Editor & PublisherA funny thing happened on the way home from
the Caribbean.Friday we were snorkeling in Nassau. Saturday
night 3 fire department snorkels were fighting
a biting wind which fanned the fire which burned
down The Bugle offices.We arrived home at O'Hare Saturday afternoon.
By 7 o'clock we fell asleep, only to be awoken
at 9:30 by a Niles policeman who told us there
was a fire in the building The Bugle occupied.
Since there was only smoke under the second floor
roof we were able to take out our business
records downstairs. By 11 p.m. flames were en-
veloping the north end of the building but our
upstairs offices at the south end seemed safe.
We ran upstairs and grabbed our checkbook before
a fireman told us to get out. By 12:30 the wind
blew the flames the length of the building and
our upstairs offices became barbecued.Down on the ground Chuck Bobula led a very
brave bunch of guys thru a tremendous ordeal.
The bitter cold formed icicles on their clothing.
One fireman sustained a scratched cornea. Another
was reported to have been frostbitten. And the
smoke caused many firemen to seek oxygen during
the long night and morning. Firemen, as well as
policemen, who did yeomen's work, are very
courageous people. We indeed felt grateful.Sunday morning part of The Bugle family were
already in the downstairs offices salvaging what
they could save. They brought to our basement
layouts, cuts and all the tools of the trade,
laying out on towels what could be saved. It was
a laborious but incredible effort.Momentarily down, I remarked to Diane Miller
I didn't expect to hear from one newspaper repre-
sentative. We're in a viciously competitive
business and I expected little compassion from
the hard-noses who run these newspapers. Yet,
within 12 hours after the fire, The Journal's
Dick Wessel offered to help us get out the paper.
Lerner's Joe Ferstl called Monday morning offer-
ing help. Pickwick's Ward Rapp volunteered
The Spectator-Champion's services. The Des
Plaines Times said we could use their facilities.

Blaze finally gets the Bugle

BUGLE DOWN
BUT NOT
OUT

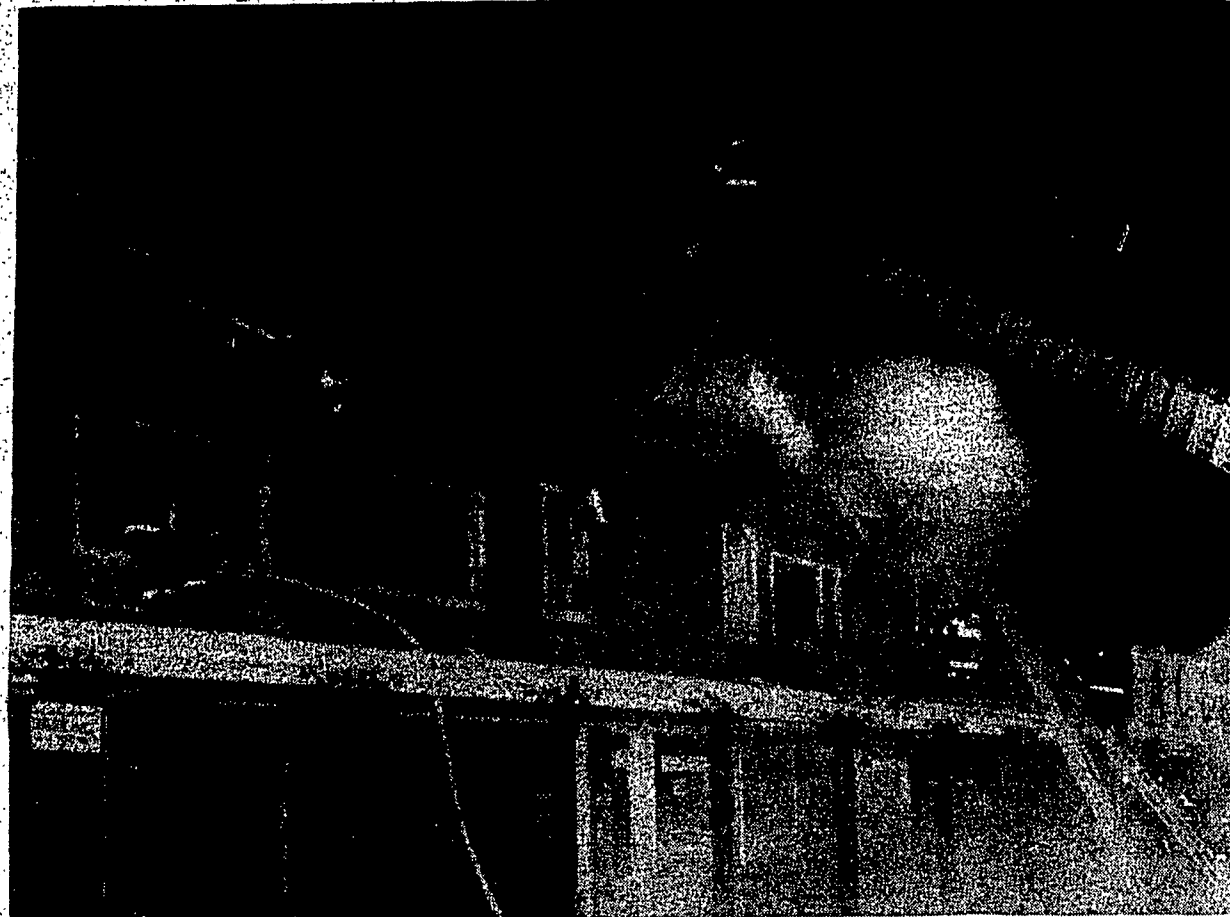

In brutal subzero temperatures firemen spent
Saturday night and early Sunday morning battl-
ing a major fire at 9000 Courtland ave. in Niles
which destroyed The Bugle newspaper office as
well as adjoining apartments and stores and re-
sulted in thousands of dollars in damages and
emergency treatment of two members of the fire
crew.Firefighters Norbert Ludkowski and Richard Val-
kanet sustained eye injuries from flying debris.
They were treated at Lutheran General Hospital
and later released. No other injuries were re-
ported.The Saturday fire gutted the second story of
the building on the 9000 block of north Court-
land ave. which also housed The Bugle Publica-
tions, East Maine Hardware and Niles Auto Parts.The entire second story of 12 apartments
and an additional office of The Bugle were total-
ly destroyed said firemen, with water damage to
the first floor stores except in the southeast
rear corner of the hardware store where the floor
collapsed from the fire. The entire roof burned
thru and was fallen in.

Cook County traffic fatalities on increase

Captain William P. Burt, State Police Commander for the Northern Cook County area, announced today provisional figures which indicate that during the month of November, 36 persons were killed in traffic accidents in Cook County.

District 3 Troopers investigated a total of 483 accidents in November.

The Superintendent of the Illinois State Police, Lynn E. Baird, announced today initial reports indicating that during the month of November, 148 persons died from injuries sustained from traffic accidents on Illinois highways. Provisional figures indicate that 1956 people were killed from Jan. 1 through Nov. 30 of this year. This total reflects an increase of 60 from the number of fatalities reported in the same period in 1976.

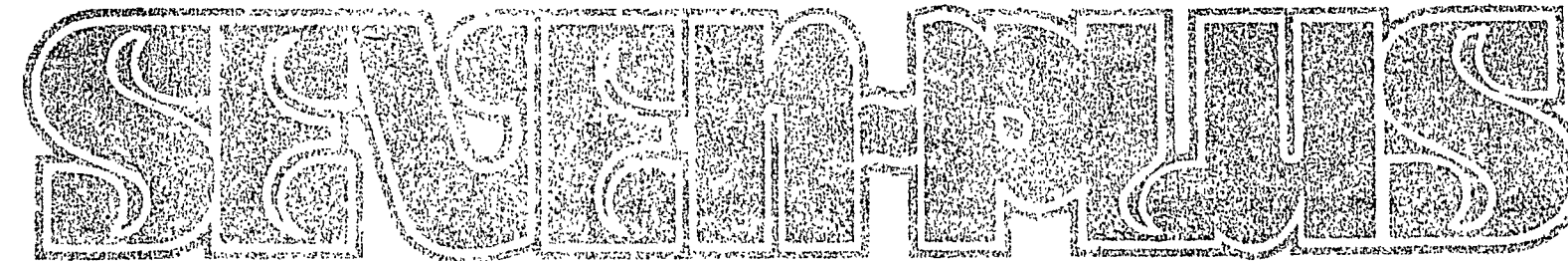

Hales calls for "new generation of GOP leadership" Pierce proposes

Calling for a "New generation of Republican leadership in the U.S. Congress", Winnetka resident Dan Hales officially announced his candidacy for the 10th District Congressional seat. Speaking Monday before groups of supporters and members of the press, Hales said he was announcing in all five townships of the district because he is "taking his campaign to the people."

Hales made a five village campaign swing thru the 10th District with stops in Winnetka, Evanston, Park Ridge, Morton Grove and Northbrook. A caravan of Hales supporters with car tops and bumper stickers led the way on the tour. An afternoon press conference was then held in downtown Chicago at the Sheraton-Chicago Hotel.

In his announcement talks, Hales referred to incumbent Congressman Abner Mikva as "a Congressman who continually tells the people one thing and votes the other way." Hales said, "For example, Mr. Mikva says he is concerned about inflation, but he has voted for large federal deficits, common situs picketing, food stamps for strikers, more federal agencies and energy taxes -- all of which have added to inflationary pressures."

Hales went on to say, "The Democrats control

both houses of our Congress, our entire executive branch of government, and most of our state and municipal governments. The Democrat establishment is everywhere -- they have brought the average family nothing but higher taxes, higher prices, a declining quality of life, and empty promises."

Hales believes the Republican party has the "sensitivity and energy to change this direction. We represent a new generation of Republican leadership, and we have the programs that will help the most people over the long term and strengthen our great country."

Hales, 36, opposed former U.S. Congressman Sam Young in the 1976 GOP congressional primary. A partner in the Loop law firm of Peterson, Ross, Schloerb and Seidel, he is also vice president and director of Americans for Effective Law Enforcement, a director of the Duncan YMCA on Chicago's west side, and a member of the Board of Governors of the United Republican Fund. He served as legal counsel for the Crane for Congress Committee in the 1969 special election, finance chairman for GOP county clerk candidate Lola Flamm, and an anti-vote fraud attorney for Operation LEAP. Hales and his wife, Debbie, have three children, ages 7, 5 and 2.

social security reform

Congressional candidate Peter Pierce today proposed changes in the federal Social Security benefit system. In announcing his reform package, Pierce criticized the recent Carter amendments: "The current system is in real danger of going broke. But it is no answer to increase payroll and employer withholdings as much as the Carter plan requires."

Pierce proposes to restore the traditional employer-employee withholding equity (Carter has placed a greater burden on employers). Although proposing reductions (compared to the Carter plan) in withholding amounts, Pierce's plan would restore the system to fiscal health by 1982. "Why should the federal government take more than it needs?", Pierce asks.

"Part of the answer," Pierce explains, "lies in the elimination of the current 'double-indexing' system which has a severe inflationary effect."

Pierce also proposes the removal of the \$3000 earned income ceiling for pensioners. "Most retired persons want to work part-time, and many have to work to supplement their monthly Social Security checks. It's simply not productive to discourage these people from working: the more they earn, the more they will be paying into the Social Security system!"

Pierce would also end the current policy of terminating the benefits of widows and widowers who remarry.

Under the Pierce proposal, future employees of the federal government would be integrated into the Social Security pension system. They now have a separate pension plan.

Benefits for alien residents of the U.S. would be reevaluated under the Pierce plan. "We have to take a good look at how our current system creates incentives for abuses by citizens of other countries," Pierce explains.

"There is very little 'security' in our present Social Security system. I believe my reform proposals will bring about what our working and retired citizens want and need," Pierce concludes.

Loss damage was estimated in excess of \$100,000 to the building with an undetermined content loss. Fire salvage crews earlier covered machinery in The Bugle newspaper offices with tarpaulins for protection from water damage.

Cause of the fire has not been determined but reportedly originated somewhere in the north-east corner of the building traveling upward to the roof.

Firemen were alerted to the scene by a 9:30 p.m. phone call from an unidentified woman tenant on the second floor simultaneously with a box alarm reportedly pulled by another male tenant.

Heavy dense smoke charged the entire area on arrival by firemen and flames had already begun to shoot up from the roof.

The code 3 blaze rapidly turned into a box alarm, then a second box alarm which brought firemen and firefighting equipment from surrounding towns of Glenbrook, Glenview, Morton Grove, Skokie, Park Ridge, Des Plaines, North-

brook and the North Maine Fire Protection District. Approximately 50 firemen and 10 pieces of equipment including snorkels from Northbrook and Skokie and the Niles serial ladder fought the stubborn fire.

A fire department spokesman said the fire must have obtained a good start before the alarm came in. Forcible entry into the first floor stores indicated the fire crept up the inside walls on the east side and spread thru the roof, burning away the loft area and eventually involving the west side apartments.

"By this time the roof began to collapse because it was all open area . . . it was difficult to chase the fire down because it was going in too many places at once . . . most of the fire was hidden from view until it poked thru the roof, involving both the north and south ends of the building."

The fire was struck at 5:30 a.m. Sunday altho firemen remained on the scene until 10 a.m. for overhaul (to check smoldering debris for lingering sparks).

Niles Fire Chief Albert Hoelbl noted the building, owned by M. Brillakis of Chicago, was built under Cook County fire code prior to annexation to Niles in the late fifties. Construction under Niles code, he said, is more stringent.

Biting winds and below zero weather froze the clamps shut on firefighters' coats, necessitating them to be hammered open. Firemen were hobbling after freeing themselves from heavy boots following the 8 hour fight with fire.

The Salvation Army mobile unit dispensed hot coffee, donuts and dry gloves on the scene. Red Cross units were on the scene to aid the displaced tenants of the building.

Niles Deputy Fire Chief Charles Bobula credited Niles police with an extremely efficient block-off of the area. Traffic was stopped on Milwaukee ave. from Ballard rd. north to Maryland st. Courtland and Davis st. were cordoned off for the firefighters.

Chief Hoelbl also credited the mutual aid fire companies from other towns for their admirable assistance.

dance at the Hearing that it "would now be safe to purchase your apartments" apparently basing the opinion on creditability of the "sound financial institution" as buyer for the property.

In other action the Plan Commission recommended denial, pursuant to final decision by the Village Board, of expansion of a Special Use permit to Stephen Bellen, 7161 Milwaukee ave., for construction of an outside addition to store solvents for the Bellen Company printing plant.

Despite testimony by Bernard Collieran attesting to the advantages and safety of an outside addition, zoners labelled the storage liquid as "highly dangerous." In fact, said Zoning Comr. Kenneth Cohen, "it would be better to have the firm move out of the village" rather than risk fire and explosion.

According to Comr. O'Grady the previously granted Special Use provided 7,000 feet to Bellen for an addition to include a solvent room which was never built. Further he said "had we known the danger at the time of the previous zoning we would never have granted permission to build that addition."

Previous meetings with Building and Zoning Director Joseph Salerno initiated his suggestion, detailed to the zoning Board and to the petitioner Monday night, to put the proposed storage room inside the existing plant building with a safety wall, reinforcing rods and a vented roof. Dangers then said Salerno would be propelled upward thru the roof.

Petitioning attorney Henry Novoselsky replied the firm's insurance company "raised heck over an inside storage room".

In final action the Plan Commission accepted withdrawal of a Special Use petition by Nick Magas of Chicago for a full service restaurant with a building addition at 8900 Milwaukee ave.

Safety hints

With the steady increase in motorcycle sales, it is significant to know that regardless of size they are considered motor vehicles and their drivers have the same rights and privileges as those of cars, trucks and buses.

A motorcycle classification on your drivers license requires a separate motorcycle examination. You will be tested on knowledge and operation of controls and must demonstrate that you can safely handle your machine when the engine is not operating, as well as a driving test in traffic.

Motorcycle drivers must obey traffic laws, signs and signals in the same way as automobile drivers. They are prohibited from passing between two other vehicles going in the same direction unless there is an unobstructed traffic lane available to permit such passing safely.

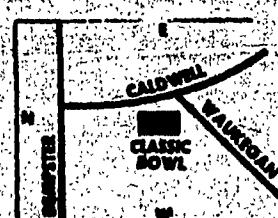

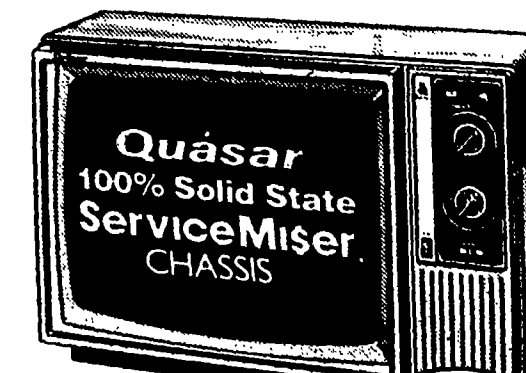

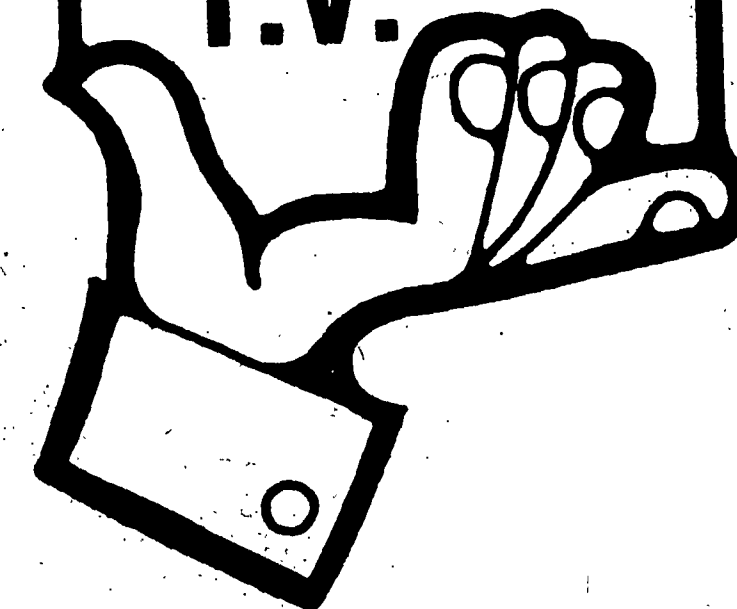

Monday and Tuesday people were unbelievably kind. Niles Park Board President Millie Jones offered space in a park building. Hewitt Bros. Printers supplied us with special stock paper and wouldn't accept payment. P.R. man Chuck Pecararo called. From District 63 Jeannine Oestreich and Larry Reiss called. Larry is laid up with pneumonia and his call was indeed selfless. Tommy Flynn volunteered his offices. Len Szymanski and Rich Harczak offered their basements. Mike Provenzano volunteered body and limb. Alice Bobula was in the front line of volunteering. Joe Salerno asked if the village could help.

Monday night Diane Miller told the Chamber of Commerce Christmas diners, "We're burned down but we're not out -- we'll be out this week on Thursday and every Thursday." She brought the house down when she told them this week's headline would be: "Blaze finally gets The Bugle".

We set up our house for temporary offices. Ironically, 20 years ago we began at 8201 Ozanam. This time we're starting over again at 7903 Maple. In the basement on the ping pong table is our new layout table. In the laundry room we're developing our larger type. In the dining room the girls are typing the unjustified copy on IBM typewriters. In the kitchen, Lucille and Jan are bookkeeping and selling classifieds. Four salesmen are at aluminum tables in the family room. Diane is using one bedroom for her editorial dept. and I'm sprawled across my bed writing.

You laugh at it all -- because that's the only way to go. Alice Bobula left her glove in my bedroom this morning and I threatened to tell Chuck of her inadvertent dalliance. A guy came to the burned-out offices Sunday and asked for back copies. He'd have to hang them out to dry.

Kindness is everywhere. The Salvation Army and the Red Cross were aiding the firemen all night long. Sullivan Liquor's Terry Sullivan wouldn't charge the firemen for cigarettes. He kept on offering drinks to fight off the bitter cold -- a lovely man.

In the first hour of the fire a man named Schultz, from the Lyons ave. area, implied he owed The Bugle a favor because "we've been getting your paper for years". He insisted on going into the offices and help carry-out records.

For all who called, we thank you. You taught us a lesson in compassion.


Our personal thanks must go to The Bugle gang. As Diane mentioned, "We're not a company -- we're a family." Indeed, many families should be so lucky.

As always, my personal family was equal to the task. My son made an incredible effort -- even lifting up the burned roof in search of records. The invasion of my wife's home was handled with her usual calm aplomb. And my California daughter had to "keep in touch" just to let us know she was near. Our other kids at Champaign are in the midst of finals, and we didn't want to upset their efforts.

Niles North Music Festival

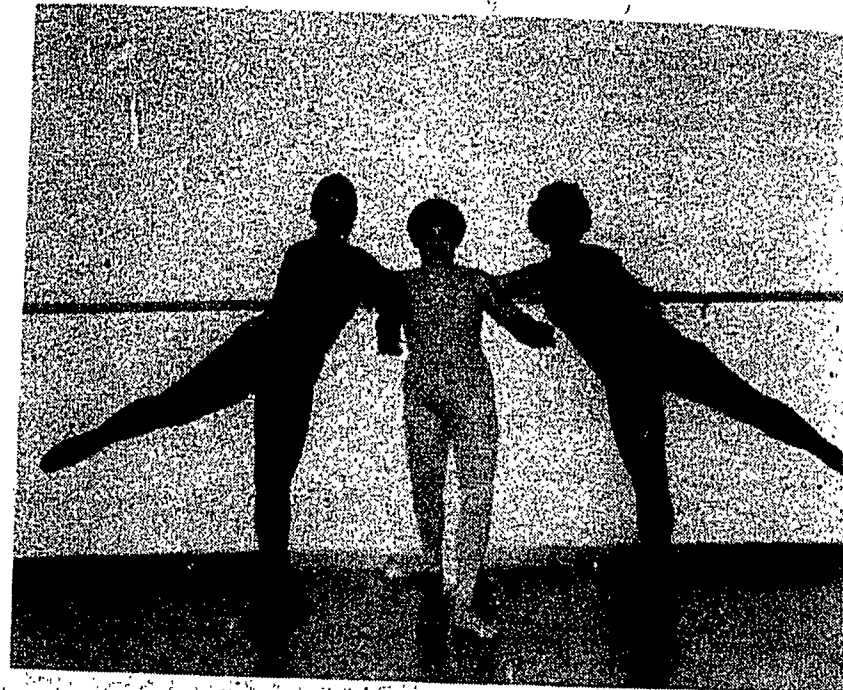

What is Enameling?

New owner for proposed Kingston conversion

Kingston Apartment tenants and the Niles Plan Commission were advised Monday night that a new buyer plans to purchase three parcels of property including the Kingston Apts., now under petition by present owner and real estate developer Morris Suson to convert the three 12-story apartment buildings to condominium ownership.

Zoners granted a continuance to January 18 of the condo-conversion petition by request of Richard Houpt, a Chicago attorney representing "a financially responsible client who last Friday entered into an agreement to purchase the buildings."

According to Houpt the client prefers to remain unidentified until the sale is consummated. Also, said the attorney, in view of the new acquisition his client intends to proceed with the proposed conversion.

Zoner Charles O'Grady noted the new owner would be responsible for necessary documentation as set forth in the Nov. 2 hearing. Zoning commissioners had indicated favorable reception of the condo-

conversion of the apartments located at Golf rd. and Western ave. in Niles but declined to hear the petition for lack of required statements of financing, engineering costs of building repairs, action on the village planners' recommendations and a certified copy of ownership.

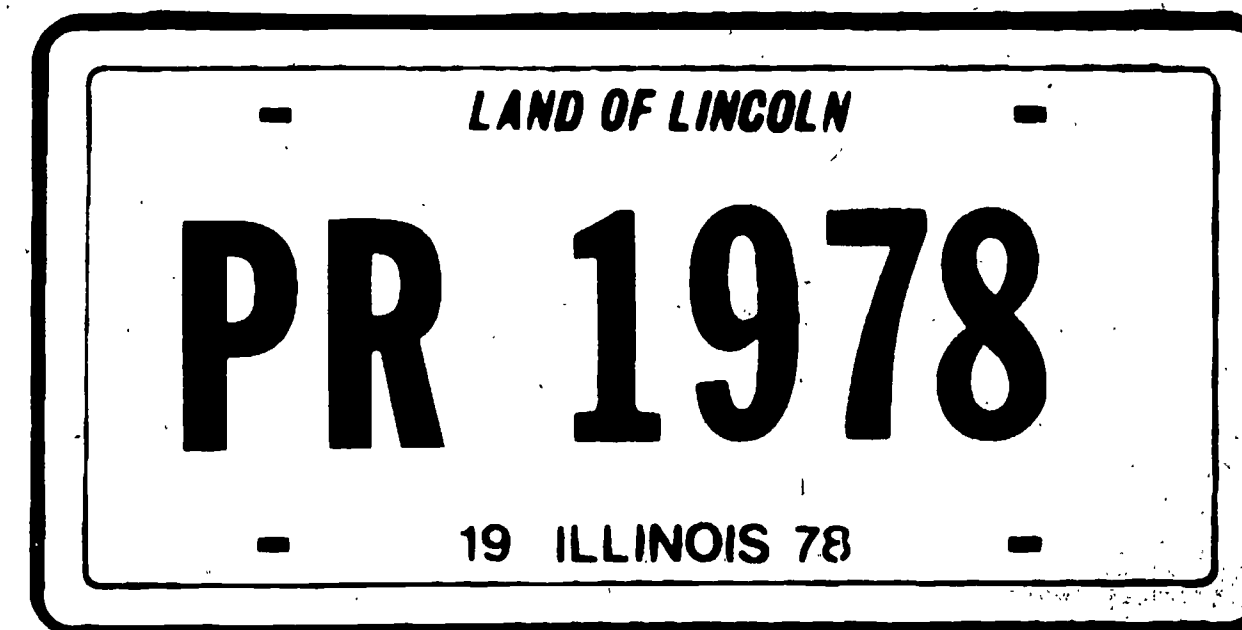
Chicago attorney Joseph Denenberg, representing 70 Kingston Apt. tenants who have signed options to buy their units, told zoners his personal investigation of Chicago records indicated the purchase would also include the Green Lakes Shopping Center and "another parcel" (possibly the near-by Key-East).

Due to his clients' concern over the present condition of the Kingston buildings as well as future improvements Denenberg requested a meeting with the new buyer and if necessary said he would fly back midway of a month's vacation in Florida to attend the Jan. 18 Plan Commission Hearing.

Denenberg later indicated to several of the approximately 75 Kingston tenants in atten-

Chicago Savings vehicle stickers and dog tags

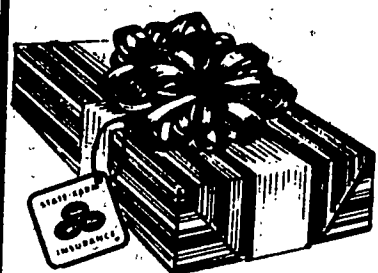

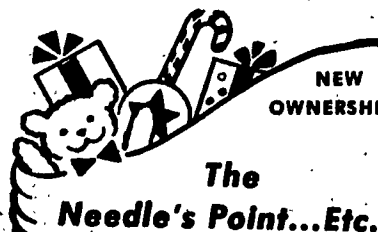
