Park Board views cross country ski proposal

Niles Park District commissioners are eyeing the possibility of leasing Tam Golf Course for cross country skiing.

Park Director William Hughes said Monday night a proposal by Joseph McNulty of Chicago Cross Country Skiers Inc. was geared to a 4-year contract at \$7,200. The contract provides for use of park

district land, clubhouse, utilities and parking area. The park district would retain rights to the concession stands.

Hughes said the company would subsidize cost of insurance and would supply snow-making equipment and extra lighting. A separate fee would be geared to Niles residents.

Park President Dan Kosiba indicated a one-year rental on a trial basis would be more amenable and suggested a meeting later this week for discussion of specifics with company representatives.

In other discussion Nov. 26 park commissioners favored shrubbery in place of a 5-foot fence

along Tam Golf Course property adjoining commercial property owned by J. Emil Anderson near Howard St.

While Comr. Walt Beusse argued for fencing which would provide security and safekeeping from vandals and trespassers, fellow board members leaned toward use of eighty 6 ft.

honeysuckle hedges projected for spring planting at a cost of \$650. Snow fencing was proposed for winter use to be replaced with shrubbery landscaping in spring by Anderson along the top portion of his land.

From the LEFT HAND

Niles Park District threw a fine bash 2 weeks ago celebrating its 25th anniversary. The dinner-dance, chaired very ably by Elaine Heinen, was paid for by all the guests including the 14 commissioners and ex-commissioners who showed up.

While Elaine insisted the affair was to be a fun night, some of us felt a bit nostalgic recalling the names of the commissioners who served the district thru the years.

Ed Leith, the first park board president, came in from Carmel, Indiana. Ed, along with Walt Zalud, Bill Dressel, Lee Cress and John Lamber were the first elected officials in 1954. Frank Jacobs, who became a commissioner in 1959, was secretary in those first days. Frank attended the party with his wife, Millie. Unfortunately, Leith is the lone survivor of the five men elected to the first park board.

In the 60's, Bernie Miller, Jacobs, Chuck Giovannelli, Ray Eagan, Jules Pandera, Jack Leske, Steve Chameriski, Joe DiMaria, Sherwin Levinson, Keith Peck, Lou Schreiner, Jerry Sullivan, Mike Provenzano and Walt Beusse served when the great expansion of the park district took place.

In 1962 the Milwaukee ave. land-pool referendum was passed. The aluminum pool cost \$91,000 to build in the early 60's. Additional land was purchased at NICO Park, Oak School, the Recreation Center and at the Ballard Park location.

In 1968 a 1.67 million dollar referendum was passed which along with a \$307,000 federal grant, enabled the district to expand its facilities and parks. The Lou Schreiner gym, the Ballard Sports Complex, the Oakton Manor fieldhouse and the administration building were included in the referendum. Additional land was purchased in Kirk Lane, Shermer Park, Greenwood Park and Washington Terrace Park.

In 1965, the district had 15 acres and 3 parks. In 1979 the district owns 82.4 park acres, leases 20.25 acres, owns 3 recreation centers, 1 sports complex, 16 parks, 2 swimming pools, 1 indoor ice rink, 1 golf course, 16 ballfields and 21 tennis courts.

Project 900 fewer students by 1984-85 school year

District 63 studies plans for declining enrollment

By the 1984-85 school year, East Maine School District 63 will lose almost 900 students according to a percentage projection presented by Acting Supt. Donald Stetina at a regularly scheduled board meeting in Apollo Junior High School, 10100 Dee rd., Des Plaines.

This year's enrollment is about 3,757 students.

Totals were derived according to normal percentage drops in the student population. According to Stetina, they have been "very close" during the last two years.

A tax rate referendum and closing of a junior high school were considered among priorities to be studied for the District's long-range plans. Other studies will include energy conservation, cost savings procedure, the teacher-pupil ratio, completing requirements for daily physical education and a pilot program for gifted children.

Controversy centered around whether board members should provide input before or after the studies were completed. It was

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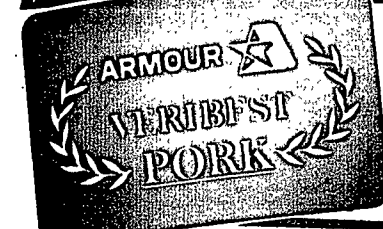

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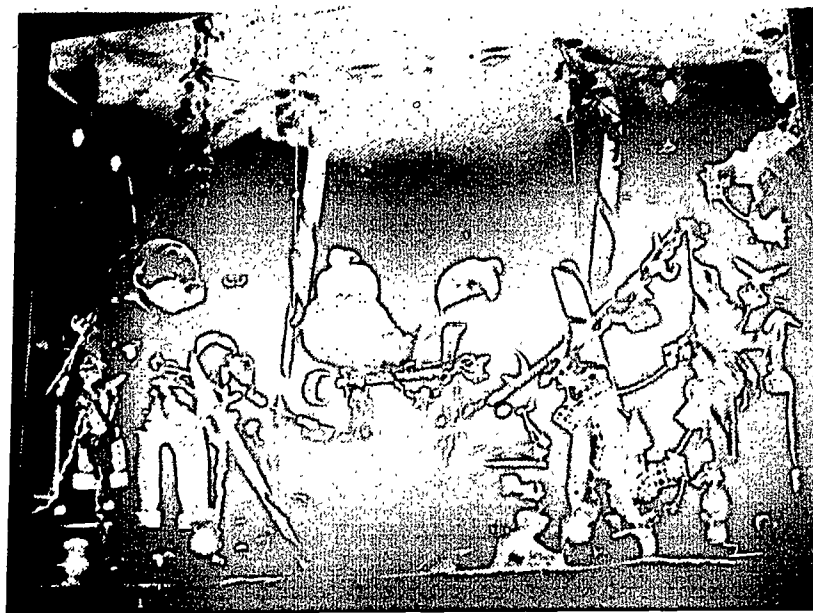

Police said the burglars entered the home apparently using a key. No signs of force were noted.

Once inside the thieves entered the den taking the stereo and removed the jewelry and cash from a dresser.

The victim told police he noted a red and white window van pull away from the area at a high rate of speed as he came home.

Niles Police Lt. John Christie said a male informant advised police Nov. 19 that films on consignment, an order catalog and price list were available from the occupant at the Harlem ave. address where he reportedly had been in operation for the past 3 years.

On Nov. 20 police obtained a search warrant and went to the store around 4:30 p.m. where Krawchuk was arrested following police seizure of 27 boxes of Super 8 and regular 8 films and other porno items. Christie said the search yielded approximately 4,465 rolls of porno "stag" films.

Niles man held in slaying of estranged wife

A 25 year old student from Saudi-Arabia was being held in Cook County Jail for the Nov. 24 stabbing death of his estranged wife in a Greenlakes apartment.

Charged in the Saturday slaying of Deborah Nabhan, 28, of Vernon Hills was Abdulaziz Nabhan of 9128 Terrace in north Niles.

Nabhan appeared Monday morning Nov. 26 at a preliminary hearing in Niles before Circuit Court Judge George Zimmerman who ordered him held without bond in Cook County jail. Another hearing is set for Dec. 10 in Des Plaines.

Niles police said they were called to the scene by Cook County Sheriff's police who were summoned by Nabhan after the slaying occurred. No disturbance was apparently noted by neighboring apartment dwellers according to police.

They said the couple had gone to the Greenlakes apartment Saturday night around 10 p.m. where an argument followed. Nabhan was said to have picked up an 8-in. long knife and allegedly stabbed the woman to death.

Nabhan, in the United States on a student visa from Saudi-Arabia, is finalizing his second year in the Traffic Institute of Northwestern University.

Niles Police Lt. John Christie described him to be a sombre, intelligent man.

Police said the couple, separated for several weeks, had been married for three to four months. A 9 year old daughter of the slain woman is expected to go to the victim's former husband residing in Brian, Ohio. Christie said much international interest is being exhibited in the case. Several representatives from Saudi-Arabia are reportedly en route to the States to discuss the case with American officials.

Industrial theft

Two electric typewriters, several air compressors and \$130 in cash along with a \$4,500 van and tools were stolen in burglary overnight Nov. 17 of Northwest Industrial Piping, an industrial firm at 7475 Oak Park ave.

Police said the burglars cut a gate lock to the rear parking lot then entered the building by pulling the lock mechanism on a rear door. A bolt cutter and crowbar were found on the ground near the door.

Once inside the burglars went thru the entire building ransacking each office.

A safe was found in the central offices which had the lock mechanism pried off. Cash boxes from the safe had been pried open.

The burglars then went to a work area and loaded the stolen items into a company 1977 Dodge truck van and left thru the rear garage door.

Witnesses said he was joined by a younger woman in her late twenties.

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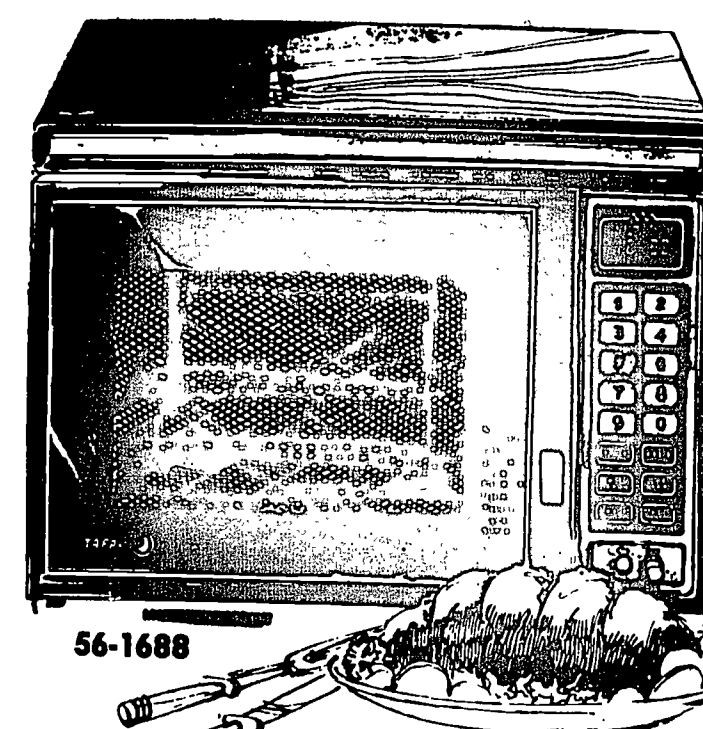
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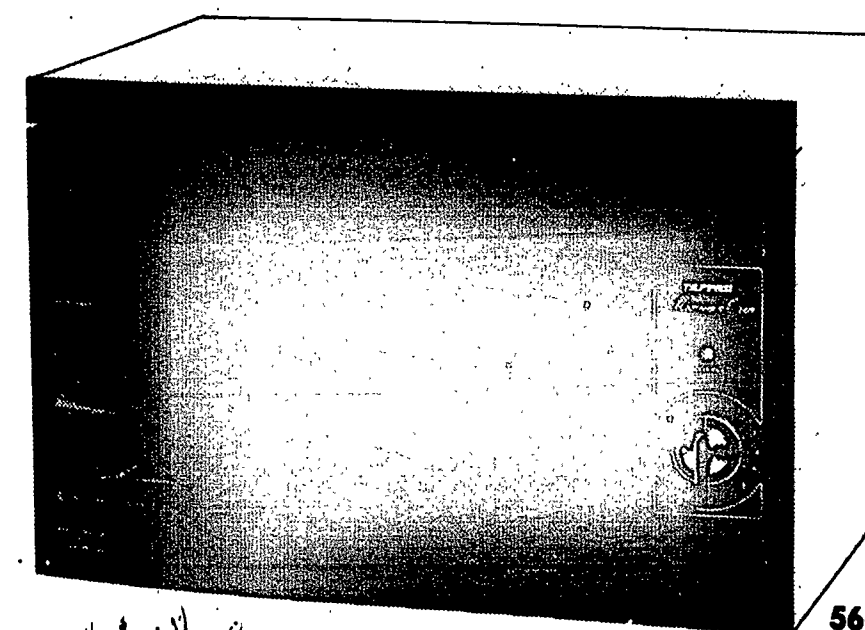
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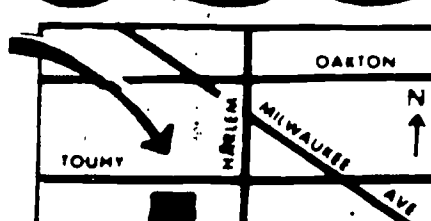
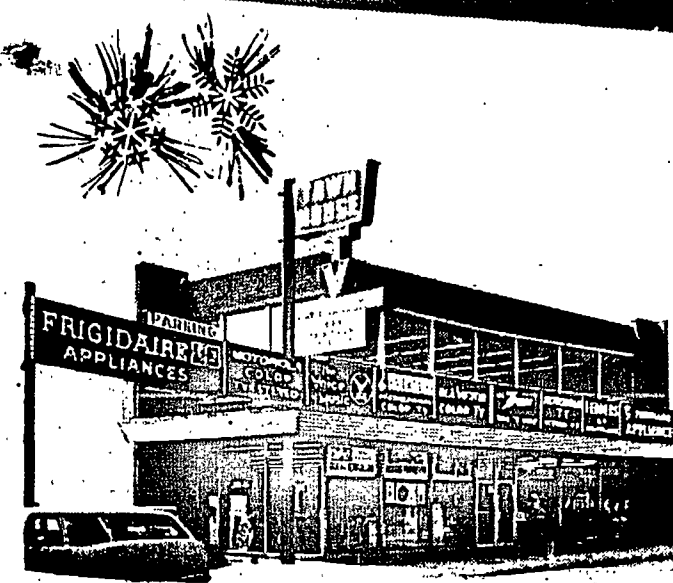
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CHURCH AND TEMPLE NOTES

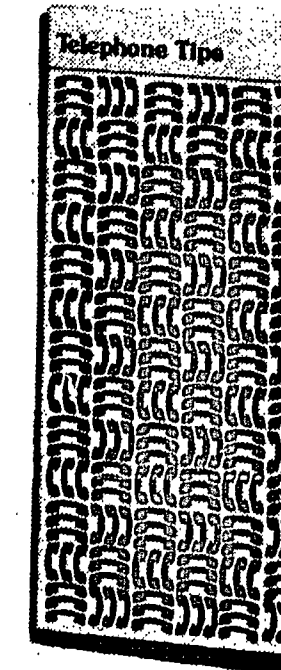

New bond posting rules

The Illinois Supreme Court has revised the procedural rules for posting of bond by traffic offenders.

The new rules which go into effect November 15 apply only to minor traffic offenses occurring inside Cook County and permit State Troopers, Sheriffs and State Dept. of Conservation officers to accept, at the violator's option, a cash bail of up to \$50. Previous rules required that cash bail be deposited in an envelope addressed to the court and placed in a U.S. postal box by the violator and the arresting officer. That procedure often caused undue hardship on motorists stopped in rural areas far from a town having mail service.

Under Supreme Court rules traffic offenders may post an Illinois drivers license, an approved bail bond card of \$35 cash bail to guarantee their court appearance or the payment of a fine later. According to State Police Superintendent, R. J. Miller, the rules were amended after the

State Police met with Illinois Supreme Court Administrative people. "I want to stress that our Troopers will accept the cash bail only at the violator's option," Miller said. "If the driver wishes to witness the mailing of the court addressed envelope containing the bond money, the Trooper will honor the request and both will travel to the nearest mail box." Miller stressed that the Troopers will personally deliver or mail any tickets issued including bond money to the court before the end of their tour of duty. According to the State Police, the arrestee will continue to receive a signed receipt for the cash bail. Providing receipts for posted bond has been the required practice for over 16 years.

"The only real difference in the rule is that now the motorist stopped for a traffic offense will not be detained and required to make an out-of-the-way trip to a post office box to mail the cash bond to the court," Miller said.

Car thefts

Safety Hints

In order to provide safer conditions and more convenience for Illinois motorists who normally renew their driver's license during winter months, I call your attention to a program which could be of importance.

Renewal notices now are being mailed approximately 45 days before expiration date, but all drivers may renew their license up to one year in advance of the expiration, thus avoiding ice and snow.

Drivers whose birthdays come during cold and bad weather months have been at a disadvantage with regard to taking their driver's license exam. Even when a road test was not required for renewal, they still had to drive to the facility for a photo, often in icy weather or hazardous streets and roads.

The alternative offered by my office allows every Illinois driver the opportunity to obtain a license renewal under ideal weather and road conditions, and this service is also available to persons who are usually out of town when their driver's license expires.

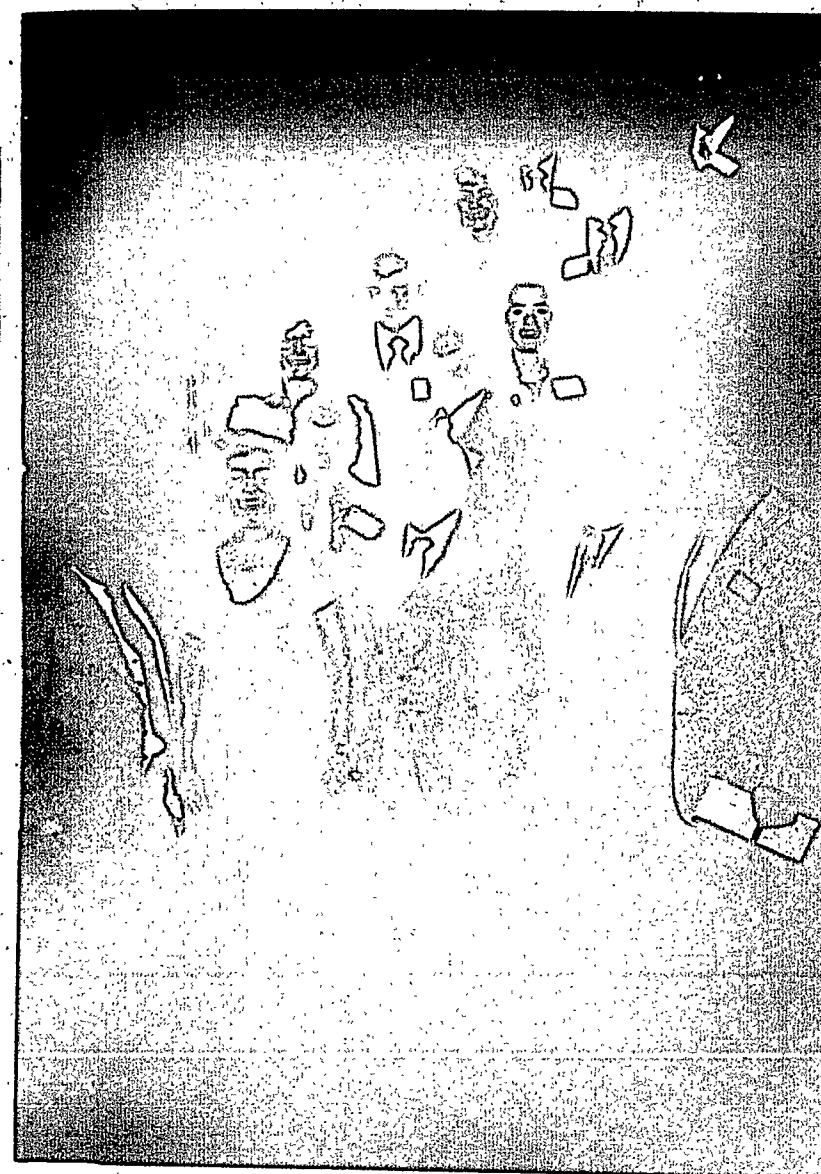

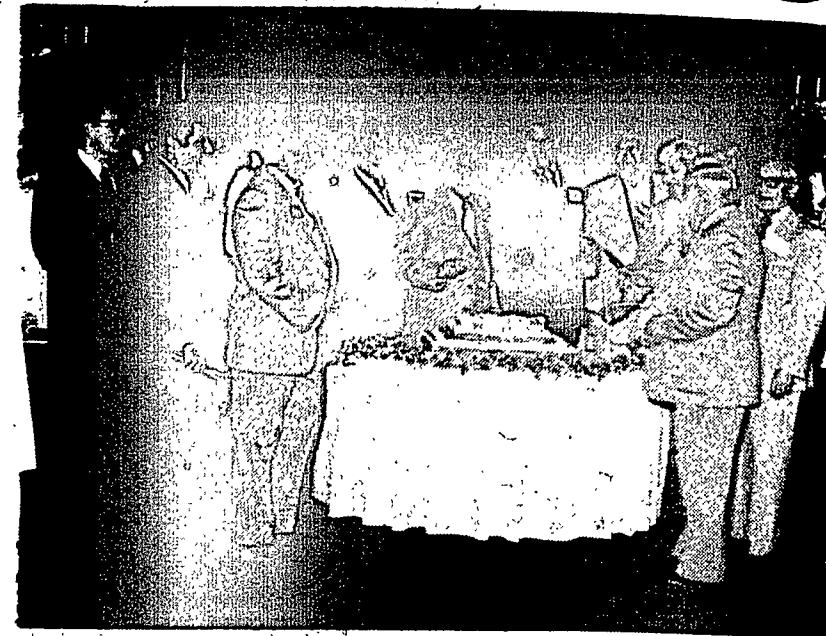

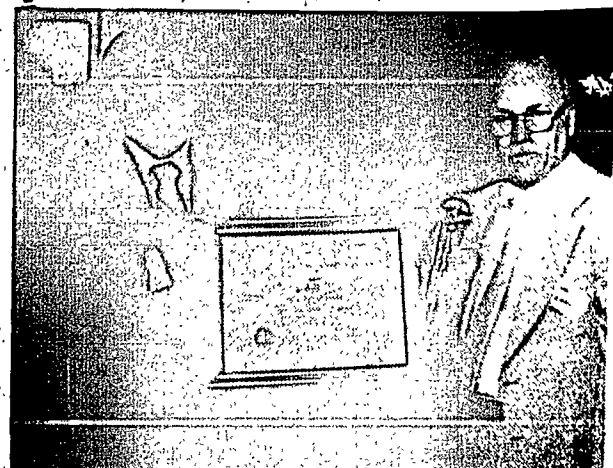

State committee seeks mandatory auto emission testing

A joint House-Senate committee has been established to help the State develop a program for mandatory auto emissions testing in the Chicago metropolitan area, State Rep. Penny Pullen (R-4th) announced this week.

The committee will hold hearings in DuPage and Will Counties Friday, Nov. 30. It is co-chaired by Sen. Charles Chew and Rep. Myron Kulas (both D-Chicago).

No hearings have been scheduled yet for Cook County, Rep. Pullen reported, although the committee already has hearings scheduled into January in Lake County and in East St. Louis, the other metropolitan area affected.

"According to the committee's announcement," Rep. Pullen said, "the State is mandated to begin testing by 1982. An annual inspection of every automobile is required under the federal Clean Air Act."

"Tailpipe exhaust will be measured for 'unacceptable' pollution emissions, and motorists whose exhaust fumes fail the tests will be required to have their autos tuned and retested."

"The citizens of the area will be required to undergo the testing and correction program annually as long as the metropolitan area

does not meet federal standards for ozone and carbon monoxide," Miss Pullen said.

She added that the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency has already completed a study of alternative methods of administering such a testing program and has already presented its findings to the Chew-Kulas committee.

Miss Pullen urged area residents to attend either the Joliet or the Wheaton hearing Friday or to send comments to her office at 22 Main st., Park Ridge, 60068.

The first hearing Friday will be at 10 a.m. till noon in Courtroom 2-B00 on the second floor of the DuPage County Complex, 421 N. County Farm rd., Wheaton.

The committee will hold its second two-hour hearing Friday at 1:30 p.m. in the Joliet City Council Chambers at Route 52 East and Joliet st. in downtown Joliet.

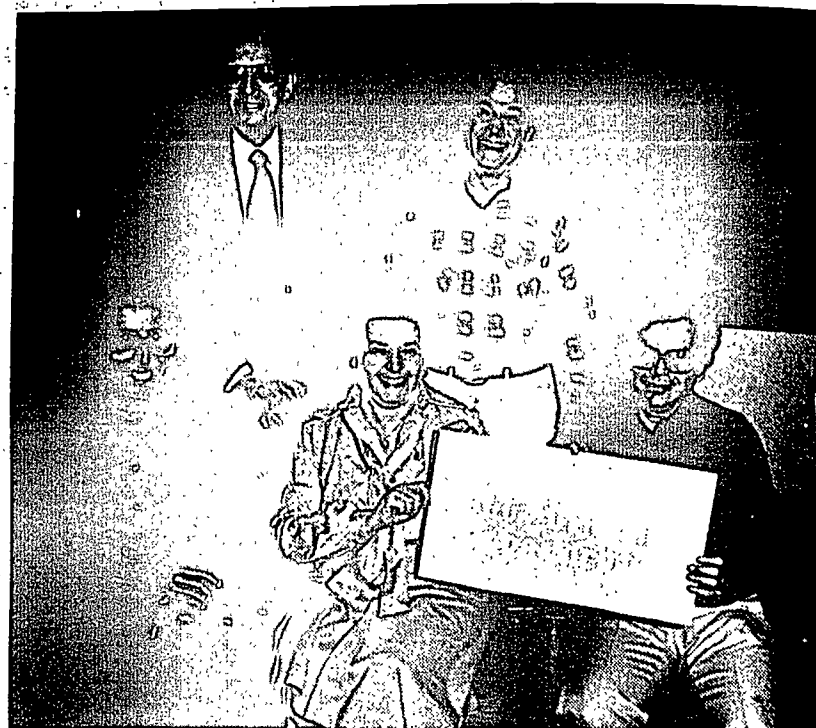

District 207 Board to act on planning document

At its Dec. 3 meeting the Maine Board of Education is expected to give its stamp of approval to the bulk of material contained in a draft long range planning report and announce plans for community involvement in studies on the document.

Subcommittees set up to refine the report prepared by the District 207 administration and work out the issue of community involvement were created by the Board's education committee at its Nov. 19 meeting. The subcommittees met on Friday, Nov. 23 and will report back to the Board on Dec. 3.

The long-range planning document projects continual declining enrollment for District 207 and a \$10 million deficit by 1983 unless changes are made in the school district operation.

Commenting on the report, Board Member Charlotte Storer said the report "was very well done." The other Board members present at the Nov. 19 meeting concurred.

The Board also agreed that the long-range planning studies must be a priority item for the Board. The District should have a plan in place by September in order to implement whatever action the Board takes.

Among those options offered the Board in the report to avoid the projected deficit are: Seeking a 60 cent increase in the District's education tax rate to operate four smaller but equal schools; and closing a school building plus a smaller tax increase to operate three high schools.

Approval of the bulk of the report means that the Board accepts certain conclusions made about the District's future.

- The current enrollment of 9,912 in the Maine schools can be expected to decrease to around 6,000 students by 1987.

- The school district will continue to reduce staff because of declining enrollment.

- A \$10 million deficit for the school district by 1983 is certain if

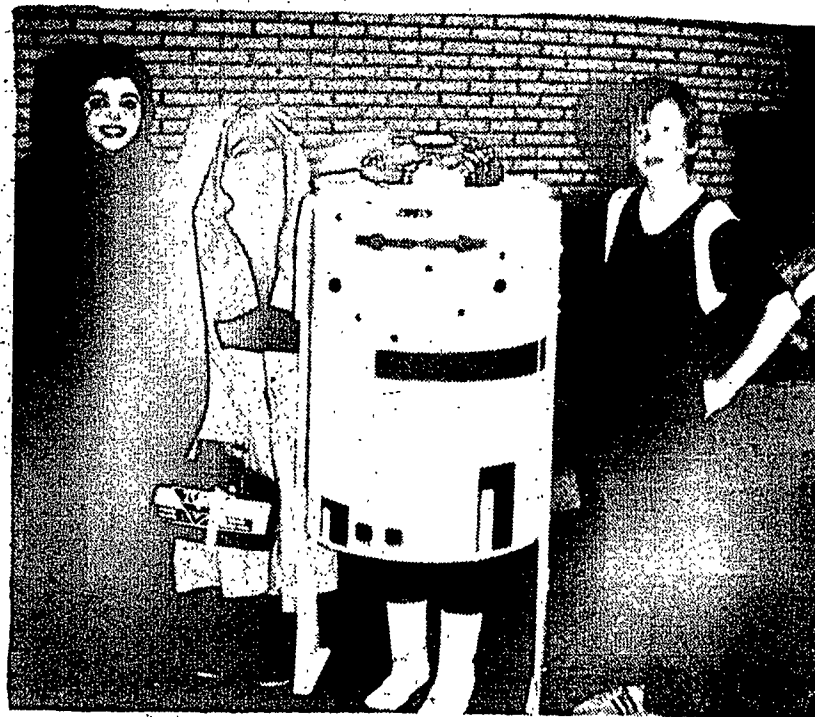
the District's present revenue sources remain the same.

Board approval also gives credence to the hallmarks of excellence of the Maine schools as presented in the report. The hallmarks include an extensive curricular and extracurricular program; an exceptional college preparatory curriculum; an excellent career education program; a wide variety of special education programs.

In addition such hallmarks as excellent school facilities and equipment; a comprehensive physical education program; an outstanding student performance record; a highly talented professional staff and administrative team; a network of special and supportive services; dedicated and concerned Boards of Education; and a supportive and responsive community are acknowledged as necessary for continued high quality high school education in Maine.

MG Postmaster issues holiday mailing reminder

A seasonal reminder not to forget the postage stamps when mailing holiday greeting cards was issued today by Morton Grove Postmaster Louis G. Principali.

No stamps means no delivery, he cautioned.

"And if your cards have no return address, chances are you won't even know that they never got where you intended them to go. If there is a return address, they'll come back to you marked 'returned for postage'."

It's been more than 3 years since the Postal Service discontinued its previous practice of

delivering unpaid mail "postage due" and collecting from the addressee.

Yet, a surprising amount of mail still gets into the system without postage, Postmaster Principali said.

Every day, for example, the Chicago post office receives an average of 1,600 letters that have neither postage nor return address.

"We are able to return more than 90% of these to the sender," says Howard Tomlin, who is in charge of the "dead letter" section of the Chicago post office, "because much of this mail is for

payment of bills, and usually the sender's address appears somewhere on the bill."

But that's not the case for Christmas cards, which seldom have the sender's address inside. "So," says Mr. Tomlin, "the sad fact is that a lot of Christmas messages and New Year wishes will be wastes unless you remember to apply proper postage."

Mr. Tomlin's office handles undeliverable mail for all of Illinois and lower Michigan. Similar dead letter offices serve other sections of the country. Mail without postage goes to a

dead letter office, rather than back to the sender, only if it has no return address.

Postmaster Principali also cautioned that careless addressing is even a greater cause for mail to wind up in a dead letter office.

He noted that the Chicago Post Office received more than 200,000 pieces of mail during the first three weeks in November that couldn't be delivered because of incorrect or illegible address, and had to be opened because there was no return address on the envelope.

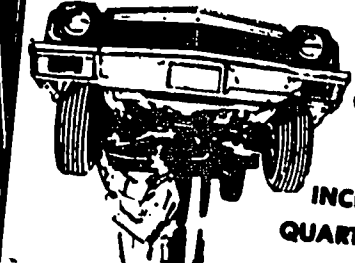

In November, 1973, the nine-hole Tam golf course was purchased.

Since 1954, thirty-nine people have been elected or appointed to Niles Park Board. Four have been women. Thirty-one have been elected, eight have been appointed. Of those elected Jack Leske was elected to 3 consecutive terms dating back to 1961. Giovanelli, Schreiner, Eagan, Sullivan, Charnerski, Arnold and Bessie were elected twice and Charnerski also served as an appointee.

In 1955 the district had 25 million dollars of assessed valuation with a tax rate under .100 per \$100. Today, the valuation is 279 million dollars with a .392 tax rate.

There were lots of battles, large and small thru the years. Lots of egos were bruised and lots of politicking dominated park activities. There were bits of hanky panky, one serious enough which could have put one guy in the pokey. Another time a non-park person, an insurance agent, failed to turn premiums into his company collected from the park district. Subsequently, he did wind up going to jail after securing loans with false premiums.

There were other bits of eyebrow raising. Petty acquisitions of park property wound up in some of the park commissioners' homes.

While there was a great deal of political infighting, particularly in the early days of the district, there was a tremendous amount of dedication and sheer hard work which did much to improve the Niles community. The trekking thru the snows three and four days a week to attend endless meetings, the knocking on doors to pass referendums, the losing and winning referenda after months of tireless efforts, are all badges these commissioners can wear proudly.

Unlike other elected posts, being a park commissioner gives a person little recognition. Most residents attending park board meetings, and they are darn few, generally are there because they want something or because they're unhappy. Being a commissioner is not a job for a person seeking glory.

In addition to the names we've mentioned, you have to add Lou Schreiner, Jules Pandera, Sherwin Levinson, Keith Peck, Mike Provenzano, Bill Keener, Millie Jones, Jeff Arnold, Dan Kosiba, Mary Marusek, Louella Preston and Elaine Heinen as commissioners who have made substantial contributions to the district. Jim Orphan, the attorney for many years, did yeomen's work on behalf of the district and Gabe Barraffato kept the ship on even keel the past 10 years. Park Director Bill Hughes is one of the best, if not the best, the district has ever had.

The Bugle has been covering nearly every park board meeting since 1957. We've been friends with many of the commissioners, and at odds with many, when we thought the district was being short-changed. But whether or not the guys and gals were wearing white hats, most of them had one common denominator - they tried hard, and most of them did what they thought was in the best interests of the community. As we noted before, it has often been a thankless job. But the number of facilities and programs the district has 25 years later is the best testimony of a job well done.

Niles is much better because these 28 commissioners served. We join with Nilesites in saluting these people who made this 25th anniversary possible.

for our quiet little village," according to Mrs. Ronnie Brenner. She cited traffic problems, drainage and sewer problems and "the aesthetic effect of this new look of Morton Grove" as basic reasons for the protest.

Mr. Harold Cohon said that endorsing the proposal could turn Morton Grove into a "developer's delight of anything goes." He objected to language in the community plan which would have the village "acquire and demolish" land and buildings. He questioned that village trustees would want to be remembered for this. According to Cohon, the Protest Association is "not opposed to change, but change for change's sake is stupid."

In asking that the Board table their endorsement of the Plan, Cohon reminded Trustees the platform on which they had been elected showed their wish to curtail development.

In answering the protesters, Trustee Don Snider said he does not see why there is a confrontation, as he cited examples in which the Board has fought developers. Mayor Flickinger explained the Board must hear every case; it does not imply they support each one.

Trustee Joan Dechert's motion the proposal be tabled until more community meetings could be held was passed.

Another issue at the Village Board meeting which aroused community reaction involved Jewel's new No Frills store at 5915 W. Dempster. The store's operation is in violation of an ordinance requiring individual item pricing. At the last village meeting, it was decided the store could remain in operation for two weeks so citizen reaction could be analyzed.

Trustees received many calls indicating residents wanted the opportunity to save money. The No Frills attorney Ralph Miller presented a petition of 1,000 signatures from store patrons who support the money saving concept of not marking items when price lists are available and prices are posted.

Trustee Richard Hobs remained skeptical of the operation fearing customers would be cheated at the cash registers. Mrs. Dechert claimed, "Unfortunately we have to be Big Brother; we have to protect people who shop."

Trustee Snider argued people should be able to decide whether or not they want to shop in such a store. "We have a free enterprise system and thank heavens we do."

The trustees voted to add an exemption to the existing ordinance which would allow no individual item pricing under certain specific conditions. Village Attorney Ashman will draw up an amendment with acceptable language.

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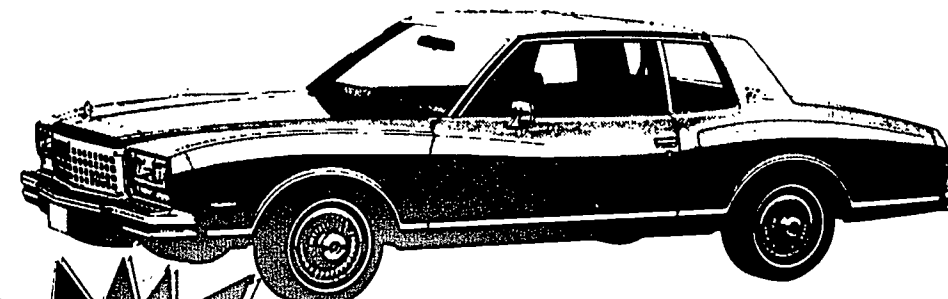
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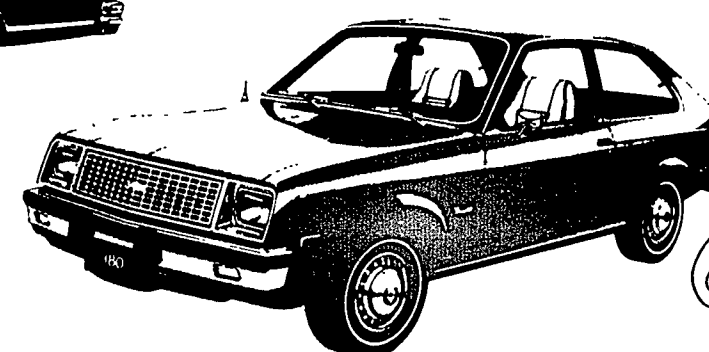
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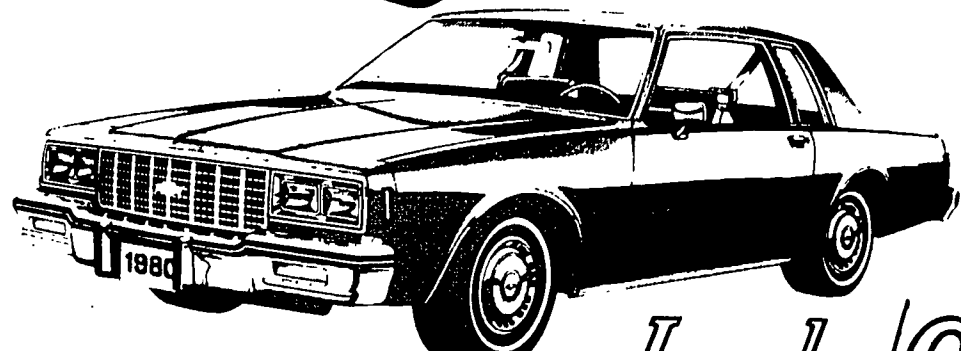
