Niles teens seized in drug sale

Two Niles teens were arrested Saturday, Feb. 10 following alleged sale of marijuana to undercover agents in the parking lot of a north Milwaukee ave. restaurant.

A third Niles youth was present, police said, but later released without charges.

Anthony D. Pesola, 18, was charged with sale of marijuana and possession of Quaalude, a controlled substance; James L. Emerick, 19, was charged with possession of the cannabis.

Both were taken to the Niles police station where they were released after Pesola posted cash on a \$10,000 bond and Emerick posted cash on a \$1,000 bond, pending a March 9 hearing in Niles Circuit Court.

Police said the sale of the marijuana had been previously agreed upon by telephone. They said undercover policemen met the two teens around 6:30 p.m. Saturday in the restaurant lot to negotiate the transaction.

Police closed in immediately following the alleged sale of 2 plastic bags containing marijuana for \$80 in marked money.

Further evidence was found on the teens following arrest.

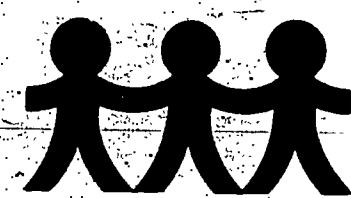
Niles Art Guild Art Fair

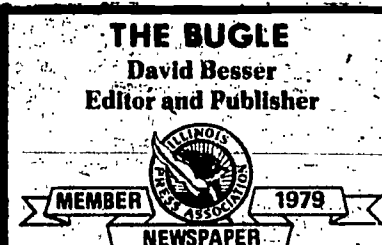

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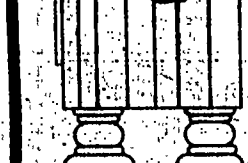
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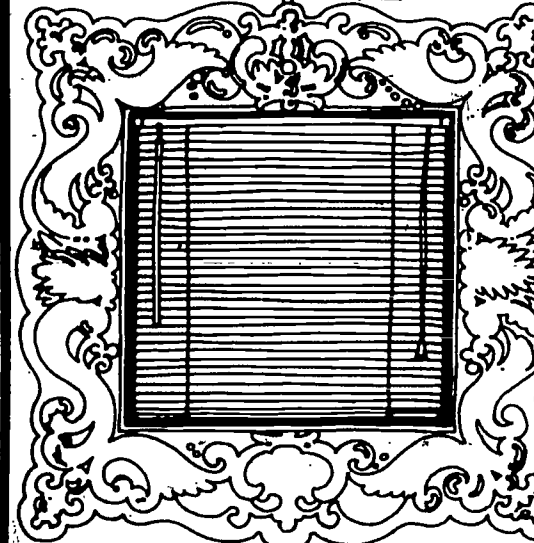

Maine East gymnasts take State Title

Although Maine East gymnasts met a formidable foe in Addison Trail last Saturday at the gymnastics finals at Prospect High School, the Demons were able to pick up points in several events which ultimately led to their taking the state gymnastic title. It was the first state title Maine East has ever won in its history.

Demon coach Tom Gardner said, "We've worked so long and so hard for this championship and I can hardly believe we've really made it." Maine East edged defending state champion Addison Trail 156.68 to 156.2 after trailing them during Friday's preliminary round. The Demons were able to pick up several points Saturday and Addison Trail fell behind thereby giving Maine East their championship.

According to the conference rules, when a team member advances from the preliminaries to the finals, the best score he earns during the 2 day meet is added to his final team score. The Demon's Joe Ray scored 8.75 in his free exercise routine which was 25 higher than the 8.5 he earned in Friday's preliminaries. Coach Gardner said he was very pleased when Ray went ahead in his Saturday performance, but added, "I expect those kind of routines out of Ray. He gave us a

real boost."

Maine East's Ron Bartusiak was fourth in all-around with an 8.41 average. Coach Gardner complimented both Ray and Bartusiak and stated, "It has been a pleasure to coach two such fine gymnasts."

According to Gardner, he felt Wheeling was going to be the toughest competition for the Maine East Demons going into the finals, but after the first 3 preliminaries, they fell far behind.

The state finals produced two individual stars, one was Maine East's Joe Ray who set a state all-around record with an 8.72

'Hemoccult Screening Program'

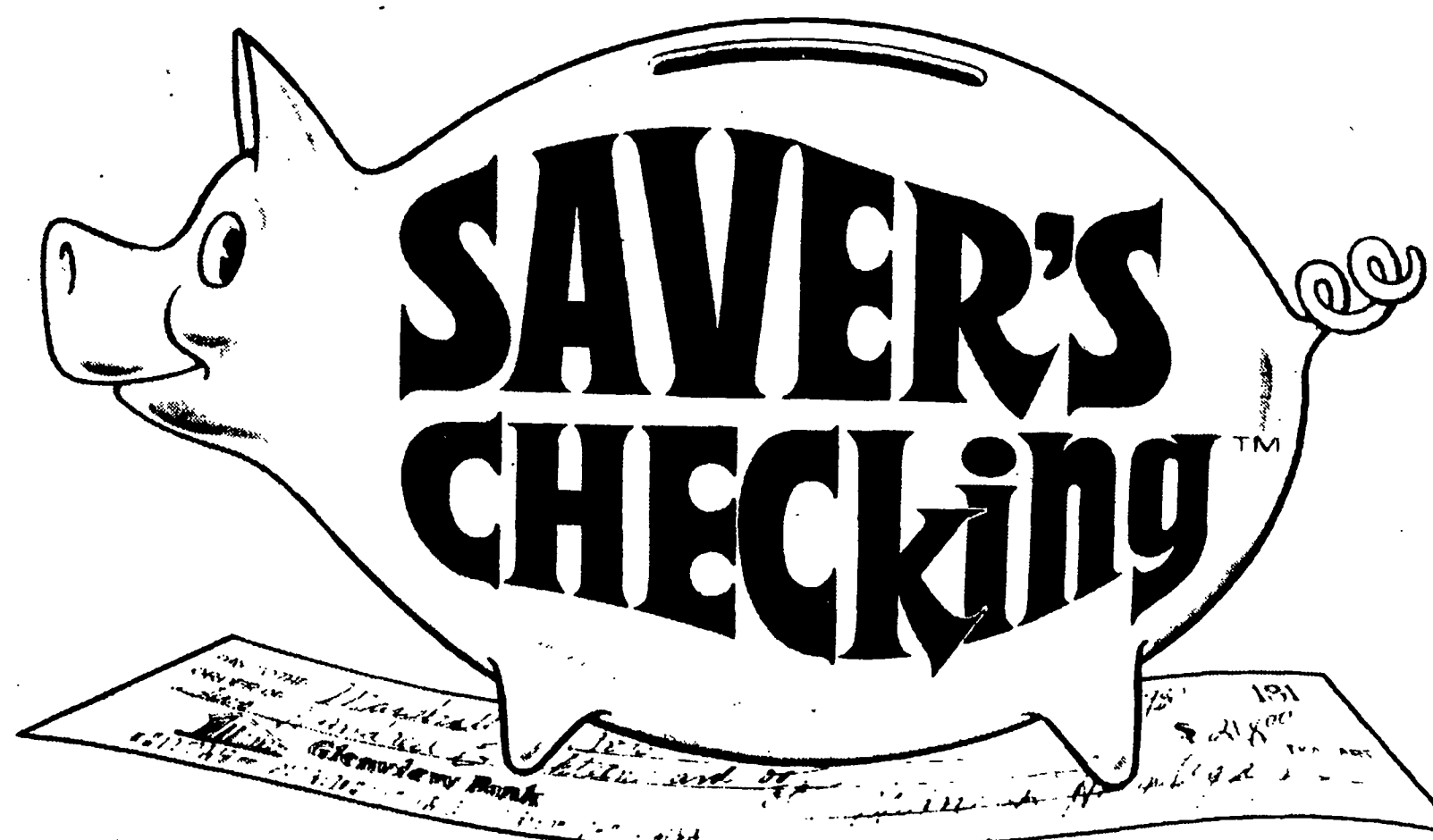

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Maine Township revenue sharing fund requests

Twenty-one social service agencies have asked the Maine Township Board of Trustees for nearly \$400,000 in township federal revenue sharing, according to Maine Township Supervisor James J. Dowd.

Dowd said the agencies made formal presentations to the township board at two special meetings conducted recently. The presentations were made following Dowd's invitation last month for agencies located in Maine or serving Maine residents to apply for financial assistance.

Dowd said the requests from the agencies totalled \$392,997. Because the requests exceed anticipated revenue sharing money, Dowd said the board was studying each application in detail to determine the worthiest recipients. The selections, he added, would probably be made by March 1 when the township's annual budget is adopted.

Applicants were: Maine Center for Mental Health and Family Services, \$90,000; The Hinge (coffeehouse for youth), \$36,102; Center of Concern for Park Ridge, \$35,000; Niles Public Library, \$34,057; Clearbrook Center, \$31,860; Greentree Industries, \$30,000; Northwest Suburban Aid for the Retarded, \$27,000; Crisis Homes, \$20,000; Glenkirk Association for the Retarded, \$15,968; Northwest Opportunity Center, \$14,460; Niles Family Services, \$10,000.

Also, Campus Life, \$7,600; Rimland School for Autistic Children, \$7,000; Northwest Suburban Headstart, \$6,233;

Retired Seniors Volunteer Program, \$5,677; Northwest Suburban Day Care Center, \$5,000; Epilepsy Foundation, \$5,000; Glenview Historical Society, \$4,225; Shelter, Inc., \$3,840; Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation, \$2,475; and Des Plaines Senior Center, \$1,500.

Dowd said it is Maine Township's policy to allocate its revenue sharing money to mental health, counseling and other social service agencies as a way of providing specialized help to those in need without levying additional township taxes.

Agencies currently receiving funds are Clearbrook Center, Glenkirk, Maine Center, Northwest Suburban Aid to the Retarded, Northwest Day Care, Northwest Headstart, Rimland, Maine Township Senior Citizens Organization, Maine Township Council on Alcoholism, and Maine Township Committee on Youth (Mainstay).

OCC Spring enrollment

Valenti Builders complete Northbrook facility ahead of schedule

Teamwork was the key factor in the rapid construction pace, Valenti said. "The owners of the

building, the architects and we, the contractor, cooperated with each other and made it a real team effort," he said. "As the construction managers, we scheduled our work in conjunction with the architect's progress and this cooperative spirit resulted in a successful project."

The Extel Corporation, which manufactures computer communication equipment, plans on using the building for offices and for research facilities. The building includes parking lots on the north and south sides, an enclosed truck dock and modern facilities for handicapped people. In addition, the property around the building is landscaped so it will prove an attractive asset to the neighboring community.

Equity Associates, the owners of the building, are also proud of the fast pace at which the building was constructed. "We have the capabilities to do this on many of our projects, but you have to have the right contractor," said Don Darnell, project manager for Equity Associates. "Valenti Builders were right for the job. They understand an owner's problems and are very capable people."

Valenti Builders and Equity Associates both praised the Village of Northbrook for its cooperation. "A village or city can make these things drag out

with a lot of red tape if they want to," Valenti said. "But Northbrook officials were very cooperative with us."

Construction of the new Niles facility more than doubles the company's Midwest manufacturing capabilities.

Features of the masonry and steel frame structure include 16 foot clear ceiling height, two enclosed truck docks with two additional drive-in truck doors, safety sprinklers throughout and energy conservation control systems.

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S & L's issue record amount of mortgages

In the Chicago area, money lent for single home purchases during 1978 totaled \$3,883,229,000, compared to \$3,688,485,000 in 1977. In total, last year the 197 savings and loan associations lent \$6,163,810,000.

"Home ownership is still the best hedge against inflation. People continue to believe that it is a good investment. Mortgage money will continue to be available this year," said Skokie Federal Savings President John R. O'Connell. Many families feel that it is better to buy now rather than wait for rates to drop because any savings that result from lower interest rates on the loan will be more than offset by a rise in home prices.

In Chicago, savings and loan associations investment for construction of condominiums jumped 128 percent, while loans for apartment construction increased 41 percent over 1977.

Most of the money lent by savings and loan associations is in mortgages. At year-end 1978, 82.6% of Illinois association assets were invested in mortgage loans.

Savings flows showed a net decrease among Illinois savings and loan associations. New savings received by associations last year were the highest on record, an increase of 29% over 1977. However, withdrawals increased 41%, resulting in a net new savings decrease of 22% from the previous year. Although the Illinois Savings & Loan League considers the net new savings of \$1.9 billion received to be a very healthy amount, it is a decrease from 1977.

The savings slowdown would have been exacerbated by rising short-term interest rates available to investors on the open securities market, but the

Federal Home Loan Bank Board authorized associations to issue money market certificates June 1, 1978 thus enabling associations to compete with open market securities. The new certificates permitted associations to attract new savings and retain funds.

Other figures disclosed in the year-end research include:

Total loans made by Illinois savings and loan associations were \$8.2 billion. Of that, \$6 billion was for purchases of residential property (\$4 billion for previously occupied single family homes, \$1.2 billion for new single family homes, remainder multi-family dwellings), \$1 billion for construction of residential units, and \$1.2 billion for other purposes such as construction and purchase of non-residential property, educational purposes, purchase of land, mobile homes and home improvements and furnishings.

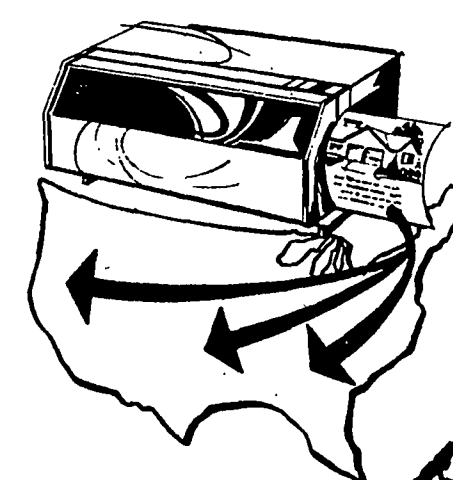
Of the \$32.3 billion total savings outstanding in Illinois savings and loan associations at year-end, 67.3% was invested in certificates and 32.7% in passbook accounts.

As a result of the high level of loan demand and a slight decline in the principal sources of loanable funds (primarily loan repayments and net savings), associations had to borrow funds in order to meet the demand. Total borrowings outstanding at Illinois associations stood at \$3 billion at year end 1978, an increase of 58% over 1977's year end figure.

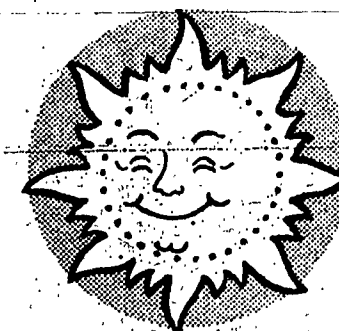
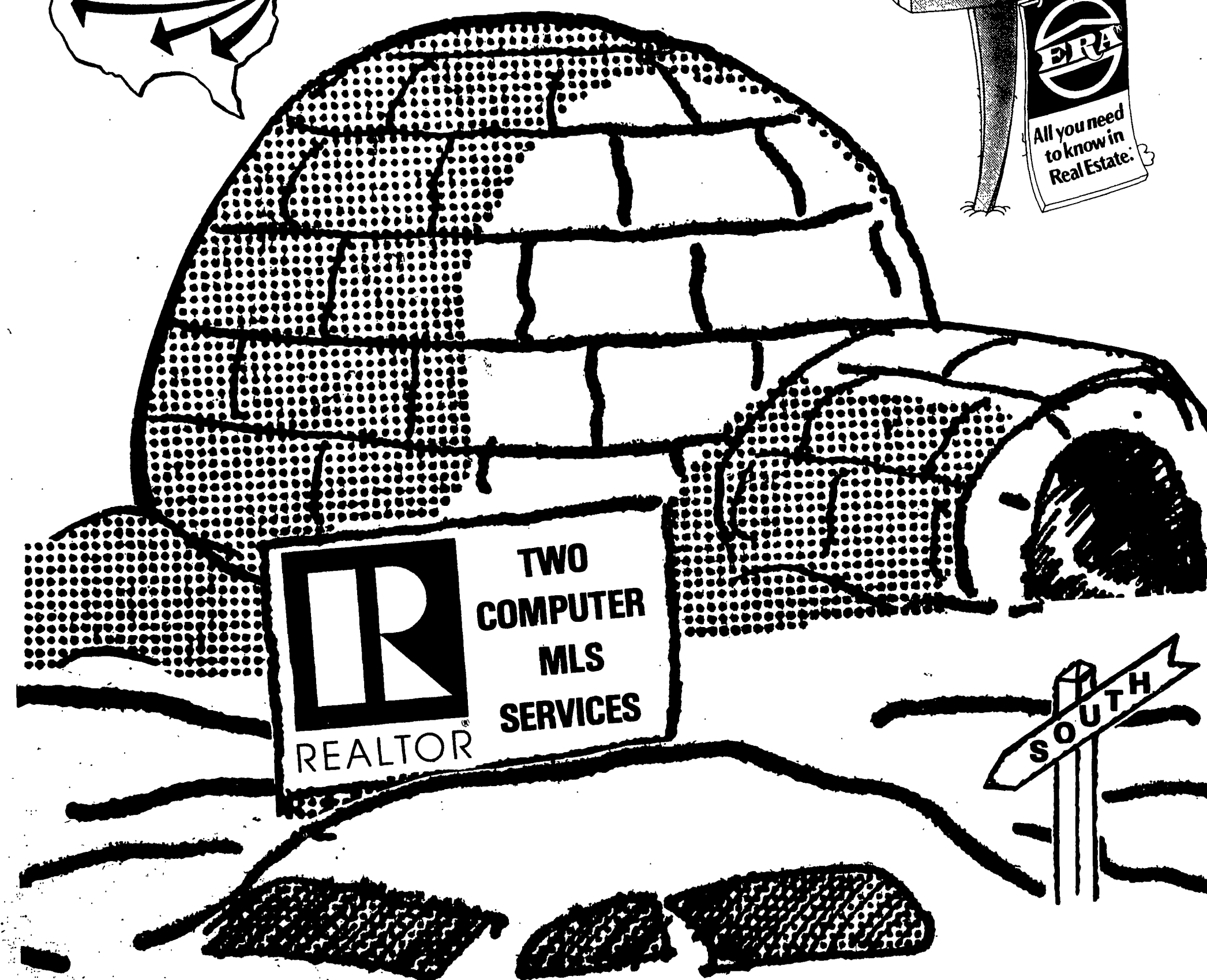

Dear Mr. Bowen:

Enclosed please find a copy of a paid bill in the amount of \$105 which covered the cost of snow removal from the sidewalks in front of Melzer School on January 24, 1979. You may recall that the decision to close schools the following day was not reached until late in the evening on that date, and, therefore, to insure the safety of our students and staff, the decision to expend these funds was made.

Earlier in the year, the Village of Morton Grove, NOT District #63, removed mounds of snow which were a danger to the children. One can hardly expect enormous amounts of snow that have fallen this year. However, even before the major snowfalls, no effort was made on the part of the District to improve the situation at Melzer, and, indeed, it was two weeks after the storms before any action was taken. Never, under any circumstances, in the history of District #63, has poorer service been rendered its children.

It is our understanding that the District is applying for federal funds that are available for these purposes due to the emergencies. Having already paid for these services in local and federal taxes, we feel the Melzer PTA should be reimbursed for doing what should have been done by the District.

Skokie Valley VFW represented at state conference

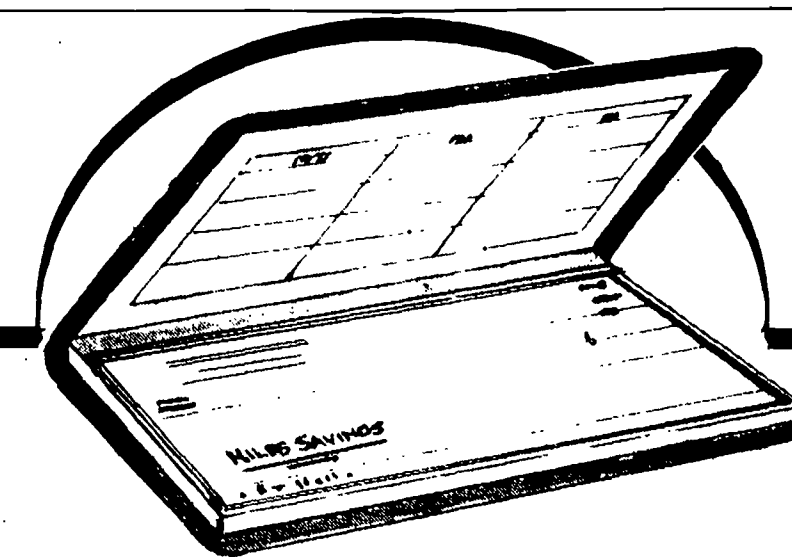

Mikva wants Congress covered by Social Security

Legislation providing coverage under Social Security for all members of Congress, their staffs, and other officers and employees in the legislative branch would help restore public confidence in the system, according to U.S. Congressman Abner J. Mikva, who agreed to cosponsor such legislation.

Mikva said, "By keeping congressmen, senators and their staffs out of the Social Security system, we are denying many citizens the right to an equitable and fair program. It insulates those of us who make decisions about Social Security from the consequences of the judgments we make about the program."

Mikva called the exemption of Congress from Social Security "a double standard." He said, "It

imposes taxes on our fellow citizens but not us. We are asking them to bear a burden we do not share."

Mikva pointed out that if the Congress were included in the program, the available funds would go up, which in turn would bolster the funds in the system's reserves. Mikva expressed the hope that this legislation would be part of a continuing effort by Congress to establish a fair and equitable system.

Mikva was active last year in introducing reforms that sought to ease the tax burden and redefine the goals of the system. He is a member of the House Ways and Means Subcommittee on Social Security and will continue to be active in efforts to re-examine the system.

On a legal note Park Attorney Gabriel Berrafato observed that Illinois statutes provide for questions to be brought before the general public. If and when a vote is taken he said the result is merely a recommendation, not mandatory, that the Board follow public counsel.

Park Board President Jeffrey Arnold noted "the timing of (Chamerski's) motion was not of the best... A policy manual adopted by park commissioners last month set up district policy of hiring," he said. "That was the time for discussion of the residency rule," he noted, "prior to unanimous approval by Commissioners of the manual."

According to the policy manual "residence within the Park District shall not be a condition of employment with the District but if two equally qualified individuals have made application for a position, preference will be given to a resident of the District..." However, the manual further provides "it shall be the expressed practice of the park district to employ the best available qualified applicant for any position..."

A supporter of Chamerski's residency code, Nilesite Gene Widowiak, asked park commissioners Tuesday night to have the requirement made into park ordinance but was turned away by Arnold, who preferred to remain with the newly approved guidelines.

In board action Tuesday evening commissioners delayed approval of the Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation (M-NASR) budget for the fiscal year May 1, 1979 to April 30, 1980, to the March board meeting due to changes in the proposed budget which commissioners said were not reflected in documents held by the Niles board.

Should revised budget figures not be available prior to the M-NASR meeting next Tuesday, Niles park commissioners directed their representative to give a negative vote.

The Niles Park District share of the \$300,643 M-NASR budget is \$31,656 payable in two installments, on May 1 and Aug. 15. Approximately 117 adults and children from the Niles park district participate in the total 1,127 M-NASR membership.

Niles representative to M-NASR Louella Preston noted in pre-board discussion she was not in accord with proposed changes in the Articles of Agreement among the seven participating park districts of Des Plaines, Golf-Maine, Lincolnwood, Morton Grove, Park Ridge, Skokie and Niles, which provide for approval of the budget by the M-NASR board prior to sanction by park districts. She indicated both budget and Articles of Agreement remain under discussion by M-NASR.

During a pre-board discussion of the hockey program Park Director William Hughes noted that since the Niles Hockey League is "apparently going defunct" Niles was awaiting authorization from the State to re-district Niles in a merger with Franklin Park. He said Franklin Park officials indicate they are having similar hockey problems.

A decline in membership of the house hockey league indicates a future merger he said with the

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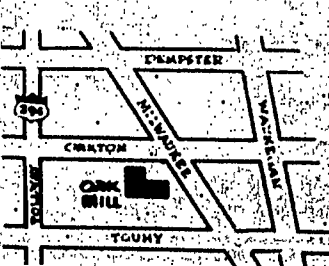
