'Bonnie and Clyde' aid Centel system



As Vicky Sheppard and Dolores Feltmann, dial clerks at Central Telephone Company of Illinois in Des Plaines type into "Bonnie and Clyde," the two affectionately named Teletype machines -part of a mechanized directory and equipment number system in the division -- the desired information appears before them on the

"Bonnie and Clyde," a St. Louis telephone number and a device with a "Star-Wars" sounding name, cathode ray tube, are helping Central Telephone Company keep track of more than 300,000 telephones and equip-

Those are just some of the components of a new computerized system being tested by Centel at the company's Prairie Street building in Des Plaines.

"Bonnie and Clyde" are nicknames assigned by Centellers to a pair of teletype machines used to call computers in St. Louis. The computers' memories are filled with Centel's phone number records which the Des Plaines office scans long-distance and updates using a TV-like screen

called a cathode ray tube. The complex system fills a seemingly simple need - providing phone numbers. But phone companies don't keep these numbers in a giant fishbowl, to be reduced." pulled out at random when needed. And since phone numnumbers are reassigned 90 days DENS.

after disconnect; business numbers after one year -- the records must be accurate and up to date,

"Prior to 'Bonnie and Clyde' and the St. Louis computers, records of working and non-working numbers were kept in books -page after endless page," said Don Adkisson, Division Traffic Manager. "When a number was disconnected, it had to be noted. in the books. When reassigned, it had to be in the books," he

The new system, DENS (for Directory and Equipment Number System), ends all that manual searching and the need for Centel to manually update its inventory of phone numbers. Some 200 to 300 service orders are now processed daily.

"The accuracy and integrity of the records has greatly improved," said Adkisson, "and the likelihood of mistakes is greatly

Central Telephone & Utilities Corp. reported higher third quarter earnings and said it is confident of a 10th straight year

Primary earnings for the three months ended Sept. 30 rose 16.4% to 71 cents per average cents a share in the year-ago quarter. Net income increased 22.3% to \$15.8 million from \$12.9 million a year earlier, while revenues increased 16% to \$123.5 million from \$106.4 million.

For the 12-month period through September, Chicagobased CTU had primary earnings of \$2.77 per average common share, up 15.4% from a restated \$2.40 a share in the corresponding period ended last year. Earnings per share from continuing operations increased 14.9%.

Income from continuing operations for the 12 months was \$61.1 million, up 18.6% from \$51.6 million in the comparable yearago period. Revenues increased 14.3% to \$464.7 million from \$406.7 million.

"The continuation of improved earnings into this second half of this year virtually assures a 10th consecutive year of records profits," said Robert P. Reuss, chairman and chief executive officer. He also reported his prediction to New York analysts last month that CTU's earnings for 1977 would likely be on the CTU common stock, Reuss said.



MONACEP, the acronym for the Maine-Oakton-Niles Adult and Continuing Education Program, is the continuing education arm of Oakton Community College. Since its inception in 1972 as a cooperative venture between Oakton and the Niles and Maine Township high school districts, MONACEP has become not only one of the largest continuing education programs in Illinois, but also one of the most outstanding, according to Alexander Kruzel. MONACEP director.

This fall, 14,700 course enrollments in about 1,100 class sections of over 700 individual courses, Kruzel said. This figure contrasts with the Fall, 1976 enrollment of around 13,000.

At the same time, Oakton experienced an 8 percent increase in college credit students this fall, enrolling 6,740 full and part-time students. Fall 1976 enrollment

Mrs. Kelly's reactions to the ceremonies were "really difficult to put into words," she said last week upon her return from Washington. She described it as one of the biggest events in her life but "nothing will ever top winning the Olympics medal ... this (Friday ceremonies) was an anti-climax," she said, but "I was so very honored at the selection.

An unexpected phone call received last July from Dave Woods, Executive Director of the Indiana Hall of Fame, told her she had been singled out for fame, asking that she be in Washington Oct. 14 for the installation

According to the Director, only 100 athletes have been inducted into the Hall of Fame, initiated approximately 5 years ago.

Initially, said the Nilesite, only she and husband Peter were to attend the Washington function. "But as the time grew near, I became more excited and it wasn't until just before the ceremonies were to be held that we made the decision to have our family go to Washington. "We called Kevin, 27, from his

Los Angeles job as a photographer, and Terry, 24, from Des Plaines, to accompany us." Daughter Kathleen, a junior at Southern Illinois University, flew to Washington and "with attendance by my only sister who was visiting me," her cup of happiness was overflowing at the family gathering said the Nilesite.

The Washington experience began with "a lot of newspaper interviews followed by meetings with Herman Phillips, president and founder of the Hall of Fame and with Dave Woods."

A reception and dinner held the main ballroom Friday evening were "magnificent", she recall ed, noting attendance by 500 guests. Ceremonies began with the presentation of colors by a formal Color Guard ("who thrilled us with their measured cadence"), after which a young girl ran into the banquet room with the traditional Olympic torch which was taken by the guest speaker to light two candles on the dais table.

Following the dinner and usual formalities, the 8 inductees for 1977 (of which Mrs. Kelly and Helen Stevens were the only women) were noted for their

"I was so nervous I thought would knock the podium over, said the athlete. According to her husband, the Niles woman was given the most applause for the 'shortest acceptance speech.''

A unique trophy was awarded to each of the eight honored guests. The one she received was engraved with the words, "U.S. Hall of Fame, 1977" and held on the left a plaque with her '32 and '36 Olympics records; a bronzed track shoe in the center and a photo at the right.

She noted the coach of the 1936 Olympics team, Dee Beckman, was present at the receptiondinner as well as Betty Robinson (Schwartz) who had driven up from Florida with her husband, thus bringing coach and 3 of the relay team members together again. The three women hope for selection of the fourth relay team member, Helen Bland of St. Louis, into the Hall of Fame.
