## Niles Family Service Day Proclamation

Gov. James R. Thompson signed a proclamation this morning in Springfield, declaring Dec. 1, 1978 as Family Service Day in Illinois.

In commenting on the proclamation Gov. Thompson said, "The work that the Family Service Associations are doing in Illinois remain a major contribution to the American

tradition - citizens helping each other in times of need."

The proclamation was offered by Rep. Clarence Darrow and adopted by the House of Representatives on June 2, 1978.

Rodney St. Clair, president of the Illinois Association of Family Service agencies, said, as he witnessed the signing of the proclamation, "Many of the

member agencies now serving the public in local communities have been doing this work since 1837."

Each Family Service Association in Illinois is a private agency founded by citizens who joined together to help their neighbors in time of need. Family Service agencies throughout the state are still being operated by

citizens who volunteer as Board of Directors to make policy and determine the business of each local agency.

Early in the history of Family Service agencies, help to people was tangible in nature, such as food, shelter, clothing and sometimes money to, disaster stricken families.

In more recent times people

look to Family Service agencies for assistance in many other specialized ways. They request help with family problems that are marriage, parent-child related or youth related as well as problems of the elderly.

Family Service Agencies have played a vital role in bringing to public awareness such issues as

## From the LEFT HAND

In this week's "Letter to the Editor" column, a writer takes off after Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson and the department hierarchy.

The letter is prompted by the resignation of Niles' fifth policeperson in the past two years. We use the term "policeperson", a very neutral (and neuter) term, because the fifth resignation came from Nan Mele, Niles' only lady cop. Nan left the department and went to work for a management firm. Obviously, she felt the future in Niles Police Department was less than the potential she'll have in the private sector.

We emphasize Nan was a "lady" cop which may have been the reason for her leaving. Some months ago the boys in the department decided to play a prank on her, presenting her with a lewd gift which caused repercussions down at the old station house. Her demanding an apology for the puerile joke led to the suspension of the cop who was in charge of the shift when the incident occurred. He got a bit stiff-necked and refused to properly admit his misgivings for the action.

In retrospect, it could be mentioned Nan's days were numbered. An addendum to the dress code was added which required all police persons wear a tee shirt under their outer shirts. We were told it was aimed at hiding those hirsute male chests. Later, strict hair cut restrictions were endorsed which might have been in conflict with a reasonable decorum for a woman. Whatever these little flicks of discontent, Niles has lost another good cop.

Five cops have now left the department. We can rightfully report at least three of the five have gone by way of the chopping block.

The past year Niles hired a management firm which recommended several changes in the department. Since it required outside help to tell public officials what's wrong inside their village, we're wondering when Niles' village president and trustees are going to assert their proper roles and stop the nonsense in the police department? This chapter in Niles' history is not a compliment, neither to the men who have been involved in the department, nor to the public of

During the public discussion part of the meeting, District 63 resident and out-of-district school teacher Claire Orth read a long statement regarding the use of SRI in the district. The company was originally hired to help the board select a superintendent.

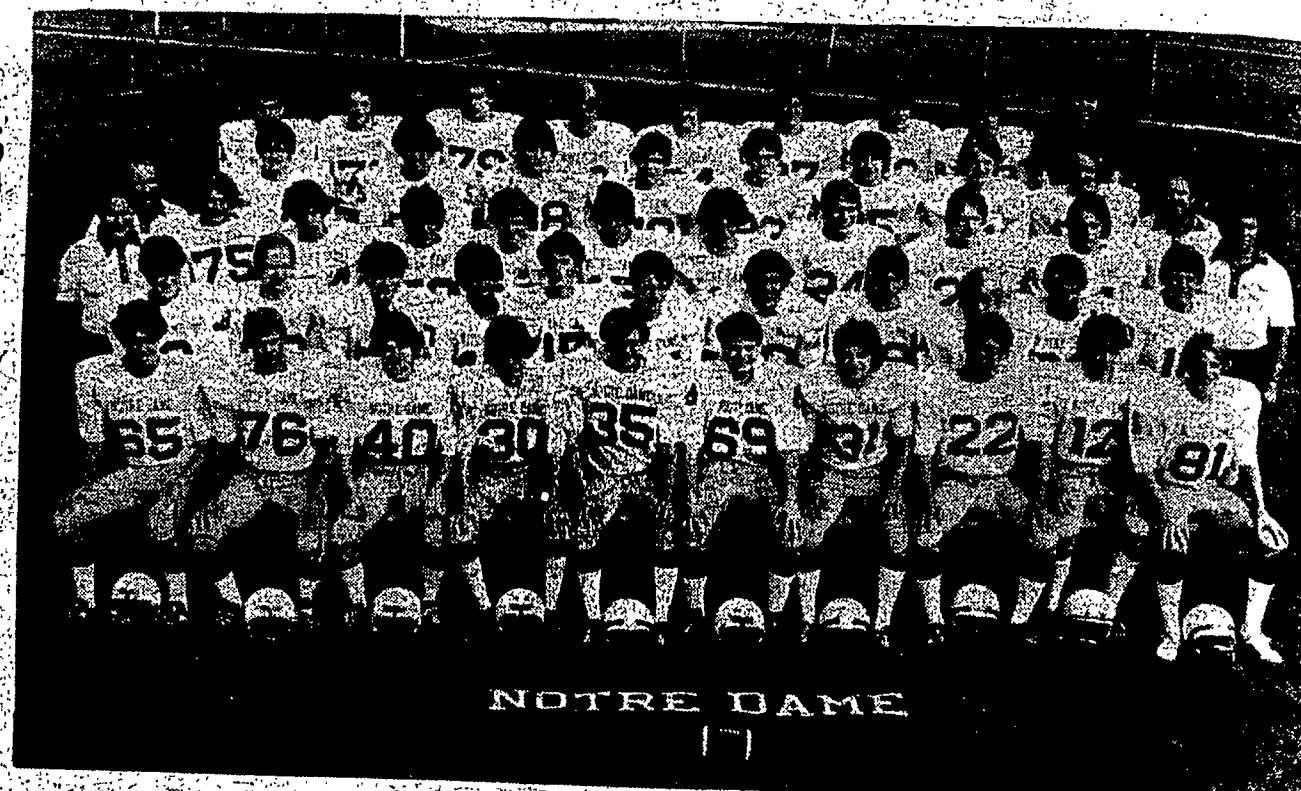
## Girls' Bowling club

## Plea issued for clear glass bottles

George Bradbec, Manager of the Niles Township High Schools' solid waste reclamation program, has issued an urgent appeal to all residents of Niles Township and surrounding areas to participate in a glass drive to be conducted at the Recycling Center, located behind Niles West High School football stadium (7929 Austin ave., Skokie). The drive will be held the entire month of December in an effort to further promote the re-use of recyclable glass containers.

Recently the glass industry has been experiencing critical shortages of soda ash, one of the three basic chemicals used in the manufacturing of all forms of glass. During the last few years, several soda ash-producing facilities have been forced to close because of their inability to operate economically and within the guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency.

Glass industry officials have noted that by increasing the use of old containers (by recycling your glass), less soda ash is required since it is already present in the old bottles.

During the past seven years, the Center has processed more than 1,200 tons of reclaimable glass which would otherwise have been sent to a landfill. The glass industry now estimates that, with a large volume of recycled glass, recycling may be more economical.

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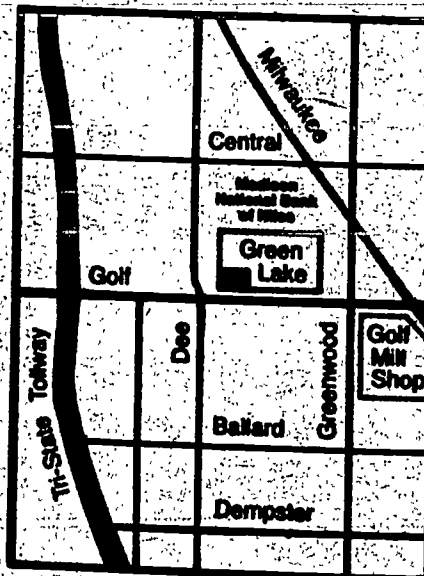

This honor recognizes each student's outstanding performance on the preliminary scholastic aptitude test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test which was administered nationwide to high school juniors in October 1977. A total of almost 35,000 commended students throughout the United States are being honored by the National Merit Scholarship Corp.; students in this group represent the top 5 per cent of more than one million participants in the Merit program. Although commended students scored slightly below the level required for Merit Program participants who were named semifinalists and who will continue in the competition for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1979, each commended student has demonstrated exceptional academic promise.

## LGH diabetes screening reveals suspected cases

Twenty-seven out of 425 persons who recently received free diabetes tests at Lutheran General Hospital's Ambulatory Care Center were found to have abnormal test results. These persons, who represent 6% of those tested, were advised to see their physician as soon as possible for further evaluation.

If it is determined that the person has diabetes, he or she can immediately begin to get the disease under control and continue leading a normal life. According to Richard Balasa, M.D., medical director of biochemistry at Lutheran General, "Diabetes is a common disease. While one-to-two percent of the population has been diagnosed as having it, it's estimated that an equal number remain undiagnosed. Diabetes is also a potentially serious disease. If untreated, it may lead to complications such as blindness, kidney disease, hardening of the arteries, stroke or coma. Because effective methods of treatment are available, early diagnosis becomes important. A very effective means of early detection is mass screening combined with careful followup of persons whose lab findings suggest the disease."

Dr. Balasa points out, however, that "Not everyone with an abnormal finding actually has diabetes. Only further studies by a qualified physician can determine this."

The diabetes testing took place during National Diabetes Detection Week, Nov. 5-11. Lutheran General was one of 90 Chicago area hospitals to participate in the screening effort sponsored by the American Diabetes

Association. Blood tests were drawn by hospital lab technicians at the Ambulatory Care Center, 1775 W. Ballard, Park Ridge.

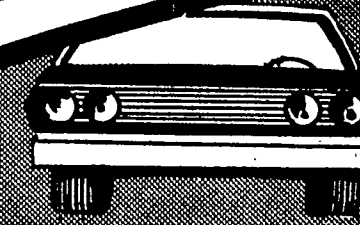

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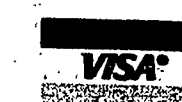
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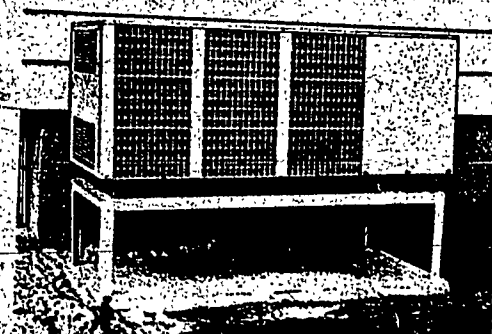

Ms. Orth questioned the competency of the company noting it is a conglomerate which owns nursing homes and is in the fertilizer business, and suggested the company's credentials in the education field are difficult to assess.

The hour-long debate was centered around the company's Perceiver program. It is a taped interview method which the company recommends, both in the hiring of teachers and substitute teachers, in aiding in communications with staff teachers and in trying to communicate with students.

The method questioned by Ms. Orth and several audience participants questioned the competency of the interviews and deplored the psychological implications of questions which some felt did not come from qualified interviewers. They also deplored the invasion of students' and teachers' privacy by asking questions which Orth felt were none of the teachers' or school district's business. One alleged student question was what they privately thought about, implying the invasion of their private thoughts was beyond the relationship of teachers and their students. Similarly, a substitute teacher mentioned questions were asked which she felt had no relevancy in determining the qualifications of a teacher to teach.

Ms. Orth concluded the taped interview program is an inconclusive program based on hypothesis, a program which has never been substantiated by being published in educational journals. Superintendent Moe said the method is one tool used in the district. In the case of student interviews, they are only done with the approval of parents. One school teacher, Ilene Carlson, said she took the Perceiver program and said it was not a negative but a positive experience, certainly not threatening, but rather helping her "know her strengths".

School board member Mark Davis questioned Orth's sincerity contending the "board and superintendent should have been made aware of their concern, rather than have the matter presented without preparing the board to answer the rather complex matter. Davis also noted the newspapers were contacted to attend the meeting implying the effort was staged to make the board look bad.

In the long convoluted discussions which followed, Superintendent Moe said the closing of schools has resulted in "you're taking it out in many ways". He left little doubt the new harangue was merely a ploy to get back at the school board because of its closing of two schools the past year. Interestingly, the supporters of Ms. Orth's point of view included many of the activists involved in fighting the school closings.

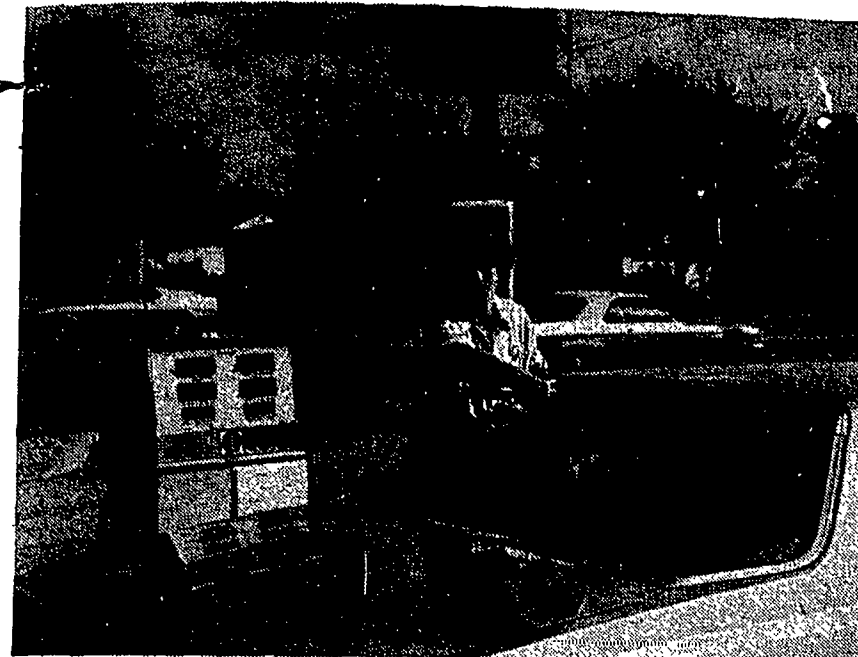
Moe cited the great progress the district has made in the last 13 months including the closing of 2 schools, the savings of \$200,000 yearly, the reduction of teachers and emphasized there has been no grievances lodged against the district during this period.

While Ms. Orth said she represented many people in the district, when she was challenged to name the group she refused contending it was not necessary. But intermittent applause indicated many of the residents involved in opposing school closings were in the front line in encouraging her presentation. Ann Sostrin, a Morton Grove resident who has been unsuccessful in two tries at gaining a seat on the school board, sided with Orth contending the money spent on the program is not important but the implications of the interviews are dangerous. She cited psychologists who seemed to back-up her point of view.

Two former school board members, both of whom were at the center of past years' acrimony, were also present applauding Orth's point of view.

Taping interviews of students and teachers may have been a genuine concern of some of the people present. But former board members who helped create chaos in the district and have been shunted aside, and very angry parents who resent school closings, seemed to be at the center of the storm Tuesday night - a storm of their own making. They seemed like artificial rainmakers, whose rainclouds are likely to blow away as soon as they can change the weather vane in the direction of still another storm.

## Plates to be sold starting Dec. 1

License plates for Illinois autos will be sold at all offices of Cragin Federal Savings, beginning Friday, Dec. 1. To obtain plates, car owners should bring in their pre-printed registration forms sent by the Secretary of State's office earlier in the year.

Same-day service will be provided at Cragin's home office at 5200 W. Fullerton, Chicago, while branch offices will have plates available within three days. Cragin will charge a \$1 service fee, payable in cash, for processing applications. Custom-

made license plate frames will be available for \$1.25.

Cragin will sell "short option" plates being offered in conjunction with the new staggered registration system run by the Secretary of State's offices.

These are plates which expire in either September, October or November of 1979. In the staggered registration program, expiration dates and fees are determined by the last two digits of the 1978 license and may not be altered.

According to the Secretary of State's office, the blue and white plates are to last five years, with a sticker attached to the rear plate showing the latest expiration date. With the staggered registration dates, car owners will no longer have to change plates during the winter months.

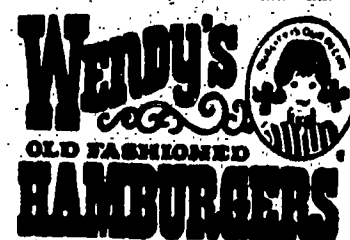

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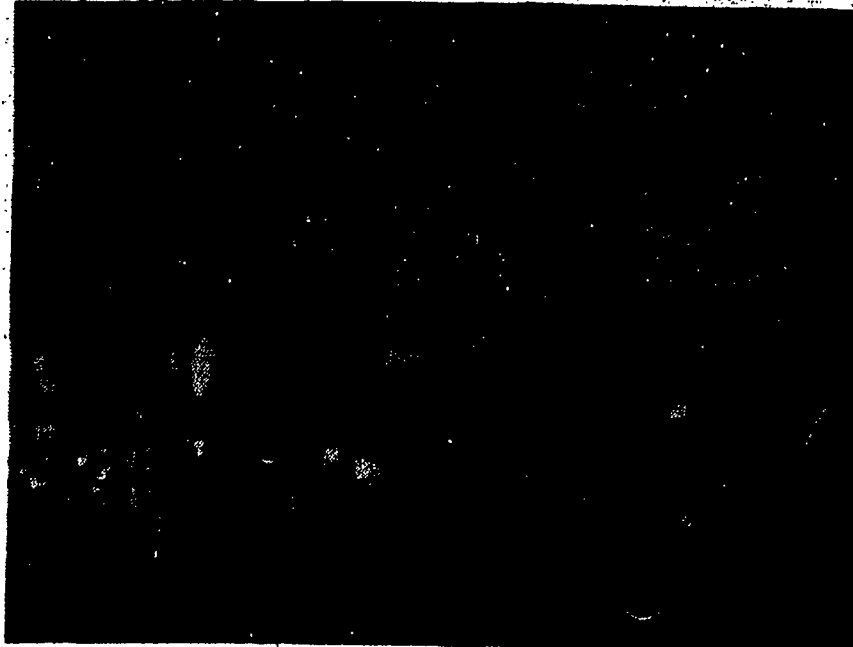

## A parent looks at education in the Maine high schools

Chester Dick, President, Parent Teacher Council, Maine Township High School South, feels that young people receive a superior education in the Maine Township high schools. He is confident, even with fewer students in the four high schools and declining resources that the schools will remain an attraction to families seeking to live in an area providing the best educational opportunities.

Commenting on education at Maine during the celebration of American Education Week, Nov. 12-18, Dick praised Maine for offering students a multilevel instructional system, for allowing individuals to excel at their own level in both the higher academic programs and in the multifaceted vocational programs.

As a civil engineer, who is in touch with local businesses and community agencies, Dick claims that business and industry are quick to recognize graduates from any one of the Maine high schools. They are prepared for the first job because of their high quality business and vocational training and experience in related high school programs, he said.

Dick is currently serving as the parents' representative on the District 207 Steering Committee conducting a year-long, self-evaluation of the Maine schools. A self evaluation is regularly done prior to the North Central Association evaluation, which will take place in late 1979. Schools must be evaluated by the

association to maintain accreditation.

Dick noted, as a citizen taxpayer, he is aware that during this self evaluation, school administrators will be taking a hard look at district programs in order to identify ways to re-shape those school programs because of declining enrollment and reduced income. The plan will surely be to establish a system of priorities, he said.

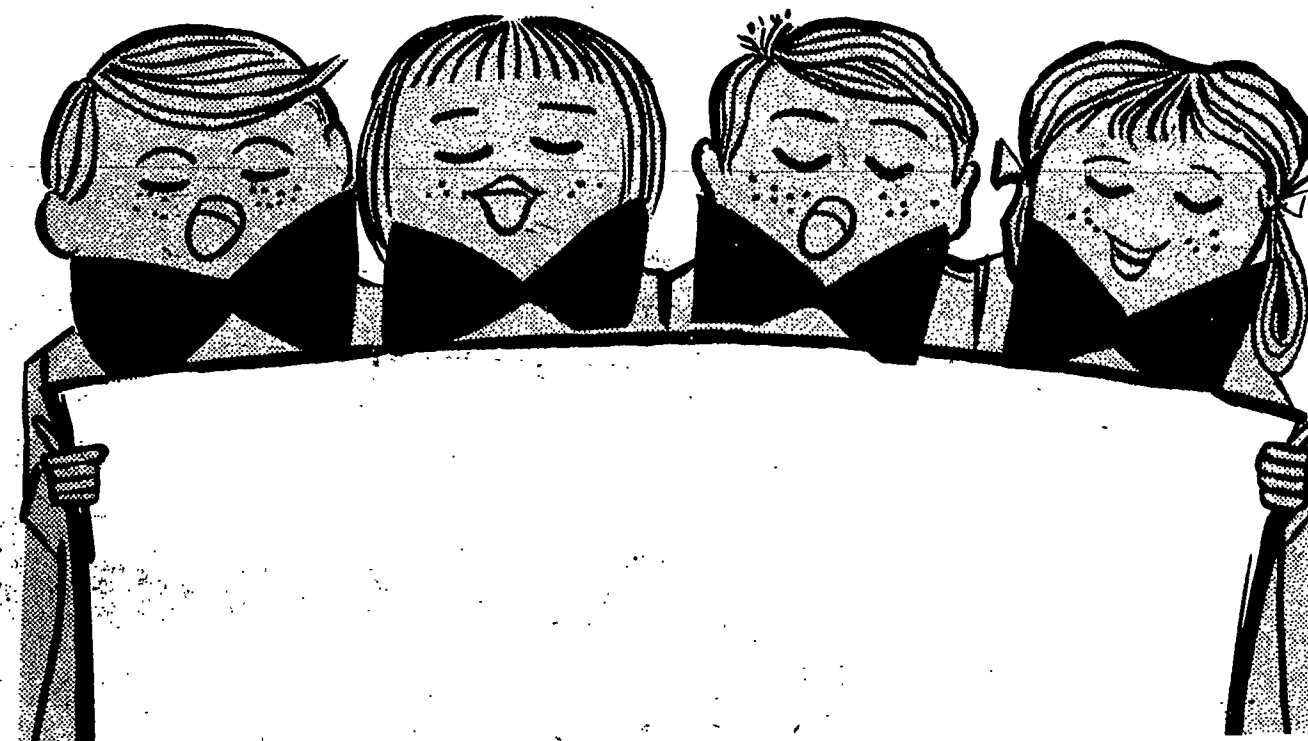
"I'm not sure I can come to grips with some of the changes that may have to be made," Dick said, "both in educational programs and extracurricular activities."

He explained his reluctance to see activities cut back by saying he considers such activities to be excellent character builders. While every student may not participate in such activities, he said, there is a place for everyone.

"I'm probably not the ordinary citizen in this township. I do know the administration will have a hard time even after it reaches decisions. There will surely be battles with some parents," he predicted.

Dick is perhaps more optimistic than some about the ability of communities, such as his own, Park Ridge, to turn around the phenomena of declining enrollment. He sees the present amazing lack of school children as a temporary trend and believes that younger families will again be moving in to the Maine area.

ficials who must bear responsibility for the incredible foul-ups in the police department.

Niles is presently expending about \$90,000 for the wasteful administration of three police officers whose work is at best trivial. Ninety big ones are being paid by the taxpayers for a police officer patrolling a shopping center, and for two others being placed on semi-retired jobs because the top guys look upon them with disfavor.

There's no sense sugar-coating a problem which has existed for many years. In its simplest terms, Niles Police Department has been poorly administered. On the surface it could be said the problem lies at the feet of the police chief. But that's not quite how Niles works. The police chief is the hand-maiden of Niles' village president, Nick Blase. When Nick hollers "Jump!", everyone's feet are off the ground.

Niles, like Chicago, is a city which works. In Niles' case it works because it has lots of money to throw around. And like Chicago, the city works when the top guy in town cracks the whip. When Niles' Nick decides he's had enough resignations, and enough bad publicity, he may take the police department by the horns and straighten out the many years of mismanagement.

Perhaps Nick Blase is tiring of his years at the top. It's usually healthy to change administrations after two or three terms in office. Nick is now in his 5th term. Should we wonder aloud if being in office for 5 terms leads to problems as we've had in the police department?

It happens to be a Nick Blase problem. It also happens to be a Niles problem.

he and Chief Huscher of the Fire Department recommended accepting the low bid of Midwest Ambulance for \$33,692. Trustee Henrici moved to accept the recommendation and the board agreed. Permission was granted.
