3 Principals returned to teaching ranks in District 63

School District 63 engaged in a round of musical chairs Tuesday night, moving administrative personnel around and down the salary scale, in moves to save the district an estimated \$25,000 annually.

The move objected to most by the audience was the transfer of popular school principal Marge Dick of Melzer School, who will be returned as a staff member (teacher). Her present salary of \$24,000 is likely to drop to about \$20,000 in the move.

Lenore Page, Assistant Superintendent of Instruction, a \$31,000 post, will move into the

principal's job at Melzer. However, this was considered a "lateral" move since her salary will not be reduced.

Apollo principal Lumb is being re-classified as a staff member. His reduction is likely to be from \$24,000 to about \$16,000. Lumb was involved in a controversial

transfer of principals last year with the Mark Twain School principal. After much protesting from parents, Lumb was returned to Apollo.

Apollo assistant principal Bers will also be returned to the teacher ranks, moving him down into the \$16,000 range.

Cesare Caldarelli, principal at Wilson School, which will be closed after June, will move into a newly-created post, Director of Personnel Development. It also will be a lateral move which keeps Caldarelli at his same salary, about \$24,000.

One Milwaukee ave. store owner turned down a Blase man's "request". He was concerned there could be incriminations against him but he did not feel it necessary to use his business to support the political guy in town. Good for him.

Norbert's had their huge marquee tell voters in large block letters to vote for Blase. Beneath the sign Puccio stick-signs were mashed in the ground.

The way the system works is simple. Norbert has long been in Blase's corner. Years ago the guy built an illegal addition to his building and village officials said it would remain there only a year. Last week's story of Niles cops taking a car out of a gas station without a court order, telling the station owner the police would inspect it and then return it to the gas station, and then returning it to a friend of the department smacks of Gestapo tactics.

Acting Police Chief Beavers told The Bugle he was serving the public by going to bat for the lady who had this controversy with the station owner.

Blase, Porter, Berger win

In the local contested elections in Tuesday's primary election Democratic Committeeman Nick Blase was leading 28 year old Jim Puccio, 3,778 to 1,616 votes, with 136 of 153 precincts reporting.

In the Democratic race for State Senator, Skokie's Sam Berger overpowered Niles' Tom Flynn and Earl Wilson in Niles Township, giving Berger victory in the district.

In Maine Township, Flynn was top vote-getter with unofficial

returns at 1,492, Berger 1,354, and Wilson 713. Flynn's showing was surprising since Berger was the regular party candidate in Niles, Maine and Wheeling Townships.

In Niles Township, Berger had a whopping 1,879 to Flynn's 341 and Wilson's 264.

In Wheeling Township, Berger had 338 votes, Flynn 110, and Wilson 142.

Mikva announces tougher air noise standards by FAA

Congressman Abner J. Mikva announced today that the Federal Aviation Administration has adopted more stringent noise standards.

"This is good news," Mikva said, "especially for the people who live and work in the communities immediately surrounding O'Hare Airport." The new regulations will apply to newly manufactured aircraft, not yet certified by the FAA, by

lowering existing noise standards for airplanes on take off and approach. Becoming effective April 3, 1978, the new standards are reduced proportionately according to the weight of the aircraft. More specifically, the FAA says 'noise levels' for commercial turbo jets must be reduced to a maximum of 106 EPND's (Effective Perceived Noise Decibels) for airplanes with more than three engines on take off; a maximum of 104 EPND's for airplanes with exactly three engines on take off; and a maximum of 101 EPND's for airplanes with fewer than three engines on take off. Noise levels on approach must not exceed 105 EPND's on new aircraft regardless of the number of engines.

The Congressman said, "These new FAA standards could not have come at a more appropriate time because the full house is expected to act shortly on further airport noise legislation." Last week there was final committee action on a bill (H.R. 8729), which would assist airlines in meeting the cost of retrofitting or replacing existing commercial aircraft so they will be in compliance with Federal noise standards by 1985.

Developer Suson charged with defrauding

An 18-month investigation by the FBI has resulted in a three-count indictment charging a Des Plaines real estate developer with defrauding a Milwaukee Bank of \$2.5 million loan.

Morris Suson, of 9130 Golf rd., owner of the M. Suson Enterprises in Niles, was indicted by a Milwaukee federal grand jury late Tuesday for lying in order to obtain the loan Dec. 26, 1975 from the Midland National Bank, Milwaukee.

Suson allegedly obtained the loan after pledging as collateral the beneficial interest in a land trust held by the American National Bank and Trust Co. of Chicago.

Lady of the night calls for help

Police were summoned to a restaurant on Golf rd. March 11 by a 19 year old Chicago prostitute who called for help when she was held against her will by an armed man, also from Chicago.

The Chicago woman asked aid from a waitress in the Ladies Room.

She later told police she was "working the streets" in Chicago when the man drove up beside her shortly after midnight, held a shotgun to her head and engaged her services.

Later he forced her into a car and drove to a Morton Grove motel where they rented a room. When she said she wanted a drink, he took her to the restaurant where she contacted the waitress.

A search of the Chicago man in the restaurant turned up 5 shotgun shells. Police said a 12 gauge shotgun was viewed plainly on the rear seat of his car.

The suspect was charged with unlawful use of a weapon, aggravated assault and unlawful possession of ammunition. He was held under \$10,000 bond pending a March hearing in Niles Circuit Court.

Liquor theft

Niles police apprehended a 25 year old Des Plaines man for theft of liquor March 9 from the A & P Store in the Greenlakes Shopping Center.

Jack R. Young of 510 Oakton st. was charged with retail theft and released under \$1,000 bond pending an April 23 hearing in Niles Circuit Court.

Niles police officers Baumhart and Ziegler said they were alerted to a theft in progress around 3 p.m. Thursday. When they reached the shopping center store, employees said the man had just left the area in a green car.

A search of the area located the auto traveling westbound on Golf rd. where officers placed the motorist under arrest.

A search of the car turned up 18 bottles of V.O. whiskey and Scotch positively identified by the store manager as A & P property. An additional 4 bottles of liquor found in the rear of the car were not claimed.

Total value of the alleged theft was set at \$150.

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"Knowledge City" teaches traffic safety to Niles children

"Stop", "Merging Traffic" and "No Passing" have become a way of life for approximately 160 students at Woodrow Wilson School, 8256 Harrison, Niles.

A child traffic safety program appropriately named "Knowledge City" is now in effect for the kindergarten through third grade students and is the innovation of Niles Police Sgt. Jim Gerhardt. Gerhardt, a veteran of 16 years on the Niles police force and the father of three, is a familiar face to the children of Niles who instantly recognize him as "Officer Friendly". This youth officer visits the school children on a regular basis instructing them on the hazards of traffic, how to handle themselves in an

emergency and answering their questions.

For some time, however, Sgt. Gerhardt had felt these occasional visits were not enough to sufficiently implant the importance of traffic safety and caution into the minds of these children. Something had to be done to educate these very young people on traffic regulations.

In December, 1976, Gerhardt was the first officer to arrive on the scene of a traffic accident in which a 7 year old boy was struck by a car while trying to cross Milwaukee ave. "When a child draws his last breath in your arms," said Gerhardt, "you don't go home and forget it. And when you have to notify the parents that their child is dead, you don't forget it. I guess that's when the idea for "Knowledge City" came to me."

Sgt. Gerhardt contacted Wilson School principal Caesar Caldarelli, and after explaining his idea for "Knowledge City", he found that Caldarelli was as enthusiastic about the idea as he was.

Fortified with this added encouragement, Gerhardt set out to secure the material needed for this project and contacted several local industrial manufacturing companies who were very cooperative and donated scrap metal from their production. He then drew to scale traffic signs in miniature, keeping in mind the size of the youngsters who would be using them. After cutting and spraying these signs, Gerhardt spent the summer months stripping and lettering them in his basement workshop. Donating many hours of his own time, Sgt. Gerhardt also made a model of a working railroad crossing, complete with flashing lights and currently is designing a scale model locomotive to complete his goal for authenticity.

"I found that the principal and teachers, as well as the school custodian, donated much of their own time to get the program

underway and were as excited as I was about the new way of teaching traffic safety to these young children," said Gerhardt.

As soon as the signs were completed, all the material was taken to Wilson School and installed on the first floor. In addition to the strategically placed traffic signs, the hallways of the school were striped with white highway striping showing intersections at classroom entrances and intersecting hallways which also warned the children of "Merging Traffic". Safety zones were designated by all lockers and the faces of the stairs were striped with yellow designating "No Passing" zones.

In order to familiarize the children with other highway

signs, "Do not enter" signs were placed over areas such as the school boiler room which were off limits to the students. "Trauma Center" was placed at the school nurse's station and "Headquarters" over the school office door. In addition, "Comfort Station" signs were placed on the washroom doors and the school lunchroom was designated as "Oasis - Picnic Area".

Everyone involved in the program felt this would make it easier for the children to recognize these proper signs when they saw them, on the highways and connect them with the proper areas.

The hallways of the school have official street signs and a contest is being planned in which the

students will submit names for their "streets".

Both Sgt. Gerhardt and Wilson Principal Caldarelli feel that the daily application of traffic safety procedures will make better pedestrians, more cautious bicycle riders and hopefully, better auto drivers out of the children in "Knowledge City".

They also feel these children will be a good influence on their older brothers and sisters and possibly even their parents when they recognize infractions of traffic safety on the roads.

"If", as Sgt. Gerhardt stated, "even one child's life is saved due to this program, then all the long hours and work were well worth it."

Morton Grove library happenings

"Pioneer Life in Illinois" will be the subject of a lecture by Dr. Thomas Conway at the Morton Grove Library on Tues., March 28 at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Conway is a history teacher at Oakton Community College and will talk about the pioneer household here in Illinois, the domestic life, and the care of the family at a time when living was much simpler and harsher than it is today.

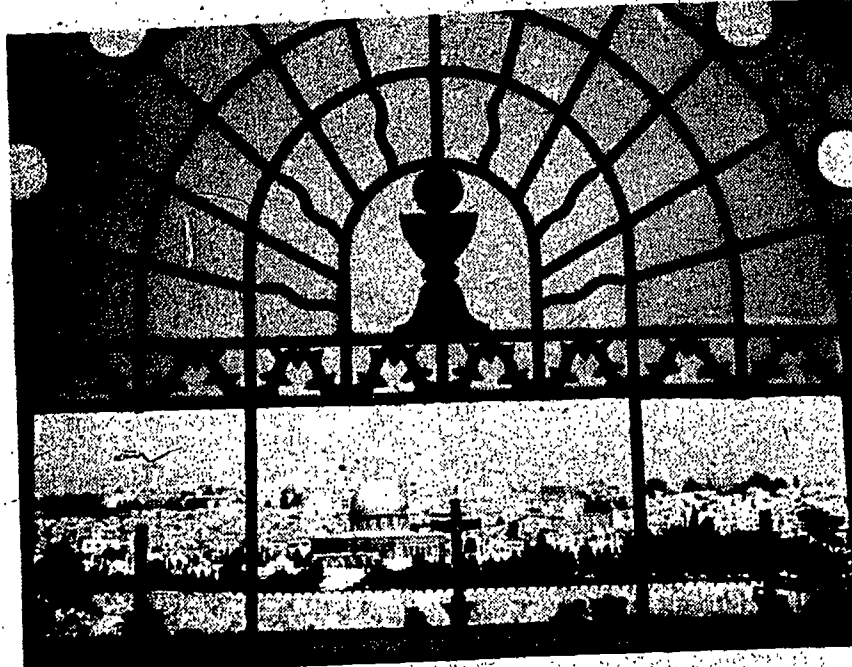

District 63 candidate Deckowitz states position on closings

Phillip A. Deckowitz, Board of Education member and candidate for re-election in East Maine Elementary District 63, feels that the community deserves a personal statement of his position relative to school closings. As he stated at the various board meetings where this subject was discussed, he felt that actual closings should be delayed to the 1979-1980 school year to permit a total district long range plan to be completed and to permit proper and thorough educational and physical planning for the reduced attendance centers. Once the actual votes were taken, all board members are required by the IASB Code of Conduct to work within the framework of those decisions. The code states: "I shall abide by majority decisions of the board, while retaining the right to seek changes in such

decisions through ethical and constructive channels."

Some people have questioned his decision to remain quiet at the March 14 meeting rather than speak in favor of delay or to move for delay. Mr. Deckowitz has stated he feels at this time any such attempt would cause a hardening of positions within the board and prevent any future changes if justified. The best interest of the children of our schools would be served if we all get together and work to complete the necessary planning. If this planning does not produce results in a reasonable period of time such that the children would be adversely affected, then the board should definitely delay the closings one year to the 1979-80 school year as has been his position during the decision making process.

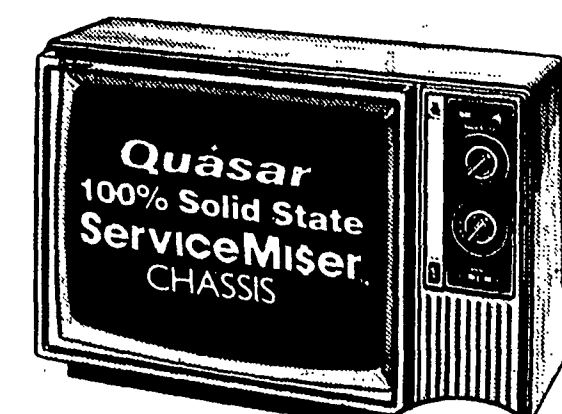

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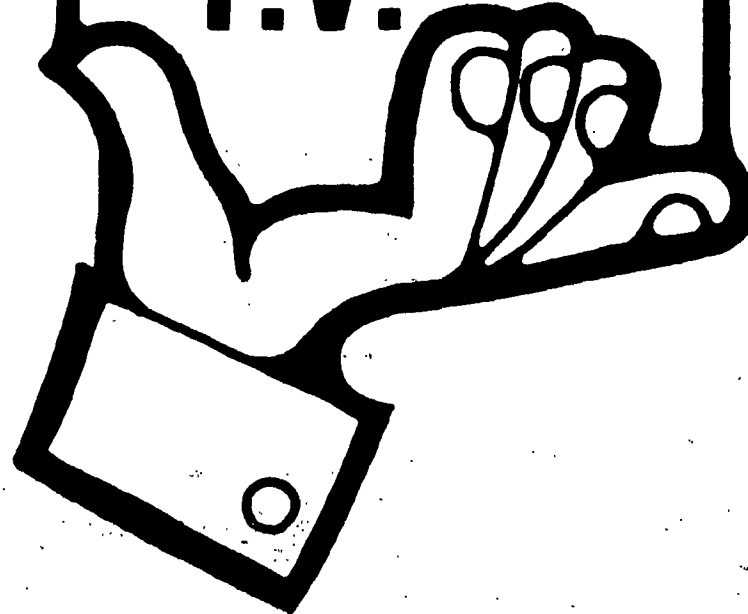

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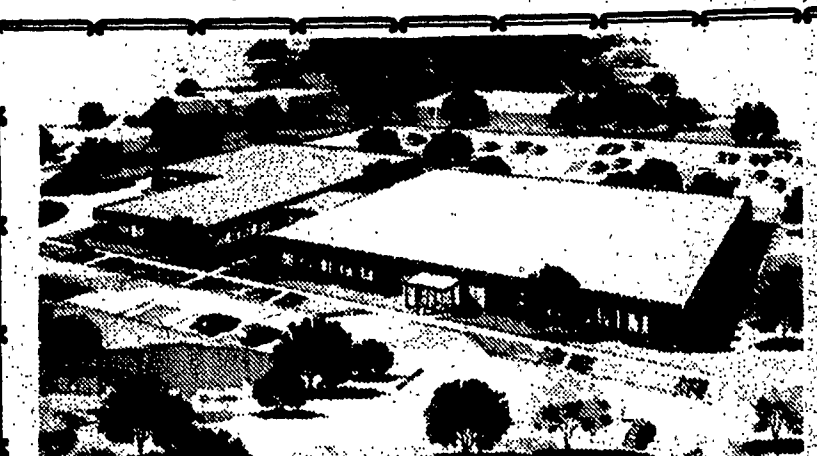

A last-day flurry of candidates for District 63's School Board swelled the total to seven people running for two openings in the April 8 election. By Tuesday, 2 of the 7 candidates voluntarily withdrew and a 3rd candidate, Allana Marks, 9024 Grace, Niles, was sent a registered letter by the school district notifying her she was ineligible to run because she has not been a resident for an entire year. Mrs. Marks' husband, Alvin, a former candidate for state representative, questioned the one-year requirement, contending the election code only requires a 90 day residency requirement for a candidate. But according to District 63 officials, the school code takes precedent over the election code and in Chapter 10.10 it states the necessary 1 year requirement.

The closing of Ballard and Wilson Schools prompted the last-minute flurry of petitioning candidates. Prior to last Friday's last day for filing, only incumbents Phil Deckowitz and Howard Lessin had submitted their petitions for candidacies.

Friday, Robert Canel, 7438 Palma Lane, handed in his petition but withdrew it on Monday. Canel announced at last week's hectic Board meeting he would be running for the Board, because of the announced school closings.

Claudia Twarski, 8507 Carol, a Ballard parent, also submitted her petition on Friday and will be on the ballot. Her announced running came after the Board voted to close her Ballard School.

Mary Jaffee, 9818 Maynard, a Wilson parent, submitted her petition on Friday and withdrew on Monday. Her announcement came after Wilson was cited as one of the schools to be closed.

Joan Futterman, 9090 Terrace Place, filed for the Board on Friday and will be on the April 8 ballot.

All this last-minute scurrying resulted in 4 candidates running for 2 openings on the District 63 School Board. Incumbents Deckowitz and Lessin and newcomers Futterman and Twarski will vie for the 2 openings.

After the announced changes, Louise Reback, President of the Melzer PTA, read a letter to the Board asking if Melzer School is to be the "district guillotine"? She requested answers from the Board, wondering whether or not principal Marge Dick is being sacrificed this year and Lenore Page may receive the same treatment next year.

Several audience participants attempted to find out the criteria for the administrative changes but the Board would not give direct answers. President Larry Reiss said such criteria for making administrative changes could not be discussed publicly, implying the unfairness of discussing personnel qualifications publicly.

One man from the audience defended the Board's policy of not discussing the matter publicly. He agreed with Reiss the reducing of personnel is among the hardest decisions

anyone can make. He added the ideas which go into the process of making these decisions, are numerous, and often cannot be verbalized.

Reiss said all personnel have merits but it is not right to discuss an individual at a public meeting. Reiss added it is the legal responsibility of the superintendent to make recommendations and the Board's responsibility to act on these.

Board member Dick Smith emphasized it is against the school code for Board members to get involved in personnel matters, but emphasized all Board members participate in the discussion process concerning the matter.

The audience, which has been asking about "criteria" and "guidelines" in recent weeks over cut-backs, once again was dissatisfied with the Board response.

Candidates must be a resident of the Niles Park District and a qualified voter, 18 years of age and over and have "an active interest" in park affairs. Qualified aspirants may call any one of the park commissioners or Park Director William Hughes at the Rec Center, 967-6633, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Terms of future park commissioners were reduced from six to four years by the Niles Park Board in 1975. The new 4-year terms were effective as of the April, 1977, elections. Senate Bill 965 signed into law by Gov. Dan Walker opened the door for Niles park action, permitting park boards to reduce terms from 6 to 4 years by resolution.

President Jones, whose 6-year term would expire in April, 1979, indicated her resignation came after the need for a larger family home forced a move out of Niles to Bloomingdale. Her final appearance as a park commissioner will be at the April 18 Board meeting she said.

An unofficial source indicated at least six interested individuals will apply for the park seat appointment.

During Park business Tuesday night commissioners urged President Jones to retain a Board seat on the Illinois Association of Park Districts (IAPD) to November for completion of one year of a two year term and unanimously approved payment of expenses. Legal counsel approved park action "proper" as long as Jones acted in the interests of the park systems.

President Jones was elected to the IAPD Board of Directors last November on an independent slate.

"Unanimously approved application to join the Illinois State Agency for Federal Surplus Property," Hughes indicated property surplus is now stored in Springfield with intent of a warehouse in the Chicago area. He urged membership, that the park district may take advantage of greatly reduced prices of an extensive list of items offered in used typewriters, trucks, office supplies, etc.

"Heard a report by Hughes that the Niles Park District may underwrite the house league of the Niles Amateur Hockey association in view of a \$6,000 deficit to the district. "Registration has dropped dramatically while costs have increased drastically," he said, "indicating one is hurting the other."

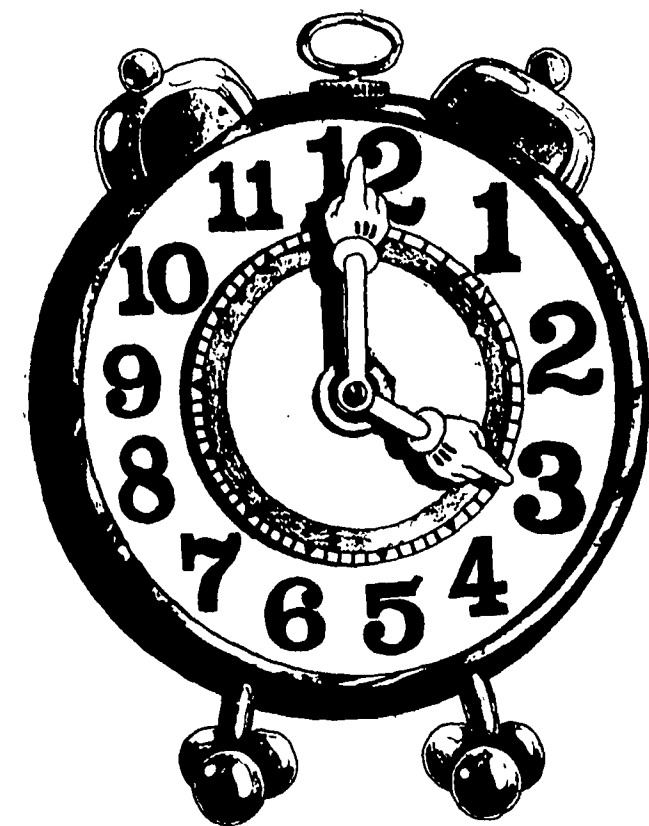
Many women returned to local college after taking non-credit classes at Greenerfields where they had experienced success and a growth in their self-confidence. As a result, many

Junior John Ambrose took a first in the diving competition against Quigley South, and senior diver Tom Barrett finished second in the Maine East meet.

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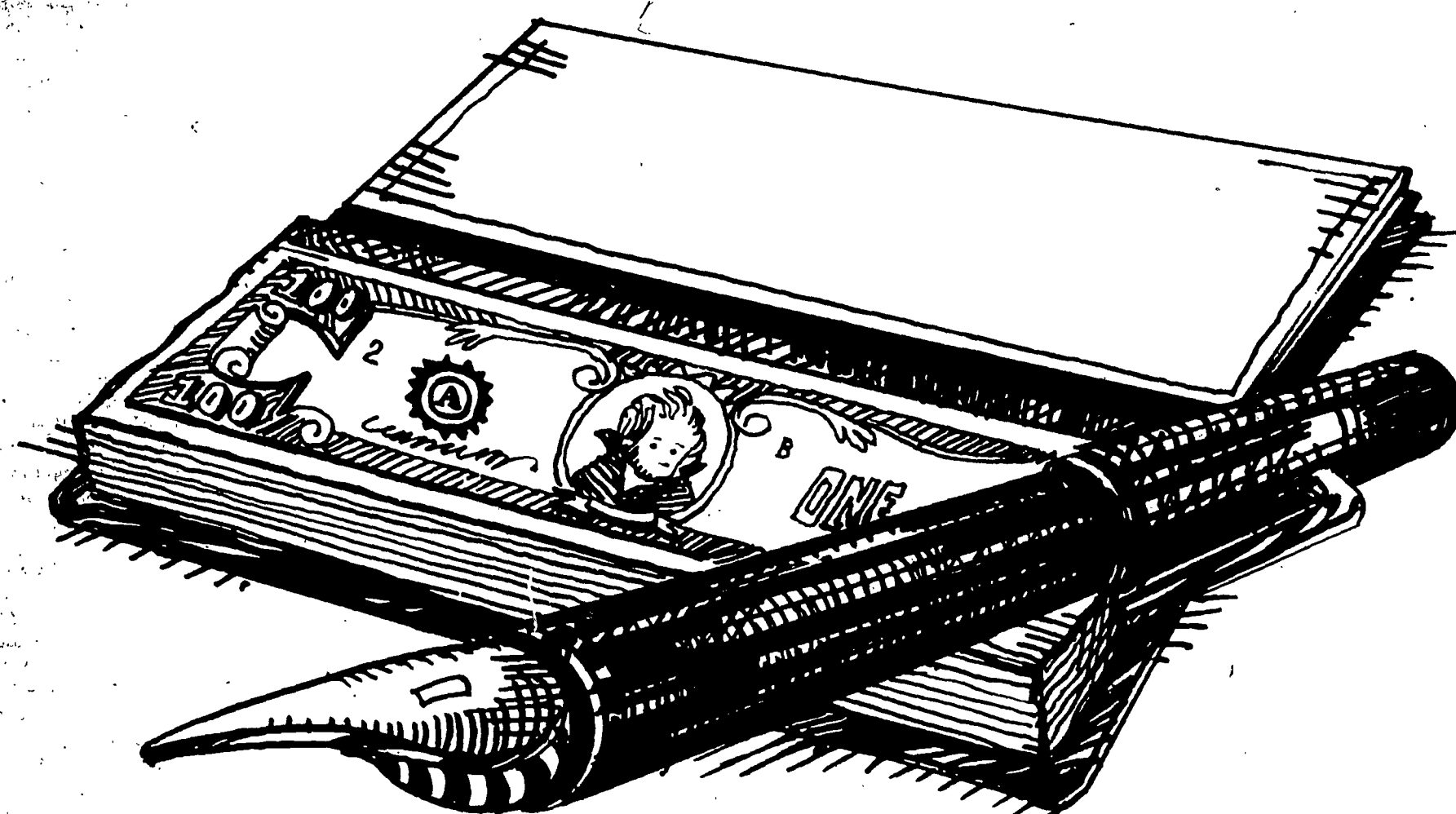
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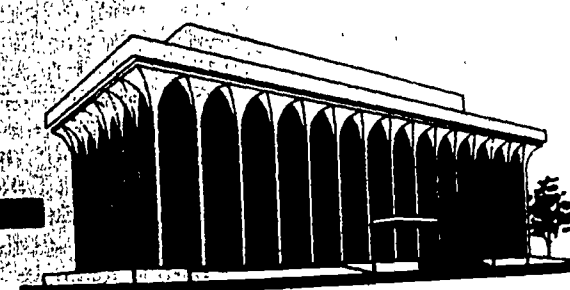

"The largest event of its kind in the state," is the way Keith Honn, Career Counselor at Maine East, categorizes District 207's Career Night Program, Project Big, to be held this year on Wednesday evening, April 5, from 7 to 9 p.m., in the Maine East Field House. All students from area public and private high schools, along with their families, are invited to attend. There is no admission charge.

According to Honn, "The program is known throughout the country because it is unique for a high school district to provide a service of this kind and of this magnitude."
