





Mikva announces tougher air noise standards by FAA

Congressman Abner J. Mikva lowering existing noise standards announced today that the Federal for airplanes on take off and Aviation Administration has adopted more stringent noise standards.

"This is good news," Mikva said, "especially for the people who live and work in the communities immediately surrounding O'Hare Airport."

The new regulations will apply to newly manufactured aircraft, not yet certified by the FAA, by

approach. Becoming effective April 3, 1978, the new standards are reduced proportionately according to the weight of the aircraft. More specifically, the FAA says noise levels for commercial turbo jets must be reduced to a maximum of 106 EPNDB's (Effective Perceived Noise Decibels) for airplanes with more than three engines on take off; a maximum of 104 EPNDB's for airplanes with exactly three engines on take off; and a maximum of 101 EPNDB's for airplanes with fewer than three engines on take off. Noise levels on approach must not exceed 105 EPNDB's on new aircraft regardless of the number

The Congressman said, "These new FAA standards could not have come at a more appropriate time because the full house is expected to act shortly on further airport noise legislation." Last week there was final committee action on a bill (H.R. 8729), which would assist airlines in meeting the cost of retrofitting or replacing existing commercial aircraft so they will be in compliance with Federal noise standards by 1985.

Developer Suson charged with defrauding

An 18-month investigation by the FBI has resulted in a threecount indictment charging a Des Plaines real estate developer with defrauding a Milwaukee Bank of \$2.5 million loan.

Morris Suson, of 9130 Golf rd., owner of the M. Suson Enterprises in Niles, was indicted by a Milwaukee federal grand jury late Tuesday for lying in order to obtain the loan Dec. 26, 1975 from the Midland National Bank, Milwaukee.

Suson allegedly obtained the loan after pledging as collateral the beneficial interest in a land trust held by the American National Bank and Trust Co. of

"Knowledge City" teaches traffic safety to Niles children

A child traffic safety program appropriately named "Knowledge City" is now in effect for the kindergarten through third grade students and is the innovation of Niles Police Sgt. Jim Gerhardt. Gerhardt, a veteran of 16 years on the Niles police force and the father of three, is a familiar face to the children of Niles who instantly recognize him as "Officer Friendly". This youth officer visits the school children on a regular basis instructing them on he hazards of traffic, how to handle "themselves in a an

For some time, however, 8gt Gerhardt had felt these occasional visits were not enough to sufficiently implant the importance of traffic safety and caution into the minds of these children. Something had to be done to educate these very young people on traffic regulations.



We say that we want it and need it. We hope in it. And if this is true then it is very important that we learn more about what we are looking for. Like the woman who felt lost and the young woman who had not seen love in her family, many of us often cry out for the direction, security, and joy

The term love is so overused that it has become synonomous with promiscuity, overindulgence, jealousy and many other attitudes and feelings that do not do what real love does — they do not heal persons; love heals persons.

Responding to and giving love is our greatest ability.

We see love when we see deep-rooted hurts healed.
We see love when greed, jealousy, hatred, lust, dishonesty, etc.

We see love when one loves with integrity, with regard to

We see love when someone puts another's good before his/her-We see love when someone chooses not to use another to meet

his/her own selfish desires. We see love when one believes in his/her own potential after

having miserably failed. We see love when one endures the crises of disloyalty.

I am convinced that we can learn to love, but it requires of us our highest devotion, because love like this is tough love. It comes from a determination to learn to love and to practice it daily. It comes as we challenge and fight our own unlovingness. It comes as we learn to receive it from another - from God, from others.

We begin to love others as we begin to love ourselves! What is this love like that I am talking about? A famous passage from the New Testament explains this love better than I have ever seen anywhere else. 
Notre Dame swimming team


