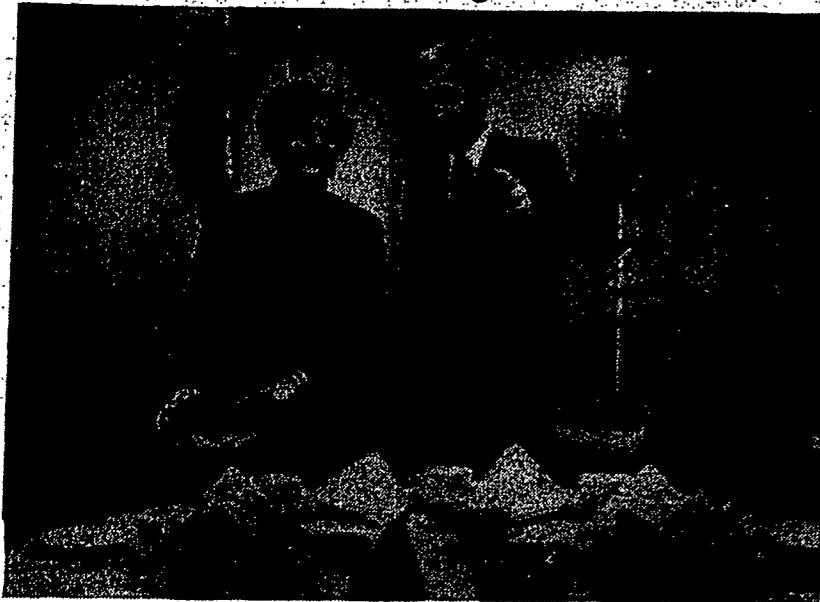

### Jaffe divorce reform legislation

A totally new divorce reform bill sponsored by State Rep. Aaron Jaffe which calls for basic changes in the legal procedure to dissolve a marriage, has been signed into law in Illinois. This legislation creates the legal terminology of "dissolution of marriage" to replace the term "divorce," and it provides for such dissolution of the marriage partnership in a manner which will avoid much of the acrimony that has generally characterized this legal action.

The law does in no way deal with the issue of "no-fault" proceedings.

The Jaffe reform bill, in effect now, will make pleadings much more simple and less inflammatory by requiring that the parties need only state in their pleadings the general grounds for dissolution, without detailing the supportive facts. All alleged facts in support of the grounds would have to be proven up in the

professional and controlled atmosphere of the courtroom.

A further change more specifically defines the marital property and provides for ten specific criteria which will now be used to determine the just division of such property. Among the criteria are: Duration of the marriage; relative economic circumstances of the spouses; consideration of the contributions to the marriage of the homemaker spouse; and protection of the interests of the children of the marriage.

The law also permits the court to appoint an attorney to represent the interests of a minor or independent child, with the confidence of the attorney-child relationship assured.

The 46-page bill, known as the "Illinois Marriage and Dissolution of Marriage Act," further provides for required procedures for the marriage ceremony and registration thereof. Other changes incorporated into the law

are designed to strengthen and preserve the integrity of marriage and safeguard family relationships, and also to promote the amicable settlement of disputes that may arise between parties to a marriage. The act mitigates the potential harm to the spouses and their children caused by the process of legal dissolution of marriage, and it makes reasonable provision for spouses and minor children during and after such litigation.

Jaffe commented, "I believe that we have made a significant step with this new legislation toward eliminating the uncivilized and outrageously harmful procedures that have routinely been used in the divorce courts. The new law will offer the parties to a dissolving marriage the opportunity to solve their legal problem in a just and dignified manner, while greatly reducing the long-lasting emotional upheaval and hurt commonly experienced by the spouses and their children."

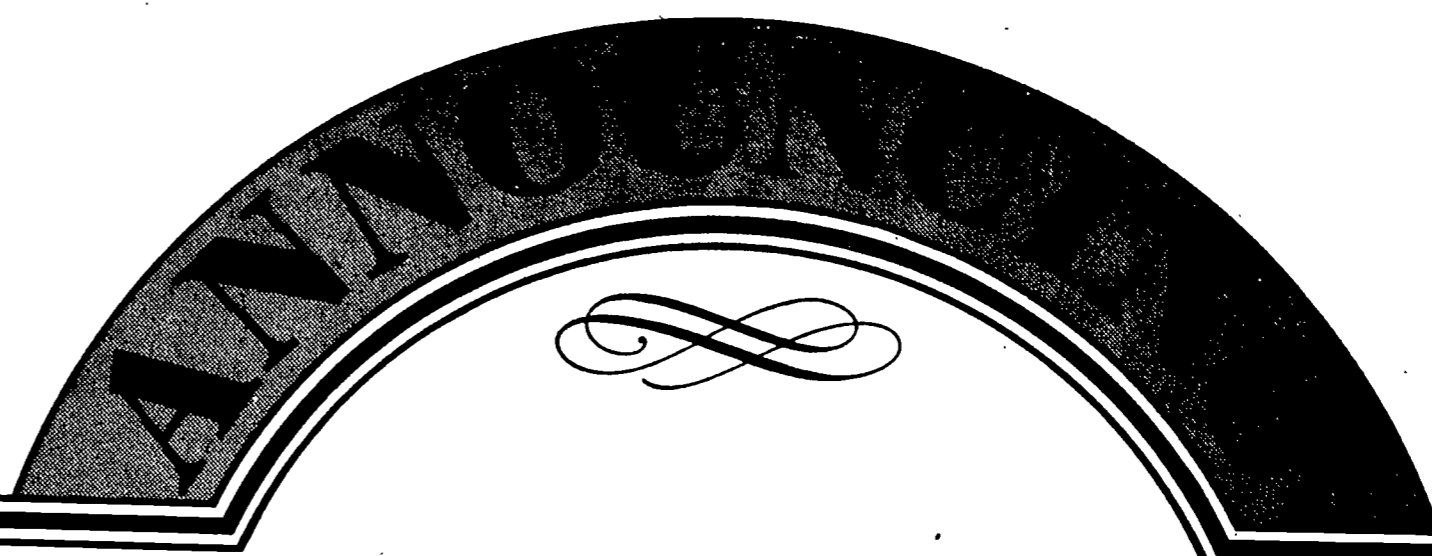

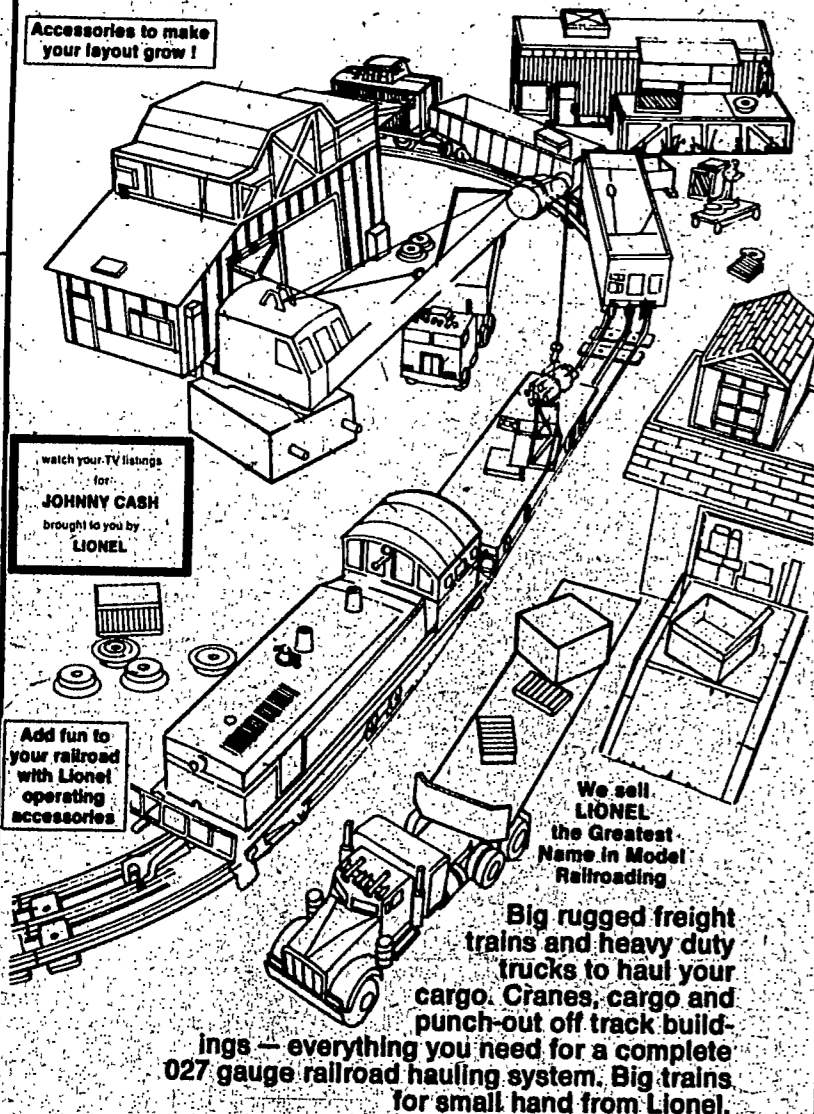

## Porter bill requires 3 year contracts for teachers

Public school teachers in Illinois would be required to sign three-year contracts under legislation introduced this week in Springfield by State Rep. John Edward Porter (R-1st).

"A disproportionate amount of time is spent by administrators and teacher representatives in negotiating contracts each year," Porter said. "They all have a more important job, that of providing the best possible education for our children."

Another problem which could be avoided by multi-year contracts is the threat of strikes that plagues more and more school districts each year, according to Porter.

"Each September, we hear of thousands of children who sit at home wondering when school will begin for them," the three-term lawmaker said. "This indecision

creates an unhealthy atmosphere throughout the year for parents, teachers, and administrators. This ill will that develops often carries over to the children in the classroom and in their homes."

Porter acknowledged that negotiating sessions will be even tougher in trying to write a three-year contract and will require foresight and good judgment on both sides.

"However, an individual school district would still have the option of leaving certain issues open for re-negotiation in the second and third year if it became necessary. The important point is that they would still have a contract, a plan to go by. If they chose to re-open discussion on two or three points, the long list of remaining points could be left unchanged. And most importantly, the children would know when school starts."

## Mikva invites comment on Concorde

Congressman Abner J. Mikva is asking Tenth District residents who are concerned about the possibility of the Concorde supersonic aircraft landing at O'Hare Airport to send their comments to the Federal Aviation Administration.

December 31 is the deadline that the FAA has set for public comment on the Carter Administration's tentative decision to expand landing rights for the Concorde to several U.S. airports, including O'Hare.

Mikva also reported that public hearings are to be held on the proposal before the end of the year, but no schedule has been announced. The period for public comment began Oct. 13, but has not been widely publicized.

Comments should be sent in duplicate to: Federal Aviation Administration, Office of the Chief Counsel, Attention: Rules Docket (AGC-24); Docket No. 15376, 800 Independence Avenue S.W., Washington, D.C. 20591. Mikva also asked that Tenth District residents send a copy to him at his office in the Des Plaines Civic Center, 1420 Miner st., Des Plaines, Ill. 60016.

"The possibility of Concorde landings at O'Hare may seem remote because the Concorde's fuel capacity is insufficient to permit nonstop flights from Europe to O'Hare and because the Concorde is not permitted to fly at supersonic speeds within the United States," Congressman Mikva said. "However, there is a real economic interest on the part of the French and English to land in Chicago and the pressure for additional landing rights is continuing. I continue to oppose any proposal that it land at O'Hare and I will continue to work with

Des Plaines, Glenview, Niles and Park Ridge residents to have O'Hare struck from the list of possible landing sites for this supersonic machine."

Mikva has emphasized the burden of noise already experienced by his constituents living in the vicinity of O'Hare and stressed the health hazards involved in increasing that burden with the additional noise of the Concorde.

The Washington experience began with "a lot of newspaper interviews followed by meetings with Herman Phillips, president and founder of the Hall of Fame and with Dave Woods."

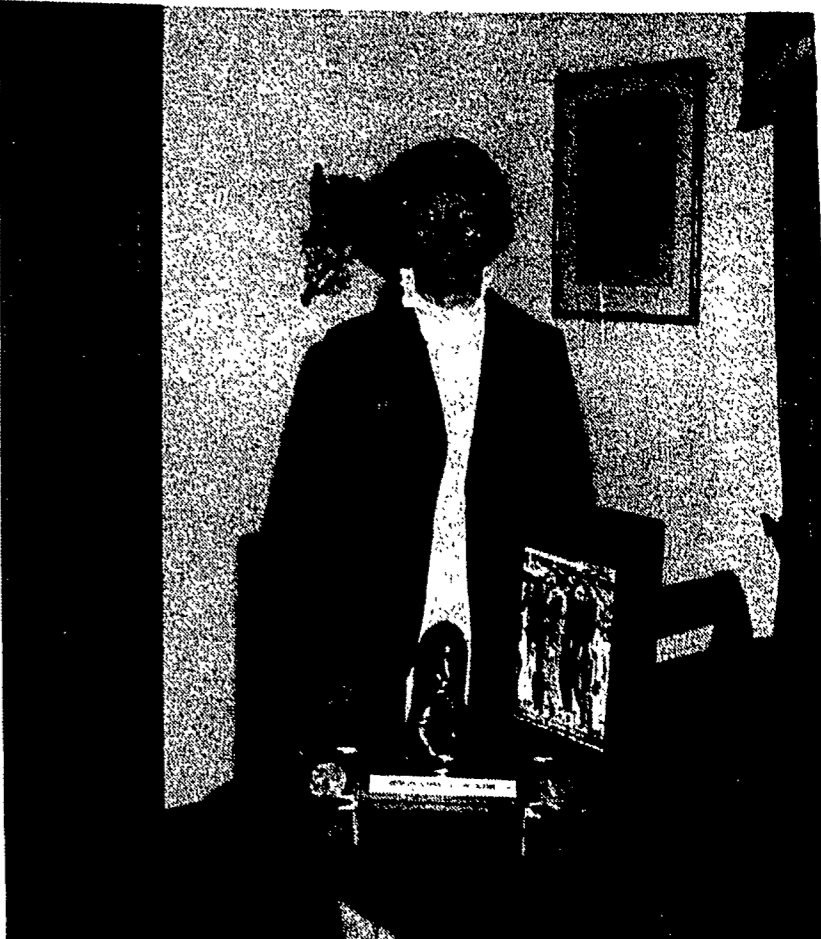
