District 71 schools open Sept. 6

The Niles Elementary Schools, District 71, will open Wednesday, September 6, 1978.

It is asked that parents at the North and South Schools plan to pre-register their children on August 31 or September 1 at the respective schools.

Students at North School will receive individual schedules when they pre-register. All fees will be collected at this time, between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

Parents of children who are new to the district are urged to register their children from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Niles Elementary School, 6335 Touhy ave., before the opening day of school. If this is not possible, they may register students the first day of school at the assigned school.

Children need to bring notebook paper and a pencil. Teachers will send home a list of necessary school supplies. A special bulletin will be sent home with each new student. The purpose of this bulletin is to acquaint the children and parents with the governing

We ask the parents to discuss this bulletin with their children, sign and have the child return it to school.

Lunch will be served in the cafeteria at both schools the first day. The price for the hot lunch will be 60 cents. A half-pint carton of milk is included with each hot lunch. Extra milk may be purchased for 5 cents per carton.

All students in grades 6-7-8 will attend the Niles Elementary School North.

All students in grades K-1-2-3-4-5 will attend Niles Elementary School South.

Suburban residents can also obtain birth certificates from the County Clerk's office in the Maywood Civic Center, 1500 Maybrook dr., Maywood 60153.

The County Clerk's Bureau of Vital Statistics has birth records for Chicago and all of Cook County.

Written requests should include the full name of the child, date of birth, place of birth, father's name and maiden name, of mother. Certified check or money order in the amount of \$3, made payable to County Clerk Stanley T. Kusper, Jr., should accompany each request. Additional copies of certificates are \$2 each if the request accompanies the original order. Certified mail and special delivery requests are processed the day received.

First day of school this year is Sept. 6 in Chicago; however, some schools in the county will be opening as early as August 28.

"Parents would be wise to obtain these needed certificates as soon as possible," Kusper said, "as during the final week of vacation, thousands apply daily."

District 207 plans in event of bus strike

Maine Township High Schools will open on schedule, Tuesday, August 29, whether or not there is a North Suburban Mass Transit District (Nortran) bus strike.

Announcement of the decision to open the district's four high schools on time was made by Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent of School District 207 on Monday, August 21.

He said: "Although Nortran bus drivers have not acted as yet on their Wednesday, August 16 vote to strike, the school must be prepared in the event a strike would be called any time."

"Nortran officials report that 5,250 of our students ride their buses to and from school. That number of students having to find alternate means of transportation

could represent a serious traffic problem in and around the four schools," he continued.

"School officials have been in close contact with police concerning traffic control and monitoring and we expect local police to be in the streets and at critical intersections to assist during arrival and departure times," he added.

"We are asking for parent cooperation, as well," Dr. Short said. "Specifically, we ask that students and parents do the following:

1. Arrange for car pools and exercise great caution by driving safely, especially near the schools.
2. Anyone driving to school should leave 30 minutes earlier than usual because of the

probability of traffic congestion.
3. Drivers should plan to drop off their passengers two or three blocks away from the school and pick the student up at the same pre-arranged place.
4. Those who live in walking distance should walk or use bicycles so that we reduce the number of automobiles near the

Niles rate lowest among surrounding suburbs

Niles ok's tax levy ordinance

The Niles Village Board at the Aug. 22 meeting approved a tax levy ordinance totaling \$1,389,688 for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1978 to April 30, 1979.

Village Manager Ken Scheel noted "no abatement necessary this year because bond issues floated in 1963 and 1967 have been paid off."

The following figures were given to the board in a summary of the 1978 tax levy of \$1,389,688: General Corporate Fund, \$500,000; Street and Bridge Fund, \$32,000; Police Pension Fund, \$240,000; Fireman Pension Fund, \$250,000; Social Security and

Municipal Retirement Fund, \$336,000; and General Obligation Bond Fund, \$31,688.

Tax levy figures were based on an estimated total assessed valuation of \$393 million with a Niles population of 32,342.

The village manager noted "taxes have been kept low in Niles," pointing out with its current tax rate of .411 per \$100 assessed valuation, the village is one of the lowest among the surrounding suburbs.

The 1977 real estate taxes for surrounding municipalities were listed as follows: Evanston (pop. Continued on Page 24

Niles Library Board commissioner Marty Hodes told us Tuesday the deficit in the district could be eliminated in 2 years by holding expenses down.

Last week our reporter, Roseann Dalmaso, wrote the library district has a total deficit of \$141,471.76 for the period from 1976-1978.

Marty said the Board in past years approved \$210,000 in expenditures for land alongside the present building, as well as money used for paving the new parking lot and also for a new roof. This money came from the general fund without seeking any tax boost from residents. He felt these costs resulted in the present deficit.

Hodes said the library district now collects \$575,000 from taxes. He said the 15 mills tax is presently at its maximum with an assessed valuation in the total district of \$385,000,000. The total budget is \$1,021,000.

Salaries for the full-time staff have been increased from \$500 to \$1,500 effective July 1. Hodes said these increases should place the Niles Library district on a salary par with neighboring districts of a similar size. He admitted salaries in Skokie and Evanston could not be matched by Niles' smaller district.

In tightening belts Marty said personnel lost by attrition are not likely to be replaced.

Summing up the last important financial news from the district, attorney Jim Orphan should be commended for his successful suit barring Glenview from taking over the Zenith property north of Niles for the next 10 years. Jim's efforts will result in the district receiving \$10,000 to \$15,000 annually for the next 10 years. After that period Glenview will take over the

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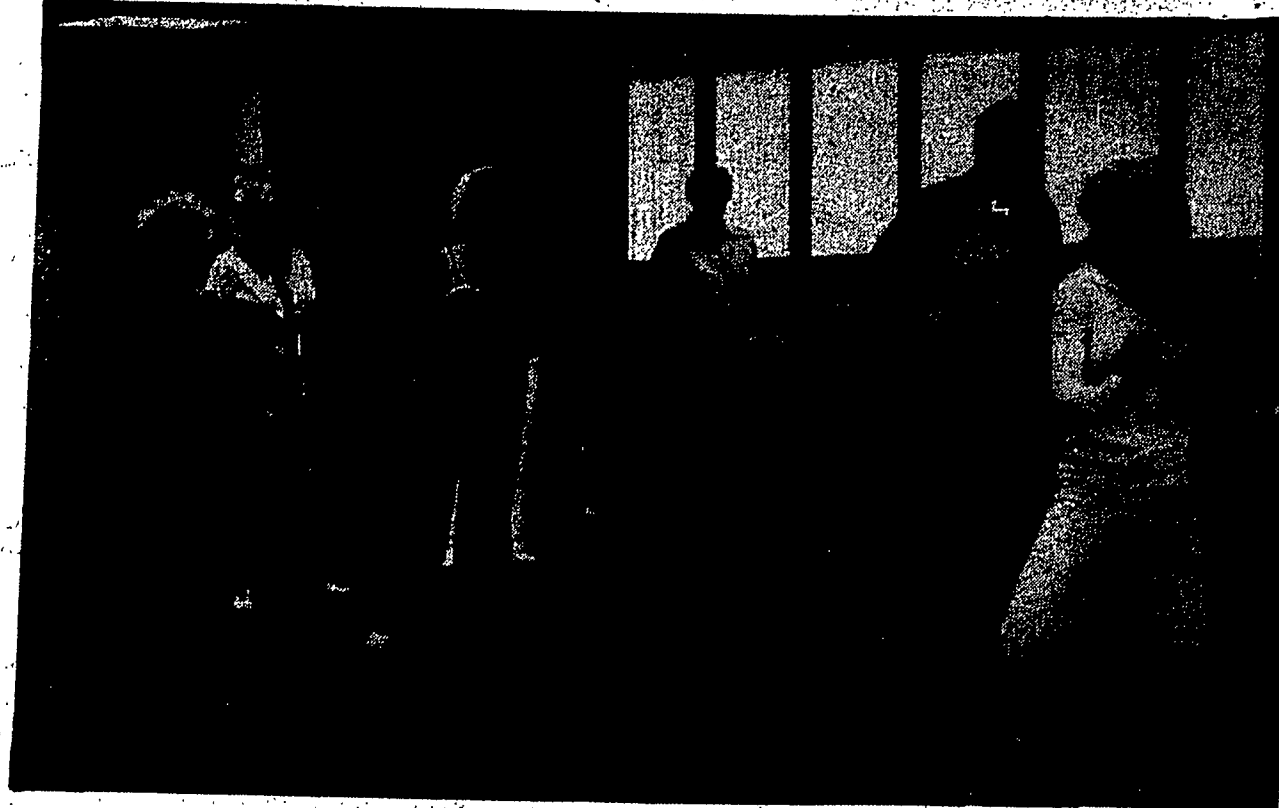

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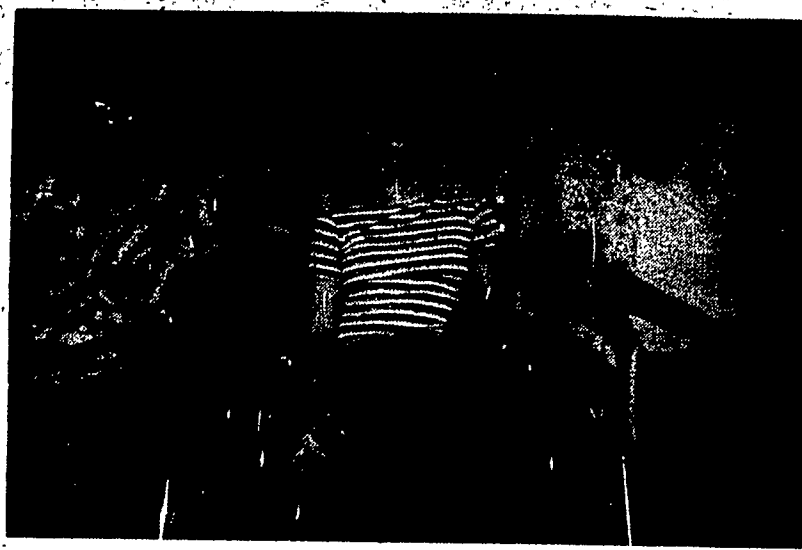

Armed robber takes \$1,973 from store manager

Approximately \$1,973 in cash and checks was stolen Saturday August 12 from a Glenview store manager attempting to make a night deposit at a drive-in bank, by a pistol-wielding gunman according to Niles police.

Jack Semens, manager of the Playback, 2864 Golf, told police that a 6 ft. tall, white male in his early 20's approached him around 5:30 p.m. when he drove his car up to the night depository of the Golf Mill State Bank at 9101 Greenwood.

He said the gunman pointed a small blue steel automatic covered with a manila envelope and told Semens to "Get out of your car, leave the keys and start walking or I will blow your head off."

Semens told police the Saturday

night deposit of \$1,950 in cash and \$23 in personal checks made out to the store were in the car.

The victim began walking north and the robber entered the car shouting to the manager to walk "faster" then drove south on Greenwood.

Approximately 15 minutes later Cook County Sheriff's Police Sgt. Star recovered the victim's 1977 Chevrolet Camaro at Lincoln ave. and Davis st. in Des Plaines. A witness said an older model white convertible containing another man and a woman were waiting for the gunman where he left the stolen car. All three fled the area northbound on Lincoln.

Police said they were able to obtain identifiable prints from the Camaro which was later returned to its owner at the scene.

To bee or not to bee

A Morton Grove photographer who is an amateur bee keeper was requested August 20 to remove an angry swarm of wasps nesting in the back yard tree of a home in Morton Grove.

Former 8-year resident of Niles, Peter Samorez, 43, said he was watching TV in his home Sunday night when he received a phone call from the Morton Grove Fire Dept.

One of their residents said the firemen needed assistance in removing a nest of wasps.

Samorez said he went to look over the situation and told the anxious homeowner he would return after dark. "The wasps come home for the night," he explained, and would be contained within the nest.

He returned later with a protective face veil and gloves and while numerous spectators watched at a respective distance, he placed a plastic bag over the foot long, grayish nest containing a "full house" of wasps, and suffocated them in a sealed box.

By request the nest and contents were returned to the homeowner for his child's "Show and Tell" class.

Samorez said the Polistes Annularis, a black wasp which builds nests outdoors, are known as "black-faced hornets."

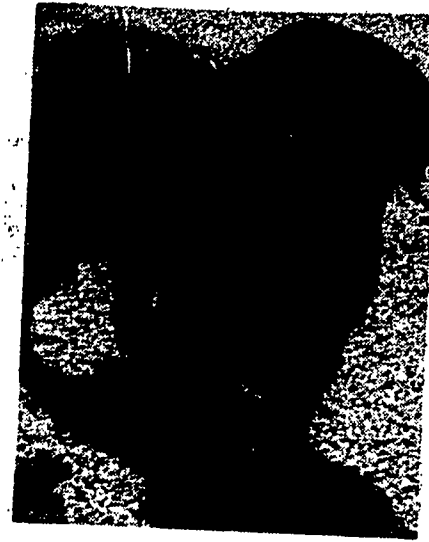
Oak Mill Mall Save-A-Pet Adoption Show

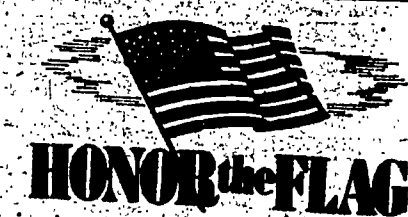

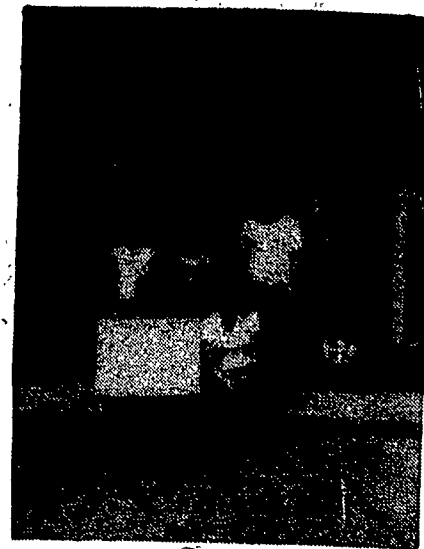

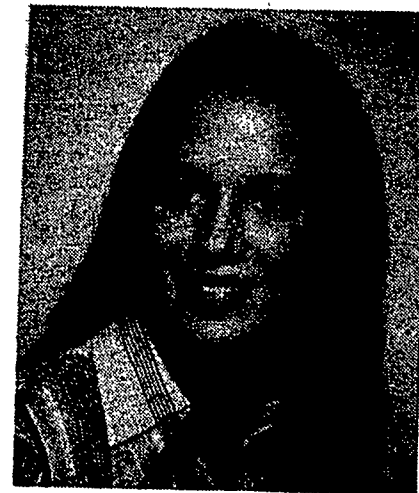

Knights of Columbus launch Tootsie Roll campaign

Illinois Knights of Columbus will launch their ninth annual Tootsie Roll campaign in behalf of the mentally retarded on the weekend of Nov. 3-4 throughout the state.

Robert J. Defenbaugh of Watseka and Gus Sundermeier of Oak Lawn, co-chairing the annual fund-raising effort, have set their sights on a goal of \$750,000, approximately 10 percent greater than the record \$685,000 grossed in last year's drive.

Neither chairman feels the goal is overly optimistic because most of the money collected during the two-day drive is donated by the Knights to sheltered workshops, special schools, associations and mentally retarded organizations in the particular community where it was solicited.

Since the campaign for the mentally retarded was initiated back in 1970, gross receipts from the program have realized over \$4 million.

Under the terms of the K of C program, 10 percent of the gross collected each year is placed in a K of C State Fund which is used to provide support for a major mentally retarded project. Handling of the funds is governed by guidelines set up in compliance with the Internal Revenue Service and the Knight's national headquarters in New Haven.

In recent years the Knights have been sponsoring a leadmobile manned by technicians from the Illinois Association for

Retarded Citizens. The mobile laboratory travels around the state testing young children free of charge for lead they may have ingested into their systems.

Hundreds of youngsters who might well have suffered organic damage or irreversible brain damage from the effects of lead poisoning were detected by the testing lab on wheels and treated by local physicians and/or hospitals.

The candy product used in "selling" the programs, plus very minimal promotional costs of the participating councils, are about the only expenses deducted. All of the contributions from the candy sales are placed in a charitable trust and donated to community mentally retarded organizations.

Both Governor James Thompson and Mayor Michael A. Bilandic of Chicago have signed proclamations setting aside Nov. 3-4 as "Knights of Columbus days for the Retarded." Scores of other municipal and county leaders are expected to follow the example.

Many will recall seeing the Knights and volunteer workers from fraternal, schools, and mentally retarded organizations in nearly every town, city and hamlet wearing the "K of C Help Retarded Children" yellow jackets and flashing the canister shaped like a mammoth Tootsie Roll, the product distributed with each donation.

Last year 244 of the 277 Knights of Columbus councils or lodges in Illinois took part in the weekend drive. Some 38 other states are holding annual mentally retarded campaigns during the year modeled after the successful Illinois operation.

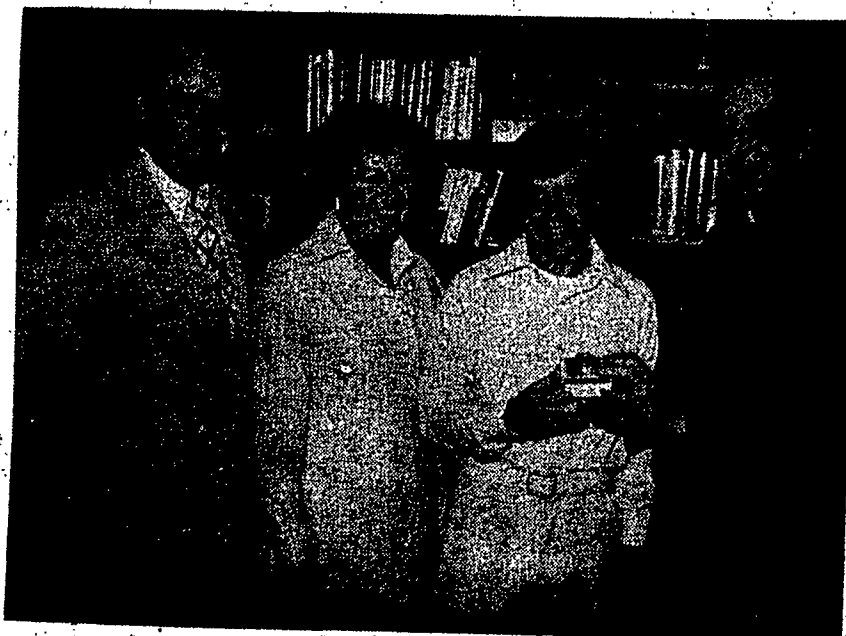
An urgent appeal for substitute teachers for work in the three Niles Township High Schools, Niles East, West, and North, has been made by District Personnel Director, Ray Tyler.

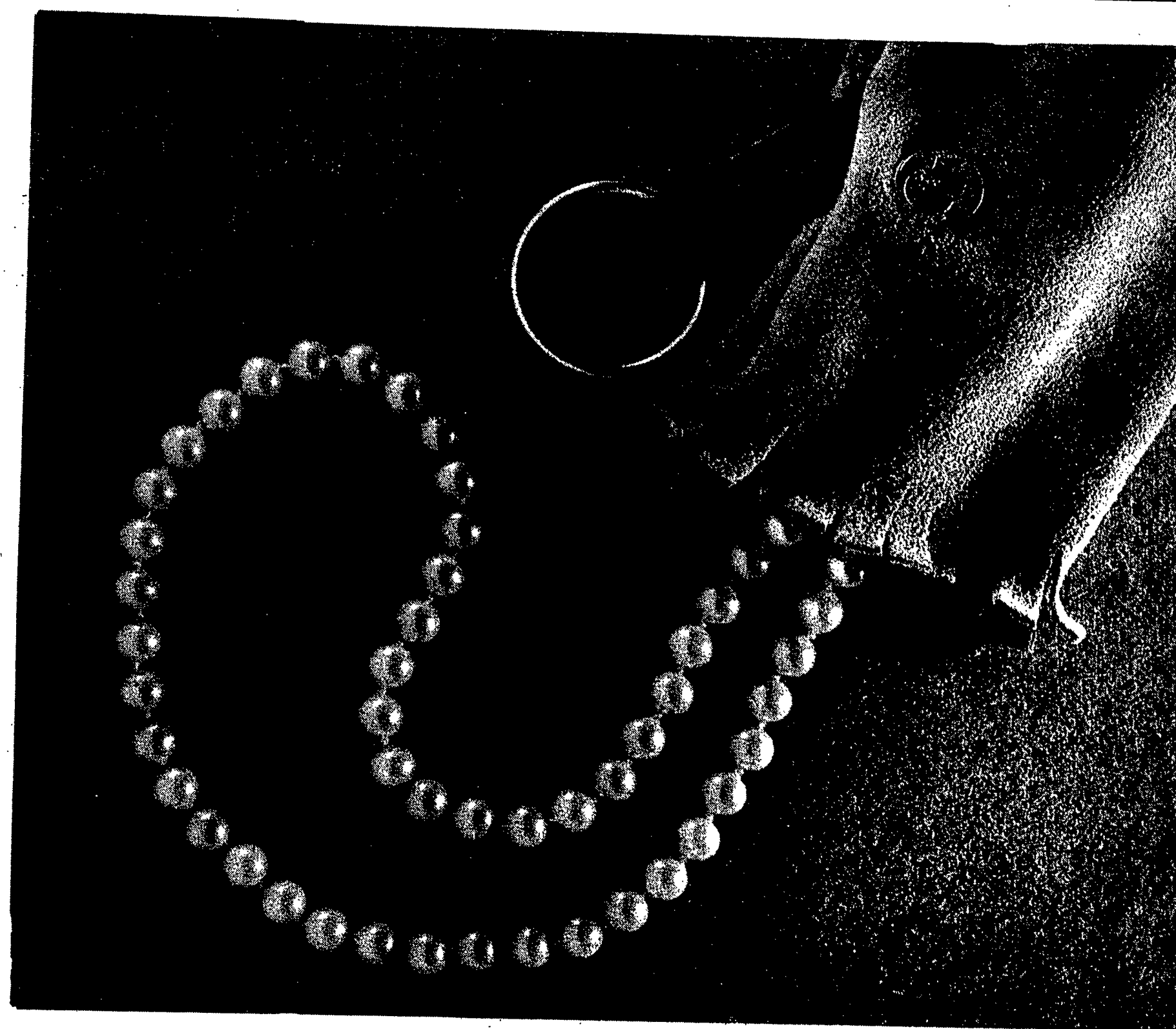
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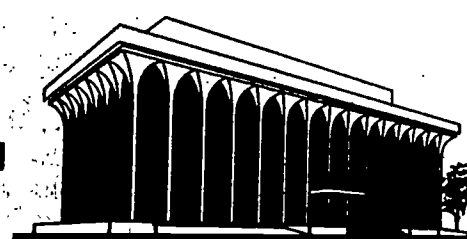

"A Smiling Christ"



The man responsible for the story prefers to remain anonymous. He now lives in Des Plaines, but once he was a prison guard for many years. The jail, in which he worked, was Raiford, the Florida State prison.

THIS TRUE, inside-story concerns a convict in this prison. He is a 'lifer', convicted of a capital crime. He is a man 'nobody knows'. His name is just a number, 26752. Even his name in the prison records is believed to be an alias. He is known only as the 'old-timer'. That's what everyone, including the warden calls him.

According to the ex-guard, the 'old-timer', when he first came to prison as a young man, was a rough, tough, incorrigible character. He had also been a confirmed alcoholic. In the early days of his incarceration he was unruly and became involved in several prison brawls.

It was observed, too, by prison authorities and inmates alike that he never had visitors. He never posted or received mail.

"He was a loner's loner," the ex-guard said, "kept to himself—even shunned other cons."

THERE WAS an air of mystery about him that increased rather than diminished as time went by. And then one day, after he had calmed down for years, it happened.

Unaided, he attempted a lone 'break'. His escape failed. But during his 'break' he put up such a fierce fight for freedom, he slugged the ex-guard, almost shattering his jaw.

Clubbbed almost insensible, the 'old-timer' was tossed into solitary confinement. Later, when returned to his cell he discovered the guard he had slugged was assigned to his cell block.

Weeks passed without incident. One day the 'old-timer' called to the guard. "Here," he said, "this is for you." He thrust a paper thru the bars.

SUSPICIOUSLY, the guard took the paper. His eyes bulged with amazement. It was a pencil sketch of the face of the Savior smiling. The picture was titled "A Smiling Christ."

The guard, himself an amateur artist, was thunderstruck both by the unusual subject and the magnificence of the craftsman-ship. The only a pencil sketch, it was worthy of a Michael Angelo or Da Vinci.

"He told me nothing of himself except that he was once an artist," the ex-guard said. "But he told me a strange story and requested an even stranger favor."

According to the ex-guard, the 'old-timer', while in a semi-conscious state in solitary, claimed he had a dream or vision in which Christ appeared for a brief fleeting moment. "It was not the Christ of sorrow as portrayed by all artists thru the ages—but a smiling Christ, insisted the 'old-timer'."

"This dream or hallucination of the fleeting image so impressed him," explained the ex-guard, "that he actually begged me to help him obtain materials so he could capture it on canvas."

The guard, finally impressed by the man's sincerity and artistic talent, did, in time, with the aid of the warden (a man named Chapman) provide the 'old-timer' with materials to start pursuit of his strange quest.

For many years the 'old-timer' has been painting portraits of Christ smiling. Recently, his four-hundredth painting was completed. All the paintings are the same, depicting in brilliant colors, a smiling Christ. The artist is never satisfied that he has caught precisely the exact image of the dream smile. He says "I shall try again."

ART MUSEUMS, galleries, critics and affluent laymen the world over have offered large sums to the 'old-timer' for his paintings of 'A Smiling Christ'. He steadfastly refuses all offers. Instead, he has given away all of his 400 paintings to churches of all denominations, here and abroad, missions, worthy individuals, and a few to Alcoholics Anonymous.

Since people have seen his paintings or heard about him, he has been besieged with offers for his works. Currently, the list exceeds 15,000 requests. But the 'old-timer' still refuses to accept any payment. He occasionally paints a few Florida landscape scenes to secure funds for art materials to continue his strange quest, but that is all.

Not too long ago, Warden Chapman had this to say about the 'old-timer': "Whatever happened, this inmate became a changed person. The mounting mail which comes to Raiford, from people who have heard of him or seen his paintings, is evidence of the truly great contribution this lone man has made to the cause of Christianity. Even attendance at religious services here at Raiford has increased because of his great work."

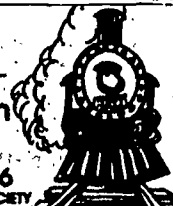
When asked why he doesn't sign his paintings, the 'old-timer' replies, "I don't want people to know me—I want them to know Him, as He really is—"A Smiling Christ."

I wrote the above story many, many years ago. The 'old-timer' was pardoned. He's alive and well and now living in Niles.

Fall gardens popular

Tom Mendelson, Manager of Lake-Cook Farm & Garden Store at 997 Lee st., Des Plaines states that an increasing number of people are planting fall gardens.

"Planting of certain vegetable can go on from early August through early September. The homeowner can then enjoy a harvest of fresh greens and other vegetables until frost — and sometimes after," the farm store manager stated.

Gardeners are encouraged to plant vegetables such as early radishes, lettuce, endive, kale, beans, cress, mustard, onion sets, peas, spinach and turnips and strongly recommended Chinese Cabbage which offers greens for salads and cooking even after several frosts.

He urged gardeners to hold some onion sets they will purchase next spring for fall planting to again have green table onions in a few weeks. It is impossible for garden centers to carry the supply for fall in quantity. Warm soils make for quick germination; weed and insect problems are reduced, so this makes the fall garden a real pleasure. Use of composted cattle manure will hasten quick response.

It was suggested that if one errs in planting too late — no problem as only a few cents worth of seed is lost. If frost is late, one may enjoy a fine harvest. Worth the gamble.

Mendelson offered free bulletins on fall gardens to any novice or experienced gardeners. "We are pleased to be able to help our gardeners. Many have not only helped balance the food budget, but found a whole new happy dimension to their lives."

property. But Jim's bonanza may be worth even more money to the district. The very valuable Milwaukee ave. land east of the Zenith property is likely to be developed soon which would add still more revenue to the district.

What's happening down at Niles library is a taxing district which has never been scrutinized by the public is finally falling under the public aegis. New board members are challenging former policies. A new librarian is instituting new methods. And this newspaper is reporting to the people who pay the bills what is happening with their hard-earned tax dollars. It all bodes well for the entire district.

The three new board members have been somewhat abrasive in their challenge to the older members. And while we sort of winced at the initial confrontations, the long-term effect of the clashes between the two forces bears well for everyone.

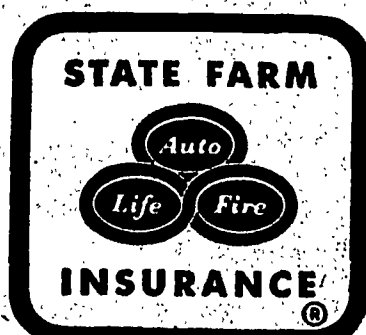
No public body should be allowed to act in a vacuum. No matter how well intended, the lack of competition between board members in presenting contrasting ideas is a hindrance to progress. Likewise, when there is not reporting of the doings of a public body, a very important element in the democratic process is lost. It's essential the public must be made aware of public doings and must react to these activities.

Lastly, even though taxpayers are seeking relief from tax spending, we're not sure Niles Library District might not be justified in seeking a tax increase. While this newspaper alone opposed the referendum for purchasing the Milwaukee ave. library building, we do believe a low-salaried poor-book-collection district might need more tax monies to improve its basic operation. If the board can prove the district is operating with maximum economy and efficiency and still having money problems, it might be prudent for the board to seek more money from taxpayers.

In Niles the village and park districts seem to be moving along well without money problems. And school districts, while facing cut-backs, still spend about 70% of our taxbills for educating our children. It follows if all other taxing districts are not operating by minimizing services, certainly the library district deserves the same support as these other districts.

While the operation of separate districts may be preferable to many, the incongruity of a village with huge revenues and probably the best services in the area, while other districts within the village are straining for more money, cries out for a solution. In Morton Grove the library district is part of the village district and perhaps Niles should have considered running the library district when it first was created.

There are no solutions in this column. For you who pay the bills, this column seeks to inform you and perhaps may jostle you into taking more interest in your community. It's your money. You work hard for it and it should be spent in your best interests.

79,808) \$2,093; Wilmette (32,100) \$1,685; Hoffman Estates (33,587) \$1,623; Mt. Prospect (46,525) \$1,533; Skokie (68,627) \$1,500; Northfield (5,010) \$1,251; Northbrook (27,927) \$1,025; Rolling Meadows (19,785) \$1,023; Glenview (29,370) .940; Park Ridge (43,411) .902; Morton Grove (26,954) .900; Wheeling (18,032) .851; Des Plaines (57,462) .785; Elk Grove (24,516) .737; Lincolnwood (13,546) .603; and Niles (32,432) .411.

Lincolnwood was noted above Niles in taxes "even the Lincolnwood does not even have a fire department," according to Scheel.

Tax rates are based on \$100 of assessed valuation.

In a press conference held last Friday, Scheel said "The whole game is productivity. You have to keep the staff down so the salaries stay down. This reduces the budget which in turn keeps the tax levy down. If we can keep doing this, we consider ourselves successful."

According to the village manager, "Skokie has more sales tax revenue from Old Orchard Shopping Center than Niles does from Golf Mill and yet Skokie's tax rate per \$100 assessed valuation is \$1.50 compared to Niles 41¢. He further stated, "It's not where you get the money, it's what you do with it. We're looking for output."

In closing, Scheel added, Proposition 13 does not scare me. I feel we have been at Proposition 13 since I've been village manager and I'm now in my 11th year as Village Manager of Niles."

Colorectal cancer, which the test may identify, is the second most common cancer; over 101,000 cases are diagnosed annually. It affects both men and women equally, and is more common in people over 40 years old.

The Hemocult kits are available from the Morton Grove Health department for \$1.25 each. The kit contains slides and instructions for diet and preparation of slides. Individuals taking the test must follow a high-fiber meatless diet for the duration of the test.

Test results will be returned within ten-days of the completed test being received by the health department.
