



Mr. Goldberg said they are offering a preliminary report on recommendations for the entire 10+ acre tract which would harrow down to one acre residential and 9 acres multiple dwellings. Since this is a least 12 quarter hours for very complicated matter, the board decided to table it till the next meeting.

The board also tabled further discussion regarding the amendment to the self-service gas station ordinance and the flammable liquid ordinance till the next meeting.

The board also approved an ordinance amending the plumbing code and sewer requirements for water conservation since they were obliged to do so in order to comply with the recent agreement on our new water allocation. Bill Mottweiler noted that 7 engineering companies responded to our ad for sewer work and said they are in touch with them now.

Atty. Ashman said the MSD has requested we pass an ordinance whereby they can build part of their deep rock tunnel through Morton Grove but added he and Engineer Mottweiler are offering suggestions for changes and want some input from the board on this matter.

Ron Henrici reported the Fire Dept. had 109 calls from Nov. 28 to Dec. 11. He also said Police Chief Glauner recommended a department commendation for Officer Debra McInerny due to her apprehension of a burglary subject at Golf View Plaza on Dec. 9. When the subject tried to flee on foot, Officer McInerny chased him with a shotgun and apprehended him.

It was announced that the next board meeting would take place the second Monday in January.


