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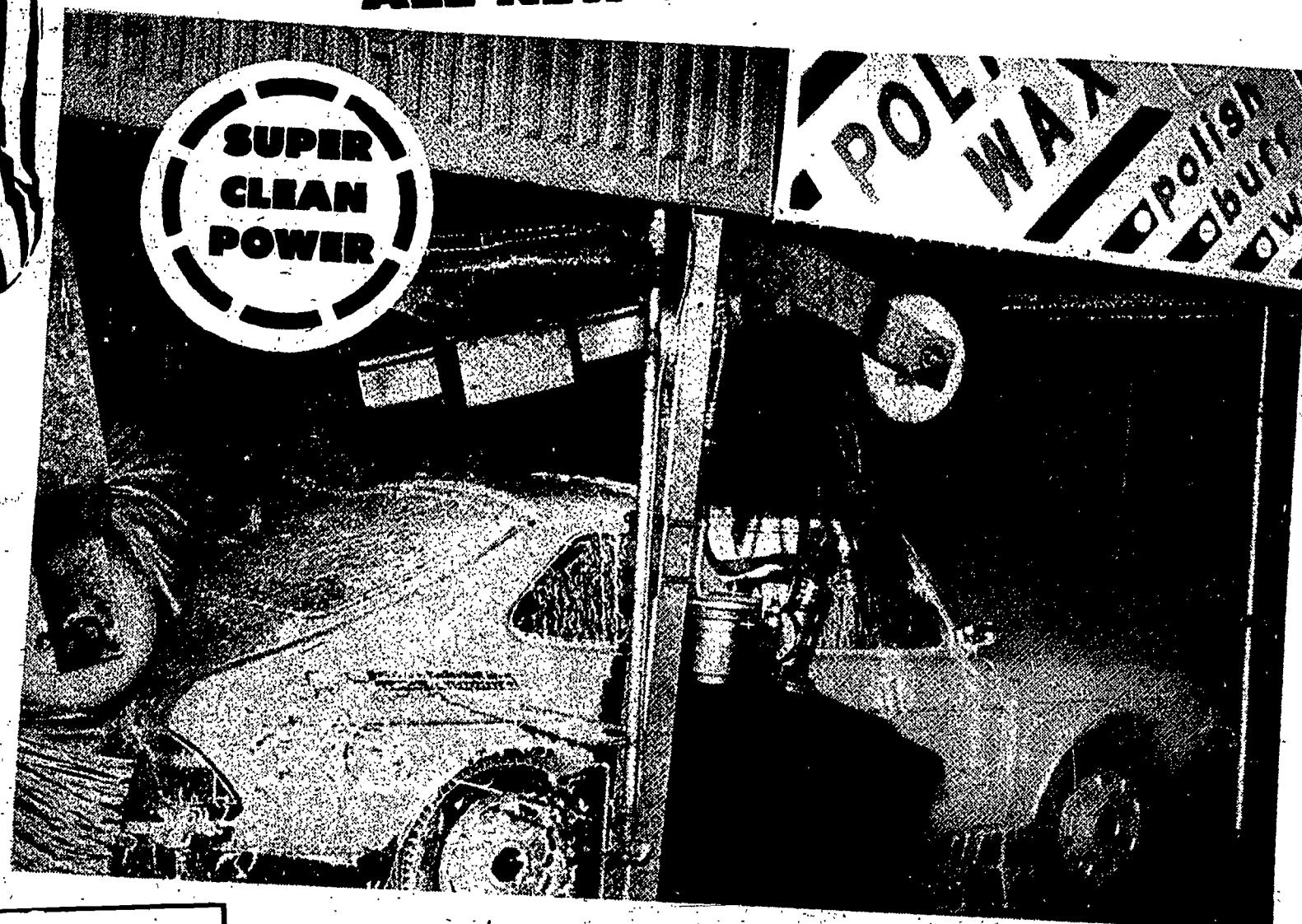

What do the utility companies owe you?

What do the utility companies owe YOU? This may seem to be a strange statement, especially since the main topic of conversation among homeowners and apartment dwellers these days is the rising cost of utilities. Granted, they do provide you

with a service... usually a very efficient service. When you turn up your thermostat, you get heat; when you flip your wall switch, you get lights and when you pick up your telephone, you get a dial tone. Of course, being non-competitive companies, your only recourse if you're not

satisfied with their service is a couple of candles, a can of sterno and two tin cans on a string. But what do the utility companies owe YOU as a consumer?

Recently 87 Niles residents registered complaints with the Niles Consumer Fraud and subsequently with the State's

Attorney's Office after they were notified the bills they paid were not received by Commonwealth Edison, Northern Illinois Gas Company, Illinois Bell Telephone, Park Ridge News Agency and Village of Niles Water Dept. All of the bills had been paid in cash at the Niles

Drugs, 8001 Milwaukee ave., Niles. Edmund Laski, pharmacist of the drug store, told police he had become depressed over the decreasing income of the store and "had locked up the store and went away." Upon his return on Feb. 10 Laski turned

**Niles auto repair shop
avoids license revocation**

Auto shop, customers reach accord

Differences between an auto repair shop and three dissatisfied customers were resolved amicably thru cash settlements to the plaintiffs on charges of faulty repairs, excessive costs and unnecessary car repairs and unnecessary car repairs following a village license revocation hearing held Friday, April 28 for Phoenix Auto at 7963 Waukegan rd.

Niles Hearing Officer Gerald Murphy declared officially that "all matters of controversy between Phoenix Auto and the three complainants were settled" and congratulated all parties involved "on tremendous good faith shown in the settlement."

Each of the plaintiffs withdrew complaints to the Niles Consumer Fraud Division after a ten minute conference with Tim Lee representing Sharon Lee, owner of Phoenix Auto, and her attorney Jerry Eisen.

Mr. and Mrs. William Hyde of Niles received a \$500 settlement as the result of a controversy over repair costs on a 1974 Audi auto last November. He had testified at the hearing that alleged careless handling of the car by the auto shop initiated transmission repairs at another shop.

Young Niles girl escapes kidnaper

Police said an 8 year old Niles girl escaped a man who pulled her by the arm and hair, forcing her to enter his car shortly after 7 p.m. Thursday, April 20 in the Lawrencewood Shopping Center.

They said the girl and her sister had finished shopping at the Jupiter store in the Center and were going to take a short cut thru the main mall of the Center. Finding the door locked the two walked around behind the Grossi Bros. store where they observed a gray car parked near the shopping center bank.

The car began to follow the two young girls then pulled up alongside of them and a man around 40 years old jumped out, grabbed the 8 year old and pulled her into the car.

The sister of the victim ran for help.

The 8 year old said the man told her he was a security guard for the Center but she became frightened and hysterical and managed to escape thru the passenger door of the car.

She said he drove off immediately.

The offender was described as weighing around 180 lbs., 5 ft. 7 in., gray hair and wearing a cap and dark jacket.

Shoot-up auto store
Damages of approximately \$1,600 were set on a shooting spree which occurred overnight April 24 at Niles Auto Parts, 8809 Milwaukee ave.

Police theorized the gunman was in front of a liquor store at Milwaukee ave. and Dempster st. when he began firing a .45 cal. revolver.

One bullet hole was placed in each of 4 plate glass windows in the front of the auto parts store. Police said 2 shells struck a 1970 Ford station wagon parked in front of the store.

Damages were set at \$1,200 for the 4 windows, \$100 for retaping of the alarm system; \$150 for products hit by the bullets and \$150 for damages to the car.

Police said pieces of slugs recovered in the shooting included those from a .44 or .45 cal. jacketed lead slug.

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Niles Plan Commission nixes eatery

The Plan Commission turned down a proposed use for the southwest corner of Milwaukee ave. and Oakton st., voting 5 to 1 Monday, April 24 to deny a special use permit for a full service restaurant by Perkins Cake N' Steak, Inc.

Zoning Comr. Stan Lowe cast the lone "nay" vote in the motion made by board member Charles O'Grady to deny the petition, "only because," stated Lowe, "there is nothing else suitable but a slow, sit-down restaurant for this area."

O'Grady complimented general contractor Ed Beaulieu on the plan layout for the corner but "reluctantly motioned for denial" of the rezoning petition not only do we have a flood of restaurants in Niles, but traffic is heavy at that (Oakton and Milwaukee) corner."

Earlier, O'Grady commented he had particularly noticed the parking lot at Oak Mill Mall as being full during his times of observation. He said he feared a "spillover" from restaurant parking if the eatery was approved.

The Monday night hearing was the third granted by the zoning board from an original presentation made Feb. 6, continued for amended planning of parking spaces, landscaping amenities, de-acceleration of lanes for the area and to comply with beautification planning.

Earlier Beaulieu presented amended plans reducing restaurant seating from 150 to 152 and 80 parking sites to 80, as well as plans for attractively landscaping and planting to front the Oakton-Milwaukee triangular

property in conformance with Niles beautification planning.

The zoning denial came after Dolly Kamieniecki of 8451 N. Olcott presented a petition to the Board carrying 330 signatures of residents and motorists using the Oakton-Milwaukee intersection who were opposed to the restaurant.

She said the area is already congested and the proposed restaurant would contribute more traffic than an alternate use. Petition signatures, she replied upon questioning by the Board, originated at the Oak Mill Mall.

Ronald Grais, attorney for Oak Mill Mall Shopping Center owner Marvin Hyman, presented a letter to the zoning board wherein he requested denial of the restaurant petition.

He noted that with McDonalds, Riggios and Maloney's already in the area, another restaurant was not necessary for the corner property.

He also noted references in the Metcalf & Eddy July 1977 Comprehensive Development

Plan for the Milwaukee ave. corridor, citing heavy traffic volume at the intersection, high accident concentration at the intersection and in the McDonalds-Jerry's Fruit Market-Oak Mill Mall driveways, finalizing with the belief that rezoning approval would "impair the economic viability of all businesses in the area" due to projected traffic congestion if the eatery was approved.

While Comr. Ken Cohen referred to the Oakton-Milwaukee corner as "one of the most dangerous in Niles for traffic," Comr. O'Grady humorously noted he was "glad the shopping center is not planning to include a restaurant," that any future eatery petition by Grais would "meet difficulty" from the Board.

Grais' reply, "I didn't say that," was countered by O'Grady's answer, "Your intent was stated and in the record."

The petitioner has the right to appeal the denial before the village board.

The senior citizens activities are sponsored by the Maine Township government, and funded in part by township revenue sharing funds.

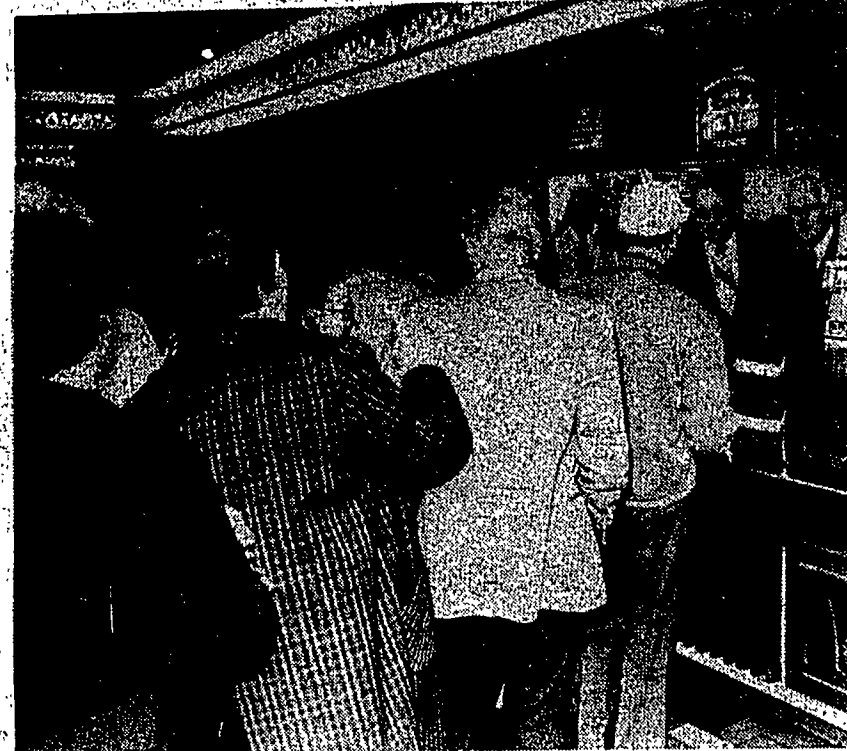

Without enough volunteers, many patients who hope to go to camp this year will have to be turned away.

The Bob Kennedy Summer Camp is dedicated to providing as normal a camping experience as possible for victims of crippling neuromuscular diseases. It is completely free of charge to all participants. Activities for the campers are supervised by Camp Director Maureen Scully.

Mr. Waters is a well-known researcher and teacher and his lecture promises to be a fascinating one.

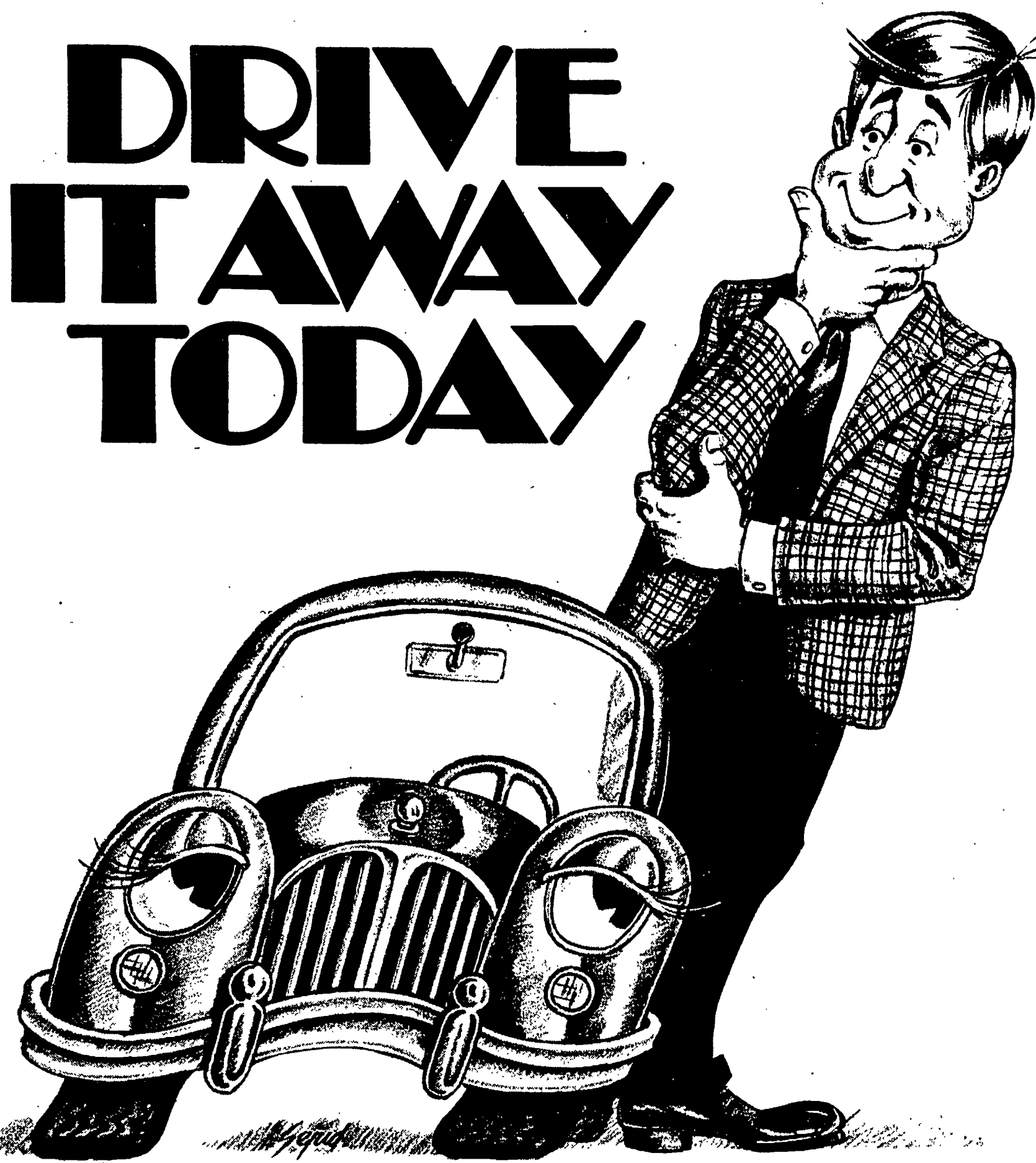
The wild and colorful features of South America will be covered in the next travelogue at the Morton Grove Library on Tuesday, May 9 at 7:30 p.m.

Lions aid glaucoma detection

Glaucoma: A serious eye disease which can lead to blindness if not detected in time.

In the detection lies the hope, and the hope is with the Lions of Illinois Foundation and the Niles Lions Club, assisted by the University of Illinois, Dept. of Ophthalmology.

Frank Hanson, president of the Niles Lions Club, said club members are mobilizing to help staff the Lions Mobile Glaucoma Screening Unit when it arrives here May 9-10, 1978 at the Trident Center, 8060 Oakton, Niles, as part of a state-wide swing to offer the free screening to residents of Niles.

"We feel fortunate in having the unit visit our community," said Frank Hanson. It is estimated that more than 2% of the total population of Illinois

residents have unsuspected glaucoma. So far, almost 7,000 people of those already screened state-wide have been warned that fluid pressure in their eyes is sufficiently high to warrant a complete eye examination. Many others have been reassured that they are fine.

When the unit arrives, Lions and volunteers will help welcome adults wishing to take the simple, painless test, and to assist the professionals medical staff.

In addition to glaucoma tests, visitors to the unit also will be able to take preliminary visual acuity tests for other eye problems which may need attention. Glaucoma generally manifests itself in adults. Its symptoms rarely are noticed until it has advanced to a dangerous stage, although it is detectable in earlier, treatable stages. The disease is not inherited, but it does have a tendency to run in families.

The night cleanup man said he had locked the doors to the beauty shop before leaving and double checked the doors again to be certain they were locked.

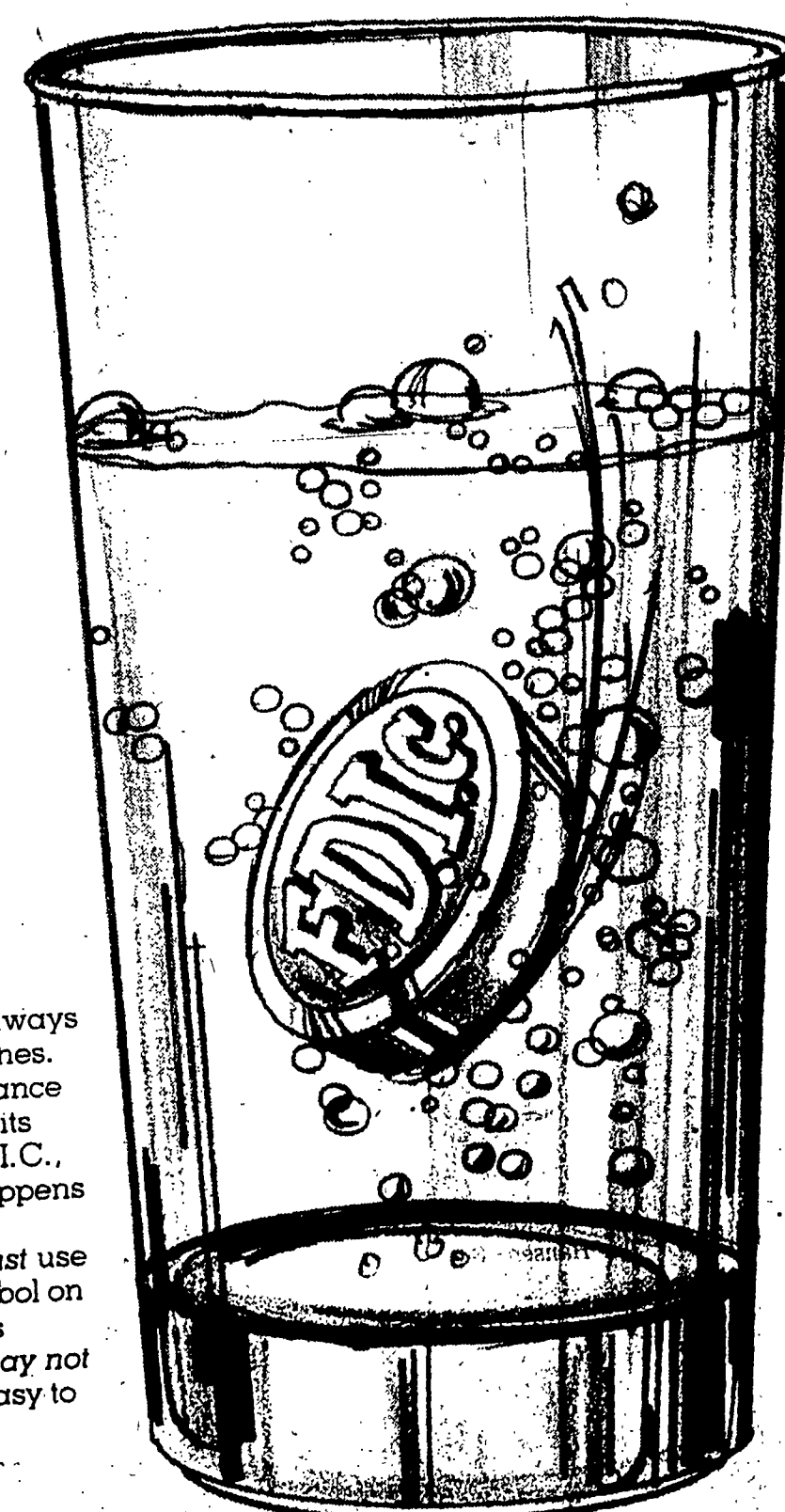
House burglary

Does the Tax Reform Act of 1976 benefit your estate?

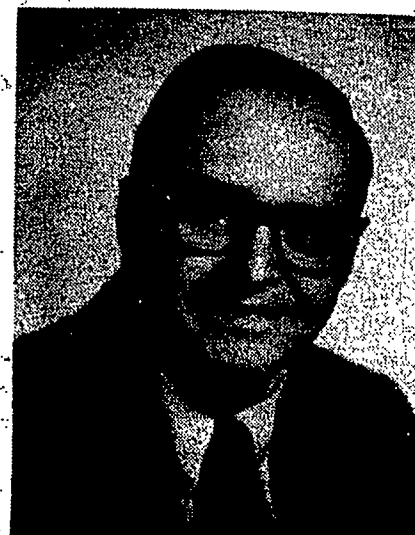
Recently, I was asked whether it was still necessary for the average person to plan his estate in view of the change in estate tax exemptions (credits) created by the Tax Reform Act of 1976. Since 1977 was the first year that most of the provisions of the new act were in effect, we heard quite a bit about it last year, but I have seen very little in print about the Act in 1978. As you may know, prior to the Tax Reform Act of 1976, each of us had a \$60,000 estate tax exemption, so an estate had to exceed \$60,000 to be subject to the estate tax. There were certain things that could be done in estate planning to minimize the tax, but the exemption was limited to \$60,000. The Tax Reform Act changed this, and we went from an exemption to a credit system. During 1978, the credit is fixed at \$34,000, the equivalent to a \$134,000 exemption. In addition, the credit will increase each year for the next three years. With this in mind, the question "Does the average person need to plan his estate?" is a logical question from a tax standpoint. However, the Tax Reform Act, while providing certain benefits, has also created new problems which impose new responsibilities and liabilities upon an executor. Further, if our nation continues to experience increasing inflation, it will obviously not be long before the advantages created by the new credit system will, for all practical purposes, be wiped out.

Many of the customers that I have talked with tell me that most of their assets are held in joint tenancy. While joint tenancy may offer some advantages in a modest estate, as the estate grows in size, the advantages are far outweighed by the disadvantages. Thus, it is important for an individual to consider having his estate properly planned and to consult with an attorney as soon as possible.

The recent election of three new people to Niles Library Board is likely to open up the happenings in the district which has too long been operating as a private club. Again, it has been partly the fault of The Bugle, which has ignored Board meetings and hasn't kept abreast of local doings there.

With the retirement of Head Librarian Francis Allen, his replacement, Edith Jackson, has been on a rocky road ever since she took over in January.

Some weeks ago we received an anonymous letter, highly critical of the new librarian. A couple of days later she called and asked if we received such a letter. Niles village president Nick Blase had also received letters of complaint from library personnel. The disturbance on Oakton st. was reaching a climax.

During this period a reference librarian, 33 year old Roger Hecht, was fired April 13 without being allowed to defend himself. Mrs. Jackson notified him he was fired by the Board and no reasons were given. Subsequent findings concluded vague charges of his writing illegibly, turning up music too loud, reading personal reading matter while on the job and being in the office area instead of at his desk. While it cannot be proven, he was the most vocal critic among library appointees. When library personnel presented grievances to the library board, it suggested a grievance committee be formed and Hecht was included. His dismissal came immediately after, even though the Board assured personnel there would be no reprisals for being members of this committee.

Clerk Black seeks to outrun Bilandic

Niles Township Clerk Louis Blak pronouncing himself the north suburban version of marathon runner Michael Bilandic, Mayor of Chicago, said Wednesday that he had entered "The Chicago Lakefront Ten," a ten mile jaunt from north of the Foster ave. beach to the Lincoln Park Zoo and back. Black will be representing the Leaning Tower YMCA, where he is a regular running enthusiast. The race will be held May 14 and Black said if his finish is good, he may challenge Bilandic to a run-down.

Hecht brought a lawyer to an April 25 board meeting who reminded the Board it was Board policy Hecht be entitled to a hearing before being fired. Six staff members, including Hecht's superiors, praised his work and denied he was uncooperative or behind in his work.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Jackson, the new gal in town, called The Bugle to inquire whether we received the aforementioned anonymous letter. While we neither confirmed nor denied we received it, our answer indicated we did. And while Hecht denied writing any such letter, he was dismissed right about this time.

Board president Marty Hodes told The Bugle the Board deserved a "pat on the back" for changing its mind in re-hiring Hecht. It was an incredible statement since the Board made a monumental boo-boo by illegally dismissing an employee without a hearing. Contrary to Hodes' statement, the Board deserves The Bugle "boob award of the month" for a gross violation of such a fundamental right. Can you imagine dismissing an employee without his being able to answer charges?

In light of these past actions, we're keenly aware it's time we began focusing attention on library board happenings. Until this year personnel in Niles Library district were among the poorest paid of any local suburban districts. And while the Board operates two separate buildings, which seems absurd, they're now citing economy problems for many of their burdens.

We've long been a bookie guy. The hell with fancy buildings, and branch buildings and mobile units - just fill the main building with books, lots of books. College kids in Niles now have to go to neighboring libraries to fill their needs. There's no way Niles Library can satisfy their wants.

Niles Library has problems which can be solved by enlightened leadership. Whether or not charges leveled against the librarian are unfair, we cannot prove. She is presently in New York, allegedly with her husband who is ill, and cannot be reached for comment about charges leveled against her handling of personnel.

She has been accused of being a martinet by the people who serve under her. We tried unsuccessfully to see her 2 weeks ago when she was in the library, and again Monday, when she was still out of town. But she has not had her day in court so it's unfair to publicly acknowledge her critics unless she has a chance to answer them.

Once again, the Niles Library problems are partly a result of a public body operating in a vacuum. No public spotlight has been focused on it. This lack of exposure has allowed it to make its own mistakes without them being made known to the people paying the bills, who hopefully would correct its errors.

Public bodies operate behind closed doors far too much. When all of us ignore their efforts by not attending meetings, it's a carte blanche invitation for it to blunder and create chaos.

Down at the old library hall, library people are saying chaos has been the law the past couple of months. We'll be reporting from there beginning this month.

In the first paragraph we said we weren't doing our job. This confession may be a catharsis for us. But don't let us get away from reporting all the news in Niles. It's your town. And if a newspaper purports to be the newspaper of that town, you must demand from it all the news in town.

Time is marching on. It wasn't too many years ago, we used to go over to Maine East with his father to watch his son play first base on some very good baseball teams. Bruce was chosen athlete of the year for his exploits in wrestling and football, as well as for his first baseman efforts. Subsequently, Bruce went to Michigan. An outstanding student, he was admitted to the very prestigious Michigan law school and has since been successfully pursuing his law career.

It was only 2 weeks ago his 3 year old daughter Dana stole the hearts of many of us down at Champaign where she was looking over the campus. She's getting an early jump on viewing schools she may attend some 15 years hence.

As the guy at the beginning of this paragraph noted, "Time is marching on."

Niles Plan Commission disapproves self service gas stations

The Niles Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals Monday night unanimously withheld recommendation for self service gas stations in Niles but amended disapproval by placement under a Special Use should village trustees endorse the concept. Applicants for self service gas operation will then be required to appear individually before the Zoning Board for a Special Permit.

More clearly, said Zoning Comr. Ken Cohen, "we do not approve of self service gas stations ... being different does not make the idea good."

Comr. Orville Ottow concurred, stating there "were many disadvantages to self service stations in Niles and we have seen no advantages."

A proffered 5% to 10% discount to customers pumping their own gas, observed Comr. O'Grady, would be followed later by price increase after the initial price reduction, noting that "prices will go up for full service."

Niles has been seeking guidelines concerning self service stations in the village since Governor Thompson's May, 1977 order that state fire regulations be changed to permit self service.

Village officials' concern over safety operation, back-up traffic at self service pumps and consideration of a price differential or discount offered due to decreased labor costs had referred the concept to the Plan Commission for study.

A Public Hearing held Aug. 24 by the Plan Commission to place self service gas stations in a Special Use category under village code resulted in appearance of only one of 26 station operators notified.

Three operators responded to the second May 1, 1978 hearing. Raleigh Keane, operator of a station at 6147 Touhy, said self service stations were safer due to more careful handling of apparatus by customers, cited less waiting in line, but was opposed to a combined full and self service operation because "there is no labor savings to pass on."

windshields, etc.) but that's a sign of the times ... if drivers want such service, let them go elsewhere ... give people their choice of what they want to buy," he told zoning commissioners.

"If self service is not approved in Niles, we may consider selling our property," he commented, noting "we are not making a profit on gas sales now at the Touhy station."

Opposed to self service, Milo Jacobson, operator at 7701 Milwaukee ave., noted approval "will put me out of business ... besides," he said, "where is a motorist going to get service if you allow self service?"

Tom Levesseur, representing operators of the (previous Memo) station near 8901 Milwaukee ave., urged approval ... "if you deny self service, you'll not be allowing motorists a choice."

Twelve of the approximately 30 gas stations in Niles have submitted applications to the state for self service operation. The state requires service operators to obtain a permit from the local fire department. No permits have been issued in Niles as yet.

Niles Fire Lt. Al Weber indicated a majority of the requests are for combined full and self service operation, dependent upon station facilities. He cited concern by the fire department over smoking regulations and age limits of self service customers pumping gas.

Also, he noted, "no station should be strictly self service. There should be at least one pump for the handicapped person

and for the mother with a group of youngsters in the car."

The 12 applications for self service gas stations held in abeyance pending a final decision by village trustees were requested by Oklahoma Service Station, 7113 W. Dempster; Al's Standard, 8010 Oakton; Mobile Service Station, 7969 Milwaukee ave.; Flores Arco, 8596 Dempster; Niles Union 76, 7300 Waukegan; E-Z-Go Station, 7662 Milwaukee ave.

Also, E-Z-Go Station, 8401 Milwaukee; Bob's Shell, 8200 Oakton; Sam's Shell, 9000 Milwaukee; Niles Shell, 8005 Waukegan rd.; Shell Service Station, Touhy and Lehigh; and E-Z-Go Station at 8001 Golf rd.

In other business zoners continued to June 5 a Special Use petition by Richard Leavitt of Buffalo Grove to re-open an existing tire, battery and accessory building for a full auto repair shop at 8851 N. Milwaukee ave. (previously Memo).

The delay in action called for exact description of the petitioned building within the Memo area, location of 18 village-required parking sites and clarification of the auto repairs and tuneup exclusion clause under the 99-year lease on the property.

Leavitt said his plans included a tuneup and auto repair shop excluding body work and auto repainting. He intends to sell tires, batteries, auto accessories and "everything people need to service their cars."

Nordica bedroom fire causes \$17,000 in damages

A mid-morning fire Wednesday, April 26 caused an estimated \$12,000 to \$15,000 in damages to an apartment building at 7760 Nordica owned by Greenleaf Realty Co. Content by Greenleaf Realty Co. Content loss to a second floor apartment leased by Mrs. Eleanor Johnson and her two sons was set at another \$5,000.

Niles firefighter Tim Crossin was injured when a section of the ceiling in the burning apartment gave way. He was treated for a mild concussion at Lutheran General Hospital and later released.

A fire department spokesman said the mother was away at work at the time of the fire. Her older son, 12, was at school but an 11 year old son was home ill when the fire began.

According to fire department records, the origin of the blaze occurred in the boys' bedroom in the area of one of the boys' beds. The rooms involved directly were the sons' bedroom, the mother's adjacent room and two bathrooms.

The son at home said he noted one of the mattresses burning and attempted to extinguish the flames with water from the bathroom. Failing to put out the flames, he said, he ran into the hallway to obtain a fire extinguisher and attacked the fire, resulting in a delayed alarm to the fire department.

The blaze reached greater volume and the young boy ran to the apartment of a next door neighbor who telephoned firemen. Firefighters said they received several calls by this time.

The spokesman said the blaze was confined to the second floor apartment but he noted the fire could have been minimized had the bedroom doors been closed following discovery to confine the fire within the rooms.

Smoke damage spread throughout the second floor of the apartment house, going into the hallways. Living units beneath the involved areas received extensive water damage.

Niles Fire Chief Albert Hoelbl, Deputy Fire Chief Charles M. Bobula and six firefighting units responded to the alarm. A truck company from Glenbrook, Unit 141, was also at the fire scene.

The fire remains under investigation by the Fire Prevention Bureau and the Niles detective division.

Fire Chief Hoelbl said firemen lost several minutes' time and experienced great difficulty reaching water hydrants due to negligent parking of resident cars. He said at least two of the hydrants were obstructed and both motorists were ticketed by police.

"Motorists should never, never block fire hydrants," said the Chief, noting it is a daily occurrence for drivers to obstruct the hydrants along Nordica from Oakton st. to Jonquil Terrace.

himself into the Niles police and, when informed of the numerous customer complaints, told police he had picked up his utility files from the drug store and "things would be straightened out." It was subsequently revealed that all the utility bills paid by check were sent to the companies, but the cash payments totalling \$7,139.31 were never turned in.

This was a very unfortunate situation for anyone who suffered a loss, but we feel the seriousness was compounded by the fact that the majority of the victims were senior citizens on fixed incomes who do not have checking accounts and pay their utility bills in cash. As one senior who called The Bugle stated, "I am 67 years old and had to repay my gas bill of \$125.00. I can't believe I'll ever see that money again."

According to Gerald McNamara, investigator for the State's Attorney's Office, Laski filed for bankruptcy on Feb. 15 and the first items of order will be the unpaid bills to the utility companies. A hearing is currently being set up by the State's Attorney's Office to discuss the restitution procedure. Insofar as criminal charges are concerned, if restitution or provisions for restitution are made at the hearing, it would be difficult for the state prosecutor to prove a charge of intent to commit fraud.

Last week The Bugle contacted Commonwealth Edison, Northern Illinois Gas and Illinois Bell Telephone to determine who the "authorized" collection agents were in the Niles, Morton Grove, Skokie and Lincolnwood

areas and also how they would be recognizable to the public. Each of these utilities stated that while there were several businesses in these areas who collect gas, electric and telephone bills for a small fee, only a small number were "authorized agents" or "under contract" and if a customer pays a bill to any business other than those who are actually "authorized", the utility companies accept no responsibility, even though the customer would have a paid receipt. It would be up to the person himself to go back to the business with his paid receipt and try to correct the problem. It should be noted that each of the utility companies stated the majority of businesses which accept utility bills for payment are reputable businesses and perform this service for the convenience of their customers; therefore, if a problem should arise, these businesses are eager to straighten out the matter. In most cases, it is usually nothing more than a bookkeeping error.

Illinois Bell Telephone told The Bugle they have no authorized agent in Niles. In Morton Grove, their agent is the First National Bank of Morton Grove, 6201 Dempster. In Skokie, the agents are The First National Bank of Skokie, 8001 Lincoln, and Old Orchard Bank and Trust, 4949 Old Orchard rd. In Lincolnwood, it is the First National Bank of Lincolnwood, 6401 Lincoln ave.

Commonwealth Edison listed no "authorized agents" in Morton Grove or Lincolnwood, but in Niles, they have authorized Unity Savings, 8361 Golf rd, Skokie has

three (3) "authorized agents", namely Brod Electric, 8021 Lincoln, Skokie Hardware, 4024 W. Main and Peck's Hardware, 4020 Golf rd.

Northern Illinois Gas refers to their authorized agents as "under contract" and stated there are none in Niles or Lincolnwood, and in Morton Grove they have the First National Bank of Morton Grove, 6201 Dempster. In Skokie, it is the First National Bank of Skokie, 8001 Lincoln ave.

The utility companies did state the majority of consumer bills are paid by check or money order and sent directly to the company. They also stated that most businesses collect the gross amount on gas and electric bills if they are paid within two days of the due date, but Northern Illinois Gas told The Bugle that they adhere to the postmark on the envelope and, if the bill is postmarked on the due date, even though it is not received until later, they consider the bill "on time."

We feel the utility companies have an obligation to the consumers they serve and if they are willing, year after year, to accept payments from businesses other than those they label as "authorized", they indeed have an implied agreement with these businesses and should be willing to accept the responsibility if a problem arises. These companies have a really unique situation, and any businessman today would be more than happy to have several "businesses in the field" collecting monies for him with no commitment on his part.

Even in the case of "authorized agents", we were told there is no sticker or identification in the windows of the businesses to let the consumer know they are authorized. The only means of identification is the stamp used to imprint the bill as paid and this stamp has the name of the utility company imprinted on it, namely Commonwealth Edison, Northern Illinois Gas and Illinois Bell Telephone. But the consumer has no way of knowing ahead of time whether or not the business has this authorized stamp until he has actually paid his bill.

The time has come for utility companies to review their collection methods, properly identify their "authorized agents" and accept the responsibility for businesses which have been collecting monies for them year after year. The consumer should not become the victim when he has a paid receipt in his hand.

Wagner indicated a May 1 renewal of the auto shop's business license had been held up predicated on the outcome of the Friday hearing.

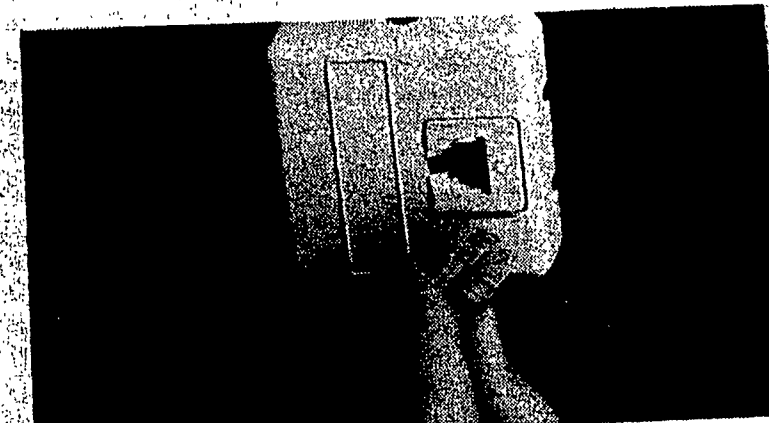

Centel's new Pick-a-Phone

Modular telephone jacks such as the one pictured allow residential customers to connect their own telephones. Under Centel's Pick-a-Phone program, customers who pick up telephones at a Centel business office are given up to a \$5 credit on installation charges. Customers also are given a \$1 credit for each telephone returned, to a maximum of \$5. They are given a \$5 credit when returning all telephones at the time service is discontinued.

Central Telephone Co. of Illinois has remodeled the lobby of its Miner Street Building in Des Plaines to accommodate the company's new Pick-a-Phone program.

The lobby now serves as a display area where customers may select the telephones they want installed in their homes.

Residential customers who choose to participate in the Pick-a-Phone program receive up to a \$5 credit on standard service call charges, thus reducing telephone installation costs, said James J. Kropid, general customer services manager.

To participate in the program, a customer's residence must be equipped with company-installed modular jacks in the locations where the customer desires service. Customers meeting this requirement may pick up a telephone from any Central Telephone Co. of Illinois business

office, and take it home and plug it into a jack. The customer will begin receiving telephone service at a designated time soon thereafter.

In addition to the \$5 credit on installation charges, the program allows residential customers to return telephones to Centel's business offices when changing or disconnecting service. To remove the telephones, the customer only needs to unplug it from the jack or snap the cord.

A \$1 credit is given for each telephone returned, up to a maximum of \$5. Customers receive a \$5 credit when returning all telephones when service is discontinued.

Excluded from the Pick-a-Phone program are wall, panel, and multi-button telephones. The program does not alter monthly telephone rates for residential customers.

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
