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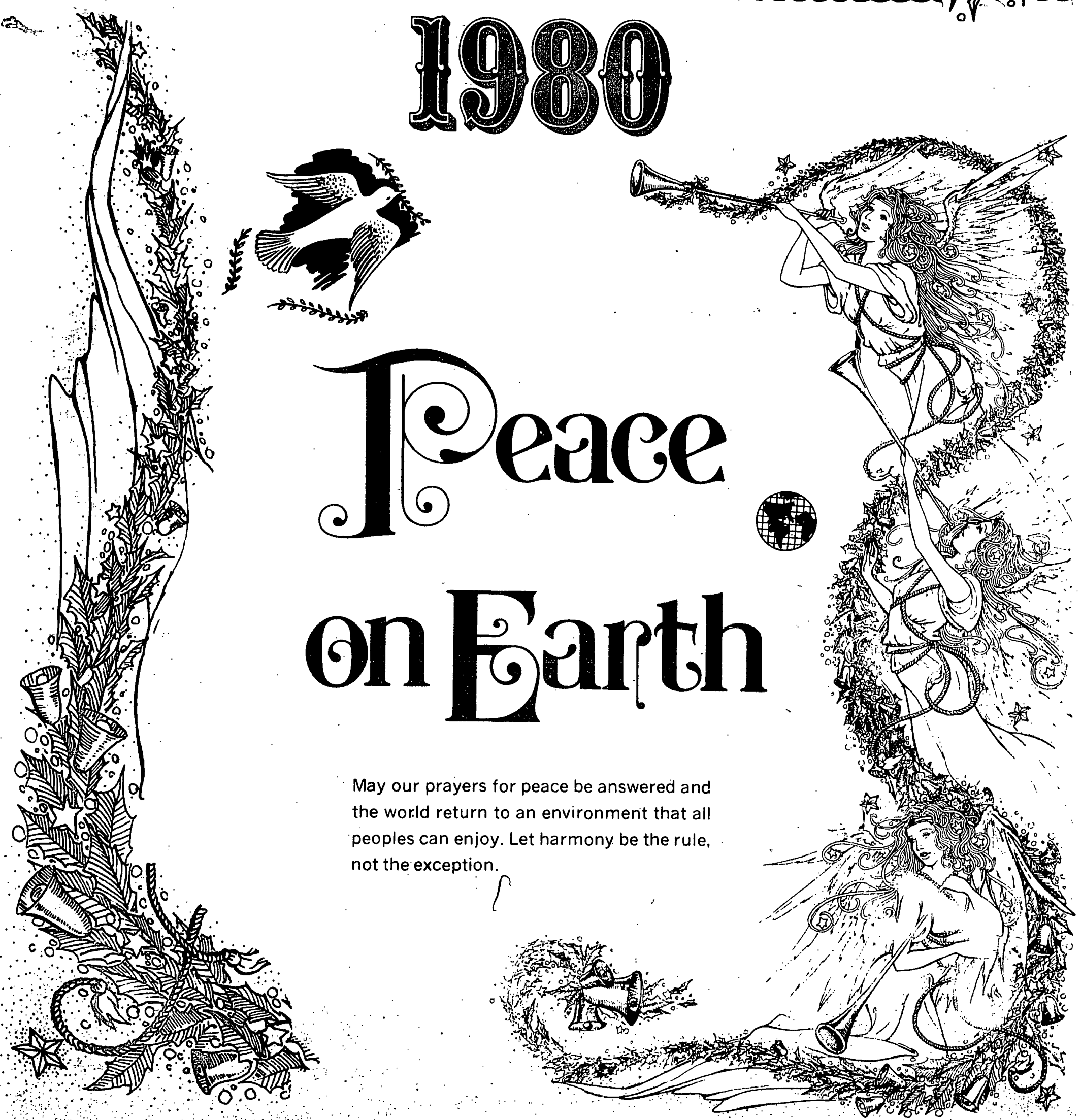
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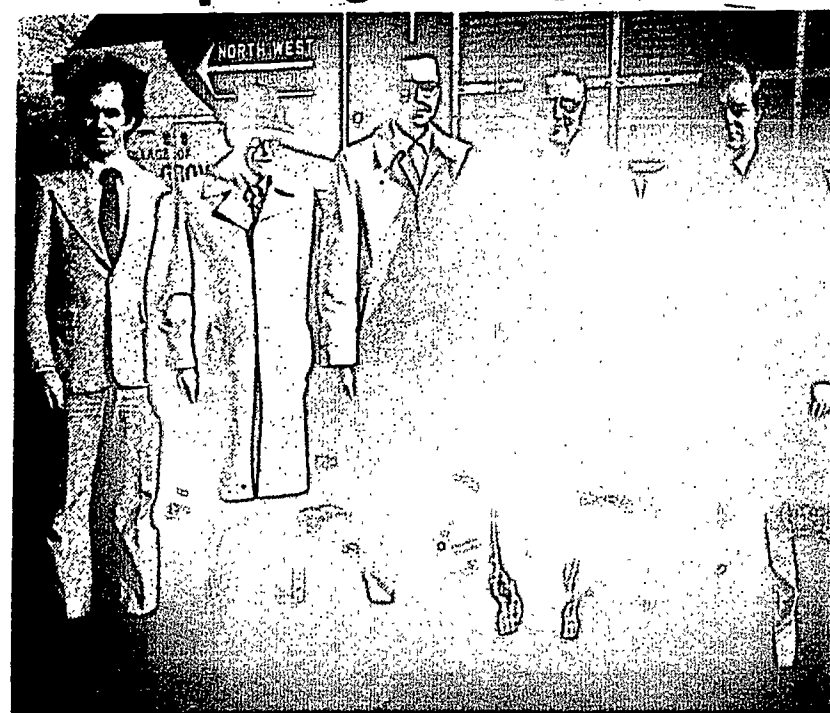

In addition to the special Blood Donor Day, Holy Family holds weekly drawings in the Laboratory on Monday evenings, 5:30 to 8 p.m. To make an appointment for both the special Blood Donor Day or weekly drawing, please call the Laboratory at 297-1800, ext. 1900, weekdays 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Holy Family is a member of the North Suburban Blood Center providing blood supplies to hospital patients and residents in the Northwest Suburbs. Since blood has a shelf life of only 21 days, the supply from volunteer donors must be continuous.

Almost everyone in good health between the ages of 17 and 65 and weighing at least 110 lbs. is qualified to give blood. The blood pressure of potential donors is taken and they are asked a series of questions pertaining to their medical history when they come to donate.

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Japanese team studies Oakton's new energy-wise campus

A team of Japanese businessmen conducting a nationwide tour on energy conservation visited Oakton Community College on Friday, Nov. 9, to study the energy-saving features of Oakton's award-winning permanent campus in Des Plaines.

The Energy Conservation Study Team, which consisted of 10 engineering executives and managers from Japan's real estate, manufacturing and construction industry, 2 interpreters, and a tour guide, came to the United States to learn first-hand how Americans are trying to improve energy efficiency of both old and new homes and buildings. Oakton was selected as one of nine stops on their tour.

Buildings and homes in Japan have in the past been constructed with light frames and walls. Now, because of the energy crisis, the whole concept of building design and construction in Japan must be changed to incorporate energy conservation features.

The team's one-day tour of Oakton began with greetings from OCC president William A. Koehnline. Paul Gilson, founding director and co-chairman of the Facilities Committee, which established the original objectives for the permanent campus, then presented an overview of the guidelines and initial approaches taken by the college to optimize energy efficiency.

Oakton's energy consultant, Dave Grumman of Enercon, Inc., made a presentation on the energy conservation design features of the campus and presented life cycle cost studies of specific design and construction.

Following the briefing session, the team of visiting businessmen toured Oakton's permanent campus, under construction between

Golf and Central rds. in Des Plaines. The team members were particularly interested in the large, variable speed cooling fans and the special heating and cooling control systems.

In September 1978 Oakton's permanent campus received an award for its wide use of energy from the Greater Chicago Committee to Use Energy Wisely. The energy conservation features which Oakton designed into the permanent campus are now being incorporated, in part, into national guidelines for the construction of public buildings, according to Paul Gilson.

Nilehi all conference athletes

While girls' competitive volleyball is just starting its district and state series, the other fall sports have already made way for the winter group. The announcement of the Central Suburban League (CSL) All conference selectees was the fall group's final curtain call.

17 Niles West athletes took their bows as the school's all conference selectees from the five fall sports. Girls' tennis, girls' cross country and boys' cross country each had one on the CSL all conference cast list.

Junior Margie Kong, picked for her tennis ability, won with a 6-4 overall and a 4-2 conference singles record. She's listed as the 9th player in the CSL North Division and ranks among the top 48 players in the state. Sophomore Laura Friedlander is a first year runner whose season included setting a new Niles West course record (approximately 2 miles at 11'33"), winning both the Niles West and the Highland Park Invationals and qualifying for the state series. She's among the top runners in the state. Steve Rosenblum, co-captain of his cross country team this year, took 2nd place in the CSL and is the holder of the Niles West cross country course record. Junior Steve's record is also the fastest time in which the course has ever been run.

Football's ten all conference stars are all seniors and include quarterback Ben Froemming, linebacker Jim Sliwa, guards Bruce Well and Ron Asher, tackles Al Moltz and Ron Braver, tight end Phil Wax and center Marty Walsh. Sliwa and Braver also received all-area honors, with Braver in a supporting role as second best player of all players in the league.

Indians Frank Fornaris, defensive end, and Steve Moll, wide receiver, were cast among the group of "honorable mentions".

And the Indian kickers had a fair share of CSL all-conference stars for 1979. Named to the all conference team were halfback Dave Adkisson, and striker Ben Piro, both juniors, and fullback John Revis and forward Steve Siegel, seniors. Their varsity team ended the season this year in a tie for third in the conference, and was eliminated in the first round of the state series 1-0 by Niles North on penalty kicks, after regular play and 4 overtime periods failed to break the 0-0 tie.

Trustee Halverson named Clerk of Maine Township

Paul K. Halverson, a Trustee of Maine Township since 1973, was named the new Township Clerk at the Nov. 13 meeting of the governing board.

Halverson succeeds Philip Raffo, Clerk since 1967, who resigned the office effective Oct. 15 to assume a newly created suburban position on the Regional Transportation Authority board.

A new Trustee will be appointed soon by the Township board to fill Halverson's seat, and Maine Township Supervisor James J. Dowd asked that anyone interested in filling this vacancy send a resume to the Township office, Room 103, 2510 Dempster st., Des Plaines, IL. 60016, by Nov. 27.

A life-long Des Plaines resident, Halverson, 30, is a 1967 graduate of Maine West High School, and received a degree in Business Administration from Elmhurst College in 1972. While a student there he was twice elected vice president of his class.

Until recently he was associated with General Telephone Directory Company in Des Plaines where he has served as general accounting supervisor, assistant treasurer and credit manager. Previously he was senior auditor with the parent company, General Telephone and Electronics.

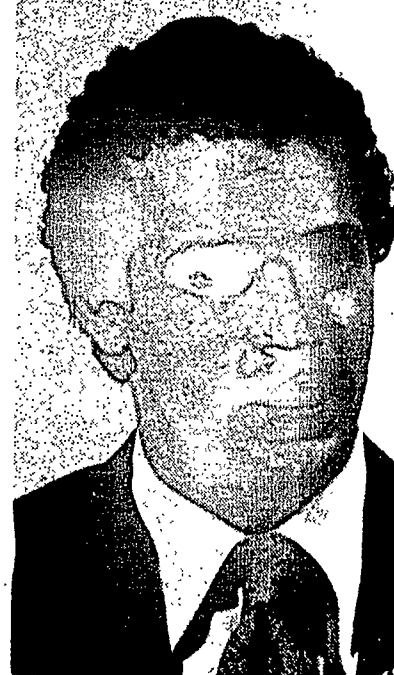
Halverson has been a Republican precinct captain in Maine Township since 1972, and has served as assistant treasurer, treasurer, and a member of the Finance Committee of the Regular Republican Organization.

When elected to his first term on the Township Board in 1973 at age 23, he was the youngest elected Trustee in Illinois history. He was reelected to a second four year term in April, 1977, so the person appointed to fill his vacancy will serve the unexpired portion of his term until the next Township election in April, 1981.

Supervisor Dowd termed Halverson as "unusually well qualified to serve as Township Clerk because of his accounting and auditing experience and his previous service as a Trustee. The part-time position carries a salary of \$7,000 annually.

The Clerk conducts township elections by securing polling places, appointing judges and posting public notices. He administers the oath of office to elected officials and serves as the official keeper of all township records, including minutes of the Board of Trustees meetings.

During the 12 years Philip Raf-

fe served as Clerk, the office was broadened to provide special services to Maine residents including voter registration, distribution of absentee ballot applications, selling county auto vehicle licenses and hunting and fishing licenses.

In accepting Raffo's resignation from the post with regret, the township board expressed appreciation for his excellent and long service and the many innovations he has brought to the clerk's office. Halverson says he expects no major changes to be made, but will continue to serve the community residents and the board to the best of his ability.

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Illinois Bell asks for first general local rate increase in six years

Illinois Bell today asked the Illinois Commerce Commission for its first general rate increase in local telephone rates in six years.

The company is asking for a 7 percent in total revenues to offset inflation-caused cost increases. The request is well below what the company could ask for with the standards set by the Federal government's council on Wage and Price stability.

"We haven't had a general rate increase since Jan. 1, 1974," said Illinois Bell President Charles Marshall.

"One of the major reasons telephone rates have remained a bargain is because our productivity has improved at a rate more than three times the national average. We have introduced cost-saving technology to offset part of the effect of inflation.

"In spite of stringent cost-cutting and productivity in-

creases, our costs keep going up," Marshall said. "While consumer goods and services, in general, have risen 118 percent since 1967, telephone prices have risen an average of only 29 percent.

"Illinois Bell can't supply service for the eighties at mid-seventies prices. We're asking for higher rates to keep the quality of telephone service as good in the future as it is today."

The proposed changes include higher rates for basic local service, for Touch-Tone service and Custom Calling services, as well as the standard phones, Design Line, Trimline and Princess phones. Higher charges for ordering and connecting phone service would bring these charges closer to the cost of doing the work. Increased charges for establishing or changing WATS service are also proposed.

The company has proposed higher rates for person-to-person operator-assisted long distance calls. Rates for direct-dialed long distance calls and for other operator-assisted calls such as credit card, collect and third number calls would remain the same.

Rates for extra directory listings and for unlisted directory service would be increased. A new monthly charge would be made for customers having their phone numbers listed only with directory assistance operators.

Illinois Bell asked to reduce the monthly call allowance to directory assistance from eight to five calls to further shift the cost of providing this service to the heavy users of the service. More than 86 percent of residential customers and 73 percent of business customers place five or fewer calls to directory assistance each month. The company also requested the elimination of the monthly credit.

Higher rates are proposed for six-button telephones and for some Private Branch Exchange (PBX) customers and some Centrex services.

Most (nearly 70%) of the rate increases - totaling \$201 million - involve services and equipment the customer has the option of selecting. The higher rates are

Following are examples of the effect of the proposal:

- A Chicago customer who has Measured Rate 80 service with one dial phone and uses 41 additional message units (AMUs) each month would see an 11-cent increase.

- An inner suburban customer who has Metropolitan service and uses 96 AMUs each month would see a 52-cent increase.

- An outer suburban customer who has Call-Pak 50 service with one dial phone and uses 37 AMUs each month would have a 97-cent increase.

- The increase for an outer suburban customer who has local service with one dial phone would be 90 cents.

- A customer outside the Chicago metropolitan area who has local service with one dial phone would see a 90-cent increase.

Marshall said that the company's 1980 construction budget to maintain and improve telephone service will be more than \$650 million.

"To continue this level of investment for present and future telephone service, Illinois Bell needs earnings which meet the competitive standards of outside investors - earnings well above what we're achieving today," Marshall said.

Marshall also said that the Commission-approved rate of return of 9.4 percent on the company's investment not only is inadequate but that the company will not earn at that level without higher rates in 1980.

LGH offers crisis and stress counseling

A continuing education program in crisis and stress counseling for clergy and other persons in counseling situations will begin January 9 at Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge.

The 12-week course entitled, "Helping Others Cope and Grow Through Stress and Crisis," will meet from 12:30 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. on Wednesdays, through March 28.

Sponsored by the hospital's division of Pastoral Care, the course will focus on the immediate issues of crisis and stress in a short-term helping relationship.

"The course will introduce and describe intervention strategies for persons under stress or in a crisis," explains the Rev. Lawrence Holst, chairman of Pastoral Care at Lutheran General.

He cites three major types of crises: "developmental," including natural stages in a person's life such as aging; "situational," such as illness, death of a loved one or divorce; and "mass disaster," such as a plane crash where there is community-wide deprivation and loss.

Because pastors, priests and rabbis traditionally have been perceived as stress and crisis intervenors, the Rev. Holst believes it is important to under-

stand certain methods and approaches to helping persons manage critical junctures in their lives.

"Many of the intervention strategies sanction and reinforce very traditional modes such as home visits and informal encounters. Some of the strategies are new," explains the Rev. Holst.

New LGH Outpatient Alcoholism Treatment Program

To be loved and raised in a caring family is a child's basic need, as the United Nations has stated throughout 1979, their designated International Year of the Child.

It is difficult, though, for a child's needs to be met in a family in which there is an alcoholism problem.

Families are learning how there is an alcoholism problem in their family. A new evening Primary Outpatient Program at the Alcoholism Treatment Center (ATC) of Lutheran General

Hospital, Park Ridge, is designed for the alcoholic and family.

The intensive four week, four-nights-a-week program places much emphasis on family participation. Special sessions for children and for spouses are held on two nights of each week while a patient is in other sessions.

Children and spouses are welcome to attend the family sessions even if the alcoholic is not enrolled in the Primary Outpatient Program.

"Children are seriously affected when there is alcoholism in the family," states Jack Clark,

coordinator of the Primary Outpatient Program.

"Children have a direct honesty. They usually tell things the way they are. When one of their parents is suffering from alcoholism, they hurt. They know something in their family is wrong and they want to change it. They usually are not afraid to speak up," the coordinator explains.

In separate group sessions, Clark and other counselors help the children and spouses of alcoholics understand alcoholism and their feelings about it. The

counselors explain the physical and emotional changes that the alcoholic is experiencing and how the family is affected.

"Family involvement benefits the alcoholic and the family by providing a more positive atmosphere for recovery."

The outpatient program, which began in November, allows the patient, who must meet certain medical criteria for acceptance, to remain of the job and to live at home while undergoing treatment. The outpatient program incorporates many of the principles of the ATC's inpatient

program. Teenagers with drinking problems also may be treated in the outpatient program. To be accepted, they must meet the medical criteria and be evaluated for motivation.

The Primary Outpatient Program consists of two phases. During the first phase, the patient attends sessions four nights a week, Monday through Thursday for four weeks. Each evening consists of:

...optional dinner for patients and family members at 5:45 p.m.;

...educational sessions on alcoholism and its effects on the individual and family members, and how recovery can be possible;

...discussion focused on personal identification with alcoholism;

...group experience led by staff members to encourage motivation and behavior change, and

...patient interaction and wrap-up.

In addition, each patient and spouse meets individually with a counselor.

During the second phase of the program, the patient and spouse are referred to a 12-week follow-up support group.

Throughout the program, the alcoholic is encouraged to attend two weekend Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) meetings. The family is encouraged to attend Al-Anon/Alateen meetings.

A person may enter the program at any time by contacting the Alcoholism Treatment Center at 696-6053. Within the next working day after calling the Center, the individual will have an appointment for an initial evaluation. Those who meet the medical and psychological entry requirements, may enter the Primary Outpatient Program immediately.

"We believe that alcoholism treatment is a real family affair," Coordinator Clark says. "The problem may belong to the alcoholic, but the solution belongs to the entire family."

"Widow to Widower"

Meeting on Skokie Park 1980 programs

Slides were also shown of Devonshire Center at which air-conditioning throughout the building was installed last summer. Other main accomplishments during the year were the painting of the interior walls of The Skatium and a new heat exchange system for the ice rink.

In addition to the accomplishments, Director Brown showed slides of many areas throughout the park system that need attention. Such areas as the tennis courts, parking lots, pathways, curbing and play areas are all in

need of renovation. The most dramatic need for remodeling was pointed out when slides of Devonshire and Oakton pools were shown.

As Park Board President, Adie Zuckerman, stated, "It is important for members of the community to know what we have done as well as what we will need to do in the future." She added that "The 80's will be challenging for all of us involved in parks and recreation services because recreation will become even more important in each individual's life." In addition, she stated that "recreation services will have to move ahead, reflecting the changes in our leisure needs."

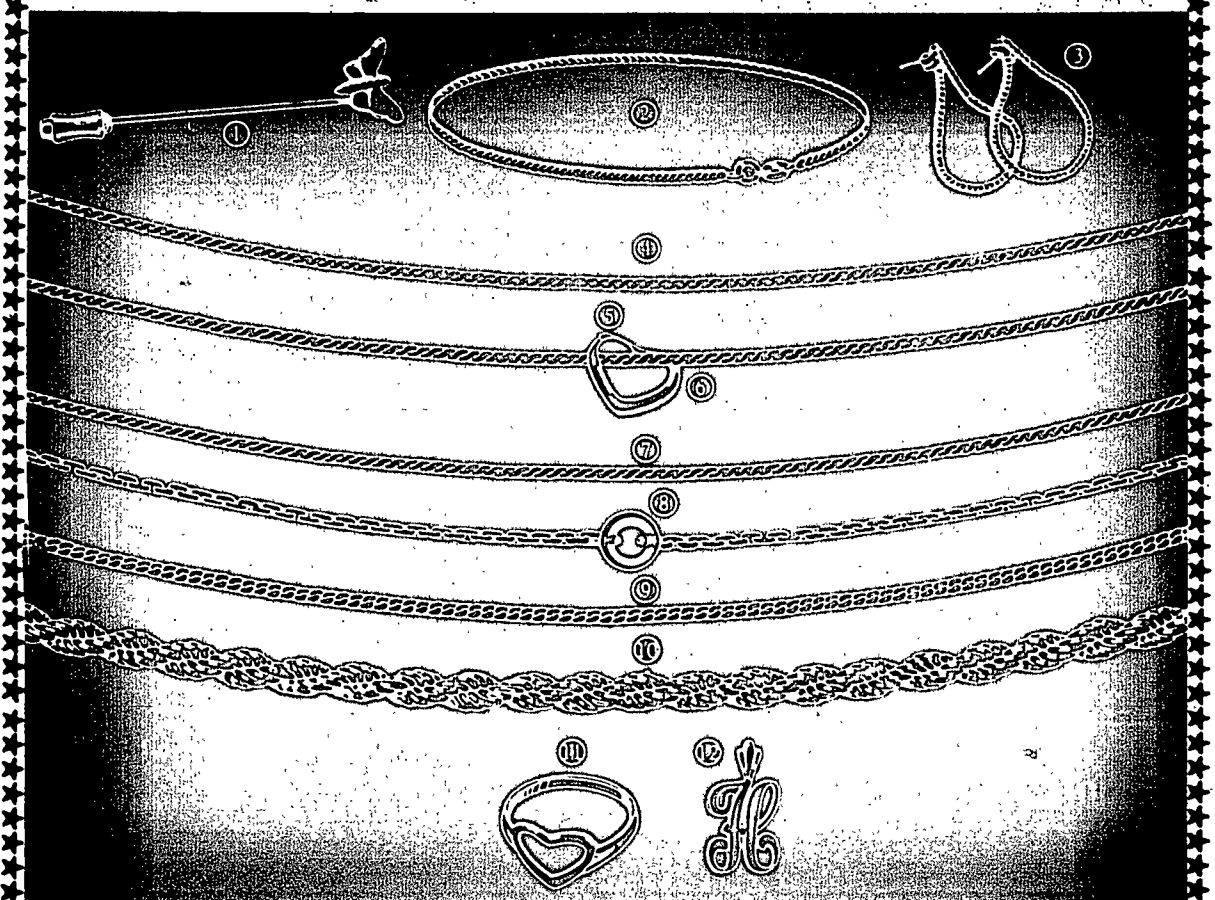

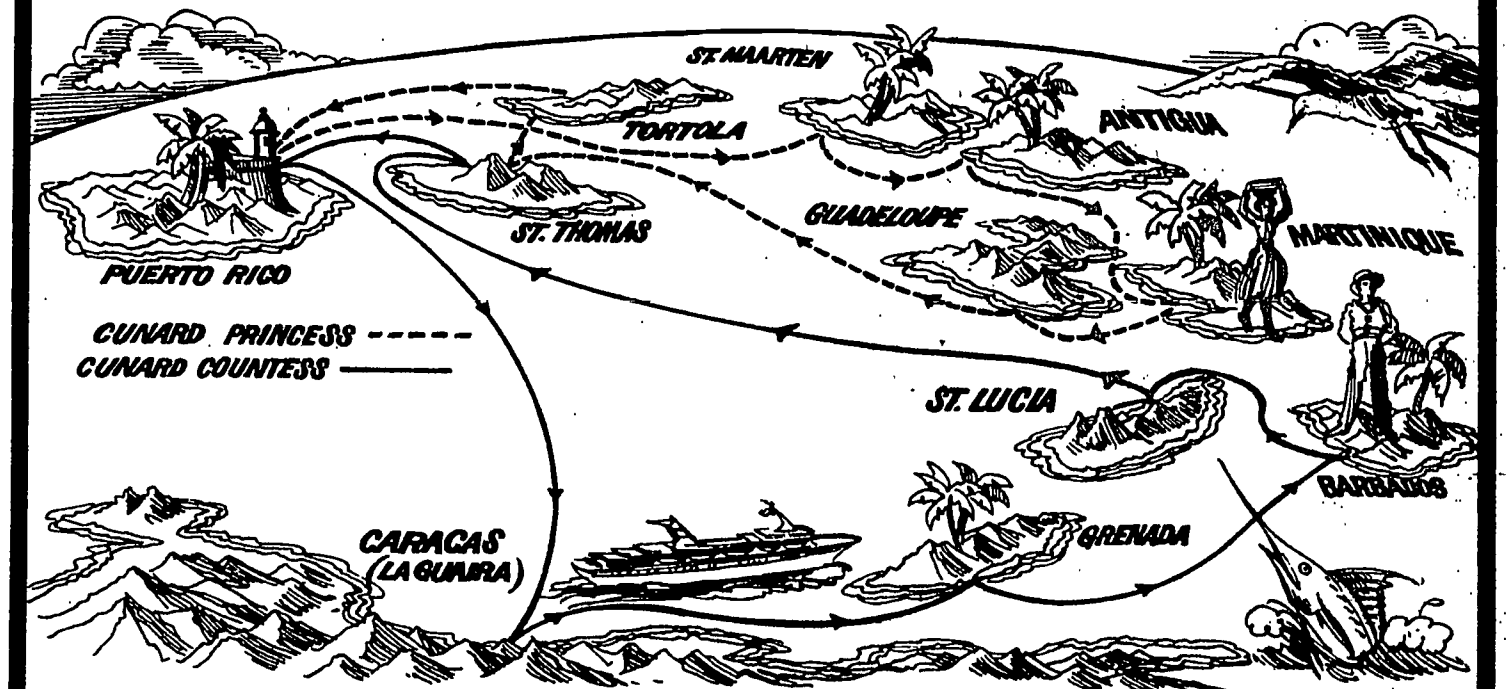

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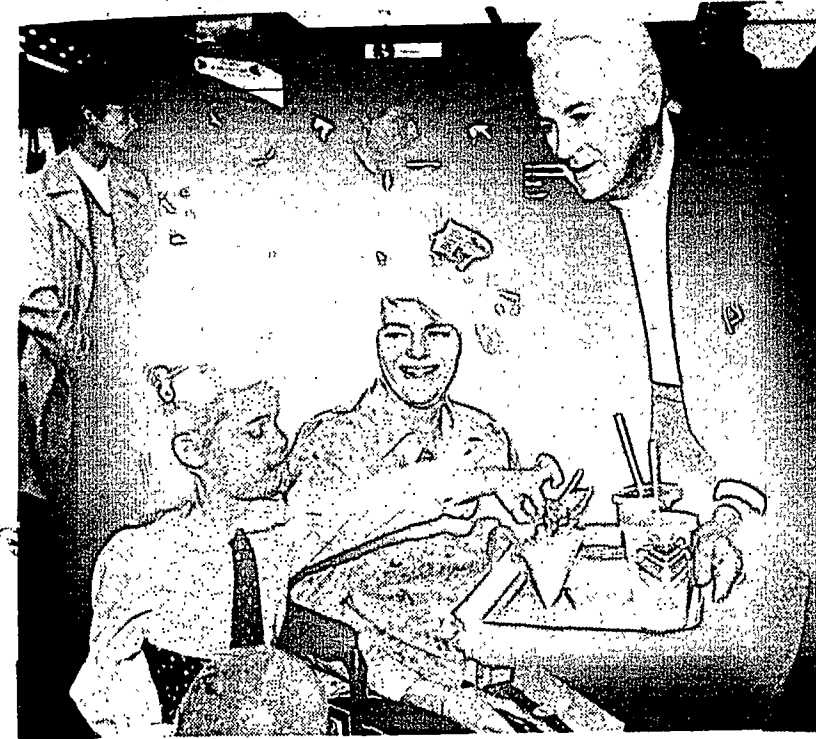

the vault in all three meets; and Mary Jo Happ (Morton Grove) whose excellent balance beam routine placed first in the meet with Regina.

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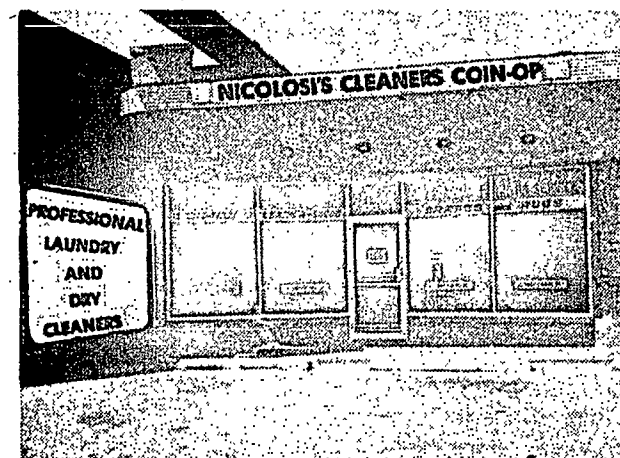
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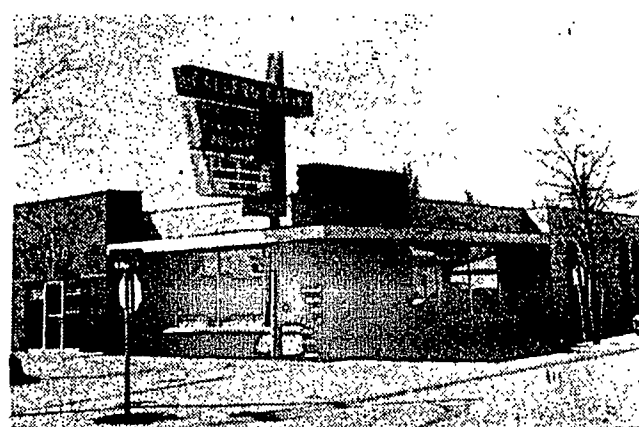
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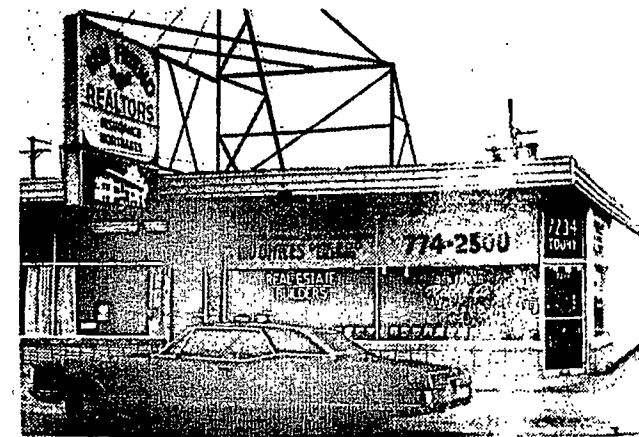
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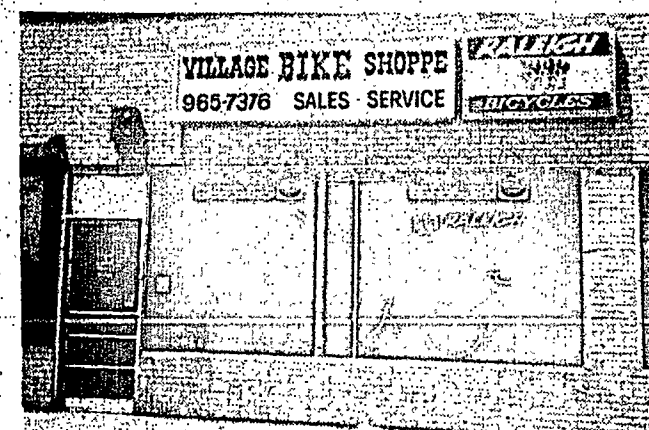
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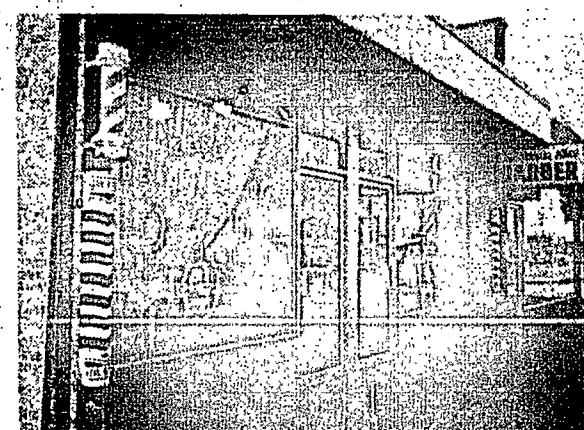

Housing experts say: Buy if you can

You might think snowy winter months, record high interest rates, and an emerging recession means that this is a poor time for house hunting; but many experts disagree. They say you should buy now because tomorrow's housing shortages and high construction costs will only send prices soaring even higher.

John R. O'Connell, President of Skokie Federal Savings and a member of the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation's National Advisory Board says "Unusually high interest rates and steep home prices have temporarily knocked many home buyers out of the market. As a result, prices are very soft and there are many good purchasing opportunities. But, I have seen signs that this buyers' market might not continue much longer, in fact, interest rates probably peaked in early December. Government mortgage auction rates have declined in each of the last six weeks.

O'Connell predicts that a drop in the mortgage rate, coupled with the more conducive Spring season will trigger increased sales.

Economists at the National Association of Home Builders point to a large inventory of unsold homes as the reason they have reduced their prediction of housing starts downward from 1.7 million to 1.4 million in 1980. It is this reduction in new construction that will result in a housing shortage stretching well into the next decade. The current stability in home prices is only a lull in the inflationary trend in

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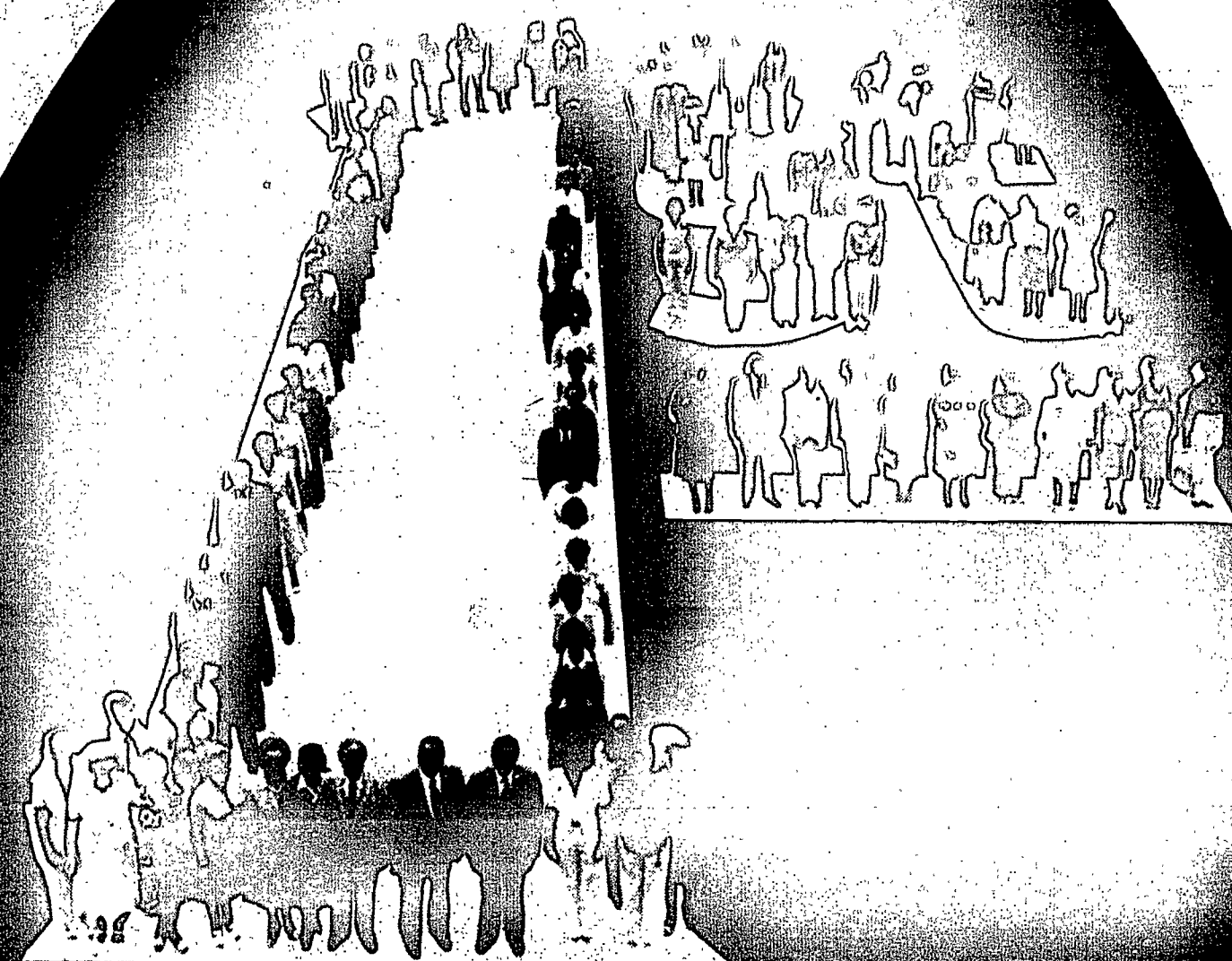
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
