

## Maine Township plans "Operation Child-Find"

The Maine Township Special Education Program (M.T.S.E.P.) is launching Operation Child-Find for the month of August. The main thrust of the program is to locate and serve all eligible school age children, ages 3 to 21, with special needs. This may include students who are visually handicapped, hard of hearing, specific learning disabled, orthopedically impaired, deaf, speech impaired, behavior disordered, mentally retarded, and multi-handicapped. One of the important activities of the Child-Find is the establishment of a hot line (823-5639) for use by anyone who has questions regarding students who have special needs that are not being met in school.

E. Gaydon Brandt, Director of M.T.S.E.P., states that an eleven-member Child-Find Committee has been established to pursue this venture. The committee members cover a wide range of educational specialists: special educators, social worker, school psychologist, speech correctionist, and physical therapist. This group of professionals will be going into the community to introduce the services offered by M.T.S.E.P. for students residing in school districts #62, #63, #64 and #207.

"First, we are looking for children who simply are not attending any school," states Mr. Brandt. "We feel there may be a few, however, if anyone knows of a person who should be in school

and is not, we would like to help. Next, we are looking for those students already in school, who have a special need that has not yet been brought to our attention". Mr. Brandt urges anyone who wishes more information to contact the committee by dialing 823-5639, the newly established Child-Find hot line.

State and Federal law requires that every handicapped child, ages 3 to 21, receive a free and appropriate education which is individualized and as much like the regular program as possible. The intent of the law is to prevent segregation of handicapped children, but at the same time to assure that special programs and related services are provided when needed. Through a Child-Find Committee, M.T.S.E.P. hopes to reach every child with a special need.

### New record for electricity

Commonwealth Edison Company today reported that its three nuclear stations set a new record for electricity produced during a summer month, when power demands are traditionally high.

Generating nearly 2.9 billion kilowatt-hours in June, the nuclear stations accounted for 51.3 percent of all the electricity used by approximately 8 million northern Illinois consumers served by the utility. The utility's three nuclear stations are Dresden, near Morris, Illinois; Quad Cities, near Cordova, Illinois; and Zion, Illinois.

## Police caution residents on door-to-door salesmen

There are many legitimate door to door salesmen who offer excellent products at reasonable prices. But many are "fast-buck" experts who back glib sales tactics with high-pressure sales tactics and fraudulent promises.

Police Chief Norman Glauner reminds residents that all solicitors must be registered with the village prior to any door to door or street-corner sales.

One example of a sales fraud is the door to door magazine subscription racket that is typically based on misrepresentation and misinformation. In this scheme, traveling magazine crews operate from city to city, soliciting high rate or non-existent magazine subscriptions. These "salesmen" are always selling magazines to "put themselves through college" to "raise funds for a charitable organization", or to "win a trip to Europe".

The same type of fraud is perpetrated over the telephone. Phone crews soliciting magazine subscriptions often begin their sales pitch with statements such as "you have been selected to receive 'free' magazines (with only a nominal fee to cover handling and postage costs)". The solicitor states that the customer will receive the publication for a specified period, such as 24 months, this, and that most people prefer to pay the associated costs on a monthly installment basis. The person who agrees to buy magazines in this manner actually pays a sum far in excess of the normal subscription rate. In many cases, he never receives the publications purchased.

Solicitors will work residential areas without the police department's knowledge. Any time you feel suspicious of a door to door salesman, call the police and verify his authority to solicit. Police Chief Glauner reminds us that if a seller comes to your house without you having asked him to come, and good or services for \$25 or more are sold to you, you have three full business days following the transaction to cancel the sale and get a full refund. You must then return any goods (but not services) that were sold. The three day period within which to cancel the sale does not begin until the seller informs you in writing that you have the right to cancel. Failure to give the refund may be a violation of the Illinois Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Practices Act, enforced by the Illinois Attorney General's Office.

Chief Glauner reminds you to be cautious and call the police or the Attorney General for information or help.

### 15th anniversary

For 14 years, glass tycoon Morrie Kellman, 6929 Kenneth, Lincolnwood, has been chairman of the Little City Pro-Am Invitational Golf Tournament, which raises money for mentally handicapped and blind-retarded children. ## Governor vetoes funds for Oakton

Governor Thompson has vetoed the \$4.5 million approved by the legislature for the permanent campus for Oakton Community College, delaying indefinitely any immediate plans to complete the east wing of the college building.

The funds for completing the east wing, which will include vital laboratories and classrooms, were included in \$111 million which Thompson slashed from the appropriation for the Capital Development Board on July 17. Thompson approved funds totaling \$1,475,900 to construct a

south access road from Golf rd. to the permanent campus building and to pave parking areas to serve 1,600 cars.

Several Board members stated that they will work to override the veto.

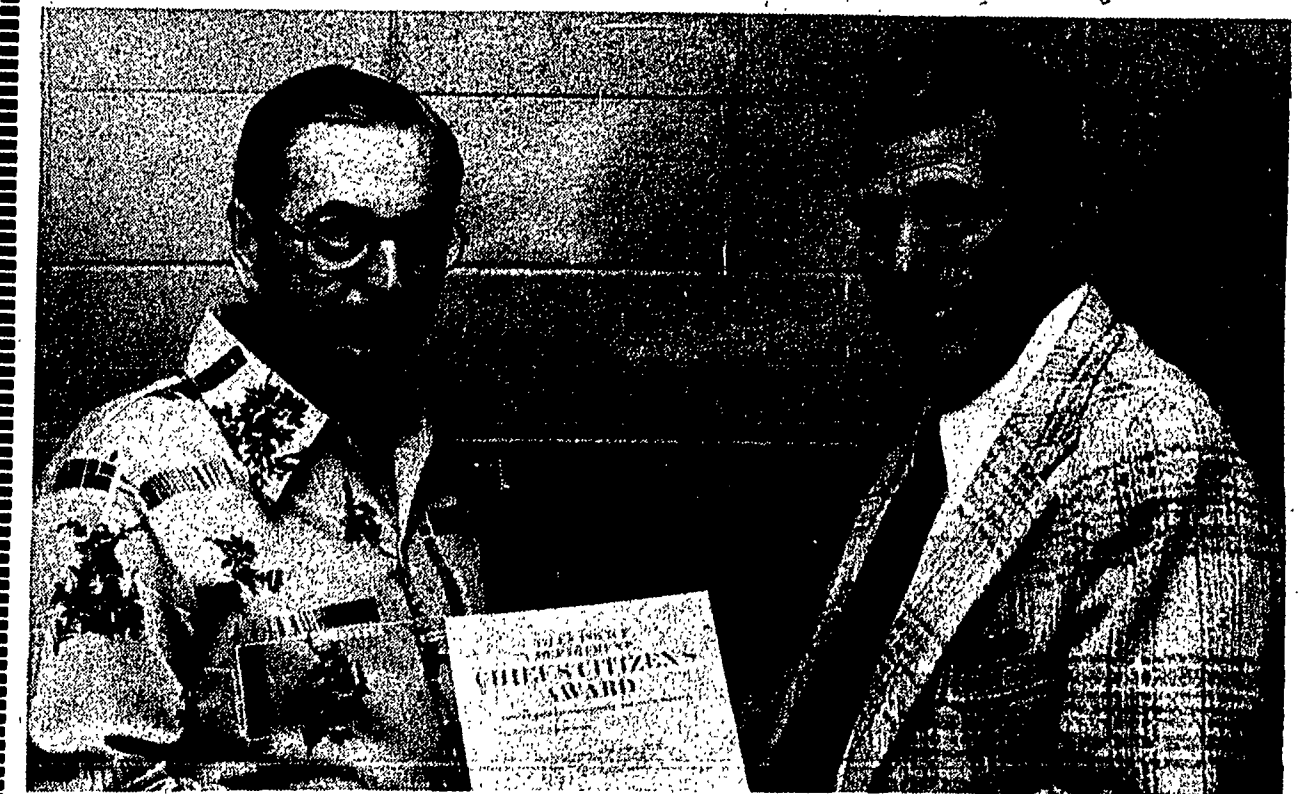
"Although we are glad to have the \$1.5 million to complete Phase I of the Oakton campus, we must try to persuade the legislature to override this veto," Paul Gilson, OCC Trustee and Chairman of the Board Facilities Committee said. "We have worked very hard to

The Pucinski Wall has been permanently erected on Newark ave. Steel metal guardrails have been installed on the Chicago-Niles border and their cement base indicates they will be there permanently. The obstacle is supposed to prevent low-flying cars from dropping down the street. The up-one-day-down-the-next-day blockades were there in the past in a tango-like rhythm which had Niles officials and Pucinski confronting the wisdom of installing such a blockade. Pucinski, who has a political barometer always pointing in the direction of votes under that bushy white hair, has probably won the battle of the barricade for the time being.

Niles Days always creates a mixed bag of opinion after the Days are over. The tremendous amount of work by so many of the same people who have been there through the years is monumental.

Among Niles public officials, there is a strong feeling Niles activities under the big tent are indeed worthwhile. They are not impressed with many of the carry activities.

Niles Days reaps a 30% return on the rides and 100% on the jar games and the food. But there's always a grumble about the outside carry people coming into the area, and many Nilesites are less than enchanted with this phase of the carnival.

This year the raising of the drinking age to 21 resulted in less police activity than in the past. It was reported Niles' finest had less problems this year than in recent years. While too much booze heated young tempers in past years, this year the "over 21" drinkers were relatively calm.

The firm which studied the working of Niles Police Department is now half-way through its study of the Niles Public Works Department. It is expected the report should be completed by Labor Day. The Fire Department will then be scrutinized which will complete the studies of Niles' three departments.

Village Manager Ken Scheel feels there has been progress made as the result of the Police Department studies. Ken said

## Immunization clinics

Parents are urged to make sure that their children are fully immunized against preventable childhood diseases before school begins. The diseases for which children should be immunized are: polio, mumps, rubella, German measles, diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis. Immunization should begin early in life, so that the child is not susceptible to disease any longer than necessary. For example, a series of immunizations for polio and a combination vaccine series for diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis should begin at 2 months of age. Immunization for measles, mumps, rubella should be given at 15 months of age.

Illinois state law requires that all children be adequately protected against the preventable childhood diseases. Schools require that parents present proof of their children's immunization status at the time of registration.

## E.R.A. discussion at Niles Library

E.R.A. Equal Rights Amendment. Those three words have touched off a Constitutional and moral debate in this country paralleling the Civil Rights movement of the Sixties. Introduced several years ago, its prospects for passage seemed bright as state after state passed the motion through their legislatures. Today, though, it is at an impasse, needing three states' approval before it can be added to the Constitution, with the prospects of earning such backing becoming darker as time proceeds toward the March 1979 deadline. Illinois, a state whose early approval might have seemed likely, remains in the negative column, possibly because of its legislative rule requiring a 3/5 majority vote for Constitutional amendments. (The recent votes in the House have seen the measure capture a 50% majority.) With the deadline

threatening to cut the E.R.A.'s jugular for good in seven months, a move is now underway to extend the deadline and keep the issue alive.

What is the E.R.A.? Some call it a long-needed Constitutional statement supporting the equal rights of the sexes. Others call it demagoguery, a move toward drafting women into the military and creating a unisex society.

What is your view? The major polls (Gallup and Harris) say most of the country favors the amendment; indeed, most of the states have ratified it. Where do you stand? A discussion entitled E.R.A.—Yes or no? will be held on Wednesday, August 2 at 10:30 a.m. at the Niles Public Library, 6980 Oakton. It is another in a series of discussions for mothers whose children attend "Storytime" at the Library, but all are invited. Join us.

She has taught the subject at the MONACEP program at Oakton Community College for the past six years and is a frequent lecturer. Perlman also serves as a consultant to individuals and firms and has employed graphology in marriage counseling, children's problems, and in the investigation of document authenticity.

There have been many interesting cases where graphology

has proven itself valuable to criminologists and employers among others. According to Mrs. Perlman, David Grimes, a graphologist working for the F.B.I., was the first to note that several signature gathered during a recent welfare fraud case were all written by the same person - Linda Taylor, Chicago's famed "Welfare Queen" - thereby cracking the case. Even companies are getting into the act, often examining the actual script of an employment application as part of their screening process.

## General Manager at Summertime Lincolnwood Hyatt House in Springfield

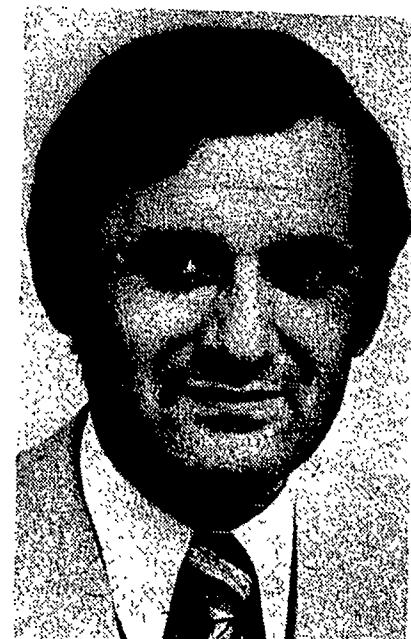

Dreyfuss was born in Frankfurt, Germany. He was a pupil of Ugi Battenberg and later studied under Max Beckmann, the famous German expressionist. Dreyfuss was a prisoner at the

Buchenwald concentration camp. When released, he fled to England and came to the United States in 1941.

During his lifetime, Dreyfuss received many awards. Among them was first prize in the American Jewish Club Show in 1962, and the Donnelly Purchase Prize at the Union League Art Show in 1969. Many of his works were also displayed at the Art Institute, and are in the collections of museums in Frankfurt and Stuttgart, Germany. He also had two one-man shows at First Federal.

have funds appropriated to complete the Oakton campus and the legislature agreed with us. Obviously, Governor Thompson does not agree."

College officials said that until we complete the permanent campus, Oakton will be forced to operate a split-campus operation between the permanent campus and the Interim Campus in Morton Grove. The two campuses are 7 1/2 miles apart.

The current construction will provide space for about 3,600 students. About 6,700 students were enrolled in college-credit courses at Oakton last year with an additional 12,000 attending continuing education classes at locations throughout the district.

The completion of the east wing of the permanent campus building will include such vital laboratory and vocational spaces as the Secretarial Science, Automotive Technology, Machine Technology, Physics, and Electronics laboratories as well as a number of regular classrooms.

Gilson noted that the request for completing this part of the permanent campus had already been passed down considerably from the \$35 million authorized by the Illinois Community College Board (ICCB).

"Current enrollment, applied to the ICCB space needs formula, justified construction of 92,000 square feet. We were only asking for 63,000 square feet," Gilson said. "Future enrollment will undoubtedly increase, but we are not asking for space for these students at this time."

"The Board received positive support at every hearing on our case to complete the permanent campus, including the ICCB, Illinois Board of Higher Education, and both houses of the

state legislature. The Governor vetoed it without checking on the facts," Gilson said.

"We need that space," he added. "The college district doubled in size and population by the annexation of the North Shore. However construction plans were only those requested and authorized before this district growth."
