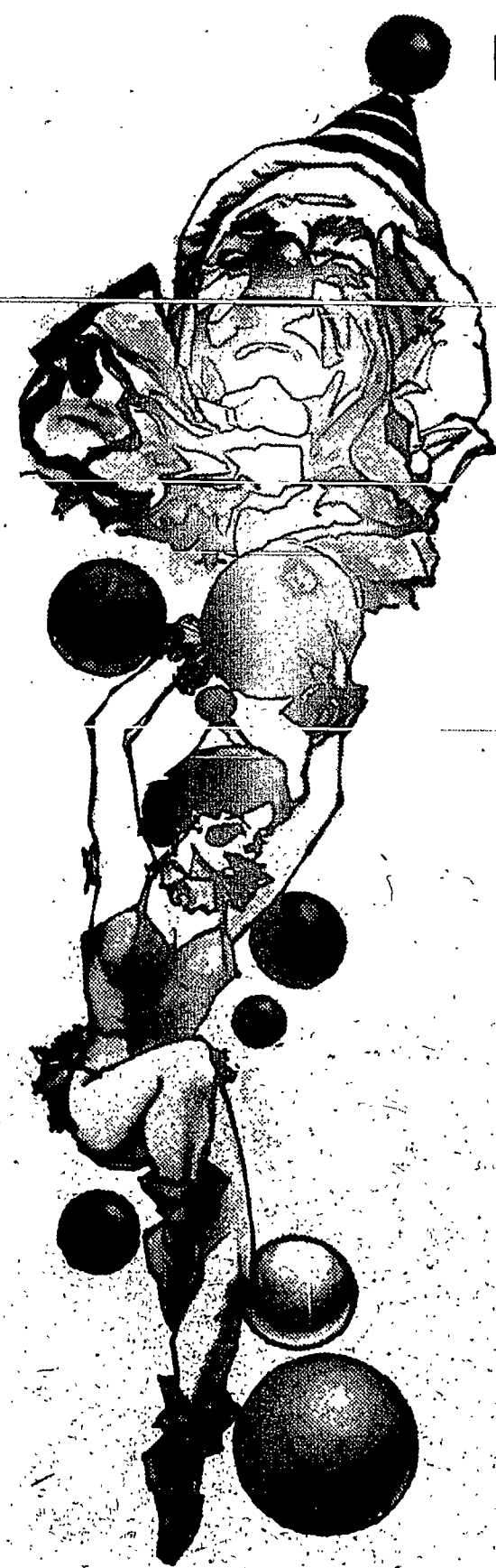
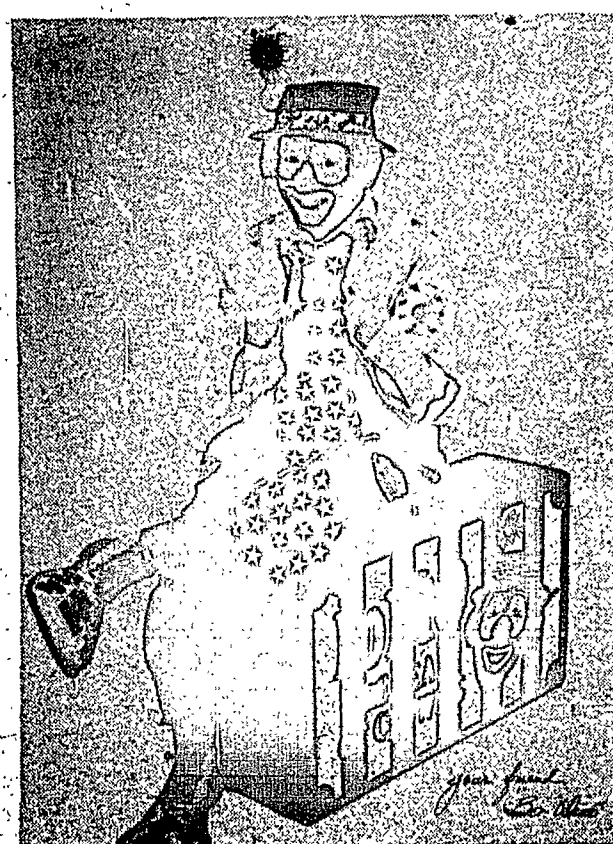

From the LEFT HAND

Ione "Pinky" Pinkert, an important part of The Bugle family during the mid-70's, is fighting for her life in the intensive care ward at Parkwood Hospital in Canoga Park, California. Pinky underwent an emergency ulcer operation Monday afternoon and post-operative complications resulted in her daughter giving us a bleak outlook. In School District 63 the expected resignation of board member Penny Larson took place Tuesday night. Any resident in the district is invited to apply for the job by 4 p.m. July 2 and then be available for an interview that evening.

To be consistent we have to defend the democratic process, and believe the combined wisdom of the voters is preferable to the six board members who will pick the new board member.

Larson should have resigned before the election to enable voters to elect the member to represent them. Her deliberate waiting until after the election does not speak well for her nor for any board members who are out to manipulate the public.

If rumors mean anything, it is expected one of last year's incumbents, who did not run for election in April, will be chosen to fill the vacancy. And while these two people were among the better board members serving the district in recent years, and who were both supported by The Bugle in past elections, it is not consistent they should be chosen, after refusing to run for re-election. Howard Lessin and Alana Marks received about 500 votes in April. And even though we didn't vote for them, we believe its incumbent upon the Board one of these people be chosen to fill the one year vacancy. The

Board delays decision on PUD condos

A petition to rezone property at 7201 Milwaukee ave. for construction of a 5-story condominium building under Planned Unit Development (PUD) was continued to July 10 by the Niles Village Board during the Tuesday, June 26 meeting.

Howard Sherman, attorney for petitioner Sim Construction Co. was told the delay would provide time for presentation to the board of economic factors of planning; engineering plans for storm water flow and/or water retention; and for visual prints of the site and adjacent properties. Tr. Peter Pesole also requested

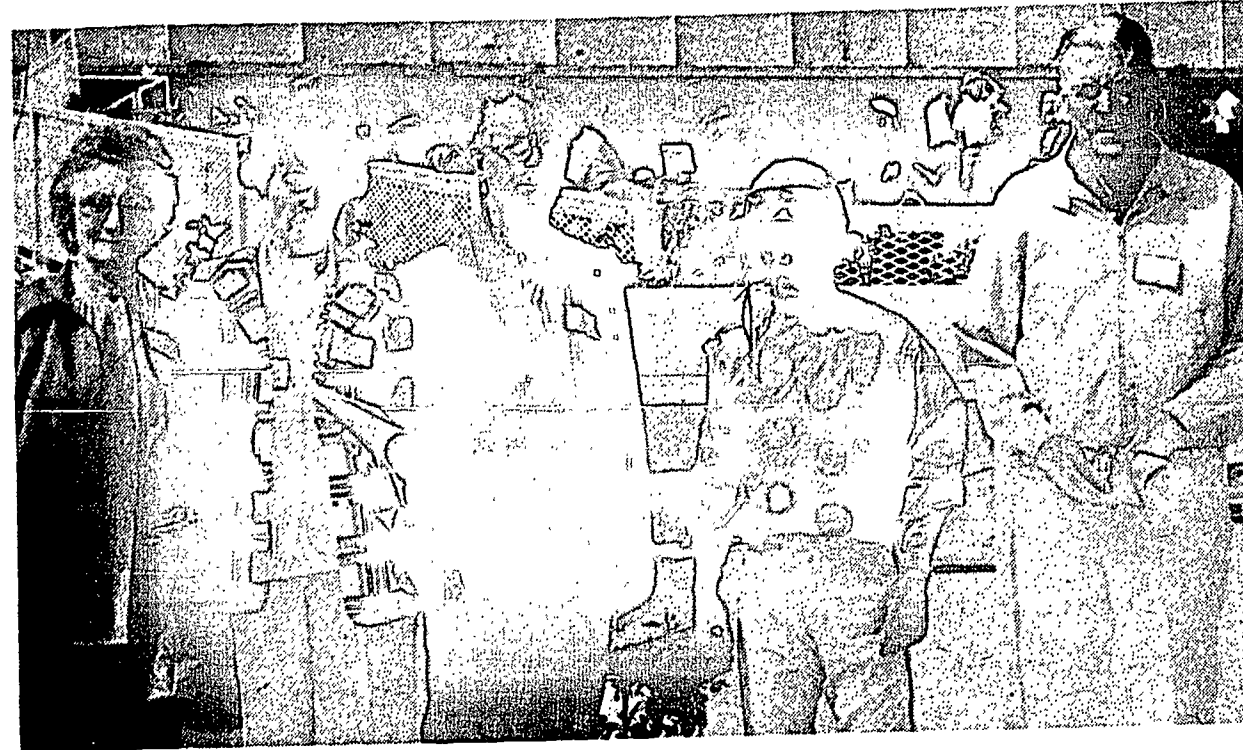
fellow board members to "consider a reduction in density" to less than the 28.9 units per acre proposed by the petitioner for the one and two-thirds acre site.

Special Use rezoning for the PUD condominiums had been approved May 7 by the Plan Commission predicated upon landscaping, a 10 p.m. curfew for the swimming pool, removal of telephone poles at the north side of the property, underground utility lines and a 15 ft. driveway width on Milwaukee ave.

Atty. Sherman told trustees the property is owned under four

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Fire departments offer mutual aid thru R.E.D. center

With the approval of municipal officials, the fire departments of Glenbrook, Glenview, Morton Grove, Niles and North Maine are cooperating in a program known as R.E.D. Center.

The Regional Emergency Dispatch Center is an advanced concept of coordinating fire and emergency medical service by pooling the resources of participating departments through central communications.

To implement this concept, work was started in May 1974 to set up procedures, modify equipment and set up mutual aid agreements to permit a test of the concept which will start approximately July 1. The area involves 32 square miles with a 150,000 population. Extensive mapping, street guides, and training now brings us to an actual test of automatic mutual aid for fires and structures.

Briefly when an alarm of fire is received for any of the above

towns, the closest fire companies will respond on a first due basis disregarding municipal boundaries. The first due response is normally three pieces of fire equipment and depending upon the location, will draw upon the equipment at time from two or three different departments. This will permit the level of fire protection to be increased because any one fire department will not have to commit all of its fire fighting forces initially. This will leave first line units in reserve within any community.

This test will be evaluated at the end of three months with a full report given to municipal officials and the future of R.E.D. Center as a permanent part of fire services in these communities will be decided. The system is open to expansion by other departments joining which will create greater depth and become more cost efficient.

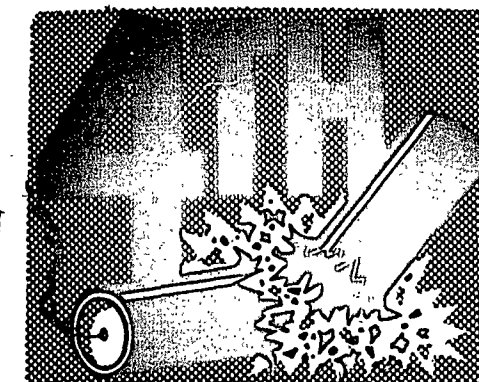

Niles Meals Program seeks volunteer drivers

The Niles Senior Center initiated a pilot Meals Program last September for 6 months. The program was designed to serve the needs of the elderly who were ill and unable to prepare their own meals. The program supplies a complete hot and/or cold meal on a daily basis. In the past six months we have found the program to be a valuable service to people. These meals enable some people to remain in their homes after hospitalization or illness.

Our social worker conducts a home visit after the initial contact has been made. She determines whether the person is eligible for our program. To be eligible a person must be 62 years of age, a Niles resident and unable to prepare meals for himself. At this time, an assessment of the family

situation, mechanics of the program, and payment procedures are discussed.

Since the beginning of the program, we have served 1311 hot and 744 cold meals. The meals are prepared by Bethany Terrace Nursing Home of Morton Grove. They are prepared in accordance to each individual's diet as prescribed by their physician. The cost to the people on the program is \$2.50 for a hot meal and \$1.50 for a cold meal.

After a 6 month evaluation, the program was reviewed and will continue with an expansion to 15 meals served. With the increase in deliveries, we have need for more volunteer drivers. Drivers are the core of the program. Without the help of volunteers, our program can not exist.

Make the mowing season a safe season

Every year, millions of Americans turn to their power mowers to tame the rapidly growing grass in their yards.

But every year an estimated 50,000 people turn to hospital emergency room assistance because of power mower related accidents.

Katherine Jarrell, University of Illinois Extension Home Economist, says yards should be cleared of stones and debris before you mow. The mower's discharge chute can shoot out debris at speeds up to 170 m.p.h.

Jarrell also offers these suggestions:

-Do not fill the gasoline tank while the engine is running or even when the machine is hot.

-Start power mowers outdoors or in a garage with doors and windows open. Without proper ventilation, there is danger of carbon monoxide poisoning.

-When starting the engine, stand away from the mower and make sure the blade cannot make contact with your feet.

-Push the "walk behind" mowers across slopes, not up and down. This will keep the mower from sliding back into your feet and will keep you from slipping and falling into a mower. But if you use a "riding" mower, go up and down slopes for better stability.

-Do not mow wet grass because it causes clogging.

-When unclogging the discharge chute, make sure the engine is off. Disconnect the spark plug wire to prevent the motor from accidentally starting.

-If your power mower does not have a grass-catching bag, make

sure it has a deflector plate to direct the discharge toward the ground.

-Keep an eye out for children, especially when you are making turns or putting a riding mower in reverse.

-Do not carry passengers.

-Before starting a riding mower, shift into neutral to keep the machine from "lurching."

-Avoid walking in front of the discharge chute. It may turn out to be as dangerous as strolling through a firing range.

-Even if you leave your mower for a moment, stop the engine. Curious children may investigate the machine while you're gone.

Pre-marital institute

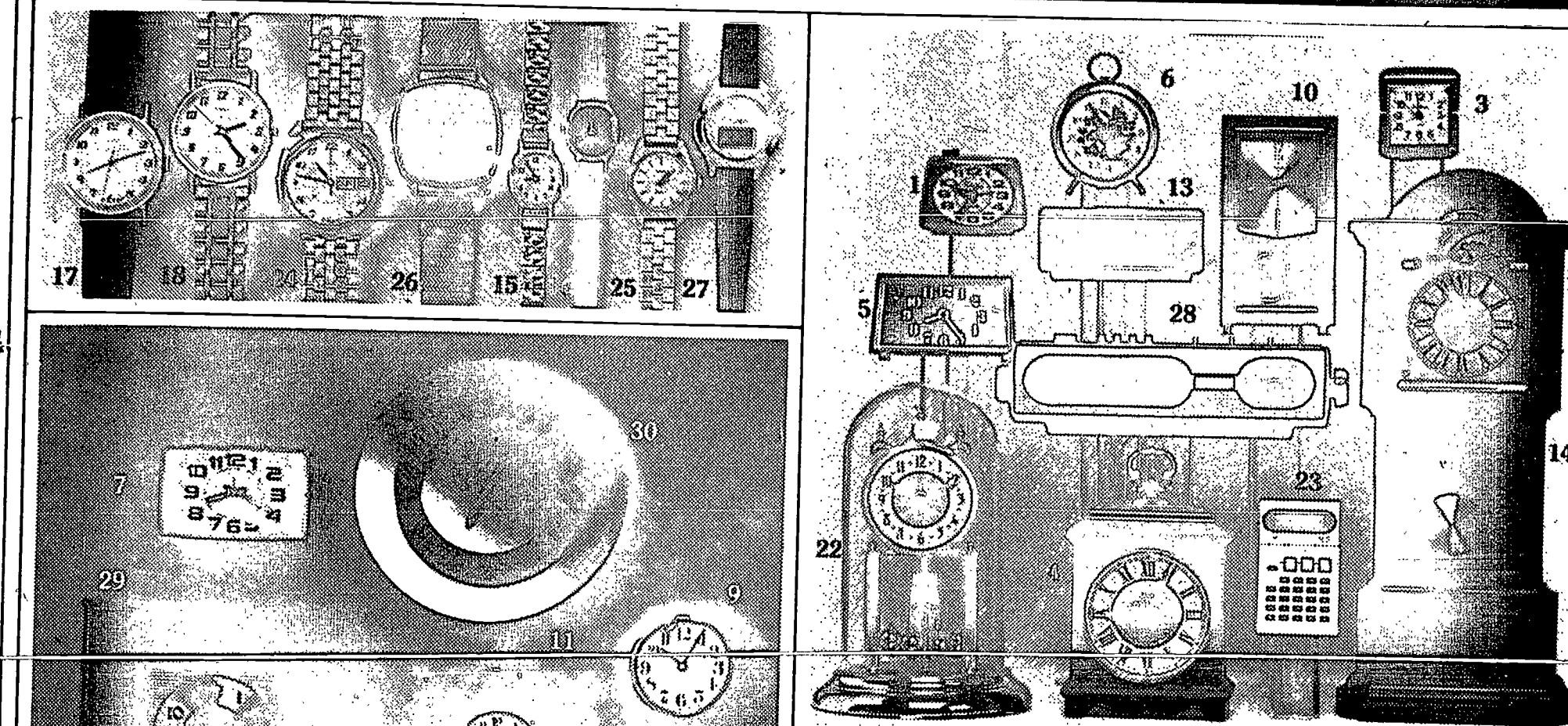

Niles Paramedics took Lachen with facial lacerations and Police Officer Lo Verde with a broken hand to Lutheran General Hospital for treatment.

The Chicago man was returned to the police station for filing of charges.

White, who is practicing attorney in Chicago, has previously held the positions of Treasurer, Secretary, and Vice President in the Chapter. White is also a

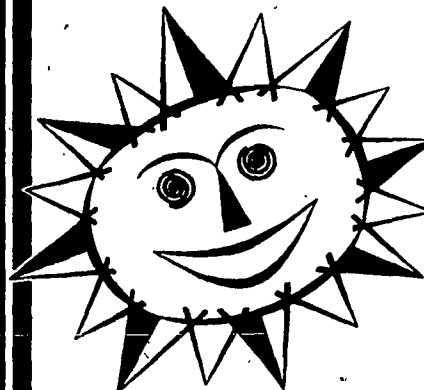

First National Bank of Des Plaines raises interest rates

In accordance with regulatory changes allowed by the Federal Reserve Board the First National Bank of Des Plaines announced it will raise interest rates on regular statement savings accounts to 5 1/4% from the current 5%, effective July 1, 1979.

First National "Make More" Accounts will also be increased to 5 1/4% interest beginning July 1 and commencing with each account's individual statement cycle date.

"Make More" Accounts pre-authorize automatic transfer of

money from a savings account to a checking account as checks are drawn.

A new four-year variable rate Certificate of Deposit will be introduced replacing the present 7 1/4% certificate. This new certificate's interest rate will be 1 1/4% less than the average yield on current four-year Treasury Securities.

With exception of the six month \$10,000 Certificate of Deposits, the First National Bank will reduce minimum deposits for CD's, and penalties for early

withdrawal.

On instruments or more than one-year maturity, the penalty will be loss of six months' interest only. For certificates of one year or less, the penalty will be a loss of only three months' interest. Currently, the penalty is loss of three months' interest and a reduction of the remaining interest to regular savings rates.

The First National Bank said customers are welcome to come in and discuss these changes with a customer service officer.

Revised savings plans announced by Evanston Federal Savings

Donald G. Martens, President of Evanston Federal Savings and Loan Association announced recently that changes would be made in all savings plans offered by the association, effective July 1, 1979. 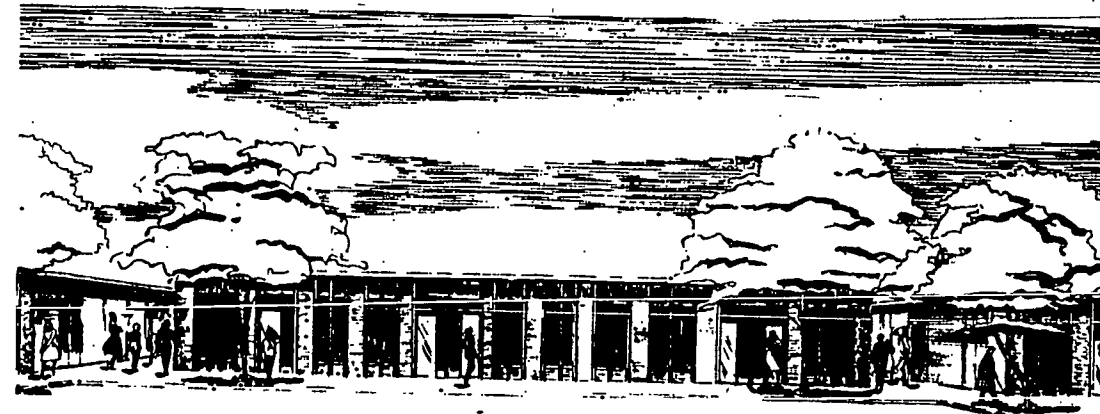

The interest rate on regular passbook savings accounts is being increased from 5.25 % per year to 5.50% per year, compounded daily from day of deposit to day of withdrawal. Interest allowed to accumulate for one year will produce a 5.65% annual yield. The increase will be automatically paid on all existing and newly opened accounts. This is the highest rate and most generous method of calculation any financial institution is allowed to pay. "Passbook savings accounts are the ideal form of savings account for individuals wishing to make frequent additions to their accounts or desiring to have their money available at any time. No individual or family should be without a passbook savings account. This account is the foundation of any savings program,"

Martens said.

The new four year savings certificate will be available at an interest rate 1% per year below the average four year Treasury securities rate as determined by the U.S. Treasury. A new rate will be offered the first day of each month. A saver will, however, be guaranteed the rate established when he opened his account for its entire term irrespective of the rate offered on new certificates at any time. Interest will be compounded daily to yield the maximum return allowed, but may be payable by check either quarterly or monthly at the savers request. Martens said, "We expect a great deal of activity with this new certificate which should prove very attractive to all savers especially since there are no fees or commissions required to open an account and no risk of loss of prin-

Home improvement loans up 40% in first quarter

Dollar volume of home improvement loans at First Federal of Chicago, Illinois' largest savings and loan, have surged ahead 40% in the first quarter of 1979 compared to a year ago, says Michael Bozich, senior vice president.

The new regulations have removed this requirement and allowed financial institutions to establish any amount they wish as a minimum deposit. "Evanston Federal Savings has established \$1.00 as the minimum deposit," Martens said, "as low a minimum as you can go. However, it is doubtful many individuals will wish to open certificate accounts for these small sums. Regular passbook accounts are more suitable for this size deposit because certificates carry penalties for early withdrawal and thus are not the proper savings account for funds that the saver is not sure can be left on deposit for the term of the certificate," Martens continued.

Penalty provisions for early withdrawal on all newly issued certificates as well as for all existing certificate accounts renewed after July 1 have been revised. In most cases the revisions result in a lesser penalty than would have been previously required. For a certificate with a term of one year or less the new penalty provides for a loss of 90 days interest, or all interest earned to date if the funds have not been on deposit for three months. A certificate with a term of more than one year will provide for a loss of 180 days interest, or all interest earned to date if the funds have not been on deposit for six months.

In addition to the newly authorized four year certificate, all other certificate accounts previously available will continue to be offered," Martens said, "with the revised minimum deposit requirement of \$1 and containing the new penalty provisions. Savers should find the 182 day Money Market Savings Certificate especially attractive," Martens continued, "since in the last week savings associations have been able to offer a higher rate on these accounts than commercial banks. When the regulations on these accounts were amended on March 8,"

Martens said, "savings associations were allowed to pay up to ¼% more than commercial banks whenever the weekly auction rate of six month U. S. Treasury bills, discount basis, is less than 9% per year. Last weeks auction saw a discount rate of 8.87% allowing Evanston

Home improvement loan totals in March were especially significant compared to a year ago. In March of 1978, the dollar volume was \$902,000, compared to the end of March of this year when it had risen to \$1.6 million.

Increases are also reflected in the totals in January and February, 1979, compared to a year ago. In January, 1979, the total was \$972,000 compared to a year earlier when home improvement loans totaled \$532,000. In February, 1979, the total was \$982,000 compared to a year earlier when February home improvement loans totaled \$534,000.

Bozich said he expects the number of home improvement loans to increase in the months ahead. "We're of the opinion that our home improvement loan portfolio will become larger as more people see the economies of remodeling or expanding their homes."

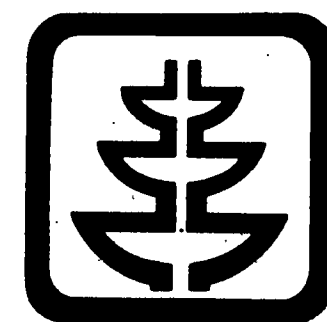

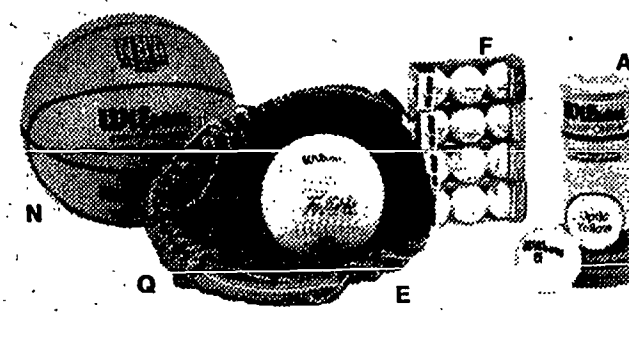

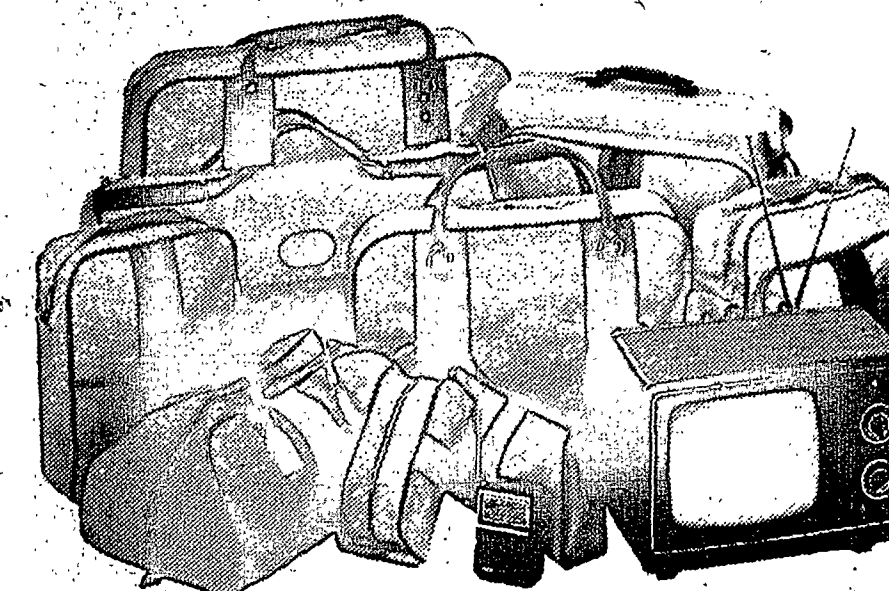

Perle Abrahamson, Director of Young Men's Parent and Child Care Centers explains the Center's goals. "We work to develop the children's desire to learn and explore their own capacities along with developing a sense of self-confidence, attitudes, habits, and techniques to tackle new ideas and situations with sensitivity and imagination."

The Center will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The basic daily schedule involves a developmental morning school program followed by a supervised hot meal and rest period. Later is snack time, more games, stories, record play and gym until the child is picked up.

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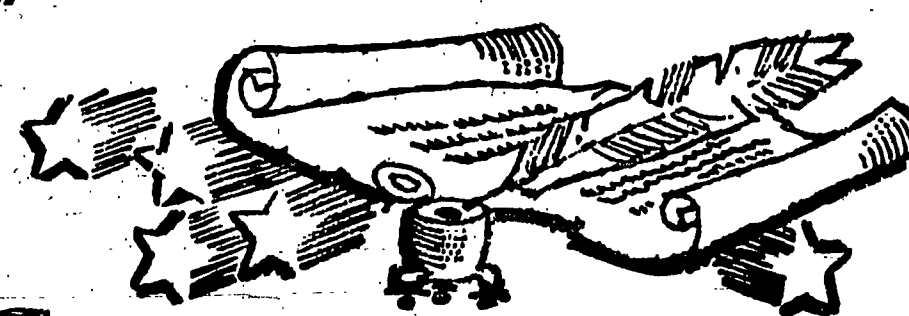
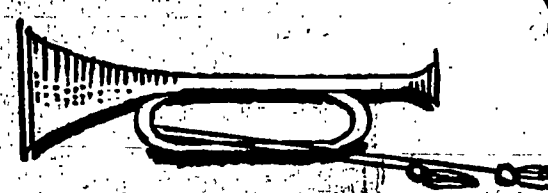
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ED HANSON Bankers Take An Interest In Their Work



Ben Franklin, when he wasn't flying kites, wrote little poems. One went like this:

"Money makes money,
And the money
That money makes,
Makes more money."

Robert Morris, who was managing the finances of our early confederation government, read this particular Franklin poem, and got an idea from it.

So Robert Morris founded our first bank in 1781. Shortly after, a rising young man named Alexander Hamilton, prevailed upon our newly formed government to create a far-flung national bank whose branches reached from Boston to New Orleans. Thus, branch banking was born and we're still fighting about it.

Another guy, named George Washington, backed Hamilton's idea and became a stockholder in the bank of Alexandria when it opened near his home. You know what happened to George Washington. He not only was our first president but he was also our richest president.

George Washington was a banker, and many of the men who founded our new nation, founded its banks as well. Talk about a "ground-floor opportunity" - this country and the men who founded it, and the banking system, grew up together.

They were all men who took an interest in their country and an interest in their work.

INTEREST! That's the key to making money. For example, just \$1.00 at simple interest invested at 4 per cent at the birth of Christ, by 1933 would have amounted to \$78.32. But at compound interest the same buck, by 1933 would amount to more than \$600,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000.

How much this same buck would amount to now, 1979, you figure out - I ran out of paper when I reached the year 1933.

Here's another classic example of compound interest magic. If the Indians, who got 24 bucks for selling us the island of Manhattan, had foresight and were smart operators, they would have invested the 24 bucks at 6 per cent compound interest. Today, this 24 dollars would be worth well over 3 billion dollars. With 3 billion dollars shrewdly invested, today's Indians might have taken over control of some of our key industries and maybe gotten their country back.

Another who missed the boat was Queen Isabella of Spain. If Isabella hadn't hocked her jewels for \$2,115 and given the money to Columbus, but instead invested it at 5 per cent compound interest, her estate today would be worth more than 5 trillion dollars.

The whole trouble was that the 'idea' that could have changed the entire course of history came too late. This 'idea' being, of course, the banking business.

But today our banks and Savings & Loans are doing pretty well. Each year they keep adding more and more new innovations until the average commercial bank of today is a "department store of financial services."

In recent years a cultural 'touch' has been added with art exhibits, and show biz has also got by the guards and slipped into the act. As savings are of great importance to most commercial banks, (next to demand deposits they make up the largest single source of funds) to attract new savers many banks throughout the nation are conducting dog shows, ice skating exhibits, musicals, boat shows, auto shows, etc.

Who sez bankers don't take an interest in their work?

Why, even architecturally, banks of the present and those of the future are undergoing drastic changes. Banks, like churches, are getting away from the 'classic columns', the staid, mouldy design of former years. Inside too, color has replaced drabness, and even the employees, particularly those of the feminine gender, have a new look.

One new bank that opened recently in Michigan has a white roof of graceful concrete, with colored plastic skylites; architecturally it resembles a flying saucer that just set down amid illuminated fountains and green gardens. Inside, one would swear they've just entered one of Hefner's new Playboy clubs, even the chic feminine employees that strut about could be likely candidates for Bunnies.

Advertising and public relations, once frowned upon by stodgy bankers, is now an integral part of the banking industry. To lure new savers, millions of dollars is annually spent in print and electronic media. Giveaways, such as electric clocks, radios, dishes, table lamps, TV's and what not, have been used extensively in campaigns to win new depositors and retain old ones.

I envision that the banks of the future will be constructed almost entirely of glass with plastic colored skylites. Outside, they will offer an 18-hole golf course, swimming pools and tennis courts. Inside, there will probably be a special playground for the kiddies, a Cinema with rocking chair seats, showing the latest Hollywood epic, perhaps a cocktail lounge and, of course, a luxurious V.I.P. room for distinguished big depositors and borrowers.

Glamorous gals will wait hither and yon thru an atmosphere as gay and colorful as a private club. Full automation, in every phase of the banking business will provide lightning - like speed to every transaction.

Well, maybe every transaction save one. That's the teller's window. You know, the one that has the lit-

tle sign on it that say "Next window, please." You follow the little signs, that say, "Next window, please" - until you get to the window that contains the teller. You'll know it by the long line in front of it - the one that reaches outside, a block down, to the swimming pool. Then get in line and wait.

This seems to be the only problem in the 20th century that modern banking hasn't whipped. Maybe they will - in the 21st century.

Seriously, no other American industry has offered so much, to so many, for so little, than the banking industry. Banks have provided their many services to the public at very low cost. See our special Financial Edition, I started more than 7 years ago. It begins on Page 15 and is "Interesting" and informative.

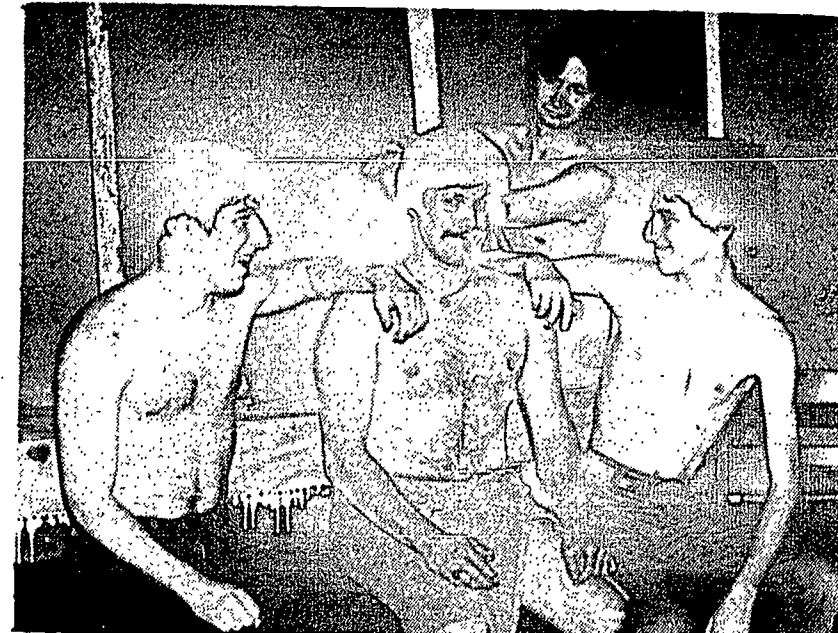

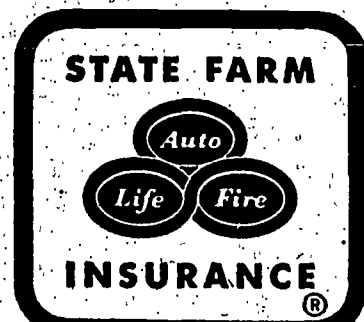

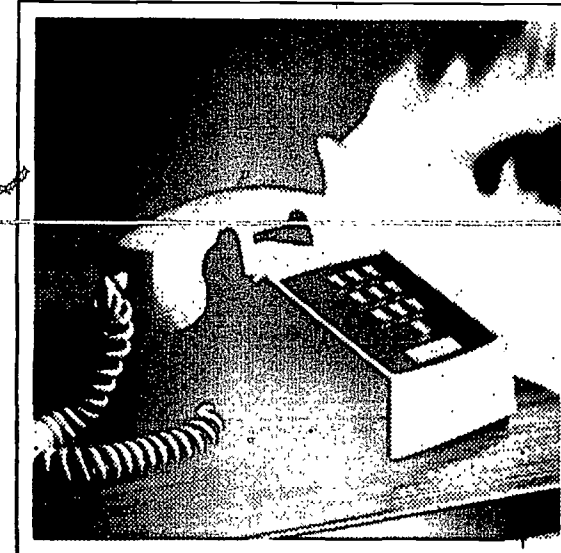

eliminated." In answer to the board's decision to deny this request, Mrs. Esposito said "We paid our architect over \$2,000 and if we were told after submitting preliminary plans this could not be approved, we could have saved a lot of money. Why were we not told at that time before I wasted all my hard earned money? I'd gladly take the permit to remodel the apartment and forget the remodeling of the restaurant. I can't give up the apartment because I owe it to my daughter and grandson to keep it."

Dick Hols said he was sorry, but if the board made one such exception, they'd be setting a bad precedent. Atty. Ashman said perhaps the Plan Commission and the Building Dept. weren't aware of all the facts and thought the past court case cleared the way for the Espositos.

Regarding the Special Use sought by the Standard Oil Company to put in a carwash at their station at Golf and Harlem, the company realizes they cannot receive a certificate of occupancy for the building until they get approval from the Sign Board with whom they have already met. Since all else was in order, trustees voted to grant this request pending approval by the Sign Board.

In other business trustees passed a resolution amending our 1975 ordinance dealing with Housing for the Elderly and agreed the Plan Commission shall hold public hearing relative to granting a Special Use permit for the building going up on Waukegan rd.

Trustees also noted the purchase on June 15 of the property at 8609 School st. but agreed that Mr. Alfred Schmidt shall have a 20' x 20' plot for himself forever.

An amendment to the ordinance dealing with weeds was passed signifying that from now on, anything over 6" is to be considered a nuisance. The village can now cut down these weeds and charge the violator a fee.

The board also adopted an ordinance regarding the latest Fire Prevention Code and National Safety Code. It deals with exits, fire hydrants, and extinguishers being properly placed, and with water mains.

In regard to the Yale property on Lincoln ave., the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended a change in zoning to R3 for the north 125' of that property. Joan Dechert moved to table until July 9 so that trustees can study this and residents in the immediate area can be notified.

Charles Sheck, Village Planner advised the board the contract has been received from the state for resurfacing around Lehigh north of Dempster, Lehigh near the railroad tracks and Beckwith from Ozark to Washington st.

Our share is just \$37,000. The county will aid with funds on the Lehigh job north of Dempster. The trustees agreed to pay our share of this project. They also voted to pay \$4,480 to NORTTRAN.

Martin Ashman said that relative to the suit by the Chicago Midwest Meat Association against Morton Grove, the village won the case and we do have the right to inspect food vehicles.

Administrator Fred Huber received permission to advertise for bids for the 50/50 tree program.

Bid opening will be on July 18 at 11 a.m. and be for seedless Green Ash, Honey Locusts, and Norway Maples.

Joan Dechert noted the next Blood Drive would be on July 5.

Don Snelder announced a two-part program on fitness at the library on July 18 at 7 p.m. and on July 10 at 7:30 p.m. Dr. David Bachman will speak on Sport Fitness.

But Mr. Wenson was told residents can plant along the sides of this alley, though not in the middle. He said this was fine and would be back to Jim Dahm of the Public Works Dept. with a sketch for his approval.

Mayor Flickinger announced the appointment of Steven L. Blonz, 7324 Palma ln. to the Zoning Commission.

Trustee Joan Dechert said the Garage Sale ordinance is not being followed since she has noticed too many signs for a sale. The Code Officer will be alerted to see to it this ordinance of only one sign per sale is carried out.

Mr. Mosier of 7515 Lyons said he was having a lot of trouble with Roselle Builders who he hired to do a room addition for his home. Mr. Mosier said he paid \$21,000 of the \$23,000 bill when the work was about 3/4 done. They never finished the job and what was done was very poor work. He tried to get the builder to finish the job, but has had no luck. His attorney sent many letters and he made repeated phone calls, but to no avail. Also the builder would not accept a registered letter stating what remained to be done.

Mr. Mosier brought pictures so the board could see the terrible job done and left unfinished. He wants some help from the board hoping they will put pressure on the bonding company. However, the board said that they were in touch with the bonding company who said they were no longer obligated since Mr. Mosier would not allow the contractor on his property and ordered him off. They maintained this should be handled in a private lawsuit by the property owner against the contractor, but added the village staff would testify for Mr. Mosier at the hearing.

Mr. Mosier said he would like to see the board take action on this matter.

separate trusts and four separate individual owners. Contract to purchase, he noted, was predicated on obtaining the petitioned change in zoning.

Plans call for construction of a 60' ft. high building containing 48 units, with a majority 2 and 3 bedroom units, located on 5 habitable floors which would be above two levels of parking, one level above grade and the other under grade. The double parking area provides for 96 parking sites with an additional outside 20 spaces for visitors and guests.

Amenities include a patio sitting area, inside parking, an outside swimming pool with access to bathroom facilities in the building, a health club with bath and sauna on the second floor of the building and a meeting room with coffee bar on the first floor. Also, shuffleboard, individual laundries, and "more than sufficient" landscaping.

A tax impact study indicated a real estate tax revenue yield of \$58,000 of which the village would receive \$4,500; the elementary school district \$9,700; the high school district \$20,000; Park District \$4,200; and the Library District approximately \$1,800.

Tr. Angelo Marcheschi Tuesday night voiced concern over the storm sewer system. "You'll be taking a lot of storm water from the property to put into village sewers," he requested review by village engineers, Marcheschi noted "I want to be sure the sewers can adequately handle the flow."

While Architect Dan LeNoble noted the parking areas were designed to provide for water

retention, Marcheschi brought a laugh from the audience with the observation "We've been getting 100 year rains every 3 years."

Board President Nicholas Blase said he would be interested in hearing economic factors "of cost per unit and on lot development per unit." Tr. Carol Panek, perturbed over the land slope (approximately 8 1/4 ft.) from west to east, requested visual planning of the site and adjacent properties.

In other action Tuesday night trustees unanimously approved a petition by Roy Makela of Niles for a zoning change to permit construction of an addition to the Chambers Restaurant at 6881 Milwaukee ave.

Special Use rezoning conditionally approved by the Plan Commission May 7 specifically noted village requirement of a 10 ft. distance between the proposed new addition and an existing garage on the property.

During the village board hearing continued from June 12 Makela presented revised plans which conform to village code with a 10% variation to a 9 ft. space.

Also requested by Makela, an 8 ft. high brick court wall at the south end of the property was turned away by trustees because of a maximum 6 ft. height requirement set by village code.

While board members asked Makela to consider a lower, 6 ft. high, wall of brick which would "be far more aesthetically pleasing" and "would last longer," Makela said he would prefer to put in a wood fence of lower height.

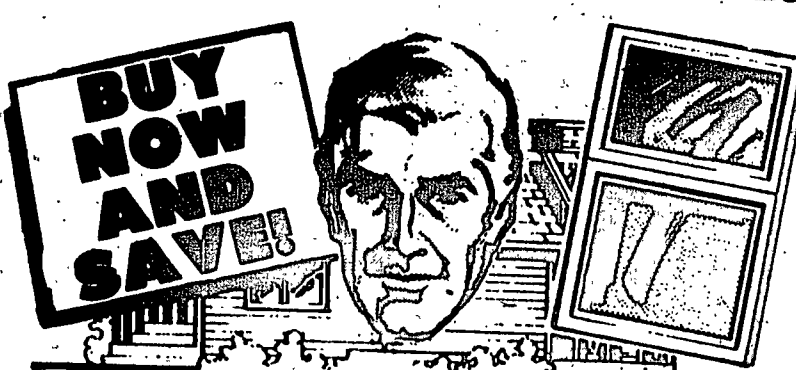

School voter registration pioneered by Kusper continues

Letters requesting voter registration dates at every public and private high school, junior college and college in suburban Cook County are again being sent to school administrators, Cook County Clerk Stanley T. Kusper, Jr., announced.

"We're expecting a heavy registration for next year's presidential election, and in keeping with a policy practiced by this office for the past six years, we are encouraging voter registration at public and private schools to make registration as easy as possible," Kusper said.

Actually, Kusper pioneered school voter registration back in 1971, when, as Chairman of the Chicago Board of Election Commissioners, he registered the first 18-year-old voter in the nation. He initiated the policy of school voter registration in the suburbs when he became Cook County Clerk in 1973.

Letters are being sent to the

administrators of each suburban school requesting permission to establish voter registration facilities. Each school may choose its own registration date.

"In addition to registering students, school registration sites are also open to all members of the general public to make registration even more convenient," Kusper said.

"Last year 10,320 students were registered to vote at 62 participating suburban school locations," Kusper said. "So far this year, in a generally off year, 1,875 suburban students have registered to vote at suburban school sites. But due to the heavy interest already being expressed in next year's presidential election, we're expecting even greater suburban school voter registration participation."

"During the last presidential election, in 1976, 17,314 young voters were registered at suburban school sites," Kusper said.

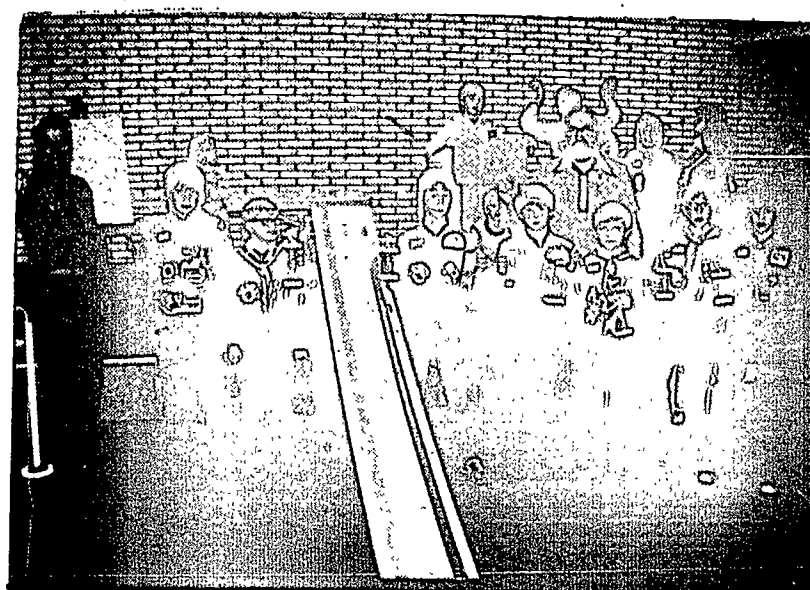

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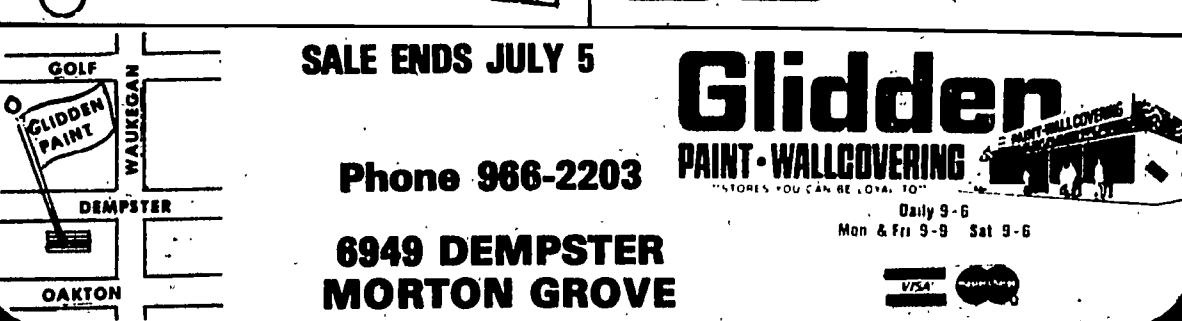
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Faulhaber named Assistant Principal at Maine South
